

SALUTE TO AMERICAN RADIO

Editor, RADIO GUIDE:

Occasionally you hear of an individual or a concern advocating government-owned radio in America. I was one of the first international artists ever to broadcast in Germany. In Berlin, there is only one radio station in operation and it is government-owned. Every German citizen with a radio receiving-set must pay the government two marks per month for the privilege of listening to government-censored programs. In England, they charge their listeners ten shillings for a license to house a receiving-set. After a listener has paid his fee, what he does hear is decidedly inferior to American offerings. If there's a long wait between scheduled broadcasts, an English announcer simply steps to the mike and says hurriedly, "We shall now play some gramophone records until the next program comes on." I salute American radio, which is NOT government-owned!

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THE STORY BEHIND THE COVER

"SNOW WHITE AND THE
SEVEN DWARFS" VISIT
LUX THEATER MONDAY



AN ELDERLY gentleman in Oklahoma saw "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" four times.

A young couple in Chicago affectionately call their expected first child "Dopey."

A pair of fond Negro parents in Alabama named their piccaninny "Snow White."

You probably know someone who makes you think of Sneezing or Doc stammering or Bashful blushing.

And you'll very probably be at your radio Monday night when "Lux Radio Theater" presents "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," with substantially the same cast that portrayed the voices on the screen.

You and I and millions of others have become Snow-White-conscious. The little princess and her seven tiny companions—especially Dopey—have become institutional, like matrimony, Santa Claus and taxes. We accept the characters as humans, and call them by their first names just as if we were comrades.

It is easy to drift into extravagant terms when speaking of this masterpiece of Walt Disney's, the modern Aladdin, for it is one movie production that deserves the application of the movie bromide "stupendous" if the word means anything at all.

This first full-length cartoon feature, from almost any angle, is actually stupendous. To be practical and American, take first the financial phase. We can slide over effusive general praise, but reduce a phenomenon to dollars

and cents and we all understand—and become interested. If you were offered the total original war debt to the U. S. of Finland, our most regular debtor, or the possible ultimate earnings of "Snow White," you might jump at the first offer. It might be wise to think twice, however, and then flip a coin; for the Finland debt was eight and one-half millions, and it is conjectured that the movie's gross income may reach an all-time high of \$10,000,000. It has passed the half-way mark and the dwarfs go blithely on singing—not Dopey—their hearty "heigh-ho."

Then there are the Disney related enterprises, which figure prominently in the financial receipts and the colossal publicity of the production. Saunter through a five-and-ten at Christmas shopping-time, spot the biggest single group, stroll over and see if it isn't Dopey—a very nearly alive marionette—stopping the show as usual, with both children and grown-ups gawking and laughing. Haunting the counters are dolls, picture-books, and even models of soap. Grumpy frowns from a lampshade. Snow White curtsies in the corner of a lace hanky. Sneezing winds up for a cataclysm on a plate. They're almost omnipresent. There are over 150 companies engaged in producing "Snow White" by-products, so it can't be denied that the depression has a fairy godmother!

Hollywood thought Walt Disney was crazy when the news first leaked out that he was planning to produce the fairy-tale as a full-length cartoon. Dis-

ney planned and worked serenely on, confident of his vision, but not even Walt, modest young man that he is, expected the fantasy to resolve itself into the biggest film revolution since the advent of sound a decade ago.

When "the tumult and the shouting dies," it will probably be found that this picture is the biggest smash hit of all time; and there isn't a big-name star in it—unless it's the name Dopey. Indeed, Dopey and Hitler are in the same category as world figures, for the picture has been shown in forty-six countries besides the United States, including such crossword-puzzle places as Iraq and Iran. The animated characters have been made to speak—all except Dopey—in ten different languages. The show was held over in Glasgow, giving rise to the comment that the picture even made Scotsmen loosen their purse-strings. At Bombay, India, the show got more publicity than Mahatma Gandhi's hunger fasts, and fans stormed the doors with such vehemence that you might have thought they were fleeing from "untouchables."

HOW large a part the music played in the success of the picture and how much the story contributed to the popularity proportions of the music cannot be exactly analyzed. The two go together like ham and eggs, and either has enough merit of its own to stand alone. There were more real song-hits woven into the picture by the artistry of Frank Churchill, Larry Morey and Albert Hay Malotte than are heard in most strictly musical films. As a group the tunes formed a flying wedge that almost monopolized the radio field of popular tunes for a while, and several of them even went into the class of popular music that lives beyond a few months. The stirring "Heigh-Ho," the rollicking "Whistle While You Work," the plaintive "One Song," and others collectively contributed many hours of delightful entertainment on the air, and

once in a while we still hear one of them tunefully revived. Placed in their original settings, the songs are even more appealing, bearing out the fact that imagination and music walk arm in arm, both springing from beneath the hard but thin surface of everyday realism.


Few of us really want to grow up and become hardened, do we? Circumstances prod us away from the sweet, simple imaginings of childhood. It takes a renaissance like the colorful Snow White fantasy to acquaint us with those fundamental stirrings in our hearts—and there, embellished with melody, genuine fun, and picturesqueness—is the secret of Snow White's and Disney's accomplishment.

The whole phenomenon, astounding in our modern hard-fisted world, is a ringing triumph for pure fancy and simplicity, and it proves quite conclusively that we all believe in fairies, for which we may well give thanks. Puck, the most Disney-like of Shakespeare's characters, once said, "What fools these mortals be!" but cute little Dopey just dumbly grins and proves that sometimes it is wise to be foolish.

This very Dopey, who stole the show and tucked it safely away in the spacious folds of his flowing garment, may be the permanent perpetrator of the show. Disney has indicated that the immense popularity of this particular little gnome may persuade him to make Dopey a regular character like Donald Duck and Mickey Mouse. Long live Dopey!

By the way, you can hear—yes, hear—Dopey in this "Snow White" radio production Monday. Oh, no, he won't talk, not even for radio, but he'll have a bell on!



TELEVISION

BOOM OR BUBBLE?



WHAT ARE THE ACTUAL OBSTACLES,
THE POSSIBILITIES OF TELEVISION?
THIS SECOND ARTICLE EXPLAINS IT

IN THIS continuation of our discussion of television, we apologize in advance for the terms and the figures which we are about to inflict upon you. We don't like them, but we must use them. Such words as "coaxial cable," for example; such figures as \$700,000,000. It is very confusing, and it is very important.

If you read last week's article, you know that the television ray does not go farther than the horizon, or approximately forty-five miles from the broadcasting station; that television sets do not perform satisfactorily when situated below the fifth or sixth floor of apartment buildings which are close to automotive highways; that a camera similar to a motion-picture camera must limit every broadcast that comes into your home; that the picture you may expect to see at home will be about the size of a business letterhead; that the set itself will cost you from \$150 to \$1,000; that no one knows what television programs will be like, and that if all the motion pictures made annually were televised to you at the rate of ten hours a day, they would be exhausted in one month; that in television today you cannot turn a dial and get the station you want, your set being synchronized and teamed with but one single television station.

