

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

A CHRISTMAS CAROL

THE WORLD'S
BEST-LOVED STORY



AFTER that first great Christmas the world waited nineteen centuries for its second-best-known and best-loved Christmas story.

In 1843, in England, appeared a short story in book form, beautifully printed and produced, called "A Christmas Carol—A Ghost Story of Christmas," by Charles Dickens. On account of its wholesome human interest, its true and deep-rooted characterization, its superb mingling of pathos and humor and, perhaps most of all, its very breathing of the Christmas spirit, the little book met with immediate success, putting Dickens on a new pedestal in the public eye and endearing him to new thousands of readers.

Those were times not entirely unlike our own. Europe was recovering from the Napoleonic chaos and was flirting, as usual, with other crises. Louis Philippe was maintaining his regime in France by hard-fisted villainy. Germany was slowly becoming unified from a loose confederacy of states. Queen Victoria had just begun her long reign in England, and Conservatives and Liberals were crossing swords. The United States was still expanding, and political parties were becoming confused over the slavery issue. All the nations were awakening to the industrial revolution. And both human greed and human charity were in the hearts of people.

Dickens himself called his story "the ghost of an idea," and wished that it might haunt many houses pleasantly. For a century it has haunted the world with increasing delight.

Whether or not the events of history repeat themselves, there still are Scrooges, Tiny Tims and Ghosts of Marleys; and Santa Claus will continue to be an evergreen visitor.

So we present, in condensed form, Charles Dickens' immortal Christmas story.

Marley was dead to begin with. There is no doubt, whatever, about that. Old Marley was as dead as a door-nail.

"Scrooge knew he was dead? Of course he did. Scrooge and he were partners for I don't know how many years. Scrooge was his sole administrator, his sole assign, his sole residuary legatee, his sole friend and sole mourner. And even Scrooge was not so dreadfully cut up by the sad event, but that he was an excellent man of business on the very day of the funeral, and solemnized it with an undoubted bargain.

"Scrooge never painted out Old Marley's name. There it stood, years afterwards, above the warehouse door: Scrooge and Marley. Sometimes people new to the business called Scrooge, and sometimes Marley, but he answered to both names; it was all the same to him.

"Oh! But he was a tight-fisted hand at the grindstone, Scrooge!—a squeezing, wrenching, grasping, scraping, clutching, covetous old sinner! Hard and sharp as flint, from which no steel had ever struck out generous fires; secret, and self-contained, and solitary as an oyster. The cold within him froze his old features, nipped his

pointed nose, shriveled his cheek, stiffened his gait, made his eyes red, his thin lips blue, and spoke out shrewdly in his grating voice. A frosty rime was on his head, and on his eyebrows, and his wiry chin. He carried his own low temperature always about with him. No wind that blew was bitterer than he, no falling snow was more intent upon its purpose, no pelting rain less open to entreaty. The heaviest rain, and snow, and hail, and sleet, could boast of the advantage over him in only one respect. They often 'came down' handsomely, and Scrooge never did.

"To edge his way along the crowded paths of life, warning all human sympathy to keep its distance, was what the knowing ones call 'nuts' to Scrooge.

"ONCE upon a time—of all the good days in the year, on Christmas Eve—old Scrooge sat busy in his counting-house. It was cold, bleak, biting weather—foggy withal—and he could hear the people in the court outside go wheezing up and down, beating their hands upon their breasts and stamping their feet upon the pavement-stones to warm them. The fog came pouring in at every chink and keyhole, and was so dense without that, although the court was of the narrowest, the houses opposite were mere phantoms. To see the dingy cloud come drooping down, obscuring everything, one might have thought that Nature lived hard by and was brewing on a large scale.

"'A merry Christmas, uncle! God save you!' cried a cheerful voice. It

MRS. PRO DEFENDS THE CHILDREN'S PROGRAMS

WHAT IS

SAY "Juvenile Programs" to most parents and teachers and see what happens! They explode! What comes out is not at all complimentary to radio. Nor fair. There are words like "disgrace" and "terrible" and "horrible." Here and there perfectly sincere and well-meaning adults form committees to do something about children's entertainment on the air. It all boils down to the inescapable fact that, to our considerable disgust, the dear kiddies have a marked taste for blood-and-thunder.

Perhaps there are some good, sound reasons why youngsters have such an appetite for the indigestible—for the highly spiced diet of the thrillers. It seems to be about time for us to realize that the success of this type of juvenile feature indicates a widespread hunger for dramatic adventure. Maybe, as critical grown-ups, we should try to see the whys and wherefores.

In the first place, children are ever so much like other people. When the day's work is over, they seek entertainment. And if you don't think that school is work, try one of those wallpaper problems yourself. When things pile up, especially discouragement and disappointments, they look for diversion. When they're tired of looking at the same old room, they're very apt to look out of the window. And if there's nothing new in sight, there's the radio to bring it into the picture.

WHEN the routine of going to school, washing the hands, running the errands, doing the home-work and helping with the dishes gets to be a bore—and it certainly does—a twist of the dial brings the galloping horse, the jungle mystery, and the triumphs of the G-men right into the family circle. Mother may not care for machine-guns in the sitting-room, but they're a big relief to the kids.

The trouble with the family circle is that nothing ever happens. Time was when Pop lost his job at the mill and decided to put the family into a wagon heading west. The kids had plenty to see and do before a new home settled down to monotony. Nowadays, Pop's losing his job has absolutely no compensations. It's not very exciting to go on relief. Even if the circumstances are more favorable, there's a period of insecurity and nerves. Youngsters learn big words like "depression" and "recession" very early in the game.

In the good old pioneer days, there were often long stretches with no school at all—the luckies! Fish and game were needed as food, and it was pretty tough sledding. But when there was a chance to read, it wasn't blood-and-thunder stories that the backwoods American youngsters read. They had enough of adventure, first-hand.

It was much later, when the what-not took the place of the rifle in the corner of the living-room, that boys and girls began to sneak in dime novels and cheap love-stories and to hide them under the pillow away from the eyes of Victorian parents. Horatio Alger was the remedy for the Lord Fauntleroy collars.

Kids could sit in the gallery of the Opera House and see 10-20-30 melodramas that carried them neatly away into an unreal world that was vastly preferable to Latin prose composition. In other words, ever since real excitement faded out for young people, they've looked for it in entertainment. The popularity of various means of juvenile recreation runs parallel to their repressions.

And this goes for the girls, too. Their urges may be more romantic, and perhaps they can assuage them with photographs of movie stars and pulp magazines. But as long as there's a scarcity of handsome, clever and wealthy young men, and not enough to go around, the fan mail for Robert Taylor and Nelson Eddy will be fat.

The real trouble is that our times are pretty tough for young people and the children aren't long in finding that out. Modern education, both in school and at home, is working toward preparing boys and girls to deal with the world as they find it. And they find it difficult. From the kindergarten, they start to face reality. At ten, most American youngsters know the answers to questions their parents were afraid ever to ask at all. They don't believe in Santa Claus, the stork, fairies, the Easter bunny or the power of carrots to make your hair curl.

