

He is fearful of what so much struggle is doing to the minds and souls of his own two sons. Other parents feel the same.

Being familiar with your requirements, namely, that a serial for children be the sort that will build an audience and sell merchandise, he does not ask you to stop them. Instead, he asserts that humor can build and hold just as big a crowd as blood-and-thunder. He insists that it is not necessary for men to die like flies.


We all know that action gets results, gentlemen. But it also gets kids into all sorts of mental stitches. Humor has also been successful. Without leaving scars, either. Remember the Mark Tidd series? Or "Two Little Savages"?

We think Mr. Dixon's idea is worth while and deserving of more than casual consideration. But here is the hitch, Mr. Presidents: It needs air time. Specifically, it needs fifteen minutes a day, five times a week, for at least thirteen weeks.

Now, gentlemen, the challenge is this: We of RADIO GUIDE propose to hold a contest to discover a fine humorous script provided one or both of you will put winning scripts on the air for the required time and pay the winning writer a fair sum for his work.

In the twelve years of network broadcasting not one great writing name has been developed. It is probable that radio's writing geniuses are still undiscovered in country towns and villages. ## Why Not Television for Us, Too?

The English gentleman who had admitted that American broadcasting might be better than his own John Bull brand leaned back and asserted comfortably, "But, of course, we have television."

The argument was whether English or American broadcasting was more advanced. Of course, the English have television. Workable,

practical, pleasing television. He said: "I saw a tennis match televised recently. One of the players looked familiar. I looked more closely and, by Jove, it was a chap I had met at a club just the day before."

Funny things have been discovered about television over there. It was thought at first that the waves

which carry the picture images through the air would reach only to the horizon. Now they learn that they go considerably farther.

In the meantime, our own radio leaders are saying television is not ready. Which simply does not make sense. If it is available in England it is available here. American small-scale tests with a hundred or two receivers cannot possibly teach us so much of practical broadcasting results as we could learn in a month if we were to turn several thousand sets onto the market. Television is ready. We know that. But are the buyers? Cynics look from England to us and see a deliberate misrepresentation. They say Big Business is waiting for America to line her pockets with gold again. Then, and not until then, we'll have television.

Big Business has been seeking a stimulant to sales. Here it is. A new product creates business if the product is good. But lies and evasions and excuses create nothing but suspicion.

## VOICE OF THE LISTENER

RADIO GUIDE: ". . . I belong to the submerged class of radio listeners who do not write applause-cards, enter contests or vote for popular radio stars. Unfortunately, there is no way to reach us. If anyone called me on the telephone and asked me what program I had been listening to, I would probably resent the impudence and give no answer.

"In spite of this, I am most enthusiastic about certain types of radio programs and would much prefer to see those types on the increase . . . I know many, many possible radio buyers and potential buyers of the products of radio sponsors who listen to the radio, if at all, only on certain evenings when they are not compelled to listen to the choices of the present applauders and voters.

"Can not we be heard?"—A. W. A., Charleston, S. C.

Most pathetic of radio's listeners are those "too proud" to make themselves and their wishes known, for they are at the mercy of more vociferous auditors. Radio's "box-office" cannot be checked as are theaters'; letters, votes, purchases reveal preferences, and those who won't take part in the game that makes radio have no right to ask "Can not we be heard?" **A** MEMBER of the great Rothschild family, czars of European finance, once said that if Joseph Pulitzer had not lost his sight and his health, he would have gathered into his hands all the world's wealth, so great was his talent for making money!

Great though his financial acumen may have been, it was the slightest of Joseph Pulitzer's incredible powers, and the one for which he had the least respect. Pulitzer was a genius in every meaning of the word; possibly the greatest genius the American publishing world has known, a Colossus among men, a figure that towered high over its contemporaries and left a lasting mark upon generations to come.

As long as men read, the name of Pulitzer will be remembered. It was typical of Joseph Pulitzer, who had such an implacable, impatient hatred for everything that was second-rate, to endow the Pulitzer Foundation for the purpose of stimulating every phase of literary excellence. Annually, money from this endowment rewards writers in every field who have, during the year past, attained to what the governing committee considers would be a standard acceptable to Joseph Pulitzer himself—to whom everything short of perfection was utter waste, intolerable, worthless.

Best known of the Pulitzer Prizes are those awarded to outstanding American dramas. To receive the annual Pulitzer Prize is the pinnacle of success for American playwrights. Unfortunately, however, even prize-winning plays are rarely performed extensively after they close in New York. Always, a Pulitzer play is a drama of great merit, but it is rarely as widely available to the American people as might be desired.

To remedy this deficiency, the National Broadcasting Company has instituted a series of broadcasts of past Pulitzer plays, and on this Thursday the 1927 winner, "In Abraham's Bosom," will be put on the air. The broadcast will begin at 10 p.m. EDT.

Genius that he was, Joseph Pulitzer best loved to foster genius, and it is high tribute to his vision that today, so many years after his death, genius still looks to him, rather than to any living man, for the final accolade. Joseph Pulitzer would have liked "In Abraham's Bosom," the moving, tragic story of a poor Negro's lifelong effort to bring enlightenment and learning to his people. Pulitzer was a keen student of drama. All his life long he read plays, and when he was blind, and could read no longer, he hired other men to read to him!

**T**HE best illustration of Pulitzer's absorbing interest in dramatic writing is given by Alleyne Ireland, one of the amazing little group of secretaries that Pulitzer gathered from all over the world when blindness settled upon him, and whose duty it was to act as his eyes and to pour into his insatiable mind a never-ending stream of information. So acute was Pulitzer's memory, Ireland wrote, that it was impossible to deceive him. If, for instance, someone remarked in conversation that he knew a certain play, Pulitzer would name a scene and act perhaps half-way through the play, sketch the action up to a certain point, then remark, "Now take it on from there."

Everything that came to Joseph Pulitzer had to be stripped of non-essentials, reduced to its utter essence. This was so important that it was necessary for his secretaries to spend

hours in preparing to read to him. He once said that no one had ever been able to read a novel to him properly without having gone over it twice in advance! Cruising in the Mediterranean on his snow-white yacht, *Liberty*, Pulitzer put into port almost daily to take on board huge bundles of clippings from the United States, copies of French, German, Austrian, Italian, English newspapers, and, of course, the copies of his own *New York World* rushed to him by fast steamer.

Joseph Pulitzer made the *World* and the *World* made Joseph Pulitzer. But it unmade him, too. He came to

America at sixteen, without a penny and unable to speak a word of English. He died in America a millionaire, owner of the most powerful paper of his time, a giant in a country full of giants. But although his body was, as he often bitterly remarked, a broken wreck, though he was blind, though his nerves were stretched to such unbearable tautness that the click of a spoon against a dish left him in agony for hours, his mind never faltered.

