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Are Actors Human Beings?

Most directors think not. Most agency executives think not. Or so their actions have indicated. Actors were men and women to be summoned hurriedly at any hour of the day or night, kept waiting until the Great One, who is usually the director, was ready to rehearse them, and then paid off with buttons.

But it isn't that way any more. The story on page 8 tells you why. The actors finally got together and forced the Great Ones to come across with decent wages and decent working conditions. There is still one step to be taken, however. Actors who do a good job on a broadcast should be recognized. We know the average actor will do a better job if he can hear his own name announced as the creator of a certain role. It's only human, and actors are human beings. It is also helpful, in our opinion, to know who has entertained us well.

Just the other night we heard a play in which one woman's voice was so old and wise and humorous that we knew that this was a mistress of acting. We listened to her for a full half-hour, wondering who was giving us such deep enjoyment. But did we learn her name when the play was finished? No, indeed. Instead, we heard that the time was exactly fifteen seconds before ten o'clock, Bulova watch time.

Let's give more credit to radio's own stars and less to the cardboard Hollywood lovers of both sexes who attempt to read lines at unheard-of prices. Let's demand to know briefly but definitely who plays who when a play starts and when it finishes. Some programs have already adopted the procedure. Why not ALL?

Tyrone Power's Exit

Rumor has it that Tyrone Power was jerked off the air because theater-owners protested that his Sunday evening broadcasts were keeping people from their theaters. It sounds sensible.

It also reminds us that Something Should Be Done.

Radio needs new talent. It needs a talent school. It needs, after years of borrowing from the lecture platform, then the concert stage, then Broadway, then Hollywood, and now from its own studio audience, to recognize that the cupboards of all the other fields of entertainment are bare and we've got to plant some seeds and grow some crops of our own. That is, if we are to continue to eat.

With wars east and wars west, with a Munich crisis, with four-day round-the-world airplane flights, mere entertainment won't be enough.


So radio accomplishes a modern miracle once again and gives back to his delighted family their long-lost brother.

HOW CAN WE SHAPE THE FUTURE?

AN OFFER of petunias on a daytime program brought, I am informed, more than 1,000,000 dimes for more than 1,000,000 packets.

A recent survey revealed that in and around the District of Columbia, even in good April weather, children listen to the radio an average of fifteen hours per week. (Children are in schools only about twenty-five hours per week.)

And I do not need to remind readers of the nation-wide effects of a recent Sunday night program running opposite one of the most popular programs on the air.

These and many other instances reveal that radio is today a force whose power we can scarcely overestimate. Radio is a sort of national newspaper. It is our national theater, our national concert hall, our national fiction magazine, our national soap-box, our national speakers' platform, our national sports page, our national joke-book and vaudeville stage. Radio is an eighteen-hour mirror of America for 80,000,000 Americans.

But what of radio and education? Here the reflection is not so clear. The mirror's surface is clouded by the mistakes of educators inexperienced in the presence of microphones, split seconds, and classes that never register and never take examinations. Radio's mirror held to education is also misty with the failure of broadcasters

to awake to the idea that people really want to learn; and that there are really no dull subjects, just dull script-writers, and dull production-directors.

It has taken ten years for symphony orchestras to achieve the place they now hold in our radio sun. It has taken about the same length of time for radio drama, pioneered by the NBC drama guild, to gain wide acceptance. It is taking slightly longer for effective educational programs to enjoy equal popularity, but I now predict that the day is not far off when education will share the radio spotlight. The success of such programs as the Damrosch series, the Great Plays, the Maddy music lessons, "Town Meeting of the Air" and "Information, Please" points the way. The high popularity of the CBS "School of the Air," "People's Platform" and "Americans at Work" points in the same direction. Demonstration programs created by the Office of Education have prompted more than 600,000 letters from listeners in two and a half years. These programs have won loyal and enthusiastic audiences hungry for knowledge, eager to learn.

Yes, we are discovering how to make one of the most powerful new means of communication carry the precious freight of knowledge.

Public responsibility increases directly and arithmetically in proportion to in-


crease of power or influence. Hence both educators and broadcasters as well as citizens must carefully consider the policies which should govern the impending, far-reaching development of radio.

We already know that radio may serve equally well the purposes of dictatorship and democracy. How can we shape the future to insure the most effective use of radio for the purposes of our democracy? Education is the life-blood of democracy. How can radio help educators help democracy? That is a question for every radio listener, for every citizen.

This year the Office of Education makes three further network contributions to this problem, three series of half-hour programs: "Wings for the Martins" on NBC-Blue, posing the problems of modern education; "Americans All—Immigrants All" on CBS, dramatizing the contributions of many nations and races to the United States, and "The World Is Yours" on NBC-Red, bringing the Smithsonian Institution treasures to the people. I invite all citizens and especially educators to listen to these programs not only for the interest and content they contain but also as experiments and demonstrations in education by radio. I should be delighted to receive comments on these programs and other views on this whole vital problem of radio in the service of education.

THE INCREDIBLE STOOGE

AFTER the spree of 1929, and when the hangover set in, Bergen kept plugging in vaudeville, which even then had a death-rattle in its throat. Eddie decided he needed a new character to work with McCarthy, so he had Little Audrey made. But it was no soap. She was the magpie type and Bergen didn't have a voice to fit her. She was the animated type, and Eddie had to talk rapid-fire to keep her personality alive. It was too hard on his stomach.

So he had Elmer Snerd created, and he was better—a bashful rustic, a goof, and fitted Eddie's voice exactly. Of course not as well as McCarthy but well enough. Funny thing about Elmer, though. When he was carved, Elmer had a thin upper lip and firm chin. The public turned thumbs down on him, because a thin lip suggests meanness. Bergen laughs about it. "I had to give Elmer a thick, protruding lip and a receding chin," he said. "Then the public accepted him." (Elmer now is Mortimer Snerd.)

Bergen had made a warm friend of Ken Murray in vaudeville. They still are pals. Eddie had a great yearning for a headline billing and didn't want to be billed as a ventriloquist. So he wrote himself a one-act opus called "Apple Valley." In it he was a Swedish explorer and gaggled about his trip to the North Pole. Master McCarthy was out.

"Apple Valley" flopped the first night.

MORE FACTS ABOUT THAT FELLOW BERGEN AND HIS MIRACLE OF ENTERTAINMENT, THAT GUY MCCARTHY

Bergen knew the act was funny. He figured one thousand Americans must be wrong, because they said the act was terrible. He tried to pull a fast one. He was billed as a ventriloquist but came on the stage as the explorer and went into his act. The crowd froze him. The manager said, "Get that dummy, brother, or get out!" Bergen pulled Charlie out of the bag, went back into the old patter stuff, and left them in the aisles. Ironically enough, Bergen and McCarthy were the backbone of many bills, but they never got headline billing.

McCarthy had taken many parts during his life—newsboy, baseball player, Lord Fauntleroy—and the time had come for him to assume his real personality and take his rightful place among men. Bergen was billed in England and McCarthy put on a high hat. Eddie realized the old vaudeville McCarthy wouldn't go over with the claw-hammer-and-white-tie boys, so he whittled off McCarthy's wooden hair and bought him a red wig. He cringes

now when he thinks of the chance he took, carving McCarthy as though he were a slab of pine. He put a monocle on his doll, and in boring the hole in McCarthy's cheek for the monocle's pin, the knife slipped and almost changed Charles McCarthy, Esq., into Scarface Mac. The tiny cut still shows on McCarthy's cheek and his face must have a special treatment before McCarthy faces the movie cameras, or the scar shows.

Eddie hunted high and low for a special paint that wouldn't shine in the spotlights, and finally solved the problem himself by loading his paint with pumice-stone.

HE practised until his fingers ached, perfecting the manipulation of his dummy, and he made the operation as simple as possible. McCarthy had worn out many innards in vaudeville and Bergen finally gave him a new inside. He learned to operate McCarthy with only two motions. The million-dollar head was mounted on a wooden pole

about the size of a broom-handle. It revolves, nods, and is raised or lowered by Bergen's thumb and the last three fingers of his right hand, which grasps the rod—McCarthy's windpipe. The index-finger is hooked into a ring, and Bergen works his trigger-finger as though he were shooting a gun. That motion works McCarthy's mouth.

