history behind the gas footlights in an earlier Hammerstein show, steps up to the mike and lives his little space of glory all over again!


Ted's famous grandfather, bluff, hearty old Oscar Hammerstein, is not there to witness this come-back triumph. But somewhere—maybe in a New York tenement—maybe in a Chicago flophouse—maybe up in a penthouse or down in the slums, some aging Victorian tunes in his radio to listen to the voice of his youth whispering back across the years.

Meanwhile, in Manhattan, at Columbia's Radio Playhouse, the curtain between then and now rises to the lively strains of "Ta-ra-ra-boom-de-ay." In the wings, a heavy figure with nervous hands and a limp shock of hair that gave up trying years ago, polishes his spectacles to re-read his script for perhaps the hundredth time.

Imagine if, he thinks. Fifty years of amusing the great and the near-great of two continents—yet he feels like a

schoolboy about to declaim his first platform monologue. Back in 1886, when Grandma laughed at his antics, he used to reel off jokes and sing his own compositions for twenty unhurried minutes, delivering them in the order that suited him best. And Grandma, laughing behind her ivory fan with its little painted flowers, used to think "O, You Kid" while she

## THE STORY OF THE WORLD'S MOST-DISCUSSED ROMANCE

THREE years ago Mrs. Ernest Simpson met King Edward VIII—then the Prince of Wales—at a week-end party at Fort Belvidere, one of his private residences. Ironically, the lovely Wally Simpson was introduced to "P. W." by the woman who was to have preceded her in his affections: the American-born Thelma, Lady Furness. Mrs. Simpson, clever, ambitious, witty, was seated beside the Prince at the first dinner in Belvidere, and the romance began then.

Today repercussions of that meeting are felt throughout the world. Everywhere

two questions are asked: "Will King Edward marry Wally Simpson? And if he does, what then?"

For years the Prince of Wales was the world's No. 1 bachelor. Princesses have sought his favor. Women who were the social rulers of two continents have thrown their daughters at his head. But, until he met Mrs. Simpson, talk of his marriage was never seriously considered.

Wallis Warfield Spencer Simpson made her debut at Baltimore in 1914. She came of a family illustrious in the history of America; she was beautiful, unusually intelligent, decidedly witty, and her debut was a great success.

At a United States Naval Academy dance at Annapolis, she met Lieutenant E. Winfield Spencer. They were married in Baltimore on Nov. 8, 1916—and amicably divorced in 1922.

In 1926 the former Wally Warfield went to England. There she met Ernest Simpson, Harvard graduate, member of the famed Coldstream Guards, successful London business man. Their marriage was followed by a meteoric rise in the highest London social circles, culminating in their presentation to the then Prince of Wales—and in their divorce a few weeks ago.

Mrs. Simpson became the Prince's closest friend. Their relationship was unostentatious at first, but gradually Mrs. Simpson began to take precedence over everyone else in the Prince's entourage. She nearly always accompanied him on his frequent

trips to the Continent—sometimes Mr. Simpson was included, but more often not—and it was on one of these trips, to Biarritz, that talk of a romance between Edward and Wally first became widespread.

George V, the present King's father, was unalterably opposed to the relationship,

and it is probable that father and son were estranged when George V died. Queen Mary is also believed to be violently opposed to Mrs. Simpson, and she is joined in her firm stand by the Archbishops of York and Canterbury, highest English church authorities, and by the court Tories who were so close to King George.

Supporting the King are those younger courtiers who have come into power since his accession. Labor and the mass of the English people are believed by King Edward to be on his side.


In any event, King Edward cannot marry Mrs. Simpson until after his coronation in May. He faces four possible courses of action: He can elevate Mrs. Simpson to the nobility so as to stifle, at least superficially, the conservatives' objections to her. He can make Mrs. Simpson his wife (he can never make her his Queen), and then, in order to settle the question of succession, appoint the Duke of York his heir. He can abdicate, marry Mrs. Simpson, and live the life of a private citizen. And finally, he can give her up entirely and marry one of a half-dozen or so eligible European princesses.

To this enigma of royal romance, no one has the answer.


I HAVE answered the letters of thousands upon thousands of women, trying to help them in their personal problems. But this is the first time that I have ever sat down to write a reply to a letter which was never sent.

I have never maintained that I am infallible, nor that my solution to any human problem is the only one. I have never been in search of pat solutions. I have merely tried to help these women think through their own problems, "talking it over" with them and

re-stating the questions objectively. I have found that a letter sometimes helps to accomplish these ends.

So let us talk over your problem, Wally Simpson. At this time the attention of the world is focussed on you more sharply than ever, for it is no longer a matter of conjecture that King Edward intends to marry you. You are news, Wally, in bold caps. Editors in most parts of the world are thanking whatever gods there be that forty-one years ago Wallis Warfield was born in Baltimore, U. S. A. Blood may flow like a torrent over all of Spain, and the world may tremble precariously on the brink of another ghastly war, but one glimpse at the news stands tells us that Wally Simpson still claims the front page—the big headlines.

