





We Needn't be Spoon-Fed

The Washington pot boils. Control of broadcasting by government officials comes closer and closer. Some among us are beginning to be genuinely alarmed for the future of radio. Recently, our contemporary, *Collier's Weekly*, devoted its editorial page to a bold discussion of the situation. Walter Winchell cited it on a Sunday night talk as solid logic. We present it in the following paragraphs through the courtesy of William L. Chenery, editor of *Collier's*.

WE WOULDN'T be misunderstood as defending peddlers of any unjustifiable kind of hate. But we do think calamity howlers are taking the radio censorship business too seriously.

Various serious thinkers are worrying in public about the situation, aggravated of late by partially successful efforts to keep the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin and Representative Martin J. Dies (Dem., Texas) off the air. So people go so far as to say that we ought to de-mike peddlers of all kinds of antagonism—religious, racial, class, etc., etc.

After all, what is the radio? It is only a comparatively new and highly effective means of passing around information, ideas and entertainment. Press, orators, theater and pulpit have been doing that for hundreds or thousands of years. The radio is a good deal less than the "great new social force" the advocates of censorship believe it to be.

Since America began, America has had ranters of all kinds; merchants of religious, racial, class, and every other type of hatred.

Since the Bill of Rights was adopted as the first amendments to the Constitution, these people have ranted prac-

tically without restriction, on paper, on soapboxes, in hired halls, even in churches—and generations of Americans have listened to them.

If any one of those generations had lost its head and gone whooping down the trail pointed out to it by any one of those ranters, our present generation would most likely be living thinly off the husk of a once great country—if there was a present generation of Americans.

No such thing happened. What did happen in every case was that the American people gave the current spellbinders a fair hearing; talked over and thought over what they had to offer; perhaps committed one or two of the barrel of mistakes the spellbinders wanted committed; and then decided against the spellbinders and snapped back to horse sense.

We've been kidded by experts, down the years—by Greenbackers, Know

Nothings, Fenians, Populists, Knights of Labor, Free Silverites, Ku Kluxers, prohibitionists, inflationists, Technocrats. But none of these has kidded the shirts off us.

We're being kidded now by all manner of New Deal and Old Deal economic and money-magic faddists, third-party dreamers, war propagandists, merchants of racial and religious and class hate. Up to now, any of these people who can scare up the money can buy radio time, just as in the past they could publish pamphlets or books, mount soapboxes, hire halls or buy advertising space in newspapers and magazines.

Are we in any more danger of being led into lunacy now than we ever were? It seems most unlikely.

President Miller of the broadcasters' association, chairman Frank R. McNinch of the Federal Communications Commission, and kindred headshakers

and handwringers seem to think the majority of Americans are mental slobbs, whose delicate ears must be shielded from "harmful" broadcasts.

Well, we aren't mental slobbs, and the ears of most of us are not overdicate. Generation after generation, we have proved capable of telling a sow from a Siwash.

Reader censorship is all the censorship the magazines and newspapers ever have needed. They haven't needed, and don't need, "czars" or police to regulate them. Most Americans, we believe, are smarter than they look, and smarter than the much-publicized wartime intelligence tests indicated. At least that is the theory on which this magazine proceeds, and more than 2,600,000 Americans have been buying it from week to week for quite a while now.

Listener censorship is all the censorship the radio needs. It's so easy to turn the dial and find a different tune.

We think President Miller of the broadcasters' association had better forget about any supposed duty of his to keep "dangerous thoughts" (Japanese expression) off the radio. All he needs to worry about, so far as we can see, are the ordinary standards of decency and discretion that govern the American press.

And we think Chairman McNinch of the Communications Commission had better begin confining himself strictly to regulation of technical radio details, and drop the motions he has been making recently toward government radio censorship. Or if Mr. McNinch persists in trying to stick his fingers in the ears of American radio listeners, we think Congress had better shackle his official hands.

Like the press, the radio can be free, or it can be a slave, but it can't be both.

GREAT AMERICANS THINK ABOUT RADIO

MY MESSAGE — BY HELEN KELLER

NEVER in history has humanity been kept so astir with excitement and wonder. A world network with radio magic cannot but abound in marvels past computing.

For radio is a miracle capable of transforming our lives day by day. Glorious music and high drama were once only for the fortunate few. Now radio is bringing these privileges within the reach of all. Divine harmonies and inspiring voices shed magnificence upon obscure homes. What new heights and depths open before the inner vision as one looks forward to the yet mightier Iliads and Odysseys of adventure awaiting radio!

The ancient Greeks had far fewer resources and much less control over natural forces than ourselves. Yet twenty-five centuries ago Greece boasted a citizenry amazingly alert, questioning, experimenting. That is why they attained immortality in phil-

osophy, art, social ideals and even physical beauty.

Through radio we moderns are living a million times more romance, beauty and adventure than the Greeks ever knew, and our opportunities for culture and progress are infinitely greater. If we only have confidence in ourselves, the forces within us can assimilate this unprecedented wealth of life and power and produce a society friendly to all men.

The beginning radio has made imparting to greater numbers the discoveries of science and health education is superb, but it must keep moving onward or the intelligence it is awakening will again fall into ruts of custom and learned-by-rote living.

If wisely directed, radio can promote education more widespread and constructive than any mankind has ever known. It can do more than teach people what they do not know, it can teach them

how to find out things for themselves. Under skilful guidance it can lift the mass mind above present-day morbidity and sensationalism. It can lessen the mania shown frequently by children for cheap comedy and unwholesome stories and restore them to a world of joyous imaginative creation. These are but a few of the far-reaching responsibilities that rest with radio.

America, democratic at heart, scarcely emerged from its pioneer stage, pledged to common school education, is as fresh clay to Promethean sculptors of national life. May radio have a leading role in its mightier and fuller development. May it foster mental elasticity which shall preserve vigorous self-government, keep public knowledge abreast with the ever-changing life conditions, and sow the seeds of understanding from which alone international friendship and peace can grow.

BORN of war at its worst, cradled in post-war confusion, nurtured in zealous excitement, cutting its eye-teeth on political laws and public movements, the American Legion this week comes of age.

"Today I am a man," says Elmer. And in celebration of the momentous anniversary the American Legion will stand right up to the radio mike and tell the nation about it. They'll say it with stars, for in honor of the beginning of the twenty-first year of the organization, a mammoth program featuring many celebrities will be presented from Hollywood, New York and Chicago over an NBC network at 11:15 p.m. EST Wednesday of this week.

According to the tentative schedule, the show will open with a patriotic number by the Paul Taylor chorus. Bob Hope, radio and screen comedian, will then take over the reins as master of ceremonies, and in his popular patter style will introduce the remainder of the program. Frank Hodek's orchestra will play a patriotic number. Mary Pickford, "America's Sweetheart," will speak a "Tribute to the American Legion." Rosemary Lane, of the famous Lane Sisters, will sing.