Joseph Pulitzer's prime aim in life was the creation of a newspaper that would offer to the American public a degree of information and enlighten-

ment that they could nowhere else obtain; and he succeeded beyond his expectations.

For that reason, Joseph Pulitzer would appreciate the Pulitzer Prize play that will be broadcast on Thursday night. For "In Abraham's Bosom" is the story of a man whose life was marked out in that same pattern, and whose greatness was not less because he failed.

Abraham McCranie is a Negro plantation worker in the North Carolina turpentine woods. Of slave ancestry on one side, on the other he is white—for Abe is the son of Colonel McCranie, his master, and a Negro girl. Perhaps it is this, perhaps it is something inherent in his soul, but at any rate, Abe McCranie is far above the level of the sodden field-hands with whom he worked. For generations, he knows, his people have lived and died barely better than the animals of the fields, with no one to tell them of the good and beautiful things in the world.

If no one else will do it, Abe resolves, he will. And he pleads with the Colonel for a chance to open a Negro school—not, he is quick to say, that he believes Negroes and whites should be made equal; no, not that. But surely Negroes have at least the right to learn about the world in which they live.

The years pass, and Abe, whose home is kept by Muh Mack, his aunt, marries an old sweetheart, Goldie. A child, Douglass, is born. But Abe, obsessed with his dream, takes little interest in the child, less in his crops. Finally Colonel McCranie, in a burst of generosity, gives him the deed to his little house and land, tells him that in the fall he will have his chance.

**T**HE school is built, and Abe's dream at last seems to be opening before him. But the Colonel is dead now, the plantation is ruled by his son Lonnie. Abe disciplines one of the Negro pupils, there is trouble among the workers, and Lonnie closes the school.

Abe is forced to leave the plantation, goes to another town to work, loses his job because of an altercation with a white man. He is aging now. Goldie has stuck with him, but their son Douglass has turned out to be thoroughly worthless. Eighteen years after they left it, Abe and Goldie return to the McCranie plantation, and in time Abe succeeds in building another school. But on the night of its dedication a group of white men, inflamed by Abe's own shiftless son, refuse to allow the opening, and Abe is forced to run for his life.

Cowering in the fields, broken, bitter, his every illusion lost, Abe is discovered by Lonnie McCranie, who tells him that he is going to take his fields from him because he has neglected them. Rising in uncontrollable wrath, Abe kills him, then goes back to his cabin. There he finds Muh Mack, Goldie, and Douglass telling of his exploits out in the world. The mob has found Lonnie's body now, they are baying on Abe's trail, and as they approach the cabin, Muh Mack and Douglass run away. Only Goldie, faithful to the last, is in the cabin when Abe is shot and left to die on the floor.

That is "In Abraham's Bosom," awarded the Pulitzer Prize in 1927—and worthy of it. Written by a man who knows Negroes, a man born and reared in the South—Paul Elliot Green, now a professor at the University of North Carolina—the broadcast of "In Abraham's Bosom" should be one of the notable events of the season.

## Louis...

**J**OSEPH LOUIS BARROW showed no signs of the ferocity that was to make him famous when, a little light-brown piccaninny, he worked manfully in the cotton fields near Lafayette, Alabama. He was just another little Negro boy, one of a family of nineteen.

When Joe was seven—he was born on May 13, 1914—the family moved north, to Detroit. Joe went to school with the rest of the children, played sandlot baseball, still his favorite diversion, and in general took life with the same calm detachment that is his prime characteristic now. At fourteen he abandoned the idea of further formal schooling, decided to learn cabinet-making.

Never a pugnacious boy—he still does not actually like fighting, as Dempsey, for instance, liked it—Joe fought his first real battle in a Detroit boys' club.

Joe Louis was a pretty good fighter at seventeen, and in 1933, when he was nineteen, he entered the National A. A. U. championships. He didn't win, but he learned a lot, and in 1934 he won the light-heavyweight championship in the Golden Gloves tournament, the National A. A. U. light-heavyweight title as well.

Jack Kracken, whom he beat by a one-round knockout in Chicago, was Louis' first professional victim, and his reputation grew so fast that by the time he met Levinsky and Max Baer they were beaten as much by fright as anything else. And so far Louis has lost just one important fight—to Max Schmeling.

Joe Louis is almost emotionless, takes little interest in things around him. He likes to sleep about twelve hours at night, nap during the day. His appetite is prodigious. He once ate half of a 20-pound turkey for a bedtime snack. He likes horseback riding, golf, baseball.

## His Wife...

Mrs. Joe Louis is the First Lady of American Negro circles. Young, pretty, a good dancer and a tasteful dresser, she is generally well liked.


Marva Trotter before her marriage to Louis an hour before he fought Max Baer on September 24, 1935, Mrs. Louis was a Chicago stenographer. She was introduced to her future husband by another Negro fighter with the remark, "A very sweet girl would like to know you." Louis was indifferent at first. Rumors of impending divorce have appeared recently, but they are untrue. There are no children.

## His Manager...


John Roxborough and Julian Black, of Detroit and Chicago respectively, share Louis' managership. Roxborough, who first saw the potentialities of greatness in Louis, requested that Black, associated with him in other enterprises, take a hand in this one.

Roxborough is a wealthy man, prominent in Detroit Negro circles, with a reputation for absolute honesty. It is generally agreed among boxing authorities that it would be impossible to "fix" a Louis fight.

# RADIO BROADCAST Schmeling...

## The Crowd...

The first Louis-Schmeling fight attracted an audience of 60,000,000 listeners. For purposes of comparison, it is figured that King Edward's abdication speech was heard by 12,000,000 listeners. Experts predict this week's battle of the century will break all records for sets tuned to a sporting event.

Broadway's betting brokers are astute gentlemen who never give a sucker an even break. Their odds are usually a mirror of public belief in a fighter. As we go to press, they are offering 7 to 5 in favor of Joe Louis. Both men have amazing knock-out records behind them. Joe Louis has fought thirty-nine times. Thirty times he has left his opponent stretched on the canvas. Max Schmeling has fought sixty-three times and he has knocked out thirty-seven opponents.

Since his previous meeting with Louis, Schmeling has fought three times, once in 1937 and twice in 1938. His last fight was April 16. On the other hand, Louis has fought eleven times since. After being knocked out in June of 1936, he returned in August and knocked out Jack Sharkey in three rounds. In September, October and December he fought again. In 1937 he fought five times, notably with Tommy Farr, the talkative Englishman who succeeded in staying fifteen rounds and thereby surprising everyone, particularly himself. This year Louis has fought twice.

The Yankee Stadium, which will be the scene of this broadcast and battle, has witnessed some stirring events. Last Memorial Day 83,000 persons attended a double-header between the Boston Red Sox and New York Yankees baseball teams. This was the biggest baseball crowd ever seen in America. It was here that Louis kayo'd Carnera. In 1933 the Army-Notre Dame football game was such a sell-out that some tickets sold for fifty dollars. During the game Notre Dame was behind, 12 to 0, but in the last five minutes of play scored thirteen points to win the game.


