# Radio Topics of the Day

*Weekly Review of Radio News, Thought and Opinion*

## DAYLIGHT SAVINGS SHIFT SOON

Anticipating the advent of daylight saving time, which begins this year, Sunday, April 28th, at 2 a. m., the Federal Radio Commission has ordered that where the local time is changed from standard time to daylight saving time at the location of all the stations sharing broadcasting time on the same frequency, the operation will be on daylight time.

Where the local time is not changed, the stations sharing the same frequency, will operate on standard and not daylight saving time. The time of operation of all broadcasting stations which do not share time with other stations on the same frequency, will be on standard time.

## PROPOSED STATION TAX PERPLEXES COMMISSION

"One million dollars a channel" was the arbitrary value fixed upon each radio wave length during the recent Congressional deliberations on radio legislation. That this standard has no real economic basis was recognized by the members of Congress, but they were sufficiently interested to order an inquiry into the possibility of levying license fees upon those granted the right to use the precious channels of the ether.

Such an investigation is now being conducted by the Federal Radio Commission, with a view to complying with the resolution introduced by Senator Dill of Washington, calling for the recommendation of a schedule of fees to be imposed upon the several classes of stations. It is Senator Dill's idea that the charges should be greater, accord-

ing to the power and the use made by those to whom licenses are granted.

At least one member of the Radio Commission, H. A. Lafount, representing the Western zone, is already on record as being vigorously opposed to any plan of making broadcasting stations bear the burden of this license fee system. Mr. Lafount is, in fact, only lukewarm toward the whole license fee project.

## IOWA PRODUCES RADIO LEADERS

Iowa, where the tall corn grows, is the native state of two of the newest figures in the radio spotlight. One is Maj. Gen. Chas. McK. Saltzman, U.S.A., retired, new Federal Radio Commissioner, who was born at Panora, Ia., and the other, F. M. Russell, new vice-president of the National Broadcasting Company, in charge of Washington activities, from Lohrville, Ia.

It is well known that President Hoover, who has had more to do with radio than anyone in official life, was born at West Branch, Ia. Dr. Lee De Forest, a pioneer in the development of wireless telegraphy, was born at Council Bluffs, Ia.

## JUDGE STILL HAS THEM GUESSING

As yet there has been no further enlightenment when Judge Ira E. Robinson, Chairman of the Federal Radio Commission, will resign from the Commission, if he does.

One rumor is that Judge Robinson will accept a position as legal advisor to the Columbia Broadcasting System, and another that he will return to the practice of law, specializing in radio. Judge Robinson says if a move is made, it will not be before June 1.

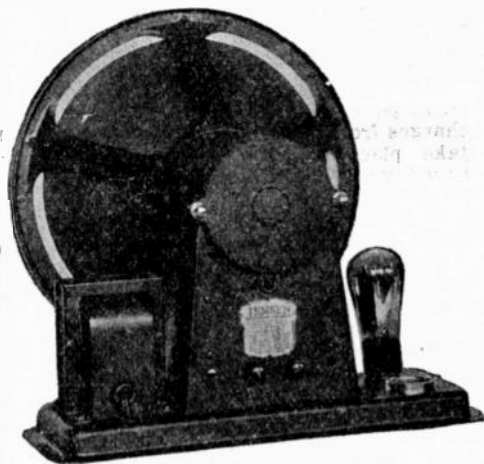

## The New Set Owners' Page

### STATIC

The term "static" is properly applied only to those audible disturbances in radio reception which are produced by natural causes. All other noises of man-made origin should be known as "electrical interference," and should not be herded under the general heading of "static." The layman is prone to call all extraneous noise in the loudspeaker "static," but it is important that he be able to distinguish between the real static and the electrical interference, for the reason that the latter can be eliminated, leaving only the former to try us!

Static is caused by the unequal electrical potentials in nature, and the discharges from one body to another which take place in equalizing this unbalanced condition. Lightning is an example of this. When a cloud contains an electrostatic charge of electricity of opposite potential to the earth beneath it, and the voltage finally reaches a value great enough to overcome the resistance of the intervening air, a discharge takes place. And this great spark sets up a violent ether disturbance or wave motion, which is heard in radio receivers at great distances. The usual heat lightning of summer is another source of static;—in fact, all of the natural conditions which give rise to unequal voltages caused by temperature changes, friction, etc.

Static is at a minimum in winter and a maximum in summer,—it is milder during daylight than at night. It can be intermittent, or almost continuous, consisting of occasional severe shocks, or a more consistent crackling. But it can readily be distinguished from man-made electrical interference, as the latter is usually in the form of a steady buzz, or if intermittent, it occurs with a fixed regularity.

