Radio has elected a president. It has prevented a World War. Its power is mighty and awe-inspiring. How shall this power be controlled and directed for man's own benefit? RADIO GUIDE has asked several American leaders of thought to think about broadcasting. Their guest editorials will appear in this space each week.—THE EDITOR.

RADIO broadcasting may be an infant industry in point of years, but it has proved itself an infant prodigy in point of wisdom.

We need only look at the stunted growth of radio in other lands—its perversion to partisan uses, its subservience to special interests—to congratulate ourselves on our better fortune.

We owe an everlasting debt to the leaders of the American radio industry for having developed technical efficiency in broadcasting to the highest point known in the world, for having made reception available to the poorest classes of our people, and for having provided us with a high order of entertaining and educational programs.

But we owe an even greater debt to the leaders of the radio industry and to the leaders of our Federal Government for their deep wisdom in having maintained, at all costs and above all considerations, the freedom of the air in this country.

I am not especially qualified to judge the quality of entertainment and education provided by the daily radio programs. There are some programs I like a great deal; others I don't care for. But I recognize that it would be impossible to please everyone all the time and that the broadcasting companies are doing a fine job in trying to please most of their listeners most of the time.

What particularly interests me in radio is its function as a medium of public information. Beyond all question it is the greatest medium of that kind in our modern world.

Today Government, political parties, organized labor and many other groups are dependent upon radio in an ever-increasing degree to carry their message into the homes of the nation.

In the early days of civilization, people derived their news by word of mouth. Later the written word brought the world closer together by way of books and newspapers.

Newspapers still are extremely influential, perhaps

because people believe the written word more than the spoken word. But the weakness of the newspapers in this country today is their partisanship. It is rare indeed that all sides of any public question are presented fully, fairly and impartially in both the news and editorial columns of our newspapers. As a matter of fact, most newspapers do not even pretend to be impartial in their editorials. They consider it their function to take sides. Such may be their function. But whenever a newspaper takes sides, its value as an impartial contributor to public information is thereby limited.

On the other hand, radio has striven against tremendous odds and powerful pressure to maintain an even balance. When radio presents facts, it excludes opinion so far as is humanly possible. When it presents opinion, it tries to offer opinions of all sides on any given subject. In this way the listener is permitted to form his own judgment from the facts and from various opinions.

Recently radio has tried to ape the newspaper columnists by presenting more and more news commentators. I do not think this vogue should be encouraged too far. Some newspaper columnists make a practise of airing personal hates and prejudices. Some of them indulge in sensational gossip. They do this cleverly in order to get a following and command greater compensation. The danger in this sort of competitive struggle is that these writers may forget their guiding principle should be to provide truthful and factual information.

I am glad to say that radio commentators have shown more consciousness of this responsibility than newspaper columnists. They should endeavor at all times when expressing opinions to label them as such so as not to mislead their listeners.

It is my earnest hope and conviction that the radio industry, in conducting the greatest public forum in the nation, will show in the future as it has in the past that it can maintain, by self-discipline and self-censorship, the freedom of the air.

GATEWAY TO HOLLYWOOD

HEAVY IS THE GATE THAT LEADS TO THE PROMISED LAND OF DRAMATIC ARTISTS, BUT A RADIO PROGRAM SWINGS IT WIDE TO BUDDING TALENT



THIS is the story of Alice Eden and John Archer—a young woman and a young man who do not yet exist except in name but who will later come to life in a blaze of glory. You may be Alice or John; or your son or daughter may be.

It is the story of a big new radio program called "The Gateway to Hollywood" and of the vistas that lie beyond that gateway, especially for two junior Americans.

Hollywood!

The name goes to the head like wine—exhilarating, intoxicating, and sometimes blinding, sickening.

The symbolical gateway to the most publicized town in the world is both seductive and forbidding. It glitters and glows, but beneath the gold plating there is a brass foundation. It takes a lot of "push," or perhaps more "pull," to move the massive gate inward, but it swings easily outward at the mere approach of an actor walking the "last mile" outward.

This week the dynamic power of radio swings the gate open inward upon Hollywood and opportunity.

Alice Eden will sit by her radio Sunday and turn on the switch. Perhaps she has read this story or has heard through some other medium of "The Gateway to Hollywood." Maybe she is casually listening to nothing in particular. In either case, if she turns the switch at a certain time, she will find to her breathless anticipation or intense surprise that she is turning a free key in the heavy lock of Hollywood's gateway. As the radio set warms up, the tubes will glow brightly and become symbolical of those shining portals to an actor's earthly paradise. There will be a fanfare of triumphant promise, and Hollywood—precious Hollywood—will stand forth with open arms bidding Alice, "Welcome to fame and fortune."

Somewhere else John Archer will turn his radio switch, see the same

vision, hear the same call. There are thousands of those Alices and Johns. Today they are only Jacks and Jills, mere nobodies, only remotely potential as future screen idols. Many will be called and few chosen. Tomorrow, though, we'll be saying of the lucky pair, "I heard them make their radio debut in 1939."

The new program, which starts this week, does present a somewhat unique idea with overwhelming appeal. Its drawing-power is based upon, first, the well-nigh unanimous desire of every youngster with the slightest dramatic inclination to crash the silver screen; second, the demonstrated interest of the general public, whether from sympathy or good-will, in the efforts of such beginning aspirants.

The idea is a combination of "Major Bowes' Amateur Hour" and "Metropolitan Opera Auditions of the Air," with the motion-picture motive to make it unique. Like Major Bowes, the new radio set-up offers opportunity to talented beginners. Like the Metropolitan Auditions, it tenders a definite professional reward to winning contestants.

It's a talent-hunt. Don't let that scare you. There have been many so-called talent-hunts and contests, it is true, in varying degrees of fairness and phony-ness. This one is strictly bona fide. It must be on the up-and-up or radio, stringent guardian of the public interest, would not accept the idea at any price. The program is sponsored by a gum-manufacturing concern whose name is a world commonplace and a reputable motion-picture organization.

The nation-wide search for fresh talent is being conducted in twenty-four key cities by two personal representatives of Jesse L. Lasky, who is the supervisor of the radio-screen project. These representatives are two of the most outstanding actors and most esteemed figures of screen history, Hobart Bosworth and Bryant Washburn. They travel all over the country building good-will for the idea and setting the stage for the talent selections.

