



Are We Too Smug About Propaganda Broadcasts?

Spying Kilocycles

Tune in those short-wave broadcasts from Germany, if your set can do it. Note how solicitously you are approached, how tenderly you are cajoled, how slyly your self-esteem is inflated. The approach is expert and effective. If German blood is in your veins, that blood must flow a little faster and your heart beat a little prouder.

That is propaganda as the experts do it. It is reaching this country nightly. It reaches every country on the North and South American continents and its sole purpose is to turn every listener into a Nazi ally. Who knows how many American dollars in South American trade are being lost by these tactics? Who knows how many American citizens are switching their allegiance because of spying kilocycles?

The invasion of the Americas has already started. Monroe Doctrine and Lima conferences notwithstanding, the Nazis are here, in our American air, whispering, flattering, inviting. Remember that and remember the German spies convicted recently in New York when idealists tell you we should disarm and lead the world to peace.

Those who know about these things tell us that democracy is on the spot. Once, wide oceans protected us and our system of government, but those days have been banished by short-wave radio. And that short-wave radio is saying:

"No one in Germany is without a job."

"Fascism has improved the condition of every man and woman in Italy."

"Democracy is worn out and old-fashioned."

"Dictatorships get things done."

Well, democracy may fumble and hesitate on occasion, but it preserves for us our liberty of thought, of worship, of speech. Our God is no State. Our statesmen don't rewrite our Bible.

But our statesmen are alarmingly silent on the virtues of democracy and the democratic way of life. Uncle Sam, like the Chinese monkeys, observes the dictators and their propaganda activities, but he hears no evil, sees no evil, speaks no evil. He, in short, is letting them get away with it. In the United States, in South America, in spite of

the Monroe Doctrine, he lets them get away with it.

Isn't it about time that we began to utilize the tremendous power of radio to tell aggressively the story of our life under our form of government. Isn't it time to say to all the people of the earth that democracy gives us contentment and happiness and wealth and health in far greater measure than is enjoyed by the subjects of any "ism" abroad.

Oops, Sorry

The recent editorial written by Mr. David Sarnoff for RADIO GUIDE contained one unhappy typographical error which we wish to correct. In speaking of our own system of broadcasting, Mr. Sarnoff originally wrote, "Our traditional liberties have been fortified with a new freedom—freedom of radio—which takes its place with our older

freedoms, of religion, speech, and press." But our story made the sentence read "Our traditional liberties have been forfeited with a new freedom, etc." Which made neither good sense nor good grammar. We applaud with all our enthusiasm Mr. Sarnoff's original thought. Indeed, freedom of radio is now a part of the American concept and it must remain so. We wish to restate this principle exactly as expressed by Mr. Sarnoff so that all those who read his splendid contribution may understand exactly the sentiment which our typographical carelessness failed to express.

Echo of Invasion

Now that the nation has stopped trembling, now that the Federal Communications Commission has lost interest, and now that psychologists have

ceased attempting to explain away our hysteria on the occasion of the Orson Welles "Men from Mars" broadcast, let us remember that the program was originally intended as one of entertainment.

As entertainment, we should like to have an opportunity to hear it again. To be sure, the Columbia Broadcasting System has promised the FCC that the technique will not be employed again, but that need not prevent the broadcast if names and locations are changed. Instead of the Martians landing in New Jersey, let them attack the earth in the Kingdom of Ruthenia. Instead of a Princeton astronomer, let them introduce one from the University of Pretzelberg. That would scare no one.

Mr. Welles is equipped with a fine Campbell Playhouse in which he presents his current series. He has a large and enthusiastic audience. "Men from Mars" is already a psychological believe-it-or-not. We believe millions would enjoy it as entertainment.

Wings For Listeners

The brightest newcomer among radio dramas is called "Wings for the Martins." In its first broadcasts it joined quickly the best listening on the air.

Congratulations for the success of this new program should go to many people, but chief among them is Commissioner John W. Studebaker of the United States Office of Education, who has demonstrated again that education by radio must also be entertainment.

Tune in yourself some Wednesday evening, 9:30 EST (NBC), and hear how far from the boresome lecture-hall our modern educational program has come.

Check-Up

That television set installed at the White House isn't there any more. Those who read our note to President Roosevelt in these columns recently recall our suspicion that the installation might be a press-agent idea. Now a letter from Mr. Steve Early, secretary to the President, brings us up to date. The only radio sets in the White House today are broadcast receivers, which are used mostly, believe it or not, for listening to news broadcasts.

GREAT AMERICANS THINK ABOUT RADIO

WHEN fires in the great virgin forests of the northern states in the early eighties swept over the villages and homes of pioneering Americans, word was brought by courier to the nearest telegraph station and there flashed to the world. The infant Red Cross organization, of which Miss Clara Barton was the president, swung into action, and soon relief of a practical type—clothes, food, medicines—was being packed by women volunteers in a number of Red Cross chapters, and was sent by train to the last outpost of a railroad station, thence by pack-horse and wagon-and-team to the distressed and homeless people.

Days were consumed in moving necessary relief to the homeless families—yet the Red Cross had gone into action as rapidly as the facilities of the time permitted.

How different is the story today.

Radio, the modern miracle, is Mercury, the winged messenger, bringing word of catastrophe and carrying back reassuring news of merciful help on the way—all within the hour.