And they hear a great deal of talk on such unpleasant topics as the family budget and unemployment. With the exception of the very few children of the very few wealthy (apologies to Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy), our children know that they are facing a world full of problems. It's not wrong for teachers

and parents to awaken this sense of responsibility and participation early. They're forced to do it by the conditions themselves, and this realistic education is certainly for the child's protection and his own best interests. He must realize the need for training himself, intelligently, to meet the frightful competition for jobs. But, golly ned, it isn't his choice of an outlook and it isn't much fun to look forward to nothing but work.

AND so, when late afternoon comes, he turns aside from his own particular brand of humdrum and takes the sandy road to adventure. Who can blame him? His elders may have other ideas of recreation and excitement—drinking, gambling, business ventures, or whatever they like. They don't have to ask anybody's permission; they can do as they please. But at ten or twelve or fourteen, you can't start out to conquer the world, except in the imagination.


Whether the child lives on Park Avenue or First Avenue, on a Nebraska farm or in a New England village, he has the same dreams of fame and fortune. He has the same urge to escape from the narrow bounds of his own routine into the unknown beyond his horizon. The radio is his magic carpet, but he'd say "Pooh!" if we told him so. Since time began, children have gone through phases of needing to try their

own powers. Apparently, the primitive tribes are the only modern people who give that urge adequate outlet. They have crude and often dangerous ways of letting their young people adventure. We can't turn our boys and girls out to sink or swim for themselves. Our civilized world has no place for that kind of thing. If we're lucky, they get a chance to test their strength and skill in summer camps—but there is necessarily supervision, and precious little genuine adventure is left for them. All the orange juice in the world isn't an adequate substitute, either.

But books and movies and radio carry them away from the restrictions. We mustn't be surprised if their taste is not our own. It comes out of a different need. The average normal, healthy boy would gladly swap his balanced diet for bear meat at a camp-fire and his studio couch for a bed of pine branches. Once upon a time a girl could follow her Young Lochinvar into the West because there was gold in them thar hills instead of a CCC camp. Now the closest they can get to the wide open spaces is a hillbilly program.

It takes more time and energy than the ordinary parent can afford to help boys and girls find romance, adventure, and a sense of independence within his own environment. City living makes a lot of fairly simple, ordinary activities difficult and expensive. De-

MRS. CON ATTACKS THE CHILDREN'S PROGRAMS



Tops among all children's programs for years was NBC's Singing Lady, Ireene Wicker. Although winner of high honors from recognized critics, her program was discontinued. Could the reason have been "bad business"?

AT THE risk of being called a militant mother, a crank, a death's-head at the feast—or worse, I'm sending you a protest on present-day radio programs for younger children.

That radio is the most potent social force in the world today, with possibilities for a greater influence on the child's development than any other. I believe you will agree. Yet here in America, which prides itself on progress and leadership, what are we doing about it? Not much, it seems to me.

Proof? Well, here are a few facts and figures which reveal the basis for a grievance on the part of those parents who are really interested (and all parents should be) in guiding the children of today in a way that will make them good American citizens tomorrow. It has been estimated that out of one hundred-hours-a-week program-schedule on the big networks, only five, at the most six, hours are aimed at the child. More than 3,250,000 hours of broadcasting took place in the United States last year, but only five percent of those hours was devoted to the child. Furthermore, out of that five percent, some were decidedly poor fare for the child mind. The programs were far too lurid and exciting to be a good influence. The situations portrayed were unreal and had no objective beyond rather cheap entertainment. Certainly they didn't appeal to the higher

instincts of the child, and the English, diction, and grammar left much to be desired. About the only thing that could be said about them was that they developed poor taste in the matter of selection.

The adventures described were far from what children should be engaged in at all. The main object seems to be to keep the children in a turmoil of excitement and sell some advertised product by giving badges to them, or having them send in box-tops.

Of course, it's impossible to interview every American parent on the subject, but out of several hundred parents interviewed by one investigator, more than two-thirds considered radio programs for children too frightening, exciting and mysterious; some said they upset their children's nervous systems and were the cause of nightmares and bad dreams.

Citing a specific case, one mother said: "My oldest child became quite nervous. This nervousness reacted on her eyes, and it became necessary to take her to a specialist. The condition was traced to something she was doing, rather than any organic disease. We finally traced the cause to the hair-raising programs that Edith was listening to just before dinner and around bedtime. After those programs were taken from her list her nervousness vanished and her eyes were all right."

Another mother who's a great be-

liever in radio and what it might do toward educating the child mind and really developing good listening habits, exclaimed rather heatedly: "When the radio brings into my home cruelty, crime, false standards and vulgar humor, I know that it is a bad influence on my children, and I feel that it would have been much better if I hadn't sacrificed to buy a radio. But when it brings beautiful music, familiar songs, the opportunity to dance, and good fun, with interesting, suitable stories from which the children can learn something that is constructive, I'm for it."

IHAVE no way of knowing who writes the stories for children that are heard on the radio, but I sometimes wonder if those men and women who do write them have any children of their own. Somehow, I can't believe they have. And I'm not alone in my opinion. One of the finest teachers in the East, whose work in the field of education is outstanding and who, by the way, is the mother of two children, had this to say, and gave it as a consensus of the teachers in her school: "Children's programs seem to be written by people who have no idea of the influence on the child mind. We feel very strongly that this should be done by men and women who have lived and worked with younger children and, consequently, know and understand their needs."

"The programs for the older children are on a much higher plane, and they eagerly look forward to them. I refer especially to the fine historical dramatizations and those on music appreciation."

Living in the Middle West myself, I was glad to get that report from the biggest educational center in America, for it made me feel that my attitude toward children's programs was one held by those who work with children in the schoolroom, and that I wasn't just a fanatic or a crackpot on the subject.

NOW I don't know whether Ireene Wicker, "The Singing Lady," has any children or not, but I do consider her programs for children some of the finest that were ever on the air. They combined the best in music with fascinating stories that not only stimulated children's minds but left them with something worth while to think about. That I wasn't wrong is evinced in the fact I noted recently that Miss Wicker appeared on the program of "A Half Century of Child Study," a conference and institute held in New York City when that organization gave its fiftieth anniversary dinner.

The "Child Study" group represents 100,000 men and women, all of them parents; and it seems to me a pretty sad commentary on children's programs when many of them write in to headquarters and ask what they can substitute for radio, when it could be such a tremendous medium for vocational guidance alone.

For example: Children are always interested in how things are made, where they come from. They are, too, fascinated by stories telling how other youngsters live, both in their own country and abroad. The city-bred child is interested in hearing how those in the wheat, fruit, and cattle countries spend their days. They've never seen the waving gold of the great wheat fields, the plains and hills where herds graze, or known the fragrance of blossoming orchards. And the children who have a two-thousand acre ranch for their playground are in turn intrigued by the very different existence of the pavement-bred child, to whom apples and oranges are something that comes from a box.

It seems to me that just dramatizing this one subject properly for younger children would develop a tremendous interest, and one that would be entirely constructive.

As a further inspiration to vocational guidance for children, why couldn't the childhood of such outstanding Americans as Luther Burbank, Margaret Fuller, the Mayo brothers, Clara Barton, James J. Hill, Thomas Edison, and others be dramatized? Certainly they are chock-full of colorful incidents that would prove fascinating to children. Then, too, there could be dramatized book-reviews for the youngsters and previews of juvenile books that would be a tremendous incentive to good reading habits. Dramatization of sport activities on lower age-levels would be helpful, as well as talks on constructive hobbies that led to careers later on. All these could be used to avoid the sensational programs with their gun-shooting and raucous voices.