Get out the lipstick and put on your most winsome smile, girls—or should we say women?—if you're over seventeen and under twenty-three. Those are the age-limits, and no fudging! Keep in mind, too, that you can't get into Hollywood through this entrance without full consent of your parents or guardians. Men, loosen your glib tongues and heave forth your chests, if you're at least twenty-one and not over twenty-seven.

You are to be Alice Eden and John Archer—that's what you think, and maybe you're right. The two final winners of the contest will take those as their screen names.

It isn't all for the glory of personal satisfaction and artistic expression. The Muse proffering a crown of laurel with one hand wouldn't be nearly so welcome if she didn't hold in her other hand a healthy sheaf of assorted bills—

travel in fast company from the very start. For instance, on the first program of the series are scheduled to appear as a supporting cast Miriam Hopkins, Joan Bennett and Edward Arnold—and that is some support either for a beginner or a seasoned actor.

The "stars" of the premiere program will be Camille Patti of Dallas, Texas, and Ralph Bowman of Lincoln, Nebraska, the first pair chosen for the ren-

art and money. A professional Yukon beckoning the restless prospector to come and find one of its buried nuggets—or its fools' gold.

Hollywood—The mecca of every career-crazy, budding Myrna Loy. The peak for every art-climbing young Paul Muni.

The place where people are paid and paid well to be somebody besides themselves. We all like to pretend, especially if we get paid for it. That's why Jack wants to be John Archer and Jill wants to be Alice Eden.

HORACE GREELEY didn't know just what his advice to "Go west, young man" would mean after his time. Every year, every month, every day it happens. Some independent youngster forsakes home and security to stake all on his or her confidence of ability to storm the castle of moviedom. Some oldster of vaudeville's halcyon days makes the long trek to beat the streets and beat on the doors of Hollywood's cold casting-offices. Some stage luminary, sated with Broadway or London success, sweeps into the film capital like a conquering hero.

A truck-driver in Springfield has been told by well-meaning friends that he has a profile like John Barrymore's. A clerk in the Jinxville five-and-ten has been convinced by her mirror that she has eyes like Olivia de Havilland's and lips like Hedy LaMarr's. A high-school grad in Chicago believes she has a shape as attractive as Ginger Rogers', and is quite sure she can dance as well. Joe of St. Joseph is a comical scream at all the parties.

They all go west.

Some give up and go home. Some stay and starve. A very few stick and succeed.

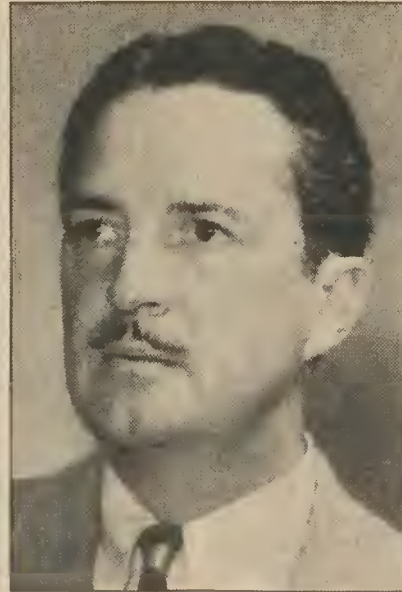
Yes, indeed, the gateway to Hollywood is a powerful magnet. It is to actors and would-be actors what the Met is to singers, the big leagues to sand-lotters, the White House to politicians, the New York Times to reporters, the missing link to anthropologists, Mt. Everest to mountain-climbers, and the whole world to dictators.

To pass through that gateway to the inner sanctum, there are thousands who would pay or sacrifice anything within their power. Good old radio offers free—even compensated—passage to the actually deserving. This time it isn't just a wildcat publicity exploit. There will be contracts in black and white with fixed figures in them, and there

They will have supporting roles to help give the youngsters impetus on their meteoric journey. Alice and John will

When Mr. Lasky rings up the curtain Sunday night and the radio spotlight falls on Camille and Ralph, with Miriam, Joan and Edward, what will Jack and Jill hear and see behind the lines? The gateway to Hollywood—open!

Hollywood—Romance or realism? Glamour or gloss? Sensuality or sensibility? A Jekyll-Hyde society turning somersaults and playing tag about the movie lots and mansions.

Hollywood—The magic city of Shangri-la whose spell proves irresistible to many who know that once beyond its "lost horizon" there is little chance of return to the world of fact.

So there is back-slapping in both directions across the Atlantic.

Humans and animals are closer together today than they have been since Darwin's daring hypothesis caused such a furor. It isn't be-

cause they've found another missing link. Walter O'Keefe is keyed up, Andre Kostelanetz' orchestra is in tune, Kay Thompson's Rhythm Singers have their chord, and Lily Pons is in voice for "Tune-Up Time." It's a new series making its bow this week, and an elaborate bow it is. O'Keefe, noted wit and raconteur, is m.c. of the program. The man who made "The Man on the Flying Trapeze" famous is known for his humor contributions to such programs as the early "Hit Parade," "Camel Caravan," "Hollywood Mardi Gras," and as a substitute for Fred Allen in 1937. The musical portion of the new show is under the brilliant direction of Andre Kostelanetz, who is returning to the air after a six-month absence. The vacation included a honeymoon with his bride, the celebrated opera star, Lily Pons. Kostelanetz, who is considered one of the most-distinguished of air conductors, will direct a forty-five-piece orchestra composed of well-known musicians. Mrs. Kostelanetz, better known to millions of music lovers as Lily Pons, the greatest coloratura soprano of the time, will be the first guest star of the new program, thereby furnishing human interest as well as top-notch entertainment. Kay Thompson's Rhythm Singers, a new choral group composed of nine girls and three men and led by the popular contralto, will round out the program as regular contributors.

You've guessed it, of course. Phil Baker and his accordion, his humor and his "Bottle," the indispensable valet-stooge, are coming back to the air. In his lucky seventh year as a radio headliner, Phil will unfold his faithful accordion and his fresh book of fun from Coast-to-Coast and on out to Hawaii. The immaculately proper

Bottle, with his suspended sense of humor and his Shirley Temple dolls, will be right on hand to challenge Rochester's position as public valet number one. The March of Music

More Points of Merit

A READER calls attention to a lapse in my article of last week, wherein I spoke of American achievements in music. He remarks: "You say that you do not like to make the American eagle scream too boastfully when you mention the things this country has done in a musical way. I don't see why you don't let that bird shriek at the very top of his voice. Europe is not backward in continually proclaiming what it considers its own superiority. You certainly should have called attention to the fact that America possesses the best opera company and the best symphony orchestras in the world. Or don't you think so?"

