



## Check Your Aerial

Our radio is a fine, big, office set. But our office is next to a street-car line, and just two flights below, huge motors drive our presses. So for months we have been attempting to hear programs through a barrage of machine-gun bursts and whirring, grinding noises.

Yesterday exasperation finally drove us to calling in a radio expert. We told him about the street-cars, about the motors, about the bad conditions. Then we told him to install whatever condensers or filters or gadgets were necessary and not spare the horses.

He departed nimbly for the roof while we sat back visualizing expensive alterations, installations, and still more exasperation. Twenty minutes later he was back. His fingers snapped on the radio. Sweet, unmarred music flooded our office. He spun the dial. Words as clear and distinct as if the speaker stood beside us amazed us.

"It was the aerial," he said.


"But the motors and the street-car . . ."

"Just the aerial," he repeated. "That'll be a couple of dollars."

That happened yesterday to us who are supposed to know our way around a radio set. It is a true story—and our face is still red. But more important than our embarrassment is the fact that millions of other listeners must also be suffering unnecessarily from the same sort of static caterwauling that afflicted our set.

It just happens that the week of October 15 to 22 has been set aside by the radio industry as Antenna Check-Up Week. Let us go on record as enthusiastically endorsing the idea. Call your radio repairman and have him check your aerial. Ours was only six months old and you know what happened.

The best set in the world is no good unless it receives the signals sent out by broadcasting stations. A good aerial is a guarantee of good reception. Your own winter listening, from Toscanini to Tommy Dorsey and from the Lone Ranger to the Lux Radio Theater, will be much better if your an-



tenna is in first-class shape.

## Word-Magic

They are saying that peace has broken out in Europe. Two weeks ago it seemed improbable. We listeners sat enthralled listening to the word-magic of network representatives telling us the story of intrigue and counter-intrigue.

No more thrilling week ever gave listeners a shivery spine. Among the men we heard, two emerge as genuine Titans of broadcasting. The first was H. V. Kaltenborn of the Columbia Broadcasting System. From Coast to Coast, listeners have written that his was the most lucid, most depended-upon broadcast on the air. For the time, he became

"required listening" for every citizen. H. V. Kaltenborn has been "required listening" for many of us for years. Talking with notes only, using the background of his vast intellectual attainments, he has helped us to an understanding of many things. It is gratifying that so many new listeners discovered him for themselves in this crisis.

The second Titan was the National Broadcasting Company's representative abroad, Dr. Max Jordan. While the whole world awaited the result of the Munich conference, he ferreted out the agreement that two dictators and two prime ministers had signed. Long before any other man told us that there would be peace, the stations of the National Broadcasting Company presented his tired but jubilant voice reading the terms of agreement. It was a world scoop and a world sensation.

It is gratifying that the networks which covered this emergency gave to us listeners the services of such competent gentlemen of broadcasting.

## Congratulations

All networks and all stations should be congratulated on their swift and effective coverage of the European situation. Special program after special program has been piped from almost every capital in Europe. Leading statesmen, newsmen, and diplomats have spoken for American ears.

It may be safely said that many a farmer, from Missouri to Minnesota, is better informed today about all sides of the crisis abroad and about the demands and counter-demands of the various parties thereto than many of the officials of the countries involved.

## RACKET BUSTER NO. 1

EDWARD G. ROBINSON  
STARS IN "THE POULTRY  
RACKET" TUESDAY

IT'S early dawn in a great metropolitan food market. White-coated workers swarm around the busy stalls. Bright lights glare on hundreds of boxes, on shiny piles of fruits and vegetables; here is food, food by the ton, heaped and stacked mountain high. Refrigerator trains and fast trucks have brought potatoes from Maine and Iowa, corn from Illinois, peas from Wisconsin, apples from Oregon, dairy products from the great milkshed of central New York, oranges, lemons, grapefruit from California and Florida. All night long the trucks have been coming in, rolling horns of plenty. There's a ten-ton tractor-and-trailer now, braking to a stop in front of a poultry-dealer's stand. It's loaded to the roof with chickens—plump, milk-fed White Leghorn broilers. The driver and his helper jump down, start to unfasten ropes and latches. Suddenly the driver stops, stares, a rope hanging limply in his hand.

"Hey, Joe! What's the matter with these chickens? Look at 'em!"

One look is enough for Joe. He's seen dead chickens curled up in their crates before.

"Arsenic in the grain, last time they were fed," he says bitterly. "The boys are at it again."

"The boys?" What boys? Well, as a matter of honest fact, they aren't boys at all. Hardly. Joe is talking about the racketeers, prohibition-bred, who specialize in the poultry branch of the food racket. You didn't know there was any such thing as a food racket?

Indeed there is, and it's one of the most lucrative of all of them.

In New York City alone, 60,000,000 chickens, valued at about \$100,000,000, are consumed annually. That's a lot of poultry, a lot of money—too much money to escape the attention of the racketeers whose fat bootleg-liquor incomes had been taken from them by repeal. The method? Simplicity itself: the formation of "Poultrymen's Protective Associations." Outwardly these "associations" are perfectly legal. They regulate and control prices, assess their members weekly or monthly dues, apparently work to "improve conditions in the industry." That's the surface story. The behind-the-scenes picture is a different one. It's a picture of sluggings, murders, graft; a picture of bombed food shops, poisoned poultry, hijackings and truck-wrecks. It's a picture that proves clearly that in the poultry racket, just as in every other racket, the consumers—you and I, the man in the street and his wife—are the people who pay. We pay in artificially boosted prices, in public monies diverted to grafting politicians, and in half a hundred other ways. And if the picture is a strange one to you—well, it needn't be. For on Tuesday, October 18, Edward G. Robinson and the rest of the star-studded "Big Town" cast will present a broadcast taking the top off the poultry racket, so that all America can see it for just what it is!

Typical of "Big Town" broadcasts, long noted for their painstaking au-

thenticity, will be the October 18 show. The original script for this program was written over a year ago, has since been scrutinized inside and out, rewritten, revised, "straightened out" in every possible way. For Edward G. Robinson is a stickler for detail. His programs have to be right! But the night-and-day research, the endless writing and re-writing, the midnight conferences and last-minute changes that have gone into the "Big Town" program since it first went on the air last year have borne fruit, and today the program is rightfully recognized as one of the air's best. Robinson has made of his role—that of Steve Wilson, crusading editor of the *Illustrated Press* of Big Town—a model of smashing, dynamic action. He has shown what can be done to fight the menace of racketeers, gangsters, civic corruption, and every other kind of evil to be found in a big city of today.

AND putting a "Big Town" program on the air is almost as complicated as real, honest-to-goodness racket-busting itself! For there's a heavy responsibility involved: this program concerns matters of vital importance to American men and women. Those men and women have a right to know the facts—and the facts must be accurate to the last word.

Says Edward G. Robinson: "We feel the weight of our responsibility to the millions who listen to 'Big Town.' Inasmuch as we are cracking down on sinister influences which actually exist in

large American cities, we dare not let a single script go on the air unless it has been subjected to diligent research and painstaking revisions. If one play exhibited any loopholes, the listeners would be inclined to discredit all of those that followed."

"Big Town" begins with the submission of script ideas by staff or freelance writers. If the idea is sound, if it's backed by facts that cannot be questioned, the writer will be given a go-ahead by Frederick N. Sard, script editor. Sard's background includes newspaper reporting and editing, magazine writing, years of intensive research in international relations, and study with James Huneker, famous critic. At least ten completed "Big Town" scripts are always on hand, so that a forced last-minute abandonment of a script won't cause serious trouble.

