LISTENING-POST

"If you had to give up either going to the movies or listening to the radio, which would you give up?" November *Fortune* publishes one of its remarkably accurate public-opinion surveys, in which this question appears. Results showed that 79.3 percent of the public would give up motion pictures before radio, 13.9 percent preferred movies, and 6.8 percent were non-committal. Which should resolve the film-radio controversy for some time to come.

Broadcasting was born of war. It is the driving-force of today's Hitler war. Bombing of cities has been held off and great battles are non-existent, but the long-predicted "war of words" is in full blaze. Ironically, Englishmen now look above the portal of their splendid British Broadcasting Corporation headquarters in London—a chief battleground of the word war—and read these words: "Nations Shall Speak Peace Unto Nations." That dream, unhappily, must wait now for fulfillment.

Chanting tobacco auctioneers "Speed" Riggs and T. E. Boone on the Saturday "Hit Parade" really say something though most listeners have no idea what. For their enlightenment, here is the chant in black and white: "Heyyyyy twenty nine nine nine nine nine nine nine nine nine nine. Roundem roundem roundem roundem roundem. Am I right at thirty one thirty one thirty one one one one one one one . . . Come along come along come along long Four thirty four four four four FIVE thirty five five . . . Grab it grab it grab it . . . eight eight eight Thirty eight eight eight eight Sold to the Ah Merican!"

The Nazis mean to control the listening of every German man and woman. Their simple method of accomplishing what most Americans would consider a Herculean task is taxation—a confiscatory tax on radio sets. On the cheapest receiver, which may be bought for only a few dollars in the United States, the tax is \$9.89 a year. Rates increase in proportion with the cost of the receiver. This system works very nicely, for no German can thus afford to own a radio powerful enough to get anything more than official Nazi broadcasts.

News for RADIO GUIDE readers is the appointment of Leonard Lieblich, music editor of RADIO GUIDE, as judge on Ted Cott's "So You Think You Know Music" quiz program. FIDLER SPANKING . . .

ADMITTEDLY the struggle to attain Hollywood stardom is a long and bitter one. But once attained, no power on earth can shake the foundations of a star's hold on his fans. That is, almost none. For there are a handful of superior beings in Hollywood who may criticize with impunity the great of radio and films. They are the radio commentator-columnists, and among them none is more powerful than Jimmie Fidler. Therefore when Jimmie Fidler pointed his finger at Orson Welles, new Hollywood arrival, several Tuesday nights ago on his CBS broadcast, and administered a verbal spanking, one would think even precocious Orson might well take heed.


This is substantially what Jimmie said in his open letter to Welles, whose "Campbell Playhouse" is heard Sunday over CBS: "You're getting a lot of criticism these days in Hollywood. Doubtless much of it is caused by jealousy. But some of it is caused by your big,

long car. Even more by your luxuriant beard. Anyway, I'd hate to see you make a flop. You have a lot to live up to with your three-way ticket and you had better make good."

Orson Welles, however, has neither the temperament nor the inclination to become very upset over such warnings. In his twenty-five active years, he has had occasion to defy tradition in the theater, invite an FCC onslaught with his Mars broadcast, and at the same time develop an astonishing number of personal idiosyncrasies—of which said beard is one of the more commonplace. Criticism has been to no avail.

Judging from the record, therefore, it would appear that Welles will no more settle down to be a normal person under Fidler and Hollywood tutelage than he did under the threat of FCC condemnation. And right as Fidler may usually be, radio listeners will still take their Orson unreformed and unregenerated.



SATURDAY'S WONDER BOY



ARCH OBOLER, the young radio playwright who gave horror a new twist on "Lights Out" some time ago, now presents "wonder tales" on Saturday nights, NBC. This week he offers "I'll Tell My Husband"

AN IMAGINATION big as the Gobi desert yet fertile as a California valley—that's the driving-force behind Arch Oboler, whose high-speed mind embraces everything from the dying thoughts of a dinosaur to the dramatic possibilities of a window-shutter banging in the night.

Arch Oboler? Who might that be?

Arch Oboler, it seems, is a radio-writer and one of the best. Usually you don't hear much about radio-writers. They're just nonentities behind the scenes, peculiar people with a frenzied look in their eyes who are always four jumps and a sidestep ahead of the microphone. That's because the mike uses up everything they write at such ravenous speed and then bellows for more.

The new clique of writers for radio falls into neat compartments. There are serial script-grinders, following the daily adventures of Suzie the shop-girl, who has more tribulations than even stout-shouldered Job could have borne. Then we have the comedy gagmen who pen laugh dialog—bright, mediocre, sometimes pretty sad—for the funnymen of the air. Continuity-writers whip off the colorful little bits of verbal fluff to be aired between dance numbers, introduce speakers or praise the merits of Dewdrop Hand Lotion.

But Arch Oboler? Not in the ranks of these hacksters will you find him. Arch looks out at dusk over the gathering lights of New York and—presto—comes up with a compact half-hour drama that will keep loudspeaker devotees on the proverbial edge of their chairs from opening announcement to ultimate network cue.

He's the man who created those "Lights Out" dramas which used to make you peer behind the pantry door before retiring for the night.

HE'S the gentleman who's written radio roles for such Thespian top-notchers as Alla Nazimova, Bette Davis, Boris Karloff and Walter Huston.

But, most of all, he's one of the few original writers in the realm of the microphone who is using his talents to prove convincingly that radio drama can pack a powerful wallop of realism. Everything's grist to the Oboler mill, from the simple, every-day subjects he finds on solitary walks around New York to those cosmic mysteries of the universe which defy the probing finger of science.

That means you can never tell what's in store when you tune in on an Oboler play over NBC any Saturday evening. It may start off with the roar of a rocket-ship departing for Mars. Or it may merely be the plain but o-so-real tale of a young couple fighting for security in an insecure world.

Arch Oboler has a free hand in both the writing and production of his Coast-to-Coast programs. That's how much faith NBC moguls have in his ability. This young idea-factory becomes today an increasingly prominent figure along the rialto of New York radio. You couldn't miss him if you wanted to. Arch Oboler's first rule of existence is—be comfortable. Being comfortable entails knitted shirts and slacks of informal design.

Few people have ever seen him beneath the sartorial yoke of a collar and tie. He wears bull-nosed shoes with crepe soles, above them sporty socks

RADIO'S RICHEST COWBOY

Gene's first songs were for cattle on the range;
now his listeners are legion, his income fabulous

HE'S the richest cowboy in the world. For three years the top-hand cowboy crooner on WLS' National Barn Dance; for five years the number one cowboy of the silver screen, his salary is terrific. Add to that salary his royalties from records, music, radio and personal appearances, sweat-shirts, cap-guns, pencils, soaps and other kid paraphernalia which bears his name, and you'll have a small idea of why Gene Autry has become the fair-haired boy of the income-tax department. Even Uncle Sam raises his eyebrows when the Autry income returns are filed each March.