I most emphatically do think so, and I am grateful for the reminder. My list was not intended to be a complete roster of America's tonal virtues, but chiefly a summary of what our composers have done and are doing and an expression of belief that it equals the best of European creation since the World War.

No opera house matches the Metropolitan with its remarkable array of singing stars and, whenever glamorous spring or summer opera performances are desired at famed Covent Garden in London, the casts are mainly made up of artists from the New York establishment.

I unhesitatingly rank the Philadelphia, Boston, New York Philharmonic and NBC orchestras above the best of the European symphonic organizations, and the latter are easily equaled by those of Cleveland, Chicago and Cincinnati. If European radio listeners get our orchestral broadcast music by short wave, I think that they must agree with my opinion.

Speaking Up

By V. V.

QUESTION:

Will radio provide more opportunities for young American artists in the future than it has in the past?

ANSWERS:

HOWARD BARLOW (CBS conductor; director of Columbia Symphony Orchestra, "Everybody's Music"): "In my branch of music, young people of experience are difficult to find, although young musicians of talent are always

in demand. I have a preference for younger performers whom I can develop and watch grow. I am also always on the lookout for new young American composers and will continue to cooperate with CBS in the fine work they have already accomplished in that field."

ALFRED WALLENSTEIN (musical director of WOR-Mutual): "Radio tends more and more toward using younger musicians. Because of a lack of famous names and because radio is a natural outlet for youthful talent, opportunities will naturally increase. However, the public demand for our own young artists is not yet insistent enough. Americans are still slaves to the star system, which must be radically transformed before younger performers and composers receive their full share of recognition."

FRANK BLACK (NBC conductor): "Opportunities are increasing all the time and are helped by the fact that the big music schools like Juilliard, Curtis, etc., are turning out an abundance of expertly trained young musicians. They come to the studio with much more experience than in the past, and it is much easier for us to use them. Also, more music by young American composers is being performed. I myself carry on a continuous search for worth-while American music. However, I do not believe in playing anything that is not good, American or

otherwise. One does the American composer only a disservice by playing something merely because it happens to be American."

SAMUEL CHOTZINOFF (music consultant, NBC): "With the spread of good music that radio has already accomplished, more artists will be necessary. I believe also that in time opera will have as important a place on the air as symphonic music. NBC, in recognition of that fact, has commissioned the young American composer, Gian Carlo Menotti, to write an opera for NBC which will be produced shortly."

WALTER DAMROSCH: "Radio has been the greatest factor in developing a taste and understanding of music among the American people. In the same way, it is gradually becoming the greatest factor in the introduction of young, fresh musical talent and, as public taste and radio improve, the demand for younger artists will grow accordingly."

DEEMS TAYLOR (music consultant, CBS): "It is Utopian to expect radio to exploit young names at the expense of big stars. The star system cannot yet be abolished because big names on radio attract a better audience. However, broadcasting companies should enlarge their efforts to discover new talent. One way of doing this is to employ the same method used by magazines. When a manuscript is sent to a magazine, it is read by one man, who, if he thinks it good enough, passes it on to others. Radio companies should have regular weekly auditions, say an hour a week, conducted by one man, who would pass on the qualified residue to a committee trained in all branches of music. This committee would then make final selections, and when young musicians of promise appear, they should be given precedence over big names wherever possible."

FORD SUNDAY EVENING HOUR: "The policy of the Ford Sunday Evening Hour on soloists is to present artists, young or old, American or not, whom we believe have highest musical qualifications. When such artists are young Americans we are particularly pleased, naturally, but we do not endeavor to restrict program bookings to young Americans, because we think the public wants great musicians, whoever they are."

BARBIROLLI'S concert presentation not long ago of music from Debussy's opera was so well received that he is giving a welcome repeat of the arrangement for his radio audience. Not all the novel sounds and crass sonorities of his ultra-radical successors have weaned fastidious ears from the mystical and haunting beauty of the music with which Debussy enriched the touching drama by Maeterlinck.

Sibelius devotees will relish his violin concerto, somewhat more weighty and complicated than lyrical. Nineteen-year-old Gulla Bustabo, Italian-American, now emerged from the child prodigy class, possesses artistic quality of degree to do justice to the Sibelius requirements. She has been touring Europe and the Antipodes, everywhere winning real triumphs.

WALLENSTEIN continues bravely and well with his series of cantatas by Bach. He has rich abundance to choose from, as the great cantatist—to coin a word—composed nearly 300 such pieces during a period of thirty years. The sacred texts inspired him to some of his finest melodic ideas and many spiritual moments of the most effecting emotion. The cantata as such was the particular product of Bach's time; after his death it was practically abandoned in church services, though the short work had furnished a welcome break in the lengthy ritual.

IT IS interesting and amusing to recall that just after he had chosen Da Ponte his librettist, Mozart thought it a bad mistake, and yet it turned out that the former's texts enabled the composer to write his greatest two operas, the Marriage of Figaro and Don Giovanni.

Not only is the libretto of Don Giovanni a shrewd mixture of drama and comedy, but also it affords continuous opportunity for lyrical, tragic and even dance numbers, with natural employment of the chorus as massed background. Mozart's genius tonalized the material into an imperishable masterpiece, and most of its music has been the delight of singers and the public since the memorable Prague premiere in 1787.

The cast at today's matinee could hardly be improved upon, featuring Rethberg's silvery voice and Crooks' suave art.

ACT I

At the Metropolitan the opera is done stylistically, with some of the aria sung before the curtain while the stage sets are being changed for the

In the third scene, a rustic pair are celebrating their betrothal, assisted by singing and dancing villagers. Giovanni desires the girl, invites the company to his castle (there he sings the spirited Champagne Song), detains her while they entone the entrancing duet "La Ci Darem" ("Your Hand in Mine, My Dearest"), one of the most popular of all operatic gems. Donna Elvira appears and denounces Giovanni, thereby opening the eyes of the dazzled and hesitant Zerlina, who chants her penitence song to Masetto, "Batti, Batti" ("Chide Me, Chide Me"). Donna Anna and Octavio trail the rake, the latter apostrophizing his affianced with "Dalla Sua Pace" ("On Her All Joy Dependeth"), an aria of rarest loveliness. All go to Giovanni's party, which opens the fourth scene with an entrancing minuet, danced by the assemblage.