You were news—gossip is a form of news, too—as far back as 1932, when you were that trim and charming mystery woman, driving a sleek Rolls Royce on the Riviera and along the Biscay coast. The question was: Where is Edward? For Edward was a modernist. A democrat. A daring innovator who flew in airplanes and visited the homes of the poor. He acted like a human being, and when it became no longer a secret that he preferred your presence to all others, can there be any wonder that your name burst out suddenly in front-page headlines and was on everybody's lips? It was clear to all that the royal romance of all romances was taking place—the real-life story of the king who loved a commoner. The undying theme of art and

And now, as I write, Edward has decided that he will announce his engagement to you after his coronation next May. The impossible has happened, and it was Wallis Warfield, of Baltimore, who did it.

I AM not being flippant when I say that the attitude of most Americans is that our Wally has made good. Sensitive Britishers may be offended, but I'm afraid we regard you just as we regard Mrs. Jones' daughter—who married a good, steady young man who's likely to give her everything she needs. Wally is marrying well, we say.

She died of peritonitis following a serious operation at a Santa Monica, California, hospital. Before her death, her father said, "I forgive Vallee everything, including the hard things that were said during the divorce proceedings." In New York, Rudy broke down and cried when he was told of his former wife's passing. He was unable to do his show at the swanky French Casino. Another loss to the entertainment world was the beloved Mme. Ernestine Schumann-Heink, opera singer-friend of the radio audiences. She died in her Hollywood home following hemorrhages of the throat and lungs. Two blood transfusions had been made, but her life could not be saved.

**T**HE company that specializes in electrical aids for the hard of hearing (and which sponsors Cheerio) is putting out a special radio which permits the deaf to enjoy air entertainment. with a sense of pride and satisfaction.

I'm sure you'll forgive this familiarity. But why shouldn't Americans be proud of your achievement? Haven't we always considered it a glorious achievement to demonstrate to the world that there are no class distinctions? You have done this better than anyone else ever could. But you are still the quiet, engaging, dark-haired daughter of Teakle Warfield, of East Biddle Street, Baltimore. Soon you may be Queen of England, but now you are just Wally to most of us.

**I**T WOULD be well for you to consider an aspect of your problem that is likely to be lost in the trumpeting and fanfare. I refer to what your fellow Americans expect of you. You should realize, as I have pointed out, that we consider you a sterling product of a glorious democracy. You have penetrated the sacred corridors of musty tradition and bridged the greatest so-

cial gap that man has ever created. You have brought a new meaning of democracy to the British Isles.

So you see, Wally, you have done a fine thing and we expect you to continue doing fine things to prove that good bearing, charm, intelligence and tact are not alien to democracy. I am sure you will not let us down.

**T**O MY way of thinking there cannot be enough fanfare and rejoicing over your achievement. The only pity is that the human values involved should be so completely obscured, and I think that here we should not fail to emphasize them.

I am glad to observe that Edward is now leaving no stone unturned in his effort to bend the tradition-loving British public to his way of thinking. It is a tribute to his sense of fair play, to his tact and discretion, that he respects the sentiments that have been instilled in his people over the course of centuries—that he will not run roughshod over them. And I know that you

would not require him to demonstrate his love by doing anything that would spoil your chances of a genuine happiness together.

Just as public opinion has been molded to think the chasm between King and commoner is unbridgeable, it can also be remolded to accept your marriage as a sign of progress and enlightenment.

**I** THINK that Edward's newspaper campaign, which is about to go into effect, should have the desired effect upon the minds of the English people. Before you know it, Wally, they will be feting you instead of whispering furtively about you. They will hail their King for claiming his inalienable right to love and marry as he likes—a right that few kings have ever had the courage to demand.

Yes, your Edward seems to be the man of tact and drive that we Americans have always thought him to be. If his subjects prove lacking in the kind of sportsmanship for which Brit-

ishers are famed and which is typified in their King, then they deserve to lose him to you. If it should come to pass that he must choose between you and his crown, I say, well—to put it mildly—anyone can wear a crown!

**R**IGHT now the court circles are buzzing with gossip about their love-smitten King and you. To be sure, Wally, these are not commoners who are whispering behind their hands, but they are in no way different from the frowsy, robust housewives who gossiped over back-yard fences in back of your mother's boarding-house in Baltimore. The difference is just one of degree. Gossipy housewives in Baltimore talk about the way Mrs. Brown is carrying on with the policeman on the beat; the lords and ladies of the court whisper about Mrs. Simpson and the King. I'm sure you're wise, Wally. You'll attach equal importance to both types of gossiping—royal and rabble.

I know there are certain values, certain issues that make your problem a

# GREATER COURAGE

**A**FTER school on a glittery February afternoon near White Cottage, Ohio . . .

Gerald Nixon, 12 years old, and Raymond Kelly, 10, trudged panting toward the top of an icy slope and turned their sled around. Beneath stretched the sparkling course. Gerald snuggled flat against the sleek wood, ready for a perfect "bellywhopper." His mittened hands gripped the steering-rod. Raymond got on behind.

"Let's go," he shouted. The steel-runnered sled moved slowly at first, then quickly gathered speed. The boys yipped shrilly. Mournfully, from somewhere near the long, level finish to which they were racing, a train whistle echoed. Deafened by the rush of air past them, they didn't hear—until it seemed too late.

Then, as the tiny wooden craft hurtled nervelessly toward the grade crossing, a slip of a blond girl hurled

\$500 award in a weekly series. She had been chosen by a group of judges from several fields as outstandingly deserving. Already the timid little Ohioan with the five-pointed blue ribbon in her hair had visited the President of the United States, earned a gold medal, and a somewhat irrelevant but very much appreciated Mickey Mouse.