Once a script has been completed and accepted and the date set for its broadcast, Edward G. Robinson calls a conference at his home in Beverly Hills. He gathers around him the author, script-editor Sard, and Sard's assistant, Eddie Ettinger. Usually the little group works on the patio of Robinson's home. There's an ample supply of cigarettes, cigars—and coffee. Edward G. Robinson has always believed that "scripts are not written, but rewritten," and the process usually involves the consumption of several gallons of coffee. First off, Robinson himself reads the entire script, talking all the parts. Long trained in every form of dramatic expression, he is quick to spot any structural weaknesses in the radio play, just as quickly finds and discards any lines that might be difficult to speak the clumsy, tongue-twisting sort of lines that radio actors read in their nightmares. Speaking of nightmares, Robinson doesn't have 'em—but he does frequently wake up in the middle of the night with an

# STORIES OF THE SONGS YOU LOVE

## "WHEN DAY IS DONE"

IN THIS SIMPLE SONG WHICH AL JOLSON SINGS TUESDAY NIGHT OVER CBS LIES THE STIRRING LIFE-DRAMA OF ITS COMPOSER

**Y**OU wouldn't think a simple love-song could play so important a part in a man's life.

You wouldn't think one song could lead a man to fame and fortune, then shatter his life to bits, and finally, stripped of everything, give him the courage to begin his life anew.

Yet that is what happened. The song is "When Day Is Done." The man is its composer, Dr. Robert Katscher.

A refugee from his native city of Vienna, Katscher's own day, several months ago, apparently was done. Today, in a New York hotel, he works cheerfully over his songs and melodies, happy to be able to begin over again and rejoicing in his new lease on life. And that is the wonderful part of this story.

You'll hear "When Day Is Done" this Tuesday evening, over the CBS network as a feature of the Al Jolson program. Jolson himself, who has cause to pay tribute to its composer, will sing the song. Listen to him and remember this story.

Robert Katscher in 1924 was an ambitious composer burdened by a hatful of decorations awarded him by the Austrian government for valor during the World War and a doctor-of-philosophy degree conferred on him by the University of Vienna.

Each in its own way seemed to stifle his inspiration. He hated the decorations because they represented the horrors of war. As an aviator, he had had to bail out five times from burning planes. It wasn't easy to compose light music with the memory of those experiences etched on his mind.

He didn't hate the Ph. D. degree, but it was a burden because his songs reflected his learning and they turned out "heavy" and academic.

**T**HIS was pretty discouraging to a man who, as a lad in his early teens, had vowed that what he wanted to do more than anything else was to write music for the whole world to sing and play. If he couldn't do that, he declared, he might as well quit. There was a teaching-post at the university open for him. He could almost see the bulletin: "History of Music, Dr. Robert Katscher, 2 credits, M & W at 9."

Dreary prospect. Still, unless he produced something successful before the year was out, he'd have to take it.

When he made this promise, Katscher was writing a new musical show, "Kisses at Midnight." He had already written the lyrics and music for several songs, but he had to admit they were not sure-fire hits.

Then Katscher met Agnes Thomas, a slim, petite, blond-haired Hungarian girl with large, black eyes. She was visiting friends in Vienna before returning to Hungary.

The composer played hookey from rehearsals to take her places, throwing the producers into wild-eyed frenzy. Frantically these gentlemen dispatched emissaries to drag the erring composer back to the theater, and if they were lucky enough to corner him in a room, they went to work on him with pleas, threats and cajolery. Among other things, they screamed they wanted a good song number for the highspot of the show.

So they threw manuscript paper at him and they tiptoed out. Katscher then departed by the rear door.

It took him several days to discover that he was in love with Agnes. (He was calling her Tzuntzi, the pet name given her as a child.) But by then Tzuntzi's visit was at an end.

When she left, only seven days remained before the scheduled opening of "Kisses at Midnight." The last-minute work was being completed in the composer's apartment. And it was a bedlam. Arrangers, orchestrators and copyists swarmed over the place. No sooner did Katscher put in an appear-

ance than he was stormed with questions.

In desperation, he retreated to a tiny alcove room and locked himself in. He had to write a song, but he kept thinking of Tzuntzi. Gradually the two merged. Soon a tune began to run through his head. He followed it, phrase by phrase. For this sort of composing, he needed no piano.

Ten minutes later he dashed out. He had the melody he wanted! To get it down on paper was a matter of minutes. This done, he went to work on the lyric.

Of course the song was to be dedicated to Tzuntzi. But how could he write a lyric using that untranslatable and well-nigh unpronounceable name? He had it! He would call her Madonna.

So the song, which we in America know as "When Day Is Done," took the title of "Madonna."

**K**ATSCHER didn't stop there, that evening. In a fine frenzy, he dashed off another tune and touched up the others.

A marvelous transformation had taken place in him. It sounds melodramatic, even the simple way Katscher relates it. But it's true. Tzuntzi had released something in him. She had, as it were, freed him from his heavy, somber burdens.

In reviewing "Kisses at Midnight," even the long-faced bespectacled critics representing the conservative journals throughout Europe's principal cities acknowledged the charm of "Madonna," and went so far as to describe its composer as the up-and-coming white-haired boy among Vienna's music-makers.

It was sung, at court parties, to at least a half-dozen kings, and one prince of a royal family, discovering that the lady of his choice, a senorita, looked favorably upon such romantic gestures, commissioned an operatic tenor to serenade her with "Madonna" each evening for a week.

Within a year, some twenty nations had made translations of the song. The title was retained everywhere except in London, where a misguided publisher, wary of its religious association, ordered a hack song-writer to make some changes. For some mysterious reason, this fellow lugged in Panama, of all places, called the song a Spanish-American fox-trot, and gave it an I'll-meet-you-in-Panama-which-is-very-very-far flavor. As "Panama," the song was a miserable flop.

**I**N 1927, Paul Whiteman was making a triumphal tour of Europe, stampeding highbrow audiences with his particular brand of jazz. In Berlin he heard "Madonna" for the first time and went wild over it. No less enthusiastic was his first trumpeter, Henry Busse. The two made a flying visit to Katscher and arranged to ferry the song across the Atlantic.

Back in the States again, Whiteman turned "Madonna" over to Buddy DaSilva for an English lyric. Several days later this capable song-writer returned with "When Day Is Done."

With great pomp and circumstance, Whiteman finally introduced "When Day Is Done" to an American audience at Grauman's million-dollar theater in

Los Angeles. Highspot of the performance was Henry Busse's solo. It came over soft and sweet and tender, and the customers shouted for more. From that day, Busse's star rose.

In an era when the sales of sheet music and recordings were negligible, "When Day Is Done" did remarkably well. Two million copies have been sold here and another four million have been sold in Europe and Asia (we mustn't overlook China and Japan). Six million copies altogether!

**S**O THERE you have it. In an alcove room in Vienna, a young man in love had created a melody. Its appeal carried it over international boundary lines and people everywhere demanded that their musicians play it. As a result, the song sky-rocketed its composer to fame and brought music-publishers and show-producers rapping at his door with fanciful contracts.

But before he lifted a pen, Robert Katscher sent for his Tzuntzi and, to Vienna's best wishes, married her.