Now, in view of the promise that New Yorkers may expect public television next year, what may other citizens of these spacious United States expect? To date, plans have been announced for a station in Chicago and one in Hollywood, but keep in mind that no

station yet has been authorized by the Federal Communications Commission to make any money out of its television broadcasting. The incentive to create broadcasts, obviously, remains nil. Nor have any schedules of regular programs been promised except in New York.

Beyond that, it's anybody's guess.

Over in England, where their government finances both broadcasting and television, the public has been invited to avail itself of as fine a television station as tax money could create. We who are much like England in our tastes, our institutions and our reactions may look at our cousins and their television across the Atlantic and form some idea of what we ourselves may do when television is offered to us. In England, after two years of carefully supervised and expert television broadcasting, less than ten thousand people have purchased television sets. Not a response to indicate a television boom here, is it?

There television programs run for approximately two and one-half hours per day. Those two and one-half hours per day are costing the British government \$2,500,000 each year. Roughly, one hour of television every day for a year costs \$1,000,000. British taxpayers pay that bill, though less than ten thousand out of forty-six millions of people can get the benefit.

For more than a year now there has been much talk about a coaxial cable, a miraculous sort of wire that is the only wire known which will carry television impulses. It was developed at

great expense by the American Telephone Company, and an experimental line was laid between Philadelphia and New York. At the conclusion of secret experiments, great things were predicted. Abroad, the practical-minded British wanted to form the first link of a television network; they wanted to send the television programs originating in London to a television station in another city. So they bought and laid a coaxial cable. The cost was terrific. The results, so far as we know, were unsatisfactory. We understand they are laying another coaxial cable to replace the first.

IT WILL succeed eventually, of course.

Of that we haven't the slightest doubt. But we are skeptical of its broad use until its price is revised. A coaxial cable costs, for example, one dollar per foot to manufacture, and another dollar per foot to install. The regular broadcasting networks in this country have available and sometimes use 70,000 miles of telephone wire. To match that with coaxial cable somebody must spend \$700,000,000. Even to match one of NBC's networks would cost \$120,000,000.

Brother, can you spare a dime?

The English have been listening to television programs for two years and have been spending a good part of that time accustoming themselves to its unexpected demands. We have schooled ourselves to go to the theater and watch full-grown people in a full-grown room, or to go to the motion-picture house and watch suppersize people on giant screens, but we have had no experience watching these same scenes and people reduced to proportions that will fit on an eight-by-twelve screen. English "watchers" report a terrific strain on the eyes, especially when the action may be so swift as to be almost invisible. In a televised tennis game, for example, one doesn't see the tennis ball at all, only the scurrying about of the players.

A recent English telecast treated its audience to a full two-hour play. We understand that headaches, burning eyes, and general disgust was the result. Next year we may learn much in this direction also.

As the British have attempted to find satisfactory programs, they have floundered badly, as we shall flounder, because everything must be done on a budget and everything must be modified by experience. Some of their programs are talks on flowers, with the lecturer holding the various blooms in his fingers so that the "lookers" might see. There are playlets, tap-dancing and kitchen recipes. One recent program presented the thrilling spectacle of a window sash being repaired.

TO UNDERSTAND more accurately the telecast bill-of-fare that is being fed English audiences, after two years of experimenting, let us look at the British Broadcasting Corporation's schedule for Sunday, November 20—and this was a typical day.

- 8:50 p.m.—News bulletin.
- 9:05 p.m.—Playlet, "Queens of France" by Thornton Wilder.
- 9:25 p.m.—Film, "Spain of Yesterday," travelog.
- 9:35 p.m.—Starlight—astronomy talk.
- 9:45 p.m.—Cartoon film.
- 9:50 p.m.—"What Does It Mean?"—an English version of our own question bee.

And so to bed.

Here is Friday, another typical day.

- 3:00 p.m.—The New English Ballet, fifteen minutes of dancing.
- 3:15 p.m.—Cartoon film.
- 3:20 p.m.—Cooking lesson.
- 3:35 p.m.—Newsreel.

- 3:45 p.m.—A twenty-minute play.
- 9:00 p.m.—More cooking lessons.
- 9:15 p.m.—Cartoon film.
- 9:20 p.m.—How to be a Ballroom Dancer.
- 9:35 p.m.—Newsreel.
- 9:45 p.m.—How to Play Bridge.
- 10:00 p.m.—Travelog film.
- 10:10 p.m.—Orchestra and singer.
- 10:20 p.m.—News bulletin.

Is there anything in the above to excite listeners who are now enjoying Jack Benny and Charlie McCarthy, the Ford Sunday Evening Hour, talks by Anthony Eden? Is there anything in the above to indicate that next year may witness a television boom?

Imagine those programs being offered to the listeners of the United States, and to your own next-door neighbor who is a prospect for a television receiver. But they could do better with more money, you say. Perhaps, but from where will that money come? Our government might supply it, if appropriate laws were passed and if our people decided that television broadcasting should be a function of government; or the television-set manufacturers might supply it, hoping that they would make it back by their profits on sets sold, just as they did when they set up the first network of the National Broadcasting Company; or advertisers might be found who could make a profit from the sale of their merchandise by means of television.

But immediately we run into objections. One, most citizens do not want our government to become mixed up with broadcasting, fearing that the consequence will be censorship and ultimate control of all programs.

TWO, set manufacturers could not possibly stand the tremendous cost of broadcasts on networks as they did in the early days of straight broadcasting, because television costs are ten times as great as that of sound-broadcasting. In 1920 the program formula quite often was to lock a singer, a piano-player, and a bottle of whisky in a room with a microphone. When the whisky ran out, the broadcast was over.


Three, advertisers might foot the bill if they could reach a large public, but it is improbable, on the evidence produced in England, that a large public will be attracted to television soon.

Among some of the men who know radio well, there is a feeling that television is further distant than recent headlines have led us to believe. For instance, Commander E. F. McDonald, Jr., president of the Zenith Radio Corporation, recently told his stockholders: "Any sale of television receiving-sets today will unquestionably react unfavorably on the manufacturer who has put them on the market. Good business judgment as well as fairness indicate that this is not the time to sell television to the American people."

Carlton L. Dyer, managing director of the Philco Radio and Television Corporation in England, has said, "I firmly believe that America will progress far more rapidly than England, where television is finally a governmental venture. Even so, you can hardly anticipate progress to the point of a common national acceptance and demand in much less than the next five years. We have had good television in England for two years and less than 4,000 people have found this new form of entertainment of sufficient interest to invest as little as \$105 for a receiver."

In short, our television boom of today is indeed a bubble.

But what next? That question must be answered not only for the public but for some of our American radio corporations, one of which has invested approximately \$20,000,000 in its



DRAMA

The dramatic shows seem to have been neglected in the midst of the holiday fever. There are, however, two productions definitely scheduled at this time, in addition to the "Snow White" presentation (page 1).