Whether the news comes from commercial stations, the wide link of amateur operators who are trained in Red Cross methods and are noted for their heroism in remaining for days at their stations, or from the network of military transmitters,

Swift Messenger of Need

Each week this space is devoted to the special message of a great American, one of the many who know radio as a vital force in American politics, education, and thought

radio provides the instant, vital link between the stricken community and the outside agency of help, the Red Cross.

Since earliest radio development, the Red Cross has enjoyed the close cooperation of broadcasters. In some disasters, as at isolated points in the recent New England and Long Island hurricanes, radio is the only means of communication. Red Cross ordered its relief workers into the distressed area, kept in touch with them, routed supplies, located missing persons, all by radio.

Equally important is the story of the flood or hurricane or other catastrophe, told frequently by the broadcaster who is an eye-witness; this story carried from Coast to Coast, together with news of what is being done to alleviate misery, enhances a nation's gratitude for this modern instrument of mercy.

I cannot undertake to measure the value of radio to the Red Cross in its relief work. I know that it has saved human lives in the catastrophes of the past decade, that it has enabled our organization to work intelligently, to rush relief to isolated people who might otherwise have perished.

It is a privilege to pay tribute on behalf of the Red Cross to the networks, the individual stations, to the military and amateur operators who have rendered such conspicuous service in times of distress.

STARS IN MY EYES

BY WILFRED PELLETIER AS TOLD TO SUMNER GEORGE

MOST people believe that a conductor's job in opera is all conducting. That isn't true. On the night of a performance I put on my tail-coat and my white tie and do my best to look handsome. But that is what the public sees of me. Like the acrobats in the circus, the rest of the time I am out working with the elephants. When he is not conducting, a conductor plays the piano offstage, gives music cues to the chorus and the supers, prompts the stars, cues off-stage orchestras, auditions new musicians and serves as a coach. I know the kitchen of the opera.

I have spoken of singers as hard workers. Few people outside the profession believe singing is work. Perhaps if I describe Jeritza's singing-habits the skeptics will be convinced.

Maria Jeritza came to America from Vienna, where she had been a sensation. Taller than most men, with a slim figure, cornflower eyes and golden hair that swept far below her waist, she was a goddess. Gatti wanted her to do *Thais* and Jeritza asked me to coach her for the part. I accepted with pleasure, greatly flattered. I had no idea what I was getting into!

FROM that moment on my phone rang at any hour of the morning. "Pelly, I must work. Please come," Maria would say. I would rush to her apartment and she would sing for an hour or two and let me go. Later in the day, the telephone again. "Pelly,

I must work." At eleven o'clock at night after a performance—"Pelly, please come." Jeritza actually sang four and five hours a day; something any doctor will tell you is beyond the power of endurance of the vocal cords. And that was only the half of it. There were rehearsals. There were performances. There were the hours she put into research to make sure a costume was perfect for the period. (Stars supply their own costumes.) She sacrificed everything to her music, including the time she allowed herself for meals. When I took lunch with her I barely tasted my soup before she was tossing down her napkin and saying, "Hurry, Pelly." She was called temperamental, but in all my years with her I have never known her to throw a diva's fit of temperament while she was working. Before a performance, it was another matter. Like a sprinter who

has been training for weeks for a big race, she was all nerves in the perilous half-hour before the curtain rose. Crossing her path then was like crossing the path of a mowing-machine.

With all of that, Jeritza was as naive as the little country girl she had been born. Where other prima donnas drank champagne after a performance, she went to a delicatessen store for a glass of beer and a bologna on rye. She spent hours on her knees before each performance, praying. On her free days she put on an old dress and hat and walked through the slums buying baskets of food and leaving them in dingy hallways. She gave costumes worth thousands of dollars to girls who were studying for opera. And when she met her husband, Winfield Sheehan, she fell in love as though she were sixteen. They met at a party. "When I saw those Irish eyes I knew it was

either tell him I loved him," she confessed to me, "or run." So she ran, seizing her wrap from the maid and dashing out of the house on her long legs. But the Irish eyes had seen her. They ran after.

Our meeting-place in the old days was a little restaurant called Barbetta's. Few dyspeptics ever take up singing, and an opera star's appreciation of food is exceeded only by his ability to consume it. Barbetta's was nothing but a large hall behind a barroom. It did not even boast menu cards. There was a slate on the wall instead. But such food! There on a good day you could see Moranzoni, Chamlee, Muzio, Chaliapin, Whitehill; everyone.

One name which comes back to me when I think of Barbetta's is that of Maurel; Maurel who gave me the most thrilling experience of my life. If you are on the minus side of forty you will not be likely to know who Maurel was. He was one of the greatest lags we have had; perhaps the greatest of all time. Verdi, his friend and admirer, wrote the part especially for him.

I was coaching a young baritone named Galeffi who was to sing Rigoletto. Maurel was in New York and it seemed sensible to take my pupil to him, the master. Where could he find better advice? We found the old man—he was 72—in an icy room sitting at a beloved piano as old as himself. He said he would be delighted to help us and we sat down. He described the entrances and exits, the gestures and stage business of the part as he had created it forty years before. It was like having the composer himself with us. But Maurel's mind was fading, on account of his age. There were a few things he could not quite make clear to us.