Then the man went to work with a vim. Like Schubert, music seemed to flow constantly through his head. In two months he wrote his second musical show, when exhibited, more than justified the critics' previous enthusiastic acclaim.

To report Katscher's stage (and screen) successes, year after year, would be dull reading. The composer himself shrugs them away lightly. The point is that "When Day Is Done" launched Robert Katscher on a career which eventually landed his name among Vienna's beloved and honored music-makers.

There is one show, however, that he likes to mention because of its familiarity to us here. That show is "Wonderbar," which Broadway first saw in 1931 with Al Jolson playing the role of Monsieur Al. If you missed the stage production, you certainly must have seen it on the screen. "Wonderbar" did a great deal for Al Jolson. Do you wonder that he has a soft spot in his heart for its composer?

**T**HE screen success of "Wonderbar," incidentally, induced Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer to bring Katscher to Hollywood. In the year he was there, his salary and royalties averaged \$1,000 a week! That is sufficient to indicate that fame didn't come to Katscher without its attendant fortune.

So we see him, the first week of March, 1938, fourteen years after he had written "When Day Is Done," sitting comfortably on top of the world.

Then Adolf Hitler stormed into Vienna. With him came rolling tanks, steel-helmeted soldiers, and Nazi officials. They moved in and took over. To Austria's music, as well as to her literature and art, they applied the Aryan microscope.

Nothing escaped its scrutiny, not even the simple love-song, "When Day Is Done." They trained their pitiless lenses on this song . . . and then let out a blast.

"'When Day Is Done' is a seditious song!" the pronouncement shrieked, in effect. "Jewish blood is in its notes. The song has been poisoning the people of this country! It is hereby banned."

**T**HE Aryan microscope searches deeply. It had discovered Jewish blood—not in Katscher's parents or in his grandparents but in his great-grandparents.

This slight trace of non-Aryan blood was sufficient to condemn the song to a public burning. Its composer was a ruined man.

For fourteen years Dr. Robert Katscher had been writing a good deal

of Austria's music. No composer in this traditionally musical-minded country was more honored. And when the time came, he could retire in the easy security provided by a lifetime of successful composing. A few drops of non-Aryan blood washed that security away!

Overnight, he found himself outside the bounds of society. Music publishers were forbidden to carry on business with him. His home and his bankbooks were tied up.

It was an ironic and terrifying situa-

tion to be in. Outside of Greater Germany, his songs were still selling and royalties were pouring in. He was making money. But he could touch none of it. It was, presumably, being held "in trust" for him. Each month the German society of composers sent him a statement, listing how much money he was making. They sent him statements. But no checks.

Living (if you could call it that) among the debris of his shattered life was unbearable. In June, Dr. and Mrs. Katscher sailed for America, leaving

behind everything that could not be stuffed into two trunks.

Was he able to take along any of his money?

"Oh yes," he tells you. "Five marks (\$1.50) for Tzuntzi and five marks for myself."

Dr. Katscher arrived in New York with something less than three dollars in his pocket. He was no longer young and the possibilities for music-writing assignments seemed dismal. He had friends, though—Whiteman, Busse, Jolson, and others who didn't care to examine the blood in "When Day Is Done." But despair gripped him and he hadn't the heart to write music.

Then something wonderful happened to Katscher.

He was reading in his hotel-room, the radio tuned in to orchestra music. Suddenly his head jerked up, his heart pounded in his chest. Why, the orchestra was playing his own song, "When Day Is Done!"

**T**HE significance of the broadcast flashed on him. Here in America they were still playing his music! Any man, any woman could walk into a music shop and buy his songs! Music publishers could print them without fear of going to jail.

"Only then, after hearing my song over the radio," Katscher explains, excitedly, "I realized I no longer was a marked man."

"What a wonderful feeling it gave me! I was a free man. I could go wherever I wished. I could have friends again. I could do business with music-publishers. I could write music again! I could be happy!"

New courage came to Katscher, courage to forget past glories and start out anew.

He spent the rest of the evening telephoning publishers and producers . . . and the following morning, before his first luncheon appointment, he was busy at the piano.

That was the beginning of Katscher's second life.

Today there is a huge billboard, a block long, over the Winter Garden theater proclaiming the wonders of Broadway's latest musical hit, "You Never Know." Because of the galaxy of well-known stars in the show, Robert Katscher's name does not stand out prominently. But his name, as music collaborator with Cole Porter, is on that billboard.

To the refugee from Vienna, it means a great deal. It means that his new life in America has started . . . and successfully, too.

**A**ND in a midtown hotel room, the composer of "When Day Is Done" walks to the windows facing the street. He is still a handsome man, though a gray fringe of hair encircles his almost bald head. It's very easy to like him, too. Just the way he offers you a cigarette or shows you a picture of Tzuntzi, now in California, makes you want to describe him as charming, amiable, warm-hearted, sentimental.

His eyes light up as he watches the steady stream of men and women. When he speaks, you can feel the sincerity in his voice.

"I am the happiest man in the world," he confides, softly. "God has been good to me. He has led my steps to the greatest country in the world."

Think of this story when you hear Al Jolson sing "When Day Is Done" this Tuesday evening. And thank your lucky stars you're living in America.

## AL JOLSON LENDS FAME A HELPING HAND



**T**HOSE radio listeners who tune in on Al Jolson when he sings Dr. Robert Katscher's composition, "When Day Is Done," will be hearing not only the composer's own love song but Jolson's tribute to the man in whose heart it was born when he was being sorely troubled by the grim aftermath of the World War. For Al has not forgotten that Dr. Katscher, the Viennese music-maker, also wrote "Wonderbar," in which he scored such a hit on both stage and screen. Too, the theme of that song strikes a responsive chord in Al's love for his actress-wife, Ruby Keeler, to whom he has been happily married for the past ten years. Like the composer's real-life love, Agnes Thomas, who inspired him to write the song which has brought him not only fame but fortune, Al's love for Ruby gave him a new lease on life, helped him to win back a failing health and climb to greater success. At fifty-two, Al is still a mixture of big boy and serious businessman. He loves sports—all of them, from wrestling to racing—and is invariably found in the front row, yelling the loudest at any contest. At parties he is always in the thick of things, singing and joking. Bubbling over with energy and good spirits, he refuses to write letters and is forever hopping in and out of telephone booths and telegraph offices.

**W**HEN professional engagements separate him from Ruby, he keeps a telephone line open by the hour. It was while Al was making a picture in Hollywood that he began sending flowers to the present Mrs. Jolson with a card attached saying, "Guess Who?" He had met her in Chicago while she was playing in "The Sidewalks of New York," but it wasn't until Ruby's company reached San Francisco that Al proposed. Born in what was then St. Petersburg, Russia, Al's real name is Asa Yoelson. He emigrated to America when a small child, and Father Yoelson became a cantor in a Washington, D. C., synagogue. Trained to be the seventh in a direct line of Yoelson cantors, popular tunes appealed to Asa more, and he forthwith planned a career of his own. He ran away from home and finally landed in an army camp, where he became mascot for a Spanish-American War regiment. Back in Washington, young Asa sang in cafes, did odd jobs, then became a "super" in a show that folded. Shoved out of a burlesque troupe because of his youth, Asa stuck around Washington until his first long-pants suit arrived; then, with his present name, he toured the country in vaudeville. Al arrived in San Francisco shortly after the fire in 1906, started entertaining in cafes, where he introduced the informal style that has since made him famous: standing on the piano, talking verses, kneeling for sad parts and putting emotion into a song. Broadway met Jolson in 1911 after an old Negro dresser suggested that he sing his songs in blackface, and the Shuberts signed him for the new Winter Garden. Always a headliner, Jolson's "Jazz Singer" made film history as the first successful talking picture. Drawn to radio, Al decided to retire from the screen after "Wonderbar" in 1934; but the movie was such a hit that he was induced to make one picture a year in addition to heading his own musical-variety radio show.