Conrad Nagel, whose distinction as an actor has outlived the careers of many flashier screen idols, will step from the wings to the center of the stage this week on the "Silver Theater." In addition to his m.c. duties, Nagel will star with Ida Lupino, young English screen actress, in David Garth's radio play, "Challenge for Three." (Sunday, CBS, 6:00 p.m. EST, 5:00 CST, 4:00 MST, 3:00 PST.)

For the first time this week the late Henry Van Dyke's immortal Christmas story, "The Sad Shepherd," will be presented on the air. The story is being produced by MBS and the Federal Theatre Radio Division by special permission of Charles Scribner's Sons. supposed deeds of the elusive Mr. Bunyan.



DUEL FOR DEMOCRACY

—Wednesday, NBC

"The Public Interest in Democracy" is a title that tells a story. It is the title of a new program that began last week, presenting a conversational huddle between two nationally known political commentators, Mark Sullivan and Jay Franklin. The set-up has two definite lines of interest. In the first place, as indicated in the title, it is built around the quickening interest of the average man and woman in the present battle-lines between democracy and dictatorship. In the second place, the program plays upon the intensified shifting of party lines into "liberal" and "conservative" groups. Sullivan is classed as a conservative, Franklin as a liberal. Sullivan has opposed the present administration in such matters as NRA, court plan, and other steps tending toward centralization; but he has upheld Secretary Hull's foreign policy. Franklin has criticized some phases of the foreign policy and has supported government reorganization and TVA. It should be interesting to hear ourselves speaking in some measure many of our strong opinions, phrased by the expertness of Sullivan and Franklin.

WEEK'S BETTER PROGRAMS

OVER-TONE

Thursday, CBS

It seems that Santa Claus is not Kate Smith's only regular visitor at Christmas time; at least, not so far as her radio program is concerned. Maybe Franchot Tone brought Kate some stick candy last year when he appeared on her last program of 1937 and got himself an invitation to return this year. However, the real reason Kate is entertaining the film star on her last 1938 broadcast probably is that Franchot is one of the movie actors who really click with radio listeners. 



THE RADIO PLAYBILL: THIS WEEK — "AUNT JENNY'S STORIES"



"AUNT JENNY'S STORIES" first came to the radio audience slightly less than two years ago. The listeners were quick to accept its true-to-life nature and the feature soon became one of the leading daytime shows. It is estimated that today approximately 9,000,000 people listen each week to "Aunt Jenny." The program is built around the storyteller, a kindly, warm-hearted woman whom everyone in her small town calls Aunt Jenny. Her real name is Mrs. Calvin Wheeler, and she is the wife of the editor of the town paper. Her stories from real life combine love, humor, pathos and adventure. They are dramatized by a capable cast of radio artists. In the course of the informal stories the listener makes the acquaintance of various members of Aunt Jenny's family and some of her friends who drop in to chat with her. There are Calvin Wheeler, her husband, Sylvia, her daughter, little Tommy, her grandson, Betty Newcomb, the little bride who lives down the road, and Fred Cooper, the town postman. Women the country over respond to the friendliness and sincerity of Aunt Jenny. Typical of the thousands of letters which pour in to her is the one which read: "I listen to your stories every day, and I've laughed and cried with you so much that it seems we have known each other for life." Not over-melodramatic nor gushy with sentiment, not extremely gripping from the standpoint of action, yet the "stories" of Aunt Jenny continue to please, because they might be the stories of our lives. Speaking Up

On the day after Christmas, the Metropolitan Opera House will be filled with stiffly scrubbed little boys, sitting carefully on the edge of their seats, listening to their first opera, "Haensel and Gretel," the old Grimms' fairy-tale, with music by Humperdinck, of the sister and brother who get lost in the woods and are captured by the witch, serves many parents as their children's introduction to music. It is one of the few operas in which the characters don't all expire in a welter of blood at the end, and the music is light, melodious and easy to follow. Children love the second act scene when angels descend a golden staircase from Heaven; and the thrilling moment when Gretel rescues Haensel and pushes the witch into the roaring-hot oven.

Dorothee Manski's hair-raising performance of the big, bad witch draws shrieks of excitement from the young audience. Queena Mario, who recently announced her forthcoming retirement, plays Gretel, and Irene Jessner, Haensel.

Here it is Christmas, and we worrying about presents and the after-effects of too much turkey, and now, to add to our trials, comes the news that Samuel Barber, composer of the Adagio for Strings (premiered by Toscanini) is a baritone. What's more, he's prepared to prove it when he does a group of folk-songs and carols on the Curtis Institute program on Monday. Singing may be merely Mr. Barber's hobby, but it's our private suspicion that he yearns to star in an opera of his own composition. What with Toscanini turning composer and Barber involved with carols and Benny Goodman's adventures with the Budapest String Quartet, music certainly keeps us on the jump these days.

The next two excursions of the NBC Symphony Orchestra and Toscanini will be to Baltimore on December 27 and Boston on January 10.

Why is the Boston Symphony Orchestra the stepchild of radio? One of the best and oldest orchestras in the count— it is the least known on the air. Koussevitzky, its conductor, is rated by many as the equal of Toscanini.

BEETHOVEN, already successful as a symphonic composer, had long busied himself with the idea of writing an opera but rejected many proposed librettos until Joseph Sonnleithner supplied him with the story of "Fidelio," a tale of political persecution offset against womanly faith and devotion. Himself a passionate believer in personal freedom, justice, and the nobility of conjugal love, Beethoven found ideal matter in the Sonnleithner story based on a French romance by Bouilly.

After much painstaking labor so characteristic of the self-critical Beethoven, he completed "Fidelio" in 1805, and that year saw its premiere in Vienna, but the occasion spelled failure because of the composer's preference for orchestral domination and his exacting demands upon the voice. Even a revision performed in 1806 met the same fate, and it was not until 1814, after further changes, that Beethoven saw his opera win success.

He wrote four overtures for "Fidelio" (two are now discarded), one used before the first act and the other, known as "Leonore No. 3" (Beethoven at first desired his opera to be called "Leonore"), precedes the final


Don Fernando, minister of the interior, is expected to visit the prison, and Pizarro orders Rocco to murder Florestan immediately. The jailer refuses and Pizarro decides to commit the crime himself. Leonore obtains permission for the miserable prisoners to walk in the courtyard for a few minutes, and the act ends with a touching chorus sung by them, "O Welche Lust" (Oh, Sweet Joy), expressive of their happiness at seeing the sunlight again. The only lighter note of the act is the comic unhappiness of the naive Jacquino, enamored of Marcellina. He figures in the earlier enchanting quartet, "Mir ist so wunderbar" (So wonderful to me it seems), with the two women and Rocco.