"Why don't you sing the part for us?" I asked.

And, there in that cold little room, Maurel rose to his feet and sang Rigoletto for us—his Rigoletto. Sang it as I have never heard it sung since and will probably never hear it sung again!

SOME day I hope a scientist will explain the amazing youthfulness of musicians to me. At 60 and 70 they have the vitality of people half their age. Maurel is one case. Schumann-Heink was singing when she was 70. In Paris in 1922 I heard Saint-Saens, a sharp, thin old man with a nasal voice, play his own piano concerto. When he finished the concerto he went to a pipe-organ and played a Bach cantata, his feet on the organ pedals as light and quick as his hands on the keys. He was 81. Charpentier when he was well

along in years might have been a schoolboy. A real Bohemian, dressing like a painter in baggy suit and fluffy tie, he fell in love with a new girl every morning. He took me to lunch one day and the meal began at noon and ended at six o'clock in the evening. Then we went to hear the Walkuere. Charpentier knew literally every note of Wagner's score by heart; he could have stepped on the stage and sung every part, I am sure.

Another thing which astonishes me about singers and which I should like to hear a psychologist explain is their incredible ability to memorize page after page of music in a few short hours. Florence Easton once memorized Leonore from start to finish for me in three days, without even taking the score home with her. I asked her if she

On Thursday he sang the role perfectly. The performance was one of his great early successes, in fact.

I WISH my own memory were as good! Never will I forget the first time I conducted *Il Trovatore* on tour. I didn't know the opera well and I was sure I was going to get into trouble over Leonora's first aria. That is the solo, you may recall, in which she in-

forms the audience at considerable length that the night is dark and peaceful. The night might be peaceful, but I was not going to be peaceful, I was afraid, because the beat changed from six to two and back to six again and I wasn't sure where or how. We were opening in Memphis.

wanted the score and she said she didn't need it. When Armand Tokatyan first sang for me I discovered that he had learned all of Tosca and Carmen by ear. He could not read a note of music! I took him into my house and gave him his board, lodging and two music lessons a day for fifteen dollars a week—all he could afford to pay. In three months he learned to read music, and not only remembered Tosca and Carmen correctly but memorized Romeo as well for the fun of it.

Tibbett is another man with a staggering memory. Lawrence Tibbett, when I first encountered him, was a thin, determined boy who had just signed his contract with the Met. His voice was magnificent and Mr. Gatti wanted him to sing the part of Valentine in *Faust*.

"Does he know the part?" I asked. "Yes; of course he knows the part," said Gatti. When he was enthusiastic he took it for granted that all of us knew whatever he wanted us to know.

I asked Lawrence to sing for me. He sang the arias and stopped. They were all he knew.

"Well, young man," I scolded him,


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

DRAMA THIS WEEK



The drama was written by Arthur Laurents, a student in William Robson's class in radio writing at New York University for production in Columbia's experimental workshop. Thursday: George Brent and Olivia de Havilland, stars of the new Warner Bros. picture, "Wings of the Navy," will appear in an air preview of the production on the "Kate Smith Hour" this week. ALEC TEMPLETON IN ROSEDALE —Sunday, NBC





LAURA PAIGE, young widow (played by Lucille Meredith), is a town favorite. She won the office of councilwoman with Hackett's support. She also made sensational news when she married a wealthy childhood sweetheart. Doc was instrumental in bringing them together

Honoring Victor Herbert

"**R**CA Magic Key" devotes an entire program this Sunday to the music of the late Victor Herbert, who died in 1924 and would have been eighty years old had he lived until next Wednesday.

I knew Victor well, and can hardly conceive that he could have reached the four-score mark even had a stroke not carried him away suddenly, for he worked hard, lived hard and played hard. In many respects he resembled none of the other musicians I have met.

One striking difference was that he originally followed the career of a concert cellist, orchestral player, symphonic composer and orchestral conductor, and ended as the most successful light-opera composer of his time. Further variances were his unchangeable hearty good nature; his refusal to take himself and his works seriously; and his devotion to less fortunate colleagues, whom he loved to help financially and in other practical ways. His generosity was so prodigal that although he earned huge sums in royalties, he left his family distressingly little money when he died.

Once we walked along Broadway together, through the district then known as the Rialto, where actors were as thick as the leaves in the forest. We had not gone half a mile before Victor was stopped four times by theatrical panhandlers who whispered in his ear, with the result that he reached for his wallet and handed out bills without even looking at the amount. "You really ought to walk only on side streets," I suggested jokingly. "Oh no," was the princely rejoinder, "the poor fellows might not see me there."

Although American by naturalization and choice, Herbert was born in Dublin, the grandson of Samuel Lover, the Irish novelist. He was sent to Germany for his musical studies. After European concert tours as a cellist, he came to America in 1886 as first cellist of the Metropolitan Opera. The Worcester (Mass.) Festival produced an oratorio "The Captive" from the Herbert pen. He played his own cello concerto with the New York Philharmonic. He wrote suites and fantasies, and later, two grand operas.

In 1894 the Bostonians commissioned him to write a work for them. "Prince Ananias" was the phenomenally successful result. Thereafter, Herbert turned out nearly forty operet-


tas and musical comedies, and truly became "the American Johann Strauss."