Eddie took McCarthy to his tailor and he was fitted with tails, and the pair was ready for the conquest of Europe. They had come a long way together. Charlie the Gamin had become Charles McCarthy, Esq. Bergen, the boy who wanted to invent a strawberry-picking machine, was to play before a king.

Eddie says he worried on the way to London, wondering how the English would accept the top-hatted McCarthy, who is a take-off on the English. Mr. Bergen, we suggest, probably is pulling our leg, as we say in dear old Mayfair. We have an idea Mr. Bergen, smart showman, knew that the English won't laugh at many things but will always laugh at themselves, and that's why Mr. McCarthy put on tails.

In London, he appeared first at London's famous Grosvenor House. Barbara Hutton was there. So was Lady Furness. So were many other persons who whooped and laughed, quite vulgarly, at McCarthy. Then Bergen went to Sweden and put on "The Operation." There wasn't a giggle, although Eddie did it in Swedish. Suddenly he remembered that in the old country doctors

are venerated. He tried that Swedish explorer's thing, and even the Swedes gave it the cold shoulder. Next Bergen went back to his old patter—and clicked. He played a command appearance before Swedish royalty.

He went to Russia and Denmark and visited Iceland on a cruise. The natives understood Swedish and Eddie gave an impromptu performance. McCarthy, the love-sneak, bowed to an Icelander's wife and said, "Madam, will you allow me to kiss you?"

The woman blushed. "Oh!" she said, and acted as though she wouldn't object. But her husband was there, so she said, "In Iceland a married woman is not allowed to kiss another man. My husband would object."

A giant of a fellow stepped from the crowd and glowered at McCarthy. Bergen almost stammered, but managed to save McCarthy, who said graciously, "Where I come from it's merely a sign of respect. I wanted to show my respect for you by kissing your hand."

Nice work, Bergen.

The lady offered her hand and McCarthy bowed and kissed it.

The hardest assignment Bergen ever had was in Venezuela, where he performed in a leper colony. The memory still haunts him. He stood in a courtyard surrounded by cells out of which the lepers peered. He knew no Spanish, so he made McCarthy sing. The lepers just stared at him. Eddie did some tricks of magic, but the lepers

didn't smile. After all, they needed a miracle.

Bergen came home and discovered the old place had changed. Vaudeville was dead and Eddie's meal-ticket was gone. Booking-agents laughed when he said he could click in night-clubs, but he put on the pressure and got a spot in a small club.

Then it happened. The night-clubbers toasted McCarthy, and before Eddie knew just what it was all about he was booked for the Rainbow Room in Rockefeller Center, one of those very very places. Bergen and McCarthy shot up like the elevators in the dump. Elsa Maxwell gave a party and Bergen entertained. He and McCarthy lamponed cafe society, and they loved it.

Other night-club bookings came in, and he went to Chicago to play at the College Inn. He arrived a week ahead of time and decided to fill in at the State-Lake Theater. The College Inn fired him before he started.

HE DROPPED by to see his friend Joe Jacobson, at the Chez Paree, and Jacobson gave him a spot. Rudy Vallee blew into Chicago, and Jacobson told him Bergen was a radio natural. Rudy said he was too busy to hear the show, but when Jacobson insisted Vallee went to the club. If Rudy ever needs a job, he can get big money as a talent-scout. For the minute he heard Bergen, he knew he had something. The next morning he signed Bergen for an appearance on the Variety Hour.

"I can't put you on steady," Rudy said, "because your material won't hold up."

Bergen agreed with him. It never had entered his head that he was a top-flight writer, although Noel Coward once had told him he was a whiz. But good old conservative Bergen didn't believe all he heard.

HIS first radio appearance was with Vallee on December 17, 1936. He got \$350 and used one of his standard routines. The next week he got more and used another old, reliable routine. The third week he said he couldn't think of anything to say, but he was offered \$750, and he sat down and wrote himself a program.

The nation forgot about its woes and Bergen gave us a new deal in entertainment.

Out in Hollywood, Sam Goldwyn heard him and McCarthy and said, "Sign those two guys. They are good."

He and McCarthy went to Hollywood, but they've never gone Hollywood. Bergen signed with Goldwyn for \$15,000 for a picture, but was astute enough to refuse an option on his future services. He was a smash in Goldwyn Follies. He began on the Chase and Sanborn Hour in May of 1937 at \$2,000 a week on an increasing salary arrangement. He now draws \$3,250 every Sunday from Chase and Sanborn. Universal paid him \$100,000 for his last two pictures, and now he is asking \$100,000 a picture. His dolls,

toys, books and other side-lines earn another \$100,000 a year for him. He declined a personal-appearance tour which would have netted him \$200,000 in ten weeks. At an appearance in Los Angeles on a 50-50 basis, he made \$17,500 in a week. He was paid \$5,000 in San Francisco for five minutes' work.

He is making money hand over fist, but his feet are on the ground. When he realized what he had, he sent home for his mother and brother Clarence. He turned his side-line business over to Clarence's management, and devoted all of his time to radio and movies.

Just in case you've forgotten, McCarthy is an old hand at the movie business. He was acting in shorts for Vitaphone back in 1935, but he wasn't a star.

With a swelling bank-account, Bergen looked around for a house and found Bellavista to his liking. It's a rambling Spanish-type bungalow. He picked it up at a bargain and improved it to suit himself. He has a small swimming-pool, a golf putting-green and a badminton court. There are no more rooms than he needs—bedrooms for his servants, himself, mother and secretary. He has an office-den, living-room, dining-room and a hobby-room, or shop. He is adding a wing to contain a rumpus-room, at the end of which will be a small stage, and there he is determined to put over his Swedish-

HEROIC METAL SUNDAY

From shoe eyelets to airplanes! That's the success story of a metal to be told on "The World Is Yours." The hero of the story is aluminum—a metal nobody wanted, although somebody thought it might be used for shoe eyelets. Today the "forgotten man" of metals has made good in a tremendous way. Now airplanes and streamlined trains are proudly garbed in the humble substance that was once kicked around on

shoes alone. A little-known metal thirty-five years ago, aluminum was confined to the shoe-eyelet market. Because it couldn't be drawn well, it was considered impracticable for any other use. Before the time of Charles M. Hall the supply of aluminum was abundant, but its cost was that of a precious metal. Hall's discovery of the electrolytic process in 1886 reduced the cost from \$100 to twenty cents a pound. Now the universal use of the metal, once considered small fry, ranges from toothpaste tubes to transport planes, from pans to ocean liners. NBC.

The most lethal of all musical instruments is the drum. This has been pointed out by Roy Shield, musical director of the NBC central division. When Gene Krupa and his orchestra visit the "Fitch Bandwagon" there will be a treat in store if you can trust yourself with Gene's toying with the "wolf-in-sheep-skin" instrument. Of course, there's plenty more to his orchestral music besides Gene and the drums. NBC.

OVER HERE TUESDAY

Of course we remember that "over there" business. We want to forget it. We don't care for any more "Goodbye, Broadway; Hello, France"—even in order to seem to be saving democracy. Yet we Americans are pretty friendly—too friendly sometimes. We've gone visiting a bit too often. We can't wear out our welcome, but our own patience is somewhat worn. Now we're staying at home, we hope, so our world neighbors will appreciate us more. We certainly don't resent closer acquaintanceship—peacefully. For instance, a great many Americans welcome the series of programs that will, every alternate week, bring us a vivid and authentic picture of France and its people. Parisian night life will contrast with provincial home life. Boulevard cafes will be pictured alongside department stores, fairs beside art schools. The series, of which this week's is the second program, will feature actual microphone pick-ups from familiar spots like "Folies Bergeres" and the Sorbonne. 