The program will then be switched to Chicago for a talk by Commander Stephen F. Chadwick of the Legion. Back in Hollywood, singing cowboy Gene Autry will entertain, and then Joe E. Brown will do a doughboy sketch with Hope. From Chicago Mrs. James Morris, president of the American Legion Auxiliary, will speak. Rubinoff and his violin, long missed from the airlines, will be heard from New York.

Then will follow a song by Gale Page and a sketch by comedian Fibber McGee and company. After a talk about the 1939 National Legion Convention by Phil Collins of Chicago, the show will be closed in a burst of comic fireworks by Olsen and Johnson, star team of the screamingly funny Broadway show, "Hellzapoppin'."

As the Legion and the public get together to cut the big birthday cake of radio entertainment, many will probably be thinking, "What a long way from 'over there' two decades ago!" True, the Legion has seen a whirl-

wind of life since its Mars-governed birth back in 1919. In March of that year a group of worn but greatly relieved delegates of all the A. E. F. units got together over in Paris, resolved to do something to insure that those many buddies who kept their unwilling rendezvous with death "should not have died in vain." Resolved, too, that life must somehow be made attractive once again to those poor half-humans in body and soul who only brushed elbows with Death, wishing later, perhaps, that they had been trampled as the others under the feet of His Majesty. Still further resolved that sons and daughters must be spared such another awful tragedy.

OUT of this preliminary meeting in the shadow of No Man's Land grew the embryo of the American Legion with that name as it still remains. Then at the call of Colonel Roosevelt and Colonel Bennett Clark, son of Senator Champ Clark, a caucus was convened in St. Louis in May the same year, and the organization was formally set up, as its constitution preamble says:

"To uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States of America;

to maintain law and order; to foster and perpetuate a one hundred percent Americanism; to preserve the memories and incidents of our association in the Great War; to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, State and Nation; to combat the autocracy of both the classes and the masses; to make right the master of might; to promote peace and good-will on earth; to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy; to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness."

How well the Legion has carried out the magnificent purposes of their constitutional preamble is a matter of record—and a matter of some controversy. There are many who consider the Legion a spoiled brat and an overbearing bully, but there are not many who will not acknowledge that the organization

has fostered and carried out some very worth-while movements.

For instance, back in its infant days Elmer was already getting public notice for his convention riotousness. At the Kansas City convention in 1921, alleged serious disorders were the subject of much hot wordage in print and in public discussion. In the following years the Legionnaires were accused of raids on socialist establishments, taking the law in its own hands in punishing opponents, drunken revelry, and political meddling. All such accusations have usually been tempered with the realization that nothing but a Dead End Kid could be born of mud and lice and starvation and shattered bodies and violent death; and that Dead End Kids don't become Lord Fauntleroy's overnight.

MOREOVER, against the charges of autocracy and disorder can be placed many factors that didn't make such big headlines. Let us look at some of the accomplishments over the years of Uncle Sam's wayward but well-meaning child.

Back in the early twenties when there was still a post-war depression, the Legion found employment for more than 1,000,000 veterans. Picture yourself—as perhaps you were, or as you might have been—back home from another world, back to a strange life with a numbed mind and a few bloody dollars, a desire to forget, and perhaps with only one arm. From one chaos to another. A job and a chance to pick up the loose ends again—that would have meant everything, wouldn't it? 1,000,000 got that chance in 1921.

In 1922 the Legion pressed its effort to obtain adequate relief for wounded and disabled veterans, which terminated in the creation of the United States Veterans' Bureau. That doesn't mean much in cold type, but visit the veterans' hospital in your vicinity and take a brief look around at the physical derelicts being restored to health.

You wouldn't know Joe, unless you live around his neighborhood in Illinois. Joe used to love life—his farm life. A German sniper tore off Joe's hand, and the poison gas twisted his lungs and made him lose control of some of his muscles. Joe lost his love of life somewhere in No Man's Land. They put him in a vets' hospital a few years later. Pa sighed when he milked the cows without Joe. Ma slipped into Joe's bedroom every day and fondled his bed with tears in her eyes. Well,

now Joe is back on the farm, lets Ma tuck him into bed, helps Pa milk the cows—and Joe loves life again. That's what veterans' hospitalization means to thousands upon thousands of Joes.

Then there was the raising of a \$5,000,000 endowment fund in 1925 and 1926, the income from which is used for the aid and care of orphans and in rehabilitation work. In 1929 emergency relief units, a national safety-first campaign, and promotion and development of aviation were the chief activities of the Legion.

Came 1933—the most critical period in the history of the organization. On March 20, Congress passed the Economy Act, and with one fell swoop wiped out the structure of legislation for disabled World War veterans, which the Legion had labored for years to


build. The Legion rallied and went to bat for its disabled members with a four-point legislative program. In 1934 the fight was rewarded by Congress adopting three of those points: preventing any reduction of benefits for veterans disabled in line of duty; providing that hospitalization be afforded by the government for those not able to pay; and providing perpetuation of service connection.

Americanism came to the front as the major policy to be pursued in 1935, so designated by the convention of that year at Miami. It has since been the most-publicized feature of Legion activity, with the exception of the bonus fight.

No single act of the American Legion, either as a body or as individuals, (Continued on Page 37)

Here in Los Angeles a few days ago, we had a rather disturbing windstorm. I was walking along Sunset Boulevard at the time, and like the other pedestrians, I ran for cover as the gale swept down. There were a number of stores near by, but something guided me toward a building across the street. I stood there in the archway several minutes, I guess, before I realized where I was. Y'know, the church must be a very strong and righteous thing—for it has survived every enemy it has ever had! 





THE SAINT IS A SINNER

THE TRUE STORY OF
RADIO'S FAVORITE
DRAMATIC SON
BY
JAMES STREET

The ordinary Hollywood hero is a hackneyed, listless ham who requires the expert priming of a high-powered publicity-man to make him look interesting. Not so the ebullient, bouncing Signor Dominick Felix Ameche, who as your favorite radio actor and master of ceremonies is known as Don Ameche. In this article, James Street's vivid style brings another radio voice to life and paints a graphic, unforgettable picture of a young man finding himself.

THERE is another woman in the supposedly exemplary life of Signor Dominick Felix Ameche, the mad Don of Kenosha, the altar-boy who wanted to be a lawyer.

She is an enchanting vixen, and he met her in his youth and learned about life from her. They held campus-trysts in half a dozen schools. Their romance has been stormy, for she is older than

he and often forsakes him for another man. But she always comes back and Signor Dominick never upbraids her. He wipes the past away and puts her back on her pedestal, salaams to her presence and sings to her beauty.

He meets her at night when the lights are low and the voices are hushed and the table stakes are high. He takes her to the races and caresses her when the horses charge around the bend. He takes her into his home, and she knows his wife, Honore, and his children, Donnie and Ronnie.