DRAMA HIGHLIGHTS

Surveying the immense field of radio drama this week, we find several choice items which seem definitely set. These samples are enough to whet our appetites for the many other fine offerings on the air, in addition to the superlative presentation of "A Christmas Carol" as outlined on page 1.

Sunday: "Life Is a Dream" is the most familiar and most widely read of the works of Calderon, Spain's greatest playwright. This drama with the challenging title is to be the offering of the NBC "Great Plays" sequence this week, and it should appeal to the student of world literature as well as to the average listener. Calderon's prolific seventeenth-century writing includes 120 full-length plays, 73 Spanish allegories, 200 prologs, 100 interludes, and innumerable romances, songs and poems. (NBC, 1:00 p.m. EST, 12:00 noon CST; 11:00 a.m. MST; 10:00 a.m. PST.)

Sunday: Bette Davis, one of the screen's leading actresses and undoubtedly its outstanding portrayer of she-devil roles, will be presented by the "Silver Theater" in an original vehicle. Miss Davis has not always been a villainess on the screen. She started out with nice ingenue roles, such as that in "The Man Who Played God." Later, when several glamour girls refused the temptress part in "Of Human Bondage," Bette took the chance and established herself therein as the most abhorred woman on the screen and consequently one of the most respected artistically. While her most distinctive work has been done in such roles, she can still play the sweet parts, too. Conrad Nagel will be the m.c., as usual. (CBS, 6:00 p.m. EST; 5:00 p.m. CST; 4:00 p.m. MST; 3:00 p.m. PST.)

Monday: The dramatics department of Yale University has begun a series of programs which is strictly a family affair. Scripts are being written by class members under the direction of Professors Allerdyce Nicoll and Walter Pritchard Eaton, chairmen of the program. The second play is to be "Nobody's Captain," a gridiron story by Edwin G. Burrows. This is appropriate, for the various "bowl" games are still in the offing and all-American selections are still in season. Although the days when the Eli bulldog was an invincible football juggernaut is just a tradition, the men of Yale still stand high in the literary and dramatic fields, and the series may well uncover some very interesting stories and performances. (MBS, 9:00 p.m. EST; 8:00 p.m. CST; 7:00 p.m. MST; 6:00 p.m. PST.)

HIGHLIGHTS

PREVIEWS OF SOME OF THIS

Thursday: Scheduled to appear on Bing Crosby's K. M. H. are Leslie Howard and Jane Bryan. Howard is not only a distinguished movie actor but he is very popular as a guest radio artist. In his recent air appearance, November 28 on "Lux Theater," he did a much-talked-of performance in the play "Interference." The English actor came to the screen from the stage in 1930. 

THE RADIO PLAYBILL: THIS WEEK—"STEPMOTHER"

KAY FAIRCHILD, the stepmother, is played by Sunda Love. Kay, on the sunny side of thirty, gave up her career as a Chicago newspaper woman to marry John Fairchild and move to Walnut Grove, a typical midwestern small town. She is immediately faced with the problem of winning the whole-hearted affection of John's two children—Peggy, who is openly antagonistic from the first, and Bud. Kay is genuinely in love with her elderly husband and is sincerely fond of the children. Fate brings many complexities to the domestic course of the Fairchilds, but through them all Kay sticks steadfastly to her purpose—that of making a unified and happy family. Her impending blessed event gives promise of being a strong factor in welding the family ties. Kay is one of those women whose loyalty can transcend even her husband's indiscretion, which she recognizes to be based on a naive rather than evil nature. She is actively courageous and fearless for her own personal safety when her husband or her stepchildren are in jeopardy. The keynote of Kay's character and the theme of the story might be described as "affection that hopes and endures and is patient" and "the beauty and strength of woman's devotion." The trials she encounters in her striving for happiness for her family and herself sometimes lead to discouragement but never to admission of failure

ANOTHER woman, politics, gossip, racketeers, murder—all combine to complicate a young woman's struggle to prove that a stepmother can, with devotion and affection, successfully hold together a home with another woman's children. Kay Fairchild is the stepmother who tries desperately to hold the love of her husband, John Fairchild, and of John's two children by a former marriage, Bud and Peggy. The "other woman," Adella Winston, a wealthy divorcee, interferes and causes John to lose his job at the Walnut Grove bank, forcing Kay to open a dress shop in partnership with her friend, Genevieve Porter. This move hurts John's pride and widens the family breach. Meanwhile, Mayor Craddock, secretly backed by Leonard Clark, magnate and crooked political power, tries to win re-election by having John Fairchild nominated as a dummy opponent. Kay, believing John's election would help him regain his self-respect, helps bring to light evidence exposing the racket of Craddock and Clark, thus winning the election for John. Reconciliation follows, made more complete by Kay's announcement that she is soon to become a real mother. Still there is rough sailing. The disgruntled Clark kills Adella, thinking it is Kay, and then frames Kay so that she is charged with the murder of her rival, just when it seems her happiness is near completeness with reconciliation and motherhood. Vicissitudes crowd each other in this serial, but the melodrama is tempered by a foundation that is rooted deep in a human-nature problem, one which is faced by many real-life people. There is excitement galore and stimulating emotion in the sketch, which is heard in the East and Middle West Monday through Friday over CBS at 10:45 a.m. EST, 9:45 a.m. CST.

JOHAN FAIRCHILD (played by Francis X. Bushman) is the husband whose life with Kay forms the pivotal theme of the play. At the age of forty he is the father of two children and has been a widower for a number of years until his marriage to Kay. Meteors and Stars

WHAT happens to the winners of the Metropolitan Auditions of the Air?" this department asked not long ago, and pointed out that some of them seem to go into a subsequent total eclipse.

The statement brings a protesting and corrective letter from those in charge of the Auditions and further feeling came from Edward Johnson, who at the November 27 Auditions read statistics concerning the finalists and victors in the contests.

From the letter and broadcast speech it appears that winners Arthur Carron and Anna Kaskas "have been singing major roles at the Metropolitan for three years"; and that "Carron, in the opinion of many experts, is destined to succeed the great Martinelli"; winners Maxine Stellman and Thomas L. Thomas "have received nation-wide acclaim"; "Miss Kaskas sang 32 roles"; Miss Stellman "made her debut as the Priestess in 'Aida' and "has been witnessed as doing 'exceptionally fine work' at the Metropolitan"; Mr. Thomas "has devoted much of his time to study and concert work"; Lucielle Browning "sang 61 times on the Metropolitan stage last year"; Nicholas Massue "took part in 33 performances"; John Gurney "appeared in four operas."

Leonard Warren has just had his initial chance at one of the Sunday evening opera concerts and John Carter is slated for his start in January. Meanwhile, Rise Stevens sang at the late November Metropolitan visit performance of "Rosenkavalier" in Philadelphia and scored strongly, according to the local papers. She was scheduled to do the same role in New York on December 8.

This department is pleased to see that its sincere question brought to record the foregoing figures, especially those in regard to the Misses Kaskas, Browning and Stevens. The last-named three, however, were finalists and not winners—which might be a discomforting thought for the judges.