Arranging for time for this super-broadcast, the Buick Company has bought every National Broadcasting Company station available. No one knows exactly how many will be able to clear their time of previous commitments. The cost to the Buick Company, because they want complete coverage, will be considerable. If the fight runs for fifteen rounds the cost will amount to between \$30,000 and \$35,000 for time alone. Though the cost of radio rights is not available at this time, radio rights for the Louis-Baer fight held in 1935 were \$27,500.

Everyone wonders what fighters get out of these million-dollar gates. Here are figures for the biggest gate ever received at the Yankee Stadium, the Louis-Baer fight. Total attendance was 95,000. Gross receipts were \$932,944. Radio and movie rights brought another \$52,000. The Twentieth Century Club, which promoted the fight, paid out for park rental \$64,000; to the Federal government for taxes, \$93,000; to the State of New York for taxes, \$46,000. Joe Louis and Max Baer split \$430,000 equally between them. When Schmeling and Louis met before, the total receipts were \$547,000 and Schmeling and Louis split \$252,000 equally.


It is understood that private contracts for this fight stipulate that the winner is to get 40% or close to \$400,000. The loser will get 20% of the gate, which "ain't hay" either.

In 1925, Jack Dempsey came to Cologne, Germany, on an exhibition tour. A youngster named Schmeling, a middleweight, was one of the volunteers. Then, as now, Max Schmeling bore a striking facial resemblance to Dempsey, and this fact, plus the German boy's courage and willingness to fight, impressed Dempsey. Jack gave Schmeling much good advice.

Though he is German to the core, Schmeling owes most of his success to Americans and things American. Born in Kluin Lucklow, near Berlin, on September 28, 1905, the son of a steamship captain, Max was a restless, adventurous youth, unusually strong. He ran away from home when he was sixteen, wandered over Germany, doing the hardest kind of manual labor. Before he was a fighter, Max was a printer, a professional strong man, a farmer, a canary-bird merchant, a factory worker, a coal miner, a railway office clerk.

In 1924 Max fought the first of sixteen amateur bouts, a year later he turned professional, and in 1928 he came to America. After a few fights against comparative unknowns he stopped the supposedly unstoppable Johnny Risko, took the heavyweight championship from Jack Sharkey. When he went back to Germany he had a trunkful of American money, an American manager, a great appreciation of everything American.

Schmeling is cold, reserved, no spender, and hence unpopular with the ordinary fight follower.

Today the greatest figure in German sport, a friend of Adolf Hitler, a national hero, Schmeling stands at a crossroad. If he wins, he will rise to new heights. If he loses, he will be disgraced. Few fighters have ever had so much at stake as Max Schmeling will have on June 22.

## His Wife...

Max Schmeling is very much in love with his wife. She is beautiful Anny Ondra, German movie actress. No great star, Anny Ondra has the virtue of considerable beauty, pure Aryan ancestry, and Hitler has named her Germany's official actress. When Max Schmeling beat Joe Louis, Der Fuehrer sent Anny a great mass of red roses.

Some say Anny Ondra cooled toward Max after he lost to Baer, that the breach persisted until after the Louis victory. Anny Ondra may fear the fruits of failure in Germany, but Max doesn't know the meaning of fear.

## His Manager...

Shrewd, enterprising Joe Jacobs became Max Schmeling's manager in 1929. Despite differing temperament, race, nature, Max and his manager get along well together.

Joe Jacobs knows all there is to know about the fight game, has an eagle eye for the unwary dollar. A born opportunist, he can adjust himself to any situation. After he gave the Nazi salute in a German ring, friends upbraided him. Jacobs' reply was classic.

"I kept my fingers crossed," he said.

## Swing Singer

Maxine Sullivan is a tiny, vibrant Negro girl with a high-flying imagination and an amazing sense of rhythm. First and best of the swing-singers, she began a career that will, on Tuesday night, bring her to a starring guest appearance with Benny Goodman, in the old Onyx Club on New York's famed Fifty-second Street. Long a musicians' hangout, the Onyx Club was attracting devotees of hot music when the word swing had no musical meaning. And Maxine Sullivan is one of the brightest of the stars who have come out of the Onyx Club. Famous for her swing version of "Loch Lomond," which she first sang at the Onyx and which was popularized by the college students who were her real "discoverers," Miss Sullivan stands today on the peaks, and the combination of her singing with Benny Goodman's playing should be memorable. You'll find her on CBS, at 9:30 p.m. EDT Tuesday.

## Invisible Man

First Nighter is going to put an invisible man on the air, come Friday the 24th. And not only that, this same invisible man will appear on the floor of the U. S. Senate, clad only in red flannels! It's all a part of the play, of course, titled "Oh Say, Can You See," and broadcast from the Little Theater Off Times Square at 10 p.m. EDT over an NBC network. The story concerns a scientist's experiment with a radium-eye machine which renders people invisible. Les Tremayne, as Dr. Slade, learns how to make his assistant, Muggles, invisible, takes him to Washington in an effort to interest the War Department in his device. But something goes wrong, and Muggles finds himself in the Senate, minus his dignity and most of his clothes.

## Night Court

In the front rank of the forces working toward a higher type of radio drama is the Columbia Workshop. Experimentally inclined, this little group of writers and actors and producers, unhampered by commercial sponsorship, has broadcast some of the most notable dramas ever put on the air. "St. Louis Blues," "Night Patrol," "Hassan," and a dozen other Workshop productions have marked milestones on the road of radio dramatics. On Saturday, June 25, at 7:30 p.m. EDT, an experimental stream-of-consciousness play, "Courtroom Obbligato," will be put on the air. Written by Hilda Lawrence, with a musical score by Tom Bennett, the play tells the story of a group of ordinary citizens haled into night court.

## Men and Books

Greatest problem facing America today is not the threat of European war, not the imminence of fascism or communism, but a matter known

and familiar to all of us: the problem of relief and unemployment. In his "Of Men and Books" program, to be heard at 4 p.m. EDT on Thursday over CBS, Professor John T. Frederick of Northwestern University will discuss two current non-fiction works bearing strongly on this problem: "We Too Are The People," by Louise Armstrong, and "The Right To Work," by Nels Anderson. Both are books of the utmost importance. "We Too Are The People," a straightforward account of the experiences of a relief administrator, has created widespread controversy.

## Country Correspondent

For years the backbone of American journalism was the country correspondent, the man—or, just as often, the woman—who noted in minute detail the little happenings of the community, the parties, the visits, the births and deaths and marriages, and sent a full account to the weekly county-seat newspaper. With the coming of extensive wire services, the general enlargement of news-gathering facilities, the country correspondent lost much of his once great prestige. But the country correspondent still flourishes in America, and every year the best one is selected by the *Country Home Magazine* in cooperation with the National Editorial Association. For an interview with the 1938 champ, tune in NBC Monday, June 20, at 9:30 p.m. EDT.