Some men think she is a hag—a rag, a bone and a hank of hair. But the merry Don calls her his Lady Fair. For there is an affinity between him and his mistress, that old lady who is known as Luck. His priest knows of the affair. The wild Don tells his priest everything. He is a devout churchman, but the saint is also a sinner—a lovable,

happy sinner with all the grace of the Latins and the luck of the Irish.

He is one radio and screen star of whom even the gossips, the jugglers of reputations, the traffickers of half-truths say, "Good old Don; ain't he a card!"

He holds his friends with hoops of steel, and his home is the sort of place a fellow wouldn't mind slipping on his slippers and talking nonsense to the lord of the manor, and children and cooking and other important things to Mrs. Honore Ameche, who doesn't object to sharing her husband with the lady who is known as Luck.

The streamliner between California and Chicago had settled down for some powerful running across the dreary flatlands of Nebraska. Most of the passengers had retired, but in the diner the Ameches were giving a little party, one of those things that starts in low gear

and then jumps to high before you know it. The Ameches were headed for Europe and a delayed honeymoon.

It was a good party. The Ameches' parties always are. There are two things the mad hatter Ameche doesn't like—a gambler who squawks and a guy who can't hold his liquor. The dining-car crew was tired and sleepy but had to stick around. The debris must be brushed away when the party broke up.

Honore Ameche—she notices everything—called the steward and told him to send his weary crew to bed. "I'll clean up," she said.

"But, madam—" the steward protested. After all, Mrs. Dominick Felix Ameche doesn't wash dishes on a diner.

"To bed," Don said. "We'll clear the wreckage."

The crew retired and the party con-

tinued. When the last ice-cube had melted and the cheese had wrinkled and run, Mrs. Ameche took up the dishes and scrubbed them, and tidied up. One of her guests helped. The next morning the dining-car crew presented her with a dozen napkins.

And today if you ride that diner and know your waiter, he might whisper to you, "This is a plate Mrs. Don Ameche washed."

It doesn't help the potatoes, but it's nice to know.

Old Lady Luck used to run around a bit with Don's father, Felix Amici, over in Naples, but the affair was never serious and she didn't think as much of Mr. Amici as she does of his son. However, she enticed him aboard a ship, into steerage, and headed him for America, and eventually lured him to Kenosha, Wisconsin, plopped him down there and went off to cavort with other men. Mr. Amici met and married Barbara Amici, of German-Scotch descent, and they settled down to have a family and live, and did a good job at both.

MR. AMICI tried farming, then opened a saloon.

"Dad was the best saloon-keeper in Wisconsin," Don said. "No man ever left his saloon drunk, and because I think that gives Dad one leg on fame I see no need of trying to keep it dark."

Good for you, Signor Ameche! Jim Farley's dad also served a great boiler-maker, and the third one was on the house.

The family lived on North Howland Avenue in Kenosha, now called Twenty-second Avenue. It was the wrong side of the tracks and there is no need of trying to pretty it up. Mr. Amici ruled his brood with a firm hand. Mrs. Amici scrubbed them on Saturday and saw that they were at mass on Sunday, come what would. The whole family was devout, and had that habit of church discipline and that deep-rooted love for religion so typical of Neapolitans.

On May 31, 1908, Dominick was born, one of eight youngsters—four


boys and four girls. He was named for St. Dominic, who, incidentally, was Spanish and not Italian.

The family and the kids in the neighborhood called him Dom, but when he got over to Kenosha Public School the fellows changed it to Dcn. Don got his first vaccination of education in Kenosha. He has been exposed many times since, but none of them took. His father took him out of public schools at an early age and sent him to St. Berchman's Seminary at Cedar Rapids, Iowa,

"Then he left for Marquette College. Our correspondence dwindled to less and less, until it amounted to marking off birthdays and such. During the next six years we saw each other exactly three times. The third time was on September 2, 1932. Then—"

Hold it, Mrs. Ameche. Cut! There are many scenes to be filled in.

At Columbia, Don had decided to become a lawyer and began wrestling with Latin. He was cutting a pretty wide swath in those days and was play-

thence to Columbia Academy at DuBuque.

There he met Honore Prendergast. But let her tell it, it sounds better:

"Don and I were fourteen. We were sophomores. He was going to Columbia and I was at St. Joseph's Academy. We had a terrible crush on each other and went together four years. I was his first girl and he was my first fellow.

ing tag with Lady Luck. She taught him about the only law he knows, the law of averages. Father Semper, his English teacher, put him in several school plays, but Dominick never took them seriously. There was Honore to take up his time, and if he had any left over—well, pitching pennies was always fun.

Even in those formative years at Co-

lumbia, Father Semper saw possibilities in the boy. His family's name had been changed legally from Amici to Ameche simply because it's easier to pronounce.

Father Semper studied the boy's background and learned that as a tot in kindergarten Don liked to recite pieces. There were only boys in the school, and when a religious play was put on Don was cast as the Virgin Mary. The day before, he had got a black eye playing basketball.

"I'll bet I'm the only fellow who ever portrayed the Virgin with a black eye," Don said.

HE PLAYED end on the school's football team, guard on the basketball team, and caught for the baseball club. He also played tennis and swam. He was among the first-string players in the national basketball tournament of Catholic schools, held in Chicago in 1924, and he was second in a national oratorical contest.

During his years at Columbia, the master of discipline was the Rev. Father Kucara, now bishop of Lincoln, Nebraska. Father Kucara had a deep baritone speaking-voice and Don practised until he could imitate it. And often he would imitate his teacher, and the master would say, "Ameche, what's to become of you? You're doing the devil's work!"

The Rev. Maurice S. Sheehy, D. D., of Catholic University's faculty in Washington, was another of Ameche's teachers. He later did Don a great favor. Elmer Layden, Notre Dame coach, was athletic instructor at Columbia and taught Don all he knows of football. All his teachers liked the boy, although they knew he was something of a hellion. One of his earlier teachers, Sister Cornelia, always said he would turn out all right. She now is Mother Superior at St. Mary's Convent in Cedar Rapids.

During his summer vacations, Don went home to Kenosha and worked. Times were getting pretty tough with the family, but the father always managed to have raviola and red wine for his folks.

Young Ameche was husky, and he got a job laying cement walks. Then he worked as a bolt-tightener in an auto plant. He dug ditches. He was two-fisted and never ducked a fight. Life hadn't been very gentle with his family, and Dominick took life for what it was—a tough business in which only the tough survived.

He saved his money, putting aside a certain sum each week. But he always held out a few dollars and gambled. He usually won. His father helped him out, and his mother packed his one good suit, cautioned him to brush his teeth every day, bathe, watch his manners and go to mass every Sunday. And he left for Marquette College.

