



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
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Radio has made it possible for metropolis and out-of-the-way hamlet to share alike when great music is broadcast. This year, more than ever before, listeners everywhere await fine recitals, operas and concerts that are theirs just by the twist of a dial. To enhance every listener's enjoyment of fine music, the editors of RADIO GUIDE are presenting this series of biographies of Musical Giants, of which this is the fifth.—Editor.

"He was the poet of mists and fountains, clouds and rains; of dusk and glints of moonlight through the leaves; he was moonstruck and seastruck and a lost soul under a sky besprent with stars."

IN THE foregoing lines, from the most recent of the biographers of Claude Achille Debussy, you have the terse epitome of his distinguishing artistic qualities. Reams of writing could not better summarize that composer's strange personality and unusual music.

During his lifetime a more or less elusive figure, he revealed little of inner feelings to even the few of his most frequent male companions. Not one of them was a really close friend. The women in Debussy's life never quite fathomed his soul or felt that they completely possessed his heart.

As a youth, shy and reticent, he rarely spoke of his family (humble tradespeople); in later years when already a well-known composer, he shunned interviewers and advertisement; in full maturity he withdrew himself more than ever; during his final years he refused to believe in his own greatness, and his letters bore, under the signature, the touchingly modest phrase, "*Musicien Français*"—French musician!

Born in the Paris suburb, St. Germain en Laye, in 1862, Debussy never strayed far or long from his beloved French capital. Musically precocious, he was admitted to the Paris Conservatoire at the age of eleven, took many medals, and in his twenty-second year won the coveted Prix de Rome which entitled him to three years of study and pensioned residence in the Eternal City. A "Roman against my will," as he put it, Debussy pined for his home town and his complete freedom. After two years, he returned there and voluntarily gave up the remaining twelve months of his fellowship. Then followed a period of privation, with the giving of piano lessons, arranging, and

encouragement only from a few broad-minded persons who sensed that his radical art theories and the exotic sounds he occasionally contrived on the keyboard held in them something of revolutionary importance for the future.

A diligent nocturnal frequenter of cafes where the practitioners of art congregated, Debussy hotly aired his views that music is not made for realistic expression but forms a medium

for the evoking of poetical suggestion, subtle sensation and fanciful imagery—"the sound of the sea, the curve of the horizon, the wind in the leaves, cry of a bird. When I gaze at a sunset sky and spend hours contemplating its marvelous and everchanging beauty, an extraordinary emotion overwhelms me. Nature in all its vastness is truthfully reflected in my sincere and feeble soul, and expresses itself in my music." Even his short songs and piano pieces

are such tone pictures, especially the familiar and fascinating "*Clair de Lune*."

With the poets, authors, painters and musicians at the cafes, Debussy argued nightly until dawn about impressionism, symbolism, romanticism, pre-Raphaelism and kindred movements in art. He thrilled at first under the spell of Wagner, only to repudiate him later as a realist. "I shall achieve a kind of music which has no superfluous 'filling in' with professional rhetoric that is the badge only of excellent training."

When he subsequently served as a professional critic, Debussy expressed many pithy opinions about the music of other composers. He alternately scolded and admired Liszt for his "undeniable beauty and vulgarity." Beethoven's sonatas "are badly written for piano." Mendelssohn is "a facile and elegant notary." Bach is a master "who often indulges in gymnastic feats." Grieg's music is "a pink bonbon stuffed with snow." Adored by Debussy were Chopin, Mozart, Moussorgsky. Of poets, he preferred Baudelaire, Rosetti, Verlaine, Mallarme. Of painters, de Chavannes, Pissaro, Renoir, Manet, Monet, Van Gogh and our American Whistler.

MALLARME was the poet who inspired Debussy's first strikingly successful work, "*The Afternoon of a Faun*" (1894). The palpitating, sensuous verses fired the composer's fancy and he created a score that has become one of the best-beloved in all music, a score of suggestive charm, glowing color and fligree instrumental tracing. In his next orchestral essay, the "*Nocturnes*" ("*Clouds*," "*Festivals*" and "*Sirens*"), Debussy expresses his sensitive understanding of nature. Masterfully he depicts in tone the sky, the drifting, dissolving clouds; the restlessness and rhythms of a festive throng; the sea, silvery moonbeams and the seductive laughter and song of passing sirens. In 1905 followed publication of the monumental cyclical tone-poem, "*The Sea*," drawn on a vast canvas and voicing the oceanic immensity, faint horizons, glints of light on the waters, daybreak, coquetry of winds and waves, and their calm and fury.


In 1902 came Debussy's only opera, "*Pelleas and Melisande*" (libretto based on the play by Maeterlinck), whose Parisian premiere brought initial failure only to be succeeded by universal admiration. Now conceded

DEBUSSY MYSTIC DREAMER

noblemen. Soldiers prodded the people with pikes, and swaggered along the streets, their armor clanging. It was an era of doubt and hate. Petty tyrants stalked the land and dictators screamed for vengeance against people they knew not and who had done them no hurt. Persecution and prosecution and ignorance walked arm in arm, as they always do. Books were burned while thousands cheered, and knowledge was a sin against Caesar.

And man was rendering all to Caesar and nothing to God.

Francesco mused, "God, indeed, has hidden his face from us."

But his conscience said, "Oh, no! You have hidden your face from God."

"All this will pass away," Francesco told himself, and his conscience replied, "But one thing will never pass away."

And it came to pass that Giovanni Francesco Bernardone, the gay blade of Assisi, took a vow. "I'll do it," he said. He lifted from his table a glass of wine from the Hills of Gold and pledged his life, to my mistress: Lady Poverty. He crashed the glass against the table and walked from his palace, and closed the door and turned his back upon his possessions and cast aside his pride.

TO HIS comrades, the rakes of Assisi, he went and said, "I am going to take unto myself a wife of unsurpassed beauty."

They slapped his back, made ribald comments and demanded her name.

"She is Lady Poverty," he said, and he would follow her to the ends of the world, and back. He was twenty-eight, and that was in 1209, when Francis of Assisi organized the Franciscan fraternity and charted a course for young Europeans, who put aside their ambitions and followed a movement that brought a revolution within Christendom, a revelation to men and a revival of learning and love.

Francis, who became St. Francis two years after his death, founded the order whence sprang the Black Friars, Brown Friars, Gray Friars, Barefoot Friars—

THERE comes a time in the experience of every radio enthusiast when he spins his dial aimlessly, hoping that in the clash and clatter and clang of cymbals and sounding brass he will strike a lode of gold, a program that shouts not its wares in the market-place but stands on its own merits, far above its fellows. Such a program was the local broadcast in California, *Help Thy Neighbor*, produced by a gentleman named Hal Styles, which aimed at getting jobs for the jobless. RADIO GUIDE gave you the story of this program some weeks ago, and now stations all over the nation have adopted the plan of bringing to their mikes men and women who seek work.

Another such program is the *Ave Maria Hour*. It is no network show and there is no fanfare of publicity or expenditure behind it, but nevertheless it is doing a distinguished job and bringing pleasure and happiness to millions. The story behind this hour lifts it to the realm of broadcasting's program aristocracy. It is a tale of two towns—

GIOVANNI FRANCESCO BERNARDONE sat alone in the florid but friendless banquet hall of his arched and dreary palace at Assisi, searching his conscience for solace and finding

none, and weighing his soul upon the delicate scales of eternity and judgment. And he found it wanting.

