



HOW HOLLYWOOD BROKE

Schumann-Heink's HEART

HOLLYWOOD killed Madame Schumann-Heink!

The city where so many stories of tragedy are portrayed on celluloid finally crushed and broke the indomitable spirit of the woman who had survived so many tragedies in her own life.

People, as a rule, feel that their passing should be blessed with a smile. They do not want to leave the impression that theirs was an unhappy ending. They want those smiles . . . and no trace of tragedy.

So with this woman.

But now that she is gone and time has dimmed the sorrow of her passing, the real truth behind the death of this great diva can be revealed for the first time.

SCHUMANN-HEINK was unhappy in her first love, fought for the very food necessary to sustain life, re-married and was blissfully happy—only to have her dreams shattered by the death of her second husband. Death shattered her dreams again when it struck her beloved sons on the battlefields of France. Tragedy . . . sorrow, seemed to be her lot in life. But she survived it all.

By the time she had reached the age of seventy-four, when many another person would be incapacitated and in need of help, she was still carrying on. She was ready to launch herself on a new career! But that never was to be. The hope that was hers when she came to Hollywood died . . . even before her great heart stopped beating.


Perhaps her feeling of utter hopelessness can be more poignantly told in her own words, taken from a letter to a dear friend!

"My part was ready after the first four days since I sang for charity. I have been home for a week, enjoyed it, but, of course, I am restless and want work . . . the movies are, so they say, great; my little part, but in August it shall decide what the future will be . . . this waiting is not pleasant for me."

Behind that letter, and many more that tell a story of idleness and slowly fading hope, there is stark tragedy.

This is what happened to Schumann-Heink:

"Life begins at seventy-five," she jokingly told friends when she boarded a train in Chicago for Hollywood.



She boarded that train with joy in her heart because she was hoping for a new career in motion pictures. She was hoping that she would reach all the eyes that had hitherto been only ears. She felt that surely now she could inspire some of us who were burdened with troubles . . . inspire us through a new medium that would not show, as she realized her voice was

beginning to fail, the toll that the years are bound to take.

"All my life I have been a tragic figure," she confided to Josef Koestner, famous NBC composer-conductor. "Now I shall make people laugh in pictures. Mother Schumann-Heink shall no longer be a sorrowful Wagnerian contralto."

Hollywood greeted her as they

would a queen. Indeed she *was* a queen. Even Hollywood, where names are made to glitter in lights, acknowledged her as the queen of all mothers. She was wined and dined. But none knew that she enjoyed, most of all, her quiet little dinners in the Hofbrau with Marion Talley and Josef Koestner.

Making motion pictures was a new experience for this veteran of the stage and opera world. She went to work on the M-G-M lot, where she made her first appearance before a movie camera, with Nino Martini in "Here's to Romance." Hers wasn't a large part, but it meant that she had to work as hard as anyone else, and that is what she lived for—to work, and to bring joy to a great number of human beings.

WHEN "Here's to Romance" was finished, Schumann-Heink said good-bye to Hollywood. Again she returned to Chicago, but this time to await a call from the studios.

Some things happen quickly in Hollywood—others, slowly. When the first rushes of the new picture were studied, studio heads began to realize that Schumann-Heink was a new character. She had the ability to steal a scene with a warm, genuine smile, or a gesture.

The motion-picture industry decided it wanted her.

Jesse Lasky, her close friend, boarded a train for Chicago, carrying a contract for the diva to sign. By air, speeding more quickly to his destination, was a representative from Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer—also with a contract for "Mother" to sign.

Hollywood still talks and puzzles over Schumann-Heink's signing that Metro contract. People wonder why she signed with a studio other than the one represented by her good friend.

The truth of the matter is, Schumann-Heink was utterly unaware that any other contract than the one she signed was to be offered her. She did not know that Lasky was en route to see her. And she was heartbroken

"I WANT TO BE ONE OF GOD'S PEOPLE!" THE SONGBIRD OF THE SOUTH DESERVES THAT TITLE!


THIS is a story I could have written five years ago about Kate Smith if I hadn't been a fool.

The story which writers and magazines go to any length to duck is the story which tells all about how Oscar Opple, the king of the kilocycles, the delight of the dialers, gives away all his salary every week to widows and orphans. They duck it because it's hoey. Oscar gives five dollars to charity (and tells his press-agent to say it was five hundred) because he hopes he'll get some publicity out of it. Or he does it because he's afraid someone will find out how tight and selfish he really is and razz him for it. Or he does it to build up an air characterization for himself as Oscar the open-hearted, the great philanthropist who can't look at a wilted geranium without bursting into tears. Any way you look at it, it's boloney, and boloney of the kind to make you good and sick at your stomach.


Well—live and learn, live and learn!

Everything they say about Kate Smith's heart being in the place where hearts ought to be is true. I'll go that statement one better. Nobody in this wide country of ours that we call America knows *one-tenth* of the things Kate does to relieve suffering and bring happiness to people in whose lives happiness is a rare visitor. The reason I've found out about it is that I've just met a friend of hers who knows a lot that has never been told. I happened to catch him in the right mood and he opened up and—to put it frankly—he told on her. He told me some things I never knew before, and some things you never knew before.

For instance, I think the picture of Kate which I will always carry in my mind from now on is that of the

Kate who refused to sing, one night, because she couldn't sing when people were suffering. You remember those floods we had in the Middle West last year. That was when. Kate has an office with a rehearsal room built into it, in a part of New York a stone's throw from the green grass of Central Park where nobody would ever look for it, and she was due there at four o'clock in the afternoon to practise. She didn't come. She was sitting at home beside her own radio, listening to the first accounts of the flood disaster coming over the air. At six o'clock—two full hours late—she ar-

rived to rehearse.

"Well, this is a fine time to get here when you've got a program to-night!" her manager greeted her witheringly. "Are you crazy?" He's an old friend and he speaks out.

"There isn't going to be any program," Kate answered, and to his incredulous astonishment there were tears in her eyes. "How can I sing?" she burst out. "Who'll listen to me? People's homes are being washed away, I tell you. I'm going to go on

the air and tell everybody to send money to the Red Cross."

"Now, Kate," it was pointed out to her, "it's all right to talk a little for the Red Cross if you want, but you've got a program and a sponsor. You'll have to sing a couple of songs."

"All right; I'll sing a couple if I have to," she agreed. And went on the air that night and began talking for the Red Cross as soon as they gave

her the mike, and didn't stop once until the whole fifteen minutes were up. She raised one million dollars in four days for the flood sufferers. Money was rolling into CBS by mail faster than they could count it. The longshoremen of the New York

docks brought her silver dimes and quarters and dollars in burlap bags.

During the recent Ohio River flood, Kate Smith diverted more than \$14,000 which she had planned to award to guests on her Command Appearance program to flood sufferers. This in addition to \$10,000 she herself contributed! The grand total of her personal contributions and those inspired

by her will probably exceed another million dollars!

Just before Christmas a year ago Kate got a letter from a little girl who said her mother was too poor to buy her a doll but she bet she'd get one from Santa Claus. Kate started talking on the air that night, and the first thing she knew she was giving a certain comedian a terrific tongue-lashing for making fun of Santa on his program when millions of kids believed in the old Saint. "If any of you've got an extra doll around the house," she ended up, "send it to me." She had two hundred the next day. Christmas morning, 8,000 dolls in new boxes with holly paper and ribbon went out by Western Union messengers to little girls in towns all across the country.

A sick boy in an "iron lung" in Poughkeepsie wrote in that his mother was sick and nobody came to see him. Kate asked people to send him post-cards. He got 30,000 pieces of mail. There were ball bats, five-pound boxes of candy, toys and telegrams. A woman in South Bend, Indiana—I wish I knew her name—sent him a dozen roses every day for weeks.