THIS WEEK—"LIFE CAN BE BEAUTIFUL"

DAVID SOLOMON, kindly old proprietor of the Slightly Read Book Shop on New York's lower East Side, is a profound believer in the philosophy embodied in the title of this serial. To the haven of his shop has come Carol Conrad, abandoned young girl of the slums. Also in the shop is Stephen Hamilton, a cripple, who refuses to let his bitterness be tempered by the old man's philosophy. Stephen distrusts Chichi, as they call Carol, and doesn't believe her story that she is being annoyed by a vicious racketeer, Gyp Mendoza, who wants her as a hostess in one of his shady

night-clubs. Chichi lives in the shop and works for her keep, although this plan is opposed by Stephen, as well as by Toby Nelson, a young man who has grown up with Chichi and has sincere hopes of taking her away from all the sordidness of her past environment. Mrs. S. Kent Wadsworth, a society matron, is also interested in placing Chichi elsewhere against the wishes of the girl herself. "Life Can Be Beautiful" may be heard Monday through Friday over the Columbia Broadcasting System at 1:15 p.m. EST, 12:15 p.m. CST, 11:15 a.m. MST, 10:15 a.m. PST.

THE CAST

CAROL CONRAD (played by Alice Reinheart) is known as Chichi. She is the nineteen-year-old daughter of the slums who is facing life bravely but with a chip on her shoulder. She is gratefully devoted to her old benefactor, Papa David, but antagonistic toward Stephen Hamilton because of his suspicious attitude toward her

STEPHEN HAMILTON (played by John Holbrook) is the embittered cripple, about thirty years old, who has been harbored by Papa David as a refugee from life's storms. The old fellow tries to convert Stephen to his philosophy, but cannot seem to shake Stephen's dark outlook. Love of books is something they have in common

DAVID SOLOMON (played by Ralph Locke) is affectionately known as "Papa David" to his many friends, young and old. He likes to convince others that life, despite its complexities, can be beautiful. It disturbs the old book-dealer to see the distrust existing between Chichi and Stephen, and he tries to reconcile their views

TOBY NELSON (played by Carl Eastman) is a twenty-one-year-old product of the same slum neighborhood where Chichi grew up. He has a bad case of "puppy love," and wants to protect Chichi from the dangers of her environment, but his plans are hopelessly impractical. To the girl, he is just a nice boy and an old friend

GYP MENDOZA (played by Waldemar Kappel) represents the most evil element of the slum district. He is involved in many rackets. When Chichi is abandoned by the woman she has called mother, Gyp offers the girl the vicious opportunity to become a hostess for one of his dives. He's persistent to a dangerous degree

MRS. S. KENT WADSWORTH (played by Adelaide Klein) is a socialite interested in social welfare. Despite a bit of flightiness, her intentions are sincere. She finds Chichi a bit startling and problematical, but she does aid, however, in setting an example as to how a lady—such as Chichi wants to be—dresses and behaves

DON BECKER collaborates with Carl Bixby in writing "Life Can Be Beautiful." Becker, though young, has spent twelve years in radio, writing and directing well-known features. He has produced and created more than 2,000 original radio shows, has produced musical shows and even composed the theme song for this sketch

CARL BIXBY, co-author with Becker of the serial, is a former newspaperman who forsook journalism for radio and stage work. His first big radio show was "Dangerous Paradise," and he has been responsible for numerous other air shows with long-run records. In his spare time Bixby directs a Little Theater in presenting well-known plays





BEHIND THE ACTORS' STRIKE

WHAT IS THE RESULT
WHEN THE BIG FELLOW
AND THE LITTLE FEL-
LOW STAND TOGETHER?
HERE IS ONE INSTANCE

LADIES and gentlemen, due to the existence of an unavoidable business situation the program regularly presented at this time will not be heard. In its stead, you will hear a musical program by the glee club of the Poinsettia College for Young Women. The glee club—"

"Hey, did you hear that—what the announcer said? No Charlie McCarthy tonight, either. And Jack Benny wasn't on. What in the world?"

That is what you might have heard and what you might have said if certain things had not happened—certain things of which you may have been not at all, or vaguely, aware. But you didn't miss Jack Benny and Charlie McCarthy, because those things did happen.

Therein lies a story.

It's a story of the triumph of the little-shot, backed by the big-shot; of a smashing blow for justice; of a bloodless rebellion; of a radio strike that almost transpired—but didn't.

Instead, those plodding actors and actresses who form one of the pillars of radio, though practically unknown in name, after long being imposed upon as the small fry so often are imposed upon, won their just recognition—in dollars and cents in black and white—with the overwhelming support of their more renowned brother and sister stars, the name actors.

The story begins with the beginnings of radio. When the great new field broke on the public scene, the door was wide open. It was come one, come all. Everything was experimental—in-

structive and entertaining to the performer as well as to the listener. The mike was open to anybody with a little talent, a little experience and a big willingness to work for the joy of it. There were no movie and stage guest stars who graciously allowed themselves to be asked cute questions or did a bit of a sketch for a paltry few grand.

It was a big game. And who were the players? Not stage and screen celebrities. They could not afford to sacrifice their names until the new medium proved itself. The pioneers were the little-shots—amateurs striving for a foothold in any medium, has-beens glad of a second chance, experimental workshop players, rank recruits from behind the counter and the sink, with a colossal confidence and a germ of an idea.

A LOT of ether has flown under the span of the skies. Radio is now a business—a serious business. It must have names. Yet it still must have the wheel-horse work of the little actors and actresses.

On this business end is where the advertising agencies came in, where AFRA came in—and where the makings of the "situation" arose. It is a commonly recognized fact that in business the little fellow is generally kept a little fellow as long as he will stand for it. That's why there are unions and strikes. That's why there is an American Federation of Radio Artists and why recently there was almost a nation-wide strike of those artists. For

as time went on radio grew and prospered, the advertising agencies grew and prospered, even the dramatic stars grew and prospered—but the hard-working, indispensable bit-players just grew.

This situation pertained especially to sponsored dramatic shows in the hands of advertising agencies. The

American Federation of Radio Artists—AFRA—already had a satisfactory contract with the radio networks, but the agencies, out to make all the money they could—a legitimate desire if legitimately sought—had the usual ideas about economy and profit. As usual, it was the little fellow among the dramatic performers who suffered. The

nigher-paid stars were fairly well satisfied for themselves, but they were not satisfied for their less fortunate brothers and sisters.

Through the past ten years, while the industry has been progressively advancing and becoming a highly organized and prosperous enterprise, the compensation of radio artists and the conditions of their employment have not in many cases progressed proportionately.

Traditionally, they rehearse long hours and give auditions without remuneration; they have no security and no guarantee that their jobs will continue; they have been subjected to deductions for agent's fees for services which have not always been rendered, and they are in many cases treated with scant consideration. These are some of the premises upon which AFRA, organized to protect the standards of its members, based its militant demand for a settlement.

Technically, the difficulties arose over the manner and amount of pay for rehearsals, rebroadcasts, and so on. Actually, it all boils down to the fact that the actors were not being paid enough by the agencies for the entire time consumed—time often wasted, too.

SUCH a situation as the following was common. The actors for a dramatic show gather at the studio at the appointed time of 2:00 p.m. They find that no scripts are yet available from the agency, but should be on hand right away. The performers sit around and twiddle their thumbs when there are many more advantageous things they might be doing. About 4:00 o'clock in come the scripts and rehearsal begins. At 6:30 the show goes on the air. For all this the actor might receive as low as ten or twelve dollars; and more time might have been wasted for the same pay.

Perhaps such wages do not sound like utter penury, but there are other angles to the situation. Suppose the actor had previously made an appointment for a rehearsal for another show at 4:30 o'clock. He is forced to skip that appointment and it costs him a permanent thumbs-down from a disappointed and outraged director. It should be kept in mind, too, that this

kind of work is often free-lance, occasional and sporadic. The pay is not always a regular income to be depended upon. Moreover, there was a glaring discrepancy between the income of big stars and that of the thespian infantry, also between that of the actors and of the musician members of the hard-fisted musicians union.