**T**HE judges' board was set up. It included Joseph V. Connolly, president of International News Service; Dr. James E. 
But although the Thursday night program has done much to dramatize the American every-day hero, it was not needed to produce him. For decades, the proof had accumulated. In a recent period of less than two years, yellowing newspaper files reveal stories of conspicuous bravery and sacrifice on the part of an obscure tugboat captain, a subway change-maker, a Negro cotton-worker, a 5-year-old girl, high-school boys, priests, nuns, a grandmother, phone operators, cab-drivers, miners and handymen.

Radio, automobiles, the infinite mechanical comforts of this generation, may be making life easier and safer. But the threats of fire, of ice, of tor-

**S**EVEN months later, 12-year-old Clara Kathryn Van Horn stood beside Kate Smith at a CBS mike in New York, and for that feat of heroism, reenacted over the air, received the first

They went for the new program in a big way because it dramatized the superb, unsuspected courage of Joe Doakes, the neighbor's boy; of Andy Curran, who pumps gas down at the crossroads; or of Helen Lee, who always runs errands for her mother. It showed that although heroism was not an every-day thing, heroes and heroines were usually every-day people, like they themselves, their families and their friends.

fifty-dollar-a-month salary as a record librarian, was given information about the forestry service. Her oldest boy wanted to take up forestry in connection with the University of Minnesota, and she didn't have money enough to assist him.

A physician in Decatur, Georgia, caught flu during his war service with the medical corps. It developed into pneumonia and then into tuberculosis. He has recovered now, but he can't go back into his profession because the disease has destroyed his vocal chords and he can speak only in a hoarse whisper. At fifty he feels that he must find a new occupation, "go into the business world; do something useful and helpful to my fellow man." Where is there a place for him in a world that has moved on? The School will try to advise him, in general broadcasts, on new occupations.

**A** LETTER comes in: "Would it be too much to ask you if I missed a program on either music or painting, before the program on glass which was the first I got? I am just another old fool grandmother that wants or hopes so much for the youngsters, but I am trying to paint a little picture for a little grandson's room, hoping to inspire him with the lovely things in life."

A man in Portland, Oregon, after spending his years since 1905 in the meat-packing industry, has been told by his firm that he is too old. He had believed that his training, his long record of service, his knowledge of the products and of the demand in various sections, would make him more and more valuable to the company the older he got. In his bitter awakening—fired, at fifty-seven—he wants to know, "If a business receives governmental protection, is it not also fair to a citizen to receive the same?" It is that same question, asked a hundred thousand times, which led to the recent enactment of employment and old age insurance legislation.

**V**OCATIONAL guidance courses should have been given in our schools twenty years ago. Radio supplies them, where many schools failed to do so.

The broadcasts bring startling results at times. One on "The Master of Light and Shadow, Rembrandt," was heard by a painter in Memphis, Tennessee, who was working in his studio on a portrait. He was a man who had studied years in Rome, Madrid and Paris, and who had made seven trips to the Holy Land to collect material for his masterpiece, a canvas six feet high and twelve feet long. On this, his masterpiece, he has been working for twenty-two years, aided by his wife. But what was surprising was that this painter's name, too, was Rembrandt! Born in Leyden, Holland, he was the last of the Rembrandt family. He was so amazed to hear his name come out of the loudspeaker that he snatched up a pen and wrote to the studio to "let them know there is a real Rembrandt still alive, and working out a miserable livelihood, not in Holland but in this country."

**A** PROGRAM giving the history of the Mormon Church brought a reply from Orson Rega Card, a grandson of Brigham Young himself. One on "Stanley in Africa" was heard by Mrs. George C. Cartwright of West Hartford, Connecticut, whose grandfather, Captain Josiah Richmond, was the whaling captain who took Stanley down the coast of Africa to Zanzibar. In the same fashion, "With Peary in the Arctic" was heard by Lily Larkin of Ossining, New York, whose nephew was a member of the Peary expedition.

But most touching of all are the bedridden, the crippled, the hopeless invalids into whose lives a ray of excitement and interest and drama has come, thanks to the programs. Such a letter as this little one, signed "Albert Austin, age 12," does not mean much at first reading. "We have a radio in our Home and have been listening to your Public School programs," it says. "We have enjoyed them very much. I liked the Geography lesson and the Hamilton family best." But it means much more—ah, how much more!—when you look up at the top and see "Home for Incurable Children" on the stationery. That is Albert's "home"—the only home he will ever know.

A brave but heartbroken mother writes in about her little daughter Jane, who is ten years old. "She has been bedridden for one year. A year ago she fought a good fight with a streptococcus infection together with complications of scarlet fever and diphtheria. Now, being left with serious heart trouble, it may be a long time before she is able to return to school—if ever. In fact, she will probably have to learn how to walk all over again. In the meantime, she is allowed only to listen to a few radio programs. She absorbs so much of these programs, and it is astounding the way she remembers every one!"

**T**HE School of the Air may be the only schooling Jane will ever receive. Good work, that, certainly!

From another little girl comes this, just as it stands, misspellings and all: "I was very severely burnt last Aug. 5 and had to stay on my back till Nov. then I could get up but I haven't been out side till a couple weeks ago. So you see I haven't missed a program for I haven't been to school this winter. I have been studying hard and my teacher is going to pass me to Number 4 I am 8 years old. I would have a lonesome winter without your program. I am, Your Little Friend, Mary Jane West, Box 444, Wellsburg, W. Va."