He's the richest cowboy in the world, but he doesn't have a suit of clothes to his name. That's the way he wants it, and when you reach the spot that Gene stands in today, you can do the things you want. And right here we'd like to observe that the man hasn't changed an iota in the whole nine years it took him to climb from 'way down under to the top of the heap. From the day he was old enough to sling a leg over a saddle-horn and yell "Giddyap," he's gone in for high-heeled boots, ten-gallon Stetsons and shirts that cause rainbows to crawl back in their holes and pull their reflections in after them. Once, back in the days when he was at WLS, he made a bet—a quarter-of-a-century note against his wearing an ordinary suit of clothes—on a softball game, lost and, in order to fulfill the bet, had to rent a suit from a costumer's. On the screen, in radio, in his private life, he stays in character and, personally, I'd wear an iron mask if it would get me where the cowboy clothes have gotten Mr. Autry.

Of course, the cowboy clothes are just a small part of the Autry success story. There's a little matter of the Autry voice, which, if it doesn't cause Mr. Caruso to turn over in his grave, is still good enough to bring loud "ahs" from romance-loving ladies and romance-hating kids who jam theaters to hear him perform and put their own individual interpretations upon his crooning. That's no small trick in itself, this satisfying of such diverse audiences. Then, too, he is, for the ladies, a virile, he-man type they love to love, and the same goes for the kids.

He comes by his gifts naturally. Born to the saddle down in Tioga, Texas, just thirty-three years ago come December, his first lusty bawl was mingled with the bellowing of cattle on the range, and his nostrils came to know the smell of freshly branded steers. His is the honest love of the West and things western, bred of close familiarity. He early learned that the best way to keep a herd of restless steers from straying when camp was made at night was to ride around them and sing. On Sundays he varied his vocal efforts by singing in the choir of the Tioga church, pastored by his grandfather, and by the time a medicine show passed through Tioga—he was sixteen years old then—he was ready to try his talents on a more difficult audience.

Now, the technique of selling corn-remedies and liniment cure-alls in the Texas of that early day went about like this. A darkey would play a banjo, a singer would croon (they didn't call it crooning then) a sentimental ballad that would soften sales resistance. Then the professor would give a scientific lecture on what his remedies would accomplish and start taking in the quarters. Gene got a job singing the sentimental ballads, and the professor reports that sales soared almost at once, especially among the feminine half of the audience.

His medicine-show experience was followed by a period of cow-punching around on different ranches in Texas and Oklahoma, almost always getting the sack because he disrupted the work

routine. Other waddies used to forget to work when they heard Gene sing and play the guitar. Then he went to work for the Frisco railroad at Sapulpa, Oklahoma, becoming a telegraph operator. His second minor singing success came in the form of a rebuke from division headquarters of the railroad. Other operators along the line, headquarters learned, kept listening in while Gene played and sang into a telephone transmitter as messages piled up.


Jimmy Long, who has since collaborated with Gene on a number of songs, including "Silver Haired Daddy of Mine," was his boss in those days, and Jimmy felt that Gene had something. He worked with the young fellow, helped him develop his style, and then, in 1928, persuaded Gene to go to New York during his vacation and try to connect with the Victor Recording Company.

New York wasn't too hospitable, and Gene found himself getting saddle-sores from sitting in waiting-rooms hoping for a chance to be heard. Finally, on the last day of his vacation, he decided to give his audition anyway. He unsheathed his guitar in the waiting-room and started singing. Nat Shilkret, a Victor official at that time, came out to see what the shouting was all about, talked with him, heard him out, and then gave him some history-making advice.

"You've got a good natural voice. Now go back home and get on the radio. What you need is mike experience, and radio will develop you." Then Shilkret sat down and dictated a "To whom it may concern" letter.

Armed with this, Gene went back to Oklahoma and, more specifically, to radio station KVOO, in Tulsa. In those days singing on the radio was considered an honor, and the only reward performers received from the smaller stations was the knowledge that—maybe—hundreds of people were hearing them perform. As "Oklahoma's Yodeling Cowboy," Autry lassoed his listeners the first night, and as time passed it turned into a regular stampede. His range "twang" and his song-stories of the Old West found a responsive chord throughout the Southwest.

In 1930, two years later, he made his

first recording for Victor, the outfit that gave him to radio, and then, shortly afterward, he was hired by Sears, Roebuck & Company to sing over WLS, then owned by the mail-order house. When WLS was sold and the famous National Barn Dance program was started, Gene moved over to it, and his fame and following—up until this time a purely sectional matter—became national. He was the idol of kids from one end of the country to the other. Fan mail poured in. They'd stampede him in the studio, gang up on him in personal-appearance tours, and long after other members of the Barn Dance cast were home in bed, Gene would still be signing autograph-books for goggle-eyed admirers.

It was late in 1934 that Nat Levine, Hollywood producer for Republic Pictures, had a brainstorm. He was going to make a new type of western, a modern western that dealt with such streamlined subjects as government irrigation

projects and fictional Sun Valleys. But there was more to his idea than just the revamping of the blood-and-thunder quickies of Tom Mix' day. He wanted a singing radio cowboy. Here was a producer smart enough to know that a man who has a large radio following to start with has just that much of a start over the fellow who begins from scratch.

GENE AUTRY was his answer. How this singing cowboy played and sang and rode his way to movie fame is a matter of record. It's no exaggeration to say that he brought back the western, and for this rejuvenation he's been amply rewarded. In England and Scotland, where he and his horse, Champion, made a personal-appearance tour recently, audiences stood in long lines to get a glimpse of him. He is the favorite actor of Princess Elizabeth, and his English tour was a long, triumphal junket from one castle to another, with

receptions not unlike those given a king. All this has changed the man little. In Hollywood he lives in a comfortable but adequate home. His wife, a former Oklahoma girl whom he married while working on the railroad, does the cooking. There is only a Negro maid to help her. He still wears his cowboy suits, refuses to go Hollywood.

Whenever he's in Chicago or Tulsa he drops in at the radio studios where he worked, does a broadcast for them. His old friends are still his best friends. Smiley Burnette, the comic who supports him in pictures, was an old partner of WLS days and one of Gene's discoveries. Other WLS stars are used in almost every one of his pictures—Patsy Montana, the Singing Cowgirl; Lulu Belle, other Barn Dance personalities are taken to Hollywood and used in his pictures.

One night long ago, when Gene was a telegrapher on the Frisco, a stranger

walked into the station at Claremont, Oklahoma, to file a telegram. Gene was singing when he entered, and the man—a cowboy—asked him if he could play "They Plowed the Old Trail Under."

"Sure thing," Gene said, and to accommodate the customer he started in. When he'd finished, the man said:

"Young man, if you work hard at that singing you might get somewhere some day."