A WOMAN on the West Coast made a practise, one day each Summer, of cutting every flower in the garden which was the pride of her life and taking the bouquets to invalids. The florists in New York heard about her and told Kate they'd donate the flowers free if Kate wanted to start something like that on the air. Today on National Flower Shut-In Day you can get flowers forwarded free to any sick person you know just by sending his name in to Kate.

She went down to Richmond, Virginia, to put on a show at the Mosque Auditorium. Her end of the evening's gate—she had fifty people in her company—was \$5,200. At the end of the evening she said, "Oh, t'hell with it," or ladylike words to the same effect, and handed over the whole sum to the Rotary Club to send 16,000 kids to Summer camps. She paid the fifty train fares for her own people herself.

Once a year out in Columbus, Ohio, the big men of the city who started their careers as newsboys sell papers on the street, the money going to charity. You can't buy a paper from anybody else in Columbus on that day,

and they don't give you any change. Kate went out to Columbus and sold papers from nine in the morning until ten at night. When a big apartment house in the poorer section of another Ohio city, Cleveland, burned down and there was not a dollar to take care of the families that were made homeless, Kate went on the air from 10 p.m. to 6:30 a.m., wearing out five orchestras, and raised \$7,700.

Why go on? No matter where Kate goes, she's called on to talk or sing for some charitable or civic organization. The whole nation has accepted her as the one to do the job. There are organizations which could ask President Roosevelt to come and address them but which prefer Kate.

By actual count, she has put on something like two hundred actual performances for charity. That is counting only the performances for which she got on a train and went somewhere—to Minneapolis, say, or New Orleans. The instances when she has used part of her program time to make a charitable appeal are literally

countless. They must number well over a thousand. When she was on the air five nights a week, for example, she made a professional beggar out of herself just about three nights out of five. Most of her appeals and personal appearances are for hospitals.

WHY hospitals? There are good reasons for the things all of us do, and for Kate Smith's appeals for hospitals.

Among Kate's earliest memories as a child were two beloved uncles. One of them wasn't really her uncle, but her grandfather's brother. Both of them were doctors. The younger one wasn't so close to her, because he practiced in Atlanta and Kate's parents lived in Washington, but the other—grave, dignified, kindly—was her pet, as she was his. Somehow she sensed that they were "different" from ordinary people, without knowing exactly where the difference lay.

Then, just as she reached the most sensitive period in a girl's life, the Great War came along. Kate, a roly-

poly youngster with her hair down her back, was already something of a celebrity, locally, as an entertainer. She sang for the enlisted men at church suppers. Kate, young as she was, had the good sense to realize that scores of the soldiers she sang for were going away never to return.

Then her cousin Arthur, barely older than herself and very close to her—so close that tears come into her eyes when she speaks of him—was killed overseas. That brought it to a focus. Suddenly she knew why her two doctor uncles were "different" and why she loved them so dearly—because they dedicated their lives to bring relief to suffering human beings.

"They seemed like—like God's people," she says. "That's the only way I can say it. God's people—put on earth to try to end suffering."

The war ended and the boys in khaki began to drift back home. Kate saw the marching men—but she saw as well the limping, broken, crippled men who "also came back."

"They looked so old," she says, "so

old, so old! All I could think of was that here were boys who had left families and never would be able to earn a living for them again. There were boys who would spend the rest of their lives strapped to hospital beds. . . . It made me see how much suffering there was in the world. From that day to this I've wanted to do all I can . . ."

No one can say she hasn't done it—hasn't done all she can.

RADIO came to Kate Smith as an accident—but it offered such staggering figures as that \$5,200 for a night's work. Salaries like that will endow a great many hospital beds and send a lot of slum kids to Summer camps. And for using her salary to do these things, Kate will be remembered always in the hearts of God's People, to whose number—and I take off my hat—she most certainly belongs.

THE STORY BEHIND THE JACK

REFORMED juggler!" "Cad!" "Toothpaste salesman!" "Gelatin hawker!"

And still the battle rages! There are no holds barred, no epithets too strong, no denunciations too bitter! It's the feud of the century. The Dempsey-Firpo fight? A waltz. The Martins and The Coys? Mere hide-and-seek. The Spanish Revolution? Nothing but a skirmish. This is a fight! This is the herculean Benny-Allen feud! This is—"It's Town Hall Tonight!"

It's Fred Allen on the air. Listen! "Now, before presenting our first guest I would like to react to some verbal mayhem shunted at me, from Hollywood on Sunday last, by an itinerant vendor of desserts. I won't mention this gelatine hawker's name at the moment. Suffice it to say he has a sideline, called by some, a radio program. On this radio program, last Sunday evening, this gentleman—and the word gentleman is used with intent to libel—this spoilsport fell asleep—fell asleep on his own program, mark you, making it unanimous. While he was asleep he had a dream, during which he shot at me six times... This Benny is a killer, folks—when he's asleep! If you ever meet him snoring, be on your guard!"

But wait a minute—that isn't all!

UP THE steps of the old Town Hall, mounted on a rearing paint hoss, waving his deadly six-shooter in one hand and his even deadlier violin in the other, comes that much-hunted desperado, that scourge of the Wild West country around Hollywood—Buck (Alias Jascha) Benny himself! Will he say it with bullets?

Certainly not! He'll riddle Allen with words! Benny turns to his faithful side-kick, a *vaquero* far-famed in song and story—Andy Devine!

Listen!

"We got a new villain now, Andy... His name ain't Cactus Face, either."

"Oh, you mean Rattle Snake Allen."

"That's the varmit!" roars Jack.

"Did you hear him last Wednesday when he said you were anemic?"

"Yes, I did... He should talk about my being anemic... That Allen is so anemic that when he eats a blood orange, his veins jump up and down with glee... That Allen is so pale, when he sleeps between two sheets the bed looks empty... He's so anemic that he has to stick out his tongue to get color in his face."

And everybody in America is listening—and laughing. From Broadway to Turnip Hollow, the Benny-Allen feud is on everybody's lips. The listeners are for Benny. They're for Allen. They're for both of them, they're for neither one. They like the feud, they think it's funny. Or they don't like it, and think it's dull. But whatever they argue, whatever they think, they're *talking* Jack Benny and Fred Allen!

WHAT is this fight, anyway? How did it start? How long will it last? What's going on, behind the scenes?

And here are the answers:

Last December 30, Fred Allen had as a guest on the Town Hall show a youthful violinist, Stuart Canin. As his contribution to the program, Stuart played Franz Schubert's "The Bee," an extremely fast and showy number requiring considerable technical ability. Young Master Canin turned in a great performance, and as the applause subsided, Allen remarked—entirely *ad-lib*, there was nothing in the script—that a certain alleged violinist by the name of Benny ought to be ashamed of himself for his poor fiddling. Allen thought nothing more about the remark, but on the next Sunday—January 3—Benny, in an "open letter" to Allen, declared that he had played "The Bee" himself at the age of ten.

Pooh pooh, said Allen the following Wednesday night. He ridiculed the idea that Benny could play "The Bee"—or anything else. And in mentioning another, similar number, Rimsky-Korsakoff's "Flight of the Bumble Bee" Allen said the composer had written it so the bee could escape from Benny.

Up to this point, the feud was being carried on in spontaneous *ad-libbing*. But it began to be too good a thing to

leave to chance. It became a regular feature of both shows, it was written into the scripts, and it will stay there just as long as it's funny.

And everybody thinks it's funny! That is, *almost* everybody! For, believe it or not, some people think it's a serious fight. Some people think Allen and Benny are at each other's throats in earnest. There's a possibility that they may be, of course, before this fight is over! Neither is notably thin-skinned, but a fight is a fight, and expert wise-cracks sometimes hurt! However, that possibility aside, the "reformed juggler" and the "alleged

violinist" certainly are good friends.