To a certain millionaire businessman, self-made and unschooled, who listens to the programs secretly in his Wall Street office—to the chambermaid in a slum rooming-house whose radio is now her most precious possession—the School of the Air brings the one thing these two people were denied. Learning! To hillmen in the Ozarks and lonely rangers at fire lookouts in the dense Oregon forest it brings—current events. To crippled and sick children, and to old folks, it brings fascinating tales of adventure—science, fantasy, glorious music. The School of the Air is that rare and valuable combination—delightful entertainment plus solid, worthwhile education.

**N**O OTHER program on the air has done so much as this. Small wonder, then, the top-hatted gentlemen from Denmark and Mexico and Japan rush all the way to New York to shake hands with the slight, pretty girl at CBS, Helen Johnson, who watches over the School of the Air, and ask to study her methods. Small wonder that the British Broadcasting Corporation, over in London, is reputed to take the programs off the air on short waves and record them on phonograph disks, so valuable does it think them. There are probably few programs on the air today which can claim such fanatically devoted listeners.

Here indeed is radio as it should be, and as it will be—a radio that truly serves the people. Here, ladies and gentlemen of America, is the radio of 1953—today!

wall and pull himself up, hand over hand. They stared while he squirmed to a standing position atop the tank. With one hand clenched around a dripping rung, he swung out of his rubber coat and attacked the creeping death. The fire was soon out.

But there are humorous angles to heroism, as well as tragic. For years Helen Wroblewski of Jersey City was kidded by her boy friend about being afraid to "swim like a man." One day, shortly after they announced their engagement, he, George Anderson of Kearney, swam out beyond his depth. Suddenly the youth cried out, threshed about wildly, and sank. Helen saw his hand break the surface. She forgot her fears and churned towards him. Inexperienced as a life-saver, she still managed to bring him ashore.

Shortly after a novena in St. Valentine's Roman Catholic Church in the Bronx, a savage blaze seethed through the wooden structure. Only one thing was saved, a vessel containing the blessed sacrament. The Rev. Joseph Ramisicewski, a visiting priest, had crawled through the searing heat of the doomed sacristy to bring it out.

**C**ONSIDER the heroism of a 50-year-old grandmother, Mrs. Mary Foley. Three grandchildren were playing on the second floor of their Brooklyn home when, from the kitchen below, she sniffed smoke. Mrs. Foley ran upstairs and found the blaze leaping angrily about the room, the children huddled in a corner. Forcing the window, she lifted three-year-old Doris Peters to the sill. A moment later Doris plunked into waiting arms. Next four-year-old Arthur plunged to safety, unerringly aimed, and finally baby George. Then Mrs. Foley climbed up.

"Here goes," she warned, stoically. She landed safely in a web of arms. Who was America's greatest everyday hero? That's a tough one, too tough to try to answer.

The fact must remain that America has such every-day heroes—and if there has yet been none to match the world-wide renown of the little Dutch boy whose finger plugged the dike, it is certainly not because we lack boys of equal courage. It is rather because we have no dikes.

cheered him back for encores.

But tonight, his few lines, written for him, are timed to the split second. Will anybody out there in the studio—anybody among the millions listening in—remember him? Will they like him? And how can he tell, if they do?

For nearly half an hour this quiet old man watches the fast-moving, well-paced show. Against a living backdrop comprised of the Music Hall orchestra, young Ted Hammerstein graciously introduces his guest stars.

**T**HERE'S Jerry Mann, introducing a new radio fad known as "mouthies" and another game, called "What's This?" with sound effects. There's Lucy Monroe, too, singing "A Star Fell Out of Heaven."

But the old-timer in the wings isn't seeing Ted or Lucy. He's seeing old Oscar Hammerstein . . . paying little Ted buffalo nickels for the privilege of writing memoranda on the boy's starched Buster Brown collar. He's seeing Oscar talking to Eleanora Duse and Bernhardt and Maude Adams, stars who could show these young smart-alecs a thing or two!

But now, in the midst of his reverie, young Ted (the whipper-snapper) is smiling at him across a script . . .

"Again we build a bridge across the years from my grandfather's Victoria theater to the Hammerstein's of today. And crossing it now is a man who has been a headliner for over fifty years. A brilliant star of the old Hammerstein Olympic theater in 1895, and later of the Victoria . . . a grand trouper . . . eighty-four years young . . . the Great James C. Thornton!"

His cue! With jauntily erect shoulders, he stumbles out to the microphone. Near by, his young host questions him about former triumphs. But how can the glory of fifty years be crammed into less than five minutes?

**E**IGHTY-four years old and still a trouper! Jim Thornton was a little boy when Abraham Lincoln was shot. He was a full-fledged trouper when the Statue of Liberty took up her vigil on Bedloe's Island. He has weathered four depressions and voted for fourteen presidents. He has seen bustles replaced by hobble-skirts, hobbles replaced by the knee-length fashions of the post-war era, and the whole kit and kaboodle of them replaced by trailing "cocktail gowns."

In the fullness of his life, he has seen people come and go.