Gene always remembers this because, when the stranger had said his say and left, Gene glanced at the signature on the telegram he'd left for transmission and suffered a belated attack of stage fright. The man was Will Rogers.

Now Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer is trying to borrow Gene from Republic to make over one of Will Rogers' greatest pictures, "Jubilo." And this, Gene says, is about the swellest thing that can happen to a guy.

NEW YORK.—Here are some interesting behind-the-scene facts I just dug up about Phil Spitalny's all-girl orchestra that you probably didn't know about. The forty girls in the band represent twenty-two different states, and one girl comes from Alaska. The band rehearses thirty-six hours a week for their single half-hour broadcast. Each musician gets a bonus for contributing new production ideas. Before a girl can join the "Hour of Charmers" she must pass a singing test as well as play an instrument, for the entire group also make up the glee club.

Bandnotes

I just found out the full name of D'Artega, music director of the NBC Enna Jettick broadcasts. Believe it or not, it's Alfonso Armando Fernandez D'Artega Tinajero Rubio Perez De Allian Castro Michel y Bienpica. Just call him "D" for short.

"Li'l Abner," famous feature of the comic pages, makes its radio debut over an NBC network starting November 20, and will be heard Mondays through Fridays . . . Listeners enjoy hearing the popular tunes of yesteryear . . . The Mutual network made a lot of enemies for itself when it ended too abruptly the broadcast of the Giants-Chicago Bears professional football game when there

were only a few minutes left to play and the game had reached its most exciting moments.

Behind the Scene

This is a story that will probably make Ellery Queen's face turn a bit crimson when he reads it. During rehearsal each week of the popular CBS "whodunit" mystery show, the cast goes through the lines and is stopped by producer George Zachary after all the clues are given, just as it is done during the broadcast. Then everyone in the cast is given an opportunity to give his opinion as to the identity of the murderer. Up to this writing Hugh Marlowe, who plays Ellery Queen and is supposed to be the guy who solves all the crimes, has not been able to name the right one in the twenty weeks they've been on the air. The actor or actress in the cast doesn't know he or she committed the murder until they finish the dramatization.

One of Fred Allen's ad-libbed remarks made during dress rehearsal was never heard by the radio audience because of the NBCensor. Fred was interviewing Billy Rose, super-showman, who'll be the husband of Eleanor Holm before long. Allen's amusing crack was, "I'll bet there's no place like Holm, eh, Billy?" Despite the fact it got a big laugh from those watching the rehearsal, it was ordered cut after considerable debate.

Billy, and of course the television broadcasts . . . Peter Van Steeden and his frau are preparing for another visit from the stork sometime in January . . . Practically everyone at CBS attended a surprise party given for lovable Nila Mack, CBS director of children's programs. Nila was given a gift book of "gag" nursery rhymes, which were read to the guests by Andre Baruch, and they got plenty of laughs.

A mystery developed during a rehearsal of the "Aldrich Family" last week. The control-room engineer suddenly noticed a weird and scraping sound coming through the speaker. He had the mike, all the electrical equipment and wiring examined, which took up quite a bit of time, but to no avail. Soon it was noticed that the noise was loudest when Ezra Stone was at the mike, so they watched him carefully. Sure enough, he was the cause of it. Ezra was wearing a high and stiff collar and hadn't shaved for a couple of days, so his stubble, plus starched collar, plus the head movement produced the crickety noise through the very sensitive microphone.

F. P. A. Wants Some Information, Please

Famed punner Franklin P. Adams of "Information, Please" decided to splurge and went out and bought himself a custom-made hat for thirty smackers, which is at least five times as much as he ever paid for a chapeau before. Anyway, after the last contestant finished spattering the words as they stood directly in front of him, Arthur chirped, "And the rains came." It's a very interesting and amusing show, no matter what your age is.



VINCENT ASTOR

A millionaire,
but his first
love is still
"Amos 'n' Andy"

WHEN multimillionaire Vincent Astor has a specially weighty problem on his mind, he takes a ride on his private miniature railway to ponder the question—or listens to "Amos 'n' Andy" to forget it.

It could happen only in a democracy, perhaps, but the nation's top social figure is quite openly enthusiastic in his loyalty to radio's lowly sons of Harlem. Mr. Astor—who paid over \$600,000 in Federal taxes in 1934—perhaps naively, but at least sincerely, considers himself an average American citizen. This radio-fan kinship with millions of other listeners goes a long way toward establishing the fact.

Yet in many other ways the forty-eight-year-old boss of the fabulous Astor realty business is actually an average American. In the first place, he looks like one. He has the rangy, well-proportioned build of the middle-aged sportsman that he is. He doesn't give much specialized thought to dress. His clothes are of course plentiful and expensive, but not flashy—if anything just a bit on the old-fashioned side. He looks like the average well-to-do businessman.

Of course the Mr. Astor does have four palatial homes in New York City, Rhinebeck on the Hudson, Newport and Bermuda. He pays hundreds of domestic employes. He has a yacht grand enough to bring pride even to the head of the House of Astor. And he has that private little railroad he calls the Toonerville on his estate, a manifestation of his whimsical fondness for mechanics, especially trains.

Mr. Astor's income has been estimated at something close to \$1,000,000 a year from the vast real-estate holdings which he owns and manages. These holdings include New York's famous St. Regis Hotel, his particular pride. He bears the name of one of the most prominent families in America's traditional bluebook. Yet he exhibits none of the un-American snobbishness and class conceit that mark so many pseudo-socialites.

He'd rather talk about the circulation of his magazine, *Newsweek*, than his real estate. He'd rather live on his yacht than in his Newport mansion. He'd rather go fishing than to the opera. And he'd rather listen to "Amos 'n' Andy" than almost anything.

It's really an obsession. You'd think a multimillionaire real-estate mogul

would be interested exclusively in other phases of broadcasting—the market reports, speeches by economic authorities, news of world events, political activities. As a matter of fact, Vincent Astor takes business as pretty much a matter of course. And he isn't much interested in politics, even though he is a close personal friend of President Franklin Roosevelt.

Radio to him is "Amos 'n' Andy." Just mention radio and, with a grin or a chuckle, he'll come back with, "Did you hear them when Andy was shot at the wedding?" or "Andy certainly is a great lover," or something like that. He will further slyly deny the story that he organizes his whole day's activities with 7:00-7:15 p.m., New York time, as an unalterable free period for listening to the antics of the blackface team.

"I allow no interruptions," he admits with a grin. "If you call me between 7:00 and 7:15, you'll find I'm 'out.' I don't like to miss a minute of the sketch. It holds your interest because it's not only comical but it's so human, too."

The only Astor in "Who's Who" has a boyish fondness for animals, especially the ludicrous species, like dach-

sunds, and especially penguins. He once owned an orang-utan named Kingfish, but he had to give her to the zoo when she got too big to keep around the place. He felt very bad about it when she died later.