## Yales and Harvards

Both unbeaten this season, the Yale and Harvard crews will meet to maintain an ancient rivalry on the Thames River, New London, Connecticut, on Friday, June 24. It will be the seventy-first running of the race, and the winning crew will share honors with the winning shell at Poughkeepsie, although neither Yale nor Harvard is entered in that race. Harvard swept the river last year, taking the varsity event after beating the Yale freshman and




junior varsity crews. Description of the four-mile upstream race will be broadcast by MBS and NBC at 6 p.m. EDT.

## "Hotel" Says Good-by

Hollywood Hotel goes off the air for the summer on Friday, June 24, and appropriately enough the last play to be put on the air by this top-ranking dramatic program will be "Always Goodbye." Barbara Stanwyck and Herbert Marshall will have the starring roles. The play goes on the air at 9 p.m. EDT. "Hollywood

Hotel" will be back in the fall, of course, bigger and better, no doubt, than ever before.

As we go to press, another important piece of Hollywood Hotel news comes in. For on June 4, Frances Langford, singing star of the program, and Jon Hall, who played the male lead in "Hurricane," were secretly married at Prescott, Arizona. No surprise to intimates of the newlyweds, this news is something of a joke to Louella Parsons, Hollywood Hotel producer. For in her syndicated newspaper column of June 7, Miss Parsons prophesied that the marriage would take place in December, boasted that this secret was exclusive with her!



## 150th Anniversary

At no time in U. S. history since its ratification 150 years ago has the American Constitution been of greater interest to the mass of the people. The document which the great English statesman Gladstone called the greatest ever struck off by the hand

and mind of man has, in a way, gone on trial, torn between two groups of thinkers. One faction holds that the Constitution is outmoded; the other, that it is an institution that should guide America always. Of special interest, therefore, is the special program in observance of the 150th anniversary of the ratification of the Constitution, to be aired by MBS on Sunday, June 19, at 3:45 p.m. EDT.

## Proud Fathers

What does a new-made daddy think about? Columbia Broadcasting System special-events announcers are going to find out, and that very soon: on Sunday, June 19, as a matter of fact. On that day, they'll track five- and ten-minute veterans of parenthood through the labyrinths of hospital corridors, corner them, demand to know just how it feels to be, at last, a proud father. The occasion, in case you've forgotten, is Father's Day, and the broadcast will be put on the air from several large cities. Only fathers whose first babies have been born on Father's Day morning can qualify.

## Billy and Bobby

The fabulous Mauch Twins—Billy and Bobby—in the East for the first time in more than a year, will return to the program that gave them their start in radio and brought them eventually to radio fame for the second of two broadcasts over CBS on Thursday, June 23, at 5:30 p.m. EDT. The program will originate in New York.


Fourteen years old now, the Mauch boys did their first dramatic work in radio under the direction of Miss Nila Mack, famed director of children's programs, whose "Let's Pretend" is a universal favorite. ## WEEK'S BETTER PROGRAMS

### Violin King

In every art there is one man who stands above his fellows, indisputably supreme. In the incredibly difficult and complex art of violin-making, that one man is Antoni Stradivari, who was born in Cremona, Italy, in 1664, and died there in 1737, leaving behind him instruments of such perfection that for 200 years they have been the despair of lesser craftsmen. There are almost as many theories to account for the perfection of Stradivarius violins as there are genuine Strads in existence. For years it was believed that the master of Cremona used a secret varnish that had a mysterious power to enhance the beauty of a violin's tone. But chemical analysis has proved that theory to be false. Stradivari's materials were the ordinary materials of his day—but his craftsmanship was extraordinary. A rare opportunity to hear a string quartet composed entirely of Strads will be presented on Sunday, June 19, when the Stradivarius String Quartet comes to the Radio City Music Hall over NBC. The time, 12:30 p.m. EDT.



### Lock-Picker

The greatest safe-cracker alive today is no criminal! His name is Charles Courtney, and he has yet to be arrested for the delicate business of opening up a tightly closed bank vault or persuading a locked safe to give up its secrets. Internationally famous, Courtney is the world's foremost authority on locks, safes and keys. And in the course of his career he has had completed assignments ranging from the opening of a centuries-old safe to the untangling of a jammed zipper on a lady's pajamas! He'll tell all when he goes on the air as a guest of "It Can Be Done" on Wednesday, June 22, at 10:30 p.m. EDT, CBS.

### Propaganda

There never was a time in the history of America when news was of such great importance as it is today, unless, possibly, it was during the period just before the World War. All of us, in this year 1938, work and live under a constant barrage of untruthful news or supposed-to-be news. It is utterly dangerous. Some of the dangers of propaganda will be pointed out by Col. Frank Knox, publisher of the *Chicago Daily News* and once candidate for the vice-presidency of the United States, in an address before the National Editorial Association to be broadcast from White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, at 8 p.m. EDT, NBC, Wednesday, June 22.

### Chinese War

An echo of the "undeclared war" now raging through China will be heard over U. S. receiving sets on Friday, June 24, when Dr. Hu Shih, famous Chinese scholar and author, speaks from 10:45 to 11 p.m. EDT over the network of the Columbia Broadcasting System. Dr. Hu Shih, who was educated in American

schools and universities—his writings are well known in this country—will speak in connection with the Red Cross campaign to aid sufferers in the devastated areas. Both because of the Japanese campaign of planned destruction and the defensive "scorched earth" policy of the Chinese, much of China today lies in utter waste. Hundreds of thousands of men, women and children are wandering, homeless and with almost no food available. Although there is no more efficient organization of its kind in the world, the Red Cross is unable to cope, using its present facilities, with misery and suffering on so widespread a scale. Help must come from other sources, therefore, and soon.



### Ninety-Two Years

Baseball, the national game of America, is just 92 years old this season. It's a far cry from the early days of the game, when a nondescript ball and almost any old stick were all the equipment necessary, to today's scientifically tested and regulated equipment, big stadia—and big salaries. But all these changes—not the least of which is the fact that radio broadcasts of baseball have become a national habit, and, to some listeners, a national scourge—are almost within the memory of living men. To talk about the old days of baseball and celebrate the new, a festive dinner will be held at the Hotel Statler in Cleveland on Sunday, June 19, and speeches by present-day greats of the game will be broadcast at 8:30 p.m. EDT over the Columbia network. Connie Mack, the oldest active man in baseball, will be on hand, as will Bob Feller, the youngest big-league star; Tris Speaker and many others, including members of the Cleveland Indians and the Philadelphia Athletics.