He stared moodily at the food before him—choice viands of Europe, spices from the mystic isles, wines from the Hills of Gold. Seamen had died bringing to him the spices of the East, and merchants bartered for more lives to trade for more spices, and more spices to trade for more gold, and more gold to build greater palaces upon the

misery of mankind—palaces that time would call ugly hunks of marble and monuments to a dark age when the flesh-pots stunk. Children had died treading out the grapes from the Hills of Gold that he, a rich man, might drink until his belly groaned. Francesco, the gay young rake of Assisi, thought of that—and more.

Walking to a window, he looked out upon the city. Beggars were pleading for alms, clutching at the robes of

orders so stern that in their beginning even the stern Roman Catholic Church shook its head and doubted that mortal man could tolerate the privations Francis imposed upon his brothers, the Friars, or *fraters*. For the Franciscans took pledges of absolute poverty, living from day to day on alms. They couldn't have a single possession except their habits, and lived in them. They took pledges of chastity and obedience, and Francis proved that man does not live

just by bread alone.

Francis bearded even the Syrians in their bazaars and the Sultan of Egypt in his palace, and the Sultan said of him, "This is a good man." Francis commissioned his *fraters* to make use of everything God had created to carry his message to the world. He told the Friars to use the sun, the stars, the air, the sea—even animals and worms. Everything, he said, was of God's making and everything should be used for God's glory.

HE COMPOSED the beautiful "Canticle of the Sun," "And praised be Thou, my Lord, for Brother Sun," and "Praised be my Lord, for Brother Wind and Air." Historians have treated him kindly, have said "the beggar of Assisi was the father of Italian art."

After his death, the world was a better place because he had lived. His order was divided into three groups: Friar Minors, Capuchins and Conventuals of the First Order of the Franciscan Family; Nuns of the Second Order, and Tertiaries—lay persons living in the outer world or in monasteries—laymen and women who heeded Francis' teachings and took the promise, but not the vow, of poverty, chastity and obedience.

Duns Scotus and Roger Bacon were Tertiary Friars. And there came a day when Christopher Columbus, the mad man of Genoa, went to Queen Isabella's court and pleaded for aid. He was scorned by the court, but the queen heard and heeded, for they were Tertiaries and each had promised to use everything for the glory of God—the wind, the sun, the sea.

Columbus' first name, incidentally, means "Christ bearer," and Christopher is the patron saint of travelers. Tuck that fact away, for we will meet Christopher again in the tale of another town. It's a far cry from the molding monuments of Assisi to the fresh, good land of Graymoor, N. Y. For Assisi has almost passed away, as St. Francis knew it would, even as Nineveh and Tyre. At Assisi, the ancient Umbrian Asisium frowns down from a hill on the poor little city of 21,000 people, and Assisi is known not for its noblemen and rakes and soldiers but for the tomb of St. Francis.

At Graymoor, the shrines to St.


Anthony and St. Christopher and the monastery look down from the brow of a mountain at the Hudson rolling by, and away at the great, sprawling city of New York. But there is peace in Graymoor. The dust of St. Francis may be in Assisi, but his spirit is in America.

And on Sundays from 6:30 to 7 p.m., and on Wednesdays from 3:30 to 4 p.m. when "Brother Air" brings the *Ave Maria Hour* over 146 radio stations in 45 states, you know the Brown Friars of Graymoor are heeding the commission of St. Francis and using Brother Sun and Brother Air to the glory of God. The bells of Graymoor are heard around the world, calling the heavily laden to meditation, and spreading a message of hope on a crack-pot age when dictators mouth and mumble and tyrants stalk the land, and when persecution and hate walk arm and arm, and men know not where to turn; when soldiers swagger down the streets like the tin soldiers they are.

The Friars of Graymoor say, "but all this will pass away—one thing will not pass," and each day they thank God for radio, for radio had helped make their work possible, and each year more than a quarter of a million persons write them. And they know that the one thing that will never pass away is the message of St. Francis that all men are brothers and that all things belong to God.

THE Graymoor as we see it today is a product of a new age and radio. It is a miracle within itself and its present director is an Irishman, a Brooklyn Irishman who can laugh at his own jokes, who has pledged troth to his mistress, Lady Poverty. He is gentle, youthful Father Patrick McCarthy, jolly as old Friar Tuck, another *frater*, and named for the apostle of Ireland, St. Patrick, who, incidentally, wasn't an Irishman at all but probably a Welshman, although no man knows exactly whence he came. Pirates took him first to Ireland, and a passion for souls sent him back to the heathen Irish and

THE WORLD'S A STAGE

Life is drama, and drama, conversely, is life—if not always life as it is or has been, then life as we should or should not live it, as we do or do not desire it, or as we imagine it might be. Whether you like your life and your drama sober or humorous, you can surely find a generous helping in the radio bill of fare.

Sunday: Considered by many the greatest of all tragedies, and certainly one of the most pathetic stories ever told, is "Shakespeare's Othello." It is the story of Othello, the Moor, who loved "not wisely, but too well"; of Desdemona, pitiable martyr of faithful love; of Iago, villainous conniver of Judas-like dimensions, of pathos and passion, the loyalty of love and the tragedy of jealousy. It will be enacted on the NBC "Great Plays" program.

Sunday: "Oh, Ginger!" doesn't always mean you mashed your finger. It's what the male members of the audience sigh when Ginger Rogers flickers her long lashes or glides gracefully about on the screen. Despite the lack of television, the popular comedienne and dancer will undoubtedly elicit sighs and applause when she appears on the "Silver Theater" program, whether she sings and dances or only acts. She's a triple-threat to emotional equanimity.

Sunday: Here's one of those "life as it should be lived" dramas on the Mercury Theater program. Orson Welles and the cast will present a play based on the life of one of history's greatest characters, St. Paul of Tarsus, and centering chiefly about the acts of the Apostles. Here is inspiration in the midst of crass realism, relief from sometimes sordid reality. The development of the tent-maker, Saul of Tarsus, into St. Paul, one of the most-revered characters in Christendom, makes a story absorbing and deep as life itself.

Sunday: The radio pendulum has an eccentric swing. Now we have Henry "Hank" Fonda "strutting and fretting" on the Chase & Sanborn variety show, and the quotation phrase is not inapt. The last time "Hank" did a turn on the air he was "strutting" his stuff as a sharp-shooting hillbilly for the benefit of Bing Crosby and the rest of us, and he was "fretting" quite strenuously with a corny cornet. Anything may be expected when he meets "s. and f." expert McCarthy.

Tuesday: Now comes a piece of "life as it

should not be," with the "smart guys" entering the picture. They're the guys who make a business of going out of business. Of course, who is better able to smash the bankruptcy racket than Edward G. Robinson, assisted by Claire Trevor? Material supplied by the National Association of Credit Men helps Robinson chase the "smart guys" from "Big Town." The play, "What Have We to Be Thankful For?" scheduled for "Big Town" last week, due to circumstances beyond the control of the producers and ourselves, was canceled for that date after our press deadline.