They knew each other in the old vaudeville days, and they kept step when they hit the big-time on Broadway. Now they're scrapping—but a feud is fun. And worth-while fun, at that. Witness the Ben Bernie-Walter Winchell feud, a genial long-distance argument that has brought valuable publicity to both.

So—don't think Fred Allen and Jack Benny are hurting each other! They're not. They love it! When Benny calls Allen a "reformed juggler" (true enough, by the way; in fact, Allen chipped off all his back teeth doing

one balancing stunt) or wonders audibly if "Allen" is his real name (it isn't: Fred's name is Sullivan—and Benny's is Kubelsky, and what of it) it's all a gag, and nobody's mad.

And when Fred Allen tells everybody within listening distance of a radio from the Atlantic to the Pacific that a picture which Benny says shows him playing "The Bee" at the age of ten is nothing but "a new low in composite photographic skulduggery, exhibited in a dinky radio studio to a hand-picked audience consisting of fifteen men named Boasberg," he's not mad either. Neither is Benny when he hears it. At least not for long!

"Hm. I should stoop to argue with a toothpaste salesman!" Jack says.

WHO'S winning the battle? Your guess is as good as anybody's. One of the high-spots in the feud to date was Allen's broadcast of February 3, when he brought Stuart Canin, the violin prodigy who started the whole thing, back to the Town Hall microphone for a repeat airing of "The Bee."

After Master Stuart, through Allen, had told Jack Benny how to hold the violin, how to handle the bow—"or crop, as you cowboys call it, Mr. Benny"—he played the selection again.

"Thank you, Stuart," said Allen. "And that, Mr. Benny, was 'The Bee.' And next Sunday, we wish you well.

Next Sunday, ladies and gentlemen, the world will realize that Aesop spoke 2,000 years too soon when he said, 'Nero fiddled and Rome burned.' If Jack Benny fiddles on Sunday—America will burn! I rest my case!"

But there wasn't any Benny violin solo the next Sunday! Apparently, Jack told the waiting world, some shameless Town Hall skulduggery had taken place. And as this is being written, Jack Benny still hasn't played "The Bee." Fred Allen says he never will play it; he has brought to the Town Hall to back him in this statement the most eminent authorities in the land: a musician, for instance, who assured the nation that if Benny started practising right now, he'd be 105 before he could play "The Bee!"—and an insurance statistician who testified that Benny would die at the age of 104 and one-half, six months before he had learned it!

But what's six months to Jack Benny? Little or nothing. And so, he would say, is Fred Allen. But to the rest of the Benny cast, Allen is pretty funny. "Did you hear Fred Allen last Wednesday night?" Jack asks Announcer Don Wilson.

Wilson: Oh, sure, and it was a swell program. It was really great. One of the best.

Jack: Don't review it, Don, just answer yes or no. Did you hear Allen

make those innuendos—you know, those slurring remarks about my violin-playing?

Wilson: Yes, I did.

Jack: Pretty catty, wasn't it.

Wilson: Oh, I don't know—he was kidding, and you're taking it seriously.

Jack: Well, so would Heifetz or any other musician. Why didn't Fred make those cracks when we were both in New York instead of waiting till I'm four thousand miles away? It ain't cricket, you know.

Wilson: Oh, calm down, Jack.

Jack: Hm! Did you hear him, Phil?

Phli Baker: Yes. Ha-ha.

Jack: That's not the point. What does Allen know about music, anyway? He's just a reformed juggler. Let him top that one—if he can!

Mary: Hello, Jack.

Jack: Well, as I live and breathe, and stand under a strong light so people won't mistake the wrinkles in my face for a washboard—ho ho ho, if it ain't Portland—I mean Mary.

Mary: What's the matter, Jack?

Jack: Plenty. Did you hear Fred Allen Wednesday?

Mary: Yeah. Gee, but that was a funny program. What laughs!

Jack: Don't elaborate, you little traitor. The way he talked about my violin-playing, I ought to sue him.

Kenny Baker: Did you hear Fred Allen, Jack? That guy kills me.

Jack: Listen, Kenny, do you realize he insulted me?



Kenny: Yeah! Ha ha ha.

Jack: Now wait a minute. I want to tell you something. I'm going to make a rule right now. Hereafter anybody working for me can listen to Allen's program but they mustn't enjoy it. And that goes for all of you!"

ONE round for Benny! And so it goes. Allen will win the next one, and the fight will go on. For how long? Nobody knows, least of all, probably, the principals themselves. Benny camp-followers will tell you that it's apt to stop very suddenly—and to Allen's complete discomfiture! They hint that there's method in Jack's repeated postponements of his one-selection recital. They point out that The Benny was once a good enough violinist to make his living with his fiddle, and they darkly whisper of catastrophe for Allen when weeks of day-and-night practise finally permit Benny to present to a startled world his own version of "The Bee." And, according to the very latest information available to RADIO GUIDE, that's just what he's going to do!

But the Allen supporters are undismayed. It can't be done, they'll tell you. Benny will never play "The Bee"—or anything else. He's just another dessert peddler!

AT ELEVEN, little Minetta Ellen was a toy copy of today's well-beloved "Fanny Barbour" of "One Man's Family"—even though that kindly character was as yet unborn in the brain of Carlton Morse, the author. She loved humans—preferably small and helpless humans, or

those in distress. But all she loved, perhaps because of the hungry loneliness she had known for the five years she and her mother spent with Minetta's terror-rousing grandmother after they left home because of continual family arguments. But all that empty life was gone—

gone with the earlier, happier years when a minute Minetta made the hearty Germans of Independence, Ohio, roar with delight at her mimicry, stamp their heavy shoes on the wood floors in applause of her dancing. Gone from her young life, too, was Andrew Jackson Spencer, kindly proprietor of famed Cataract House, in South Cleveland. He it was who invited the elder Ellens to banquets at Cataract House—so the little girl could sing for him. He it was who lifted the tiny girl high in the air, looked in her eyes, and said simply, "I wish you belonged to me."

Now Minetta and her mother faced life alone in Cleveland—faced it from a back-alley housekeeping room with only the doubtful security of the struggling mother's income from mending linen in a hotel. Still the little girl let her love for others drown thoughts of her own privations. She brought urchins in and gave them baths in a wash-basin; she rescued scrawny cats and shivering puppies from her alley.

AND then a frightened girl of 16 came to the hotel where Minetta's mother worked. She brought with her a nameless baby, and the mark of her parents' wrath in her heart. She wanted only work—and a chance to forget. Minetta's mother managed to win a promise that the girl could work at the hotel and live there if she were not encumbered by the child.

"Maybe you and I could take care of the baby," she told Minetta. "Oh, Mother!" Minetta jumped up and clapped her hands in delight, raced to the hotel, clasped the little baby to her heart and ran home with it.

Somewhere in America is a middle-aged woman who will never know what a part Minetta Ellen played in her life; will never know that to the radio star whom she probably admires as Fanny Barbour, she will always be a chubby, flaxen-haired bit of affection, running to throw herself into the arms of a schoolgirl who hurried home each day to her "baby," and who cared for her tenderly for two years.

When the girl's family suddenly repented and took the child and mother back, no mother could have been more broken-hearted over the loss of a child. Minetta never saw the chubby two-year-old again. Twice the girl mother came back to visit the two people who had aided her, but when she married, the link was broken.

It was during this trying period that Andrew Jackson Spencer came back into Minetta's life. He met her mother in one of those strange, accidental meetings of destiny, and learned of her divorce.

One Christmas morning which had promised to be a miserable one, a mysterious package arrived for Minetta. In it was a pair of skates and a pair of gold bracelets from Mr. Spencer.