ALEXANDER SCRIBIN (1872-1915) visited New York a number of years ago and appeared there as a pianist. I remember him as a small man, slight, elegantly groomed, his chin adorned with a bit of aristocratic goatee. He played some of his own keyboard works, suggesting the influence of Chopin and Liszt. Later he developed his own individuality, fully matured when he devoted himself to orchestral creation. His third symphony ("Divine Poem") is divided into three parts, "Struggles," "Sensual Pleasures," and "Divine Joy." The music is intensely personal, descriptive.

EVENTS THAT SHOOK THE WORLD



The nation shuddered when on June 19 of this year the Olympian, crack flyer of the Milwaukee Railroad, crossing a flood-weakened bridge over

Custer Creek in Montana, crashed through into the swollen river, killing more than forty persons, the worst railroad tragedy of recent years

GONE is your radio, your daily newspaper, your newsreel. Gone are motor cars, airplanes, and the other fixtures of 1938. For you are living in 1815, Mrs. Smith, in a quaint side street in old New Orleans. The air is hushed and hot, pregnant with that soft fullness that bespeaks dire events.

Even now, just beyond the city, the heavy red line of the British army is charging across the plain toward General Andrew Jackson's trenches. Yankee musketeers and creole cannoners stand shoulder to shoulder, and as you listen you hear the first booming cannon shots of the Battle of New Orleans. Your heart quickens and your hands turn cold, for your Jim is out there with his musket, Mrs. Smith, standing under his general's orders to defend his country and his home. As the patter of rifles and cannon-fire echo distantly, the hours pass unmeasured except by your prayer, "Dear God, keep my Jim safe."

Then the battle is over and the men have come home. New Orleans is saved, for the British have withdrawn, leaving

hundreds dead on the field.

Leaving your Jim dead on the field, too.

You found the body and you felt like dying with him, so great was the bruise on your heart, but you knew that other women had lost as much or more, so you choked back your tears and helped him into a respectable grave.

But the other thing was what spilled tears down your cheeks while you shrilled in crazed hysterics. The other thing hit you all of a sudden that afternoon the messenger arrived from the North and told New Orleans that England and the United States had signed a treaty of peace five weeks ago. Five weeks ago! Good heavens! Jim was alive then. He had marched

out to fight for his country only a week back; he had stood before British volleys until his blood run into his shoes. Great God! He had died while English and American diplomats feasted together in London, celebrating the peace.

If only the news had come in time. Since the Battle of New Orleans was fought so gloriously but so unnecessarily, communications have speeded up. News travels faster, too. Today, with the speed of light, it comes into your parlor or is delivered on your front porch each evening. Today you live with it and by it, planning your shopping (advertisements are news of bargains), your picnics (weather reports are news), and your entertainment (What do they say about

that picture down at the Bijou, dear?) as it reaches your interested ears.

So it is not surprising that the waning year of 1938 finds our networks preparing a summary of the history-in-the-making events we have just experienced. Two spectacular programs are planned, testimonials to the importance of news.


The first of these, appropriately enough, reaches back ninety years to dramatize a momentous occasion. That occasion was the founding of an organization which has done more to accelerate the flow of news to all of us than any one force in our life. That founding saw a group of far-seeing Americans cooperating for the advancement of news reporting out of the infant stage. Since then the Associated Press has grown with the growing of the news. The enterprising, determined spirit that fathered and fostered its organization has not changed—only the outward methods have changed with the progress of time.

I'm told this new show is so sad that when it was auditioned a couple of weeks ago it got the best of Harry Hicks, who was the engineer in the control-room, and Harry actually shed tears—the big Hicks . . . After two years on the "Saturday Night Swing Club," Leith Stevens has departed from that show and turned over the baton to Walter Gross. Announcer Mel Allen has also been replaced by Dan Seymour, who also does the splicing on Benny Goodman's swing sessions. Incidentally, the show shifts to an earlier time on January 14.

The Three Ambassadors, who started out with Phil Harris in California years ago and have been on the Kate Smith show for the past three years, leave that program and return to their native California, where they will join the singing group on the Eddie Cantor show when the comic returns to the Coast. They've been on the Cantor show every week since he came east . . . A series of Fu Manchu recordings will probably be heard over your local station before long. I heard the first few episodes at a private audition last week and they pack plenty of thrills and are full of suspense. Hi-Yo, Fu Manchu! . . . Welcome Lewis, who has been away from the networks too long, has an interesting show called "Singing Bee," which is being aired over WHN in New York. It's a combination of musical quiz and community sing, which should be a good bet for some sponsor.

Mr. Crumit—It Isn't Cricket

Mr. Frank Crumit, you generally ask the questions on your Tuesday night broadcasts, but I'd like to take the liberty of asking you a question. A couple of programs ago, Mr. C., you presented a show featuring male and female dramatic stars of the air. Included in the press release that reached my desk was the name of Bud Collyer, who appears on "Pretty Kitty Kelly" and numerous other shows. However, Mr. Collyer was conspicuous by his absence on that program and I went out to find the reason for it. I learned from an authentic source that the actor reported at the studio at the appointed time, having traveled quite a few miles from his home to be there, only to be told by you at the last moment that you were sorry but that someone else would be on the show in his place and would he mind stepping aside. The question I would like answered is, Why you didn't think of asking actors Ted DiCorsia or Al Swenson, who were asked to appear on the show after Collyer, to step aside? Mr. Crumit, I'm afraid you are guilty of a very bad piece of mismanagement, for which I point my thumbs downward at you.



SHE SELLS HUMAN BEINGS



When listeners-in hear some particular radio artist over CBS who fits his role to a "T," ten to one Gertrude Lanza and her unique way of cataloging talent had a lot to do with the star's success

THE world is full of talent, but to get just the right artist in the right spot on a radio program was a difficult task before Gertrude Lanza of the CBS Artists Bureau in New York City came along with her unique plan of selling human beings' talent through artists' presentation books. Prior to that, sponsors and program-makers had a tough time. They spent long hours looking for a player to fill some special role. Voice, personality, appearance, experience—all had to be considered with no one source of checking it. Miss Lanza's method of putting the history of each artist's work into individual books solved the problem. Now CBS salesmen, sponsors interested in buying talent can turn to these books and find what radio artists have done and are doing. They find all press clippings, published and unpublished photos, sound and every potentiality.

On Dec. 1 Herman B Wells became youngest state university prexy

New Prexy for Indiana U., New Ally for Radio

When Indiana University inaugurated president No. 11 on December 1, the occasion had several significant angles. For the university, Herman B Wells was the first new president in nine college generations; for Wells it meant the distinctive recognition due the youngest president of any state university in the country*; for radio-education it meant the support of another ally.

One of Herman B Wells' first acts upon taking over the administration was to establish a radio workshop in the division of speech. This work has proved so popular that radio classes are swamped with applications. Three faculty members are now working part time in teaching broadcasting, script-writing, program-planning, directing, and radio-research.