TAKE another specific example. A show is on the air at 12:00 noon. It is rehearsed from 10:00 a.m. till broadcast time. Then in the afternoon there is a brush-up rehearsal for the repeat broadcast to the West Coast, and at 3:00 o'clock the second show is presented. All this, too, for a ten-dollar bill.

There is the case also of the sponsor happening upon the scene, turning up his nose at the script and ordering a rewriting, thereby consuming—and wasting for the actors—several more hours at no extra pay to the actors.

"It is true," says Mrs. Emily Holt, New York AFRA official, who was Joan of Arc of this conquest, "that the fees which we asked in our minimum scale appeared high to the layman, but there are reasons. First, radio is piecework. Many jobs are for short periods and they are highly competitive. Often an artist must refuse a job because a rehearsal for which he did not receive any pay would conflict with another job that might have been offered. Secondly, life as a professional is not long. He is lucky if he has ten good years of work.

"The actor on a five-a-week script show spends hours in rehearsal that he was not getting paid for. He has to study new parts each day. And his work on a national network might be heard by as many as thirty million people. At the same time, he is selling a product. Therefore, I say pay for the program and pay for the rehearsal. The actor has but two things to sell—his talent and his time."

So—came the revolution, a very peaceful but very firm revolution. Came the unanimous threat of a strike of radio artists, a strike that would have had unusual significance for the listeners as well as for the industry.

If the strike had transpired, the

listener would have witnessed some unique wholesale changes in the stuff he plucks daily out of the air. There would undoubtedly have been a great deal of sustaining talent hired by the network, replacing many of the absent commercial shows. Listeners would have heard more recordings than they ever heard before. New types of audience-participation shows might have been conceived for the emergency.

In fact, the American audience might have had a taste of something very similar to the nature of the British system of broadcasting—chamber music, a popular soloist, an organ recital, a bit of poetry, an orchestra—all without a word about Neverslip Soap or Eternal-Wear Suits.

IT ALMOST happened, but an eleventh-hour capitulation early this month by the agencies to the relentless pressure of a unanimous front led to a peaceful solution, in which the AFRA and the little fellows won their demands and their rights almost one hundred percent. The agreement signed by the advertising agencies and AFRA, along with the Columbia Broadcasting System and the National Broadcasting Company, provided in effect for an AFRA shop, pay for rehearsals, pay for auditions, and the AFRA minimum scale, which is much higher than the one proposed by the agencies. The minimum scale provides: For shows, \$15.00 for 15 minutes, \$25.00 for 30 minutes; \$35.00 for 1 hour; for rebroadcasts, \$10.00, \$12.50 and \$17.50 respectively; for rehearsals, \$6.00 for the first hour and \$3.00 per half-hour thereafter, except for five-a-week programs, when the actor may be paid at the rate of \$5.00 per hour for rehearsal. Announcers' fees are substantially the same as those of the actors.

SO UNDERDOGS Mary Miller and Sam Smith now feel more like Miss Mary Miller, actress, and Mr. Sam Smith, actor. Big stars like Eddie Cantor and Jack Benny are happier, too, for their former "poor relations." From top name down the organization was solid in its demands and its intentions to strike. Here, as examples, are some of the telegrams received by Mrs. Emily Holt, the AFRA leader:

"Rest assured that the radio people on the West Coast will support AFRA in whatever action the Negotiating Committee deems necessary." Signed: Eddie Cantor. (Cantor is the national president of AFRA.)

"Keep up the fight. We are back of you 100%." Signed: Jack Benny.

"Heartiest congratulations on our AFRA victory. Hooray for our loyal executives." Signed: Margaret Speaks.

"Arkansas reporting present, accounted for and ready to go through." Signed: Bob Burns.

"The agencies must be made to understand that performers, whether on the stage, the screen or the radio stand together. You may count on my support as always." Signed: George Arliss.

"I guess it's in the blood. I stand with my fellow actors." Signed: Tyrone Power.

"Count me in till the finish." Signed: Dorothy Lamour.

"After this our batting average will still be 100 percent, so keep on fighting." Signed: Ralph Morgan.

"We are all together as always." Signed: Robert Young.

"I'm doing all I can to round up everybody to take up the cudgels." Signed: Eddie Arnold.


"I'm proud to announce this program. I am with you." Signed: Jimmy Wallington.

"I have always been for the actor. Count me in." Signed: Gene Raymond.


Almost all the actors in the radio centers are AFRA members. The organizations of New York, Chicago, Los Angeles and San Francisco voted unanimously to strike unless demands were met. It was "United we stand—divided we fall." They stood.

There may be still changes that will affect the listener. Directors may possibly now rush through rehearsals to reduce the established rehearsal fees. Probably, too, some script-shows will be pared down to fewer characters to cut expense. Shows of three and four characters may become more prevalent to replace larger casts.

The actors, especially the little fellows, and AFRA are confident they have won a victory for justice and progress—smoothly, bloodlessly and overwhelmingly.

Artistic Private Lives

WONDER whether RADIO GUIDE readers feel as I do about the intimate and even impudent way in which eminent artists of concert and opera are treated on the air by some masters of ceremonies? Such chumminess hardly seems in place, for it often borders on the familiarity that breeds proverbial contempt.

There come to mind particularly the occasions when Bob Burns asked venerable Moriz Rosenthal whether he would like to hear the bazooka again; when Bing Crosby told Mischa Levitzki to remove his coat if he felt warm playing; and when the same brash Bing called Ernest Schelling "Ernie." Rosenthal answered that he would not care to hear the bazooka more than once every hundred years; Levitzki's atmospheric reply was that he would not mind if he took off even his suspenders; Schelling asked that he be given his full title of "Uncle Ernie."

It is to be doubted whether those incidents stimulated the gayety of nations or particularly edified the radio listeners who had thought of great musical artists as especially dignified persons.

Of course the blame falls chiefly on the artists who assist in such pranks. There was a time when they kept a strict barrier between themselves and their audiences. Then started the era of personal and hysterical publicity in the newspapers and magazines; and came also the opportunities offered by radio for contacting nearly every household in the land. Leopold Stokowski was the first of the musical stars to understand the new way of adding notoriety to renown, and his "front page" antics first astonished, then intrigued his colleagues. They soon sought similar picturesque ways to win public attention in the belief that celebrity with a few serious music-lovers is not nearly as profitable as to be known to millions of the general public. The best approach was through radio, if physical attractiveness did not permit of a side career in films, as in the case of Lily Pons, Grace Moore, Nino Martini, Gladys Swarthout, Nelson Eddy and others. Even a Kirsten Flagstad allowed herself to be purchased for a Hollywood review and Jascha Heifetz is now under contract to make a picture. Lauritz Melchior went on a cigarette hour and unblushingly spoke a commercial plug for the sponsor's product.

Do we really wish to be disillusioned and have a great artist cheapened by being made the butt of ridicule on the part of a master of ceremonies; or hear the famous one say, "Goot afternoon, ladies and chentlemen, I vill now sing for you the Narratif from 'Lohengrin';" or again, "Bon soir, mesdames et messieurs, for you I vill sing zat so joli musique, se Polonaise from ze French opera 'Mignon'?"

Speaking Up

When on January 21 small, baldish, bespectacled Mischa Elman stepped out on the stage of Carnegie Hall, he was greeted with an ovation such as few men have ever received. The applause was not so much for the great artist as for his magnificent gesture in donating the proceeds of a three-months concert tour to the relief of German and Austrian refugees.

The tour (he will pay his own railroad fares and expenses) will take him 20,000 miles to twenty-five cities both here and in Canada. He hopes to raise \$60,000 to be divided equally between the American Committee for Christian German refugees, the Committee for Catholic Refugees from Germany and the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee.

Among the patrons of the tour are Jan Masaryk, ex-Czechoslovakian ambassador to England and son of the late Czech president; Hendril. Willem Van Loon, historian and fighting humanitarian; Alfred E. Smith and many others, who, like Elman, are demonstrating the difference between merely deploring the totalitarian persecutions and acting vigorously to alleviate the suffering they cause.