It is of course unfortunate that Miss Stellman has had only two chances at the Metropolitan and at her debut did not even emerge upon the stage, for the role of the Priestess in "Aida" is sung behind the scenes; also it is to be regretted that Mr. Thomas is not included in the present personnel of the Metropolitan.

I think that Miss Kaskas and Mr. Massue are highly useful members and that Miss Browning is a brilliant one. Also, I like Mr. Gurney's voice and delivery and consider Mr. Carron a competent singer, although I do not belong to the "many experts" who look upon him as the destined successor to Martinelli. I hope, however, that he may rise to that eminence.

The Metropolitan Auditions of the Air and Mr. Johnson are following an undeniably beneficial course in giving radio hearing to aspiring vocalists with Metropolitan ambitions, and the contests enable dialists to feel that they are playing some part in the selective processes of the great opera house. Maybe the Auditions might eventually produce a truly shining star or two, even though the present and past luminaries of the Metropolitan were not acquired through any sort of public competition.

This page maintains the bright countenance of truth. Therefore I may have been wrong to speak of a total eclipse when mostly it was only a partial one. —L. L.

Speaking Up

One wonders when a radio opera will be written on a contemporary American theme.

The question arises after hearing the premiere on Thanksgiving night of "Beauty and the Beast," the Vittorio Giannini-Robert A. Simon opera ordered by the Columbia Composers' Commission. Both composer and libret-

tist made the most of their slight material, which had a splendid performance by the cast and orchestra.

However, it seems strange that Simon and Giannini had to resort to a fairy-tale subject, especially when Giannini himself is quoted as saying, "The present times are full of drama and filled with action expressing the quick tempo in which we are living. The radio opera . . . is admirably adapted for the expression of this action."

American composers need look no further than the headlines of their daily newspapers for operatic material much more in keeping with the emotional intensity of today than the fantasy of Fairyland.

For those who would like an opportunity to see Toscanini as well as hear him, NBC has planned a short December tour of the NBC Symphony Orchestra under the maestro's direction. The tour will probably be confined to about eight eastern cities within a day's journey of New York, as the orchestra will continue its Saturday night radio series and must be available for rehearsals. The first city visited will be Newark, N. J., on December 13.

Alfred Wallenstein has been swamped with piles of letters praising his performances of the Bach cantatas. One letter reads: "We were so surprised to hear such music by the composer Bach. These sonatas, I mean cantatas, are very beautiful and we are wondering if this man wrote other things."

"This man" certainly wrote a lot of other things, and Wallenstein would be adding to his already high record in the service of music by continuing Bach programs after the end of the present cantata series.

Carob trees and little donkeys flourish on the Island of Cyprus, according to Anis Fuleihan. He was born there, so he should know. A self-taught composer, Fuleihan has had his works performed by some of the major orchestras in America, and on Sunday, the New York Philharmonic will radio-premiere his second piano concerto. He plays and teaches the piano, and helps discover other composers for Schirmer's music-publishing house in New York.

THREE young musicians—English, Syrian and American—are the performers on this program, in the persons of Barbirolli, Fuleihan and List. The international character of the occasion is intensified through the presence of Austrian Schubert, Belgian Franck and German Wagner and Bach.

The actual novelty is the new (second) piano concerto by Anis Fuleihan. He is a man of the moment musically, for he writes in the idiom and manner of today, so do not look for conventional address in form, style or treatment. Fuleihan's themes are short, direct and mostly sharply rhythmic, framed by elaborate decoration employed as intrinsic part of the whole. A declamatory first movement, reflective second, and vigorous third are set off with knowing and well-sounding orchestration.

THE matured Schoenberg, after youthful devotion to melody, has been called the cerebral mathematician of music, when he was not reproached for using tones chiefly to express yawping ugliness. No living musician suffered more abuse and ridicule than this radical Austrian now teaching composition in Los Angeles.

Perhaps the climate there softens his outlook and puts sunshine into his soul, for Schoenberg's recently completed essay is an orchestral transla-

"MIGNON," first done in Paris, 1866, was librettoed from Goethe's famous novel, "Wilhelm Meister," relating the adventures of a romantic student. The episodes connected with Mignon have been loosely joined together for Ambroise Thomas' operatic purposes.

His music is largely a succession of attractive tunes, the lyrical intention far outweighing dramatic import and orchestral characterization.

ACT I

Courtyard of a German inn.
Late eighteenth century.

Mignon, a pretty dancer, stolen in childhood by gypsies, is threatened with the whip by Giarno, the chief, if she does not dance for the guests at the inn. Wilhelm, a wealthy student, and Lothario, a mentally deranged harper and wandering minstrel, intervene to protect her. The actress Filine and Laertes, her partner, are to perform at the neighboring castle. Wilhelm flirts with Filine, but is more strongly attracted to Mignon. The two sing a duet, in which she tells him of her vague childhood memories in the famous song "Knowest thou the land

pays court to Filine and leaves with her. Mignon dons Filine's clothes. Frederic, son of the castle's owner and admirer of Filine, enters through the window, and Wilhelm, looking for Mignon, finds him there. The men quarrel until Mignon comes out of hiding. They mock at her costume and Wilhelm, embarrassed, requests her to leave his service.

Scene II

The castle park.

Mignon, wandering about sadly, meets the mad minstrel, Lothario. They hear applause from the conservatory for Filine's acting. Mignon cries out her wish that the conservatory might be struck by lightning.

The guests emerge, and Filine, radiant with success, sings the brilliant polonaise "I am Titania." She sends Mignon into the conservatory which suddenly bursts into flames, kindled by Lothario. Wilhelm rushes in and saves Mignon.

ACT III

An Italian castle.

Wilhelm has taken Mignon and Lothario to Italy, where she finds her

where the citrons bloom?" Wilhelm buys Mignon's freedom from Giarno. Lothario offers to take her with him, but Wilhelm keeps her in his service, dressed as a boy. Now in love with him, Mignon watches jealously as he waves farewell to Filine.

ACT II

Filine's boudoir in the castle.

As Filine sits before the dressing-table, Wilhelm and Mignon enter and she pretends to sleep while Wilhelm

luxurious home and its surroundings strangely familiar. Wilhelm, in a duet with Mignon, realizes that he loves her. Lothario, his reason restored, remembers that this very castle belongs to him and that he is in reality the Marquis of Cipriani, who had left home to wander in search of his daughter, stolen years before by gypsies. He recognizes Mignon as the lost daughter and the opera ends happily in a trio sung by Wilhelm, Mignon and Lothario.

tion of Brahms' early quartet for piano and strings, music of rare and heartfelt feeling, luxuriance of imagination, and the Hungarian influences adored by that composer.

The orchestral amplification and enrichment are so imposing that an apt critic terms the result "Brahms' fifth symphony," for it fittingly crowns his other four. If Schoenberg now has reformed himself into an evangel of beauty, much may be forgiven him for his previous excursions into raucous din and discord.