"A Drink of Water," incidentally, won the O. Henry Memorial Award when it was first published.

IF WAR COMES

The staggering bills that are now being presented to the British and French governments

as a result of the mobilizations during the last European crisis demonstrate graphically the frightful cost of war. The British alone spent approximately \$500,000,000 in one week! Included in this amount are such expenditures as the digging of trenches in London parks, the evacuation from London of crippled and sick school-children, the distribution of gas-masks and the construction of bomb-proof shelters. To mobilize the British Home Fleet alone cost \$50,000,000, and not a shot was fired! Staggering as these amounts are, they do not tell the whole story. Private industry in England will be paying for that week of mobilization for a long time, paying in time lost, employes assigned to war-protection work, and so forth. In the last analysis, it is private industry and the taxpayer who foot the bill. An explanation of just what American industry faces if war comes may be put on the air over CBS on Wednesday, October 19, when Colonel Louis Johnson, United States Assistant Secretary of War, speaks on "Industrial Mobilization" before a convention meeting of the Wire Association in Detroit, Michigan.

**T**HE story of "The Goldbergs" is the story of the great "melting-pot" that is America, with all of the early scenes laid in New York City. Immigrants from Russia, Molly and Jake Goldberg first settled on the East Side in the famous Ghetto in order to be near others who spoke their language—friends who had preceded them to America. Molly was eighteen when she came. Her father, a learned man in his native Russia, found it difficult to support the family from his meager earnings as an unskilled worker in a clothing factory, so Molly went to work in a garment factory, too. Eager to become an American, to learn the language of her adopted country, Molly worked days and went to school at night. An understanding soul, young Molly made many friends as she became assimilated into American

life and its customs. Open-minded, with a wisdom far beyond her years, she was always a favorite in her group, for each knew they could come to her with their problems and troubles, and that she would give sympathy as well as showing them a way out of their difficulties. Even after her father was doing well in a financial way and moved his family uptown to the Harlem section of the city, Molly continued to work until she was married to Jake. Her beautiful philosophy, developed in girlhood, has helped her through the years as she and Jake climbed from modest success to near-affluence, and later through the depression, which put them back to a point below where they had started life together. **M**OLLY GOLDBERG (Gertrude Berg), now in her forties, met her husband Jake when she first went to work in the garment factory and he was an ambitious young cloak-and-suitier trying to get ahead. They belonged to the same social group, and both were imbued with a tremendous love for their adopted country, America, where each had found happiness. Molly was twenty-four when Jake decided he was doing well enough to support a wife and asked for her hand in marriage. They were married when Molly was twenty-five. Molly takes this failure with the same cheerful philosophy, and doesn't complain when the family is obliged to move to a New England farm. Her big problem right now is Joyce, a girl she befriended, who has attracted Sammy

When she finds an especially good one either in character or problem, she puts the cart before the horse and writes the show to fit it. When the script is finished, Mrs. Berg tries it out on her family and the servants in her home as a test, watches their reactions. If it doesn't suit them, she rewrites it. Other characters that have appeared with the Goldbergs are: Mrs. Bloom, who shared honors with Molly as a good neighbor, even though she was never heard on the program; Mickey Bloom (Howard Merrill), her son, about Sammy's age, who's smitten with Rosie; Mrs. Melenka (Bertha Waldon), one of "the girls" and a member of Molly's "Mamatalks Club," who's a well-meaning busybody; Mr. Schneider (Arthur Auerbach), a ne'er-do-well; Martha Wilberforce (Carrie Weller), hard-bitten "down East" woman, Molly's neighbor in Lastonbury; Mrs. Kelvin (Selena Royal), Joyce's real mother; Mr. Kelvin (William Thornton), her real father. The question of Joyce's marriage to Sammy (apparently settled between the pair themselves) is still a vital issue and a cause of worry to Molly and Jake. This problem is principal story-thread of the show at the present time. Art Millett is announcer.

MUSIC HALL'S new season starts with productions of opera, "Traviata" leading off and "Die Walkure" ending the lyrical procession. Full casts, chorus and orchestra function under the musical supervision and conductorship of the ever resourceful Rapee.

In the one hour available, the presentation includes principal solo and ensemble numbers, and omitting lesser moments, but a narrator sustains plot continuity with short explanations.

As informed RADIO GUIDE readers know, the libretto of "La Traviata" bases on Dumas' play, famous under the title of "Camille." The romantic tale concerns the limitless devotion of a Parisian youth to a courtesan who becomes ennobled through love.

Rapee has issued a statement to the effect that this opera series comes to the air because radio has been making dialers more familiar with symphonic music than with the stage masterpieces of Italian, French and German composers.

Brancato's roulades and trills have triumphed at the Chicago Opera; suave Robert Weede is with the Metropolitan; and Peerce's smooth tenoring is a year-round attraction at Music Hall.

## Toscanini's Return?

AT THIS writing Toscanini is aboard the French liner *Normandie* enroute to America and his NBC orchestra, thus refuting the wide flare of publicity concerning his supposed detention and incarceration by Mussolini. The news had us all fearing for his safety, and just what really did happen is not yet known. In any case, the maestro is on his way to American admirers and that is the all-important thing. We are all prepped for his exciting concerts, and as we number millions, Il Duce, now an accredited man of peace, no doubt considered well before courting our belligerent displeasure, proving once again that art always triumphs over politics.

Toscanini, given to talking right out, ran afoul of the Fascists several times before by refusing to play their party anthem; signing a manifesto assailing Mussolini's side-kick, Hitler; giving up the conductorship of the Wagner series at Bayreuth; and resigning as chief of Salzburg Festival when it was *anschlussed* by the Germans.


Whatever our individual ideologies, we can all credit Toscanini with deep sincerity and warm humanitarianism, as well as unselfish courage for defending the freedom of art and artists, irrespective of nationality, creed, or political conditions.

## Two Steps Forward

One seven-league advance was made by radio when it founded its own fine symphony orchestra. Why could not the next large step be an equally important opera company exclusively for the air? Radio surely is ready for such an epochal innovation, as it has the facilities, the audience, and the money, too! ## Add Rochester

Eastman School and Rochester Civic Orchestra programs are here again with promise of programs as edifying as those presented in former years by the well-known institutions of Rochester, N. Y. The Eastman School opens its broadcasting season on Thursday, October 20. The Rochester Civic Orchestra, under the leadership of Guy Fraser Harrison, will be heard as usual on Monday afternoons, and in educational programs on Tuesdays.

Deems Taylor is what the French call an "arrived" composer, one who has reached recognition and success. "Through the Looking Glass" has been described previously in these pages, even though the composer wrote of it: "The piece needs no extended analysis. It derives from Lewis Carroll's immortal nonsense fairy-tale, 'Through the Looking Glass and What Alice Found There.' The musical suggestions should be readily recognizable to lovers of the book." Written about twenty years ago, the composition has found its way to leading symphonic programs all over the world.