Wells was dean of the College of Business Administration at Indiana University before the presidency came his way. He is an internationally famous authority on banking and banking laws, and it is this fame that brought him back to his alma mater six years ago.

*Wells is thirty-six years old.

Youthbuilders' Idea Worth Copying

To show how the press, radio and motion pictures may be used to advantage in giving the child a graphic appreciation of the world in which he must live and achieve success is the theme of "Your Child Series," presented over station WNEW, New York City. The programs are prepared as an adult-education feature for parents by Youthbuilders, Inc., which, to quote their own pamphlet, is "an organization founded to help parents, teachers and leaders in youth-work fulfill their responsibility for bringing up a generation of fair-minded and courageous citizens."

Judging from the outline of the programs in this series, the job they are doing is one that would fill a great need in any community. WHAT has always been a serious threat to the effectiveness of round-table broadcasting arises from the fact that no suitable arrangements have ever been discovered for receiving and answering, during the broadcast, questions raised in the minds of listeners by the speakers' comments. *Bring an audience into the studio; their questions should accurately represent those of the unseen audience.* This first suggests itself as the answer to the problem. It is not, however, because every time you admit an audience to a round-table broadcast you alter one of the most vital factors of that type of program . . .

the atmosphere of the studio. Round-table speakers invariably tend to direct their comments at the "seen" rather than at the "unseen" audience, in many cases don't feel free to say the same things they would if the audience were not within view reacting to

every single statement that is made.

Dr. Clarence M. Morgan, director of radio activities for Indiana State Teachers' College, has a solution to this problem that is working admirably at station WBOW and therefore should help overcome this obstacle elsewhere. Instead of bringing an audience into the same studio with the round-tables, he assembles them in an adjacent audition-room, where the broadcast comes to them under much the same conditions that exist in the average home. When comments of the round-tables raise questions in the minds of this audience, they jot them down on a slip of paper and have an attendant deliver them to the round-tables. This is Dr. Morgan's solution to the confusing round-table problem, and it is working satisfactorily with I. S. T. C. round-table broadcasts without affecting the atmosphere of the studio.


WPA ON THE AIR

AN OUTSTANDING civic service project is that being supervised by the U. S. Works Progress Administration in New York City. Organized in 1937, the project started as an experiment to bring unemployed white-collar workers into direct contact with opportunity via radio. Today the unit occupies an entire floor of office space and prepares, directs and presents its own radio programs.* At the start the job was to organize writers, actors, directors and technical experts out of fifty thousand available workers, practically none of whom had any previous radio training. Today there is an acting company, continuity and directorial departments and a full-

force office staff that is a self-contained producing unit for the service of New York's metropolitan stations.

In less than two years the project has produced the following results: (1) Many workers have found employment in private industry from their experience with this unit; (2) New York City homes have available more and a better brand of interesting educational programs than ever before. Individuals have profited by this project and the citizens of the city as well.

Young Writer-Director Gives New Life to Old Friends

Prolific best describes Shayon, writer-director of the Federal Theater Radio Division's new Mutual network series of famous fairy-tales from many lands. Robert Lewis Shayon is only twenty-five years old, but a list of his associations reads like a directory of the entertainment field. Song-writing and adapting, he's done that; stage show producing, he's done that; writing and directing for radio and the movies, he's done that. In fact, there is hardly any phase of writing, producing or directing in the entertainment field—be it radio, screen or stage—that he hasn't had experience with at some time or other.

This logically leads up to the reason why "Once Upon a Time," though only a few weeks old, has scored such a decided hit with adults as well as children. Further than this, the success of this series is another excellent example of what can be done with an idea that is basically educational when a talented man supervises the job.

Of itself, the series has many interesting angles. Here for the first time a class of writing that has maintained popularity generation after generation is given serious radio treatment. Of all types of writing, fairy-tales are unique in that they hold their charm year to year, while most other types of writing have either lagged in appeal or died altogether. Presented over the air with all the modern resources of radio, our old friends, the giants, fairies, gnomes, and witches take on new life, coming to us as more lively beings than ever before. The series is scheduled for a thirteen-week run, and in the list we find the favorite stories from many countries a really interesting panorama of the fantastic traditions of the world.

"Pinocchio" will be dramatized on Saturday, December 31. Following in order will be "The Blue Bird," "Jack and the Beanstalk," "Emeylan, the Fool," "The Pied Piper," "The Fisherman and His Soul," "The Devil's Mother-in-Law," "How the River God's Wedding Was Broken Off" and "Rip Van Winkle."

RECORDS OF THE WEEK

A department reviewing the recordings of your radio favorites

Air Raid:

TAKEN right off the air from the Columbia Workshop presentation of Archibald MacLeish's remarkable script, "Air Raid" is a great step forward in the world of commercial recordings. The quality of the cutting is not always excellent, the sales probably won't be big, but the artistic level of the album is without question.

The first thing one hastens to explain about the work is that it is NOT the Orson Welles jiggers-here-come-the-men-from-Mars broadcast, which was a Sunday evening Mercury Theater job. This one was presented of a Thursday last month on the CBS Workshop series, a series which has championed and developed some of the most forward of techniques in radio. MacLeish's theory that in the announcer-narrator radio has a great implement is exemplified well, and Frank Gallop does magnificently as narrator in this poetic description of the impending arrival of the bombing planes. The dramatic build to the final air raid is accomplished with effective montage, stressing the simple lives of the women and children, and how the modern war brings blood and death to their kitchens and back yards. As drama as well as propaganda, "Air Raid" is priceless.

The publication of this album brings to mind how impermanent and fleeting our radio programs can be. Granted that 95 percent of them are entertaining once and not twice (if that), there are still many moments on the air which are unfortunately gone forever and there's no retrieving them.

And radio producers seem to shy almost exclusively from a repeat performance of any nature, Lionel Barrymore's annual Christmas Carol excepted. Of course, home recording-machines capture those fleeting moments, but they cost dough.

So we hope more off-the-air records are issued, such as the "Air Raid" album. (Columbia 50382-5. \$4.)

Other Christmas-aimed albums of note include the Gershwin Rhapsody in Blue, done in a special two-piano transcription, with verve and color by Jose Iturbi and his sister Amparo. (Victor album 517. \$4.50) . . . a set of Mexican melodies.

A symphonic synthesis by Stokowski and the Philadelphia of Wagner's Tristan und Isolde—tremendous stuff by Wagner's greatest synthesizer, lengthier rapture in next week's column. (Victor 508. \$9.)

Christmas Carols of Many Lands, sung in the ethereal manner of the world-famous Vienna Choir Boys—and the word ethereal is no overstatement. There are the obvious carols, Silent Night, Adeste Fidelis, and some lesser-known Tyrolean, American Indian, Silesian Christmas songs. Delightful. (Victor album C-3. \$6.50.)