NEW YORK.—One of the largest life-insurance companies in the U. S. A. is practically sold on the idea of presenting a one-hour dramatic-musical show which was heard in audition last week. The dramatizations will be based on stories appearing in magazines . . . The audition Raymond Paige gave a few Friday nights ago has met with the approval of the rubber-tire sponsor who last year presented the Ben Bernie program. Paige will have eighty-eight musicians in his orchestra and a choral group of twelve men. The title of the program, which debuts February 22, will be "One Hundred Men and a Girl," and the lass will probably be Hildegarde, although it isn't definite at this writing . . . Olsen and Johnson, the two comics of "Hellzapoppin," the funniest and wackiest show to ever hit Broadway, are being readied for a regular air series to be heard on Sunday nights starting in January. The Andrews Sisters and either Richard Himber's or Jimmy Dorsey's orchestra will complete the show. At a cocktail party the other night, Ole Olsen outlined his plans to your reporter, and it should click big because it's a different brand of comedy than anything being heard at the present time. If it's half as funny as their Broadway show, I'm laughing already . . . Phil Baker will return to the CBS air-planes before long and will be heard on Saturday night at 9 EST. In the meantime Baker is touring the country as the star of the legitimate play, "Idiot's Delight" . . . Lanny Ross has been signed to appear on the "Hit Parade" for a full year . . . Raymond Scott's Quintette will appear on the same show for at least thirteen weeks. They were originally set for two weeks but went over so big with the listeners their contract was extended.

The "Saturday Night Swing Club" will henceforth present a small jam band composed of no more than eight pieces during their weekly sessions. This will be in addition to the Leith Stevens band . . . "March of Time," which folded two weeks ago, may be back on the air soon (I hope! I hope! I hope!) and perhaps at a new time . . . Fred Allen may make a special appearance on the Sunday night "Silver Theater" . . . When Jack Benny announced over the air that his next broadcast would come from New York, NBC was swamped with calls for the next hour from people putting in their reservation for the precious ducats. I was dere, Sharlie . . . Which reminds me to predict the next radio catch-phrase, which was launched on the Bob Benchley show two Sundays ago. It's "You know what I mean?" which got a big laugh every time it was used . . . Benchley, by the way, started to present previews of the program, but cut it out after two weeks because the material didn't sound fresh any more when it came time for the actual broadcast, and that does make a big difference. I understand Al Jolson is cutting out his previews for the same reason . . . The Cantor previews on Sunday nights last about an hour and the best laughs of the script are boiled down to fit the half-hour show. Cantor stays in New York until January 3, and may then move his troupe to Florida for a few weeks . . . Dick Todd, of the Benchley show, will be given lines to read on the order of the Kenny Baker type heard on the Benny show.

Kate Smith's request for Christmas dolls to be distributed to underprivileged children is meeting with the usual enthusiastic response from her listeners . . . Lucille Manners of the Cities Service show has been named chairlady of the radio division's Christmas Seal Fund . . . When Irene Beasley visited Stephens College in Missouri a few weeks ago to lecture on writing radio-scripts, she was made first

honorary member of their radio sorority . . . Dave Elman has enough applications on hand from hobbyists to enable him to conduct a weekly Hobby Lobby program for many years to come . . . Uncle Jim, who picks "the person you didn't expect to meet" for Fred Allen, has his selections lined up four weeks in advance, and they generally stick, whereas on "We, the People" guests are often canceled at the last minute to make room for timely guests who are currently in the news.

Richard Maxwell's new book, "Songs of Cheer and Comfort," comes off the press this week and he has several hundred unsolicited orders for it . . . A typical "Gang Busters" program has been prepared for presentation in theaters with the setting of a typical radio studio, complete with clocks, a control-room, microphones, sound-effects and everything else that goes to make up the program. The "act" started a nation-wide tour of theaters in Philadelphia last week, and perhaps you will be able to see it in your town soon . . . Leonard Warren, runner-up in last season's Metropolitan Opera Auditions, is preparing for his debut at the Met Opera House. He spent most of the summer studying in Milan, Italy . . . By the way, I wonder what has happened to John Carter, who came out on top in the Met auditions?

Wally Butterworth did a typical "the show must go on" broadcast on Saturday, November 26. His father died the day before. My sincere sympathy in your bereavement, Wally . . . Mark Warnow has been plenty worried because of his wife's illness. She was in the hospital for several weeks with doctors visiting her twice a day. She is out now, but leaves for Florida, with a special nurse, to recuperate . . . Doris Rhodes and her music-publishing husband, Jonie Taps, are also going to Florida, but for a vacation and sun-tanning . . . Dave Rubinoff is in Ha-

vana recuperating from his recent illness . . . Edward Roecker, former "Pick and Pat" baritone, is away on a hunting-trip, his first vacation in two years . . . Lebert Lombardo will become a papa sometime in May . . . Eddy Duchin tells me his baby is progressing nicely in the Palm Springs atmosphere.

Looking in at a Guy Lombardo rehearsal. Guy usually starts off rehearsal on the stage, directing the band, and then, when everything's going well, he moves into the control-booth to hear how it sounds. During rehearsal he never uses either a baton or a script. He announces the numbers himself, informally. Rehearsals begin before noon and run straight through the afternoon, with each section of the program done separately again and again until it's perfect. Late in the afternoon there's a dress rehearsal, and by then the show runs off without a hitch. At lunch-time Kate's own maid arrives with a large hamper of food and coffee. That's the signal for Kate to retire to her dressing-room, where she heats the coffee on her own little stove and eats





Kid Stuff

CHICAGO.—Probably the only show in Chicago in which the actors dress up for the benefit of their studio audience is Kaltenmeyer's Kindergarten. Attired as kids, the cast seems to have as gay a time as the youngsters who compose about half of the audience. Holding the spotlight is Bruce Kamman who, in a long black frock-coat, white wig, with spectacles and a noise-maker, makes a genial Professor Kaltenmeyer. Cecile Roy, dressed as Daisy Dean, is in real life the mother of a seven-year-old son, Richard. Mrs. Roy, incidentally, is one of Chicago's most capable actresses. She can and has taken roles from little babies to tottering old grandmas. It is Cecile Roy who is the gossipy old Bessie Flounce on the Ma Perkins program. Wearing a silly straw hat and yellow chrysanthemum is Thor Erickson, who has no difficulty with the dialect of Yohnny Yohnson. Another actor who doesn't need any dialect practise is John Wolf as Izzy Finkelstein. Merrill Fugit is attired in Little Lord Fauntleroy fashion to enact the "sissy" character of Percy Van Schuyler. Latest recruits to the Kaltenmeyer gang are Betty and the Escorts, harmonizing team. In real life, the popular team is composed of Betty Olson, Ted Clare, Cliff Peterson and Floyd Holm.

A behind-the-scenes item your Tattler picked up one day was related by Bob White, the producer. It seems that Harry Lawrence, who writes the program, is one of these procrastinating fellows. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday pass by, and while the directors tear their hair, no script appears. Finally on Thursday Harry gets to work, and by rehearsal time that afternoon he has a rough script. Friday and Saturday the final touches are put on it. This is a far cry from most of the weekly shows, which are written weeks in advance. When the show was sponsored by a cereal, it's said the NBC people had the practical habit of locking Harry in a room Thursday morning, and he would work on the show all day, even foregoing meals. The network could take no chances in not having a show—hence the enforced lock-up.