For years opera-goers and music critics have been trying to unravel the plot of "La Gioconda." They managed to figure out "Aida," "Lucia" and even "Il Trovatore," but "La Gioconda" defied even the best efforts of the G-men. Now, at long last, we have a key to the mystery. "The Authentic Librettos of the Italian Operas" gives the plots and complete dialog of ten operas, including the above-mentioned and "Cavalleria Rusticana," "Pagliacci," "The Barber of Seville," "Don Giovanni," "La Traviata" and "La Forza del Destino." The English and Italian texts are printed side by side, and although slightly cryptic in spots (we found ourselves stumped by such little gems as "Despair and anguish grant the heart may desolation" and "Strike, the frail strings of life now dividing, at her nuptials my pale corpse presiding.") give blow-by-blow accounts of the operas. The book costs \$1.75, is published by the Crown Publishing Co., 444 Fourth Ave., New York, N. Y., and is invaluable for Saturday afternoon opera-listeners.

Once in a while a piece of new music comes along that makes us sit up and take notice. Tuning in to Lyn Murray's "Moods for Moderns" recently, we heard Vera Brodsky's brilliant and exciting performance of the "Rhapsody in Three Moods" by twenty-year-old Arnold Schwarzwald, one of the best short piano-and-orchestra compositions to appear since Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue."

Mischa Elman pauses briefly in his concert tour for the benefit of German and Austrian refugees to make an appearance with the Philharmonic in aid of his own purse. The nimble Elman fingers and that artist's warm tone and impulsive temperament have a fertile field in the melodic and brilliant old romantic concerto by Saint-Saens.

Beethoven, ardent lover of nature, devotes his sixth symphony (the "Pastorale") to rural scenes and episodes. To help the hearer in following the tone portrayal, the composer describes his first movement as "Awakening of pleasant feelings on arriving in the country," a succession of light melodies simply treated. The second movement, "Scene by the Brook," murmurs recognizably and later introduces bird songs of the nightingale

(flute), cuckoo (clarinet) and quail (oboe). An ornithologist told me that Beethoven's quail is the German variety, not the American Bob White whose notes are quite different. The third movement is a "Merry Gathering of Country People," whose fun and dancing are interrupted by a thunderstorm (really a fourth movement), the thunder suggested by the drums and the wind by the strings. The last movement, dealing with "Happy and thankful feelings after the storm" also offers a joyful "Shepherd's Song," with the clarinet substituted for the rustic pipe. At the end the horn softly echoes the song, and suddenly the whole orchestra crashes in with two overpowering final chords.

The Opera: "Manon"

IN GRAND opera, as in life, romance remains perhaps the most fascinating subject. That is doubtless why "Manon," composed to Abbe Prevost's great love-story, loses none of its popularity as the years travel along. Of course, not the least attraction is the Massenet music, melody-filled, lightly lyrical (even sentimental) and altogether of fragrant quality. Massenet makes no attempt to be psychological or profound, although he does copy Wagner by tagging the two leading characters with themes that recur repeatedly in the course of the opera. You will hear them in the overture (one is a fragment for cello); see if you can follow their course throughout the action.

A great part of the music was composed by Massenet (1882) at The Hague, in the very room where Abbe Prevost had lived, and that accounts for the atmospheric sincerity of the score. In a present-day cynical and material world, the coquettish light-o'-love Manon, and the chivalrous Des Grieux of passionate devotion, stand out with particular appeal and charm.

Massenet's opera was premiered at Paris in 1884 (America in 1885) and in 1893 Puccini brought out a "Manon Lescaut" on the same subject. However, the French composer did a better job than the Italian.

ACT I

Manon, a pretty country girl, is being escorted to a convent school by her rascally uncle, Lescaut. To break the journey, they stop at a wayside inn. Lescaut leaves her in the courtyard while he goes in to drink, admonishing her to be a good girl while she waits for him. She sings an entrance air, "A Simple Maiden Fresh from Home!" De Bretigny and Guillot, two rich roués accompanied by several attendants, are dining in a pavilion. Manon watches them fascinated, meanwhile singing a song warning herself against dreaming too much of vanities. More sophisticated than she looks, Manon flirts with the two roués. The dashing young Chevalier Des Grieux comes into the courtyard, sees Manon and falls instantly in love. He sings a wooing aria, Manon responds, they do a duet, and decide to steal Guillot's carriage and elope to Paris.

ACT II

The lovers dwell in a chic apartment. Des Grieux's mad infatuation meets with opposition from the scheming Lescaut, who has come to see his niece, with De Bretigny. While Des Grieux

is out, De Bretigny tells her that Senior Des Grieux is against her marriage to his son, and plans to carry him off by force. Manon's cupidity aroused, she casts favorable eyes on De Bretigny, even though she loves the younger man. De Bretigny and Lescaut leave, and Manon and Des Grieux are alone. He sings the famous "Dream," an entrancing air with soft harp accompaniment. They have supper and then Lescaut's confederates kidnap the Chevalier. Manon meanwhile has decided to accept the luxury offered by her elderly admirer.

ACT III

(Scene I is sometimes omitted)

Scene I

A fete at the Cours de la Reine, in Paris. Dancing and gaiety. Manon, beautifully dressed in early nineteenth-century fashion, appears with De Bretigny, and sings the celebrated Gavotte ("List to the Voice of Youth"). She learns that the Chevalier is about to enter a seminary at St. Sulpice Church.

Scene II

Sensing that Des Grieux still loves her, Manon, veiled and modestly garbed, seeks him at the church. She hears his father admonish him and leave. Coming out of her hiding-place, she seduces the Cavalier from his priestly intentions. They sing a tempestuous love duet and elope again.

ACT IV

A fashionable gambling-house. The Chevalier, having spent most of his money on Manon, stakes the remnant of his cash, wins consistently, but finally is accused by Guillot of cheating. Manon and her lover are arrested and confronted with the elder Des Grieux. The act ends with a genuinely heartfelt lamentation by the ill-fated girl.

ACT V

A lonely spot on the road to Havre. Manon, legally condemned as immoral, is to be deported to a French penal colony in Louisiana. The Chevalier, freed through the influence of his father, plans to attack the convoy escorting Manon to the ship. However, hopelessly ill and exhausted, she falls by the wayside and dies in the Chevalier's arms. Even at the end, the keynote of her character is stressed when she has a delirious vision of glittering jewels, but she gazes at Des Grieux, kisses him and sings "I Love Thee," as she expires.

AMAZING PARALLELS

WHEN Joe Penner, comedian (Thursday, CBS, 7:30 p.m. EST, 6:30 p.m. CST, and for the West, 6:30 p.m. MST, 5:30 p.m. PST), and Tommy Lane, eleven-year-old vocalist on Joe's program, had a heart-to-heart talk and discovered an astounding similarity in their lives, they each delved into their family albums and uncovered an abundance of evidence to support the parallel. Joe Penner was born Joseph Pinter in Nagybecserek, Hungary. Tommy Lane was born Stanley Hoffman not far

away in Lodz, Poland. The parents of both were musical, Joe's mother being an opera singer. Both Joe and Tommy got their start in show business by winning local singing-contests. Tommy sang for local benefit performances in Atlanta, Ga., and Joe vocalized for the benefit of the Liberty Loan drives in Detroit twenty years before Tommy's time. Both were choir boys. Both were given their first radio break by nationally known personalities—Joe by Rudy Vallee and Tommy by Joe Penner himself on Joe's current show.