### Robot Farmer

According to advance publicity releases of the Columbia Broadcasting System, 7:30 p.m.



on Friday, June 24, will see the broadcast of a talk from Washington by S. H. McCrory, Chief of the Bureau of Agricultural Engineering of the United States Department of Agriculture, entitled, "The Farmer Takes a Robot." Unfortunately, this little broadcast, scheduled as a feature of the "Adventures in Science" series, has been cancelled. But we thought we'd call it to your attention anyway, because it will undoubtedly be put on the air in the fall, and it should be well worth watching for.



### Tennis Abroad

The greatest tennis star the game has ever produced, Bill Tilden, will be on the air at 1:15 p.m. EDT for Columbia on Saturday, June 25, to bring to U. S. listeners an account of the international tournament at Wimbledon, England, where top-ranking stars from all over the world are gathered in their annual struggle for supremacy. Until a tennis star has played—and won—on the famous Centre Court at Wimbledon, he is hardly considered to have amounted to very much! The tournament started on June 20, will continue until June 30.

### Man and Wife

Thoroughly happy in each other and in their work, Fredric March and his wife, Florence Eldridge, are two of the best—and best-liked—actors that Hollywood knows. Although Florence Eldridge has done little stage or screen work since her marriage, leaving the starring role in the family to Fredric March, her infrequent appearances are usually notable. When the Marches appeared last season in a Broadway effort called "Yr. Obedient Husband," their individual work attracted considerable praise, even though the play itself was a quick failure. When the Lux Radio Theater comes on the air at 9 p.m. EDT Monday night (June 20) over the CBS network, Fredric March and Florence Eldridge will be together again, this time in a radio version of "Manslaughter." Well known as a play and as a film, "Manslaughter" tells the story of a spoiled rich girl, sent to prison after killing a man in an automobile accident, and how life behind bars brought her to the realization that her philosophy had been wrong.

### Robin Hood Dell

On June 23, the Ninth Summer Concert Season begins at Robin Hood Dell in Philadelphia, with the famous Philadelphia Orchestra playing a series of concerts under the batons of internationally famous conductors. The first broadcast will go on the air at 9:30 p.m. EDT, MBS.

The programs, which will give to a national audience what is recognized by leaders in the musical world as America's outstanding summer concert series, will be broadcast direct from a vast outdoor amphitheater in Fairmount Park on the banks of the Schuylkill River.

The Dell concerts are a unique institution. Begun in 1930 in a natural open-air theater, walled by huge trees, the concerts this year will be played from a huge acoustically perfect stage, before audiences ranging up to 8,000 persons. At one time—in 1934—there was talk of abandoning the project, but the musicians of the Philadelphia Orchestra took over. During the season opening on Thursday, such conductors as Wallenstein, Van Hoogstraten, and Smalens will be on the podium.

**A**TTUNE yourself for serious contemplation of ancient classics, as none of these composers except Leoncavallo, who died in 1919, lived later than 1828, the year of Schubert's death.

Krebs was the best organ pupil of Bach; C. P. E. Bach was the master's third son and functioned as court musician to Frederick the Great. Radio auditors are becoming instructively familiar with the superior harpsichord playing of Ernst Victor Wolff.

**"LES AEOLIDES,"** as its title indicates, has to do with the winds, and Cesar Franck (1822-1890) found his inspiration in Leconte de Lisle's poem of the same name. The sentiment of the lines is beautifully reproduced in the composer's delicate and impressionistic symphonic score.

The generously named Andre-Ernest-Modeste-Gretry (1741-1813) was founder of the school of French comedy-opera. His music is light, simple in harmony and orchestration.

Saint-Saens, dead seventeen years, would be practically out of the orchestral repertoire were it not for his third symphony, his best work in that form. Aside from its sustained and lofty merit, the score offers unusual effects with parts written for piano duet and organ.

## More or Less Comment?

**A** WRITER in *Modern Music* complains of the kind of spoken comment that accompanies most of the music programs on the air. He says that he gets too many elementary and over-familiar facts, and pokes fun at the commentators who tell him solemnly that the opening motif of Beethoven's Fifth Symphony is "Fate knocking at the door"; that Bach had innumerable children; where Saint-Saens traveled in his busy life; and what Franck said to his wife after finishing a symphonic score. The same writer also ridicules such phrases as "the great German master"; "sublime in its . . . etc. . ."; "the Finnish genius" (this one has been worked to death); "brilliant young Americans" (when applied to our native composers), and concludes, "Maybe your experience with musical knowledge has been limited to the amazing fact that Beethoven crossed Napoleon's name from the fly-leaf of the 'Eroica' symphony, or that Brahms wished he could write a waltz like Johann Strauss. But don't tell me that you haven't heard how old Mendelssohn was when he wrote the 'Midsummer Night's Dream' music!"

The foregoing abashes me down to the ground, for I too have been guilty of setting down some of the ABC's for readers of RADIO GUIDE. However, I was not moved by a spirit of condescension, but only by the belief that many older dialists never came across those items and that many younger ones have not yet heard them. Am I right or not? It would interest me to know just what the radio listeners think of the music-commentators, and what kind of comment they prefer: factual or romantic, weighty or light?

## Prophets and Profits

Whenever I think about the chief problem of American composers I am reminded of the anecdote about old Dr. Johnson, who was one of a standing crowd at a London musicale, when the hostess asked him: "Haven't you a seat, Doctor?" "I have, madam," the author snapped back, "but I have no place to put it."

American creators have enough music but don't know where to have it performed. Radio offers the solution, as exemplified by CBS, which has commissioned six Americans to submit new compositions written especially for radio hearing. Their works will be premiered this summer through the medium of "Everybody's Music" (Sundays, CBS), conducted by Howard Barlow. As the composers are to be paid, radio can point with proud scorn at those who accuse it of operating for profit only.

The harmonically simple melodies of the early English composer, William Boyce (1710-1779), and the exciting, sophisticated orchestration of Debussy's "Festivals" provide a striking frame for the romantically lovely "Romeo and Juliet" overture, to be heard on the air twice this week. It will be interesting to compare Mr. Stewart's interpretation with that of Alfred Wallenstein on Saturday evening with the Philadelphia Orchestra.

Wagner offers me a recurringly funny experience, and maybe others share it with me. Whenever I hear much of his music within a given period, I imagine I am tiring of it. However, deprive me of him for a time and then bring him back—lo and behold! he conquers me afresh with the magic of his melody and the lure of his orchestration. I fear that I exist in lifelong thrall to the radiant Richard.

Strangely enough, while I have heard the Wagner operas no oftener than the Strauss waltzes, the latter never surfeit me even temporarily, doubtless because they ask for lesser emotional drain.



**B**ROTHER WALLENSTEIN has summoned some typical "Pop" favorites for this occasion, but how did he overlook Brahms' Hungarian Dances, Chabrier's "España," Grieg's "The Swan" and Weber's "Invitation to the Waltz"? Yet the program is ingenious, for while it pleases the many it should not displease the few.