ACT II

Giovanni utilizes the noisy gaiety to lead Zerlina into a secluded chamber. She emerges screaming, and Giovanni follows her, sword in hand and dragging Leporello, but the trick avails nothing, and again Anna, Elvira, and

many scenes, the first of which has the wily Leporello waiting for his master, Don Giovanni, while that libertine is intriguing to win Donna Anna at her home. He emerges, followed by the girl and her father, the Commandant, who engages the Don in a duel, and falls. His slayer flees with Leporello. Donna Anna and her fiance, Don Octavio, swear vengeance.

In the second scene of Act I, the despoiler and his aid, plodding along a lonely road, encounter Donna Elvira, whom Don Giovanni has deserted while they were eloping. Leporello engages Elvira's attention with an ironical aria and Giovanni slips away.

Octavio expose the villainy of the host, who promptly disappears.

Scene three climaxes with an arraignment of Giovanni by Octavio, and the latter's delivery of the ravishing "Il Mio Tesoro" ("My Beloved").

Scene four and Giovanni and Leporello, stumbling through the darkness, come upon a statue erected to the memory of the Commandant.

In scene five, retribution overtakes Giovanni. He sups to music, when the stone Commandant enters after the unafraid gallant's sword has tried to halt the unwelcome guest. The Commandant grasps Giovanni with an icy hand, dragging him to his doom.

MORE selective taste distinguishes this list from some of the recent Ford compilations by Reiner, for which improvement, much thanks. Leo Weiner, Hungarian, born 1885, still living, specializes in folk-tunes treated with modernly rich orchestration.

The Bob Benchley show is shopping around for a new time in order to get away from the stiff competition of that new Hollywood all-star show featuring Carole Lombard, Cary Grant, Lawrence Tibbett, Ronald Colman and perhaps the Marx Bros. I hope it doesn't turn out to be an all-star flop like that Wednesday night show which also features a flock of big Hollywood names . . . Edward G. Robinson and his cast will broadcast from New York for the next three weeks . . . That "100 Men and a Girl" program with Raymond Paige's orchestra and Hildegard may have to change its title to avoid lawsuits . . . Edythe Wright is leaving, or will have left, the Tommy Dorsey band by the time you read this. CBSongstress Nan Wynn may join up with the Dorsey crew . . . NBC's "Boredom By Budd," featuring Stoopnagle's former partner, will henceforth be known as "The Budd Show." Maybe it changed because it lived up to its title, as did the CBS show presented early last year called "Earaches of 1938."

Behind the "Seen"

Announcer Fred Utall hobbling into the elevator at the CBS studios on crutches. Two days before, he strained a ligament in his ankle and it will be taped up for a few weeks. That was our old announcer friend, Norman Brokenshire, who went in to pinch-hit the "Big Sister" program while Fred was doctoring . . . George Hicks, losing three out of five games of ping-pong to his colleague, Jim Shellman, threw his paddle on the table in disgust and vowed that he will not play another game for at least a month . . . Carol Deis, who is appearing in the Broadway show, "Knickerbocker Holiday," sings in the Cities Service program chorus on Friday night in her elaborate and colorful stage costume. She sneaks out of the studio before the broadcast is over in order to reach the theater on time.

Leopold Spitalny, sitting in the glass-enclosed balcony watching his brother Phil go into all kinds of contortions as he directs his splendid all-girl orchestra . . . At the Eddy Duchin program everyone is in formal attire, including the engineer and production-men . . . At the "Hobby Lobby" program an armed guard hired by Dave Elman stands around watching a collection of watches reported to be worth \$200,000. The week before, a valuable exhibit was missing and Elman wasn't going to take any more chances . . . Peter Perrine, a page at NBC, spends his time off in the studios drawing sketches of the radio stars. Those that I saw are excellent . . . Frank Black and his attractive frau sitting at a night-spot reminiscing about "the good old days" with Jack Pearl, as your reporter and a friend listen in on the interesting conversation . . . Radio-writer Arch Oboler walks into NBC about midnight with his wife, declaring he just came from the show, "Boys from Syracuse." As he opened his coat, he looked just like one of the boys from Syracuse. He wore slacks and a sweater to a Broadway show, where almost everyone goes in white tie and tails. Arch thinks he's still in Hollywood.

Eddy Duchin is one of the most conscientious of the bandleaders. He rehearses a number over and over again until he's satisfied it's right, and even then he's not sure it will be perfect during the actual

broadcast. About a minute before his program was to go on the air last Monday night, he wanted to bet Harry von Zell (he produces the show) that the boys would mess up one of the numbers. It so happened Duchin would have lost the bet if Harry had taken him up on it, because every number was played without anything going wrong. After the broadcast Eddy rushes back into the control-room to avoid the mob of autograph-seekers. Despite the fact that he spends about one-half hour or more in the control-room selecting the numbers he will play the following week, there still were about thirty gals waiting outside the studio door for the treasured signature.

From the Duchin program, I went up a few floors and went in the back way to pay my first visit to Dr. Harry Hagen's "True or False" show. I had to sneak in the back way via the control-room because the program was already on the air and you're not supposed to go into the studio after the "on the air" sign lights up. Anyway, I saw Dr. Hagen sitting on a bench in the middle of the stage looking like a judge. The team of male contestants were lined up at his right and the females on his left. Around the neck of each contestant hangs a huge placard, with his or her name printed on it in huge letters along with personal questions he asks when each one comes before him. Typical of the questions asked, which are the only things rehearsed in advance, are "How much should a married man eat?" or "How much do you think a fellow should spend for lunch?"

Perhaps you listened in at the Benny Goodman broadcast the night Phil Baker and Don Budge were the guest stars and heard the audience howl when Goodman greeted Don Budge with the following words, "I'm glad to see that old smile of yours again." The reason for all the laughs was because Budge was not smiling, his face was as white as a ghost, and he looked so scared you'd think he had just seen one. Baker had an amusing script that night which would have been ruined if it wasn't for his expert showmanship in covering up when Goodman lost his place in the script and Don Budge missed his cue. If I were his sponsor, I wouldn't permit Benny Goodman to do anything but play the clarinet and lead his orchestra. I've yet to hear Goodman read a script where he hasn't fallen all over his lines. The Sunday night he appeared as guest on the "Fitch Bandwagon," he couldn't even pronounce his own name correctly, calling it Benny's Goodman band. I'm sure if Mr. Goodman stuck to his music and let Dan Seymour do all the talking, it would make for better listening.