WHEN an American tenor sings Wagner, that is infrequent news, the more so in the case of one best known as an exponent of purely lyrical opera roles. Remembering Crooks' delicate and poetical vocalism in the "Dream" from Massenet's "Manon," hearers will follow expectantly his delivery of so dramatic an excerpt as the noble "Narrative," in which Lohengrin discloses his identity and exalted mission.

Little did Schubert think that his "Serenade" would enchant for all time when he penciled those inspired measures on the back of a menu in a noisy Vienna cafe. It has warmed as many hearts as the immortal first movement of his "Unfinished" Symphony.

Liszt's "Hungarian Fantasie," featuring folk-tunes, appears in unfamiliar aspects this evening, for its original form was that of a piano piece with orchestral accompaniment. The Liszt themes are used also in his "Rhapsody" No. 14 for piano solo.

**B**EETHOVEN'S overture and incidental music (1810) to Goethe's historical play about the ill-fated Count of Egmont (Flemish nobleman who fought with William of Orange for the liberty of the Netherlands) testifies to the composer's admiration for the illustrious German poet and dramatist.

The two geniuses first met at a Bohemian spa, but did not hit it off, because Goethe, the polished courtier, servile to royalty, resented the radical democracy of Beethoven and his curt speech and bad manners.

Goethe, however, recognized his great contemporary's talent more readily than that of Schubert, to whom he never even deigned an acknowledgement when the struggling young master set the poet's "Erlking" as a song, and sent it to Goethe with an affectingly humble letter asking him to accept the dedication.

Beethoven's overture is at first a mighty lamentation (the voices of an aroused and angry people) changing to final tumultuous rejoicing.

The overture form enjoyed a far advance in Beethoven's treatment. Previously it had been mostly a curtain-raiser for opera, but he made it into an independent composition, highly expressive, with eloquent characterization in the orchestra. To appreciate the Beethoven reforms, one has only to compare his "Egmont" with an overture by Mozart or Weber.



**W**HILE military band concerts do not ordinarily come within the scope of this department, the foregoing one merits attention because Captain D'Arcy, Jr., evidently intends to free himself from the usual type of program followed by the brass and woodwind aggregations.

Seldom done by bands, the Karl Goldmark symphony excerpt and Svendsen's "Romance" were originally composed for full orchestra and violin solo with orchestral accompaniment. Raymond Scott's "Toy Trumpet" is a sprightly bit of musical fooling by a youthful American who is as ingenious in his popular music as in his titles, two examples being "Dinner Music for a Pack of Hungry Cannibals" and "Dance of the Wooden Indians." In "Toy Trumpet" the purposely sour note, repeated several times, furnishes a truly humorous touch.

It was John Philip Sousa who first put a U. S. government band firmly on the musical map, with his universally beloved marches and their novel instrumentation. Fittingly, it has been proposed recently to erect a \$750,000 memorial in his honor, preferably a home for aged and infirm musicians. The public should respond generously with subscriptions.

## San Francisco Civic Opera Does "Cavalleria Rusticana"

**W**ITH its music retaining freshness and fire and its story unfaded in drama and passion, Pietro Mascagni's opera "Cavalleria Rusticana" (Rustic Chivalry) still is matter to charm the ear and stimulate the emotions. Two years short of fifty, the little operatic thriller holds a vital place in the repertoire and seems destined for brilliant permanence.

Except at the Metropolitan, "Cavalleria" has not been given in its entirety on the air, and therefore it is of interest to dialers who do not know the opera well to learn that it will be performed without cuts by the San Francisco Civic Opera on Monday, NBC at 11:05 p.m. EST, 10:05 p.m. CST, 9:05 p.m. MST, 8:05 p.m. PST.

Called a one-act work, it really has two, separated by the celebrated "Intermezzo," which the orchestra plays while the curtain remains up on an empty stage. For years the "Intermezzo" was one of the best-loved of compositions (even attaining the dignity of inclusion at most symphony concerts all over the world), and it grew to be an audience tradition to demand an immediate encore, always granted.

Mascagni, now seventy years old, was twenty-seven when he composed "Cavalleria," and although he has

written many other operas since, none achieved its fame or profits. And how he needed both, just before his masterpiece gained premiere performance in 1890! He was a struggling conductor of small opera companies when he heard of a competition held by the Milan publisher, Sonzogno. In hot haste, Mascagni brought "Cavalleria" to paper and sent it to the judges. First prize followed and placed the young composer among the lyrical immortals, for the premiere resulted in a world-wide sensation.

The tale about the Sicilian peasant (Alfio) who avenges his wife's (Lola) faithlessness by duelling her philandering lover (Turiddu) to death (he had also betrayed and deserted the maid Santuzza) will be sung and acted by Ebe Stignani (Santuzza), Doris Doe (Lola), Alessandro Ziliani (Turiddu), Carlo Tagliabue (Alfio), and Thelma Votipka (Lucia, mother of Turiddu). Conducting is Gaetano Merola, who functions too as the artistic director of the San Francisco Opera, housed in its own new, beautiful home built by municipal funds and public subscriptions.

Generally paired with "Pagliacci" in a double bill, that work and "Cavalleria Rusticana" have been facetiously referred to as "ham and eggs of opera."

## Symphony Concerts Resume At Radio City Music Hall

**D**URING the summer months, chamber music and vocalism have been regaling us in the Sunday matinee broadcasts of Radio City Music Hall of the Air, but starting on Sunday the regular symphonic courses will resume under the baton direction of Erno Rapee. However, they offer a new time schedule, with the concerts now set half an hour earlier, from 12 to 1 p.m. EST (NBC), 11 a.m. CST, 10 a.m. MST, 9 a.m. PST.

Oldest and longest sustained of its kind, the Rapee series has for over five years brought master music to its broadcasts from Coast to Coast, Canada, and by short wave to South America. The programs offered not only great orchestral works but also prominent soloists and operatic presentations. Special features conceived by Rapee were the Sibelius cycle last season, with the seven symphonies by

the Finnish composer (a marathonic undertaking never attempted previously in radio), and single concerts devoted entirely to the music of present-day Russia, Richard Strauss, Ravel and the modern Hungarian composer, Kodaly. Also, during the more than three hundred broadcasts by Rapee, he has introduced for the first time on the air many works by leading creators of the moment.

Small of stature but dynamic in energy is slim, black-haired Erno Rapee, whose chief musical characteristics are versatility of style and interpretation, temperamental verve and rhythmic precision. His high qualities have won him guest appearances with General Motors, the Hollywood Bowl and other eminent symphony orchestras. Now in his late forties, Erno Rapee was born in Budapest, started his musical career as a pianist.



Because of picture work, Martha Raye will be the only one of the regular cast that will remain in California . . . "Information, Please" will have a sponsor starting sometime in November, which prompts this department to suggest they come down a few notches in the type of questions used. It's much too highbrow for the masses . . . Graham McNamee got the job of announcing the "Vox Pop" show on the recommendation of his friend, Wally Butterworth . . . Robert Ripley threw a party for his friends after his last broadcast on October 4 and announced that he will start on a trip touching Atlantic Coast ports of South America, rounding Cape Horn, and then across the Pacific, via the Galapagos Islands . . . Songstress Shirley Howard, last heard over NBC, is now heard twice-weekly over Mutual.