Static does not interfere with local reception, and in winter is bothersome only on extreme distance. Whether or not the static will interfere with radio reception depends upon the static "level" with respect to the signal "level." The use of the term "level," in regard to radio reception, static and

noise should be understood by the layman.

The word is used in telephony as a measurement of volume and is expressed in transmission units, the unit being called the "decibel." For our purpose, however, to make the meaning of the term clear, we will simply assume arbitrary units of measurement, and say that with a radio set located in Los Angeles, KHJ is received with a strength which we will call 20 units. KOA will, of course, be weaker, let's say 6 units. It is logical, therefore, that if our receiver is adjusted so that we have comfortable volume from KHJ, and then turn the dial to KOA's frequency, we will not hear him at all unless we increase the sensitivity or volume by means of the control provided. Now assume that WGN reaches with us with a strength of 3 units. Assume further, that on this particular night the static, which is the sum total of all of the natural electrical disturbances, comes into our midst with a strength of 5 units. KOA will be received above the static, but when we increase the sensitivity of the set so that WGN might be heard, the static will be louder than WGN, and it will not be possible to receive him through the static. We will then say that "the static level is above WGN." All other distant stations, whose signal strength level is less than 5 on that particular night, will be submerged in the static, and all those who reach us stronger than 5 units, will be received.

Many people ask why they can receive local stations clearly, but must put up with the "popping" noise on DX reception. This becomes clear when the idea of the respective "levels" of the noise and the signals is understood. For local reception we reduce the sensitivity of the set to a point where the static is no longer heard. Our distant reception is, therefore, limited by the "static level," or taking into consideration man-made electrical interference also, by the "noise level."

The noise level varies from night to night, up and down, as does also the

## ? Questions and Answers ?

● A Weekly Department Conducted by K. G. Ormiston, I.R.E. ●

**QUESTION**—I get a lot of harmonics of the local stations. They show up in three or four places on the dials and prevent me from getting much in the way of DX stations. What to do; Oh, what to do?—F. E. N. Los Angeles.

**ANSWER**—The first thing to do is to stop calling 'em harmonics! Every time a local station pops up somewhere on your dial where it doesn't belong, please do not call it a harmonic and blame the station. This word harmonic has been so abused that one would think a broadcast station has more harmonics than a prune has wrinkles. While a station has a few harmonics, all right, not more than one of them is in the broadcast band, and that only holds true for stations above 400 meters! In Los Angeles, for example, KFI, KMTR, KPLA and KFVD have a perfect right to show up weakly at the lower end of the scale at exactly twice their operating frequencies. To illustrate, the true harmonic of KFI would be found at 1380 kilocycles, of KPLA at 1140 kilocycles, etc. The word harmonic means just the same thing that it does in music, and the harmonics of any fundamental vibration are the multiples of that fundamental. Broadcast stations are equipped with apparatus which is supposed to suppress these harmonics and keep them so weak that they carry but a very short distance. And what's more, they do it!

And now you are wondering what causes locals to appear at other points than where these true harmonics are. There are many reasons. I'll name four of them for you and maybe you can figure out some more.

1. In A.C. sets, the lighting circuits have a decided antenna effect upon the set. The lighting circuits have characteristics which give them natural periods or frequency just as in an ordinary antenna. Hence it is very probable that one of the local stations will predominate in the untuned lighting circuits and be fed into the receiver so strongly that this station may appear in the background of other stations—just seems to ride in on the other station's carrier. Remedy: An RF filter in the A.C. lines.

2. The same applies to the antenna connected to the set. The comparatively short aeriels used nowadays have a natural frequency somewhere down among the stations at the lower end of the tuning range. Hence these stations, and one station in particular, will predominate all of the time in the antenna. The antenna usually comes into the set, goes through a small coupling coil and out to ground. This circuit is tuned to some definite wavelength due to its electrical properties, and this wavelength may be exactly that of a local station. Hence this station will be the strongest in your antenna all the time that it is on the air, regardless of what station you may tune in. Supposing your antenna's characteristics are such that the antenna circuit is nicely tuned to KGFJ. Then, no matter whether you are listening to KGO, KPO, KFI or any other station, KGFJ is always the strongest station in your aerial circuit. This gives rise not only to broad tuning on that station but the formation of all sorts of heterodyne repeats. Suppose you live fairly near KFI and the lighting circuits are loaded with KFI's broadcast. Then we have the two frequencies of 640 and 1420 kilocycles combining to produce a "beat" or heterodyne frequency of 1420 minus 640 or 780 kilocycles. Hence, when we tune in 780 kilocycles, we will hear a bunch of mush in which sometimes we can make out KGFJ's program and sometimes KFI. You can imagine how many combinations are possible. Remedy: A loading coil in the antenna circuit which will raise its natural wavelength above the broadcast band.