Chicago's famous Blackhawk Cafe has given birth to many famous programs. It was here that Kay Kyser's Kollege of Musical Knowledge first saw the light of day (or night?). It was at the Blackhawk that Joe Sanders inaugurated his famous Monday Nite Celebrity Nites. So when Jan Garber started a new show there called the Musical Cook Book, Your Tattler was on hand to see whether a sensational new program idea was being cooked up or not. Though the originators of the idea have tried not to imitate Kyser's show in any way, the fact that there is a slight relationship may automatically mean that the Cook Book will never equal the Musical Knowledge program in popularity. In the Cook Book you're given clues to the name of a song. For instance, if the song is "So Sweet," Chef Garber and m.c. Jess Kirkpatrick will tell you that the first word of the song is what tailors do, while the second word might either be an endearing term used to lovers or a "what sugar is." At any rate, should the unlucky victim—I mean participant—fail to guess the song, he is given a rat-tat-tat on a dishpan. The dishpan and the fact that Garber and Kirkpatrick are attired as chefs is the only "cook-bookishness" about the show. Unless you could call the clues recipes. Anyway, if you guess the song you get a five-dollar bill. Like bank night, if you fail, the prize adds up and the next participant gets a whack at \$10. I will say that the Cook Book now is better than when I saw Dick Jurgens' band "play it" at the Casino in Catalina Island last summer.

It was there that Nelson Shawn, Chicago advertising man, first started the show. Now it's Coast to Coast over Mutual, and if it clicks, Nelson says it may be sponsored. Well, it may go and it may not. I still say it smacks too much of Kyser's show.

Tattler's Tidbits

Father Coughlin's talk was banned on Chicago stations WJJD and WIND Nov. 27. When station officials, who did not receive advance copies of the script, heard his show, they figured it was too anti-Semitic in tone to air. Reason they could hear it before the audience could was that a transcription is made of actual talk and then the disk is played over WJJD and WIND . . . Joan Blaine, Chicago gal who made good as Valiant Lady in New York City, flew to Chicago with her mother over Thanksgiving, to visit friends in suburban Deerfield. It's an annual custom with Joan, and though her radio contract forbids her to fly, she received a special okay to make the trip . . . Two Bettys met on Dec. 10 when Betty Winkler appeared with Betty Lou as guest star on Tommy Riggs' show. Incidentally, we erred in reporting Betty's mother's name as Bertha. It's Pearl. Sorry, Mrs. W. . . . Fibber McGee stage show bowed in on Dec. 3 at Cedar

Rapids, Iowa. Don Novis, Billy Mills, Bill Thompson, Hal Peary, together with Sylvia Clark, comedienne formerly with NBC Jamboree, also appeared with the Punning Prevaricator . . . Two former Broadway stage headliners now working in Chicago radio shows are Orin Brandon and Bob Hardaway. Latter at one time starred in Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde . . . Paul Dowty replaces Fort Pearson as narrator on the Carnation Contented program . . . Moving Edgar A. RECORDS OF THE WEEK

A department reviewing the recordings of your radio favorites

Classical:

SIBELIUS AGAIN—Sibelius, mighty Finn, greatest of living composers, receives further attention this week with an album recorded by Serge Koussevitzky and the Boston Symphony of his Fifth Symphony and the musical saga, Pohjola's Daughter.

The album duplicates one issued a couple of years ago by Victor, imported from the Sibelius Society of London, which includes both of the above, plus another tone poem, Tapiola. (Album 333. Robert Kajanus and the London Symphony.)

But Mr. Koussevitzky's versions are to be preferred—stronger and more colorful and vital. The symphony is in three movements, and albeit magnificent, not quite as pungent as the Fourth or Seventh, to our ears. It was written during the World War and is full of the richness that is Sibelius. Pohjola's Daughter is one of the numerous legends of Finnish mythology which Sibelius has set to music, and in which he is at his greatest.

All in all, a fine release. (Victor 474. \$10.)

Popular:

Bob Crosby shines once again. Pure swing. **Big Foot Jump** was written by and features pianist Bob Zurke, one of the best, and Yank Lawson and trumpet get the spotlight on the other side, **Five Point Blues**. (Decca.)

If for nothing but those two new lines in the lyric that we never heard

before, Billie Holiday's record of **I Can't Get Started** is worth a try. "When J. P. Morgan bows I just nod; Green Pastures wanted me to play God." (Vocalion.)

F. D. R. Jones, the song from the Broadway show, "Sing Out the News," makes fine material for Ella Fitzgerald and Chick Webb in their latest Decca issue. Good. Benny Goodman cracks through with a couple of robust arrangements in **Ciribiribin** and **Bumble Bee Stomp** (Victor). Erskine Hawkins has another killer with **Strictly Swing** (Bluebird). Ovie Alston sounds very much like Count Basie in **Junk Man's Serenade**—and that's a compliment (Vocalion). Very black is **Blackstick**, with swing clarinetist Sidney Bechet performing with Noble Sissle's band (Decca). Lullabye to a Jitterbug is the newest Andrews Sisters platter (Decca). So goes the swing market.

Get Out of Town and **From Now On**, two of the newest batch of Cole Porter show tunes ("Leave It to Me" is the show), get their first hearings by Les Brown's band on Bluebird. Rhythmic readings and the usual smart lyrics by Mr. P., **Gardenias** and **Deep in a Dream** give Skinnay Ennis another chance on Victor, and he still lives in the Hal Kemp world of affectation. The story goes that the gals like Skinnay's warbling, however. We've reviewed both **My Reverie** and **Old Folks** a couple of times already in these pillars, but we must mention them again now that Bing Crosby has recorded them for Decca.

a leisurely meal before returning to the stage. Kate puts a Hoover apron over her dress during the day, and changes in the dressing-room in the evening. Her CBS noontime "Kate Smith Speaks" program is always broadcast from the stage on rehearsal day.

At the final Connie Boswell-Richard Hember-Henny Youngman broadcast. Before the program gets under way, Youngman asks the audience to please laugh. "If you don't," he adds, "you'll only make the unemployment situation worse." The audience laughs, but the situation is worse anyway because Henny is out of a job after the program is over. Hember is to leave early the following night on an eight-day tour of one-night engagements. He tells the boys in the band to report for rehearsal early the following day. They plead with him to call the rehearsal off and do their work on the train, so that they can catch up on much-needed sleep. Hember agrees. . . . The phone rings backstage and Connie Boswell, sitting by the desk, picks up the receiver, and like an experienced operator chirps into the mouthpiece, "Columbia Broadcasting System, Playhouse No. 3." Connie, looking very lovely in a rust-brown ensemble, tells me she is leaving for Toronto, Canada, the next day to visit her sister Vet and persuade her to come back to New York for Christmas so the three sisters can have a family reunion.

AUTHENTIC!

IT IS of special interest that this map (right), prepared by the U. S. Office of Education in cooperation with the Smithsonian Institution, was checked in detail by a man who spent years exploring the Arctic region—a man who is distinguished as the only living survivor of the Greely expedition of 1880-'84—General David L. Brainard.