**ALL ABOUT SINGERS:** Jerry Cooper is commuting to Cincinnati by air each week for his twice-weekly "Vocal Varieties" program. He leaves New York on Monday and returns on Friday for week-ends . . . Jack Fulton flew in from Chicago for one day and visited a number of band agencies in regard to his plans for organizing an orchestra . . . Tenor Felix Knight is making a movie short with Nat Shilkret and his orchestra. Knight's singing on the recordings of the George Gershwin tunes just released by Victor is really something to rave about . . . Del Casino is another to be dropped from the CBS schedules.

Fred Allen and Portland Hoffa spent a full working-day with NBC photographers last week taking pictures in about twenty different costumes. Fred sets aside one day a year for this job and you couldn't drag him down for more than that . . . Mary Margaret McBride threw a party celebrating her first anniversary on CBS, but could stay only long enough for the photographers to take pictures. She had to run off for another local program while her guests partook of the feast . . . Another new baby was named Edward MacHugh, after the popular "Gospel Singer." It's the second in two months and Mr. Mac sent a present to each baby . . . Myrt and Marge have finished playing theaters for a while and are trying to catch up on sleep. They averaged five hours of shut-eye a night during their theater work because of rehearsals and broadcasts, and they both were beginning to feel the strain.

Not so long ago Jimmy Dorsey and his orchestra played at the Hotel New Yorker. Last Tuesday, brother Tommy and his crew moved into the same spot. Tommy, by the way, just completed an engagement at the Paramount Theater in New York. He had to rehearse for his radio programs after his last theater show, which meant from midnight until four a.m. His announcer is "Bud" Collyer, one of the better radio actor-announcers, who also plays the male lead in "Pretty Kitty Kelly," which, if you know your radio schedules, hits the air at 10 a.m. for listeners in the East and Midwest. So neighbor Collyer had to be content with three hours' sleep one night last week.

Dropped in at the Kate Smith rehearsal for a few minutes, and just as I walked into the studio Kate was asking the orchestra boys to stop playing. They continued on for a few seconds and Kate repeated the request the second time but in a louder tone, adding: "Are we going to start the season off that way? When I say stop, it means stop—please!"

At the program that evening a good part of the male audience was dressed in white-tie-and-tails, with their lovely ladies dressed in flowing evening gowns. While the orchestra played, Kate went to town, amusing the audience for a few seconds by "truckin' on down." In case you didn't know, dancing was part of her original musical-comedy routine and she does it well. Guestar Cornelia Otis Skinner did a grand dramatic job, but it was quite obvious she had a slight case of mike fright, although it was hardly noticeable in her voice. Big Boy Costello, who, with Abbott, supplies the comedy, came on the stage wearing a Boy Scout uni-

form, which brought many chuckles from the audience. Couldn't help notice that Ted Straeter's choir has quite a few good-looking gals in it (I'm only fooling, dear). I might even say they're viddy charming. After the broadcast, a cake baked from the sponsor's flour is awarded to a lucky ticket-holder.

This idea of giving away samples of the sponsor's product is also done at "We, the People" broadcast and in the same manner as Kate Smith's program. Harry von Zell directs the selecting of the winning ticket from a glass bowl. On the first drawing, a seat in the balcony was called out and Harry was ready to award the prize, when someone rushed up to the stage and whispered in Harry's ear. Then Von Zell disclosed that the number called was held by one of their own gang and he was declared ineligible. Slim and Slam, writers of "Flat Foot Floogie," who appeared on the first show, had part of the audience join in with a rhythmic handclap, but it was not extemporaneous, as you may have believed. One of the directors of the program invited those so inclined to join in, but not many responded.

Behind the "seen" at the first Burns and Allen broadcast of their new series: Before the program goes on the air, announcer Paul Douglas rehearses the audience on how to applaud, stating that the theater seats only nine hundred and they must sound like 15,000. George Burns sits in the control-room listening to the hand-clapping and Paul asks him how it sounded. He replied, "I can't hear the lady in the last row."

They do it over again and this time everything is satisfactory. Three microphones are used—two for B & A, who face each other, and the third for either Douglas, Noble or Frank Parker. So when Parker entered the scene during the broadcast and Burns said, "Hello, Frank," Parker (who seems to have lost a few hairs since I last saw him) was looking at George's back. Ray Noble apparently wasn't told his new boss was a ciggie-maker. Someone handed him a cigar before the broadcast and he walked out on the stage with the stogie stuck in his mouth. After B & A finished their last line they ran off the stage, and from where your reporter sat he could see them go into a clinch and kiss each other—behind the scene.

## AIRIALTO LOWDOWN

The trek is occasioned by Jolson's engagement at the Casa Manana there, and Gluskin will make the most of it by appearing at the Paramount Theater. Another New York packer is writer-actor-comedian Robert Benchley, who'll begin his broadcasts from the same eastern studios November 20. As a tramp printer, he lifts the mortgage from the widowed, small-town newspaper publisher Fay Bainter's head; inspires boy John Beal to win girl Jean Parker; speaks many homely philosophies and further clinches his position as the best person eligible to fill somewhat the void left by Will Rogers . . . Universal's "That Certain Age" boasts two radio names—Deanna Durbin (who knocks another home-run) and Irene Rich who returns to pictures after five years.

CHICAGO.—Didn't get a chance to see Irene Rich while she was in town, so I called her at the Blackstone, where she was staying. She sounded very nice over the phone. Miss Rich came to Chicago to make some midwestern personal appearances for her sponsor and was accompanied by her daughter, Frances. I called Miss Rich in the morning. She had to fly to Detroit for an appearance that very afternoon. Miss Rich is rightfully very proud of her daughter. Though Frances is also interested in dramatics, her first love is sculpture. I was really surprised to learn that a sculptured bit of work the younger Miss Rich made for the Army and Navy nurses will be dedicated in Arlington National Cemetery in November. I asked Miss Rich if she would make another picture following "That Certain Age," which stars Deanna Durbin. Miss Rich said that she would shortly start work on a new film. However, Deanna Durbin will not be in the next one, as a film company other than Universal, to whom Deanna is under contract, will produce Miss Rich's next picture.

#### Courtroom Broadcasts

Do radio broadcasts direct from a traffic courtroom help prevent accidents? That is the problem Chicago jurists are wrangling over at the present time. Judge Stephen Adamowski, who presides over a courtroom from which traffic violation cases are broadcast over WJJD, believes that the broadcasts are a deterrent to traffic violators. On the other hand, Judge Edward E. Casey of the Municipal Court contends that the broadcasts are unfair and that there is more of a tendency to convict before a microphone than otherwise. Judge Casey also believes that larger fines are imposed in cases that are broadcast in order to impress the listeners. What is your opinion? Do broadcasts from a courtroom aid or obstruct justice. It will be interesting to find the reaction of RADIO GUIDE readers to this problem.