Such wonderful gifts for a girl who had had so few! Not in Minetta's whole life had she known anything like them. She would get up in the night, in the bitterest cold, to feel around in her drawer for the bracelets—"just to be sure I really had them, to know it wasn't all a dream."

It wasn't a dream. But it was the start of a new happiness almost dream-like. For shortly afterward, Minetta's mother married the handsome, confi-

dent owner of the Cataract House.

The little alley with its forlorn cats and dogs, its bedraggled babies, disappeared. There was a new home—their own suite in the hotel, with its big, spacious salons, its gay-nineties elegance in which plain, solid comfort had a large part. There were new dresses, a bewildering array of them for the girl who had suffered through her adolescence for pretty clothes.

When she entered Cataract House as Andrew Jackson Spencer's daughter, Minetta was almost sixteen. He and her mother tried to make up for the years of poverty. It's a wonder Minetta wasn't spoiled; if she had been spoilt, she probably would have been. But just as she has received the adulation and the fan-letters showered on her as Fanny Barbour, she accepted the gifts and the good times of her new existence. She still wanted to take care of other people instead of having them take care of her.

She had her first acting experience at sixteen, with her stepfather. At a benefit performance of "Uncle Tom's Cabin" she played Eliza and he played Uncle Tom. The girl's ease in committing her lines and her poise on the stage impressed everybody.

Shortly afterward, when the leading woman of a local stock company fell ill, Minetta was called upon to fill her role. Her speed in memorizing her part and her performance after a single rehearsal brought her an offer of a job. The manager wanted to send the young actress to New York to study for a principal part in a production he intended to present there.

But for the only time in Minetta's memory her adored Father Spencer denied her a wish. He asked her to postpone her career until she was older.

It was a bitter disappointment, but young as Minetta was, she had known many, and her present comfortable life hadn't hurt her ability to "take it on the chin." She quietly resigned from the stock company, and followed his plans for her education.

UNTIL she went to Cataract House, Minetta, for all her quick intelligence and love for fine things, had never had any books. She had read "dime-novels" and popular stories, but Spencer felt she would respond to fine literature. One day he casually tucked her arm under his and strolled with her into his big library. She had never been in it before and she looked around in wonderment at the book-lined walls.

"Oh—I forgot," said her stepfather, "I have something to attend to before we have our talk. Wait for me here, my dear—I'll be back."

Obediently, the girl dropped into a chair and waited. Spencer was gone for two hours, and when he returned he found his adopted daughter curled up with "A Connecticut Yankee at King Arthur's Court." He had left it on a table where she would surely see it. The occasion was the opening of a rich treasure-house through which Minetta has wandered ever since.

So time passed, and Minetta grew through her teens into young womanhood. And she met the man who was to become her husband. It was love at first sight between the slight, gold-

en-haired girl and the tall young man whom Father Spencer brought to Cataract House for dinner.

Shortly after Minetta's graduation from college, they were married in the hotel's largest drawing-room, with resident guests who had watched Minetta grow up among the spectators. A famous musician who always stayed at Cataract House when in the vicinity of Cleveland, played softly on the harp as Minetta put her hand into that of the only man she loved enough to leave Father Spencer and her beloved mother.

It's easy to see her as she must have looked then, with her cheeks pink, her eyes blue and impish, her hair softly blond, and her mouth humorous but determined.

SHE looked up at her husband in their new home in Lorain, Ohio, one night, and told him, "We're going to have a big family, my dear."

"We are not," said her husband with equal determination. "I know how you feel about children, Minetta—but we're not going to have any. Not yet, anyway, and certainly not a lot!"

"Is that so?" demanded Minetta. "Well, you're going to have one baby, anyway, Henry Ellen—and you're going to like it!"

Fanny Barbour herself might have spoken that line!

People in Lorain who knew Minetta Ellen before she became Fanny Barbour, recall her as the gay and charming young matron who was the leading spirit of all the town's endeavors, an accomplished performer at benefits, a tactful, spirited hostess who radiated a charm not unlike that of a great lady of today—Mrs. Wallis Simpson.

"I was a thorough success as a young wife and mother," says Minetta today. "Nobody ever knew what it cost me to be so; I've never told anyone before."

She doesn't say it bitterly; there is no bitterness, no self-pity, in Minetta's make-up. Her fine blue eyes, as bright as those of a sixteen-year-old, alight with the fire of the genuine fighter, she says. "Oh, I was a headstrong, arrogant young thing! I wanted to help everybody, do big things . . . and life whipped me into a corner. But it didn't get me down! I'm not proud of a lot of things; I've been more lucky than wise. But I did try to carry on. I raised my daughter in the environment I felt she needed, and I tried to help people who wanted help. Whenever Carlton Morse gives Fanny a line or two to say that indicates life hasn't always been clear sailing for her, smooth as she has kept it for her husband and family, I wonder how that young, young man can know so much about women!"

SHE hadn't been married long before her first disillusion came. Life left the pleasant, sunny path it had promised, followed one of blackness and despair. Most women would have succumbed; ended a marriage whose very first months brought grief.

But Minetta held on. Her baby—the baby she had hoped would be the first of that big family she had always wanted—was coming. The maternal instinct, perhaps the strongest force in Minetta's whole nature, was working. Minetta carried on, as women of her

generation did, as women of her gallant courage have always done.

Donna, her daughter, was born in Cataract House while Minetta and her husband were paying a visit to the Spencers. The baby made her entrance unexpectedly and her advent almost cost her mother and herself their lives. Minetta, barely breathing after days and nights of pain, scarcely knew when the tiny new soul arrived. But her ears caught a muffled word from the doctor, carried a message to her tired brain. She forced open dull eyes, stared up at the pitying face of the physician.

"What did you—say? She won't—live?" she managed to enunciate. "Bring her—to me!"

THEY brought her the thin little baby, and Minetta, suddenly strong, took the tiny thing into her arms. She who had spent all her girlhood healing and helping little, hurt things—she knew what to do for her own baby when it came to her weak and helpless.

Minetta doesn't tell it herself, but an old friend who knew her then, and still holds a close place in her affections, likes to describe Minetta, the fighter, as she was then. It was early in the twentieth century, and it was "new-fangled" and radical when Minetta banished the well-meaning friends and neighbors and went into a serious colloquy with the doctor. No old-fashioned remedies for her! She had been reading the newest medical literature on raising babies, and she and her physician entered into a conspiracy to keep baby Donna alive and make her grow healthy and strong.

Consequently Donna, lovely young mother herself today, was permitted to develop along lines which few babies then enjoyed. She had fresh air instead of hot, stuffy rooms. She wore so few clothes (compared to her infant contemporaries) that she and her mother were a positive scandal to their acquaintances. No layers of heavy wool to make her perspire and break out into a rash; no "tastes" of this and that dainty to give her colic. She came into the world a sickly baby with less than half a chance to live; within a few months she was a radiant, blooming little thing who never cried, whose sleeping and feeding schedule was a regular one—even though it meant insulting friends and relatives. This wasn't 1937 or even 1927 . . . or

1917! It was the dawn of the 1900's, when people thought you were silly if you refused to let them kiss your baby on its rosebud mouth.

"Germs!" they screamed in derision. "I suppose you think I have 'germs'—I suppose you can get a cold through 'germs'! Dear Minetta, what an idea. And you feed her by the clock! What if she gets hungry before the clock says she should? Poor little thing!"

Minetta laughed with them, joked with them, recited funny verses to them—but she made them keep their hands off her baby. . . . And she saved her baby's life.

She had a firm champion in her stepfather. Spencer had faith in his adopted daughter and applauded the vitality of an intelligence which, like his own, was far in advance of its era. So Minetta and her baby and her

husband stayed on at Cataract House for more than a year, while Minetta worked on her little girl.

The baby's tiny legs were bent in a manner to strike terror to anyone's heart but Minetta's. She bristled at the word "deformed."