Many children's albums by Frank Luther on Decca, the Jerome Kern potpourri (Victor), a fine Debussy set of nocturnes on Columbia, a set of Hebraic church songs by five cantors (Victor S-100), the Swing Session with Benny Goodman (Victor) . . . and once again, "Air Raid."

the Kate Smith and Eddie Cantor shows and in private life is Mrs. Al Rinker, wife of the CBS Swing Club producer, straining her eyes reading a newspaper in the subway. At rehearsals she knits between numbers. I'm afraid you're going to need glasses pretty soon, Mrs. R.

"Your Hit Parade" has been having so many changes lately that I went up to CBS' Playhouse 3 last Saturday to see how the new program was shaping up. I arrived there about three in the afternoon and found the whole cast assembled, except for the Raymond Scott Quintet, who come in only for dress rehearsals. They start rehearsals about eleven in the morning each Saturday and go straight through the day. Most of the principals were lounging around in sports clothes when I arrived, while the orchestra under Al Goodman's direction was going through a number. It looked almost like a Hollywood rehearsal, for only in Hollywood do radio stars usually appear in such informal costumes. Andre Baruch, announcer of the program, wore a corduroy shirt and bright wool socks; director Al Goodman had on a dark sports shirt. Lanny Ross brought in the conservative touch, in a sober gray suit of the type he usually wears. As usual, the orchestra men were ribbing Andre about his outfit; and this time they had a new cause for gags. Andre has recently won a prize as a champion amateur male cook—and you can imagine the wisecracks that leaves him open to. Lanny Ross, tall and lean, seemed to be having a hard time fitting himself

into one of the orchestra seats during rehearsal. His long legs were almost up to his nose. When it came time for dress rehearsal, Raymond Scott and his six-man quintet appeared and went through their numbers. The admiration for the quintet among the fifty-five musicians of the band was obvious.

You may have wondered why Rochester didn't appear on the first Jack Benny broadcast from New York. Well, the report is that he got "lost" up in Harlem and didn't show up for rehearsal, causing Mr. Benny to be quite peeved at his comical stooge and cutting the ducky's part out of the script. At the second Benny broadcast, the Jack of the jokes apparently again became peeved when he noticed eight empty seats in the third row a few minutes before the program was to go on the air and yelled at the page-boys from the stage, "What are you holding these seats for?" With tickets practically impossible to get, the pages had to go in the hall to recruit people to fill the seats. At the first week's broadcast, there were about fifty empty seats in the studio, which didn't please the comic. When Don Wilson announced before the broadcast that Kenny Baker would not be on the program, as he had to return to California, there were a lot of "ohs!" and "darnits" from the gals in the studio. During the broadcast Jack reprimanded Phil for using Peter Van Steeden's orchestra while he was in New York because they were loyal Allen listeners and wouldn't laugh at any of his gags. However, Jack didn't tell the listeners that he was using two of Fred's "Mighty Allen Art Players" for his sketch.

In RADIO GUIDE for November 26, page 5, the following statement appears: "The story is tied to the present by the announcement a few weeks ago that nicotine is another cure for pellagra."

This statement is most unfortunate. Nicotine, the alkaloid of tobacco, is a deadly poison. When nicotine is subjected to certain chemical treatment it breaks up, one part of the molecule being named nicotinic acid. It is nicotinic acid, a relatively harmless substance, and not nicotine, that has been used in the treatment of pellagra.

some of those early events that it covered to see how that real journalistic, real American spirit was expressing itself in prophecy of a long career of praiseworthy service.

A cub reporter on his first big assignment crawls through the smoke with sabers still rattling and shells still exploding over the battlefield of Gettysburg. Through the human shamble he picks his way. He bumps into a still body in a gray—and red-spotted—cavalry uniform. A riderless horse is snorting near by. The young reporter springs into the saddle and rides for the town of Gettysburg, not to spread a warning, for the battle is almost over. He rides to spread the news of Pickett's ill-fated charge and a Union victory. It's the turning-point of the war! It's a headliner! It may be a scoop! The young reporter is concerned with the business at hand. He does not think that his act is a preview of other scenes fifty years later, when reporters like Floyd Gibbons on a scarred battlefield somewhere in France will brave the deadly machine-gun fire to bring back the news, the complete news—and bring it first!


Again: A man wearing hip-boots, water-soaked clothing and a harried expression stands at a drug-store telephone making what he fears may be his last call from Johnstown to Pittsburgh. The telephone lines cannot stand much longer, nor can he. The water swirling through the streets into the buildings is already creeping up to his knees. Soon he must desert his post to find other means of communication—a boat, perhaps. But, somehow, the news must go through, news that means life and death. This reporter of 1889 covering the Johnstown flood is thankful for the telephone, which is still young enough to be a marvel to his times. Perhaps he will live to see his deed re-enacted, when reporters and ham short-wave operators will fight with hunger, exposure and the raging waters of the Ohio to bring an anxious world word of disaster and need, in little Shawneetown, Illinois, or great Cincinnati, Ohio, not only for the sake of the news itself but also for the sake of property—and lives.

The pace of events quickens. An AP foreign correspondent is casually witnessing the visit of Archduke Ferdinand to Sarajevo. A shot rings out; the correspondent dashes for a cable office; the New York editor reads a cablegram and shouts, "Archduke Ferdinand shot! It means war!" It is not impossible that the same correspondent, or his son, twenty-five years later will frantically wire New York that a young Jewish refugee has killed a Nazi official; that it will mean inhuman race-persecution. Or maybe one of those correspondents will in the near future wire that new Radio City AP office that somebody else has been shot in Europe and that it means another war. Who knows?

So here let us pause, reflect a moment on the difference between 1815 and 1938, and then consider the second of the two big programs, this one to be presented by CBS on Saturday. It is called "Twelve Crowded Months"—and twelve crowded months they have, indeed, been.

We have never seen, and, perhaps, we shall never see again such a year crammed with action and import. We have seen an Austrian house-painter



pick up a bigger brush with sharper bristles and paint new flags and new maps and paint himself black in the eyes of humanity. We have seen statesmen playing with dynamite and with lives and, whether by their own contrivance or simply by the grace of God, escaping the great explosion.

We have seen how barbarism and race-hatred still survive, at least in the narrow minds of egoistic imperialists.

We have experienced or read about floods and hurricanes, elections and purges.

We have seen how a Howard Hughes can circle the world in the air, even if men can not yet encircle it with brotherhood. We have seen how an unassuming Douglas Corrigan can pull the biggest hoax of the time and win the overwhelming regard of the multitudes.

We have seen how radio itself, great reporting-agent that it is, sometimes makes news itself in a big way, for the Orson Welles "War of the Worlds" fiasco of last October 30 turned out to be America's biggest Hallowe'en scare, second only to the Czech crisis as a source of jitters.

Perhaps you have not seen all these events come to life in newspaper type or radio words. If you have, it will certainly be a thrill to hear them come to life again with lifelike vividness. If you have not, then there is certainly a treat in store for you to have these momentous events redone for your benefit. The programs await your dial-twirling pleasure.