Up at Milwaukee, he didn't do so well. In a burst of ambition, he took on nineteen hours of work a week. He always would rush in where angels feared to tread. He had promised his dad he

would be a lawyer. The spirit was willing but the flesh was weak. Soon he cut his work to twelve hours a week and tried to do joust with equity, habeas corpus and all those dull things. But it simply wouldn't work. Just as he would settle down for a long evening with parties of the first part and/or parties of the second part, somebody would

The Rewards of Radio

TWO long airplane flights and one extended railroad ride (New York-New Orleans-Miami-New York) recently gave me opportunity for additional interesting study of the vogue of radio. Of eight passengers on one plane, three carried those new portable radios which need no outside attachment, and after the rest of us consented, an owner gave a demonstration, with splendid reception singularly free from static. Ironically enough, however, a news bulletin almost immediately read an item about the crash of a Marine Airways plane, en route from Ketchikan to Juneau, Alaska, with five persons aboard, on February 13. Our comfort was not increased thereby, as we were then flying at an altitude of 6,000 feet or so!

On the *Orange Blossom* express train from Miami to New York, the club car had a radio on which we heard the best of the Sunday evening programs, somewhat blurred; but in the compartment adjoining mine, a passenger had his private apparatus, which blared dance music and swing songs until midnight.

In Miami, at a dinner party where I was the only music sharp, we were at the coffee, cognac and anecdotal stage, when the host suddenly looked at his watch, said "Toscanini," and rushed to turn on the radio. Everyone fell silent while we listened for half an hour to the magnificent Wagner program.

Lecturing at the University of Miami, I asked the audience of nearly 400 to indicate by hand-raising how many of them tuned in regularly to the best musical programs. Nearly all the hands went up. I noticed one near the platform that remained down. I asked, "Don't you like good music?" The reply got a general laugh when the questioned young man answered, "My radio is out of order."

It was in Miami, too, that I tried to get a copy of the current *RADIO GUIDE*, but found none after inquiring at a half dozen newspaper stands and stationery shops. My discomfiture turned to pleasure when I was told that the paper is sold out invariably on the day it arrives. (An experience I have had also in other communities.)

FELL to thinking about what radio means to musicians themselves. It has taken the place of the aristocratic patrons who used to commission composers to write, and then premiered their works for select audiences. A Palestrina featured by the popes; a Haydn housed and salaried by the noble Esterhazy family; a Bach favored by Frederick the Great; a Beethoven's quartet first heard at the homes of Viennese princelings. Now the place of all those title-sponsors is taken by CBS, NBC, MBS, and the other leading networks and outstand-

ing stations. Radio "first times" are of the greatest importance to composers, giving them a nation-wide audience instead of a few music-lovers in one town. Radio has consistently introduced new music by Americans and shamed some of the regular symphonic concert series. Radio has developed and given to concert and opera a number of ranking performers. Hundreds and even thousands of players and singers with no chance to appear elsewhere had helpful debuts on the air.

Yes, radio today is the most vital medium of music, and not the least of the loudspeaker's achievements is that through boring repetition it kills off the worst of the cheap popular numbers after a most welcome short life.

Speaking Up

Austrian Artur Schnabel and British Neville Chamberlain have one trait in common: Neither of them is ever seen on the street without a tightly rolled umbrella in his hand. But their ways part there, for Schnabel is a stranger to any "policy of appeasement." Just as he refused to play in Germany again at the urgent invitation of Furtwaengler (conductor of the Berlin Philharmonic) until all Jewish artists could return, so he has never once omitted or altered any note of a composer. Among present-day pianists, Schnabel is probably the most rigid purist, and has always been a devoted seeker after the composer's original creative intentions. A living document of Schnabel's creed is his edition of the Beethoven sonatas, considered one of the most authoritative in existence.

SCHNABEL'S concerts are salutary rebukes to musical sensationalists. The programs are invariably long and favor the works of Beethoven and Schubert. Students with note-books on their knee crowd the concerts and the atmosphere is more that of the lecture than the concert hall. As one irritated critic remarked at a recent Schnabel recital, "You could hardly hear the playing for the scribbling." However, students know his value to music just as did the German government during the World War when they refused to permit him to join the army. His teaching and playing was considered of more importance to the Fatherland than his ability to handle a gun.

Today, the picture is sadly altered, and with art ranked below almost everything else in Central Europe, Schnabel and his wife live and teach in exile in Italy. His two sons will shortly become American citizens, and Schnabel is very happy about it, for he considers America the only country left where cultural growth is still possible.

The lone American here, Horace Johnson, was born forty-six years ago in Waltham, Mass. Since early manhood he has led a dual professional existence, divided between composing music and doing editorial work on various musical magazines. Of several orchestral scores from his pen, Johnson's suite "Imagery" has been the most successful, with forty-two performances since the premiere in 1924, nineteen of them this winter.

In three movements, the composition was inspired by excerpts from the East Indian poems of Tagore. The musical themes, invented by Johnson, are of Hindu character. "Procession to Indra" voices propitiation to the God of Rain "Aparasa" depicts nymphs who dance before the great God Indra. "Urbassi" is the name of the leading dancer of the Aparasa. Unmistakably oriental in coloring, the piece is in the modern manner harmonically and orchestrally.

Ford here emerges momentarily from habit, with Ormandy listing a seldom-heard selection by the best-known composer of Brazil, Antonio Carlos Gomez (1839-1896), who wrote successful operas in his own country and in Italy. One may be sure that Bidu Sayao, herself a Brazilian, called Ormandy's attention to this aria. Gomez music has fluent melody in the light Italian style, but loses somewhat in grip when he essays the heavier dramatics. His most widely known opera is "Il Guarany" (1870, Milan), chiefly because of the bright overture revived fairly frequently even now.

Gomez is particularly identified with American musical life because he composed a hymn to celebrate our independence, "Il saluto del Bresile," played at the Philadelphia Exposition in 1876, and a cantata, "Colombo," for the Columbus Festival in 1892.



Cheers to Bruno Walter for playing the Brahms' first. Of his four symphonies, many people consider Brahms' second the easiest to understand for those who are unfamiliar with his music. However, the first seems to me a much simpler introduction to Brahms, particularly the lovely singing second movement and the last movement, whose middle theme is one of the clearest and most joyous melodies in all symphonic literature. I have known people to become Brahms discoverers and enthusiasts merely on the strength of that one theme, which bursts out like strong, bright sunshine after a shower.

Haydn's "Oxford" symphony, originally composed in 1788, was played by the composer in 1791 at Oxford, England. The University had conferred an honorary degree of Doctor of Music on him during his first trip to England, and out of gratitude, Haydn conducted his symphony, which ever since has carried the title of "Oxford."

The story of "Oberon," Weber's fairy opera, concerns the fairy king, Oberon, who has quarreled with his queen and cannot be reconciled until he finds two mortal lovers who have remained faithful to each other under every circumstance. The overture contains many themes from the opera, notably an excerpt from the famous aria "Ocean, Thou Mighty Monster."