A good time is had by the twenty- or thirty-odd people who sit in at the Fred Allen dress rehearsal every Wednesday afternoon from 1 to 2 p.m. Fred stands in front of the mike practically for the entire hour with his derby hat sitting on the back of his head, his tie loose and collar open. When the boys in Peter Van Steeden's band are not playing, they crowd around near the mike and almost go into hysterics laughing at the Allen quips. They make a swell audience for him, as does Portland Hoffa, who gets a big kick out of her hubby's cracks. Fred chews about two or three sticks of gum at a time during the rehearsal and also at the broadcast. During a peppy Merry Macs routine, the comic breaks out into a tap dance, which isn't bad at all. Yes, everyone has a good time at the Fred Allen rehearsal but the comic himself. He takes his work very seriously and hardly ever even as much as smiles.

HOLLYWOOD.—As a new year starts, it is wise to take stock in oneself and see how far one has gone—and where one should aim to go the coming year. So comes up the old question: "What's wrong with radio?" Well, maybe nothing too serious now, but radio had better watch out. It is definitely headed for the doldrums unless (1) the networks or advertising agencies or both combined organize a "farm" system for the development and encouragement of new talent, new ideas, young producers, directors and writers; (2) agencies restrict their commercial plugs to welcome, friendly and newsy messages and discontinue untruthful, obnoxious and unfair methods of selling their product (such as peddling by means of overrated premium gadgets that cost less than a dime to make), and (3) the competition for greater and greater arrays of guest stars is diminished and approached from a saner point of view.

Today, aside from college courses which are mostly in the theory of broadcasting, there is no systematic training-ground where budding talent may be encouraged; given the necessary preliminary experience—with livable wages—in order to refill the huge and ever-expanding reservoir required to supply the broadcasting art. And where does young talent go now to be developed? Well, perhaps through false encouragement, it may land on the "Major Bowes Amateur Hour"—and after one ridiculous performance be assigned to a Bowes touring-unit, where the salary is \$40 for fifteen performances (not \$40 a week unless the unit does, with luck, the required fifteen performances in one week), out of which the young man or girl must pay his or her own living expenses. One girl from a western mining-town will tell you plenty about the Bowes units. RADIO GUIDE did, quite thoroughly, two years ago, but still the units tour along under the same conditions. Amateur hour an opportunity? Bah! Show me ONE star ANY amateur hour has developed.

As for the tin whistles and other box-top coaxers offered to the gullible youngsters and adults by the philanthropic sponsors, these might easily be suppressed by an awakened Federal Communications Commission that would pass on their value, okay or bar each one, and insist that ALL premiums be made in the United States or Canada.

And now guest stars are on the pan. In mid-January, a new Hollywood show will offer listeners everything but the kitchen sink. The talent galaxy for this extravaganza probably will run \$30,000 a week. Yet the advertising agencies are complaining they won't be able to pay the low minimum wage requirements set up by the radio artists union. Why? Because a few big names are getting all the money? This evil of too many guest stars, however, possibly will cure itself. By the end of 1939, guest stars will be so overdone that a name won't mean a thing to the average listener. Then sponsors will quit buying them—or start sewing them up with exclusive contracts.

Off a Live Mike

The last December issue of RADIO GUIDE carried a picture of "Ferdinand, the Bull" and "Ferdinand's mother" on its cover—but you mightn't have recognized them. They were typified by Don Wilson, whose snorts, giggles and grunts are heard in the new Disney cartoon film . . . Dorothy Lamour, en route home from Gail Patrick's holiday party during the blinding (unusual) California rain, stalled her car in a flooded depression and ruined a \$225 gown. "They warned me," she was heard to mutter, "I'd get plenty of mud slung at me in Hollywood" . . .

The Kellogg revue to be aired over NBC starting January 15 will offer you radio newcomer Ronald Colman, Lawrence Tibbett, Carole Lombard, Cary Grant, three of the Marx Brothers, and Robert Emmett Dolan's orchestra. What, no Mickey Mouse? . . . Although the new "Good Gulf" series, with stars to be provided by the Screen Actors Guild, is due to start January 8, at press-time it remained unnamed and no guest star had been set for the opener! However, the Motion Picture Relief Fund, which will receive the lion's share of the \$10,000 weekly fee for talent, has broken ground for an administration building in anticipation of the work to be carried on with the moneys it receives! . . . Hear the plumful guest turn of Blondie (Penny Singleton) and Dagwood (Arthur Lake) on the Bob Hope show? It was so good that Hope and your reporter predict that they will be sponsored on their own program ere many moons. Lake, you may recall, is a radio vet; was once heard as "Harold Teen" . . . Early Christmas celebrant on December 21 was not a berserk Spaniard; was just ex-radio troubadour Tito Guizar, who had that day become father of an eight-pound daughter.

Real Spelling-Bee with Stingers

When "One Man's Family" staged a spelling-bee on Christmas Day (for the West Coast) and on the following Wednesday for listeners in the Midwest and East, the cast were actually on the spot. Author Carleton Morse refused to give out his list of words; did not have them written into the scripts. The result was a purely spontaneous spelling-bee. When the episode was rebroadcast on Wednesday, canny Mr. Morse fooled his cast again. He employed an entirely new secret list of words!

Hunting a Hollywood Hubby?

Al Pearce's handsome mikeman, John Conte, is one of a half dozen or so eligible bachelors on whom feminine fans might concentrate their correspondence until 1940, the next leap year, rolls around. John is 23, a Yankee by birth, has wavy black hair, meticulous molars, a gleam in his blue eyes, a taste for athletics and blondes without their hair up. He stands five feet eleven, snores ever so slightly, but isn't planning matrimony for a while yet. Then there's still nimble Nelson Eddy, fickle Edgar Bergen, Paul Douglas (who has one claimant at the moment), debonair Frank Parker, overstuffed Johnny Scott Trotter and his apartment mate and opposite, Skinnay Ennis of the asthmatic love-lyrics . . . And good luck, girls.

Nice Guy Crosby

On Thursday before Christmas, Bing Crosby again sang "Silent Night," as has been his custom for several years. When he first sang the classic on his commercial program, about one letter in every thousand received afterward complained that Bing had no business singing a practically sacred selection. He replied that he believed his singing would help its appreciation by some folks who might otherwise never hear it. What the complainers didn't know was that four years ago Crosby recorded "Silent Night" and signed over the record royalties to the Columbians Missionary Society. To date more than \$5,000 has been earned for mission work from the record sale, which now has exceeded a hundred thousand copies. Any more kicks?