NEW YORK.—Pick and Pat have every reason to be sorry they took that two-week vacation. Tom Howard and George Shelton, who stepped in to pinch-hit for the vacationing comics, went over so big with the tuner-inners that they will return to the show starting February 27, replacing Pick and Pat, who will get a permanent vacation they didn't ask for. CBS has always had trouble in filling the theater for the P and P show. As a matter of fact, a restaurant on Forty-fifth Street near the CBS Playhouse was giving tickets away to diners for this program, with very few takers. . . . Tommy Riggs is going to take "Betty Lou" to California because "they" have been bothered with a sore throat most of the winter. Tommy's first broadcast from the West Coast will be on March 4. . . . Ted Collins, Kate Smith's mentor, outbid about a dozen other programs for the right to broadcast scenes from "The American Way," one of the biggest hits in New York. He wants nothing but the best and is willing to pay for it. . . . Orson Welles is busy rehearsing his new theatrical production, "Five Kings," and Alice ("Big Sister") Frost is also rehearsing for her appearance in a new play to hit Broadway soon. . . . Phil Baker is reading the script of a new play to open on Broadway sometime in March. It was written by Raymond Knight, whom dialers may remember as the star of the "Cuckoo Hour"—and that was Knight who was the barking dog on a recent Baker airing. . . . Robert Ripley will deliver the commencement address at Missouri Valley College on May 29; at the same time, the college will confer upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws.

Behind the Scene

Dropped in on a rehearsal of Columbia's "Campbell Playhouse" when they were doing a dramatization of "Arrowsmith." The sound-effects crew were cutting a piece of glass into little squares with a glass-cutter. "Arrowsmith" is the story of a doctor, and they told me they had to have the small pieces of glass to click together to get an effect of glass slides under a microscope. Orson Welles and Helen Hayes, the guest star of the week, came in and a line rehearsal started. There were a lot of medical terms to trip up the cast, but a research man had consulted a good dictionary and was there with a list of pronunciations. The program requires two studios—one for the actors and another for the band. A sound-proof wall with a glass panel separates the two rooms and the bandleader uses the panel to watch Welles' orders. They both wear the headphones that seem to be a part of the Welles' trademark.

The thing about the rehearsal which impressed me most was the meticulous way in which Welles rehearses and directs a show. He pays careful attention to the smallest details, going to great pains to help his actors get a complete understanding of the characters they are playing. He never reads a line for another actor, but helps him to imagine all the action and thought leading up to the line.

It seemed as though all the autograph-hunters in New York were outside of CBS Radio Theaters One and Two, on Forty-fifth Street, the night George Brent guestarred for Kate Smith, and Doug Fairbanks, Jr., appeared across the street with Walter O'Keefe and Andre Kostelanetz on "Tune-Up Time." It was quite a gala night for the collectors of famous names. . . . At a rehearsal of "This Is New York": Bill Robinson, that hail-and-hearty dancer, autographing a picture for a fan. . . . Ed Gardner getting entrenched in the "Archie" habit, wandering around heckling people even when it's not in his script. . . .

Somebody left a door open at the Ben Bernie rehearsal Sunday and a gusty breeze comes whipping across the stage. The drummer cracks, "Will somebody close that door! You could fly a kite in here." Somebody closes the door. . . . Artie Shaw's boys find it very simple getting to rehearsal for the "Melody and Madness" show. The alleyway to the Lincoln Hotel, where they play nightly for the dance crowds, and to CBS Radio Theater No. 1, where the show is given, are one and the same, the buildings being adjacent, and the boys can step from the hotel to the theater without even having to put on their hats. . . . Meeting songstress Bea Wain outside the studio, I learned that the entire cast of the Tommy Riggs show was waiting for John Barrymore, who was already one hour late for rehearsal. Amid some excitement, Barrymore marched in a half-hour later, was introduced around, then sat down quietly enough to read his script. His wife, Elaine Harris, was constantly at his elbow. The rehearsal continued in business-like fashion except when the Clinton crew went off on "Dippermouth" and songstress Bea Wain got up to do a bit of shagging. Then up jumped Barrymore, the great lover, to shag with her.

Attended the Kate Smith broadcast over Columbia the night George Brent appeared in scenes from "Wings of the Navy." The house was packed with high-commanding naval officers and their wives, with many standees, which is unusual in a radio theater. They rarely permit anyone to stand, but this was an exception. When the "On the Air" signal was given, the audience was so quiet you could hear a coin drop—and I did. Andre Baruch came out in front of the curtain to make the opening announcement with the spotlight shining on him. The curtain remained lowered all during the playing of the opening theme song, which to these eyes looked like a good piece of showmanship.

The audience was pleasantly surprised when it was announced that they could remain in their seats after the program was over and witness a preview of the movie, "Wings of the Navy." The picture was over at 10:30, and as the last person left the theater, the new crowd for the repeat broadcast rushed in.

Whiteman Wears "Wed" Woo! Woo!

The Paul Whiteman program seems to be a male fashion-parade. What with the Four Modernaires appearing in gray tuxedos with a black stripe down each trouser leg, and the Dean of Modern Music proving to be Master of Modern Style with a very reddish maroon tux and a matching maroon bow tie. And the maestro explains his attire with, "Ever since we played the song about Ferdinand the Bull I don't feel at home in any other suit!" Roy Barge conducts the twenty-eight-piece band during rehearsals and for almost every number during the actual broadcast. Whiteman goes in for little baton-waving, but lots of hip-waving to amuse the audience. Clark Dennis is now on this program, and this favorite of "Breakfast Club" listeners and other Chicago programs is doing a nice job of vocalizing.

In case you're interested, Fred Waring does not use a bandstand from which to direct. He uses a rickety old table, with the entire score of the program spread out before him, and a pitcher of water with a glass, from which he drinks between numbers. When directing choral numbers he stands in front of the table, and not only signifies the rhythm, as most leaders do, but directs the diction and breathing of his men and girls. No other organiza-

• The New York City Board of Education whole-heartedly opened its doors to radio-education recently when it was announced that Columbia's *American School of the Air* had been made a part of the New York City school system's course of study. The affiliation of broadcaster and school was made more firm with arrangements to include actual participation of pupils in the broadcasts. Every Thursday, "This Living World" will originate in the auditorium of a different New York high school, with a group of students participating in forum discussions following the dramatized portions of the broadcast.

• Teaching teachers how to use radio programs in the classroom is not the broadcaster's problem. Pleasantly surprising, however, is the fact that broadcasters are showing the initiative in this matter and are lending every cooperation to organize clinical demonstrations of the value of radio in classroom education. First in this field was Columbia, who last fall organized the first Radio Teachers Institute in New York City; station WBBM came to the front next in Chicago by sponsoring a similar gathering of teachers to study radio-classroom problems. Most recent to sponsor this work was Joseph Ries, educational director of station WLW and the "Nation's School of the Air" classroom series. The future's looking better with every delivery of mail.

THREE MEMOS

MR. OR MISS AVERAGE TEACHER:

PROMINENT educators everywhere recommend broadcasts as helpful supplements to teaching in the classroom. It is very apparent, however, that in too many cases you teachers don't know how to use this new tool to effective advantage. For this you cannot be and are not blamed, because heretofore training in the utilization of radio in the classroom has not been available. However, we who are interested in the almost unlimited possibilities of radio-education hope that in the future you will take advantage of every opportunity to learn how to utilize radio programs as a supplement to classroom teaching.

TEACHERS' TRAINING-SCHOOLS:

Are you training prospective teachers in the use of radio in the class-

room? Do you have a summer course to train practising teachers during their vacations how to use this new tool of education? Stop for a moment and give these questions serious consideration; show the teachers you train how to deal wisely with classroom radio problems.

MR. SCHOOL OFFICIAL:

Are teachers in schools under your jurisdiction using radio correctly in the classroom? Are you providing them with every opportunity to learn the best methods of utilization? There is much you can do to help them with this problem, and one of the best plans to come to the attention of this department is the radio institute that has been used in New York, Chicago, Cincinnati. Why not try this stunt? It might help your teachers!

BRINGING TEACHERS UP TO DATE

ONE of the biggest drawbacks in the classroom use of radio is the average teacher's lack of training for this new medium. Reason is radio is so recent that teachers have had little or no opportunity to study it. Solution to this problem in most school systems where radio programs supplement classroom teaching is a handbook or manual prepared to give teachers guidance. One of the most serviceable handbooks of this type is the one being prepared by a special committee of educators for the Los Angeles city schools. Most unusual features of the L. A. handbook are its simplicity, readability and beauty of composition.