Brainard was a sergeant in 1880 when he shipped with Greely. On April 3, 1882, he was one of three men who reached a point farther north than any man had attained at that time. When the party got into dire straits, he frustrated a mutiny plot to put another in charge; next, although weak from cold and hunger, led a rescue party that saved four companions who failed to return from a hunting-trip. Brainard managed to catch enough shrimp to keep the survivors alive when the food gave out, and, although only a noncommissioned officer, was placed second in command in the event of Greely's death. On June 22, 1884, Greely summoned him to investigate a "strange, moaning sound." Staggering toward it out in the Arctic waste, he fell into the arms of Winfield Scott Schley, of the U. S. Navy, who was heading a rescue party.

A CHRISTMAS CAROL

was the voice of Scrooge's nephew, who came upon him so quickly that this was the first intimation he had of his approach.

"Bah!" said Scrooge. "Humbug!"

In that retort old Scrooge described himself quite completely. Characteristically, he angrily chided his nephew for being merry on Christmas, refused his invitation to Christmas dinner, and jeered at his long-suffering clerk for bidding his nephew "Merry Christmas!" Shortly afterward he turned his cold, bony shoulder in rebuff to two gentlemen who came soliciting charity for the poor.

Foggier and colder became the evening. Finally, the hour for closing arrived and, after grumbling about the clerk's having the whole day off on the morrow, Scrooge grudgingly departed for home.

As he opened the door to his sordid little suite of rooms that once had been Marley's, looking at the giant metal knocker on his door with no more awareness than usual, he saw—not the knocker but—Marley's face. Marley, dead seven years this night! Then it was a knocker again. Scrooge paused irresolutely and looked cautiously about before entering and closing the door. He double-locked himself in, which was not his custom.

"After several turns, he sat down again. As he threw his head back in the chair, his glance happened to rest upon a bell—a disused bell—which hung in the room. It was with great astonishment, and with a strange, inexplicable dread, that as he looked he saw this bell begin to swing, and then it rang out loudly. Soon the bell ceased ringing. It was succeeded by a clanking noise, deep down below. Scrooge then remembered to have heard that ghosts in haunted houses were described as dragging chains.

"The cellar door flew open with a booming sound, and then he heard the noise much louder on the floors below; then coming up the stairs; then coming straight towards his door. Without a pause, it came on through the heavy door and passed into the room before his eyes. Upon its coming in, the dying flame leaped up as though it cried, 'I know him! Marley's Ghost!' and fell again.

"How, now!" said Scrooge, caustic and cold as ever. "What do you want with me?"

"Much!"—Marley's voice, no doubt about it.

"Why do spirits walk the earth, and why do they come to me?" Scrooge asked the spirit.

"It is required of every man," the Ghost returned, "that the spirit within him should walk abroad among his fellow men, and if that spirit goes not forth in life, it is condemned to do so after death. At this time of the rolling year I suffer most. I am here tonight to warn you that you have yet a chance and hope of escaping my fate. You will be haunted by three spirits. Expect the first tomorrow when the bell tolls one."

"As Marley's Ghost disappeared, Scrooge started to mutter, 'Humbug!' but his voice stuck on the first syllable."

(Scrooge goes to bed and after he falls asleep the first visitation appears as the Ghost of Christmas Past. This spirit takes him on an observation tour of Christmases that Scrooge has known in the past. Soon he awakens in his bedroom to the visit of the second spirit, the Ghost of Christmas Present.

This ghost takes him invisibly on Christmas day through the merry throngs to the humble home of Bob Cratchit, Scrooge's clerk, to watch the proceedings.)

"Such a bustle ensued that you might have thought a goose the rarest of all birds. Mrs. Cratchit made the gravy hissing hot; Master Peter mashed the potatoes with incredible vigor; Miss Belinda sweetened up the apple sauce; Martha dusted the hot plates; Bob took Tiny Tim (poor crippled tot!) beside him in a tiny corner at the table; the two young Cratchits set chairs for everybody, not forgetting themselves. At last the dishes were set on, and grace was said. It was succeeded by a breathless pause, as Mrs. Cratchit, looking slowly all along the carving-knife, prepared to plunge it into the breast; but when she did, and when the long-expected gush of stuffing issued forth, one murmur of delight arose all around the board, and even Tiny Tim, excited by the two young Cratchits, beat on the table with the handle of his knife and feebly cried 'Hurrah!'"

"At last the dinner was all done, the cloth was cleared, the hearth swept, and the fire made up. Apples and oranges were put upon the table and a shovelful of chestnuts on the fire. Then all the Cratchit family drew round the hearth, and at Bob Cratchit's elbow stood the family display of glass; two tumblers and a custard-cup without a handle. These held the hot stuff from the jug, however, as well as golden goblets would have done, and Bob served it out with beaming looks, while the chestnuts on the fire sputtered and crackled noisily. Then Bob proposed:

"'A Merry Christmas to us all, my dears. God bless us!'"

"Which all the family re-echoed.

"'God bless us, every one!'" said Tiny Tim, the last of all."

(SCROOGE has gradually been undergoing a transformation as he has witnessed all these visions, and now as he absorbs the intense humanness of this scene he comes more nearly than ever a new man. Especially is he stirred when the family drink a slightly grudging toast to Scrooge himself. Then the spirit shows him other Christmas scenes: In a miner's hut, in a light-house, on ship, and at his nephew's gay party. Finally, the Ghost of Christmas Yet to Come, a speechless phantom, takes the other's place as guide and proceeds to show Scrooge the gruesome, fruitless and utterly lonely end of his own life unless its course is altered. It is also shown him that Tiny Tim will die unless he receives assistance. As Scrooge agonizes over his own unkept grave he awakens to find the phantom is his own bedpost. His supreme lesson is learned well, and he goes wild with joy at the consciousness of his new self. He becomes as extremely prodigal with his money and lavish with his kindness as he was miserly with both before. It is still Christmas day, and the new Scrooge proceeds to make the most of it, wishing everybody Merry Christmas, scattering money, visiting his nephew in the delirium of his awakening.)

The day after Christmas Bob Cratchit came to work late, which was just what Scrooge had hoped for.

"'A merry Christmas, Bob!'" said Scrooge, with an earnestness that could not be mistaken, as he clapped him on the back. "'A merrier Christmas, Bob, my good fellow, than I have given you for many a year! I'll raise your salary and endeavor to assist your struggling

family, and we will discuss your affairs this very afternoon, over a Christmas bowl of smoking bishop, Bob! Make up the fires and buy another coal-scuttle before you dot another i, Bob Cratchit!'"

"Scrooge was better than his word. He did it all, and infinitely more; and to Tiny Tim, who did not die, he was a second father. He became as good a friend, as good a master, and as good a man as the good old city knew, or any other good old city, town, or borough in the good old world.

"He had no further intercourse with spirits, but lived upon the total-abstinence principle ever afterwards; and it was always said of him that he knew how to keep Christmas well, if any man alive possessed the knowledge. May that be truly said of us, and all of us! And so, as Tiny Tim observed, 'God Bless Us, Every One!'"

liberate planning spoils most of the fun. Sports, dramatics, experimentation of all kinds in arts and crafts and sciences—these are the thrills that can be had that really satisfy that yen for self-expression and accomplishment. The short-wave radio's been a blessing beyond words.

