

The New Earle C. Anthony Station

Actual construction work is beginning on the new studio building which is to house the new and greater radio station, K. F. I., on the roof of the building of Earle C. Anthony, Inc., at Tenth and Hope streets. Frank Meline has the contract for the erection of the bungalow of hollow tile that will house the entire equipment of K. F. I., and within a very few days the Llewellyn Iron Works will commence the erection of the gigantic towers on the roof of the Packard building, which will carry the aerials of K. F. I. higher than the tallest building in Los Angeles.

The studio room will be the best equipped station of its kind yet constructed in the west. The walls of hollow tile will be built sound-proof by Johns-Manville, so that not the slightest noise from the outside will ever penetrate, and so that the sound waves of speech and music inside will not be reflected from the walls. The room itself will be 18 by 24 feet and will accommodate an entire twenty-piece orchestra. An elaborate system of signal lights will preclude the necessity for any conversation within the studio.

The broadcasting mechanism itself is the 500 watt equipment of the Western Electric Company, the finest of its kind so far known to the radio world. It is to be installed by P. H. Evans of the New York office of the Western Electric Company, a radio engineer of long experience. The total cost of the new equipment of K. F. I. will be in excess of \$30,000, and due to the excellence of its aerial equipment and its favorable location away from the interference of tall buildings or hills, radio engineers predict that it will be unsurpassed in the West for both quality and range.

"The Part Radio Played in the World Peace Conference"

The First Story of Former President Woodrow Wilson's Trip to France to the Historic Gathering at Versailles, France, in 1919, by one of the "boys" on the U. S. S. George Washington, "The Floating Whitehouse" During the Conference

Editor's Note—This is the third installment of Mr. Davis' story. The first appeared in the issue of November 25th, and the second in that of December 2nd.

I have mentioned the vast amount of business we were called upon to handle. Here, in the fewest possible words, is how we did it; New Brunswick would send to us on one schedule No. 1 to 150 inclusive and we would O. K. for them on our following schedule and then send our 1 to 200 inclusive, waiting for their O. K. It wasn't as easy for New Brunswick to copy our 60 k. w. arc as it was for us to copy their big alternator so sometimes we would have to repeat some of our traffic.

On the trip over (abroad) the press was unrestricted as to number of words each man could send daily so if you know newspaper men at all, I do not need to tell you they simply flooded us every day. It was part of my duties to check press and I counted words until I was talking "press," eating "press" and when I would finally get to sleep, whole armies of words—little words and big words marched in endless rows, companies, columns and battalions through my dreams. I was strongly tempted to throw the ship's dictionary overboard just to relieve my feelings.

But the daily torrent of press wouldn't have been so bad had it been our traffic only. Almost invariably, however, just when we'd be in the middle of a schedule with all conditions right to unload a lot of press, along would come a message from the Communication Office with "DOUBLE PRIORITY—TO U. S. SENATE, WASH-

INGTON, D. C., across the top of it.

This would, of course, call for an instantaneous halt in press sending until we had sent the message and waited for a response.

Then, if nothing else had interjected, we would resume sending press, for each day's dispatches had to be cleared the same day, otherwise it would be "dead" news—and the newspaper men informed us sweetly that we would be too, if this happened. Not that we had the slightest fear of such a happening—the newspaper boys were there to keep a world informed and we were proud to have a hand in that work. History was being made and written—and broadcasted, all within one floating office.



Each of the ten correspondents would average 150 to 200 words and the President's code messages would run 200, 300, 400 or 500 words. Going to Europe we had very few "commercials." I would go into the radio room about 7 a. m., muster all the boys, O. K. all messages that had been sent and received during the night and forward them to the communication office. Next would come a careful inspection of the sets and equipment and to eliminate the necessity of a monthly inventory, I took daily check-ups of supplies, etc. stayed in the radio room until ten p. m., very often no sooner asleep than to be awakened about 1 or 2 a. m., with the report, "Chief, the key on the arc set is out again."

We had a big federal 13-contact key and we had such good results with the arc set that instead of the radator ammeter reading 28 amps., it would be reading 50, 58 or 60 amps., and in this way we'd be burning up teh key. Repairs would take until 3 or 4 and I'd turn in again, sometimes to be calld out a second time by the report, "Chief, I've a bunch of stuff to get off and there's some ship working right next to us and they will not Q.R.T. (Q.R.T. being international code for "Stop sending.") So we would battle that peaceful ending-about regular time to go on