His songs, waltzes, marches, filled with attractive melody and ingratiating harmonies, were heard everywhere and still have frequent performances. Some of us oldsters think that for charm, lilt, vivacity and sentiment, no better musical plays exist than "The Wizard of the Nile," "Babes in Toyland," "Mlle. Modiste," "The Red Mill," "Naughty Marietta," "Sweethearts."

Not long before he died, I asked Victor to play some cello solos at one of the Gambols given by The Lambs (New York theatrical club).

"My dear boy," he protested, "I haven't even had the darned thing in my hands for ten years. My fingers are soft, my arm is stiff."

"Never mind, it's a compliment to the club and the boys all love you.

And the proceeds go to the fund for needy actors."

"Hm! I didn't think of that... Well, I'll do it. Anyway, even if my playing is rotten, they'll say 'Not so bad for a writer of Broadway shows.'"

An inspired musician, a real human being, a grand soul was Victor Herbert.

Speaking Up

Previewing the music of tomorrow has been the League of Composers' job for sixteen years. No other organization exists which has done so much to

encourage and stimulate contemporary creative music both here and abroad.

Shostakovich's fantastic opera "Lady Macbeth of Mzensk," Schoenberg's musical melodrama "Pierrot Lunaire," Mexican Carlos Chavez' Quartet for piano, clarinet, trumpet and bassoon, American Virgil Thomson's Mass for Women's Voices, De Falla's puppet opera "El Retablo de Maese Pedro" are only a few of the five hundred and eighty-three works produced by the League in its indefatigable efforts to promote the output of living composers. Leading orchestras, conductors, soloists and musical lecturers have collaborated with the League in concerts introducing the best American and European contemporary music to American audiences. *Modern Music*, the League's quarterly magazine, with its authoritative articles by composers, performers, and critics, represents a vital contribution to musical journalism.

To help American composers, the League evolved its unique Commission Plan. Financed by its Composers' Fund, the Plan commissions new American works, which are accepted for performance by major choral and symphonic organizations before the commissions are executed.

The League's present radio series on CBS, Tuesdays at 3 p.m. EST, is the fourth since 1935. The interest of the nationwide audience provided by radio has been of inestimable value to the League in the pioneer work it is so courageously accomplishing.

The world's tallest cellist appears with the Philharmonic on Sunday. When Felix Salmond plays, he folds himself over the instrument like a question mark and looks as though he were embracing it.

He also has a passion for neckties that look like stocks, and is never seen without yards of black silk bound around his neck, making his long head look even longer.

English by birth, Salmond has lived for years in America, teaches at the Juilliard School and Curtis Institute.

His memory for chamber music is phenomenal, and when he appears in his frequent recitals with quartets and trios, hardly ever glances at the music. Finally, he plays a mean hand of bridge and has a very attractive wife.

P. S.—He is one of the four ranking cellists of the world, the other three being Pablo Casals, Gaspar Cassado, and Gregor Piatigorsky.



INDESTRUCTIBLE is the popularity of this Verdi masterpiece, based on the gripping Egyptian drama with its intense themes of love and revenge. The vibrant action begins immediately, moves on swiftly and continues ceaselessly to the final moment.

Amneris mockingly reveals that Rhadames lives and is returning as the nation's hero. She pronounces the death sentence on Aida for daring to be her rival, but changes her mind and decrees that Aida shall be punished by being the first to witness Rhadames' triumphal return.

ACT I

An ante-chamber in the Palace of the King of Egypt.

Ramfis, the high priest, informs Rhadames, ambitious young military commander, that the Ethiopians are again marching on Egypt. He adds that the goddess Isis has prophesied the appearance of a new warrior to lead the Egyptians. Rhadames sings of his hopes to be chosen, so he may return to Aida, captive Princess of Ethiopia, whom he loves.

The Princess Amneris, daughter of the King, is enamored of Rhadames, but when she witnesses the meeting between her slave, Aida, and the young general, she realizes their mutual love and her jealousy is aroused. A messenger enters and tells of the approach of the Ethiopians under Amonasro, Aida's father. The Egyptian King appoints Rhadames to head the troops. Aida, torn between love for her country and Rhadames, sings the dramatic aria "Ritorna Vincitor" ("Return Victor").

Scene II

Outside the city walls.

The King and his court sit on a great throne awaiting the conquering army. Rhadames is carried in on a chariot and behind him are the captives, including Amonasro, Aida's father. Amneris places the victor's crown on Rhadames' head. He pleads successfully for the lives of the prisoners. The King rewards the hero with the hand of Amneris.

ACT III

The banks of the Nile.

A moonlight night.

Amonasro prevails on Aida to find out from Rhadames the road by which he will march on Ethiopia. He conceals himself behind some trees as Rhadames enters, and with Aida, sings a love duet. She persuades him to reveal his plans. Amneris, overhearing the plot, denounces Rhadames. Aida and Amonasro flee, but Rhadames, in remorse, surrenders to the high priest.



"CONCERTANTE" at various stages of musical history has meant a composition in which each part alternately becomes principal and subordinate, or a work for one or more solo instruments with or without orchestra. It will be interesting to see how a modern like Enesco handles the ancient form, with all the orchestral resources of today at his disposal.