Something About Symphony

WHAT do you know concerning the symphonies you hear on the air, and the symphonic form generally? Is it necessary to have such knowledge? Well, it is and it isn't, depending on whether you listen for aural enjoyment only or would like also to widen your cultural understanding. This department has furnished brief notes on the symphonies you dialed but offered no explanations of why they are or how composers came to put them together. Recently Deems Taylor took up the subject in his Philharmonic commentations, and tried to show us the methods of symphonic construction. However, it is to be feared that many of his listeners preferred merely to hear the music and not to find out how it looks on the inside. Much as the majority of persons take a watch for granted and never know what makes the wheels go round, and turn radio dials without any conception of the marvelous process which produces the resultant sounds.

The "March of Music" today starts a series of articles on the chief musical forms—the symphony, symphonic poem, orchestral suite, sonata, chamber compositions, art-song, opera, instrumental works and other examples. The editor's purpose is not so much clinical as to offer material that should intensify your pleasure in radio-listening, and save dry research in the bulky dictionaries and encyclopedias of music. It may amuse you, by the way, to learn that in a 2,000-page work of that kind, published a few months ago, "symphony" is treated to a quarter-page description, while a half-page is devoted to "swing"! Even some of its jargon is listed, like "hidebeater" (drummer), "fog-horn" (saxophone), "scratch-box" (violin), "agony pipe" (trombone), "licorice stick" (clarinet) and "clambake" (every musician playing for himself).

"Symphony" is a term as old as art-music itself, and was applied originally to an instrumental passage in an extended work, as an opera, or an overture. Later the word meant an orchestral composition in three movements. About 1750, at the beginning of the classical period, "symphony" designated an opus in sonata form for orchestra. Since then, practically every great composer has tried his hand at that medium, with Chopin serving as an outstanding exception, for he confined himself mainly to piano writing.

Early music-making consisted chiefly of singing, solo, choral, and with instrumental accompaniment. About 1340 there was rising interest in instrumental music. For the next three centuries or so, the sonata, trios, suites, overtures, concertos (solo and orchestral) found slow but sure development. Composers became more and more fascinated with the possibilities offered by combining the many string, woodwind and brass instruments. German,

Italian and English masters did the most progressive development, with French colleagues industrious also. Musicians quickly became accustomed to the massed sounds, while musical laymen first wondered, then understood and loved. Respected too, because they always realized that, strictly speaking, a symphony is a sonata for orchestra. A less terrifying definition is the Latin one, which has "symphonia," denoting a "harmonious course of voices and instruments." (The voices fell by the wayside as time went on.) In other languages, the spelling is "sinfonia," "symphonie" and "sinfonie."

Commencing the greatest classical period, Haydn created 104 symphonies, and Mozart 49, the first of them when he was eight years old. That should not mislead anyone as to the difficulty of the job. There was only one Mozart! Wagenseil, Austrian, first inducted the minuet into the symphony, then Haydn used it in faster tempo, Mozart adopted it also, and finally Beethoven supplanted it with the scherzo, which in his handling was not exclusively graceful but sometimes somber and even tragic. Schubert was the first real romantic symphonist, because the charm of his material overbalances the structural interest. Mendelssohn contributed five symphonies, notable for elegance and perfection of workmanship. Then the symphony began to be divided against itself, as it were, for Berlioz and Liszt wrote stuff that was based on a "story" (so-called "program" music) and Brahms adhered to the "absolute" style, which expressed whatever the listener could find in the composition without clues from the composer. The two schools have functioned ever since, some modern examples being titled and sub-titled, and others labeled simply "symphony." Marches, waltzes, variations, funeral marches, and other departures crept into the form, and today a composer is at liberty to do anything he likes in a symphony, so long as he keep to the rules—the use of contrasting themes, consistently employed and logically amplified, varied and developed.

Tschai-kowsky, Sibelius, Scriabin, Bruckner, Mahler, Dvorak, D'Indy, Franck mounted the heights with their symphonies. Dozens of lesser men climbed after. In our own day, the best are Rachmaninoff, Bloch, Vaughan Williams, Dohnanyi, Enesco, Shostakovitch. Leading Americans: Shepherd, Kelley, D. G. Mason, Gruenberg, Barber, Harris, Ives, Hanson, Hill.

You have your choice of an extensive repertoire of symphonies, both "absolute" and "program." The name of the form should not keep you from approaching the works confidently. Some of them contain the loveliest music imaginable. Just remember Schubert's "Unfinished," and Dvorak's "New World."

NEW YORK.—Ever since word got around to the effect that "Good News" might go off the air, many listeners considered it a piece of good news, hoping it might mean that the sponsor will bring "Show Boat" back to the air. I say this because I've literally been swamped with mail from readers who are looking for the return of this popular program. Well, there is some talk of reviving "Show Boat" with some of the members of the old cast, but if it does happen, I doubt if Lanny Ross will be in it because of his present "Hit Parade" show . . . Orson Welles turned down the offer to do "Napoleon" for Warner Bros. . . . The Ted Straeter chorus has been given notice and will be off the Kate Smith show in a few weeks. The new AFRA scale made the cost of the chorus prohibitive, which is the same reason the large singing group was dropped from the Bing Crosby airing.

In an NBC press-release that reached my desk a couple of weeks ago was a paragraph mentioning Amos 'n' Andy's broadcast direct from the World's Fair. The release went on to state that the boys would broadcast their own program before an audience for the first time; that it would be their first half-hour program; that Edwin C. Hill would relinquish his time to make this possible. Just to keep the records straight, the program was not broadcast before a visible audience (it seems someone forgot to consult A & A about this), the program didn't run a full half-hour, and Edwin C. Hill did not relinquish all his time. Otherwise everything was correct.

Behind the Scene

Dropped into CBS' radio theater No. 2 and listened to Johnny Green rehearse his boys for "Johnny Presents." He told me there has been a bit of confusion in names since he joined the program, what with him and Johnny the Call-Boy. Anyone else coming on the program by the name of John will be requested to take the name of "Jack" . . . Walked across the street from "Johnny Presents" to the "Saturday Night Serenade" rehearsal and found Gus Haenschen sitting in front of his orchestra chewing gum in rhythm with his band. Gus always has a smile and just sits there quietly. The only time you can tell he's getting a little excited is when he chews gum faster . . . Had a chat with lovely Mary Eastman, vocalist on the hour. She told me that just that afternoon she had put her father on the train for Florida. He was so nervous about missing the train that they got to the station two full hours before train time—and then killed so much time around the station that her dad had to actually run to catch the train . . . Spent a few pleasant hours at Columbia's Seventh Avenue studios. They all seem to make a lot of fun out of their work up there. When "The Goldbergs" rehearse you have a feeling that they consider themselves members of a family, not only on the program but off the program. And it happened to be Bess Johnson's birthday the day I was there and the "Hilltop House" studio was packed with gifts. Bess' cook was on the program to bake a birthday cake over the air for Bess, but they haven't a stove in the studio, so her gift was really a pair of bedroom slippers. Don't tell anyone I told you, though.