Titled "Radio Learning," this handbook really digs into teachers' radio problems—from the educational status of radio in Los Angeles schools to plans for the guidance of students' home listening. It tackles the actual

problems that teachers are faced with and in logical order offers suggestions and advice for their solution.

Prime is the introduction by Superintendent Vierling Kersey in the first chapter of the book:

Curricula must be modified; traditional procedures must be revised and new ones learned. Teachers and administrators must admit radio's contribution and devise ways of utilizing its superior resources within the school.

Here is the healthy attitude toward radio-education from which all concerned—students and educators alike—will benefit most. There are many problems to be overcome

before the full possibilities of radio in the classroom are realized, and the best way to solve these problems is by rolling up your sleeves and tackling them with the spirit that is being demonstrated by this wide-awake board of education on the West Coast.

FTRD Has Enviably Record As Program-Producer, Job-Getter

The Federal Theatre Radio Division began in New York City as a branch of the Federal Theatre Project in March, 1936, with a two-fold purpose: (1) To preserve the skills of unemployed artists and return them to private enterprise; and (2) to produce radio programs of an educational, cultural nature. That both these aims have been successfully fulfilled has plentiful evidence in the record of the FTRD after less than three years' existence. On the employment score the FTRD can boast approximately fifty percent return of its personnel to business; and, regarding radio program production, FTRD shows rank with the best in educational, cultural and civic service broadcasting.

The first person to be identified with the FTRD was Evan Roberts; it was his original idea, and Washington appointed him a \$1-a-year man to carry out the plan. At the beginning little did anyone suspect that in the brief span of three years the FTRD would have such an enviable record as a job-getter, as one of the most prolific producers of radio programs, and as one of the greatest stimulating forces in educational and cultural broadcasting. Recognition of Mr. Roberts' excellent work came early in 1938 when he was appointed radio consultant of the 20th Century Fund, and shortly after was made director of the National Radio Division and Information Service of the Federal Theatre Project.

Maiden activities of the FTRD were centered in New York City. With the production of radio programs that received national attention, however, the plan spread to other large cities. Today there are ten definitely affiliated groups exchanging scripts and ideas through Roberts' office in New York City, initiating programs of their own, and operating in general to meet the specific needs of their own localities. FTRD productions now enjoy an audience of 10,000,000 listeners every week.

Since it started, the FTRD has put to valuable use more than \$5,000,000 worth of radio time, donated gratis by networks and local stations. Five million dollars, incidentally, is more than ten times the cost of the entire project.

RECORDS OF THE WEEK

A department reviewing the recordings of your radio favorites

Ballet Festival:

A POTPOURRI to end all potpourris comes to us in the new ballet album, *Nights at the Ballet*, recorded by Walter Goehr and symphony orchestra. It is a cavalcade, a gamut, a tapestry of ballet music from Scarlatti to Stravinsky and back backwards. It is a medley easy on the ears even though the listener cares not particularly for its significance to the dance. Tchaikowsky is represented several times—excerpts from the *Nutcracker Suite*, the *Swan Lake* and his *Fifth Symphony*. Chopin pops up twice, Rossini's *La Boutique Fantastique* is there, The Good Humored Ladies by Scarlatti, Rimsky-Korsakoff's *Scheherazade*, DeFalla's *Three-Cornered Hat*, the famous *Blue Danube* waltz, Ravel's *Bolero*, Borodin's *Prince Igor*, Stravinsky's *Petrouchka*—one after the other in a cascade of melody. (Victor album C-30. \$5.50.)

Streamlined Nutcracker:

Decca's Little Symphony Orchestra makes its first appearance in a capsule reading of the famous Tchaikowsky *Nutcracker Suite* this month. It is famous and great music, played none too brilliantly under the direction of Alexander Smallens, but not a bad buy. (Decca album 23. \$2.75.)

All-Star Swing:

Doubtless most interesting pop record of the month is the All-Star Band gathered by *Metronome* magazine and issued on Victor. The naming of all-star orchestras is not new, nor do any two individuals agree on every choice, so the *Metronome* poll is as representative as any. About half of the men on this list also won the *Downbeat* magazine poll. And quite a few of them were chosen by Paul Whiteman for his Dreamband in *Collier's*. Benny Goodman, Arthur Rollini, Eddie Miller, Hymie Schertzer handle the reeds; Bunny Berigan, Charlie Spivak, Sonny Dunham from Casa Loma, and Harry James, the trumpets; Tommy Dorsey and Jack Teagarden on trombones. Carmen Mastren, guitar; Bobby Haggart on bass; Ray Bauduc on drums; and Bob Zurke on piano rounds it out. On one side, they play the fine Edgar Sampson swing tune *Blue Lou*, sounding very much as though they'd played together for years. Turn it over, and as every musicians' gathering should play, they play the blues. All-star indeed. (Victor 26144. 75c.)

Mezzrow and Panassie:

Hugues Panassie is the French swing devotee who recently came to investigate the U. S. picture personally, and we are glad if for nothing else but for his supervision on another outstanding swing record, *Comin' On* with the *Come On*, two sides by Milton "Mezz" Mezzrow and a hand-picked band which includes drummer Zutty Singleton. (Bluebird 10085. 35c.)

Coward and Noble:

Echoes of Noel Coward's new hit show are heard in a double second-hand issue by Victor. Not only is the tune taken from a previous show but the record also is the old master by Ray Noble. However, it happens to be about the best song Noel Coward ever wrote and the best recording Ray Noble ever pressed. We mean *Mad About the Boy*. (Victor 26147. 75c.)

On Short Waves

THE Andean Anthropological Expedition, sponsored by the Arizona Anthropological Association and endorsed by forty-two universities, museums and government agencies, will leave soon for the tribal territory of the Jivaro Indians near the headwaters of the Amazon River in Ecuador and Peru. A 100-watt short-wave transmitter will be installed at the base camp to maintain communication with the United States and with the various field parties, each of which will carry a 15-watt portable transmitter powered by a hand generator. Frequencies applied for include all amateur bands and three channels for inter-communication purposes, one each near 15.79, 8.57 and 6.00 megs. The expedition, whose radio set-up is in charge of Lloyd Demrick, W6HRX, will be headed by more than thirty leading scientists and will include from one to three hundred field workers. The daily activities of these explorers, which will be available via short-wave radio to listeners throughout America, promise to provide more thrilling moments of reception than even the transmissions of VP3THE, base-camp station of the Terry-Holden British Guiana Expedition, did last year.

In accordance with a decree of the FCC, General Electric short-wave stations W2XAF and W6XBE are now authorized to operate on new additional frequencies of 6.19 and 21.59.

Some interesting stations are being heard on the 20-meter amateur band these days. Reginald Tibbetts, operator of world-famous amateur station W6ITH at Berkeley, Calif., reports working KF6DHW (14.378), Canton Island, Phoenix Group, at 10:45 p.m. EST. The operator of this 40-watt station says not to be worried if he doesn't come back at once while in contact with another station, since he sometimes has to crank his gas-driven generator. This station will be on the air daily from 10 to 11 p.m. EST, for the next two months. K7FST reports hearing UKA000 (14.00 to 14.15) on a small

island off the Siberian coast, at 4 a.m. EST. Eugene Reinhard of Locust, N. J., is the first listener to report VQ6XT (14.1), in British Somaliland. This station was logged at 2 p.m. EST, and was identified as "VQ6-X-ray, Tokyo."

An illegal Nazi station, located somewhere in southwest Africa, is operating daily from 9 to 11 p.m. EST, on either 7.14, 9.09 or 10.71 megs. According to Radio Press Service, transmissions begin with the following announcement, "Germany, attention! Southwest Africa calling, Hello, Berlin."