#### Watching the Gooks

One of the most popular of the dramatic skits on the air today is "Vic and Sade." Let's take a look at the Gook family as they rehearse one of their programs. Tall, lanky, Art Van Harvey, who takes the part of Vic, sits on one side of a little table. Across from him sits comely Bernardine Flynn, who dons a pair of glasses when she gets ready to read her script. Wandering around the studio and pecking at a note or two on the piano is Billy Idelson, eighteen-year-old Chicago youngster, who has played the part of Rush for the past six years. They all read their lines easily and naturally, as if they were in the parlor of the Gook home and not talking in front of a microphone. In fact, so much a part of the character has Van Harvey become that studio associates call him "Vic" instead of by his real name. Miss Flynn, too, says she doesn't know where Sade Gook leaves off and Bernardine Flynn begins. The trio is showing no favorites between the two major networks these days. At 10:15 they broadcast from the Merchandise Mart over NBC. Then they all ride over to the Wrigley Building in Billy's new car. At 11:45 they start rehearsing at Columbia's studio number one and at 12:15 they go on the air over CBS for their second broadcast of the day. It's one of those rare instances where a sponsor has the same show on two different networks. In real life, Bernardine is married to a Chicago physician while Van Harvey is married to a childhood sweetheart. Billy is now eighteen years old and has just entered college at the Chicago campus of Northwestern University.

#### Seen Around Town

Francis X. Bushman, ex-star of movie thrillers and now a Chicago radio actor, seen walking down Michigan Avenue with a legal-looking briefcase tucked under his arm. No, Bushman doesn't have any legal aspirations. He says it's easier to carry his scripts in a briefcase. . . . When Zasu Pitts was in town to appear on the Fibber McGee program, Chicago was holding a tag day. As Miss Pitts alighted from her car in front of the Merchandise Mart a woman rushed up to her to sell a tag. The woman looked at Miss Pitts a moment and then said: "Oh, I know you—you're Louise Fazenda." The movie comedienne took the whole incident good-naturedly.

#### Actors to Dance

Chicago radio actors and actresses will be dressed in their finest on November 11 when they hold a dance at some Chicago hotel as yet undetermined. Purpose of the dance is to raise funds so that the Chicago actors can send a contingent to St. Louis, the scene of the forthcoming national meeting of the American Federation of Radio Artists. (That is the organization to which most radio actors in this country belong.) Altogether, thirty-two Chicago radio artists—sixteen delegates and sixteen alternates—will attend the St. Louis conclave. During the course of the same meeting in Chicago at which it was decided to hold the dance, nominations were also made for new officers for the coming year. It seems the actors in "The Story of Mary Marlin" are the ones with the most executive ability. Retiring president of the Chicago chapter of AFRA is Carleton Brickert, who is David Post in "The Story of Mary Marlin." Slated to be his successor and who has been the vice-president is Anne Seymour, star of the same sketch.

Last year instead of a dance a masquerade was held. I attended last year's affair, which was held at the Medinah Club. Winning the prizes for the best costumes were Barbara Luddy, feminine lead of the "First Nighter," and Bret Morrison, who, in addition to taking the part of "the genial First Nighter," also acts on the same show. Bret and Barbara were dressed as Romeo and Juliet. Other prizes were given for meritorious acting, but off-hand I can think of only one winner. He was Hugh Studebaker, who takes the part of Dr. Graham in "Bachelor's Children," a very popular script-show which is unfortunately not heard in the West. Hugh, who received a radio trophy similar to the movies' little "Oscars," awarded for the best film acting, is also heard as Silly Watson on the Fibber McGee show.



## SPECIALIST IN ADVENTURE

### MAX JORDAN, WHO KNOWS THE WORLD THE WAY THE REST OF US KNOW MAIN STREET

THE world itself, and all of it, from Shanghai to London, from Mexico City to Moscow, has been the life-long stamping-ground for Max Jordan, today the National Broadcasting Company's No. 1 European newscaster and a man much in the news, much on the air during the recent Czechoslovak crisis.

Linguist, journalist, commentator, and split-second expert in the fiendishly difficult business of arranging round-the-world broadcasts by unwilling people in inaccessible places, Max Jordan lives a life as romance-packed as that of any E. Phillips Oppenheim hero.

A cosmopolite from birth—he was born in Italy of Austro-German-French ancestry—Max Jordan grew up in Italy, Germany and Switzerland, with occasional trips to France and other countries, and while still a high-school student he could speak fluent Italian, French and German. He was educated at the Universities of Frankfurt, Jena and Berlin, took a Ph. D. in philosophy at Jena with the idea of devoting his life to religious philosophy. He studied the ancient theologies of the Orient, learned

Arabic, Hebrew and Persian at the same time. But in 1920—he was 25 then—he decided against a professional career and went to work for a newspaper syndicate in Berlin, specializing in international affairs. Two years later he joined the Hearst foreign service and became assistant to Karl H. von Wiegand, then as now one of the greatest foreign correspondents who ever filed a cable. Jordan's early experience and contact with Wiegand, incidentally, has borne much fruit since those post-war days. During the Czechoslovak crisis Jordan brought Karl von Wiegand's brilliant interpretations of passing events to American listeners while other foreign broadcasters were groping in the dark.

JORDAN'S radio history, as a matter of fact, is scoop-studded. For instance, when Hitler, Chamberlain, Daladier and Mussolini signed the now famous Munich agreement, Max Jordan had the full text on the air to America three-quarters of an hour

before his nearest competitor, two hours and sixteen minutes before the next-earliest broadcaster!


Typical of Jordan's methods was a classic broadcast he brought out of Ethiopia during the Italo-Ethiopian war. He succeeded in taking equipment into war-torn Abyssinia a tremendous feat even under the most favorable conditions, and put on the air Emperor Haile Selassie, his wife, and Count Galeazzo Ciano, Mussolini's aide and son-in-law! He'd been told a dozen times it couldn't be done. First of all, skeptics informed him, he wouldn't be able to get his equipment

into the barbaric country, and even if he did, he wouldn't be able to service it. But Max Jordan remembered reading, somewhere, sometime, about a Swedish radio engineer who lived in Ethiopia. He got a list of all the radio companies in Sweden, queried them about the matter, soon found his man. After that there was nothing to it—all he had to do was coordinate the available time of his network in America with the schedule of the Negus and Count Ciano, bring those two bitter enemies to agreement—and go on the air!

Journalists who are fond of arguing that radio can never seriously compete with newspapers in the business of handling eye-witness accounts on big stories should look into Max Jordan's record. He once broadcast a complete running story on a Paris riot—and when the Parisians riot, it is no pink tea—from the floor of a taxicab, under a barrage of stones, paving-bricks, bottles and every other kind of handy missile, broadcast it quietly, efficiently, objectively. And with only one eye open, incidentally. The other had been tightly closed by the blow of a stone that had crashed through the window.

Wherever there's danger there's news. It's legendary among European radiocasters that when most people are fleeing for their lives from some such little catastrophe as a volcanic eruption, there'll be a slight, bald, big-domed man battling his way in the other direction, a microphone wire running out behind him—Max Jordan.

# RECORDS OF THE WEEK

A new department reviewing the recordings of your radio favorites

THE main event of the week doubtless is the Gershwin Memorial Album, made by Nat Shilkret, the Victor Salon Group, Jane Froman, Felix Knight, and Sonny Schuyler. The packet contains five twelve-inch records, two given over to a medley from Porgy and Bess, one a special vocal-orchestral arrangement of the famous middle strain from Rhapsody in Blue, one a super-production on The Man I Love, and the rest numerous medleys of Gershwin's most famous songs.