But to many of the gray-haired men and women listening to his broadcast, he is not an octogenarian with a quavering voice and trembling hands. He's the great Jim Thornton, the "deadpan" monologist of the Mauve Decade. With great solemnity, he used to tell stories that convulsed them. On Broadway, his keen humor and good fellowship were as legendary as Jack Benny's today, and his devotion to his first wife, Bonnie, as legendary as Benny's to Mary Livingstone, or George Burns' to Gracie Allen.

Bonnie is gone now, and the green moss trails creeping fingers over the old-fashioned sentiment carved on her marble marker, but it was she who inspired many of his famous song-hits, hits that you know, even today.

It was while riding in their carriage through Central Park that Bonnie said, "How lonesome the man in the moon must be without a sweetheart." So Jim promptly wrote "My Sweetheart's the Man In The Moon."

**JOE HOWARD** is another old-timer who made a radio come-back on the Music Hall. Joe's over seventy now, but he can still put over a song with the best of them. In fact, he does it every evening in "The Gay Nineties," one of New York's liveliest night spots.

## GIVE US SOMETHING TONEY

**T**HE leading singers of "swing-topated" melodies in the Northwest might owe their success to the fact that two of them are brothers and the third argues like one.

The popular "Three Tones" trio consists of Hal and Ernie Garven and Paul Fillmore. Though the boys are only in their mid-twenties they have been harmonizing for radio since 1930, when Hal and Ernie were "dueting" on WDGY, Minneapolis, and Paul was a member of the "Three Musketeers" trio at the same station. It was there the boys started their climb up the high and treacherous ladder toward fame and fortune in the entertainment world.

They have incurred responsibilities; Hal and Ernie are both married while Paul is auditioning with someone he considers the perfect sponsor.

Those lower rungs of the ladder are years in the past, but the boys often

a bolt from the blue, a friend in need suggested The Three Tones.

The suggestion clicked instantly with them and the name seemed to add new impetus to their upward climb. With less than two weeks' rehearsal the new combination was put on the staff at WTCN.

The Three Tones had been at WTCN about one year, during which time they had also made numerous recordings, when commercial jobs called them to WCCO. On their first sponsored appearance here the boys' hearts were literally in their throats. Paul had a severe cold, and though Hal and Ernie had forced him to swallow two boxes of cough drops and several aspirins, he still complained that "my throat feels like it's going to find the Lost Chord."

As the months went by the Three Tones became something more than

remember the disappointments and tribulations of those early days. They recall with laughter the keen competition that existed between Hal and Ernie and the Three Musketeers. There was the time one of the Musketeers had called Hal by telephone and told him to dash down to WDGY as there was a certain sponsor who wanted to hear the duet team immediately.

It was a blizzard, cold, winter night when Hal and Ernie hurried to the station. They warmed up to the boiling point, however, when they found the call had been a joke. Their method of reciprocation gave the Musketeers some harrassed moments. The two boys had all their friends, relatives, and any strangers who would join in, write to WDGY expressing their dislike for the entertainment offered by the Musketeers.

**I**T took some length of explanation before the Musketeers were able to sing at ease before the mike.

A third boy joined Hal and Ernie to form a new trio and this unit soon went to WCCO. They were quite successful in gaining new contacts and contracts. Appearances followed on KSTP, Minneapolis and St. Paul, but fate had arranged an even better trio to be formed. Early in 1932 this trio and the Musketeers disorganized, with three of the group leaving for solo jobs or parts in musical productions.

From the remnants arose the combination of Hal, Paul and Ernie, a combination spelling success. The three boys decided they must have a name for their unit, something "toney." Like

just a singing trio. Ernie, the pianist and first tenor, began doing a guitar accompaniment. Hal, baritone and also a guitar player, showed remarkable versatility on the harmonica in novelty numbers. Paul, second tenor, became practically a whole string orchestra, playing the violin, mandolin, and base viol—one at a time, of course.

By 1935 the Tones were doing four heavy commercials plus three and four personal appearances a week and in between times making animated film shorts. Adlibbing on informal shows proved their ability to handle dialogue and the Three Tones soon found themselves singing, playing and acting, not to mention doing minor sound-effects when necessary.

Hal, Paul and Ernie gained another rung when they appeared in a weekly half-hour show over CBS, originating at WCCO, Minneapolis.

The boys are noted for their novelty numbers, which are arranged, as are all their numbers, by Ernie. In preparing a novelty number Ernie works ahead of rehearsals and only does a little touching up after the first rehearsal. The swing and instrumental numbers are arranged during a "jamming" session, in which a song develops into the beautifully rhythmic tunes of the Tones.

There is a high ladder reaching to entertainment "tops." The Three Tones struggled and plugged through disappointments and bad breaks to reach that high rung they now stand on. They are not resting yet. They want to hear it said, "The Tones are 'Tops'." And then they won't stop!





When Ted introduced him to the radio audience, people like your grandparents and mine remembered an advertisement which appeared Nov. 5, 1905, in all New York newspapers:

**HAMMERSTEIN'S VICTORIA MUSIC HALL**—(Prices, 25, 50, 75, 1.00 with smoking at all performances).

First time in vaudeville, Anna Laughlin, late of the "Wizard of Oz." Joe Howard, singer. Also, return of Will R. Rogers, expert lariat thrower.

The transition: November, 1936. Will Rogers, America's beloved humorist, is dead. Hammerstein's Victoria has vanished from Broadway. Anna Laughlin has retired from the stage, has married, and is the mother of a radio star. In fact, she's the mother of Lucy Monroe, prima donna of this very program, and she's the ex-partner of this same seventy-year-old Joe Howard, just facing the microphone to sing "I Wonder Who's Kissing Her Now," the torch-song of the Mauve Decade.