Mr. Astor, like so many other Americans, likes detective stories, but, unlike the average American, he smokes exotic, sinister-smelling Turkish cigarettes. He has only a casual interest in movies and theater, nothing approaching his enthusiasm for "Amos 'n' Andy."

HIS best indoor game is backgammon. He's quite an outdoors sportsman, plays lots of tennis and golf and has a passion for the water. Yachting is his big avocation. He learned as a boy to handle a sailboat. During the first World War he turned his yacht, the *Noma*, over to the Government and saw active service himself in European waters as an ensign and lieutenant. He is now a lieutenant commander. His present yacht, the *Nourmahal*, is spacious enough to require a crew of about forty.

It was shortly before the War that Vincent, whose unused first name, by the way, is William, came into the for-

tune to which he has added. And it was a quarter of a century ago, too, that he married Helen Dinsmore Huntington. His wife is a lover of music, is active in social-welfare work, and, like her husband, is socially democratic. Both are fond of children, and their only touch of unhappiness is that they have had none themselves.

Mr. Astor's chief business enterprise, other than his realty business, is the fast-growing *Newsweek* publication, of which he is chairman of the board and of which Raymond Moley is contributing editor.

He holds offices and memberships in dozens of organizations and social clubs, from the Chase National Bank and Western Union Telegraph Company to the Honor Legion of the police department.

Mr. Astor says the stories of his playful interest in his private railway are exaggerated, that the railroad is of practical use. He's not at all backward, though, about his "Amos 'n' Andy" fan-complex.

That's how radio serves one famous American, who proudly calls himself an average American citizen.

FORECAST

Impossible is the task of anyone who in a few short paragraphs tries to describe these two gigantic scores. As well attempt to give tabloid analyses of Shakespeare's "Midsummer Night's Dream" and "Hamlet."

delight in the beauty of the world... here rises the image of a poet transfixed by the immortal spectacle, recording his awe and tenderness in songs that cannot help being canticles of praise." Not so long before his death, the composer exclaimed ecstatically, "Almighty God, in the woods I am blessed." One might say that whole libraries exist in delineation and eulogy of the Fifth Symphony, and yet its pictorial meaning has never been convincingly explained, chiefly because Beethoven himself left no helping clues. "The summons of Fate," "martial celebrations," "a tragic love-affair," "the note of the yellowhammer heard on country walks"—and many more are the suggestions advanced by the ready musicologists. Again to quote Gilman, the irrefutable feature of the symphony is its "epic valor... music pregnant with the greatness of the indomitable human soul. Listening to it, one knows that the inward ear of Beethoven has almost caught that lost word, which, could a man but find it, would make him master of the hosts of Fate and of the circling worlds."

So let us not try to solve further, but sit entranced and enjoy and thrill and respond to our own imagery, each to his own capacity in heart and mind.

Handel's music (now edited and modernly arranged by Hamilton Harty) was written by him for the fireworks exhibition given in London in 1747 to celebrate the peace of Aix-La-Chapelle. A peace about as successful as that of Versailles in our own century! Handel's set of pieces consists of an overture, allegro, lument, bouree, largo, allegro and two minuets. The music is in reality a classical suite and not any attempt at literal description in tone. Stravinsky attended to that, with his own "Fireworks" (1908), in which one hears and almost seems to see the whirling pinwheels, sizzling rockets and bursting bombs.

The lowly saxophone is not a product of the jazz age, as often supposed, but actually earned the respect of several fine composers and has figured in symphonic and opera orchestras for a little less than 100 years. It was used among others by Bizet, Saint-Saens, Delibes, and you will find it too in the "Sinfonia Domestica" by Richard Strauss.

Debussy's "Rhapsody" was created originally for saxophone and piano; the orchestration is by Roger-Ducasse. The work has an American origin, for it was commissioned by a Mrs. Hall of Boston in 1903, who played the saxophone and was president of the Orchestral Club in her city. At first Debussy entitled his score "Oriental Rhapsody," then "Moorish Rhapsody," and in its final state the music still has melody and rhythm suggestive of Spain and the Moors.

In and Out Again

LAST week, under the picture of a musical artist, the editor of RADIO GUIDE wrote this caption: "Now radio listeners must say good-by to Nelson Eddy. And, it seems, they must say good-by to great classical singers in general . . . With his departure, few of his kind remain as regulars besides Richard Crooks . . . Only a short while ago Lawrence Tibbett was upholding a stirring segment of 'The Circle,' Lily Pons was combining her glorious art with that of Andre Kostelanetz, Grace Moore's voice was thrilling thousands. Where are they now? We are puzzled. Why must this be? Surely people still want to hear great singing. Perhaps the best way to get it back is for listeners to demand it of the broadcasters . . ."

As a sort of musical policeman on the air, I was much impressed with the implications of the foregoing comment. Where are the roses of yesteryear, asks the poet; and your music editor repeats, where are some of the former artists that used to be featured regularly on important broadcasts?

I don't mean that they have vanished entirely, but their radio appearances now are only occasional, and that's what puzzles some of us greatly. What is the reason? Are they too expensive for the sponsors? And do the sustaining programs ignore them at present simply because they succeeded last year in convincing the Federal Communications Commission of their high cultural intentions through the presentation of the best music and performers?

It is difficult to understand why we have no hour (or even half-hour) devoted regularly to the solo art of the best singers and instrumentalists. The entire country is more than ever alive with response to superfine musical achievements, and he who declares that there is no general interest in the subject only displays his ignorance of the true condition. Listeners, sponsors, producers and advertising agencies that refuse to be convinced are merely content to go along the line of least resistance.

Everyone of taste and discrimination regrets the abandonment of such programs as the General Motors symphony concerts, and even the Toscanini series is not altogether a substitute for them

with its dearth of soloists. Such famous orchestras as those of Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago and other major cities come to us infrequently if at all during the winter, and their absence is all the more to be deplored because of the tremendous army of dialers built up through the years by the Sunday broadcasts of the New York Philharmonic.

America is essentially "star-minded" in music as in everything else. Wherefore, then, shut out the shiningest soloists of song and instrumental art?

If money is the deterrent, perhaps we shall soon have renewed and regular replacement of the absentees. Prosperity, that elusive factor, now really appears to be around the corner, with war in Europe, America busy with peaceful manufacturing, and Wall Street figures steadily worming their way upward. If more cars, then more art . . . let us hope.

THE Toscanini broadcasts remain one of the highspots of the New York season, and one can always discover one or two big-name guests in the audience that packs the big NBC 8-H studio every week by invitation.

Oscar Levant, popular pianist-conductor, one of the stars of "Information, Please," is a regular attendant, and can be found every Saturday night during intermission chatting with a group of friends. Among a very dressy crowd, Levant is one of the few that sticks to plain, pin-striped business suits.