Beethoven's Seventh could well be called the "Rhythm Symphony," for it suggests dance meters in most of its pages except in the slow introduction. The famous second movement, *allegretto*, remains one of Beethoven's most gracious inspirations, with a humorous touch at the end, where the violins whimsically accent the wrong note in the rhythmic pattern, a soothing chord of wind instruments chiding them for their impudence.

CONDUCTOR SEVITZKY deserves a crown of laurels for his policy of including in each of his programs at least one composition by an American. Some other batonists give frequent lip service to our native creators, but only occasional performances.

It is good, too, to see Stephen Foster in orchestral garb. I have often wondered why his composing compatriots do not use his melodies as subjects for their symphonic works. Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven and Brahms so employed European folk-tunes with conspicuous success.

KEEPING UP WITH M. MOUSE

"AMERICANS AT WORK" is just what the title says in plain words. Broadcast regularly on Saturday over CBS at 7:00 p.m. EST, 6:00 p.m. CST, 5:00 p.m. MST, 4:00 p.m. PST, it is a program worth any American listener's time,

for it tells the every-day, down-to-earth story of us Americans and how we make our living. It tells the story not with grandiose dramatizations or lectures but with vivid, specific examples, visits right in the centers of certain occupations with the workers

themselves. Some of the examples are uniquely American, some are common, bed-rock industries, all are vitally interesting. Typical of these broadcasts was the recent one from the West Coast studios of cartoon animator Walt Disney.

Universal Pictures want too much money for it . . . Jack Pearl remains one of the few ether comics without a regular series, but it may not be for long. A sponsor is just about set to sign Pearl . . . James Melton is about the only big-name tenor to be missing from the radio schedules this season and he will sign on the dotted line for a series any day now . . . Jane Seymour, from the Broadway stage, is the gal playing the part of "Flo" in the "Big Sister" cast . . . And the lass who has just been added to the cast of "Her Honor, Nancy James" as Laura is Claire Niessen, whose home is in Hollywood, California. She walked into producer Ed Wolfe's office and asked for an audition, and despite the fact that she hadn't had any previous radio experience, was hired for the part after her reading . . . The agency handling the tickets for the Kay Kyser programs are 104,000 requests behind at this writing. Ticket requests received last April are now being filled.

Behind the "Seen"

At a recent "What's My Name?" broadcast, Johnny, the call-boy, who usually opens the program, is conspicuous by his absence. The show gets under way without the familiar call for Mr. Morris. Fifteen minutes later Johnny rushes into the studio breathless. His car broke down on the Brooklyn Bridge, causing him to be late for the first time in his six years as a broadcaster . . . At a Kate Smith rehearsal, the songbird calls for a new script. She complains the type is too light and it's hard to read . . . The girls in the Ted Straeter choir sitting around knitting between numbers . . . At a Cities Service airing, Lucille Manners sips a hot cup

of tea before going on the air. This is a regular weekly procedure, the songstress claiming it warms and relaxes her nerves . . . Cornelia Otis Skinner, who recently guested on "Information, Please," claims she was more nervous than on an opening night. After the broadcast, she told her famed father, who was in the studio, that she should have been billed as "Misinformation," despite the fact she answered quite a number of the questions correctly. Such modesty.

Jim McWilliams puts on an extra added attraction for his "Ask-It-Basket" audience. Jim is an old-time vaudevillian, and after the broadcast he keeps the onlookers howling with his songs and monologs . . . The Andrews Sisters, now heard on the Phil Baker show every Saturday night, made a recent guest appearance on the CBS Swing Club and joined the jitterbugs by clapping their hands and tapping their feet to the music of Walter Gross' band . . . Songstress Doris Rhodes, back from her Florida vacation, is the envy of everyone in the studios because of her swell suntan . . . During a "Your Family and Mine" broadcast, Sam Monroe, the sound-effects man, winks at Irene Hubbard, who plays "Mary Preston." Just for the records, Sam is Irene's son . . . At a "Pepper Young's Family" airing, the cast is thrilled by the presence of two distinguished visitors who dropped in at the invitation of Elaine Sterne Carrington, who writes the series. The visitors are Franchot Tone and Jean Hersholt, for whom Miss Carrington is doing some script-writing.

Talking with "The Three Ambassadors" before they left New York to join Eddie Cantor's show in

Hollywood, they told me they hoped there was a ping-pong table in the new CBS studios. They've just gotten to the point where they feel up to challenging any other trio and don't want to get out of practise . . . Andre Kostelanetz taking infinite pains getting the "mikes" set just right for his orchestra . . . At a "Big Town" rehearsal, noticed that Edward G. Robinson usually wears a sweater a la Hollywood instead of a vest . . . Over listening to Benny Goodman polish up his numbers for his Tuesday night broadcast and discovered that Martha Tilton has given up needle-point for the nonce and is learning to knit. She's reached to "drop one and purl two" . . . Kay Thompson and I were talking about love and marriage during a rehearsal of "Tune-Up Time," and she told me she wouldn't be married to anyone unless he was in the business—because only those in the business understand the irregular hours . . . Elizabeth Newburger, member of the "Kay Thompson Rhythm Singers," agrees with her. They're both married to men in the business . . . Elliott Reid, who plays Jack Harding on the "Mighty Show" over CBS, tells me he's taking up horseback riding: he bought a riding-habit for some pictures and decided he might as well get some use out of it . . . Dropped in on a Whiteman rehearsal and Paul told me that his son has a \$300-set of trap drums.