Vicarious excitement, then, is the best we have to offer in most cases. The kids want the real thing, and we can't let them have it because it's dangerous. The need remains, and we may as well face the fact that dramatized adventure, regardless of its literary and artistic merits, satisfies that need. Perhaps if we understand what makes youngsters crave the blood-and-thunder, we'll be thankful that it's so easy, and cheap, and safe, to let them have their adventures over the air.

I've emphasized the word dramatize, I know; but the tempo of the world today is such that this is imperative. But I still contend that lessons can be stimulating and sparkle with interest, and be of benefit at the same time.

"Renfrew of the Mounted" was a splendid example of a good children's program. Unlike so many others, it had dignity of presentation, splendid delivery, excellent voices, and contained throughout an element of excitement and suspense without the usual nerve-racking devices.

Russia says, "Our only hope for the future lies in the child." Isn't that true in America also? But what are we doing about it? Instead of being the favored one in our vast radio family, it's but the stepchild which leads a catch-as-catch-can existence. Once in a while a plum drops into its lap; but for the most part the programs seem to have been prepared by inexperienced, neurotic adults, some of whom have either forgotten their own childhood or never had one.

Is there no way by which children's programs could be aired for a sane, supervisory audience of adults and a representative number of children to find out whether they contain the right combination of educational and entertainment value before they are broadcast to millions of children?

I've read the article "Will F. D. R. Be the First Radio Czar?" in RADIO GUIDE, which points out that broadcasting is being threatened within its own ranks. Undoubtedly that is true. Certainly the type of children's programs generally on the radio upholds the point. But why wait until we need a czar to dictate, when we might begin right now to remedy the evil by teaching future citizens how to think straight?


To my mind, a woman like Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt as supervisor of children's programs in America today would aid in great measure the overcoming of a dictator menace tomorrow. Mrs. Roosevelt has reared a family of her own and has grandchildren who keep her close to the minds of young children and their needs. She sees life clearly and sees it whole. Not only that, but Mrs. Roosevelt is familiar with the lives of children the length and breadth of the nation.

REALIZE that parents everywhere have not been outspoken enough on this vital subject, that if more of us were articulate it would help. In fact, that's the big reason I decided to put my thoughts and findings on paper. I know that we have a great many negative listeners on the air. What do I mean by a negative listener? One who simply shuts off the radio when he doesn't like what he tunes in on or twists the dial to something else. He complains, but he doesn't do anything about it.

One method I have found helpful in getting my children to cultivate good listening habits, and to discriminate between the good and the bad, is to listen with them and discuss the program afterward. In this way it is possible for me to cooperate with their teachers who are working toward the same goal. Certainly parents can't be lazy in this matter if they expect to have their children use the radio to advantage. They must be guided. Just putting them in front of the radio and telling them to listen to a certain program, because you or someone else has labeled it cultural, isn't going to accomplish results.

By listening with them, pulling the



program to pieces afterward, analyzing it with them, I believe I am helping them to discriminate and to develop their own inner resources. I've been amazed and delighted at the results. Especially delighted when my ten-year-old son with whom I'd been listening to a certain program said, "The way I figure this program, Mother, it's just a smart way of boosting what we don't want here in America—and that's fascism."

Believe me, I'm not trying to put all the blame for poor children's programs on the broadcaster, for I realize that it represents a joint problem for parents and those responsible for the programs heard on the air. If the parents' protest gathers enough volume, something will be done about it. However, I do feel definitely certain that if a clean

sweep were made of all children's programs on the radio today, and good ones were substituted for the present blood-and-thunder shows, youngsters everywhere would listen just as eagerly, maybe more so, and the results for the sponsors who spend their money to bring these programs to the air would be even greater than they are now. I believe that it would be possible to achieve the good-will of parents and teachers who are vitally interested in the future of America.

Recently a mother who has been very active in furthering the activities of better radio programs for children sent this beautiful thought to me. With profound gratitude to the sender, I now give it to you: "The heart of a child is a sanctuary; fill it with incense."

On Short Waves

THE little-known Balkan country of Albania is soon to have a modern short-wave station. The government desires to reach the many Albanians living outside of the kingdom in neighboring countries, and even in the United States, with programs of entertainment, patriotic speeches, propaganda, and news of Albania. The new transmitter which has already been purchased from Italy has a power of 3,000 watts, and will broadcast on the following three frequencies: 7.4875, 9.987 and 15.765 megs, the latter channel being reserved for broadcasts to North America. The transmitter will be housed in a new building close to the old wireless station on the outskirts of Tirana, while broadcasts will be made from studios in the Tirana City Hall.

"Vox Pop" broadcasts are not restricted to stations in the United States, since listeners to the Davenport, England, program entitled "In Town Tonight," which is broadcast on Saturdays at 2:30 p.m. EST, over GSG and GSP, have become quite familiar with a regular portion of this show, called "Standing on the Corner," in which Michael Standing (son of the great movie actor, the late Sir Guy Standing) of the BBC stands on some busy London corner, microphone in hand, and informally interviews Mr. and Mrs. Londoner as they pass.

Those interested in the technical side of radio will certainly appreciate the valuable lecture-course being given on Mondays at 8 p.m. EST, over W1XAL (6.04), the University Club station at Boston, Mass. Some of the subjects that will be covered within the next few weeks are: Rectifiers; radio-frequency oscillators; crystal oscillators; radio-frequency amplifiers; radio-telegraph transmitters; plate modulation, etc. A booklet containing diagrams, textual material and questions and answers pertaining to the lecture is available for the cost of printing.

The director of All-India Radio has sent me several copies of the current operating schedules for all short-wave stations in India. I will be glad

to send one of these schedules to any listener who writes in requesting same, as long as they last.

The Columbia Broadcasting System will shortly be able to direct its short-wave broadcasts to South America and Europe at the same time whenever desired. This will be accomplished by combining the services of W2XE, its station in New York, and W3XAU in Philadelphia. At present W3XAU is operating with a non-directional antenna. When its two new directional aerials, now under construction, are completed, it will be able to direct its broadcasts either to Latin America or Europe. Combining their services, W2XE and W3XAU will thus be able to cover a maximum area of both South America and Europe at all times with programs from the United States.

Captain Oxrieder of Corozal in the Canal Zone reports hearing a new station whose call started with TG on a frequency of 11.704 megs, at 12 noon EST . . . CB1180, Santiago, has shifted to a new frequency of 11.96 megs.

SHORT-WAVE SHORTS: Guatemala short-wave stations TG2 (6.19), TGQA (6.4) and TG3, operating as a network, broadcast a musical program for English listeners Sundays from 1 to 3 a.m. EST . . . The present operating schedule for short-wave station ZHP (9.69) of Singapore Straits Settlement is daily from 4:40 to 9:40 a.m. EST, Wednesdays from 12:40 to 1:40 a.m. EST, and Saturdays from 12:25 to 1:40 a.m. EST, and from 10:40 p.m. to Sundays at 1:10 a.m. EST . . . Operators of commercial short-wave station WXA (9.74) of Seattle, Wash., state it is against their policy to verify reception reports; however, reports sent to WXE (12.25) of Anchorage, Alaska, a member of the same aircraft network, will be verified . . . ORK (10.33) of Ruysselede, Belgium, is now operating daily from 1:30 to 3 p.m. EST. Reception of this station in the United States is normally poor, since its transmissions are beamed on the Belgian Congo in Africa.