It was in 1899 that Joe first introduced another famous song, "Hello, My Baby," at Oscar Hammerstein's Victoria, then just opened. He remembers it is "a regular actors' club."

"Just two big dressing-rooms," he says now, "one for the men and the other for the girls. We always went early to swap stories. Nearly everybody knew everybody else. We all watched a new act from the wings and made suggestions afterwards. There were gas footlights and no orchestra."

Well, times change. Imagine the fate of an actor bold enough to stand in the wings of the Palace and criticize or make suggestions today!

**R**ECENTLY, on Ted's program, Maude Nugent sang "Sweet Rosie O'Grady," the song-hit of 1896 which she wrote and introduced in her own headline act forty years ago in his grandfather's music hall.

And so they come, this parade of old-timers, tramping out of the past into the present, to relive at the microphone the glory that was their adulation and the grandeur that was their fame back in the days when Grandma was a girl. Some have gone further than Hammerstein's Music Hall. Others have appeared once, then dropped from sight again.

Even in the hardened eyes of a blase theatrical agent I saw tears when he told Ted and me, "Some of these oldsters look desperate when I tell 'em I haven't got any work today. And I know there won't be any tomorrow, either. It kinda gets me."

"I know how you feel," Ted agreed. "Some of them have dropped out so completely I can't find them. Others I do find are rusty and scared so that we can't use them. In fact, so few are qualified for return engagements, we're thinking of leaving out old-timers from the program altogether."

Thus, scores of fallen stars who have been Ted Hammerstein's guests on his radio Music Hall during the last two years, recalled briefly into the spotlight by means of his grandfather's scrapbook, are again, and perhaps finally "at liberty" as actors always call their periods of unemployment. Many are too old to come back, even if they could adapt their old-fashioned entertainment to radio requirements.

No, time doesn't fly. Only we do. Down the long years we run, the ghosts of yesterday barking at our heels, the specter of our unknown tomorrows just around the corner.

Will the youngsters—the popular air personalities of today, be as fondly remembered tomorrow? And if so, will there be a televised Music Hall to welcome them back for a short hour of revived triumph?





SHORT-WAVE reception has been rather erratic during the past few days, but on a few occasions remarkable signals were recorded. Wednesday, November 11, was open house for the Nazaki, Japan, stations. At 10:25 p.m. EST (9:25 CST), JVE (15.66) was heard calling PLE of Bandoeng, Java, in English. A few minutes later JVF (15.62) was logged while making contact with KWU of Dixon, Cal. Turning to JVH (14.6), I found this station radiating an excellent program of Oriental music. . . . At times, signals can only be classed as unbelievably good. Such was the transmission from 2RO (9.635) of Rome, Italy, on Friday, November 13, while broadcasting a talk by Mayor Al. Williams of the U. S. Air Reserve Force on his impressions of Italian aeronautics. . . . HJ4ABH, La Voz de Armenia, in Colombia, no longer under W2XAF but transmitting on 9.52 megs, is coming in with exceptional clarity. I strongly recommend the characteristic music broadcast by this station. . . . ZBW of Hong Kong, China, has reappeared on a frequency of 9.525 megs, after an absence of several days.

A new station, giving no specific call letters, but announcing in English as "Radio Delta" at Chiclayo, Peru, was heard on a frequency of 6.14 megs at 1:40 p.m. EST (12:40 CST), reports John Deibe of New York City.

THERE are now several places in London where the general public can have an opportunity of seeing the programs broadcast from the new BBC television station at Alexandra Palace. Receivers have been installed in railway stations, museums and several big stores. Manufacturers of television receivers, which can now be obtained at prices ranging from \$300 to \$500, have already received a far greater number of orders than they had anticipated.

For the benefit of the large Finnish population in North America, transmissions with aerials directional here will soon be inaugurated from Lahti.

PREFERRING to spend one week of his vacation at home, twisting the dials of his receiver, Paul Dilg, well known DX'er of Evanston, Ill., kept track of the air miles represented by different foreign stations logged daily and found that at the end of the week, he had reached the amazing total of 2,039,800 air miles. 448 programs from 105 stations in 37 different foreign countries were recorded. No attempt was made to tune in difficult or rarely heard stations, and inasmuch as the

majority of the log is made up of commonly heard stations, Mr. Dilg feels that his stunt is an undeniable testimony that the world is at our fingertips. He favors us with a few facts picked up in his aerial wanderings: SPW (13.635) of Warsaw, Poland, transmits at present on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 12:30 p.m. EST (11:30 a.m. CST); LZA (14.97) of Sofia, Bulgaria, may be heard almost every afternoon but is best near 4 p.m. EST (3 CST); LSX (10.35) of Buenos Aires, has instituted its own "Argentina Hour," which is heard on Mondays and Fridays at 5:30 p.m. EST (4:30 CST). In the future this broadcast may start an hour earlier due to the recent adoption of daylight-saving time there; GSG (17.79) is unofficially transmitting in conjunction with GSF and GSH during transmission II from Daventry at 6 to 8:45 a.m. EST (5 to 7:45 CST); YV1ORSC of San Cristobal, Venezuela, is back on the air again, utilizing a frequency of 5.72 megs.