It was a Monday and all his white shirts were sent to the laundry and he didn't have time to stop off and buy a new one.





If you happen to be a ham, try working Amos between 7:30 and 9:30 a.m. PST most any day . . . Ray Noble, the Burns and Allen maestro, has sorrows. Rented a furnished Beverly Hills home last month, tendered \$200 rent for two months in advance, and last week a municipal marshal came to the house, served some legal papers alleging Noble's landlord had not paid for the furniture, and then moved it right out from under the English bandleader! The incident has its humorous point (not to Noble) because the same day he learned that Harms was going to publish his new song, "I Love You Best By Candlelight." He'll have to! . . . Have you been tuning to the Jolson Show during the past three or four Tuesdays? Maybe the improved pace has not registered with you, but it's there, all right. Miss Goddard can blame herself, too, for an inside source informs that it was Paulette herself who first introduced Vivien Leigh to Selznick! . . . At Texaco Theater's farewell to John Barrymore: Dave Broekman, deft Dutchman, conducting his show from an unmarked script—no score, as he has that memorized. It's a superstition, and also a necessity, he explains, in directing the music fore and aft temperamental actors. Could he have meant J. Barrymore? That worthy, missed much by your reporter, is the world's greatest scene-stealer, even at the microphone. Watch him raise

his voice above that of his foil, pause in his lines, and sometimes step on his opposing actor's or actress' word! Jack also loved those rib introductions, but hated rehearsals; would sit through them mumbling, grunting and groaning . . . Jesse L. Lasky's "Gateway to Hollywood" is an old-timers' coffee-klatch worth seeing. At the January 15 show, Lasky kept talking across the footlights before and after the broadcast to Mary Pickford and Sam Goldwyn, and all regaled the audience with reminiscences. Through the Control-Room Window

The sound-effects man had his hands full the day your Tattler witnessed a performance of "Houseboat Hannah." Watching a performance, however, convinced me once again that radio serials should be heard and not seen. For with all the action in the show taking place in a storm aboard a drifting houseboat all you see in watching the episode are the actors with scripts in hand, standing in front of a mike, while the sound-effects man is busily engaged with storm-producing records and assorted noise-making gadgets. Still, though there's no enjoyment in watching the show. I don't mean to cast any aspersions on the acting ability of the performers. Doris Rich, for instance, a recruit from the stage, does a grand job in the leading role. Other performers also turn in commendable jobs. They include Norman Gottschalk, playing Hannah's husband; Billy Rose, as the young son, Shamus O'Leary; Gene Byron as Ellen; Jim Andelin playing Clem; Michael Romano as Joe Mosey, and Jean McDonald as Rosey. (Jean, incidentally, does her stint at the mike wearing her fur coat and hat.) Watch Billy Rose! He's an up-

and-coming youngster. You'll hear more of him this year. Announcer and producers of the show are Gene Baker and J. Clinton Stanley and Alan Wallace.

The "Houseboat Hannah" cast cannot rehearse during the fifteen minutes before showtime because they are in a "live studio." And here's the meaning of that: Preceding "Houseboat Hannah" is "Girl Alone." Since Irma Glen who plays the theme for both of these script-shows is in the "Houseboat Hannah" studio, no noise can be made while "Girl Alone" is on the air. Shortly after Miss Glen finishes the "Girl Alone" theme, "Cecile Waltz," she plunges into "The Last Rose of Summer," theme for "Houseboat Hannah."

Both Carlsen and Jurgens are heard nightly over WGN and MBS.

Something New

Remember a few columns ago we mentioned Charles P. Hughes, who was once famed as the original "First Nighter"? The veteran producer is trying to stage a comeback in radio by trying out something new in Chicago. A complete half-hour dramatic show, on the order of his old "First Nighter" dramas and more recently "Behind the Camera Lines" programs, is being presented before regular patrons of the Edgewater Beach Hotel's Marine dining-room. 


• First in America is the distinction of a "children's laboratory theater" to be opened in Chicago on February 1. Following the scientific lines laid down by a five-year research, prominent educators will supervise dramatic training to attempt to prove that if children would be guided in dramatic performances in their own theater, their dramatic impulses would be enabled to develop their imaginations to the end that they would more easily grasp educational facts. The new laboratory will be launched by three representatives of as many outstanding educational institutions—Norman Alexandroff, director of the nationally recognized school of dramatic training, Columbia College of Drama and Radio; Herman Hofer Hegner, president of the leading training-school for kindergarten and primary grade teachers, Pestalozzi Froebel Teachers College; and John DeBoer, director of practise teaching at Chicago Normal College. Most significant result of the research, according to Alexandroff, was the strengthening of his theory that children learn almost exclusively through dramatic impulses. "This is so basic," he says, "that it may well be the future of all education lies in presenting facts through dramatic form."

This experiment promises to be well worth the attention of educators everywhere and may speed up national acceptance of radio as an invaluable aid to classroom teaching.

• Chicago is the first city to follow the Radio Teachers' Institute plan, which Columbia network has been sponsoring in New York City. School principals, superintendents, board members and radio-education directors from all parts of Illinois gathered in the large audience studio of station WBBM in Chicago recently to listen to an *American School of the Air* broadcast, witness a classroom demonstration and to take part in a panel discussion on the use of radio in the classroom. A spread of this practise to other cities throughout the country would harvest a much keener understanding of radio's possibilities among educators.