3. Sometimes there are bodies of metal, unused aeriels, wiring systems, etc., close to broadcast stations, which have natural frequencies within the broadcast band. These affairs are energized by the close-by transmitter and re-radiate the program at whatever wavelength they may happen to be tuned to. In the old days of radio there used to be two unused aeriels close to KHJ, one on the Chamber of Commerce building and one on the Hall

## Radio In The Schoolroom

Unusual possibilities for making current events a part of common-school education are seen by school authorities in a recent radio installation in Signal Hill school, Belleville, Ill.

A master station in the principal's office consists of a Sparton Equasonne radio receiver, from which outlets are provided to eight classrooms. Plug-in jacks permit the principal or other operator to connect with any or all of these classrooms. The necessary volume and smoothness of reception to make the installation a utility rather than a curiosity caused extreme care to be used in the selection of the set finally chosen.

The practical use of the installation will be made through reception of events of national interest and of educational value. A good example is the recent presidential inauguration. Educators, in commenting on further use, suggest daily reception of one of the many fifteen-minute news bulletins that are being broadcast, of reception of good programs once or twice each week with appropriate lectures on music, and of radio reception to supplement the daily class-room callsthenics that have been introduced into most schools.

Officials of broadcasting stations are watching the spread of radio into the educational field with interest, it is said, and many are eager to provide instruction along diversified lines as well as entertainment, when a recognized demand exists.

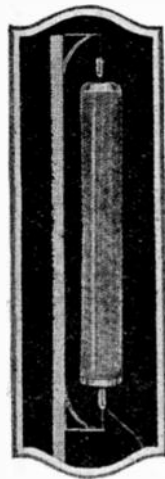

This month marks the ninth anniversary of radio communication established between seaplane and the Naval Air Station in Washington, D. C., and between a seaplane and a submarine in the Washington Navy Yard, demonstrating possible communication up to 70 miles between submarine and seaplane.

During February the regular transmission of West to East programs was started. A San Francisco orchestra is now heard at regular intervals from several Eastern stations.

## New Silver-Marshall Factory Near Chicago Airport

Temple Wholesale Distributors at Convention in Chicago

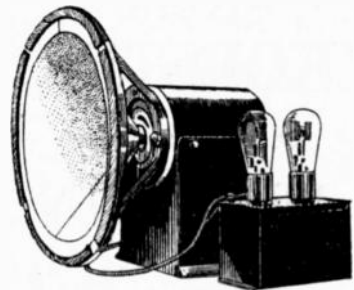

signal strength from the broadcast stations. Hence, one night a low powered station back east may have an unusually high signal strength, and the noise level may be unusually low, and we hear him. He may not again be above the noise level for a year or so.

One night the noise level may be so high that stations 500 miles away are submerged in the noise, and the following night perhaps the noise level will go down to where we can hear everything in the country! One location is better than another for DX reception, in that it will have a better signal-to-noise ratio. In other words, the choice spots are where the signal strength from distant broadcasters is uniformly high, and the noise level is uniformly low.

The general trend is, of course, to widen the gap between the signal strength and the noise level. This can be done by two means:

1. Reducing the noise level by eliminating all forms of man-made electrical interference.

2. Increasing the power of broadcast stations.

By preventing electrical interference at its source or by blocking it out of the radio receiver or both will reduce the noise level to natural static alone. And this demon can then be conquered by increasing the power of the transmitters and reducing the sensitivity of the receivers.

of Records. There was enough energy in them from KHJ to give a healthy reading on a meter, and both radiated KHJ's programs at wavelengths other than the one which the station used. We took 'em down and the two "alleged harmonics" disappeared. Some broadcast stations have a mess of unused wire in their antennae. Here we also have the possibility of radiation at some other frequency than the one assigned the station. KGEF recently had this difficulty and the chopped-up flat-top aerial was taken down and a vertical cage similar to that of KEJK and KNX installed.

4. Another source of "repeats" is due to an unbalanced condition in the set itself. By detuning one or more of the circuits which are ganged on one dial you can make almost anything happen, because the set will be always resonant to two or more frequencies instead of one.

We have not mentioned super-heterodyne receivers, which are inherently blessed with a local oscillator tube which has its own harmonics to heterodyne with the incoming signals and give still more reasons why the locals should be found in many unexpected places on the dials. However, the superhet has other advantages which offset this disadvantage.

I didn't mean to get into such a long answer to your question, but I would like our readers to understand that there are many, many conditions in their own equipment and installation which may make local stations seem very broad or have several "repeats" or be "mushed" so that the quality is poor, etc., and in no way be the fault of the stations.