Apropos, a number of gracious compositions which used to be regular visitors at "Pop" concerts years ago seem to have fallen by the wayside of recent seasons; for instance, d'Albert's "Improvisator" overture, Dvorak's "Scherzo Capriccioso," Ibert's "Diversissement," Rubinstein's "Feramors" and Victor Herbert's "Irish Rhapsody."

Nearly all the leading composers have written at least one number which endears them to the multitude. Remember Bach's "Air," Beethoven's "Minuet," Schubert's "Ave Maria," Schumann's "Traumerei," Mendelssohn's "Spring Song," Rubinstein's "Melody in F," Rachmaninoff's "Prelude in C Sharp Minor," Chopin's "Funeral March," Ravel's "Bolero," Dvorak's "Humoresque" and Liszt's "Liebestraum."

The Wallenstein program ends on an elevated note with the sublimated romanticism of Tchaikowsky.

## Goldman's Band Ushers in Summer with New York Open-Air Concerts

Sunday, June 19 at 9 p.m. EDT on CBS

**M**ANY years ago—for diplomatic reasons I shall not say how many—I used to go to the Irving Place Theater in New York, where an excellent little orchestra held forth between the acts. My ear was caught by the music, but my eye wandered often to two performers in the pit, one of them the mature conductor, the other the very young cornet player. They drew attention because of their strong facial resemblance and their extraordinary crowns of luxuriant, wavy black hair, worn in the pompadour manner. They were uncle and nephew. In later years, the former became first violinist and assistant conductor at the Metropolitan, and the cornetist founded and led his own band of brass and woodwind performers. The names of the uncle and nephew? Naham Franko and Edwin Franko Goldman.

The older man has passed away, but the younger—with head now capped by snowy-white but still luxuriant hair—last summer celebrated the twenty-fifth anniversary of his inauguration of the annual summer concerts by the Goldman Band in Central

Park, New York. June 19 will witness this year's opening broadcast of the series, seven years ago named the Daniel Guggenheim Memorial Concerts, to commemorate the public-minded sponsor who made them possible from the beginning. His family continues generously to finance the enterprise that affords free musical enjoyment for hundreds of thousands of New Yorkers during the hottest period of the summer. They find seats facing the specially constructed bandstand, scatter themselves over the lawns or sit in their parked cars crowding the drives near the concert enclosure. Always they are regaled with programs featuring the masters, led and performed with understanding and finish.

"Here comes the band!" A cry that has thrilled people since 3000 B. C. or so, when the Egyptians paraded to the shrine of Serapis, god of healing, and made music upon reeds, pipes, tambourines and drums.

A harmonious summer to Goldman, and happy hearing for the armies of Central Park visitors and their fellow listeners at the loudspeakers!

## Robin Hood Dell Commences Its Annual Rustic Series

Thursday, June 23 at 9:30 p.m. EDT on MBS

**P**HILADELPHIA, too, offers its citizens outdoor musical delights when the new season of Robin Hood Dell concerts begins June 23 (9:30 to 10:30 p.m. EDT on MBS) at the forest-fringed amphitheater in Fairmount Park, on the banks of the Schuylkill River.

In such picturesque surroundings the famed Philadelphia Orchestra started its summer ministrations in 1930, and since then as many as 8,000 persons have at times crowded the natural open-air auditorium to hear symphonies under the stars, with human stars serving as soloists. The radio audience of millions is especially favored, too, because experts declare that the nature of the Dell site offers splendid acoustics not normally found in al fresco amphitheaters.

Inaugurated by public-spirited Philadelphians, the Dell project developed slowly at first, and was about to be abandoned in 1935, but the men of the orchestra stepped forward with

a proposition to run the series on a cooperative basis, and since that time its artistic and financial success has been continuous. Today a huge stage replaces the original canvas-covered platform, and spacious dressing-rooms instead of tents offer hospitality to the assisting artists.

Distinguished guest conductors are scheduled for the present course, Eugene Ormandy (regular leader of the Philadelphia Orchestra) batoning the opening concert. The following evening Alexander Smallens has charge (9:30 p.m. EDT), and Saturday Alfred Wallenstein conducts (8:30 p.m. EDT), followed in later broadcasts by Willem van Hoogstraten and others. The series will be broadcast regularly through the summer on Friday evenings at 9:30 and Saturdays at 8:30 p.m. EDT.

Music-loving dialers who feared their pleasures were to be few this summer have fumed needlessly, what with the generous list of shows.





## Propaganda Discussed By Col. Knox

Wednesday, NBC, 8:00-8:30 p.m.

Propaganda has many names and grins at "what fools we mortals be" from many places. A powerful force, it exerts, directly and indirectly, a sordid influence on the lives of all people, taking an immense toll from the ranks of the innocents. Being powerful, struggles for the control of the agencies that circulate it have often upset governments. There was one such struggle in Germany, and the Nazis now control German reading-matter; another such struggle took place in Italy, and now the Fascists dictate the Italian press; today we read of editors and publishers in this country being challenged the right of what they term "freedom of the press," and of a proposed bill aimed at the suppression of that freedom. So it is with a topic loaded with dynamic possibilities that Col. Frank Knox addresses the annual convention of the National Editorial Association.

Col. Knox, publisher of the Chicago Daily News and Republican candidate for the vice-presidency in the 1936 presidential election, is regarded as an international authority on forces and trends which mold public opinion. He chose this topic for his address before 500 editors and publishers of small-town daily and weekly newspapers because of the important bearing it has on the lives of all citizens of the United States. Its appropriateness is further enhanced by the fact that propaganda is a subject with which newspapermen should be well acquainted, for it has been by newspapers that most propaganda has been circulated.

## Anniversary Celebration At Valley Forge

Sunday, MBS, 3:45-4:30 p.m.

Addresses by Governor George H. Earle of Pennsylvania and Associate Justice H. F. Stone of the United States Supreme Court will highlight a special Reverence Day program in observance of the 150th anniversary of the ratification of the Constitution of the United States and the evacuation of Valley Forge by George Washington's troops. Over 10,000 people are expected to make the pilgrimage to Valley Forge for the ceremony.

In this display of devotion to our democracy and those, now long dead, who were closely associated with its early history there is a bright ray of hope for its continuance in spite of the threatening antagonism in many foreign quarters. Americans should remember on occasions like this that many heroes and several events, now celebrated and symbolized, passed without honor in their own day.



## "Wild Bill" McGovern Tells of the Orient

Tuesday, NBC, 7:45-8:00 p.m.

Bringing to the air a wealth of experience in subjects of which he speaks, William Montgomery McGovern, author, explorer and lecturer, will be heard Tuesday in the third of a special series of six broadcasts titled "The Roving Prof." In this series Professor McGovern tells the American public something of the little-known human sidelights of family life in the Orient. His commentaries are based on interesting anecdotes taken from his own experiences.