French long-wave station "Poste National Radio Paris" is to be rebuilt near the center of France. Its present transmitting site near Paris will be left vacant. The present "Radio Coloniale" will be moved to the new spot and eventually the long heralded 100,000-watt will go on the air.

THE Czechoslovakian giant has not been coming in very well of late, leading me to believe that its transmissions are being directed elsewhere. The early morning transmission from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. EST (7:30 to 9:30 CST), on a frequency of 11.875 megs, is being heard with fair strength. . . . My Nipponese correspondent, Akifusa Saito, of Kumamoto, Japan, writes that the following broadcasts are in effect: To Europe, Tuesdays and Fridays at 2 p.m. EST (1 CST) over JZK (15.16) and JZI (9.535); to South American and the Atlantic coast of North America on Mondays and Thursdays at 4 p.m. EST (3 CST) over JZK and JZI; nightly to Hawaii and the Pacific coast of North America at 12 mid. EST (11 p.m. CST) over JVH (14.6). The new 50,000-watt transmitters, son to be completed, will be used for all transmissions to North America, thus assuring more certain reception from the land of cherry blossoms.

Observer George Sholin, of San Francisco, Cal., concludes that the Khabarovsk, U. S. S. R., station, recently reported on 5.7 megs, was not RV15, but an entirely new station, probably RV54. It was heard immediately after the transmissions on 5.7 megs came to an end. RV15 is transmitting as usual on 4.243 megs.

She told her story during lunch at Universal studios, where she is the star of "Three Smart Girls," a picture written to suit her astonishing talents not only as a singer but as an actress as well. In the midst of the excitement attending her discovery, Deanna seems to be the only one who remains composed and unaffected.

She is slender but sturdy, with blue eyes and brown hair. Her figure is that of a child, but she has the poise and grace and voice of a completely mature woman.

"I was born in Winnipeg, Canada, on December 4, 1922," she began. "Dad's name is James Durbin. He's a broker. My mother's name is Ada. Neither of them sings, and I don't know of anyone else in the family who does. They say my voice is just one of those accidents—I seem to have grown-up vocal chords. Doctors say the same, and so does my teacher, De Segurola. I guess it just happened!"

And she shrugged her shoulders, grinning.

"It's a lot of fun, but a lot of hard work, too, being a singer. I have to get up at 6:30 and get to the studio for my make-up and hair-dressing by 7:30, because I must be ready for the cameras at nine. During the day I have to put in three hours of school work with Mrs. Wells. That's required by the Los Angeles school board. You see, I have three years more of high school and four years of college ahead of me. As soon as I am through at the studio I go to Count de Segurola's for my singing-lessons.

**WE REHEARSE** Saturday night for the radio program and again at 10 Sunday morning. Mr. Cantor has a preview of the show in the afternoon, and then the actual broadcast in the evening. So you see I don't have much time to play.

"But I'm naturally healthy, and since Mother tucks me into bed by 9:30, I get enough rest. I play with my dog Tippy—he's mostly spariel, I

think—and when I have a chance I go swimming or horseback riding. I don't have much chance to see my friends, but my friend Dorothy Forbes was given a job as my stand-in, so that makes it nice.

"I'm studying Latin so that learning languages will be easier for me. My teachers say that's the best thing to do.

"'Il Baccio' has become sort of a theme song for me—anyway we call it that because it has brought me good luck. It's my favorite song, I think.

"My favorite possession is a letter from Norma and Irving Thalberg, written to me just a few days before his death. It was to thank me for singing at the dinner given Dr. Johannes Poulsen, the director of 'Everyman.' On the program at the dinner were four singers—Allan Jones, Gladys Swarthout, myself and Rosa Ponselle. They were all very kind to me and afterwards Mr. Thalberg sent me a huge bouquet of roses and orchids."

WHERE and when he had met Dorothy Janis previous to the publication of that statement is just another one of the missing pieces in the jigsaw puzzle picture that is Wayne King's personal life.

All of his relatives agree that they met through her uncle by marriage, who plays saxophone in Wayne King's band, and that this meeting undoubtedly took place in Chicago.

Supposedly, after a short visit in Chicago and an even shorter romance with Wayne King, she returned to the West Coast and her movie work.





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# WAYNE KING'S INSPIRING LIFE STORY

in publishing her pictures. Newspaper columnists racked their brains for fresh superlatives with which to describe her charms.

Hers was a sensation that far surpassed the preceding "It" record established by Clara Bow.

During the latter part of May, in 1931, a personal appearance tour brought this glamorous creature to Chicago. It was just another stop on a national circuit that was taking her all over America following her first big motion-picture smash, "Hell's Angels," but it happened to coincide with one of the gayest weeks Chicago has ever celebrated.

The city was knee-deep in "Jubilee" festivities, a tremendous promotional project designed by canny State Street merchants to combat business depression.

Highlight of the festivities was a huge carnival which featured dancing in the street. In order to accommodate the mammoth crowds, six of radio's most popular orchestras were drafted to play for the shindig and these occupied elevated platforms located at the six principal intersections of the downtown loop.

Ben Bernie and his lads were on one platform. Jan Garber on another. There were Herbie Kay, Dan Russo and Art Kassel.

And of course—there was Wayne King.

Extra-curricular entertainment, provided by Balaban & Katz, was enlisted to augment the musical entertainment.