Wednesday: The "Star Theater," with a regular cast already overflowing with artists, both musical and dramatic, presents as a headliner this week one of the outstanding contemporary actors, Leslie Howard. Here is a veritable constellation of stars, with John Barrymore, Ned Sparks, Una Merkel, Charlie Ruggles, Kenny Baker, and Jane Froman sharing the spotlight with the eminent guest, and over the dramatic portion the guiding genius of Max Reinhardt.

Friday: "The last shall be first" is the formula being applied by the producers and performers of "Hollywood Hotel," for as the noteworthy program offers its last presentation, before being succeeded by Orson Welles and the Mercury Theater, it is assured that the vehicle and the performance will be one of the best offerings on the air, and one to be greatly appreciated.

TWENTY YEARS AFTER

—Sunday, CBS

Another country carved twenty years ago from the fluid map of Central Europe celebrates the anniversary of those two decades of history this week. In a position not so precarious, from some standpoints as that of its sister state, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia can mark its twentieth anniversary with slightly more gaiety and thankfulness. There probably will be no defiance or even carefree merriment, for in Europe all nations keep their fingers crossed. Perhaps twenty years of freedom is something really to be proud of, and the people of Yugoslavia are probably happy in the assurance of the future. The commemorating program will present talks in Belgrade by U. S. Minister Arthur Bliss Lane, and a representative of the Yugoslav government, introduced by William Shirer, CBS Central European

agent. This is a "Europe Calling" program.

THE RADIO PLAYBILL: THIS WEEK—"HER HONOR, NANCY JAMES"

AS HER HONOR, Nancy James, Barbara Weeks portrays the role of a woman judge in the newly formed Special Court of Common Problems in Metropolis City. Although she is still in her twenties, Nancy has been trained to fight for what she believes to be right, especially if it means helping the needy and underprivileged classes. A feminine Darrow, she weathers some long, hard battles to better slum conditions. Formerly a leader in settlement activities in Metropolis City, she has guided the work of the South Side's House of Refuge. The support Nancy gave to the reform ticket during a hot political campaign has led to her appointment as judge of the Special Court. Mayor Wharton has tremendous faith in her ability to succeed, but the promotion breeds new enemies for Her Honor, Nancy

MAYOR RICHARD WHARTON (it's Joseph Curtin's role) heads the reform movement in Metropolis City. His Honor, the Mayor, has been in love with Nancy James ever since they were law students together in college; but when it came to marriage, he chose the daughter of a wealthy, socially prominent family whose political connections and background have played a vital part in his present political success. To further his clean-up program for the city, he has appointed Nancy James to the task of wiping out crime and racketeering in the teeming slums of the South Side. Nancy's appointment to the Special Court of Common Problems has been an entirely sincere and aboveboard gesture, but Mayor Richard's fashionable wife takes the catty-female viewpoint and looks upon Judge Nancy with suspicion



TONY HALE (Ned Wever) is a dashing young lawyer whose own father was defeated and ruined by political racketeers, and Tony is out to avenge him. His chance meeting with Nancy James, when she is on her way to rescue Stan Adamic, who's being held captive by thugs, proves fortunate, for he offers to help her

A NEWCOMER to radio, "Her Honor, Nancy James," depicts the dramatic events in the restoration of a big city which has been overrun by corrupt politicians who have intimidated law-abiding citizens and undermined legitimate business with their rackets. Elected on a reform ticket, Mayor Richard Wharton starts a clean-up, aided by Judge Nancy James and Tony Hale. One of Judge Nancy's first cases in the Court of Common Problems gives her an insight into the workings of the tenement-house racket going on in the South Side. It shows plainly the graft tie-up between officials in the department of buildings and the Cranston mob. She determines to do her share in saving Metropolis City from moral and financial bankruptcy. Tony Hale, an enterprising young lawyer, is with her. Mrs. Evelyn Wharton, the mayor's wife, has no interest in the betterment of the masses and thwarts Nancy's work in the Settlement Center at every turn. CARRIE DEAN, played by Alice Reinheart, is Nancy James' staunchest official and unofficial supporter. Carrie's an ace reporter on the Metropolis Daily Star, the paper that has backed the Mayor's clean-up campaign, and aids Nancy and the reform movement by digging up information damaging to the corrupt opposition party. Only Carrie knows how much Nancy loves Richard Wharton. When Her Honor gets discouraged in the ceaseless political battle for right, Reporter Dean provides new inspiration

THE part of Madge Keller is played by Janice Gilbert. Flower of the slums, Madge has struggled up from poverty and squalor, and is trying hard to make something of her life. She lives on the South Side of Metropolis City and has come in contact with Judge James through the Settlement Center. Nancy listens to Madge's story, counsels her wisely, as she does dozens of other young people in the section who come to her every day with their pitiful problems. By guiding these youngsters, Nancy hopes for their betterment

A FIRM believer in the good that Nancy James is attempting to do, Stan Adamic is a racketeer turned reformer. The fact that his kid brother Joe is being influenced by outlaws and is becoming a petty criminal makes Stan do a right-about-face. Judge Nancy wins him completely when she sends Joe to school instead of to the reformatory. He gives her inside information on the workings of the Cranston mob, of which he used to be a member. Stan is kidnaped by the gang and brutally beaten. Chester Stratton plays Stan



GEORGE NOVACK (Maurice Franklin) is the kindly caretaker of the Settlement Center whose wise counsel and philosophy have been a great aid to Nancy. When George falls victim to gangster violence, Nancy decides to dedicate her life to war on crime

EELLEN CLARK, Nancy's secretary, is played by Joan Banks. Ellen worships her boss, and is interested in Stan Adamic's future

BASIL LOUGHRANE, director of the show, is heard at the close of each program. His voice is the nameless one of the wise man

BEST known to radio listeners on the CBS Philharmonic Hour, Frank Gallup is announcer for the show. After trying his hand at the stock-brokerage game, Gallup won a competitive audition in Boston, in 1934, and came to the Columbia Broadcasting System a year later

Money and Music

WHENEVER the gods Mammón and Apollo traffic together, art purists raise horrified eyebrows and hands, forgetting that almost from its beginnings the history of music is filled with examples of such moneyed communion.

The purists have even made a large part of the public think of musical creators and performers as super-personages, motivated only by the highest ideals, always gazing skyward and stubbing their toes on the realities of earthy life. As a matter of fact, it was money that originally aided musical art to greater development and larger audiences. Powerful princes of the church commissioned the eminent composers and potentates, and wealthy noblemen founded the first concerts, orchestras and opera troupes. Palestrina, Bach, Gluck, Purcell, Rameau, Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven, Weber and Wagner—to name only some—were dependent upon such practical assistance, and without it might never have felt encouraged to keep up the struggle of an artistic career. As for performers, they sought the patronage of the mighty and rich even more humbly and assiduously than the composers.

These reflections continually come to mind when discussions are aired about the relative artistic value of sustaining and commercially supported programs in radio, and the issue is again paramount now that the newspapers announce the possible sponsoring of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra concerts and the performances at the Metropolitan Opera House. Our purists still feel that commercial hands should be kept off music in spite of all adduced evidence that it has never maintained itself without the leverage of the moneybags. All great orchestras are endowed, subventioned or financed by guarantors. All great performers function publicly because there is such a thing as a box-office. Unfortunately, in the U. S. A., there is no official state subsidy of the arts such as exists in Europe, where every town of any importance has its government-subsidized opera house and theater.