Studio 3B, where Dave Elman's "Hobby Lobby" program was in rehearsal, presented as amazing a scene as I've ever witnessed in my years as a radio reporter. Elman had brought Harold Funston, a mechanic from Columbus, Ohio, to appear on the program, and Funston was demonstrating his hobby—emulating the tricks of East Indian fakirs. Elman

unwrapped a fresh double-edged razor-blade and placed it in Funston's mouth. Then, amid surprised gasps from onlookers, he began to chew the blade. A few moments later, he distended his tongue to show us the chewed blade, then, smiling, he calmly swallowed the bits, washing them down with a glass of water. He repeated the feat for disbelievers, and when I asked him what else he could do, he pointed to an electric-light bulb. "Get me one of those," he said. He broke the bulb, selected a large piece of the glass and, so help me! he began to chew it, and when the bits were small enough, swallowed them. For a half-hour a fascinated audience demanded repeat performances. Dave Elman hovered around Funston, plainly worried that he might hurt himself and thus incapacitate himself for the broadcast. After watching him swallow six razor-blades, Elman persuaded his star hobbyist to quit for the day. "But I'm still hungry," Funston cracked. As for me, if I had an appetite, I certainly lost it after watching this stunt.

Raymond Paige Scores a Hit

The new Raymond Paige "99 Men and a Girl" program is unquestionably a hit and worth your attention. The only letdown in the show, in the opinion of your reporter and many of his friends, is songstress Hildegard, who didn't live up to the tremendous build-up they gave her. But Paige's music—ah!—that's another page from another book. I went to the dress rehearsal for the first broadcast, and you can take it from me, ninety-nine musicians on one stage are a lot of men. As a matter of fact, the first few rows of seats in the theater had to be torn out and the stage made larger to take care of them. When I arrived, Paige was rehearsing only the strings. He had evidently put the orchestra through all the numbers the day before and had made a recording of it.

For instance, in one place where the strings played a phrase by plucking the strings—you know, pizzicato—Paige stopped them with, "When I listened to this last night I heard a lot of fingernails. Use the meat, boys, use the meat." When they went through it again "pizzicato" (I like that word), I didn't hear any fingernails, so I guess the boys were "using the meat" . . . About that time the rest of the orchestra came in and Paige really went to work. He's about as active and dynamic a conductor as I've seen in many a day. He'll occasionally jump half a foot in the air when he's pulling the orchestra up to a high note, and when they hit it right he shouts "Ah! That's it!" on the way down.

In this same studio on Monday nights, Ray Bloch conducts an orchestra of twelve men on the "Model Minstrels" show. They are all grouped in a corner and are actually lost on the big stage. Believe you me, it is quite a decided contrast after you see the Raymond Paige orchestra up there. Nevertheless, Bloch has a swell group of ace musicians and they do a grand job. Ray doesn't stand still for a second while the boys are playing; his body seems to be permeated with rhythm. The night I was there, Tom Howard and George Shelton were making their first appearance as regulars on the show. All during the time they were in front of the mike, the audience didn't stop laughing. One gag after another hit the bull's-eye. Incidentally, it was the first time I've ever seen these comics use a script. When they worked on the Rudy Vallee show they never read their lines, but they work about fifteen minutes out of the half-hour on this show and I can understand that's a lot of material to memorize.



A BROADCAST originating in the cab of a new 8,000 horsepower German electric locomotive—said to be the world's most powerful—will be made on Tuesday, March 14, at 6:15 p.m. EST, over Zeesen stations DJB, DJD and DJZ.

Montagu Collet Norman, Governor of the Bank of England since 1920, one of the world's outstanding authorities on the subject of finance, will make his first radio broadcast on Thursday, March 16, at 1:40 p.m. EST, over Daventry stations GSP and GSG. A recorded version of his talk will be broadcast at 6:20 p.m. EST, over stations GSC and GSD. President Milan Hodza of Czechoslovakia will address America from Prague on Saturday, March 18, from 4:45 to 5 p.m. EST. This broadcast will probably originate over either OLR5A (15.23) or OLR5B (15.32) and in this country over W8XK (11.87) and W1XK (9.57).

Completion of "Radio Eireann's" transmitter has been held up pending the arrival of certain equipment, but our Irish readers will be glad to learn that latest communications promise the Moydrum station will be testing before the end of this month. Watch the following frequencies: 17.84, 15.12, 11.74, 9.55 and 6.19 megs.

The "American Hour from Rome" can now be heard nightly from 7:30 to 9 p.m. EST, over 2R04 (11.81), as well as 2R03 (9.635) . . . RV96 (15.18), Moscow, is now radiating the Soviet transmission for North America, heard nightly from 7 to 9:15 p.m. EST, in addition to the usual stations RKI (15.08) and RAN (9.6) . . . "Paris Mondial" has been experimenting with various frequencies in connection with its nightly transmissions to North America, from 9:30 p.m. to midnight EST. At present a new frequency, namely 7.28 megs, is in use . . . A religious service called an "Hour with the Bible," conducted in English by Rev. Arthur Pain, can be heard over Cuban station COCQ (8.83), Sundays at midnight EST. Listeners reporting this period receive a handsome Spanish calendar, which makes a worth-while souvenir . . . "Jamaica on the Air," that interesting English program formerly broadcast nightly over HH2S (5.95) of Port-au-Prince, Haiti, is now radiated on Wednesdays only from 8:30 to 10:30 p.m. EST.

French listeners are considerably perturbed by very vehement anti-French broadcasts being made daily from 3 to 3:30 p.m. EST, over a mysterious station announcing as "Radio Corse Libre," which operates on a frequency of 9.57 megs.

SHORT-WAVE SHORTS: The African Broadcasting Corporation is installing new short-wave transmitters at Capetown and Bleomfontein . . . Walter Guthrie of Los Angeles, Calif., reports a new Japanese station JLK (6.18), which is being heard best from 8 to 9:30 a.m. EST. The program consists of news and announcements in Chinese, Japanese, English and French . . . The Chungking, China, short-wave transmitter is testing on various frequencies and at irregular hours. Using the call XGOY (9.5), the station is now testing near 6 to 7 a.m. EST. Pacific Coast listeners report the station operates nightly from 8 to 11 p.m. EST, on a frequency of 15.19 megs, using the call XGOX . . . Shades of the Arabian Nights! Bagdad is on the air. YIJG (7.2), located at Bagdad, Iraq, is now operating daily from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. EST. Occasional announcements in English help to identify the station . . . If you would like to tune in YUA (6.10), Belgrade, Yugoslavia, here's how. Set your dial for 6.1 megs. At 12:43 a.m. EST you will hear the Yugoslav national anthem followed by a short announcement. At promptly 12:45 a.m. EST one stroke on a gong will be sounded, after which the news in Serb-Croatian is given . . . VUD4 (15.29), Delhi, India, may be heard nightly from 9:30 to 11:30 p.m. EST. Some nights reception is unbelievably good. To reach us the signals must cross the lofty Himalayas and the North Pole . . . The new Guatemala City station TGX1 (6.132) operates daily from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and from 8 p.m. to 1 a.m., with a special DX program for the United States Sunday mornings to 2 a.m. EST . . . COCQ, Havana, Cuba, seems at last to have definitely settled down for a while. The spot is 8.83 megs.