The glittering girl with the platinum hair who was packing them in over at their Oriental Theater was ordered to the platform occupied by the Waltz King.

Her name, in case you haven't guessed it, was Jean Harlow.

PERHAPS the masses may have realized that drama was being enacted before them, for the platform occupied by the Waltz King and the picture queen was speedily surrounded by scores of spellbound people.

In the tensify of the occasion, Jean Harlow nervously smoked a cigarette while Wayne King played for the dancers.

When she had finished with it, she tossed it idly into the street.

Strange as it may sound, that insignificant cigarette stub caused what was probably one of the greatest downtown street riots Chicago has ever witnessed.

The stub had hardly landed in a near-by gutter when the mob was on it like a pack of hounds.

A half-smoked cigarette bearing lipstick stains from a mouth as devastating as Jean Harlow's was a memento well worth fighting over, and before anything could be done, the battle of the century was on!

IT TOOK a flying wedge of fifteen stalwart Chicago policemen to get Jean Harlow, Wayne King, and his twelve-piece band into the big two-decker city bus hurriedly called to transport them to safety.

After this turbulent start, the romance between the bandleader and the blonde is rumored to have gained momentum rapidly.

"They saw each other constantly for almost two weeks," one of my informants told me. "Wayne sent his car and chauffeur to the theater after her every night and then she'd drive out and pick him up at the Aragon."

And every night, perhaps, the two of them stole away to some quiet rendezvous where they could get a midnight snack and exchange those youthful confidences that make the early days of any romance days to be remembered—long after the romance itself has died.

It must have been grand while it lasted, but like a skyrocket, the King-

Harlow romance blazed across the Chicago sky and was gone almost before anyone knew it had started.

No one seems to know why it ended. Maybe it wasn't really serious in the first place. Perhaps Jean, hardly more than across the threshold of her career, wasn't willing to give it up for Wayne. Perhaps he didn't ask her to.

ON THE other hand, maybe her blond beauty, through sheer force of contrast, reminded him of a dusky brunet in California.

Whatever it was, Wayne, as one of his intimates told me, "certainly burned up the long-distance telephone wires calling Dorothy Janis during the next few months." And soon afterward, on January 12, 1932, in a letter to Charles Gilchrist, one of Chicago's prominent radio editors, Wayne King informally denied romantic rumors about Jean Harlow without directly mentioning her name.

Two months later he was married. His bride was Dorothy Janis, petite little star of "The Pagan," and several other Hollywood pictures. The ceremony took place March 22, 1932, in Highland Park, a North Shore suburb of Chicago, and the wedding dinner was held that night in the Congress hotel.

Phil Stewart, honey-voiced announcer on the Lady Esther show, John Kozel, guitar player in the Waltz King's band, and Ward Keller, former bass player, were the only guests.

To my way of thinking, Wayne King's marriage illustrates perhaps better than anything else, that famous "power of persuasion" which every-

first amazed Hollywood. Or, as Louella Parsons said in her column, "panicked" Hollywood.

There is really no explaining that remarkable voice of hers.

She sings with the vocal cords of a woman of 22," says De Seguirola. "The larynx and vocal cords are powerful and mature. She sings with no effort. But what is just as important, her voice has what you might call a focussed quality.

"And what is just as important, Deanna's mental development has been as advanced as her voice. That is indeed a rare combination. I would say such a voice and mind, together, make her unique. It is like discovering a blue-white diamond in a mine. "I teach her as I would a woman, not a child. She readily grasps reasons and explanations, even though they are sometimes very technical.

"I cannot be mistaken in her voice, for I have made fine voices the one adoration of my life. And Deanna's voice surpasses them all."

That is indeed high praise! Deanna's happiest hours are spent with him in his studio, near the famed Bowl. De Seguirola's active career as a singer and as an actor in motion pictures ended several years ago with his retirement. He emerged only to take a role with Grace Moore, his friend, in "One Night of Love."

Most touching in the relationship of master and pupil is the fact that Deanna leads her teacher about by the hand, and is his guide! For Count de Seguirola's eyesight is failing, and objects a few feet away are lost in a blur. To see the teacher following his pupil brings a lump to the throat.

Deanna has not had many public appearances—her first being at the famous Breakfast Club of Los Angeles.

MOST exciting of all her invitations to make a public appearance came from the White House. She was a very disappointed little child when her other work prevented her from going to Washington for the annual concert conducted for the President.

For a thirteen-year-old, she has a mature judgment, a fact demonstrated when Eddie Cantor decided to let her select her own songs.

At De Seguirola's studio, Deanna stands by the grand piano and sings to the portraits of the great singers who would, if they could hear, be amazed at the voice which issues from her child's throat.

De Seguirola's comment on her mental development is well taken. At thirteen she has finished a year of junior high school, despite the interruptions of her career. And she has demonstrated that she can act as well as sing. When Universal signed her for a picture, it wanted her voice. The picture had been in work for only a week when production was stopped and the entire story rewritten to give scope to Deanna's acting abilities.

"She begins where other child stars leave off," declares Charles R. Rogers, head of Universal.

Meanwhile she is continuing her radio broadcasts with Eddie Cantor. At the time RADIO GUIDE sent me to interview her, she was preparing for that clever little Romeo and Juliet skit with Bobbie Breen. She was looking forward to the program with all the joy of a child awaiting Christmas.