Sustaining programs in radio are a necessity to fill out unbought time, but most of them strive through excellence to attract the attention of possible paying sponsors. Intrinsicly the artistic standard of a broadcast can remain the same, whether sustained or sponsored. The proof as far as symphonic concerts

are concerned may be derived by paralleling the superb performances of the Philadelphia Orchestra when they played for the sponsoring banks last year, with the elevated achievements of the Toscanini orchestra now operating as a sustaining feature for NBC. The fact remains, however, that the sustaining programs have been the paramount factor in elevating the public taste and preparing it for the ever-increasing quality of the more elaborate sponsored programs.

The one thing we music-lovers expect radio to do is provide the masterpieces performed in the best possible manner. Whether or not the jingle of coin is a silent factor interests us little or not at all. Always the laborer—even a tonal one—is worthy of his hire.

Three New Books

A flood of musical books has hit the market in the last few weeks, of which the best are "Such Sweet Compulsion," by Geraldine Farrar, the Paderewski Memoirs, written in conjunction with Mary Lawton, and "The Authentic Librettor of the Wagner Operas."

Of the three books, the first is the most glamorous, bringing back a period when prima donnas were front-page news. Long before the advent of Garbo, Loy and Crawford, mothers were naming their long-suffering offspring Geraldine, and there was a hysterical group of young women who called themselves the Gerry-flappers. That was when people discussed whether Geraldine really loved Lou Tellegen, instead of who's going to play Scarlett. Now for the first time, Miss Farrar tells all, but with the greatest dignity and sincerity. Of the many prima donna biographies that have appeared recently, "Such Sweet Compulsion" is unquestionably the most charming.

Paderewski waited years to tell his story until he could tell it to the right person. He found her in Mary Lawton, who has taken down his narrative practically verbatim, and has kept all the flavor of his quaint English and the gentleness and simplicity of his personality. The book ends just before the World War period and is to be continued in a future volume.

The Wagner librettos include those of all the Wagner operas except "Rienzi." Both German and English texts are included. The ideal book for the perfect Wagnerite, ideally priced at \$1.75.



NOW fifty-two years old, Igor Stravinsky, Parisianized Russian composer, seems to have run dry in the flow of inspiration. He still writes music, but the past fifteen years or so have brought from his pen nothing that compares with his earlier works.

"Apollon Musagete," a score written as background for a classical ballet, whose libretto concerns Apollo and the Muses, shows Stravinsky in one of his later experimental phases, when he was rigorously avoiding euphony and rich color in his orchestration, as being "too romantic" and even degenerative.

"Jeux des Cartes," a more recent Stravinsky ballet, is based on the game of poker. In this music Stravinsky has at least some moments of real melody and a sort of cynical gaiety.

It is necessary for radio hearers to know these two compositions in order to understand Stravinsky's present trend and methods. Stravinsky, "a talent who was once a genius!"

DO WE NEED A LARGER ARMY AND NAVY?

EVERY man and woman in America who can by hook or crook get near a radio set on Sunday night, November 27, owes it to himself and to his country to tune in Columbia's "The People's Platform."

For on that date—Sunday, November 27—the most vitally significant question that has faced the American people since the World War will be put on the air. The question is this: "Does the United States need a bigger Army and Navy?" The participants in the informal discussion will be an Army officer, a Naval officer, two laymen. The "People's Platform" discussion will be led, as usual, by Lyman Bryson.

Just why is this question to be mulled over Sunday night the most important facing the country today? Because on the answer given to that question may hang the welfare, the safety, the very existence of these United States five years from now—or three!

Let's look at our brave new world today, twenty years after the war to end war. For twenty years the world has enjoyed "peace." But there is no peace, there has been no peace. There have been at least twenty wars fought since 1919, official and unofficial, declared and undeclared.

But none of these bloody horrors have touched us, have they? The United States, with friendly nations north and south, a couple of thou-

sands of miles of blue water east and west, hasn't been involved. So we have felt quite safe. Here, as in England, the pacifist movement gained great momentum in the rollicking, blooming twenties, when everybody had a fistful of money and the millennium was just around the corner.

Led by idealistic statesmen, men like Kellogg, Briand, Stimson, we stopped building guns and battleships, junked the old ones, tore up the blue-prints for the new ones. Permanent peace, at last, we declared.

It is more than possible that future historians—if there are any historians

in the future—will write something like this: "It was in the decade and a half from 1920 to 1935 that the Democracies sowed the seed that later resulted in their total destruction by the Dictatorships." For while England and France and America were happily glowing over the vision of permanent peace, something was happening to the other three world powers: In Germany, in Italy, in Japan, bitter, hard-headed, revengeful men were plotting, planning, living, sleeping and dreaming—War! The democracies know that now. They didn't know it then. The democracies have only just awakened. It is too early yet to tell whether or not they woke in time.

FOR there is going to be "another" war, a war on a scale that will compare with the World War about as that conflict compared with the Civil War. For wars progress, you know, and grow. If you live five years, you'll see that war, whether you like it or not, experts promise. Why is it so certain, so inevitable? On the surface, the reason is that three of the seven great powers believe in taking what they want by force. Eventually, the other powers will have to stop them, or try to. Under the surface, the reason is that the peoples of the world are, and for nearly a century have been, choosing up sides for a fight to the finish over the world's wealth. Wars have nearly always been be-

tween the "haves" and the "have-nots." That is more than ever the case today. All modern wars are fought for money, and for nothing else. Spain, China, today are examples. The Spanish civil war is a war between people who work on the land and the people who own it.

We almost had war this fall. It was averted only by the surrender of England and France to the imperious demands of Germany and Italy. Military experts generally agree that if war had begun in October, Germany would have been promptly and badly beaten. But if war were to begin today—they are not so sure. They are not so sure of the war tomorrow, either. They are only sure that it will come. It must come.

Now then. When war does come—two years is as good a guess as any—what kind of a war will it be? Have the fanciful romancers of the H. G. Wells school painted the proper picture? Will the next World War see mass bombing of great cities by invulnerable airplanes, or by remote-controlled rockets? Will deadly bacteria be used to wipe out tens of thousands of non-combatants? Are there new and horrible gasses waiting to be loosed on the defenseless? What about "death-rays"?

THE answer to all of these grisly fantasies is a simple "no." Any plane flying low enough to bomb a city accurately can be knocked down, and rocket-flight is still in its infancy, although the Germans have succeeded in establishing a twenty-mile mail service by rocket. Bacteria can't be used for a very simple reason: germs don't recognize flags. And the best authorities on poison gas say that there's nothing worse in the laboratories of the war-making nations than lewisite, discovered by an American just before the end of the last war. Nothing "better" than lewisite is needed. Properly called chlorvinylidichlorarsine, its effects are as horrible as its name. It's a gas-maker's dream: it burns the skin wherever it touches, like mustard gas. It wrecks the lungs, like chlorine. And it sets up a guaranteed-fatal systemic poison, like phosgene and chloropicrin. As for "death-rays," the most powerful one openly tested can barely kill a mouse at three feet.