Do you think, ever, that news is not important to you, Mrs. Smith? Do you think what it would mean if you had to get along without it? Remember 1815, Mrs. Smith, and your Jim dying with his boots on, even though peace had been signed, because the news was too slow. Thank heavens, that cannot happen here, not so long as radio serves us such programs as will be reviewed this week.

ON CHRISTMAS DAY, December 25, at 4:10 p.m. EST, listeners to Daventry, England stations GSB, GSC and GSD, will hear a radio version of the first full-length animated film, "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," thus having the opportunity of enjoying this famous fairy-tale a whole day ahead of its airing over the Lux Radio Theater, Monday, December 26. On Friday, December 30, at 7:15 p.m. EST, Daventry stations GSC, GSD and GSL will broadcast an eye-witness account of the Chelsea Arts Ball, one of the gayest and most elaborate of London's holiday festive attractions. The theme of last year's decorative pageant was "Flaming Youth"; this year it will be "Physical Perfection". Short-wave listeners may hear the New Year in, not once but many times as they follow the advent of 1939 around the world by radio. Starting at 9 a.m. EST, on Saturday, December 31, listeners may hear the New Year welcomed in at Melbourne, Australia, over VLR (9.58) of Melbourne. Celebrations from numerous other countries follow throughout the day (refer to program listings), ending at 5:30 a.m. EST, on Sunday morning, January 1, 1939, when the New Year makes its last official debut in Honolulu, Hawaii.

John DeMyer of Lansing, Mich., writes that he is hearing the 62-meter-band India stations with great volume between 7 and 8 a.m. EST. Try your own luck at dialing for VUC2 (4.88), Calcutta; VUB2 (4.905), Bombay; VUM2 (4.95), Madras; VUD2 (4.995), Delhi.

Quoting from a letter from RADIO GUIDE reader Wallace Adams of Avilla, Ind., he states in part: "Let me say that the average listener with an all-wave receiver is missing some of the finest music on the air if he doesn't become familiar with the short-wave part of his radio. I have in mind particularly Station TGWA (9.685) of Guatemala, Guatemala, which broadcasts some really fine programs every evening from 9 to 11:30 p.m. EST. These broadcasts

consist of band, orchestral and marimba music, and the best thing of all is that there are no long-winded commercials, the announcements in Spanish and English being short and to the point. It seems fitting to remind our many readers who will be sporting new receivers at this time that the few minutes spent in becoming familiar with the operation of dialing the short-wave bands will repay vast dividends in making available for their enjoyment a variety of fine symphonic, operatic and light musical offerings, dramatic and variety shows, international sporting events, current accounts of on-the-spot happenings, and world-news periods in English from practically any corner of the world that their fancy might dictate.

The new station on 11.85 megs, reported by Captain R. B. Oxrieder of Corozal, Canal Zone, has been identified as OAX2A, "Radio Rancho Grande," owned by Rafael Larco H. Hoyle, of Hacienda Chiclin, Trujillo, Peru. The power of the station is announced as 250 watts.

SHORT-WAVE SHORTS: COCQ, Havana, Cuba, one of radio's worst jumping-beans, is now being reported on a frequency of 8.84 megs. FG8AA (7.05), Boite Postale 125, Pointe a Pitre, Guadeloupe, will soon receive a substantial boost in power, a new frequency and will assume the slogan "Radio Guadeloupe." At present the station is operating nightly from 6 to 7 p.m. EST. M. W. Soplop of Alleghany, N. Y., reports he is hearing RV15, Khabarovsk, U. S. S. R., until 7:30 a.m. EST, on its old frequency of 4.273 megs. Numerous listeners have been hearing RV15 on a new frequency of 6.045 megs. It now seems as though this may be an additional transmitter instead of the old one moved to the new frequency. Amateur ZAICC (14.1), supposedly in Albania, is being heard near 12 mid. EST. Many listeners believe this is an unlicensed Italian station using the ZA call to escape detection, since no one has received a QSL card from him, or knows his (Continued on Next Page)

location . . . According to A. Tuff of London, England, 2RO5 (15.3), Rome, Italy, is operating daily from 11:15 a.m. to 12:15 p.m., and from 3 to 5:30 p.m. EST . . . An announcement heard over HVJ, "Radio Vaticano," Vatican City, Italy, on Sunday, December 11, at 1 p.m. EST, stated the station was operating on dual frequencies of 15.2 and 11.74 megs, and requested reports on the comparative signal strengths of the two channels. The announcer further stated that considerable interference was being reported on their transmissions. Almost immediately following this announcement, that familiar heterodyning - type of interference known in radio as "birdies" became evident on the 15.12 megs frequency. Apparently this was a malicious attempt by an unknown power to blot out the Sunday broadcast from the Papal State.

The government short-wave station at Lahti, Finland, has been assigned the following additional frequencies and calls: OII (21.55), OIH (17.8) and OIE (15.19).

Roger Legge of Binghamton, N. Y., the first United States listener to report RR3 (11.98) of Vitoria, Spain, reports he received a prompt reply in the form of a small red-and-white QSL card, which stated that this 450-watt transmitter is on the air daily from 4 to 4:30, 8 to 10 a.m., 1 to 1:50 and 4 to 7 p.m. EST, and on Tuesdays and Fridays from 8:30 to 10 p.m. EST, with a special transmission in Spanish and English for America. Reports are cordially invited and should be sent to RR6, "Radio Requete," Postas 19, Vitoria, Spain.

DJG (17.815), another frequency for the new 50,000-watt transmitter at Vienna, Germany, is being heard between 11:15 a.m. and 1 p.m. EST.

HOA (2.34) of Panama City, in the new tropical short-wave band, is now on the air and relaying HP5G (11.78) nightly . . . Ray Shaffar of Waterloo, Iowa, reports a short-wave station, CFBT of Calgary, Alberta, Canada, heard testing on a frequency of 6.03 megs, at 2 a.m. EST. This may be a new call for old VE9CA . . . Gail Beyer of Chicago, Ill., writes that VUD2 (9.59) of Delhi, India, is being heard these days with loud signals at about 8 a.m. EST . . . All-India Radio notifies me that attractive QSL cards will soon be in readiness for confirming reception reports.

Warren Stark of Wauwatosa, Wis., reports that SUZ (13.82) of Egypt may often be heard working GBB2 (13.595) of Rugby, England, after 3 a.m. EST.

A new United States short-wave voice, owned by the General Electric Company, is being installed on Treasure Island, site of San Francisco's World's Fair, and will be in readiness for operation with the opening of the fair in the middle of February. This station, W6XBE, will operate on two frequencies, 9.53 and 15.33 megs, which it will share with W2XAF and W2XAD of Schenectady. Because of the difference in time it will be possible for this new Pacific Coast station to operate without interference nightly from midnight to 6 a.m. EST, which will be the ideal time to provide evening programs for the Orient. The power of the transmitter will be 20,000 watts.