In presenting this series by Professor McGovern, NBC, in cooperation with the University Broadcasting Council, brings to the air one of the most colorful figures in the field of education in America today. Although he is professor of political economy at Northwestern University, he is known on the campus there simply as "Bill." He returned to Northwestern this spring after a year of study in North China, where he was frequently in the war zone.

His career as a traveler started when he was only six weeks old. He started traveling then and he has been traveling ever since. Outstanding among his unusual journeys is one he took with his mother to Mexico just to see a revolution. At sixteen he went to Japan, where he later entered the Buddhist priesthood. From here he went to Oxford for more study and then to the Field Museum for a curatorship in anthropology. He also found time to explore the Forbidden City of Lhasa, the Inca ruins of Peru, and the Amazon River.

## Professor Frederick Airls Comments on Books

Recently added to Columbia's series of Adult Education programs was one titled "Of Men and Books," conducted by Professor John T. Frederick. In this series, now in its fifth week, Professor Frederick reviews books which impress him as significant interpretations of American life, with particular stress on regional literature. Besides reviewing from one to three books on each broadcast and including interesting biographical information about their authors, Professor Frederick, from time to time, has prominent writers as guests.

John T. Frederick, recognized as one of America's leading short-story critics, is professor of modern letters at the Medill School of Journalism of Northwestern University, director of the Illinois Writers Project and lecturer on contemporary literature at Notre Dame University.



When Victor Bay raised his baton on June 1 to rehearse his "Essays in Music" orchestra for a piece by Rachmaninoff they were going to play on their next broadcast, he didn't get the reaction he expected. Instead, as one man, the musicians broke into the strains of Mendelssohn's Wedding March. Bay had suddenly gotten married the night before to Hanna Moore, a dancer, whom he met in Hollywood while he was working on Columbia's Shakespeare cycle last summer and she was in "The Goldwyn Follies."

Saw Howard Clancy in the studios the other night, and during our conversation I asked the popular announcer if he was doing any painting, which is his great hobby. Much to my surprise, Howard told me he was doing a painting of Arturo Toscanini. While he sat in a private booth off the stage during the maestro's concert series, he made some sketches from which he is doing the painting. When he is through with this one, he is going to make paintings of other conductors.

While I was sitting in the reception room at CBS headquarters one day last week, Actress Betty Garde went rushing past me three or four times, dashing between two studios. Finally my curiosity got the best of me. I stopped her and, between breaths, she revealed her broadcasting schedule for the week. That afternoon she was dividing her time between rehearsals for "Gang Busters" and Helen Menken's program, "Second Husband." She had done her usual "Mrs. Wiggs" and "Lorenzo Jones" broadcasts that morning. The next day she would do her regular morning shows, rehearse with Al Pearce all p.m., and in the evening dash from the Pearce show over to the "Second Husband" broadcast. Wednesday she would rehearse and broadcast with "Gang Busters." Thursday she would be on with Kate Smith... continuing her "Wiggs" and "Jones" broadcasts every morning! I wonder what Betty does in her spare time?

INSTEAD of allotting fixed periods in the Daventry transmissions to commentaries on the All-England Lawn Tennis Club Championship Meeting at Wimbledon, the programs will be interrupted for broadcasts from the center court whenever the matches then in progress have reached an exciting stage. This arrangement will remain in force throughout the entire period of the Championships—Monday, June 20, to Saturday, July 2—but during the last three days electrically recorded sound pictures of episodes during the day's play will supplement any commentaries that may be given. That colorful bit of old London bounded by Oxford Street, Regent Street, Shaftesbury Avenue and Charing Cross Road—known as Soho, and as John Galsworthy once said, "untidy, full of Greeks, Ishmaelites, cats, Italians, tomatoes, restaurants, organs, colored stuffs, queer names, and people looking out of upper windows," will be described in a broadcast from Daventry, on Saturday, June 25, at 6:30 p.m. EDT, over GSP and GSD.

Ray Shaffer of Waterloo, Ia., reports a new station, TIEM of San Jose, Costa Rica, testing in early evenings on 10.04 and 10.2 megs.

NBC's International Station W3XAL (17.78) is now presenting news reports to foreign countries each Sunday as follows: At 1:45 p.m., in Italian; at 3 p.m., in German; at 4 p.m., in French; at 7:30 p.m., in Spanish and at 7:45 p.m. EDT, in Portuguese. The Latin broadcasts are also heard weekdays at the same time. A Broadway air column, devoted to news about the theater, motion pictures, night clubs and fashions, with Miss Carmer Castelo as the Spanish commentator, is now directed to Latin-American listeners each Friday night at 7:15 p.m. EDT, over CBS International Station W2XE (11.83). A sparkling luncheon concert by the Golden Palm Marimba Band may be heard daily from 1:45 to 2:45 p.m. EDT, over TGWA (15.17) of Guatemala City.

According to Radiocorriere, the new 1,000-watt short-wave station which was inaugurated at Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, on May 9, is now operating daily on 9.553 and 4.75 megs. A third optional frequency of 12 megs will be added soon.

SHORT-WAVE SHORTS: OZF (9.52) of Skamlebak, Denmark, is now beaming on South America daily from 9 to 10:30 p.m. and on North America and Greenland daily from 10:30 p.m. to 12 mid. EDT. COCM of Havana, Cuba, has shifted to 9.82 megs, assumedly to escape interference from EAQ, Madrid. Other stations that have shifted frequencies lately are: YV5RC, Caracas, Venezuela, to 5:97 megs; TIWS, Puntarenas, Costa Rica, to 6.375 megs; HC2CW, Guayaquil, Ecuador, to 9.19 megs, and HCJB, Quito, Ecuador, heard testing on 6.225 megs. R. B. Oxrieder of State College, Penn., writes that a new Chilean station on 11.78 megs, believed to be CB1180, is being heard evenings from approximately 7 to 11 p.m. EDT, where it receives considerable interference from HP5G (11.78), "Radio Gonzales," P. O. 1121, Panama City, Panama, which went on the air officially with an inaugural program on Wednesday, May 25, and is now being heard from 10 p.m. to 1 a.m. EDT. Plans are under way for world transmissions from Delhi, India, which beamed on various parts of the world, would seek to impart general knowledge about the languages, culture and principles of that country.

Listeners should be on the lookout for PK6XX (14.2) in New Guinea. The power of this station, which was first heard with very loud signals, on June 2, by John DeMyer of Lansing, Mich., was given as 300 watts. PK6XX is believed to be the base-camp station of the American Museum of Natural History's Expedition to New Guinea, and as such should provide some very thrilling moments of reception from the land of "head hunters."






**"CORNTUSSEL NOOZ"**

TOBY TOLLIVER AND SUSIE SHARP TAKE THEIR STAND WITH HOMESPUN HUMOR

BY RAY COX

"HERE comes Toby, here comes Suz, here they come with the Corntussel Nooz."