HER bones are still soft—they'll be beautiful legs when I've finished with them!" she said staunchly . . . as Fanny Barbour herself might say under similar circumstances.

Three times a day she massaged the thin, bent limbs in olive oil—pulled them, smoothed them, shaped them . . . Today Donna (she'll blush to see this, but it's so) has as pretty and strong a pair of legs as you ever saw. That's what a mother's will, linked with good sense and hard, physical effort, can do.

Musical talent cost Rosario Bourdon the joys of his boyhood playtime. Not so his own children: they live full lives—even as yours should!

ROSARIO BOURDON, topped with curly gray hair and straight as a poker, is father of one of radio's oldest musical shows—the Cities Service program. It's been on the air ten years and all but one of them has seen Papa Bourdon with the baton in his fist.

In private life, he is father of radio's sweetest family—two boys and a girl, all grown, all handsome, all devoted, all successful. He's done such a good job of raising these kids that I went to him and demanded to know his secret. I asked it for your sake—you who are married or are about to be.

His reply is a story that has everything: tragedy, self-sacrifice, wisdom. And his philosophy can be summed up in a phrase: "Leave them alone." The French call it *laissez-faire*—the old "let-alone" principle of economics—and sometimes of human nature. He told me how it was in his case.

His success with his children has grown out of the failure of his own parents with him. He said simply, "I had no childhood." For his parents, more particularly his stepfather, would not leave him alone.

"No, I never had a childhood," he confided. "When I was a boy I played the cello. My stepfather, a teacher of music, thought I had a great gift for the instrument. Perhaps I had. But it was a gift which robbed me of all the light-hearted pleasures of youth.

"When I came home from school I was not free to roam about the streets and fields. I had to go to work on the cello. For three, four and five hours I had to play it—every day, and Saturdays and Sundays as well. When I grew older, he got me a scholarship in

a Belgian conservatory of music. That was my boyhood.

"I am grateful, in a way. I learned all the music I know from that training. But I would give it up in a moment if I could recover the joys I missed."

Because of that training, Rosario Bourdon became a great cellist. He played that instrument for the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra, under Leopold Stokowski, one of the greatest of conductors. But when his kids began to grow up, he laid it aside. Kreisler, the violinist, said to him, "Practise at least fifteen minutes a day—or perhaps you will lose the touch."

But the cello gathers dust in the Bourdon attic. And the Bourdon children who, in a sense, took its place, move about in the world with shining faces. Their happiness is music which their father loves more than any he produced from the cello.

What he suffered as a boy, he was determined they should not suffer. And the results have been good enough for you to find out an object-lesson to all who love children.

Bourdon gave his children freedom. He did not tell them, "Do this, do that, don't do the other thing." He never spanked them. He never scolded them. He never gave them long

lectures. He felt that the job of a father was *not* to be a Hitler or a Mussolini in the house. He saw his kids as human beings, and he believed that fair, reasonable treatment would be appreciated—that it would achieve its own reward.

You might think that his family would turn out as wild as March hares—disobedient, rebellious. But you would be wrong. He governed the children by reason and by fair play. He set them an example. His relations with his wife, the former Esther Fisher of Philadelphia, with whom he eloped at twenty-one, have always been amiable and loving. His chivalry and good manners began at home. He encouraged the kids to be generous and forgiving—the boys to be gentlemen, the girl to be a lady.

HE TALKED their language. He knew more about baseball than they did. He swam beautifully. He knew more about horseflesh, and could pick winners at racetracks more often than they could. He was their comrade. The boys asked him to join them when they went out, not because they had to, but because they wanted to.

How many families can boast a memory-picture of Mama and Papa and the two boys banging away—all four on the same piano—in impromptu quartets? How many families tell of the children pleading with their father to play the piano and play and play some more!

The "leave them alone" formula, has been a success because Papa had the wit to stay in the background and do his guiding so that it seemed like advice from a good friend.

Take the case of John, next to the oldest, now a highly successful automobile man in San Francisco. He had a bent for mechanics. And he spent thousands of dollars on books and tools and gadgets. Bourdon paid the



bills without a chirp. He even ferreted out ways for spending more money!

But when John came to him one day and asked his father to buy him an expensive automobile, Papa looked at him and asked,

"How much does it cost?"

"Oh, only \$3,000," said John, entirely too easily.

"Only \$3,000! Did you ever try to earn \$3,000? I'll tell you what I'll do. You earn half of it, and I'll put up the balance. We'll see how soon you get a \$3,000 car—that way!"

So in the end John was satisfied with a Ford. And when I say satisfied, I mean it. He got the point. He had been brought up to be a good sport, had learned to take it as well as to dish it out.

And the same is true of Charles, the oldest, now a promising journalist. The lad spent money freely on books and magazines. Yet when it came to extravagances of no importance, Papa Bourdon was there to bring home to him the value of money.

Both sons have learned that lesson, and today they are earning their own way and doing it successfully too.

ONLY once has Bourdon set his foot down—he would not let them be musicians, although both boys had smatterings of talent. He has no use for smatterers. In music, competition is too keen.

However, when Rosaire, the daughter, grew up with a singularly beautiful voice, Papa Bourdon encouraged her, helped her at every turn. Now she is in Europe, and before long she plans to make her debut in radio.

The Bourdons have two cars, but the kids usually get to the garage first—so that when Papa arrives the cars are gone. Does Rosario Bourdon "humph!" and stomp around, thinking, "These are my cars, bought with my hard-earned money—how dare they . . .?"

NO, HE laughs, and takes a taxi. They can have everything he has. He understands that it is not malice nor meanness that made them take the cars, but simply the heedlessness of youth. For Bourdon well realizes that youth is always in a hurry.

When the kids come home and challenge Papa to play ping-pong, and beat him in the early hours of the evening, he laughs—and keeps on playing. And after a while they begin to tire. When the clock strikes two in the morning, it is Papa's superior endurance that wins. He wears them down.

For twenty-three years he has made records for the Victor Company, coming home at night to eat and dash out to direct a hotel orchestra. For nine years—without a week off—and without a *faux pas*, he has fathered his family of musicians on the Cities Service hour. There too he has pursued his policy of *laissez-faire*, guiding his artists tactfully, almost invisibly, with the result that the program has gone on and on, to become recognized as one of the smoothest and most enjoyable musical features on the air.

AND as to his private life. His children will go far. But he does not ask this of life. He himself gave up fame as a cellist for the more modest happiness of his home. He asks only that his children love life. And that they certainly do.

Each has learned to keep at his job until it is done. They have learned to be generous, to think of the other fellow, to respect themselves and others as well.

And because he left them alone, they are today three definite, distinct individuals, each endowed with personal charm, each capable of being a loyal, devoted friend. They are the kind of children you want your own to be.

MEDAL OF MERIT

IN THE early 1920's the University of California's football team boasted a remarkable quarterback named Horace Heidt. One day he was hurt and his teammates carried him off the field. Though that accident injured his spine dangerously, it turned his life toward a career which stumbled and veered about at first, and then forged ahead to a remarkable triumph.

Horace Heidt's triumph is remarkable because of a fact which but a few people know. His football injury required first one operation and then another in order to permit his body to keep pace with his questing mind. Time and again the sick back rebelled and nurses rolled him back into the operating-room. In all, there were seventeen operations . . . seventeen times when he could have lost heart and quit.

So finding Horace Heidt today with the greatest organization of its kind in radio represents something more than the result of a well-planned career aided by an unusual talent. His victory is close-kin to that of the electrical wizard Steinmetz, and Helen Keller and Franklyn Roosevelt and Neighbor Nellie Revell, all of whom conquered physical handicaps to stand ultimately head and shoulders above the crowd. Horace Heidt and his Brigadiers have never created a flurry in broadcasting equal to Major Bowes or Jack Benny. He and his entertainers have never caused a nation to adopt such gag-lines as "You N-a-a-a-sty


M-a-a-n!" But month after month, they have poured their music into millions of homes. Month after month they have come to us not claiming musical greatness or posing as something rare and different and touched


with genius, but rather as friends of talent who do a modest job of brightening a part of our lives. Always they have been the kind of friends we like to have around us.