Cry, Baby, Cry

Don't attend a performance of a radio serial! All your illusions will undoubtedly be shattered. For instance, many followers of "The Story of Mary Marlin" will swear that the little baby Davey on that program is really a two-year-old baby boy. Well, in reality it's a lovely young actress Dolores Gillen. Accompanied by Carlton Brickert (David Post), who was temporarily out of the show, your Tattler watched a performance of the show, in which Miss Gillen emitted such lifelike baby cries that one would swear there really was an infant in the studio. Miss Gillen is one of the oddities of that odd profession of baby cryers in radio. While the rest of her sisters use a handkerchief, Dolores does not resort to any such tricks, depending solely on her voice and her hands. I'll bet Dolores will turn red when she learns I picked up her script after the show. Neither her name nor her radio name was on the first page of the script. Instead, only four letters—"Da Da!"

One of Chicago's finest actresses is heard in the lead of "Mary Marlin"—tall, stately, brunet Anne Seymour. Anne's radio fans will also remember her as the leading lady in "Grand Hotel" when it was on the air. Besides Anne and Dolores, there were only two characters in the show your Tattler saw. They were Rupert LaBelle, who plays Rufus Kane, and Frances Carlon, who has two "furry-soft" nice roles in radio—the lead in "Kitty Keene" and Bunny Mitchell in "Mary Marlin." The latter show probably has one of the largest casts of any of the radio serials—nearly thirty people appear in the show at one time or another. Some of these you may have heard from time to time are Robert Griffin, who plays Joe Marlin; Carlton Brickert (David Post); Phil Lord, who is Frazer Mitchell; June Meredith (Eve Underwood); Frankie Pacelli, who is heard as the little blind boy; Timothy Kent, and Arthur Peterson, who plays Pater Hujaz.

Though many radio script-shows have organ themes, "Mary Marlin's" is played on a piano. Pianist on the show is one of Chicago's most versatile musicians, Allan Grant. He can sit down at a piano and strike off an original tune in the time it takes the average person to think of something to say. Allan's piano-playing is one of the highlights of Chicago's many radio parties, and lucky is the hostess who can get the bespectacled, nearly bald pianist to attend her party. In "Mary Marlin," Allan keeps a well-worn, dog-eared copy of the theme, Debussy's Clair de Lune, on the piano for sentimental reasons, but actually he doesn't even

look at it. His eyes are glued on Maurice Lowell, who ably directs the show. Lowell, by the way, in addition to being one of the town's most popular producers, is also the author of a good radio textbook for those interested in radio. It's called "Listening In."

It isn't generally known what happened to "Mary Marlin" a few months back when the show suddenly began repeating episodes that had occurred years ago. Well, now it can be told. Jane Crusinberry, author of the show, was so grief-stricken at the loss of her mother last fall that she was unable to continue writing the show. Rather than discontinue the program or get a new writer, flashbacks—episodes that occurred in the past—were resorted to until Miss Crusinberry returned.

Bond Notes

Orrin Tucker will leave the Palmer House for San Francisco's Mark Hopkins in February . . . Mr. and Mrs. Jan Garber celebrating their twelfth wedding anniversary . . . Billy Mills will take his special piano along when he goes to Hollywood. The instrument is designed with a desk above the keyboard to facilitate writing down musical arrangements as he conceives them . . . Leaving ranks of bachelors is Hal Kemp, whose theme song with Martha Stephenson on January 21 will be the wedding march . . . Bob Trendler's orchestra reported succeeding Frankie Masters on Edgar A. Guest's "It Can Be Done" show . . . Andre Kostelanetz trained in to appear on latter show and discuss ideas with Herb Carlin, who headed Chicago World's Fair musical committee. Kostelanetz is on similar committee of New York Fair.

Radio Reviving Stage

Person-to-Person

•For years much-commented-on question has been "Do We Have a Free Press?" Never have the "do's" and "don'ts" been so stimulated to wrath as in the present administration. When staunch administration-defender Harold L. Ickes and persistent administration-heckler Frank E. Gannett meet at "America's Town Meeting" next Thursday night to discuss this question from the same platform, it promises to get a real going-over "once" but probably not "for all." In addition to being editor and publisher of the Gannett newspaper chain, Frank E. is one of the leaders of the Republican party and a vigorous opponent of many of the administration's acts both in his newspapers and in public addresses.

•"The name 'radio-education' is inadequate in itself," writes Kenneth E. Yeend, director of the State College of Washington station KWSC. "The mention of education," he continues, "brings to the minds of thousands boring lectures and dull recitations. Give us a word with more color, more punch, more appeal. Call our work civic or social or informational—create a word, but give us one which connotes the vital, romantic, interesting work that it is."

That sums up my own sentiments exactly, Mr. Yeend. Every time I type out the word "radio-education" chills run up and down my spine just at the thought of those who, having read that far, are too frightened to continue. Let's try to coin a new word!

•Pride of the radio division of the Office of Education is script-writer Peter J. Harkins. In 1936 Harkins hitch-hiked from a CCC camp to his home in Springfield, Massachusetts, to audition for a part in a chorus to be used to supply background music for educational programs. He convinced the director to also give him a chance at radio script-writing and shortly after made his start in the national field as a member of the chorus and as a dramatist. Today he has no time for singing because the educational dramas he writes for "The World Is Yours" series have won him millions of listeners and second prize in a nation-wide script contest.

High School Girl Asks Question And Eight Notables Answer It

The Question . . .

Sixteen-year-old Alice Hooper, of Winchester, New Hampshire, intent listener to all broadcasts on the Czech situation, heard a speaker talking about democracy over the radio. Fortunate was the fact that Dr. Lorine Pruette, novelist and psychologist visiting at her farm home, was audience to her question: "What is this democracy they talk about? What does democracy mean?"

Fortunate it was because Dr. Pruette at once realized that she was expressing ignorance of a question of vital importance, a question uniquely representative of majority confusion regarding the actual meaning of this favorite American password. So inspired was Dr. Pruette with the significance of the question that he immediately wrote the National Broadcasting Company about it. As a result, on December 11 a special broadcast brought together eight distinguished persons to define the word "democracy" for little Miss Hooper and the entire nation.

The Answers . . .

Editor-Professor.—Raymond Moley, contributing editor of *News Week* and professor of Public Law at Columbia University, declared that democracy was "an affirmation that mere distinctions of birth were spurious. It was, at the same time, a recognition of man's reaction to power—an awareness that the possession of too much power corrodes human beings; that absolute power cannot be entrusted to any man or group of men; that, in the broad sense of the word, no man is fit to play with the lives of other men." He declared that the "Constitution implicitly defines democracy as the guarantee of minority rights under majority rule."