Miss Catherine Weir, Long Beach, Calif.—Orchestra-leader Joe Sanders is about forty-one years old and is married. Famous as a composer and pianist, Sanders first won recognition at the Blackhawk in Chicago, when he was leader of the Coon-Sanders aggregation, which helped introduce modern dance music to radio. After several years of success over the air, Joe retired for a while to devote his time exclusively to writing music for the movies, but eventually he succumbed to the lure of the orchestra world and organized another dance band. At present Joe and his boys are not heard on the air, because they are "on tour."

Miss Merie Kelly, Alliance, Ohio.—The "Landt Trio" are still on the air. They may be heard Monday through Friday at 5:30 p.m. EST over NBC's Blue network.

Mrs. Evelyn F. Creamer, Forest Hills, N. Y.—The character Kay Crane, formerly heard on the "Today's Children" sketch, was portrayed by Irna Phillips. Irna also wrote the script for this program and she is now writing the script for "Woman in White," which replaced it.

Mr. Bernard Perrin, Washington, D. C.—Lauritz Melchior, great operatic tenor, was born in Copenhagen, Denmark. Almost obscured by the shadow of her husband is tiny Mme. Melchior, whose 106 pounds have loomed large in aiding her husband to reach his present eminence. She was formerly Maria Haacker, idol of German and Danish film fans, and it was while making a parachute jump for picture purposes that she landed in Melchior's yard and fell, quite literally, into his arms. Lauritz has two children, a boy and girl, by his first wife, who is now dead. Both of the children are living in Europe.

Miss Mildred McCoy, Jefferson City, Mo.—Poley McClintock—he's the frog-voiced drummer who's the funnyman of "Fred Waring's Pennsylvanians." In real life, his voice is really pleasant and he's quite serious about everything. Poley and Fred grew up together, being next-door neighbors in Tyrone, Pa. Once both were in love with the same girl and they became bitter rivals. Then they went away to college. Several years later she married another chap in the band. They shook hands and have been friends ever since. It is not generally known that Poley, noted for his rasping renditions of novelty choruses with Fred Waring's band, possesses a fine tenor voice and sings tenor in the serious glee-club numbers during the weekly Waring broadcasts on Saturday night.

Mr. J. O. Phillips, Omaha, Neb.—Patrick Barrett, better known to radio fans as "Uncle Ezra," was born in Holden, Mo., on September 27, 1887. His wife is the former Nora Cuneen and she also appears on his program. Pat Barrett's first stage characterization was the exact antithesis of the one he's famous for today. Instead of playing an old man, he played a little boy. This happened in 1907, when a building let-down forced him to forego

architecture in favor of footlights. Several days after answering a dozen stock-company ads, Pat found himself in Wellington, Kan., wearing a thick wig of blond curls and playing Lord Fauntleroy in a lace-collared velvet suit. He's still wearing a wig, but it's a bald one with a white fringe instead of a blond one with curls. Since his Fauntleroy debut, Pat has continued to play character parts, and his old man make-up for his "Uncle Ezra" role is considered to be the best in the business.

Mrs. Elsie Traster, Fairmount, Ind.—The announcer on the "Avalon Time" program is Peter Grant, not Paul Sullivan as we so wrongly stated in a recent issue of RADIO GUIDE.

Mr. Richard Dobyns, Mexico, Mo.—One of radio's newest stars is a little girl who is heard but not seen. She has traveled extensively but never needed a ticket. She is beloved by all radio fans but never had a picture taken or signed an autograph. She came into being six years ago, doesn't really exist at all, yet her guardian was once threatened with arrest for violation of the child-labor laws. Her name is "Betty Lou" and she is the imaginary character who exists only in one of the voices of Tommy Riggs, her creator. Tommy Riggs, who was born at Pittsburgh, Pa., on October 21, 1908, first went on the radio when he was attending Ohio State University in 1929. The voice of "Betty Lou" is one he has been able to produce since childhood, but until six years ago he used it only in playing pranks on his friends. Quite accidentally an executive in a midwestern radio station heard the voice, recognized its appeal and persuaded Tommy that "Betty Lou" should be added to his act. Up to that time Tommy's act was a "single," in which he sang, played the piano and did light comedy, a sort of variety show. It was in Pittsburgh that Tommy got in trouble with the child-labor authorities by presenting "Betty Lou" at eleven o'clock in the evening. One official finally paid a visit to the studio and saw for himself that "Betty" was only a voice. Tommy is married, five feet ten inches tall, weighs 165 pounds and has brown hair and eyes.

Mr. Pat Ferreri, Brooklyn, N. Y.—Arlene Francis, who is heard on the "What's My Name" program, also takes the part of Lola Mitchell in the radio serial, "Big Sisters." Arlene's real name is Kazanjian. She is 28 year old, weighs 119 pounds, is five feet five and one-half inches tall and has brown hair and eyes.

Mr. Roy Kent, Pittsburgh, Pa.—The actors taking part in the "Her Honor, Nancy James" sketch are: Barbara Weeks as Nancy James; Joseph Curtin as Mayor Wharton; Ned Wever as Tony Hale; Kay Strozzi as Mrs. Evelyn Wharton; Alice Reinheart as Carrie Dean; Janice Gilbert as Madge Keller; Chester Stratton as Stan Adamic; Maurice Franklin as George Novak and Joan Banks as Ellen Clark. Frank Gallup does the announcing for this show. Vera Van, lovely singing star, was born in Marion, Ohio, on February 20, 1915. belief that television will become an actuality. One man's solution to the problem is as good as the next, but particularly interesting is the prediction of Commander McDonald, president of Zenith.

"Television must have a box-office," he said. "Someone must be found to pay the terrifically high expenses of operation. Since practically all of the alternatives presented by the current set-up seem to offer no box-office, I shall not be surprised if something like the following happens. Television service may come to the ordinary listener exactly as he now subscribes for telephone service. It will come to him possibly over telephone wires and not through the air at all.

"I see the motion-picture companies of the future as the creators of television entertainment, producing films which will be especially designed for showing in the home; newsreels, travelogs, shorts, special features, super-colossals. I see the telephone companies as distributors of this form of entertainment. I see radio-set manufacturers of the future as the manufacturers of television receiving-sets.

"Under such a set-up, the listener would telephone his television central and ask for a showing of 'Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs,' shall we say. It would be sent to his receiver through the telephone wire at an agreed-upon time."

Interesting, but you recall that no wire except a coaxial cable has been invented which can carry television impulses and it is prohibitively expensive. Therein lies the weakness in Commander McDonald's prophecy. Perhaps the reason no cheap, usable wire has been perfected is because most experiments have been directed toward wireless or broadcast transmission. Let all the laboratories now engaged in this work turn to experiments which seek to find a practical wire. Well, it is possible that within a year or two something might be found which would serve, and which would enable the television industry to untie its knottiest problem; namely, how to find the money with which to pay its way.