CHICAGO.—Don Ameche, former Thespian of this city who now is increasing his radio salary by means of picture work in Hollywood, makes the lead to this week's column by his recent statement: "Once an orphan of the legitimate stage, radio drama, quietly and almost unnoticed, is growing into full manhood."

Don is right. Radio drama is growing, yes, but it still is quite a little shrimp and there are doubts remaining regarding its legitimacy. And, most extraordinarily, the ether opus which presents Ameche as its star is not an example of the adult play.

Almost without exception, the daytime serials are full of monotonous drivel that copies in effect previously successful formulas. Think not? The NBC officials right now are burning up over the fact that FOUR other daytime serials are copying the "custody of children" angle that was launched months before by "Today's Children"—for two years the most popular daytime program according to survey.

A few of the night time drama spots have been endeavoring lately to present plays in the more subtle manner, but nearly all playwrights have pruned fully far to go. Quoting Arch Oboler, who by diligent effort has developed himself into a Pulitzer prize threat: "A playwright can't turn out original plays at \$100 a copy."

Aside from worrying about ailments of the drama, I'm preparing a resolution for the Federal Communications Commission asking that all Federal employees (even the Commissioners) listen to recordings of their speeches before broadcasting them.

If you ever have a chance to meet Dr. Frank Black, NBC's skilled musical director, in a confidential mood, you'll hear some of the funniest stories about music and its makers you've ever tuned in. I did last week and won't forget soon. The yarns he tells about Ennio Bolognini, the talented but eccentric Argentine cellist, are worth missing even a Jack Benny broadcast to hear. For one, Ennio remembered he had to rehearse a difficult selection for an audition next day with Dr. Frederick Stock, of the Chicago Symphony. But by the time Ennio remembered, it was midnight and he was on a Pullman car. . . . And the time Ennio tied his police dog to his chair and the dog decided to sprint away—chair and all—while the

cellist was broadcasting a solo! . . . Dr. Black, sold on good music, nevertheless hopes "that America never becomes so musically educated that the man on the street can whistle Beethoven's Fifth Symphony in its entirety."

MUSIC of the MASTERS

NO MORE thrilling news could be made public than the fact, which most of you have doubtless heard or read, that Arturo Toscanini returns to America this Fall for a series of non-commercial radio concerts. Every music-lover knows that Mr. Toscanini is the most renowned interpretive musician of our generation. During the past six years his imaginative and surpassing re-creations of the classics have become an indispensable part of our national life, establishing the highest standard of orchestral playing we have ever known.

This Winter he has been sorely missed. Needless to say, no one has come to take his place. We have had competent and interesting performers and we have heard the works of the masters. "The gods are not dead . . . but they have been sleeping."

And now they are to be roused from their slumber . . . and we are to hear Toscanini conduct again. It will be a grand reunion. For, so miraculous are his powers that each time one hears him, after a short absence, it is difficult to believe one's ears. "Is it, in truth, reality? It can not be so," one says to oneself. But it is.

During the three months after his final *Fidelio* in Salzburg last August, I toured the capitals of Europe, hearing great orchestras and renowned conductors. Then, I made a trip across the Continent to Budapest for Mr. Toscanini's two concerts with the Vienna Orchestra. That romantic city on the Danube was in gala attire: Dress-makers and fashion advisors had been occupied for weeks, the Lord Mayor was entertaining officially, and Mr.

presence of a work which has few equals among the temples that mortal man has erected to his God.

And I could not believe that I had ever heard before so great a performance of so great a work. It is always so when you hear Maestro Toscanini. With a few exceptions—and this with music for which he has no sympathy—the last performance one

hears from him always seems the best. It will be so for you, I am sure, when you hear him again this Fall.

MR. TOSCANINI told me then that he missed America and should like to return for another visit. He could not come for so long a period, he said, and he wanted it to be an occasion that would be auspicious and memorable.

And that occasion, it turns out, is afforded by you, his radio listeners. He is returning at the invitation of Mr. David Sarnoff especially to conduct a broadcast series of concerts.

It would be a unique treat if he could be persuaded to add a few great choral and operatic masterpieces. The chorus and the same soloists he uses in Salzburg are readily available, and he will do the rest. One could not help remembering with regret, during the Metropolitan's routine performance of *Aida*, what he does with that long familiar score. In it are all the time-worn ingredients of Italian opera; the plangent melody, the sobbing cadence, the trite rhythm. They are thrilling when filled with rich and gorgeous voices, but when reflected through the prism of Toscanini's soul, when every accent and every vibrato is clear, its measures become fraught with symbolic meaning. It glows and breathes and lives again.

That Mr. Toscanini will not conduct the entire Philharmonic-Symphony means a somewhat different set-up for the musicians. Undoubtedly, he will require the key men of that organization (many of whom have been resting and basking in the sun of less exacting conductors). For work under Mr. Toscanini, they will demand and receive considerable extra pay. But whatever it costs, it will be worth it. And you and I will be the recipients.

Vincenzo Bellini's "Norma" is one of the oldest operas remaining in the repertoire. None of the music-dramas of Richard Wagner, or the operas by Verdi or Puccini has as many years of service. "Norma" was heard in New York nearly a century ago at the Park Theater. It had achieved initial acclaim at its first performance ten years before, in Milan, and has been heard at frequent intervals since, whenever a protagonist for the title role could be found.

Norma is one of the most difficult roles in the whole of Italian opera. It demands a dramatic soprano of full and opulent voice with enormous range and a coloratura's agility. Moreover, she must be able to act.

When Rosa Ponselle made her phenomenal success in this opera ten seasons ago, it had not been sung at the Metropolitan for decades before. Since Miss Ponselle decided it was too difficult and strenuous for her to continue singing it, the Metropolitan management has been scouring the earth to find a successor.

Norma was scheduled last season with Kirsten Flagstad, who later declined and sang Leonore in "Fidelio" instead. It was then given to Miss Dusolina Giannini and postponed due to her last-minute indisposition.

THE STORY

Act I: Sacred Grove of the Druids

The first scene is laid beneath an oak tree sacred to the Druids. It is night, an army of Gauls is approaching for worship. Pollione enters with Flavio to confess to Norma—he is her secret lover, the father of her two children—that he loves another, the Virgin Priestess Adalgisa.

Forced to withdraw by the approach of the Gauls, Pollione asks Adalgisa to come with him to Rome. Adalgisa asks counsel of Norma, who, mad with rage, plans to kill Pollione and her children both.

Act II: Interior of Norma's Dwelling

Norma's children are asleep, and she fails in her resolution to kill them. Her maid enters, and Adalgisa is sent for. Norma confides her children to her rival, vowing she will die in order to allow Adalgisa happiness.

Pollione refuses Adalgisa's plea that he return to Norma, attempts to seize the girl by force. Enraged, Norma summons her followers to war. Pollione is threatened with death as a spy. He refuses Norma's plea that he give up his love for Adalgisa, whereupon Norma confesses to her superiors her violation of the sacred laws of chastity, claims purification by death on the funeral pyre. Moved by Norma's action, Pollione shares her fate.

Toscanini's concerts were obviously the high-point of the social season. Seat prices ranged from fifteen dollars to three: every member of the aristocracy and nobility of Europe's largest "kingdom without king" was on hand. And indeed they well might be.