Two Hollywood visitors were Ramon Novarro, glamour boy of the silent films, and Zasu Pitts. Novarro is at present interested in a concert career as a singer, and his companion at the broadcast was Frieda Hempel, famous prima donna of a few years back. Zasu Pitts, in a magnificent mink coat, almost fooled us into taking her for an "oomph" girl, but one look at those large, pathetic eyes and that quavery smile and we knew Zasu, thank goodness, was still Zasu.

Frank Black never misses a Toscanini concert, and always escorts his very lovely wife, a tall, dark brunette with exquisite taste in clothes. At each broadcast she wears a different kind of fur jacket with hat to match. Another conductor's wife who is a fashion-plate is Mrs. Alfred Wallenstein, as blond as Mrs. Black is dark. Efrem Zimbalist, violinist, turns up regularly every Saturday night, as does David Sarnoff.

March of Music readers who live in or near New York will be glad to know that the last broadcast of the Beethoven cycle, when Toscanini will play the Ninth Symphony, will be a public performance in Carnegie Hall and seats are already on sale at the box-office.

The New Friends of Music concerts also get their quota of celebrities. Seen at the first one was New York's own Mayor La Guardia. No one knew he had been there until he left. He came and went unobtrusively—not to be seen but to listen to chamber-music, of which he is passionately fond. One can imagine the fanfare and pomp that would accompany the visit of the mayor of the biggest city in the country—in any country but America!

Men Behind the Music

This Week: Lewis Lane—

Dr. Jacob Coopersmith—Thomas Belviso


Presenting the second part of Leonard Liebling's discussion of network music librarians and their work.—Ed.

AFTER Mattfeld left NBC, the library continued to function under the able supervision of Thomas Belviso, manager of the music division, and the direction of William Paisley, composer-pianist. Under Belviso, too, flourished the most unique section of the library—a sort of information bureau of musical data and history. Started by Lewis Lane, it is still under his personal supervision and has now become a part of the script department.

Although not properly belonging in an article on music librarians, Thomas Belviso appears here because he is head of all the technical departments of music at NBC, including the music library. He was brought in several years ago to organize the music department, and under him are program-building, musical composition, arranging, research, copyright-clearing and the music library. He has had a career as violinist and conductor, was a child prodigy in New Haven, Conn., studied with, among others, Horatio Parker, famous American composer, and has written much music himself. Since his

Lane, a piano student under Rubin Goldmark and Edwin Hughes, joined Mattfeld at NBC as his assistant. For three years Lane did regular library work. But he noticed that the script-writers were still depending on outside sources for bits of musical information to use in the introduction of music programs. Lane conceived the idea of starting a file of such information so people could come to one place and get quick and accurate answers to their questions. He suggested such a department and was told to go ahead. He started with a few reference-books and clippings. Today his department contains practically every musical reference-book extant, and his clipping files include over 75,000 items, covering every musical subject. Not only has his department been invaluable to NBC but he gets inquiries from all over the country from musical organizations and private individuals. Some of the questions he gets stump even him, however. One that lives in his memory came from a worried mother, who asked whether her son's recently thickened lips came from playing the flute, and what should she do about it. He's still thinking up an answer to that one.

entrance into NBC, all the various music departments function like clockwork and particularly the copyright section. NBC has not suffered one infringement fight since Belviso came to them. Over 100,000 items pass through NBC every month for checking. A program has to pass through countless hands and has to meet with Belviso's approval.

At WOR, Dr. Jacob Coopersmith is librarian. Asked by Jules Seebach and Alfred Wallenstein some years ago to found the WOR music library, he made such a good job of it that it now possesses the largest collection of music for string orchestras in existence today. A Ph. D. of Harvard, he is one of the outstanding musicologists of the country and an acknowledged authority on Handel. Collecting unpublished Handel score-pages is his hobby, and to date he owns two thousand. Julius Mattfeld is his fast friend, and both have endless arguments with musicologists, claiming that music is and should be a living thing and not a subject for musty, theoretical discussion. Both have done more than their share in upholding their end of the argument by their brilliant achievements in the radio field.

THE RISE OF MOLLY GOLDBERG

"FOR you, Papa, two and two must always make four. Such logic you have." The voice was scolding—gentle, but nevertheless scolding. "Yes, Molly. And for you one and one can make four, yes? Such arithmetic you have!"

If you happen to be the type of person who looks for the formula behind any success story, and if you happen to be looking, now, for the formula which permits radio's first family—the Goldbergs—to celebrate its tenth anniversary on the air this week while other shows have come and gone. I rather think you'll find it in those two lines of dialog, picked up from "The Goldbergs" broadcast a few weeks ago. In those two lines we find Molly—warmly, lovably human and illogical, striving to make her illogical dreams come true against all laws of reason—and Papa, sternly honest and logical. Add in Sammy and Rosie and Uncle David, with their problems and worries and loves, and you have a family circle which—stripped of its Jewish dialect—might be any American family. There you have the nearest approach to a formula which can be applied to this radio show, which, if we except Amos 'n' Andy, occupies a place of honor as radio's first serial. Boiled down, it's simply a matter of wide human appeal, and the only difference between the Goldbergs and other less successful shows is that the less successful shows are aimed at the target of universal appeal with indifferent success while the Goldbergs has struck the bull's-eye.

If it seems odd to you that a poor Jewish family from the Ghetto of New York should become the symbol of American family life to so many people of all sects and races throughout the country, it's because you haven't met Gertrude Berg. Gertrude is Molly. As

a matter of fact, it's difficult to say where Molly ends and Gertrude begins. But she's more than Molly. For it was Gertrude Berg who dreamed up this family, put them down on paper in black and white, and then breathed the breath of life into them all.

"I have two families," she confesses. "My radio family and my real family and—in different ways, of course—it's hard to say which is the closer to me." And there's no question but that she lives out each heart-breaking or humorous experience her brain-children undergo in the course of a broadcast.

THE Bergs—there's Lewis Berg, a sugar technician; Cherney, 18-year-old son; Harriet, fourteen-year-old daughter; and Gertrude—live in a ten-room duplex apartment in Central Park West these days. There, in a neat little study away from the usual noises of a healthy household, "The Goldbergs" is written. Mrs. Berg is a stickler for detail and her scripts are first set down as short narratives, later chopped into individual broadcasts and put in dialog form. She works early in the morning, before the noises of the city start and before her own family is up and around. This is not so much to avoid the family as it is an effort to spend more time with them, for from their conversations and affairs she gleams much of her material. Mrs. Berg is a conversation "snitcher." When anyone says something that strikes her as having show possibilities, she writes it down. Once she got up and left a dinner party the Bergs were giving for friends, and when, after an

hour, her husband went to look for her, he found her working over a typewriter on an idea she had just got. In her enthusiasm, she had forgotten the dinner, guests and everything except the Goldbergs. Things like that are always happening, but when the creative urge is not upon her she is the most considerate and understanding of people.