Church Leader.—The Rev. Jerome Harris, pastor of St. Ignatius Anglican Church, considered democracy "the expression of the will of the majority, but tolerates no oppression of the minority"; further maintained that "democracy more than any other political system allows for the exercise of Christian principles."

Diplomat.—Ruth Bryan Owen Rohde, first woman diplomat to represent America abroad, said: "No one has given a better definition of democracy than Abraham Lincoln, in his words, 'A government of the people, for the people, and by the people.' In those few words Abraham Lincoln expressed not only the citizen's rights in a democracy, 'a government for the people,' but also a citizen's responsibility, 'a

government of and by the people.'"

College Dean.—Virginia C. Gildersleeve, dean of Barnard College, declared that "the old watchwords which our sister republic of France takes as her motto—liberty, equality, brotherhood—may be used also to express our democratic ideals of education." Our schools and colleges "do not always attain them. But we are sure we want to keep such ideals as our aim—to hold them up as the shining goal towards which we march."



What is democracy? asked Alice Hooper

French Novelist.—Abbe Dimnet, noted French author, said: "The French are passionately attached to democracy. By that name, they understand the conquests of the French Revolution, daughter of the American Revolution."

Irish Poet.—Padraic Colum, Irish poet and naturalized American citizen, saw democracy as a political system "which struggles on to let man show his dignity, exercise his freedom more and more."

English Author-Professor.—Bertrand Russell, English author (in limelight today with the publication of his latest book, *Power*) and visiting professor of philosophy at the University of Chicago, maintained that "Democracy consists in this: That in every organization those whom it affects shall all have a voice in selecting its government."

Newspaperman.—Henry Hazlitt, of the *New York Times*, declared the essence of democracy to be "that lawmakers and rulers are dependent on the people's will in such a way that they may be changed in a peaceful manner as soon as they cease to represent that will. What democracy does, in other words, is to make and keep domestic peace. Under it the people's vote can not only freely elect rulers but freely remove them. So that is the test to apply today to any government that claims really to be democratic. The test is not even whether, at the moment, that government happens to reflect the popular will. The test is whether, if the government ceased to represent the people's will, it could be changed peaceably and without violence; or whether, to maintain itself in power, it does or would resort to intimidation, terror and murder."

Calls for More . . .

This broadcast was indeed a most novel one. May we hope that the future will bring more of the same? May we even suggest that this type of program be taken out of the novelty class and made a regular part of the menu?"

KFI Series Rates National Attention

Candidate for top honors as radio's most-outstanding educational contribution in 1938 is the popular Pacific Coast adult-education series, "Parents on Trial." In the light of what it has done, what it is doing and what it promises to do, the choice of a program that has been heard in only one section of the country is not as illogical as it may seem at first.

What has it done? This is a logical question to which Mrs. Lytle* gives a convincing answer: "In California the program has been instrumental in getting all groups engaged in child welfare together to formulate a plan to aid mentally and socially handicapped children, and this plan will be presented to the next session of the California Legislature." The plan suggests the establishment of parent clinics, similar to child clinics now in operation throughout the country.

What is it doing? It is attacking the all-too-common parent-faults—neglect, ignorance, misunderstanding, selfishness and cruelty—and, thanks to the ingenious script-writing job of John Boylan, the programs, though basically educational, have such strong appeal that the series is actually being listened to in a large percentage of the homes in California. Boylan's scripts are an outstanding example of painless education—painless because the educational message is subtly inserted as an integral part of the fascinating story.

What does it promise to do? Again Mrs. Lytle answers: "Station KFI has generously offered to record 'Parents on Trial' for use nationally. Any state or district parent-teacher organization may secure these half-hour transcriptions for broadcasting over their own local stations, merely by paying the cost of the records." Further than this, the Los Angeles Probation Department is to publish the scripts for distribution to interested parties.

The work that this series is doing and promises to do in the future shows quite clearly the potentialities of local and regional broadcasting—illustrates how in many cases the local and regional broadcast is a better answer to some of our radio-education problems than the Coast-to-Coast program.

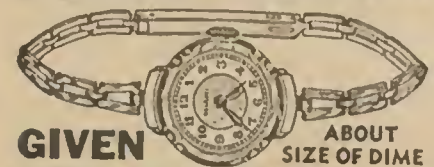

is reputation at stake behind them. Jesse L. Lasky is himself well qualified to direct such a talent-search. He should know talent. In his long and distinguished career he has produced such successes as "Wings," "The Covered Wagon," "Peter Pan," and "Beau Geste." He has developed such stars as Maurice Chevalier, Carole Lombard, Fredrie March, Claudette Colbert and Marlene Dietrich. (Hedy LaMarr?)

Then there are Hobart Bosworth and Bryant Washburn, Lasky's ambassadors, whose reputations should be security of the project's honorable intentions. Both these men have worked consistently before the cameras for the past quarter of a century and both have scored repeatedly with unforgettable characterizations in major productions.

BOSWORTH, talented as actor, director and writer, is of commanding appearance, well over six feet tall, with steel-blue eyes and a mane of white hair. He starred in the first motion picture ever made in Los Angeles, "The Sultan's Power." Descended from a line of seamen, his own youthful ambition inclined toward a seafaring life. It is a coincidence that the first production which started him on the road to stardom was "The Sea Wolf," which he wrote and directed and in which he portrayed the leading role, that of a swashbuckling captain. Bosworth played in many legitimate productions. He is considered one of the finest character actors ever to grace the silver sheet.

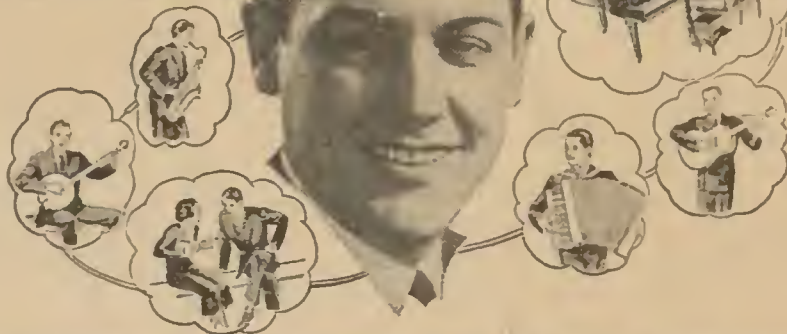
These men are touring the country paving the way for the machinery of the contest to run smoothly by making available to the aspirants sound advice from the wealth of their experience.