The Crosley Corporation of Cincinnati, Ohio, has requested permission from the FCC to install a 1,000-watt television transmitter on the 48th floor of the Carew Tower. The station would operate in the 50-to-56-megs band.

tip him off that a dance was in progress, and that a crap game was forming. So Signor Dominick would leave Blackstone for a duller day and hie away with Lady Luck.

"I had discovered that it was more fun to play than to work," Don said. "Dancing was my specialty. I managed to pass my examinations at Marquette, but it took a lot of fast talking to get by."

He changed over to Georgetown University in Washington, at seventeen, but his habits didn't improve.

"I was developing into the world's worst student," he said. "Bridge and poker demanded a lot of my personal attention, and I attended only about twenty classes during the first semester. With football games and races taking a lot of time, too, I knew there was no use of taking my examinations. So I pulled out just ahead of them and entered the University of Wisconsin."

His father had sunk a lot of money in the boy, and was demanding some results. Don tried to work, but he just couldn't find the time. There were so many pretty coeds. He didn't forget Honore, completely. He remembered her birthdays.

SIGNOR AMECHE was right on the brink of flunking when Prof. William C. Troutman of the School of Speech discovered him. Troutman now is director of dramatics at Kansas State College.

Troutman was seeking a gay young blade for the role of Dick Dudgeon in Shaw's "The Devil's Disciple," which the Wisconsin Players were staging. That was in 1928. Troutman could not find his lead in the School of Speech. He was on his third day of tryouts and was pretty discouraged when, as a gag, Don showed up with some of his pals, who thought they would try for the part. They had dared him to try the role and he agreed. He was tall and thin and not exactly handsome. He always had a grin.

He read the first lines of the role in a booming voice. It thundered through the Bascom Theater and Troutman jumped.

"Where have you been keeping yourself?" Troutman snapped.

Don thought he was being kidded and said, "Oh, I've been around." Then he started off the stage, but Troutman laid hands on him. "The part is yours," he said, and a great mouthpiece became a myth.

After "The Devil's Disciple," Troutman cast him in "Liliom," opposite Bernardine Flynn. Bernardine Flynn, by the way, is the Sade you hear in radio's "Vic and Sade."

Troutman knew Ameche had everything; that is, everything except the determination to be a lawyer. His grades were suffering with malnutrition. The play was all ready and Signor Dominick caught shingles, went to the hospital, and his grades almost died. He had to maintain a good average to be eligible for the play and his grades were too low for eligibility. But Troutman went to the dean of men and pleaded, and got a special dispensation for Don.

The show ran a week, a record at the time.

Back in Kenosha, Papa Amici's tavern was gathering cobwebs, for prohibition was upon the land. There was no more money for Don. He played a tight hand of poker and Lady Luck brought him a few dollars. He barely got by his midterm exams in 1929. He

was about ready to chuck the whole thing overboard and get a job, if possible. But Troutman took him into his own apartment. They cooked their own meals.

It seemed that Lady Luck had thrown him down, until into Madison, the university town, came the Al Jackson Players in March of 1929. They were about to stage "Excess Baggage," and their leading man met with an accident. The show was promised for Monday, and Sunday night the director called Troutman.

"Is there an actor in town?" the director pleaded.

Troutman helped Don into his overcoat, and Ameche hurried to the old Garrick Theater, where the company was rehearsing. He stayed up all night learning his lines, and at the opening carried the role to perfection. The company gave him a twenty-week contract.

Mrs. Leslie Carter came to Madison, and Ameche got a role with her. He was booming along. Prof. Herbert Page of the College of Law reckoned it was time for a showdown. He told Don to choose between law and the theater. Ameche took the theater, flunked his law-school exams, and kissed the law good-by. The nearest he ever came to being a lawyer was when he caught shingles instead of hanging out one.

That summer he stayed with Troutman and starred in several summer plays. He always worked opposite Bernardine Flynn. After summer school, Troutman loaded Don in his car and they lit out for New York. It took Troutman (good old Bill) only a week to land Don a spot in a Broadway thing called "Jerry For Short." So was the play.

Troutman returned to his work and Don got a place in Texas Guinan's vaudeville skit in which she burlesqued her battles with the law. The show played the variety houses of New York and Brooklyn. That gave Don a yen to do burlesque, but he never got to it. When Guinan's show closed, Signor Ameche was broke. But when things got really tough, he would wire Troutman collect, and good old Bill would send fifty bucks and a word of encouragement.

"I wore the patience of theatrical agents thin," Don said. "My soles got thin too. I put cardboard in my shoes. Eventually, I took the bean course for dramatic talent.

"The bean course consists of eating beans every day. I had the advantage over some of the fellows in my school: I could afford a plate of ten-cent beans at noon and a nickel apple at night. As my studies became more involved, I found a beanery where I could load up for a nickel."

THAT was in the fall of '29 and a lot of men were looking for nickel beans.

Things looked pretty hopeless to Don until Lady Luck came around the corner and cooed, "Hello, honey. Where have you been? Come along." He followed her out to Greenwich, Connecticut, and got a job with the Brown Stock Company, and won a lead in a mystery called "Illegal Practice." It was quite a mystery. The mystery is why it ever opened, but it did, out in Chicago, and the critics slapped it flat. Ditto Signor Ameche.

He had carfare and he grabbed the North Shore Electric and went home to Papa and Mama up in Kenosha. The prodigal was back. There was no fatted calf, but gobs of spaghetti.

But back at Madison, old Lady Luck

"THE FROZEN CONTINENT"

Antarctica, loftiest and most remote of continents, is the destination of "New Horizons" explorers this week. Its gigantic ice cap is seven or eight thousand feet deep, and yet, though Antarctica is still in an ice age of its own, its earlier conditions were vastly different. Within a hundred miles of the South Pole enormous coal seams have been found, with fossil plants eighteen inches in diameter—evidence that the "frozen continent" was once upon a time a sub-tropical world with teeming flora and fauna.

Known only to a handful of such men as Scott, Amundsen, Byrd and Ellsworth, the polar regions are regarded by most people as places of no particular interest except to scientists. Dr. James H. Kimball believes they are of interest to everybody. During the program he will explain his theory that the vast masses of cold air released at the poles have a direct influence on weather conditions all around the globe. Although he admits that man cannot control the weather, he thinks it likely that the establishment of weather stations in the polar

regions would give timely warning of air conditions in the making.


Dr. Robert Cushman Murphy has an interesting story about penguins, famous animals of Antarctica, based on his explorations in South Georgia. There he found the friendly Johnny Penguin, the tall and snobbish King Penguin, and the mighty Emperor Penguin.

Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen Rohde will take listeners from the Antarctic to the Arctic and give some interesting highlights on the lives of Eskimos and their dogs, neither of which has a counterpart at the South Pole.