At forty, Mrs. Berg is a plump, matronly type, much too heavy for her height. She'll tell you vaguely that she weighs a hundred and fifty pounds, but a figure closer to two hundred would be more nearly accurate. "I've tried dieting," she said, "but watching calories makes me nervous, so I just let nature take its course." Somehow you think of the Biblical Naomi when you talk with her. She has the same warm patience, the same understanding. She has the faith of a child in people—all people—that strikes an immediate response in others. Her clothes are simple, her home ornate. Her twinkling brown eyes, which can become suddenly sad and heavy, have warmth and a deep strength of character. She is nervous, sensitive, highly excitable.

Gertrude Berg was an only child, bright, probably spoiled, reared in a part of Harlem that had not yet gone black. Later her family moved to the Catskills, where her father operated an inn at Fleischmann, N. Y. Today Mrs. Berg owns the large Fleischmann estate for which the town was named. At an early age, Gertrude started acting in amateur theatricals, went to the Jewish folk-theater in New York. At the age

of eleven, she wrote her first poem, followed it with other poems, stories, plays, none of which ever saw print. Later she studied writing and acting at Columbia University.

While at Columbia she met Lewis Berg, a young chemist, and the following year—in 1919—they were married, left New York for New Orleans, where he had a job as a sugar technician with a large sugar refinery. During this whole period she continued to write poems, monologs, stories simply for her own recreation and without any thought of turning this talent to a profitable use.

In 1924 fire destroyed the sugar refinery and Lewis Berg's job, and they returned to New York and to a period of hard times. Because of his specialized talents, it was difficult for Lewis to secure work. And with hard times, it was natural that Gertrude—with her boundless energy—should begin to look around for some means of helping to make ends meet. And here again we see Molly peeping through Gertrude's make-up—Molly, the dreamer, but a dreamer of sound dreams and a dreamer with resources.

RADIO was a young art then, and an awkward art. And this young mother and wife saw—with her insatiable taste for the warm and human things of life—what so many of the program-builders of that early day failed to see: that people are most interested in the things near at hand, in the every-day problems of every-day people. Armed with a series of scripts called "Effie and Laura" and with a letter of introduction from Herman Bernie, brother of Ben, she went calling on program directors. It was Julius Seabach, then program director for CBS, who became interested in her stuff, agreed to put her on

By means of short wave King George V first sent his Christmas message to his people in far-flung British possessions. By short wave Edward VIII spoke his famous farewell words, "At long last * * *." By short wave on September 1, Prime Minister Cham-

berlain told his countrymen that, "We are now in a state of war with Germany." To thousands of loyal subjects isolated in the far outposts of the earth, the news from London and the booming strokes of Big Ben have become an indispensable link with home.

At Daventry, the great short-wave center of the British Broadcasting Cor-

The Swiss Monday and Wednesday night (8:45 to 10:15 p.m. EST; 7:45 to 9:15 CST; 5:45 to 7:15 PST) programs for North America are now being broadcast over HBL (9.34) . . . The Danish program for North America, heard nightly from 9:30 to 11 p.m. EST (8:30 to 10 CST; 6:30 to 8 PST) over OZF (9.52), is now being heard with good signal strength. A station announcement in English is given at 9:30 p.m. EST (8:30 CST; 6:30 PST), the news in Danish at 9:50 p.m. EST (8:50 CST; 6:50 PST), very beautiful chimes are sounded just before 10 p.m. EST (9 CST; 7 PST), then a clock similar to Big Ben strikes the hour (4 a.m. EST; 3 CST; 1 PST in Copenhagen), and the program ends with the National anthem . . . Which is the Mexico City station on 9.68 megs that interferes with "Paris Mondial" on the same frequency nightly? . . . The anti-Nazi "German Freedom Station" is broadcasting nightly from a secret location in Austrian Germany on frequencies ranging from 10 to 11 megs . . . August Balbi of Los Angeles, Calif., writes that DXB (9.61) is now broadcasting an additional schedule in English, nightly from 11 p.m. to 1 a.m. EST (10 p.m. to 12 mid. CST; 8 to 10 p.m. PST) . . . The Berne Bureau has assigned the following calls to the new 10,000-watt Belgrade, Yugoslavia, station: YUA and YUB (6.10); YUC and YUD (9.505); YUE (11.735), and YUF and YUG (15.24) . . . The Soviet broadcast for North America nightly from 7 to 8:50 p.m. EST (6 to 7:50 CST; 4 to 5:50 PST), is now being heard best over RNE (12.00) . . . All Colombian and Venezuelan short-wave

stations have been ordered to stop making any English announcements for the duration of the war . . . ZIKZ, Belize, British Honduras, broadcasting Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, from 8:30 to 9 p.m. EST (7:30 to 8 CST; 5:30 to 6 PST), is again being heard on a frequency of 10.6 megs . . . A new station, COX7 (4.29), controlled by the Cuban army, Ciudad Militar, Havana, is relaying broadcast station CMZ nightly with loud signals . . . 

Person-to-Person . . .

● A note comes from Irwin Johnson, of station WBNS (Columbus, Ohio) announcing the inauguration of a series of debates utilizing a specially created technique. Teams from eighteen colleges in the Ohio conference will compete for the WBNS Radio Debate Cup.

● Northwestern University's Professor John T. Frederick makes a very unusual claim to distinction for his "Of Men and Books" series. *At least half the books he reviews never find their way within sight of best-seller listings.* "That doesn't mean they aren't worthwhile reading," he explains. "On the contrary, they frequently are of greater literary merit than works that sell by the hundreds and thousands. But they aren't written by popular authors, or as well publicized. The American reading public consequently is quite unaware of their existence. That's why I review them. I want my listeners to become acquainted with authors of really important books."

● Illinois' Department of Public Health has prepared another set of recorded educational dramas on public health for release to all interested broadcasters in and near Illinois. Last year twenty-three independent stations gave a total of 534 fifteen-minute periods to these transcriptions. Working on the theory that the successful use of radio for public health education depends upon the adaptation of the subject-matter to the medium by someone who understands both, a professional script-writer with training and experience in public welfare has been added to the department's staff.

● November 10 and 11 finds many outstanding leaders in the field of radio education assembled in Minneapolis for the Third Annual KSTP Conference on Educational Broadcasting. This yearly meeting was started in 1937 by Thomas D. Rishworth, educator-director of station KSTP, and since its founding sixteen radio workshops have been established in the Twin City area. The conference program includes several demonstrations by these workshop groups, talks, round-table discussions and panel meetings. A feature of the meeting will be three audition-rooms, where recordings of outstanding educational programs will be played for visitors upon request.