And with those words from the announcer, WMT ushers in another quarter-hour of laughs and amusement for Midwestern radio listeners from Toby Tolliver and Susie Sharp, editor and star reporter of the mythical little community newspaper in the village of Corntussel, U. S. A. In real life they're known as Neil and Caroline Schaffner.

From the time their program first took to the air two years ago over WCAZ in Carthage, Illinois, its popularity has never been questioned. Now it originates in the Cedar Rapids studios of WMT, and in addition is heard over a special network of Midwestern stations, including WOW, Omaha, Nebraska; KMA, Shenandoah, Iowa; WHBF, Rock Island, Illinois, and WCAZ. But perhaps we're getting ahead of our story. Let's go back a few years and delve into the past history of the two stars who have appeared on Broadway and Coast to Coast over NBC.

Picture a sign-painter working on a flimsy scaffold high above the ground in Fort Dodge, Iowa, one June afternoon some forty-five years ago.

"Hey, mister! They want you to hurry home," shouted a voice from the street below, "you've got another baby boy."

A paint brush falls to the ground as the sign-painter slides down a rope and walks nonchalantly home.

The report was correct, and a proud father promptly names his fifth son Neil. The youngster was just like all other boys, and not till several years later was his love for the stage to make itself apparent.

JUST before young Schaffner was ready to enter grade school another important event took place, but as such things go, he wasn't to know about it for a good many years. Down in Texas a young lady made her first appearance in the world, and she, like the lad in Iowa, was in a few years destined to find herself on the stage. Caroline Hannah attended high school in De Ridder, Louisiana. Later she matriculated at the State University at Baton Rouge, and traveled north in a few years to attend the Horner Institute of Fine Arts at Kansas City, Missouri.

Neil attended high school at Fort Dodge and took a turn at commercial training in a business college, but like most young fellows, he wanted to get away from home and travel. A dramatic company was playing in town at the time and here, thought he, was an opportunity to see some of the world. The next four years found him touring the Midwest playing everything from the hero with the broad shoulders, to the villainous character with the curling mustache. If it was experience he needed it had certainly been plentiful here.

"Well, I've played every role in the books," said Mr. Schaffner to himself. "Why don't I go east and try my luck up near the top of the show business?"

He did, and was awarded the role of Honorable Archibald Graham in Cosmo Hamilton's European success, "The Blindness of Virtue." Neil was the leading man in the traveling show which ended after a triumphant run at the McVickers in Chicago.

This was followed by a two-year tour on the Columbia circuit's road show "The Whirl of Mirth." He played the part of a "light-comedy straight man," in the terms of the theater, and any actor who has "trode the

boards" will tell you it is far from being an easy task.

Charles A. Mason, popular German star of another day, had just brought his musical comedy vehicle, "Rudolph and Adolph," to America. It became a tremendous success overnight. After its American showing, the act was condensed to a twenty-minute vaudeville sketch, and for two solid years Neil and Mason toured the old Orpheum circuit with the smash hit.

While playing the "Rudolph and Adolph" sketch, Neil met Al Ferris and formed a partnership to play vaudeville billed as "Ferris and Schaffner."

"We played all the circuits with that act," says Schaffner. "The Orpheum, Pantages, Loew's, and all the rest. Our act went over wherever we went, and that was every state in the Union, Vermont included. It wasn't a matter of remembering in what town you were

playing, in fact you did well to remember what state you were in. All we ever saw on that circuit was the theater, hotel and depot. Things were going along too well to last. We were playing the American Roof on Forty-second Street in New York, when Ferris decided to get married. That broke up the act."

Ingenuity and resourcefulness have been the backbone of the show business. With vaudeville definitely on its way out Schaffner returned to the Midwest and organized the stock company which bears his name. It's now entering its twelfth year touring on one-week stands under canvas.

The "Corntussel Nooz" first began over WMT in March of this year. One of the Midwest's largest bakers heard them and began negotiations to sponsor the program. Now it's being aired every Monday through Friday over a special Midwest network at 11 a.m., under the signature of the Peter Pan Bakers. Frank Voelker, radio's blind organist, composed and plays the original theme used on the spot, Benne Alter does the announcing and Douglas B. Grant, program director for WMT, personally supervises production.

"We've always tried to give the public what they want," says Neil, "and I hope we can continue to do that very thing."

# AIRED FROM THE AIR



**A** SINGER'S throat is his fortune, and the best care he can give it is none too good. Endless are the formulas used by radio's ranking stars to keep their throats in tip-top condition. In the big broadcasting studios, as the "on the air" signal approaches, star singers produce a weird variety of throat-soothers. Raw eggs, lemons, dill pickles, candy drops, gargles and sprays are commonplace. Some singers adopt even more stringent safeguards for their precious voices. The great John McCormack, for instance, would not speak a word on the day preceding a concert, no matter what the situation might be. McCormack used a special spray to protect his vocal cords from the strain of day-in-day-out singing. Radio Guide on these pages shows in exclusive photographs a few of the methods used by throat-conscious stars of today.



# THEY DANCE TO THE SUN

**N**EWEST dance craze to sweep America is a modification of the ancient Indian Sun Dance, introduced recently by Arthur Murray, famed New York dancing-teacher. All primitive peoples are dancers, and the variety of the steps they use is endless. Because of their high intelligence and splendid physical development, most of the American Indians developed dances of unusual grace and significance. The Sun Dance, practised in various forms by nearly all the great tribes, and perhaps brought to highest perfection by the Indians of the plains country, is an excellent example. The steps, or divisions, of the Sun Dance represent important events or beliefs in the Indians' every-day life. Worship of the sun is, of course, common with most primitive peoples. The Indians go much farther than mere sun worship, however. There are four steps in the Sun Dance: the turkey, the war, scalp and eagle steps, each with its own separate meaning and significance. The tempo of the dance is very fast, with two beats taken on the same foot—one on the toe, one on the heel. As in the Big Apple, couples form a circle, dance first to the right and then to the left, breaking up the individual steps in pairs. Slightly modified for ballroom use, the Sun Dance reveals attractive formations, appealing rhythms, may well be highly popular with dance-lovers of the good old U. S. A.

Many of them are humorous or of merely passing interest, and parallel in great degree an average person's light conversation; some are of more consequence, and answers to them have given an index to popular sympathies.

"Professor Quiz—the one, the only, the original," as Bob Trout introduces him, taps uncounted founts of common interest and uncommon knowledge in his weekly question-fest. Voters proved that such entertainment has lost none of its grip on them with their hearty support.

One more poll is yet to be tabulated. That is the super poll, the Star of Stars Election itself, the poll which names the outstanding star of the year, as named by the listeners themselves. The results of that election will be printed in next week's RADIO GUIDE.