No music that I had heard since the *Fidelio* of the August before had sounded as this music sounded. No conductor since my last visit with Toscanini had been able to send chills running up and down my spine with five strokes of a stick of wood through the air. No other among the great artists in Europe had been able to establish instant contact between his listeners and the music.

WHAT had only a minute before Mr. Toscanini's entrance resembled nothing so much as Madison Square Garden bedlam on the night of a championship bout . . . with bells ringing, seats banging, yelling between ushers and patrons, and the organ emitting strange groans . . . became with one down-beat of Mr. Toscanini's baton a hushed cathedral.

There followed the prayer of Beethoven, the priest, the archangel of the Divine, pronouncing a stately invocation, shouting of the Hymn of Praise, intoning the ageless Nicene Creed, offering up the Oblation and the Hosannas, and asking the blessing of the Lamb of God. No one could mistake the fact that he was in the

down to the safe and settled leadership of Artur Rodzinski, who comes from Cleveland to take over the New York orchestra's final eight broadcasts.

Mr. Chavez, in case Deems Taylor hasn't told you, holds about every important musical post Mexico has. He ranks as that nation's most distinguished composer and conductor. He founded the Symphony of Mexico, he has been director of the National Conservatory of Music, chief of the Department of Fine Arts in the Secretariat of Public Education, etc., etc. In fact, Mr. Chavez' biography resembles that of a politician. And his appearance in his native country is nothing short of a national hero's. When his music is played, it is "E-viva"-ed. That in a country where they hiss when they don't like a piece, means something. What it is like, you can judge for yourself when you hear his own *Sinfonia India*, the concluding composition on his broadcast Sunday.

JUDGING from her singing and the resultant cheers over the microphone, Gina Cigna's Metropolitan debut as *Aida* was a success. The voice was resonant and full and pleasant to the ear. And, in certain respects, Miss Cigna may prove to be the most important addition to the famous lyric stage's roster of Italian dramatic sopranos since the sensational emergence now nearly twenty years ago of the great Rosa Ponselle.







RADIO GOES COLLEGIATE

BY PHILIP L. RAY

YES, you can go to college now to learn your radio. If you want to be a second Graham McNamee, here is a place where you may overcome your "mike" fright. If you want to learn to broadcast news, football games, or other special events, you'll get a chance to try. If your interests run toward program building, script writing, music—no matter what branch of modern radio—you learn the business here in the only way to learn any business—by actual practise, at WSUI.

WSUI, the home of a unique "college of the air," is one of the services offered to the people of Iowa by the State University. Founded in 1919 as 9YA, WSUI on 880 kilocycles now has a full time license from the FCC with a daytime strength of 1,000 watts. Financial support for the station, which is non-commercial, comes from the university through a radio board of which Professor Bruce E. Mahan is chairman. Carl Menzer is director of WSUI while Pearl Bennett Broxam serves as program director.

With two studios and modern equipment valued at \$94,000, WSUI kills three birds with one stone. Besides providing entertainment for the residents of the Hawkeye state, it offers education in two directions—to the listeners and to the Iowa students who write, direct, produce, and announce many of the 8,592 programs that go on the air each year.

How, you ask, does this "college of the air" operate? For theory and practise in the mechanical side of radio the College of Engineering offers courses that cover both radio and television. As supplements to WSUI, the university also operates an amateur radio station W9YA, and an experimental television station W9XK.

OF MORE interest to those who wish to follow a career before the microphone is that unusual course in the College of Liberal Arts known as Radio Broadcasting and conducted by Professor H. Clay Harshbarger. From this class are drawn many of the students who work on WSUI shows. Here all phases of radio from decibels to Lulu Belles are lectured about and discussed. No mere theorizer is Professor Harshbarger, who is the production manager of WSUI. There is actual practise in writing scripts, spot announcements, and building programs. Correct and fluent speech, so necessary a part of any radio program, is treated in the special courses of the speech department.

In the School of Journalism, Professor Charles Sanders presides over a class listed in the catalog as Radio News. Primary purpose of this course is "to study the technique of production and presentation of radio programs that have news as their basis." Professor Sanders likens the preparation of a newscast to the putting together of a newspaper. In addition he stresses the importance of news programs other than those using reports from a wire service. He helps his students develop such weekly features as Iowans in the News, Art News, and Club News.

Practical experience, the thing so difficult to secure for most young people ambitious along radio lines, is offered to Iowa students in the studios of WSUI. Almost all of the 3,536 hours that WSUI is on the air each year find students at the mike doing the announcing. This includes all types of studio announcing from recorded musical programs to children's hours.

For news and special events broadcasting, practise on WSUI is especially rich. Associated Press copy from "The Daily Iowan," student newspaper, is the basis for two daily newscasts known as The Daily Iowan of the Air. Students from the class in Radio News

get their practise by editing and broadcasting these programs. Often in direct competition with commercial stations, WSUI makes direct broadcasts of all home football, basketball, and baseball games as well as other special events about the university, such as dances, vespers, and pep meetings. For all of these events there is a student at the microphone.

"The Parade of Events" and "Great Speeches in American History" are two of the most popular programs on WSUI in addition to furnishing top-notch technical experience. Entirely written, produced and announced by students, "The Parade of Events" is a rapid-fire dramatization of the week's news. "Great Speeches in American History," being a serial drama based on historic incidents, is written by Professor Harshbarger and produced by his broadcasting class.

HERE, then, is a "college of the air" where you learn by doing, where you can create your own programs and put them on the air. Here you are guided by experts in their particular fields so that when you appear before the hard-boiled manager of a commercial station asking for an audition and he counters with—"Have you ever had any experience?" you can reply—"Yes, sir. I've had 609 hours on the air, announced 873 programs, and written two and one-half miles of script that went on the air." If he believes you enough to allow you to prove it, you will find that training in the "college of the air" has stood you in good stead.

"Molly of the Movies" Goes In Radio

Listeners to the career story of Molly Malone in the "Molly of the Movies" programs, should know that the girl who plays the part is fully qualified to give a true portrayal of all the so-called trials and tribulations that come to a girl attempting to crash the gilt-edged realm of stardom.

That girl's name is Gene Byron. Gene came from the legitimate stage to radio. But there was a short period during the depression years of 1930 to 1933 when the tottering status of show business threw her into other work. An office job in a theatrical agency gave her the necessities of life and gave her a chance to try radio on a nation-wide dramatic program. At her first rehearsal for this program, she met near-disaster.

AFTER an easy dress rehearsal, Gene found herself suddenly getting wobbly. By the time her cue was seconds off, Gene lost her bearings. Where she had seen one microphone, she saw a dozen, all going 'round and around. Where there had been three other actors beside that microphone, she saw three dozen. And when she tried to walk to the place before the microphone, where she had placed a large mental "X" during rehearsal, she felt hundreds of horrid hallucinations crowding into her mind.

Vaguely, off in the distance, she heard the lines before her cue—but she couldn't do anything about it. She felt as though she must scream—when suddenly an arm circled about her, clasping her tightly, firmly, chasing away the fears, and helping her to see only one microphone, three other people. And when she opened her mouth her lines came out, not as they had at the rehearsal, but—well—splendidly. She was a sensation, a success!

The young man who saved the moment was named Ray Jones, and he was her partner in the portrayal of the radio script. Now he plays a double role—he is her partner in radio, and her partner in marriage.


SPELL-BOUND HOUSEWIVES





ACCORDING to the BBC, reception in general was poorer during the month of January than at any time during the past twelve months. These same experts predict a great increase in solar activity, with consequent improvement in reception conditions very soon. . . . Already notable increase in signal strength from Asiatic and Australian stations has been manifested. Five continents were tuned in the other morning without leaving the 31-meter band, namely: VK3LR (9.58), Australia; ZBW3 (9.525), Asia; HJ4ABH (9.52), South America; GSB (9.51), Europe, and W1XK (9.57), North America. . . . Monday morning, February 8, with the barometer at the lowest point in many weeks, it was noted that while reception from Asia was practically inaudible, Europeans on the 19-meter band were coming in with undiminished volume. GSH (21.47) was putting in an unusually loud signal. . . . Wednesday morning, February 3, HJ1ABB, Barranquilla, Colombia, was logged on approximately 9.565 megs.