Reflecting the tenor of the period, Boucher's works substitute charm for Rubens' robustness, warmth for Rubens' fire. Some of his paintings are

artificial and in questionable taste, as was life among his contemporaries, but his portraits of Mme. de Pompadour are of the finest type. They breathe the spirit of elegance and aristocracy of Versailles, are the best of a "pink painting" era. Boucher and his work will be interpreted through talks and dramatizations on the "Art for Your Sake" broadcast, Saturday, Nov. 18

"**THE NOBLE SLAV,**" below, is by the renowned Rembrandt Van Rijn (1606-1669), whose paintings differed from his contemporaries in that they were not concerned with every-day appearances but with the permanent inner qualities of character and mind. "**Mlle. Charlotte du Val d'Ognes,**" below, by Jacques Louis David (1748-1825). The FUNNIEST MAN IN THE WORLD

FRED ALLEN'S radio income is \$10,000 a week. He chews five-cent tobacco and his real name is John Florence Sullivan. He lives as though his wages were \$50 a week, in a small apartment with no servants. He has no car, or secretary. His wife, Portland, does her own housework. It's not because Fred is stingy, heavens, no! He simply is a man who enjoys simple things, who hates ballyhoo.

He's an easy touch for old friends. After each program, the usual number of stews and ex-vaudeville folks gang around Allen. He hands them out a sawbuck or so, chats with them about the old days.

The most important man in Allen's stable is Uncle Jim Harkins. He and Allen became friends in 1915, when they both were in vaudeville, and when Allen hit the upper brackets he hired Jim as a "handler of details." Harkins is the only man alive who can interrupt Allen while he's talking. Allen gets sore if a fellow butts into his conversation, but Jim can get by with it.

Harkins is big and dark and jolly. He enjoys telling good jokes and will sit on the floor or stand on his head to get his point across. He's always getting jobs for friends and never charges

commissions. He's what the craft calls a right honorable guy. And he thinks Fred Allen is the greatest man alive.

"It's common knowledge," Uncle Jim said, "that Fred was offered twice as much money as he now is getting to go on the air for a cigarette company. He turned it down. His sponsor has cut its newspaper space to use its broadcast and Fred thinks it wouldn't be right for him to switch sponsors."

Allen also knows that should he switch he might have to buck competition that doesn't bother him now. Also, the show that was opposite him would have tough sledding.

Uncle Jim saves Fred a heap of headaches. One evening a dignified man demanded to see Fred. "Don't think I want to make a touch," he told Harkins. "I have money, but I must see Mr. Allen."

"Maybe I can help you," said Harkins.

"Well," said the stranger, "I've got an idea for a radio program. It deals with horse-racing and would be announced in code over short wave. Now, here's where I need Mr. Allen. You see, short wave limits the area over which a program can be heard. I want Mr. Allen to go before the FCC and use

his influence to have the commission bend one of the short waves so my program could be heard all over the nation."

Uncle Jim looked at the man. He didn't know whether to call the cops or Bellevue, where they take folks who want to bend short waves. "You know," said Uncle Jim, finally, "you should have come a few months ago. A fellow was here and made exactly the same request of Fred. Fred went before the FCC and asked them to bend a short wave. He had to stay in Washington for months, and one day he told me, 'Uncle Jim, I'll never try to have another short wave bent. It's a lot of trouble.'"

The stranger sighed. "Yes, I suppose it is a lot of trouble. Well, I won't annoy Mr. Allen, but thanks, just the same."

Then there was the dentist who telephoned from an Ohio city and demanded to speak to Allen. "He's very busy," said Uncle Jim.

"I know he's busy, you dope," the dentist said, "but do you think I'd be calling from Ohio if it wasn't important?"

After much persuasion, at the dentist's expense, the doctor finally confided in Uncle Jim, who swore he would see that Allen got the news.

"I've been a dentist for twenty-five years," the man said. "After a few years of observation, I have found that

Allen never forgets a friend. He still patronizes the same barber he knew back when he was Freddie James. The barber used to give Allen a bit of credit and Fred never has forgotten the favor.

Back in 1919 Allen conducted "Easy Aces" Goodman's column in the Kansas City Post for a week, just to prove he could do it.

Perhaps the greatest bit of work Allen ever did was back about 1930, before he went on the air. The popular stage and the movies wouldn't dare write or present comedy about physically deformed persons. But Allen broke all customs and did a funny show about deaf mutes. Incidentally, the mutes, who were students at the time, won the famous Belasco cup that year for an outstanding performance.

If a fellow is writing a story about mutes, he should make it serious and all that, but not Brother Allen. The deaf-and-dumb students wanted to do a play and Fred agreed to help them.

WHEN the curtain went up, the mutes were in their New England home. A baby was in her cradle. Father and mother were at a table. Mr. Allen translated the mutes' sign language for the audience. The baby crooked a finger and Mr. Allen was off:

"The poor child is in distress," Fred said. "He calls to his parents. The crooked index finger of the right hand gives the baby a slight defect in speech, similar to a lisp."

The audience didn't know whether to laugh or not. After all, one doesn't laugh at mutes. The parents waggled their fingers and made all sorts of signs.

"The conversation is at the boiling-point," Mr. Allen interpreted. "He calls her a liar. She says, 'So is your old man.' Their language is very strong. Note their muscular fingers."

By that time the audience was wise

my patients who listen to Jack Benny's program have loose fillings in their teeth. The ones who listen to Fred Allen not only have perfect fillings but when I'm working on Allen fans they always are calm. Be sure to announce my discovery over the air. Have you got my name right?"

(Aside to Uncle Jim Harkins: If that one gets by you owe me a drink. I don't believe it and I don't believe anybody else will, even though you vow it's true.)

Remember, I said Uncle Jim would go to any limits to get a story across. You can take the dentist yarn for what it's worth. But this one is on the up-and-up: An executive of a telephone company had his servant call one night to tell Allen that the big-shot was listening in and instructed Fred to announce that startling fact over the air.

that it was comedy, real comedy. They rolled in the aisles.

Finally Mr. Allen ended the show by explaining that the troupe really were silent opera singers who sang with the language of the mutes.

It was a masterful performance. If any other artist had done it, it might have been crude and in bad taste, but Allen never does anything crudely.

He's a very even-tempered man, but if you want to get under his skin walk up to him some day when he's standing before friends, chewing tobacco, and telling a tale. Just interrupt his story and call him Florence.

But don't say we didn't warn you.

that mingle hues of the rainbow with the patterns of a kaleidoscope.

Once, rumor says, Arch donned a collar and tie. The event was a dinner given by Lewis H. Titterton, chief of NBC's script department, at his home. When Oboler and his young wife arrived at the Titterton domicile, the writer fidgeted and said:

"Notice anything different about me?"

Titterton dismissed the matter lightly, only to have it brought up again a few minutes later. Still no reaction.

"Look," explained Eleanor, Oboler's

wife, at last. "He's been trying to tell you he's wearing a collar and a tie to-night!"