No, the changes in "civilized" warfare booked to appear in the next conflict are not those changes. They are infinitely more horrible, because they have to do with a brutalization not of the instruments of war so much as of the man behind the instruments!

THERE'S a new idea in warfare today. It's not a game any more. Wars aren't fought on open battlefields by professional soldiers. The idea today is total destruction—destruction of the armed forces, including the wounded, destruction of civilian centers and noncombatants, women and children included, and finally, destruction of the government, the art and culture, religion and ideals of the conquered peoples. The Red Cross used to be a guarantee of safety. The Ethiopians, the Spanish and the Chinese found that it's wiser not to use it even to mark hospital roofs: it makes too good a bomb target. Vittorio Mussolini reported that he found the bombing of defenseless Ethiopians "exceptionally good fun." Documentary evidence, backed by actual photographs, proves that the Japanese use bound and helpless Chinese men in bayonet practice. War today is wholesale slaughter raised to the highest point of efficiency. If General Sherman were alive today, that doughty warrior would have to call it something else. The old term isn't strong enough.

Even so, all that is a long way from the United States. But is it? When the World War started, it took the better part of a week to get across the Atlantic Ocean, and you couldn't do it any faster. Today it takes twelve hours. Tomorrow it will take five. The Atlantic and the Pacific Oceans are all right, and we should be thankful for them. But they're a lot narrower than they used to be!

YOU can argue, if you like, that the American people would never get into another European war. They might not have to "get into it." It might get into them! Today the United States is constantly being derided and threatened by Germany and Italy. The Germans and the Italians are openly taught to hate America—and to envy its wealth and resources. Between us and two of the most warlike nations on the globe stand what? First, France, possessing what is admittedly the best army in Europe, but a nation weakened by dissension, so cynically corrupt that the Germans are today able to use 50,000,000 francs a month to "buy" French newspapermen. Second, there is England. The English people hate dictatorships, believe thoroughly in democracy. Yet England is turning more and more toward fascism under the direction of its present government. If England went fascist under German pressure, we could expect no help from her. We might not be able to expect help anyway. Spain expected help from England. But England would only form the farcical and ridiculous Nonintervention Committee. Prime Minister Neville Cham-

berlain should, in decency, have aided Spain; he should, in law, have been neutral. Yet he once said to a friend, "But don't you see, Franco *must* win. If he doesn't, we shall have labor governments everywhere!"

If America is ever attacked by a foreign power, she need expect no help from England. She need expect help from no one. She must rely on her own strength. And that strength is today far below par. In the Czechoslovak crisis, Germany mobilized 1,250,000 men in four days. The U. S. Army today could mobilize only 300,000 men. The German air force has about 6,000 planes. We have 1,500. The German Army is thoroughly mechanized, but in this country the substitution of motor- for horse-power is proceeding very slowly. German anti-aircraft guns are the world's best. We have practically none, good or otherwise. There is a dangerous shortage of anti-tank guns, light and medium-heavy artillery. Although we have in the new Garand semi-automatic rifle the finest hand-arm in existence, only some 8,000 of them have been manufactured.


THE United States was similarly unprepared at the outbreak of the World War, yet, by turning America into one vast arsenal, we were able, in a year, to hold up our own end—after a fashion. Remember that the American Army, throughout the war, used British tanks, French artillery, and British and French planes. But when war strikes again, we will have no year of grace in which to get ready. The new warfare isn't planned that way.

"Blitzkrieg," the Germans call it—"lightning war."

We have two consolations. Our Navy is superior to Germany's in every division, and the American, although he hates military training and finds strict discipline obnoxious, is just about the best fighting-man in the world. The Japanese is a better marcher, can live and fight on one-fifth the food, and places little value on his life; the German is better-disciplined and more systematic—but the American has one priceless advantage: he thinks for himself. The dictator nations base their military training on one idea—discipline. Every detail of the soldier's life, from the angle of his cap to his use of the bayonet, is regulated. Foreign correspondents tell of Japanese officers in the field under fire looking up tactical maneuvers in textbooks! The World War showed that the German infantryman's efficiency declined severely when his officers were killed, and fighters in Spain report that the Italians, now as always, must be in large groups to be effective. But better fighting qualities are of no avail in the face of superior numbers and equipment.

Is America ready for the war that will certainly threaten her within two years? The answer to that question is your responsibility, and mine. Upon the answer we make, the fate of the nation is hinged. We had better think about it!

NEW YORK.—Several months ago this department mentioned the fact that CBS was requested by the advertising agency handling the Sunday night coffee hour to please refrain from using the name of Charlie McCarthy on their network, so the dummy's name has not been mentioned over CBS since. Eddie Cantor was unaware of this ruling, and on his broadcast of November 14 one page of dialog with guestar Leslie Howard had to be taken out. Many listeners will undoubtedly regret to learn the "March of Time" leaves the air after the broadcast of December 2 . . . CBS word-spieler John Lang moves to Hollywood around the first of the year with an RKO picture contract in his pocket . . . H. V. Kaltenborn has been signed by Pathe News as asso-

ciate editor, news commentator and consultant on foreign affairs . . . The Steele Sisters, formerly heard on "Musical Steelmakers" over the Mutual net on Sundays, have been signed by Horace Heidt. The harmonious trio, still in their early teens, do a swell job of putting over a song, according to those who have heard them.

Bess Flynn, author of Painted Dreams and portrayer of "Mother Moynihan" on the air, wrote a special skit satirizing script-shows. She appeared in it as Mother Moynihan, with Ma Perkins (Virginia Payne). A hit at the ball were three cavorting Chicago radio actors dressed as the brothers Marx. Al Halus, who in real life is an exact double for Groucho, needed very little make-up for the part. In fact, if Groucho ever needs a double, Halus is his man. Paul Luther, ex-announcer now turned actor, was Harpo, while Frank Behrens, Jim Ameche's successor as All-American Boy Jack Armstrong, rounded out the Marx trio.

Radio Couples

You're no doubt interested in who came to the ball with whom. Well, your Tattler won't let you down. Dolores Gillen (Baby Davey in "Mary Marlin") was escorted by Bill Thompson. Anne Seymour ("Mary Marlin") was chaperoned by her uncle, John Seymour, who is appearing in Chicago in the legitimate production of "Of Mice and Men." Les Tremayne, Chicago's most eligible bachelor and star of "First Nighter" (I'm sorry to disappoint you)—Les was there with his mother and younger sister. And did teen-age Miss Tremayne have a grand time getting autographs of all the stars present. Of course there were plenty of married radio couples there. Fran Carlon, star of Kitty Keene, dashed about with her husband, radio-actor Dan Sutter. It was Dan who in ten days sold \$1,000 worth of space to advertisers for the ball's printed program. Remember Mary Steele, whose lovely voice was often heard on NBC before she retired some years back? She and her good-looking mustached husband, announcer Bob Brown, made a very handsome pair. Other married couples seen by your Tattler were Jeanne Juvelier and her husband (he's in the transcription end of the business), Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Studebaker, and Joan Winters (of "Girl Alone") and her husband, Frank Bering, Hotel Sherman executive. Incidentally, Joan Winters' pet horse, Peter Pan, proved quite a hit at the show. He fell to the slippery dance floor, but soon righted himself and went on the stage to perform some very clever tricks.