• The California State Legislature was lobbied in the most unusual manner on record when the California Congress of Parents and Teachers asked each member of the Legislature by letter to listen to the "Parents on Trial" broadcast. The Congress, having backed this program since it was conceived several months ago, is sponsoring an amendment to the school code which will help solve some of the difficulties facing every community in relation to its handicapped children.

• Another New York World's Fair exploitation stunt via radio will begin over NBC next Sunday, February 5, with the premiere of a series of weekly programs covering the twelve themes to be represented in the Federal Government's exhibit at the Fair. The broadcasts will deal with various phases of the Government's participation in the social and economic life of the nation. Cabinet members and other high-ranking officials will participate in this series, which will start off with a discussion of food by Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace. Theodore T. Hayes, executive assistant U. S. commissioner, represented Washington in the arrangements for this series. —J. H.

"New Horizons" Retraces Paths of Scientific Exploration

For half a century the Mecca of explorers starting out on expeditions or returning from their quests has been the director's office in the American Museum of Natural History. From here each week Dr. Roy Chapman Andrews, as guide and commentator, will lead the way for classroom audiences and interested home listeners on journeys of exploration from the Arctic regions to the forests of the Congo, from mysterious Tibet to the lost cities of the Yucatan, from the jungles of South America to the pearl lagoons of the South Seas. This is a brief word-picture of the second semester's outline in the "New Horizons" series of Columbia's *American School of the Air*. It will unfold a sweeping panorama presenting almost every life-zone in the world, a panorama that has been painted by the lives, adventures, explorations and discoveries of famous scientists whose footsteps upon new frontiers have not only opened up trails into new horizons but also left lasting imprints in the fields of science. Recognition for the preparation of this series goes to Hans Christian Adamson, assistant to the president of the American Museum, and members of the Museum's scientific staff.

As interesting as the places to be visited in this series are the distinguished men and women who will take part in it at various times. Outstanding in a list of almost thirty famous scientists to be heard are the names of Dr. William Beebe, Dr. William Hall Holden, Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., Mrs. Blair Niles, Dr. Vilhjalmur Stefansson, F. Trubee Davison, to mention only a few.

THE FIRST PROGRAM, on Wednesday, February 1 (see Map No. 1), follows the trail of ancient man into the heart of Mongolia to the vast expanse of the Gobi desert, largest in the world. Here the history of early man rests beneath the sleeping sands. In the era of the Dune Dwellers—about 20,000 years ago—the desert was much less arid and not nearly as inhospitable as it is today. Dr. Roy Chapman Andrews, director of American Museum of Natural History, and Dr. Walter Granger, curator of the Museum's department of fossil mammals, on their various expeditions in the Gobi, discovered traces of these prehistoric people among the dunes that stood on the shores of lakes, long since dried up. The Dune Dweller was a hunter and, when lakes and rivers began to disappear, when forests dwindled and grass plains shriveled and game became less abundant, he had to move or die. From the dunes of the Gobi, he marched westward to Europe and eastward to North America.

The shaded portion of Map No. 1 shows the land bridge which has probably existed between Asia and North America at various times in the earth's geologic history. 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

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RECORDS OF THE WEEK

A department reviewing the recordings of your radio favorites

RICHARD STRAUSS: One characteristic of Richard Strauss is that his music is always highly programmatic; that is, there is a story or idea behind it. With his *Symphonia Domestica*, this is unfortunate—to us, at least. We would have enjoyed listening to this seldom-played symphony much more had we not read the "idea" it was written about. Also, this "idea" would never have suggested itself from mere listening. So if you buy the new album of the *Symphonia Domestica* by Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra, avoid the accompanying pamphlet, at least for a few hearings. The music itself is tremendously exciting, with a double-fugue finale of great proportions. It is performed well and recorded magnificently. (Victor album 520. \$10.)

Flagstad: A potent aria from Von Weber's opera *Oberon* gives the great Kirsten Flagstad one more triumph on wax—again given plenty of accompaniment by Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra. The solo is heroic and classical: "Ocean, Thou Mighty Monster" from Act 2. (Victor 15244. \$2.)

Korjus: The lovely Miliza Korjus of Hollywood follows her appearance in "The Great Waltz" with three songs from that picture, a fireworks reading of *Tales from the Vienna Woods*, some terrific coloratura in *There Will Come a Time*, and a not very satisfactory job of recording of the beautiful and simple *One Day When We Were Young*. (Victor 4410-1. \$1 each.)

Special Swing: To the collector or fastidious buyer, a batch of special

recordings by the Hot Record Society of 303 Fifth Avenue, New York, are of interest. Numerous personalities of swing history, both living or dead, are presented, such as:

Bessie Smith, singing one of the truest of old blues type of song, *One and Two Blues*, Joe Smith, Buster Bailey and Fletcher Henderson accompanying.

The *Connie's Inn Orchestra*, boasting a hatful of swing names, such as Rex Stewart, Coleman Hawkins, and Fletcher Henderson, in a typical old-time ride arrangement of *Sugar Foot Stomp*.