This man who gave horror a new twist in his "Lights Out" presentations is a dynamo of nervous energy. He wanders around with quick, jerky motions. To watch him sit in a chair is practically like viewing a gymnast at work. He gets one leg over the arm, then the other leg, finally squirms around in contortions that bring painful pangs of sympathy to the observer. But Arch doesn't mind. It's just a way of working off that excess energy which keeps his mind churning at high speed.

He's small in stature, wears glasses, is definitely no glamour boy. Yet get him going in conversation and you'll unearth a congenial warmth, an understanding of many things, plus the discovery that here is an entirely democratic person. He likes people—and consequently it's not hard to understand why people like him.

Arch—who, incidentally, hates to be called "Mr. Oboler"—lives with his wife in an old brownstone house in the heart of New York. He has a collection of toads, tortoises, frogs and snakes, plus a grand library. In addition to a penchant for unpressed trousers and informal dress, Arch is an inveterate prowler amongst out-of-the-way sections of Gotham. Plots, he says, are a cinch to find. It's the dressing them up that takes the time.

Mrs. Oboler, a co-ed at the University of Chicago when he married her, fools many a guest by her apparently extreme youth. This she gleefully accentuates by girlish peasant costumes and long hair. On their wedding trip through the New England states about two years ago, Arch devoted a good part of the time to visiting all the haunted houses he could find. Life with those Obolers is delightfully informal. That's what a friend found out not long ago when invited to dinner.

"Gee," confessed Oboler, "there's nothing in the house to eat!"

He had forgotten to tell his wife that the friend was coming. And, anyway, she was studying for an examination next day in a study course she happened to be taking. "Mind going downstairs and eating at the cafeteria?" asked Arch.

The guest ate in the cafeteria. But with the sparkling flow of Oboler conversation at his elbow, it wasn't such a hardship.

The young radio-writer finally had to give up his series of "Lights Out" productions. They were aired shortly after midnight and millions stayed up late to shiver beside the radio at the grunts of Neanderthal men or the spooky tread of supernatural terrors. But there was a point of diminishing returns.

"The horror tale," says he, "has one great defect. The horror must be cumulative or else it soon becomes a bore. If you break a man's leg in one episode, then you have to break all his bones in the next if you want to achieve the same effect. That's why all truly great horror stories are short and why even the last third of such a masterpiece as 'Dracula' becomes anti-climatic.

"That," admits Arch Oboler, "is why I stopped writing the 'Lights Out' thrillers. I couldn't keep on topping my own horror situations."

Today it's the "wonder tale" that corrals the audience, he finds. Man's capacity for marveling at the wonders of the universe is without limit.

Remember "The Ugliest Man in the World"? If you missed it, then you missed one of radio's most powerful playlets. That's the production which helped put Oboler on the NBC map. He brought a record of it—which he had cast and produced himself—to the office of script-head Titterton one day about a year ago, along with a portable phonograph.

Titterton, a busy man if ever there was one, listened. Finally he took the phone off the hook to keep it from ringing. He just sat there and continued to listen, fascinated by the half-hour recording. When it was over, Arch Oboler received free rein from the NBC bosses to write and produce a weekly drama. And those programs have more than lived up to their expectations.

He prepares all scripts by using a dictaphone. There are three of them in the Oboler home. The young writer has lost the knack of pounding a typewriter. He merely talks at high speed into the dictaphone; then, next day, a typist transcribes it. "Sometimes," says he, "it's so bad I throw it all away and start again."

The ideas come from every which way. A resonant, liquid voice he hears on the radio, the smile upon the face of a woman sitting next to him in the subway, some vagrant theme from the pen of Sibelius or Debussy—any of these may send the train of thought clicking like a row of dominoes. Once he sat down at midnight to write a tale about Mars and its sinister approach to the earth; next morning he arose with a finished story about a woman suffering from a split personality.

In the studio, producing his own handiwork on the air, Arch Oboler is still a whirlwind of energy. Spurning the usual procedure of production-men who direct from behind the glass of the control-room, he sets himself up in the middle of the studio. Earphones clamped on his head, Oboler commands with sweeping gestures, often perched on a central table while his actors rotate in swift succession around the microphone. It gives the cast a closer-knit coordination, saves precious seconds in the giving of cues, and lets Oboler himself feel the tempo of the play by being right in the thick of its action.

"There's no other medium," he insists, "which has quite the possibilities for unhampered imagination and originality as the new field of radio drama." And the Oboler formula has been applied with exemplary success in the realms of fantasy, comedy, realism, satire, stark tragedy and romance.

After all, that just about spans the whole range of humanity's highly variable emotions.



poration, near London, are ten powerful short-wave transmitters capable of transmitting on more than twenty-five assigned frequencies.

Constant tone signals are used on each London frequency before the beginning of a broadcast. The announcers are always men. Each transmission opens with these words, "This is London calling in the Overseas Service of the BBC." Big Ben, famous clock atop the Tower of Parliament in London, strikes the hour during broadcasts from Daventry. Preceding the strokes of Big Ben, and often on the half and quarter-hour, the chimes of Westminster are broadcast. Intervals between programs are identified by bow-bells. London programs can not always be identified by English speech or announcements since many programs are now broadcast in other languages. All transmissions from London end with the British national anthem, "God Save the King" (same tune as "America").

The news bulletins in English from London, prepared by the Reuters International News Service and the Propaganda Department of the BBC, heard at frequent intervals throughout the day as shown in the section, War News from Europe, on this page of RADIO GUIDE, are more detailed and authentic, and as a whole more propaganda free than those from other foreign stations. Each news item is brief and concise, almost telegraphic in style. Often recorded excerpts from important speeches made during the day are included at the end of the news bulletin.

Topical talks from London are of vital interest at present. The most important of those scheduled regularly are as follows: "Background to the News," consisting of one or two talks in which current events are expertly interpreted or are given their historical background, may be heard Mondays and Thursdays . . . "Matters of Moment," bringing to the microphone some of Britain's best-known personalities—Malcolm Macdonald, Arthur Greenwood, Lord Hailey, or others—to give their views on important happenings or to explain recent developments, may be heard on Wednesdays . . . "In England Now," consisting of men and women from all over the country, talking about their war work or describing how they are carrying on with their normal occupations, may be heard on Tuesdays and Fridays . . . "London Log," in which Howard Marshall tells of life in the British capital as it is today, may be heard on Saturdays . . . Topical talks that offer listeners a chance to hear Britain's foremost authorities and experts, such as Winston Churchill, Anthony Eden or Commander Stephen King-Hall, discussing war-time problems, activities and developments, are broadcast almost daily. For the best frequency, or frequencies, to hear the above programs consult Short-Wave Program Listings on Page 14.

Symphonic concerts, sports reviews, variety shows, dramas and opera broadcasts, may still be heard occasionally in the London programs but these are seldom scheduled far enough in advance to permit their inclusion in our program listings, for everything in London is now on a war-time or emergency basis.