Not Present

Being naturally curious, your Tattler even inquired into who was not there. Betty Winkler, "Girl Alone" star, was needed in Cleveland and Detroit, so was unable to attend. Unexpected out-of-town guests prevented Alex (Nothing But the Truth) McQueen from coming. For weeks Cliff Soubier had planned to attend the ball, and his frau had been giving him dancing-lessons. Night before the ball, Cliff stepped on his wife's ankle so hard that she was walking with a cane that day, and—P. S., the Soubiers weren't there.

After the ball was over (music fades out) a small party motored to Ricardo's, an Italian restaurant

with Bohemianish atmosphere, to complete the gala night. Host at the gathering was Ted Maxwell, ex-Chicago writer now stationed in San Francisco, who came east to attend the Windy City affair. He's a buddy of Cecil Underwood, Fibber McGee producer, and the two cronies were as happy as kids at their reunion. Everybody burst into song (music fades in), and you could have knocked your Tattler over with the proverbial feather when Harold Peary sang a solo in professional style. After all, he's a character actor, but it developed he also has a trained singing-voice. Mrs. Peary then looked across the table at her actor-singer husband and favored the merrymakers with "My Man." She, too, was a singer, but marriage and a youngster keep her too busy for a career now. Scriptural Troubles

(Other two are "The Woman in White" and "Road of Life.") Miss Phillips must certainly be the cause of plenty of stacked-up dishes and late dinners for husbands in this country. But back to "Guiding Light." The episode we witnessed had poor old Mr. Abe Kransky in bed with a very bad cold and a sinister cough. Murray Forbes sat coughing at a table some ten feet from the mike, to obtain this effect. Mr. Kransky was all wrought up because his daughter, Rose, is living as the wife of a Christian, Ellis Smith, played by Ray Johnson. Rose is ill and her husband comes a-calling on the in-laws. He knows that Rose would like to see her parents. Mrs. Kransky (Mignon Schreiber) is inclined to forgive her daughter, but the old man raspily proclaims that as far as he's concerned, Rose is dead. The episode ends with Mr. Kransky tottering back to bed and Mr. Smith solicitously advising Mrs. Kransky to get a doctor for her husband. Next week, "East Lynne." I'm sorry, I mean "Backstage Wife." I've treated all this in a light vein, but seriously, there's some very fine acting in the show. You've all heard Murray Forbes and Mignon Schreiber on the air. They were paired in "The Hoofinghams" as well as in "The Foxes of Flatbush." Ray Johnson is one of Chicago's finest actors. He has appeared twice in Vallee sketches, once in "Steel" and later with Paul Lukas in "Test Flight." They all do a splendid job in "The Guiding Light."

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DEBUSSY, MYSTIC DREAMER

to be a masterwork, it is also the most original stage composition since the time of Wagner. Maeterlinck's drama so completely suited Debussy's mystical turn of mind and command of shadowy and shifting moods that he never again found a story to inspire him similarly, and so he remained a one-opera composer. Mary Garden created the role of Melisande and later sang it often in America. She saw much of Debussy and he admired her as an artist, but no romance existed.

Aside from transient attachments in his cafe years, the four women who played the chief amatory roles in Debussy's life were Mme. Vasnier (a matron who became infatuated with the composer when he was a beardless youth of hardly nineteen); another mistress, Gabrielle Dupont, known to his friends for ten years or so as "The Girl with Green Eyes"; and the two women whom he successively married, Rosalie Texier and the divorced Mme. Bardac. To the former he dedicated his "Nocturnes"; with the latter he had a daughter nicknamed Chou-Chou, for whom "The Children's Corner" was composed.

The cafe companions who enjoyed Debussy's harangues and mordant wit, and those who knew him toward the end of his life, saw a medium-sized, thickly built man with a faunlike black beard, curly hair falling over one eye, swarthy complexion, delicate nose. His shoulders were wide, his legs short. He had keen, black, heavy-lidded eyes. Slow of movement, he suggested something catlike in his walk and gestures. (Indeed, he had a

passion for cats, even to owning figures of them done in porcelain.) His distinguishing articles of dress were cape-coats and large, broad-rimmed hats of the ten-gallon type. His favorite cafe was Chez Weber, which still exists on the Rue Royale.

Just after the start of the World War, Debussy's fatal illness (cancer) began his physical decline. Emaciated, his face like wax, he described himself as "a walking corpse." The ravages of war agonized him mentally. He had become impoverished. He still worked, but finally the pen fell from his hand. Four days before the notorious Big Bertha dropped its killing shell on the church of Saint Gervais, in 1918, Debussy breathed his last. He is buried at the cemetery in Passy, a quarter of Paris near the Trocadero. On the gravestone of this mystic dreamer, this inspired poet of nature, is the simple inscription:

"Claude Debussy, musicien francais."

he preached to them the philosophy that all men are fraters.

The story of Graymoor and its Friars and radio could have happened only in America, where men may believe as they please or not believe at all. Graymoor was conceived by Lewis T. Wattson, son of an Episcopal rector of Maryland, and later himself an Episcopal minister. He had studied the life of St. Francis and he wanted to establish a society for missionary work. He and Lurana Mary White founded Graymoor in an abandoned Anglican church near Garrison, N. Y., in 1898. There a convent was built and the Society of the Atonement, an Episcopal organization, was founded. Later, Miss White and the Reverend Mr. Wattson embraced the Roman Catholic faith and their organization became affiliated with the Catholic Church, and the Friars became the Franciscan Friars of the Atonement. A monastery was built.

LADY POVERTY literally ruled Graymoor. Nobody had anything except faith and a belief that God would take care of his own. They lived from day to day on donations received from grateful folk. The convent and monastery became wayside inns for wanderers. The rule of the organization was that no man could be turned away, regardless of race, color or creed, or condition. But each wanderer who ate had one task to perform: he must draw a bucket of water from a distant well to supply the household for its cooking. Under direction of its father general, Father Paul James Francis (The Rever-


end Mr. Wattson), Graymoor grew gradually and became a community of Brown Friars. They lived on alms. Roman Catholics heard of the work and sent donations, and the Society of the Atonement struggled along, feeding wanderers and following the commission of St. Francis.

At the monastery, young men could prepare themselves to be Priest Friars, the highest order within the general order of Franciscans. A St. Christopher Inn was erected with alms sent to the Friars by well-wishers. All communities of Friars do not have St. Christopher Inns. This amazing institution is peculiar to Graymoor. The inn is simply a refuge for homeless men. It is named for Christopher, the patron of wanderers, the patron of Columbus, the patron of all men who roam. Wanderers were fed and bedded at the inn and given a chance to find themselves. Father Patrick McCarthy became Father Director of St. Christopher's Inn, and the Very Rev. Father Paul James Francis became Father General of the Society of Atonement.

The young Friar looked around for some method to enlarge St. Christopher's Inn, which is simply one of the missionary activities of the Society of the Atonement, although it is located on the grounds of Graymoor, the general community of the society. Wanderers, broke and down-hearted, the flotsam from the wreckage of 1929, flocked to St. Christopher's Inn, and its facilities were taxed to the limit. But because of St. Francis' order that no man must be refused bread and drink and a couch, the poor Friars often had

to surrender their own hard beds and their food to strangers who knocked at the door. Something had to be done. The inn was small and the need was great.