RECORDS OF THE WEEK

A department reviewing the recordings of your radio favorites

Symphonic:

STOKOWSKI-WAGNER AGAIN.—Once more, Victor issues an album of Wagner's operatic music, streamlined and synthesized by Leopold Stokowski. This time it is from three of the most passionate parts of his most passionate opera, *Tristan und Isolde*. The beautiful and powerful way in which Mr. Stokowski has orchestrated and performed these great melodies makes the synthesis an outstanding release.

Included in the medley are the *Prelude*, the *Liebesnacht* and the famous *Liebestod*, the last considerably shorter than usual but nonetheless potent. Some years ago Mr. Stokowski and the Philadelphia Orchestra made a similar synthesis of these same excerpts, but the new one far surpasses the old both in content and in recording strength. (Victor album 508. \$9.)

Two string quartets claim our attention this week, both of interest to those who pursue the endless pleasure of chamber music. Albert Roussel, modern Frenchman, gains a hearing of his *Quartet in D Major*, played by the Roth Quartet, who introduced this work both abroad and in America. It is a most modern work, and lacks the beauty of Ravel or Debussy, with whose quartets it might be compared. (Columbia set 339. \$5.) Without hesitation, however, we recommend the *Quartet No. 10 in E Flat Major*, known as "The Harp" quartet, by Beethoven. Rich and melodic and ever-changing, it is played magnificently by the famous Budapest String Quartet. (Victor album 467. \$8.)

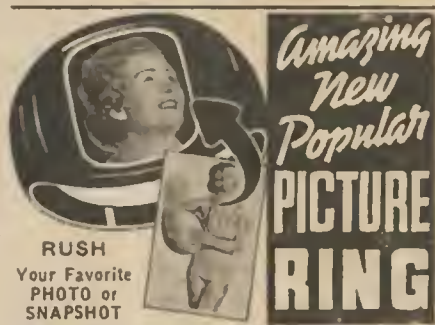

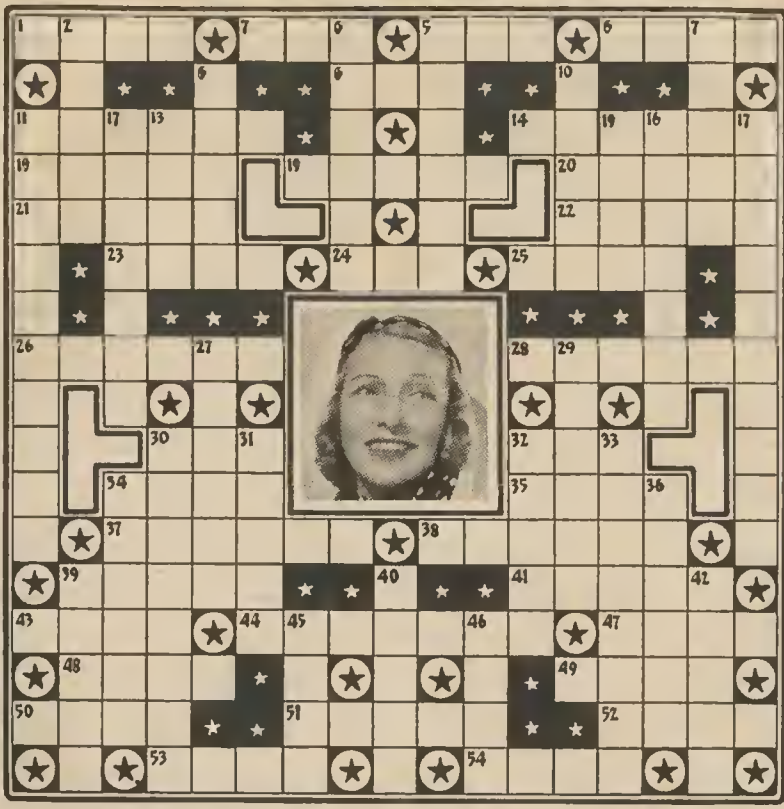

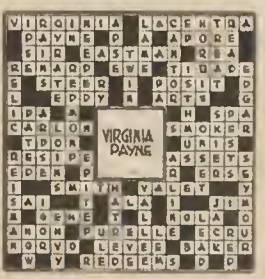

EARL ROBERTS of Indianapolis, Ind., writes the amateur short-wave transmitter of the Ellsworth 1938-1939 Antarctic Expedition, aboard the Wyatt Earp, is being heard on a frequency of 14 megs under the call LDUC. F. C. Seid, W2MQ, of Maspeth, N. Y., and J. H. Lymburner, VE2IC of Oskelaneo, P. Q., Canada, are the radio operators with this expedition, which is en route to Antarctica to explore the Enderby Quadrant. As soon as the party reaches their base objective regular contacts with New York will be made by short wave. . . . The Oxford University Expedition, now in Greenland, keeps in touch with London by means of its amateur short-wave transmitter OX7OU, which is being heard on a frequency of 14 megs. Reports on reception should be sent to A. Croft, Esq., Leekhampton House, Cambridge, England. H. B. Clein of Los Angeles, Calif. reports hearing OX7ZL, located at Angmagssalik, East Greenland, at 9:30 p.m. EST, on a frequency announced as 14.005 but actually 14.02 megs. This may be the Oxford University Expedition's transmitter utilizing a different call. . . . A mysterious amateur station using the call XAR2LA (14.37), heard near 1 a.m. EST, was, according to its operator aboard a Norwegian freighter, at that time in the Panama Canal.

According to the QRC, CRY9 (6.08) of Macao, Macao, is now operating Mondays from 8:30 to 10 a.m. EST, and on Wednesdays from 8:30 to 9:10 a.m. EST, all announcements being made in English and Portuguese. . . . The Malayan government has decided to build an ultra-modern radio station at Kuantan in Pahang early next year. Short wave will be used for inter-Malayan communications. . . . Broadcasting House, London, home of the broadcasts from Daventry, will be extended to more than twice its present size. Five underground "floating" studios will be included in the extension. . . . Before signing off, the following announcement in English is made over "Radio Guadeloupe" (7.05): "This is Radio Guadeloupe calling, P. O. Box 125, Pointe a Pitre, Guadeloupe. . . . OAX4C (15.29), "Radio Nacional del Peru," at Lima, was the Latin station that was on the air evenings during the Pan-American Conference, recently held in that city.