"The Frozen Continent" is the title of the March 15 broadcast in the "New Horizons" series. Time: 2:30-3 p.m. EST; 1:30-2 CST; 12:30-1 MST; 11:30 a.m.-12 noon PST.

I'm not old fashioned enough to blush. For crying in a bucket! I'm not blushing . . . I didn't say I was . . . my face is flushed. What with the excitement of looking for keys and meat and what have you, and if you are insinuating that I'm not old fashioned enough to be able to blush, you make me sick. Always talking about your old-fashioned girls. Too bad you didn't marry one . . . If you're so smart, tell me this: HOW DID OLD-FASHIONED GIRLS KNOW WHEN TO BLUSH? . . . Come on, Junior, while I still have my appetite . . .

has been so widely publicized or so hotly argued about as the march to Washington of the bonus-seekers in those hectic days in the trough of the depression. From all over the country they came by all manner of transportation. In battered and decorated jalopies, by freight rods, walking, hitch-hiking, from Hoboken to Seattle, the "bonus-or-bust-ers" descended on the capital, a resolute vagabond army, camping in the very shadow of the White House. When Hoover and the Army finally drove them out, the event became a football for press and politicians. The vet came home with gas in his nostrils and fire in his eyes, grumbling of tyranny. Officials said it was nothing but a debacle inspired by disgruntled reds.

In 1936 the big fight was won when a bill to permit immediate cash payment of adjusted compensation became law.

Since the bonus slate was wiped clean, the biggest talk has been about Americanism, and much has actually been done by promotion of youth activities, educational activity, legislative agitation and publicity to further the ideals of Americanism in a political sense by the present 11,000 posts of the Legion.

Now, as it reaches its age of legal

adulthood, what is the Legion's inheritance? "To you from failing hands we throw the torch . . ." Surely they remember the mire of the trenches, the din of the battle, the horror of agonized shrieks. They remember the pale faces of foes and buddies—and the pale face of Death. They remember—even though all lies peacefully buried now beneath the poppies.

Surely they must hear the admonition, "Be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die, we shall not rest . . ."

Yes, they paint the towns red at their conventions. But it is their boast that they help keep others from painting the nation red with blood or red with communism, or black with other insane isms.

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


Wanted: One Breezy Story

Charles Forsyth, ace sound-expert for "Lux Theater," is trying his best to persuade Cecil B. DeMille to schedule a drama in which the wind will whistle, shriek, moan and groan. Reason is that at last Forsyth had made two dozen new recordings of the wind which he would like to put on the air. During the recent windstorm, which did \$5,000,000 damage in southern California, the sound-engineer worked all night making the records of the gale whistling through the cracks in his garage and the shrubbery and trees around his home, and Charlie's quite proud of his achievement. They are, he says, the first authentic records of a good California blow, a rarity in this clime . . . Just to show you how Forsyth works, when "Lux Theater" played "Ceiling Zero," the plane-motor sounds during the broadcast were actually true sounds of a plane's motors—and a historic plane it was that supplied Charlie with his records. The sounds were those of the engines on the plane that made the first non-stop flight from Moscow, Russia, over the North Pole to California. When the Soviets landed and took off from here, Forsyth was on hand to set their noises down in wax for the future. No ordinary airplane engines would have satisfied Charlie. Mr. Forsyth demands that his noises be authentic, historic, pedigreed, colossal and stupendous, if not terrific.



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GOOD RECORDS

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ARC to CBS

After plenty negotiating, CBS has bought ARC (Columbia Broadcasting System has bought the American Record Company), which includes the defunct Okeh, Melotone, Perfect, Variety and Master labels, the still-alive Columbia, Brunswick and Vocalion labels. This puts CBS in a stronger position to tie up recording and broadcasting activities in the same way that NBC and RCA-Victor work.

The issuing of the CBS Workshop drama "Air Raid" and the recent release of Deems Taylor's "Through the Looking Glass" by Howard Barlow's Columbia Symphony Orchestra were forerunners of what we might expect of the tie-up, which augurs right well for the future.

But so far, the releases from ARC continue much the same as before, with the addition of the Jimmie Lunceford band on Vocalion the only change (and this accomplished before the sale). Brunswick has as its mainstay bands Kay Kyser, Horace Heidt, Eddy Duchin, Gene Krupa and Duke Ellington. . . . Vocalion goes on with Lawrence Welk, Al Donahue, Johnny Hodges, Cootie Williams, Mildred Bailey and more, plus re-issuing most of Artie Shaw's stuff formerly issued on Brunswick.

Of recent ARC releases, we note the following:

Quartet in E Flat Major by Beethoven. The addition of piano to small chamber groups is a happy one, as recently exemplified by Robert Schmitz and the Roth Quartet in the Cesar Franck Quartet in F Minor album. Another by the same men is this, a work which Beethoven originally wrote for a quintet of piano, woodwinds and horn. It is an excellent performance of a flawless classic. (Columbia set 348. \$6.)

Peruvian Indian Melodies, a medley of unique and interesting songs sung

by Ninon Vallin, part of Columbia's extensive library of national and folk-music. Mme. Vallin sings in the ancient Quichua tongue, using their five-tone scale, with flute and harp accompaniment. (Columbia 4219-20. \$1 ea.) The native Tahitian records by Les Tamaru-Tahiti group are authentic but none too musical. (Columbia 396-7. 75c ea.)

Boogie Woogie Festival, spotlighting this highly exciting form of swing with a three-record series by four of the very best pianists in this style. A solo by Albert Ammons, another by Meade Lux Lewis, two duets by Joe Turner and Pete Johnson, plus two-side killer with Lewis-Johnson-Turner combined, all adds up to a superlative collection of the sharpest stuff in jazz. (Vocalion 4606-7-8.)

DUKE ELLINGTON goes right on with his amazing output—changeless, always virile and imaginative. Six sides by his full band on Brunswick include one of the mood-indigo type, Blue Light; one featuring Rex Stewart's trumpeting, Boy Meets Horn; one in moderate tempo, Slap Happy; and three bright ones, Old King Dooji, Battle of Swing and Jazz Potpourri. Then on Vocalion, the Ellington band crops out again, four in Johnny Hodges name, two in Cootie Williams name, all highly recommended, particularly the coupling Hodge Podge and Wanderlust.

GENE KRUPA is represented with his theme Apurksody and with two commercial tunes of merit, An Old Curiosity Shop and I Don't Believe It. (Brunswick.)

MILDRED BAILEY on two apt revivals, Begin the Beguine and I Cried for You, gives a particularly choice 35c worth . . . and possibly her last for some time, since she left husband Norvo's band for a European tour. (Vocalion.) —Joe Thompson.

They all don't like the same type of entertainment, so they tune in different programs and just about drive the driver and themselves screwy with all the noise . . . Ernie Holst is back on the networks. He and his band opened at the Belmont Plaza's Glass Hat last Tuesday night . . . Enoch Light's new song, "Mariettina," has all the earmarks of a hit tune . . . 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
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