Then the Friars thought of radio. Why not use "Brother Air" to the glory of God? So the *Ave Maria Hour* was launched. For the benefit of Protestants, *Ave Maria* means "Hail Mary" and is a prayer to the mother of Christ, asking her to intercede for sinners.

The program was an immediate success. Strangely enough (or is it strange?), religious programs generally are successful, and they have the largest following of any contemporary programs. Father McCarthy, as director of the *Ave Maria* program, receives more mail than any other radio personage.

On Wednesdays, the programs are purely religious Novena services to Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal and are broadcast from the chapel of St. Christopher's Inn, and the sole participants—choir, organ, announcer and celebrant at the services—are friars. On Sundays at 6:30 p.m., music and the dramatization of the lives of the saints are broadcast, with only Friars participating and taking all the roles of the dramas. Talks are delivered by the Friars, usually the Father General and Father McCarthy, S. A. (Society of the Atonement).

THE "live" broadcasts are heard over stations WMCA, WINS and WIP. A master record transcribes the programs, and many other records are made from the master record, and are sent to stations throughout the land.

Radio has contributed much to make St. Christopher's Inn and the missionary work of the Society of the Atonement possible. Alms are not solicited openly on the program, but when the radio public hears of the work, contributions are sent in. The work of St. Christopher's Inns (there are two now) is supported by a Christmas appeal and radio. The monastery, convent and other activities at Graymoor are supported by the Society of the Atonement. Graymoor must be pictured as a community within itself, a community of many activities, of which the work at St. Christopher's Inns is the best known in the profane world.

There is no institution in America like Graymoor, and perhaps not in the world. The community begins at the base of a mountain near Peekskill, and the inns and chapel, the convent and other buildings line a winding road that leads to the top of the mountain, and there is the monastery. As many as 6,000 pilgrims visit Graymoor on Sundays, to pray at the shrines and seek meditation in the peace and solitude.

The center of activity at Graymoor is the two inns. The largest is pink stucco. And the inns, the chapel—virtually everything at Graymoor—were built by wanderers who stopped there for rest and stayed to help.

No man ever has been turned away from Graymoor. Any man can go there any time and get food and lodging and an opportunity for rehabilitation. Even animals! A dog or a cat or a deer is never refused food, for St. Francis is the patron for the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Wearily and desolate men merely knock at the door of St. Christopher's Inn (the new one) and a Friar opens the door and the wanderer tells his needs. He is admitted. If he is dirty, he is bathed. He doesn't have to tell

his problems. The Friars never pry. He doesn't even tell his name unless he so desires.

The Friars and his comrades call him Brother Christopher, a wanderer, and ask no questions.

He is assigned to a bed in the dormitory, a huge room of double-deckers. He never complains, because he shares and shares alike with the Friars. He is fed well, as well as West Point cadets who are trained just across the river at the academy.

Nobody gets any money. The chefs, the waiters, the gardeners are Brothers Christopher who found refuge at the inns. As soon as a man enters the inns, he is given a task. He is allowed to do the thing he does best. Some work with wood. Others cook. Others paint. Thirty Brothers Christopher are kept busy answering radio mail. At present there are about two hundred Christophers at the inns.

Transients flock to St. Christopher's Inns by the thousands. Many get a meal and move on the next day. Others stay "to find themselves." They are not paid a penny for the jobs they do around the inns, but each man is allowed one package of ten-cent cigarettes a day. He gets his bed, clothing and meals.

Every timber in the inns was laid by a Brother Christopher. There came one day a man and asked aid. "I am down-hearted," he said. Financial troubles, brought on by sundry causes, send most men to St. Christopher's. The stranger didn't give his name. "I just want peace," he said.

Several days later, and several meals later, he asked for a pencil and a pad, and he went alone to the crest of the hill and drew up the plans for the new St. Christopher's Inn. He was one of America's greatest architects.

There are gentlemen, artists and laborers, crooks and saints sleeping in the same room at Graymoor, eating from the same table. Literally thousands of men have been rehabilitated there because "Brother Air" is used for the glory of God. It is the most concrete example of the possibilities of radio for good that I've ever seen. Each year the Friars serve more than 165,000 meals and provide 55,000 nights' lodgings for homeless men. And radio makes it possible, the gifts that well-wishers send to the *Ave Maria Hour*.

One outstanding example of the work was impressed upon me when I saw, much to my amazement, a Brother Christopher who was a famous foreign correspondent when I was a cub reporter.

I called his name, and he rebuked me, gently. "I'm a Brother Christopher," he said. Then he explained. I hadn't heard of him in years. "I got tired of it all," he said. "I was run down at the heel, mentally, morally, physically and financially. I had no place to turn, and I turned to the Friars. I'm very happy here. I've taken inventory of myself, and I'm about ready to take another whirl at life."

HE USED to call ambassadors by their first names, play poker with generals, and flirt with the colonel's lady. His name is known to every reader of American newspapers, but to his comrades he's just another Brother Christopher, answering radio fan mail.

"The amazing thing about all this," he told me, "is that it's all possible because of one hour a week on the air. The *Ave Maria Hour* lives the life of St. Francis and enables the fraters to do his work. I thought I had seen everything, but this has opened my eyes."

Dayton, Ohio, Finds Radio Answer to School Dilemma

When Dayton's Board of Education ran out of funds recently and the city's 1,300 teachers refused to continue without pay, 34,000 pupils of the public schools were faced with the possibility of being left high and dry, educationally, until the mess was straightened out. That was before Leonard Reinsch stepped into the picture and volunteered radio time (which in commercial broadcasting means money) and the facilities of station WHIO to meet the emergency.

Collaboration . . .

Following consultation with the superintendent and assistant superintendent of the Board of Education, WHIO's manager, Reinsch, revamped the station's daily program schedules to clear appropriate broadcast time for emergency lessons. An advisory committee, composed of the Board of Education officials, the president of the local Parent-Teacher Association Council, a newspaper editor, the executive secretary of the Dayton Council of Churches and station manager Reinsch, organized to collaborate in planning the radio instruction. In short order radio had padded the sharp edges of another catastrophe.

Lessons . . .

The advisory committee outlined a course of instruction that included four periods daily. Teachers and students cooperated in presenting these radio lessons, and two of the four broadcasts each day went over the air as regular classes, with recitations in the studio. Supplementing this curriculum with the educational broadcasts offered by the networks, pupils were able to spend a couple of hours every day under the guidance of expert educators. To illustrate the wide range of subjects that can be handled by radio lessons as supplementary aid to classroom teaching, the following were prepared by Dayton's Board of Education and presented by WHIO's Emergency School of the Air: English, Biology, Chemistry, General Science, Physics, Vocational Guidance, Latin, French, Spanish, German, Bookkeeping, Geography, American History, Mathematics, Civics, Art and Music.

Shades of Chicago, '37 . . .

Although the reason for closing Chicago public schools in 1937 was quite different from the one that faced Dayton, these two situations are similar in many respects and prove the same point. When the poliomyelitis epidemic of September, 1937, barred Chicago's half-million public-school students from their classes, radio stations donated freely of time, talent and facilities. The Chicago emergency gave impetus to the birth of the present extensive system of radio education in that city, Chicago Board of Education's Radio Council being an outgrowth of an advisory committee comparable to the one that officiated in the Dayton dilemma. If the crisis does for Dayton what the epidemic did for Chicago, we can hope to have another radio-education-minded city in the near future. In any event the fine spirit of cooperation shown by Dayton's WHIO is another mark to the credit of radio and radio-education.