Bix Beiderbecke with the famous *Wolverine Orchestra*, early in the days of jazz (*Riverboat Shuffle* and *Lazy Daddy*) and two different versions of *Three Blind Mice* made with Frankie Trumbauer and a little band.

Romeo Nelson and Montana Taylor, two early and terrific boogie-woogie pianists, in two fine solos.

Benny Goodman in a great Chicago-style arrangement of *Wolverine Blues*.

Pee Wee Russell in four newly recorded hot records in the modern tradition, two in trio form with Zutty on drums, Jimmy Johnson on piano, four with full band.

All of these but the last-mentioned are repressings of old Gennett or other waxes, and constitute a rich heritage in the jazz tradition. They may be had by writing the society; priced \$1 each. Our personal recommendations are the Bessie Smith, the Goodman, *Three Blind Mice* and the boogie-woogie pianists. —Joe Thompson

singers on the stage. Nino was singing the part of Edgardo. In the last act the plot demanded that he stab himself. He reached for his dirk. There was no dirk in the sheath fastened to his belt! I saw him grabbing for it frantically. Luckily Edgardo takes a long time to die, like most opera heroes. So while Nino sang on more and more feebly, trying to convey the idea that he was dying of a broken heart or pernicious anemia, I signaled to a super standing in the wings. The super caught on and nodded to me reassuringly. Tramping out on the stage, he drew his own sword and stabbed Edgardo heartily in the stomach.

Nino coughed a little but died grateful.

ANOTHER time Melchior fell into difficulties with the *Sword of the Nibelungs*. As Siegmund in *Die Walkure* he was to draw the sword from the trunk of the great tree; a feat which only Siegmund can accomplish, according to the prophecy. But a stagehand had jammed the blade into the tree trunk a bit more securely than usual. When Melchior took hold of the handle and gave it a tug it refused to budge. So as he triumphantly sang, "Aha, I have drawn the sword, the beautiful shining sword," he had to go on struggling with it. Lauritz is a very strong man. He nearly pulled down the tree.

It is quite a picture to watch Melchior behind the scenes. Wearing his winged helmet and his coat of mail, he


sets a pair of horn-rimmed glasses on his nose and takes a pack of cards out of a pocket in Siegmund's trousers. Lauritz is a bridge fiend as Caruso was a poker fiend. During waits the helmeted hero plays contract bridge with the stagehands, the chorus or anyone available.

MELCHIOR and Lotte Lehmann have been friends for fifteen years and he teases her constantly about her dogs, which are rather small and frowsy beside his enormous Great Danes. In *Der Rosenkavalier* a dog appears on the stage. The opportunity was too good to be missed. Melchior stole Madame Lehmann's own dog, Jimmy, from her apartment. When she walked out on the stage there was Jimmy!

Lehmann was afraid the pup would jump into her lap, but Jimmy seemed to realize something unusual was going on that demanded perfect behavior. He did a fine piece of acting except for one small lapse, as you might call it, from character. All the while he was on the stage he wagged his tail.

I do not want to leave the impression with you that all we do in opera is have fun. Heaven forbid! We work long, hard hours.

Still, if a genie were to pop out of a vase tomorrow and say, "Pelly, you can live these twenty years over again," I have a strong suspicion where I should end up. In white tie and tails, I should be right back in my pit with my arm stretched up absurdly to wave a little stick in the air—the man nobody looks at; the cook in the kitchen of the opera.

WITH the two-and-one-half-year-old Spanish Civil War rapidly approaching a climax, listeners will be eager to keep in close touch with latest developments on both sides. Loyalist news bulletins in English are still being radiated over EAQ (9.855) and EAR (9.488), of Madrid, nightly from approximately 7:30 to 8 and 8:30 to 9 p.m. EST. Nationalist news bulletins in English, originating in the studios of "Radio Nacional" in Burgos, are relayed over EAJ43 (10.37 and 7.49), of Tenerife, Canary Islands; EA9AH (13.997) of Tetuan, Spanish Morocco, and numerous low-powered Spanish transmitters, nightly from 9 to 10 p.m. EST. Reception reports on any of the Nationalist transmissions may be addressed to the Ministry of the Interior, Department of Radio, Salamanca, Spain. QSL cards stamped by the Military Censor are issued promptly by the Franco government. These verifications serve as valuable souvenirs of the Spanish conflict.

A new Daventry frequency, GSV (17.81), "V for Valor," is now in use daily from 12:20 to 4 p.m. EST . . . ZP14, "Radio Cultura," a new short-wave station at Villarica, Paraguay, is being heard on 11.72 megs, nightly from 7:07 to 9:07 p.m. EST.

The only news broadcast in Spanish to be given during morning hours is now being heard over W2XAD (21.5) of Schenectady, N. Y., daily at 10 a.m. EST . . . HOA (2.34), "Ron Dalley" P. O. Box 1121, Panama City, Panama, operates in parallel with HP5G (11.78) nightly from 6 to 10 p.m. EST.

Miss Cecile Wiggins, Clinton, Okla.—Gustav Haenschen, conductor, was born in St. Louis, Missouri. His birthday is November 3. He is six feet tall, gray-eyed. Mrs. Irene R. Anderson, Grandview, Mo.—Henry Burr is 54 years old . . . he was born January 15, 1885. He is married and has no children.

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
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


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