THE new transmission from Tokio, daily from 9 to 10 a.m. EST (8 to 9 CST) over JZJ (11.8) and JZI (9.535) is beamed on Java and Malaya, according to Akifusa Saito, Kumamoto, Japan. This program, heard with excellent strength in the United States, opens with an English news period and is followed by native music originating in the studios of JOAK, key station of the Japanese network. The daily 4 to 5 p.m. EST (3 to 4 CST) overseas period for eastern United States listeners is being radiated by JZJ and JZI, while the overseas program for western United States fans, starting at 12 mid. EST (11 p.m. CST), is carried by JZJ only. An official communication states that the new 50,000-watt transmitters are still not in use.

Since February 1, DJQ (15.28), Zeesen, Germany, has been radiating a nightly program from 7 to 10:45 p.m. EST (6 to 9:45 CST).

August Balbi, Los Angeles, Calif., informs me that KIO (11.68), Kahuku, Hawaii, is feeding a program from Honolulu to the Mutual Broadcasting System on Saturdays from 10 to 10:30 p.m. EST (9 to 9:30 CST). . . . Mr. Balbi is hearing XERB (11.83), Hermosillo, Mexico, on Sundays and Wednesdays from 1:30 to 3 p.m. EST (12:30 to 2 CST).

THERE is much discussion as to whether the Chilean station being heard nightly from 7 to 8:30 p.m. EST (6 to 7:30 CST) on 12.3 megs is a new station or a harmonic of CB615 (6.15). The name is given as "Radio Nacional" and the address as P. O. Box 761, Santiago, Chile. Roger Sampson, Yerington, Nev., reports the frequency as 12.8 megs. It may be CEB, an entirely new transmitter.

J. H. Fulweiler, secretary of the Academy of Natural Sciences in Philadelphia, has invited F. Satterthwaite, Toledo, Ohio, to be on the lookout for WNB, the schooner Cressida, now on a voyage through the South Seas.

Paul Dilg, Evanston, Ill., has received a letter from officials at Daventry, England, stating that good progress is being made on the equipment and aerial arrays for the new 50,000-watt transmitters. Several hundred steel poles to support the feeder system

have been erected and all but one of the masts are in position. Several of the new aerials are all ready for operation, so listen for tests. . . . The best reception ever recorded from France, is being picked up over TPA3 (11.88), Pontoise, every morning from 4 to 5 a.m. EST (3 to 4 CST). . . . Prague, Czechoslovakia, is heard around 5 a.m. EST (4 CST), on still another frequency of 11.76 megs.

THE Second Intercontinental Concert, arranged to acquaint listeners of the world with the music of various countries, will be broadcast by leading foreign short-wave stations and jointly by CBS and NBC on Sunday, February 21, from 11 to 11:30 a.m. EST (10 to 10:30 CST). The broadcast will originate in the Argentine. It is expected to include the ringing of the historic Independence Bell in the Cabildo Building at Buenos Aires, performances of original Argentine compositions for symphonic orchestra, folk-songs from the pampas, a popular tango band, and a large chorus singing tunes typical of various regions of the country.

HJ1ABE (9.5) of Cartagena, Colombia, continues to offer original awards to listeners to its DX programs, Monday nights at 10 p.m. EST (9 CST). On February 1, a genuine Colombian coconut was offered to the first listener sending in a clipping from their local newspaper regarding the station's programs.

Enthusiasts on amateur band reception report hearing VQ1AB (14.255), located on Fanning Island, one of the mid-Pacific air bases for the proposed new Hawaii to Australia air mail service. Although a power of only ten watts is in use, the station is received with astonishing clarity near 1 a.m. EST (12 mid. CST). . . . Another interesting station reported by many listeners is PYRO01 (14), P. O. Box 585, Para, Brazil. This queer call is merely in temporary use by PY8AD, for the duration of a Brazilian DX contest.

Edward Schmeichel, Chicago, states VPD, Suva, Fiji, is testing nightly at 12:30 a.m. EST (11:30 p.m. CST) on 13.98 megs. At 3 a.m. EST (2 CST), the station establishes telephone contact with VLK, Sydney, Australia.

THE establishment by the Federal government of a Pan-American station in Washington at an estimated cost of \$750,000 has been proposed. The station would be used to improve relations with Latin American countries. Five frequencies reserved for the station are as follows: 6.120, 9.55, 11.73, 15.13 and 21.5 megs.

Rumors concerning a supposed short-wave station in Jerusalem have been current for some time. W. K. Brasher, chief engineer of the Palestine Broadcasting Service, writes: "There is no short-wave transmitter in Palestine and I am afraid that the information which has been given you on this point is not accurate."

The new Venezuelan YV1RI (6.21), "Radio Coro," now on the air, is heard between 8 and 9:30 p.m. EST (7 and 8:30 CST), reports Harry Kentzel, Averill Park, N. Y. . . . VP4TC (6.85) of Trinidad, has been heard now for two successive Saturdays, from 4:30 to 5 p.m. EST (3:30 to 4 CST), broadcasting a running commentary on the British Intercolonial cricket matches which are apparently sponsored by a local lime tonic concern.



because she had signed a contract before he arrived.

Again she journeyed to the film city, and with her she carried her hopes and dreams of great things. Side by side she was to work with a person who was as lovable as Schumann-Heink herself—the late Marie Dressler. The diva was overjoyed at the idea. She talked of nothing but her picture. But the picture was destined never to be made.

Marie Dressler fell ill, production was stopped, the picture postponed. Then, like so many blows Schumann-

"Of course, I am restless," Schumann-Heink wrote. "This waiting is not pleasant." Then—"Next week . . . some real good news." But it never came!

Ich bin wirklich müde, homesick for you my dearest friend and our work — in next week I know more and I am sure some real good news — All my love to you and yours ever Ernestine Schumann Heink

Heink had received earlier in life when her heart was not worn with sorrow, came Marie Dressler's death.

That was the beginning of the end. It was then that the first of one tragic circumstance after another began to choke the life of the hope that had been Schumann-Heink's.

The fault was not the studio's. It was an incredible twist of fate that so often happens in Hollywood. Things like this have happened before and they will happen again.

Schumann-Heink was destined never to receive another studio call. Dressler was gone, the story had to be rewritten—but the rewrite never left the author's room.

Through the final months of 1935 and into the spring of 1936, the great singer waited . . . They had taken away the one thread by which she had rushed through life. Schumann-Heink could help no one. She couldn't sing . . . and life, to her, was empty.

Marion Talley, her protegee, knew her well—so well that she says: "She could have done great things in motion pictures had she lived. I believe idleness hastened her end."

And Josef Koestner, her dearest and closest friend, voices the same thought: "She often spoke of her unhappiness and disappointment in pictures."

Worry and idleness will, in time, wear down the stoutest heart. And Schumann-Heink was no longer young.

In the spring of 1936 an ambulance drew up to the front of her house. She was taken, suffering from anemia, to

Hollywood had stilled her song. Hollywood had taken away her work . . . had kept her in idleness . . .

Hollywood had broken her heart! And yet you can't point a finger at Hollywood and cry "Murder!" Too many others have suffered there. Schumann-Heink went down fighting. She fought to the last ditch. But she died of a broken heart. She unwittingly told us so when she wrote:

"I am homesick for you, my dearest friend, and our work . . . Next week I will know more and, I am sure, some really good news."

But next week—and the good news—never came . . .