SPECIALTY: NATURE STUDY

WHEN you want a ditch dug, you hire a ditch-digger, to fly a plane you get an aviator, to cure pneumonia, a doctor is your best bet. That a specialized job is best executed by a specialist may be accepted as fact. Following this theory, Columbia's radio educators went direct to Dr. Roy Chapman Andrews when they decided to send natural-history lessons into the nation's classrooms. Of him it may be said without fear of successful contradiction that no man is better qualified.

Using as a starting-point the fascinating exhibits in the famous American Museum of Natural History, the radio series is designed to present the story of the adventure and scientific work that formed the background of the museum's displays, thereby to open up new horizons in natural history for children of the intermediate and junior-high-school grades and also serve as supplementary material for elementary science and geography studies. To Dr. Andrews, director of the museum, these exhibits, many of them his own, are as familiar as your own wardrobe is to you. More significant is the fact that Roy Chapman Andrews is not, primarily, a "text-book scientist." More than two decades of his scientific career have been spent probing remote parts of the world for answers to the many-fold mysteries of the sciences.

Thus, by virtue of many years' study of strange, interesting things in strange, interesting places, Dr. Andrews has ever at his tongue's tip an unequalled

wealth of first-hand experiences with which to sprinkle his weekly discussions of nature's phenomena.

Dr. Andrews' program, "New Horizons," is the Thursday session of Columbia's "American School of the Air." A typical lesson, broadcast direct from the exhibits in the American Museum of Natural History, finds the eminent explorer discussing one of the displays with a group of school children, answering their questions about it, giving the story of adventure and scientific work that forms its colorful background. Following this exchange between scientist and student, the stories are elaborated by brief but comprehensive dramatization.

Fantastic would be an attempt to bring a wasp's nest, buffalo, skunk or alligator into the classroom—or, more remote, into your living-room, if you are one of the many thousand adults who also have found this series of unusual interest. But thank God and the gifted men who have given us radio as it is today, Dr. Andrews can almost do this very thing for those who wish to learn of the world and its inhabitants, past and present, without bringing in also the customary inconveniences. Dr. Andrews does this in a much more practical way every Thursday afternoon when he broadcasts from the exhibits at the American Museum of Natural History.

Notes

Scripts and Records . . .

An announcement from Washington, D. C., throws light on a department that, in the near future, will make the two new Office of Education programs, "Wings for the Martins" and "Americans All—Immigrants All," available to schools, colleges and parent-teacher groups in the form of scripts and recordings. Thus, after these programs have been presented over the networks, permission will be granted to present them over local stations and in auditoriums.

Round Table Promotion . . .

The University of Chicago inaugurated a novel audience-builder stunt recently when they distributed posters to the stations carrying the Sunday morning Round Table broadcasts. The orange and black posters, to be set up in studios, libraries and other public gathering-places, have a panel for weekly announcements of the subject to be discussed and the names of the speakers.

Radio in England's Schools . . .

In England, where 9,600 schools now listen regularly to special school broadcasts, travel talks lead in interest, while nature study, regional geography and history follow in order. Seventy-five percent of the schools of England and Wales are taking over the responsibility for the installation and maintenance of receiving-sets.


Parent Clinics . . .

Los Angeles, Calif.—A legislative bill for establishment of parent clinics is being drafted by Los Angeles attorneys, as a result of a radio-script, titled "Parents on Trial," which is being heard over a West Coast network. The California Congress of Parents and Teachers is sponsoring the proposed bill as well as the popular educational program series. If adopted by the state legislature, the proposed measure would establish clinics throughout California, where parents could seek advice and information on problems concerning the rearing of their children. Similar to the health clinics operated by the government, the parents' clinics would be free to all who need the assistance of trained psychologists and child specialists. Needless to say, the idea sounds good enough to merit similar promotion in other states.

As We Go To Press . . .

Dayton, Ohio.—So favorable have been the results from the WHIO Emergency School of the Air in their broadcasting of classes during the Dayton school crisis, that a permanent civic-radio educational committee has been appointed. Quoting Norman B. Wine, assistant superintendent of Dayton schools: "The results of the Emergency School of the Air have gone far beyond our expectations, and it is desirable, in the interest of the children and parents, that we arrange a Dayton school of the air on a permanent schedule. We feel that we have pioneered in this effort which may develop into a long-range program producing a better understanding between the schools and the home."

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
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

A PART from New Year's Day, there are two days in the year on which Scotsmen like to let themselves go. The first is the anniversary of Robert Burns; the second is St. Andrew's day, November 30. The following programs from Daventry have been arranged to help commemorate this latter event: A special St. Andrew's day talk to be heard on Wednesday, November 30, at 6:35 a.m. over GSF, GSG and GSJ, and at 11:05 p.m. over GSC, GSD and GSL, and a feature program from Edinburgh, entitled "Scotland, 1938," to be heard on the same day at 2 p.m. EST over GSG and GSP. The news in French, German and Italian, is now broadcast over Daventry stations GSE (11.86), and GSA (6.05), week-days at 2 p.m. and on Sundays at 1 p.m. EST.

According to a letter from the Caribbean Broadcasting Service, ZIZ (6.384) of St. Kitts, B. W. I., now operates week-days from 4 to 4:35 p.m. and on Wednesdays from 7 to 7:30 p.m. EST; the latter period being sponsored by the Booker Drug Stores of Demarara.

W1XAL (11.79) of Boston, Mass., presents a "Bulletin Board" broadcast featuring announcements regarding future transmissions, Sundays at 6:20 p.m. EST. Messages from the jungle outposts of British Guiana are given over short-wave station VP3BG (6.13) of Georgetown, on Sundays at 4:45 p.m. EST.

The Crosley Radio Corporation of Cincinnati, Ohio, has been granted permission to increase the power of short-wave station W8XAL to 50,000 watts, and to operate on the additional frequencies of 21.65 and 17.76 megs. The Columbia Broadcasting System of New York City has been granted permission to add the frequencies of 6.17, 9.65, 17.83 and 21.57 megs in addition to the regular frequencies of 6.12, 11.83 and 15.27 megs, already assigned to short-wave station W2XE. The new broadcasting schedule for W2XE, which was adopted on November 15, follows: On 21.57 megs, week-days, 7:30 to 10 a.m., and on Saturdays and Sun-

Earl Roberts of Indianapolis, Ind., gives the schedule of CHNX (6.132), Halifax, Nova Scotia, as daily from 7 a.m. to 10:15 p.m. and on Sundays from 12:15 to 10 p.m. EST. The Milwaukee Journal Company of Milwaukee, Wis., operators of broadcast station WTMJ, have applied for a license to operate a television station for the purpose of transmitting a regular schedule of visual programs. According to Radio-Press Service, coils which enable reception on the short waves are being forcibly extracted from all receiving sets in Vienna, Germany. The power of short-wave station COCO (5.985) of Havana, Cuba, is to be upped shortly to 5,000 watts.

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
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