George Gershwin wrote great tunes, great melodies, and for a general cross-section of them, this album is valuable. Jane Froman is a good choice for the songs she sings—some of the orchestral arrangements fall down, and the scat-singing in "It Ain't Necessarily So" is really laughable. The fastidious record-buyer will no doubt prefer the Tibbett-Jepson album of Porgy and Bess music over this, should prefer the regular Rhapsody in Blue, and would prefer a solid swing band on the pop tunes over the Victor Salon Group. But for the easy-going guy who wants it all in a package, here is the works. (Victor Album C-29. \$7.50.)

Victor unleashes three top-notch singers in its latest release—Flagstad, Castagna and Thomas. Any record by Kirsten Flagstad is an event and a sure-fire addition to the collection. This time she turns for a second time to Beethoven—not his strongest in vocal composition yet strong enough to give the magnificent Flagstad something to sing about. The aria is from Beethoven's only opera, "Fidelio," "Thou Monstrous Fiend" the title. The Philadelphia Orchestra under Ormandy accompanies. (Victor 14972. \$2.)

Bruna Castagna turns to the candy for all contraltos, "Carmen," and does toothsome with the card song, but not quite strongly enough with the famous Seguidilla. These are arias most familiar yet always welcome. Wilfred Pelletier and orchestra back her up. (Victor 1936. \$1.50.)

Personality and understanding and a great voice all make the John Charles Thomas record a notable one. Both songs he sings are from his concert repertoire, both in French—one dramatic, one with a touch of humor. They are "Au Pays" by Holmes, and

"Requiem du Coeur" by Pessard. Well worth a whirl. (Victor 15184. \$2.)

## Popular:

Larry Clinton's latest three aren't too terrific, alas. Zig-Zag and Dodgin' the Dean are routine swing patterns. Shadrach parallels too closely the Louis Armstrong record without topping it; Summer Souvenirs is pretty slender; Heart and Soul is a pleasant Hoagy Carmichael tune, and Old Folks is a tear-jerky saga of a lovable old guy that will be gone soon. (Victor.)

Slim and Slam are the Harlem screwballs that created Flat Foot Floogie. They tried to repeat on Tutti Frutti, and both Jan Savitt (Bluebird) and Gene Krupa (Brunswick) made acceptable records of it. The boys themselves did both tunes on Vocalion, and now have a couple more in the same vein—Jump Session and Vol Vist du Gaily Star. Both exhibit a display of swing originality. (Vocalion.)

Tommy Dorsey is not the first by far to put out a record called "Boogie Woogie," but the Dorsey band does well in this rolling Kansas City style of swing, which features the pianoforte at its best. Albeit studied, the boys essay the Pine Top Smith version of the style. With another trumpet battery, the band backs it with an old swinger, Weary Blues, jam-session fashion. (Victor.)

Leith Stevens and his very sharp studio band from CBS, New York, go the limit on putting the swing blasphemy on old sacred stuff with theirs on Love's Old Sweet Song. Tsk, tsk! Shudder, shudder! (Vocalion.)

Penny Wise, plaintive femme singer, does right well with two very likable tunes from the Paramount picture foundry. Silver on the Sage and Laugh and Call It Love are the tags. (Vocalion.)

Will Hudson, swing arranger who recently parted with co-bandleader Eddie DeLange, is now reported to be disbanding his present band. His latest, and presumably his last, is pattern-formula stuff—Break It Up on one side and Break It Down on the other. (Brunswick.)

idea, and forthwith calls a writer for a conference that will last until dawn!

When Robinson is satisfied with the script—he usually makes numerous changes—a final revision is made. This goes to a Hollywood law firm titled, by an ironical quirk of fate, "Gang & Kopp." The attorneys go over it carefully to see to it that anything in the story that has to do with legal procedure is correct, and to watch for libel. Typical of the precautions that are taken is this: Every name used on the "Big Town" program is that of a living person who has given written permission to use of it. Thus, no listener can say, "That show had a gangster in it with my name. I'll sue 'em!"

REHEARSALS begin the Saturday previous to the broadcast in the main studio of Hollywood's brand-new Columbia Broadcasting System Building. Special music, written and conducted by Fran Frey, is rehearsed in the morning, and the players go to

work at noon, when Robinson arrives. When Robinson or co-star Claire Trevor are engaged in film production the first rehearsal is held on Sunday. Work is the order of the day during these rehearsals. A recent session began at 10 a.m. on Saturday and lasted until 2 a.m. on Sunday! Final rehearsal begins at 10 a.m. Tuesday, continues straight through until broadcast time at 5 p.m. PST.

That's the way "Big Town" is put together. When the "Poultry Racket" script goes on the air this Tuesday, and you meet Steve Wilson, Lorelei, Luigi and Tony Torelli, "Red," and "Muggsy" and the rest—you'll know you're listening to the real thing; you'll know you're finding out something new about this America of ours. 

### Remote Control

Last spring I attended a startling exhibition at a radio manufacturer's sales convention held at Chicago's famed Edgewater Beach Hotel. I saw an ordinary radio set, and standing about 50 feet away was a girl holding a little box about the size of a small, midget radio. This little contraption had a dial-like gadget on its face similar to those seen on dial telephones. Instead of numbers, the dials had names of stations. A certain Chicago station was on—the girl flicked the dial and a new station replaced the other one. And she could both increase and decrease volume or shut the radio off completely even though she was nowhere near the radio. This is called "remote control." No wires are used. It is simply a case of "synchronizing" the gadget with the radio set. You can be in another room 100 feet away and

still operate this remarkable new invention. This remote-control apparatus was also on display at Marshall Field's exhibit. Should "remote control" become universal, long commercials may be a thing of the past. For any listener, weary of a long commercial, can get a new station even though not near the radio simply by a twist of the remote-control "dial." Edgar Guest's "It Can Be Done" show got a nice break at the radio show. A radio manufacturer exhibited a color film and a portion of the movie was devoted to a broadcast of the "It Can Be Done" show. Edgar Guest, Frankie Masters, Producer Harry Klein and numerous Chicago radio stars who are part of the "It Can Be Done" show—all appear on the film.

on his way to put something on the air. Jordan actually did broadcast an authentic eruption of Mount Vesuvius on one occasion. One of his five microphones was snatched away by white-hot molten lava a moment after he'd placed it, and only asbestos wrappings saved the others from destruction.

Another spectacular Jordan coup was a Christmas broadcast aired three years ago. A full hour in length, it took listeners, via short wave, from Bethlehem to Egypt to Rome to Oslo to London to Paris to St. Augustine, Florida, and concluded at Washington.

TODAY, as Continental European representative of the National Broadcasting Company, Jordan watches the radio affairs of thirty nations from his London office. In constant communication with NBC officials in New York through a leased cable, he is ready, on ten minutes' notice or less, to leave for a broadcast from a London suburb or from Moscow, half-way round the world. And news-coverage, although the most spectacular part of his duties, is by no means all he does. He engages talent for NBC, places NBC transcription programs with European stations, handles programs coming from America as well as those going in the other direction. Because of his extensive European contacts and experience, he is well fitted to pick for Continental consumption those programs that will be of highest interest. It was Max Jordan who arranged for the rebroadcast of President Roosevelt's inaugural address from Washington to twelve different European countries.

A tough job? Not for Max Jordan, although it would be so difficult as to be impossible for even a well-trained

newspaper correspondent. Because hard work, ingenuity, persistence—these things aren't enough. To cover the hodgepodge of conflicting nationalities and ideologies that is Europe today, a broadcaster needs the background that comes only with a lifetime of study and experience, and the friends in high places that only competence and fair treatment can win.