SHORT-WAVE SHORTS: CT2AJ (4) at Ponta Delgada in the Azores Islands, operates Wednesdays and Saturdays from 5 to 7 p.m. EST. OAX4T (9.56), Lima, Peru, is now being heard daily from 7 to 8 a.m. EST. Work on the new Swiss government short-wave station at Schwarzenburg is proceeding nicely, and it will probably be opened in May. It will have a power of 25,000 watts. The best time to hear SP31 (9.525) of Warsaw, Poland, is from 3 to 3:45 p.m. EST, as W2XAF (9.53) drowns it out when it comes on the air. The identification signal consists of a short 17-note melody. Reports on reception of KZIB (9.49), should be sent to I. Beck Ind., Crystal Arcade Building, P. O. Box 440, Manila, P. I. John Larsen of Geneva, N. Y., reports a new Dominican station, call believed to be HI1V, operating on a frequency of 6.39. A new Honduras station, HRK, exact location unknown, is being heard nightly on a frequency of 5.795 megs. TILS, San Jose, Costa Rica, has moved to 6.165 megs.

A new type of radio wave recently invented by three young scientists at Stanford University, called the "Rhumba" wave, may revolutionize the whole field of ultra-short-wave transmission. These new waves, which are less than 4 inches long, can be concentrated and focused like the beams of a searchlight and will have extensive use in the fields of television and aviation.

explorer act, or bust, which is what the act always did.

He has invested his money in government bonds and annuities.

"I'm making more money than I ever dreamed of," he said. "It's more than I want, even if eighty-five percent of it does go for income taxes. I think income taxes are good things. They set a limit on a man's work and keep him from killing himself with ambition."

He is never reckless with his money and knows how to spend everything deductible for tax purposes. He is apt to be long on correspondence and short on cash with friends in difficulties. He will take them to lunch, maybe, hear their hard-luck stories, and perhaps buy a script, which he probably never will use. He would rather show them a way out of their predicaments than dig into his pockets.

He is canny with his money. Last year the police department of Culver City tried to unload a flock of benefit tickets on him. He balked and said he would support his own community, Beverly Hills. Since then, it is reported the Culver City cops have been watching for a chance to tag him, but he avoids that town.

Bergen likes to rip around the countryside on a motorcycle, and when he bought it the dealer thought he had a nice fat profit coming. But Bergen drove such a hard bargain that the dealer is not sure he even made a profit.

His habits are jerky and he is a restless, industrious fellow. There was a time when he drank rather heavily, but he had sense enough to realize the stupidity and futility of it and now he is a light drinker. And for every cocktail or highball he downs, he averages a quart of milk.

He is a sound sleeper, and gets in his seven or eight hours a night, and usually gets up at 7 a.m. and reports at the movie studio at 8. He sleeps in gay pajamas with wide stripes, and shuns a pillow. He often takes a mid-day nap. Bergen won't have breakfast in bed, but after a hard day's work he enjoys dinner in bed. He's a hefty eater and likes Chinese food, and frequently has snacks between meals. When he went to Hollywood he weighed about 140 pounds. Now he weighs about 160.

Bergen is a conservative dresser, with a weakness for shoes and hats. His hair is thinning. Maybe that's why he likes hats. The most he ever spent for a suit was \$225 for a claw-hammer get-up. McCarthy has a larger wardrobe than his stooge.

His household employs a Swedish cook and her husband, who also serves as houseman, valet and chauffeur. His secretary is Mary Hanrahan, tall, brunette and very efficient. She was working in the government research department of the University of Chicago until she took a job with Bergen. Now she helps mother him, and has been with him two years. Bill is Bergen's gardener. Mrs. Nellie Bergren completes the household. She and Clarence retain the r in their name.

Bergen's office force includes a staff of three or four gag-men, but they do more suggesting than writing. They write an idea and Bergen studies it. Then he runs the lines through an Ediphone and changes them to suit his style. If he likes it, he has the act transcribed and runs it through a refining process. The completed job usually is nothing like the suggestions of his gag-men. At rehearsals, he is apt to ad-

lib some swell spontaneous cracks. His secretary must catch them, and they are added to the script.

Like many other radio personalities, Bergen gets ideas from his own life. He was in a minor automobile accident one evening, and that gave him the idea for the great script in which McCarthy wrecked Bergen's car. It also furnished the idea for Bergen to give McCarthy a car for his birthday and have the little fellow wreck it.

Remember the time Charlie was an interior decorator? That was at the same time Bergen was decorating his new home. Bergen got the idea for McCarthy going into the bird business when he bought a canary for his mother.

His versatility is among the marvels of Hollywood. He knows writing, comedy, mechanics, and is superior in most sports. He has a smattering knowledge of medicine and a great knack for law. He is a cartoonist and an airplane pilot. He loves gadgets and is always trying to invent something, but his only patents are on McCarthy. He spends much of his time in his workshop, just tinkering. He enjoys fishing, but his favorite sport is hunting, particularly wild goats on Catalina Island.

He has a big collection of firearms, many of which were given him by Texas Rangers, who made Bergen and McCarthy honorary members.

His secretary doesn't like the guns, and one of her problems is to get information from him while he stands on his patio and blazes away at the markers on his putting-green.

He has one dog, a cocker named Skinny Dugan, but he is planning to buy a Doberman pinscher. Skinny is afraid of McCarthy and goes into a dither when the dummy calls him. Most dogs, however, are fascinated by McCarthy's voice.

Bergen owns two cars, a sedan and a limousine. He prefers to drive himself, but uses his chauffeur when the occasion calls for one. He flies his lawyer's plane.

His favorite musical instrument is the pipe-organ. He studied music a bit in school and can trifle with a piano. He has a good collection of phonograph records, mostly organ music.

Bergen's favorite hobby still is photography. He is not a heavy reader. His library has books on magic, photography and movie-making. He also goes for Skippy and Donald Ogden Stuart's books, and at times he wades into philosophy. He seldom reads newspapers, but gets his news from the radio.

His idea of a good time is to take a pretty girl to noisy night-clubs, where he generally is quiet. But every now and then he'll come up with a crack that will convulse the party.

He is very forgetful of things he doesn't want to remember, and is seemingly bashful. He'll let McCarthy say things he wouldn't dare say. When he thinks, he'll sit and scratch his nose. He is inclined to twist his right wrist when concentrating, as though he were manipulating McCarthy. He is even-tempered, but when he is irked his taut lips are a storm warning. During a meal he will frequently go wool-gathering, think of a crack for McCarthy, and laugh out loud.

He still loves to travel. "I'm too tied down now to travel much," he said. "I should like to go to Europe this summer, but I can't get away. However, I'm going to New York pretty soon and broadcast from there."

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

He's quite a gadabout, however. He never moons as the suffering swain who loved and lost. His first love now is McCarthy. He has set up a fund of \$10,000 as a bequest to the National Society of Ventriloquists. The society will get McCarthy and the money when Bergen passes.

So with McCarthy fixed up, Bergen began having some fun. He first began dating Judy Canova, but that was more of a press-agent gag, for soon Judy was on the program with Bergen, and when they parted company, she made the rather trite and page-four crack that she wouldn't play second fiddle to a dummy.

Next, Bergen began swiping Ken Murray's girls. He and Murray still are pals. They must be. It takes a real pal to grin when a fellow takes his gal. Bergen likes to steal Vallee's girls, too. However, Ken and Rudy often manage to snatch one of Bergen's favorites.

Florence Heller, once reported engaged to Murray, became a Bergen date. He still rides and flies with her. Murray began dating Shirley Ross. Bergen stepped in. Then Ken Dolan arrived on the scene and married her. Andrea Leeds was added to his list, and Katherine Stanley became an athletic pal. He began dating Helen Woods of NBC's "Those We Love" last winter, but she went to New York

and Bergen turned his attention to Kay St. Germain, the singer. He dated Marion Talley, but her heart is elsewhere. He night-clubbed with Eleanor Walsh, the dance-instructor, but they are old friends. Madaline Lee, Rochelle Hudson and Anita Louise have been on his date list. He often dates Florence Heller and Nancy Carroll for men friends who haven't got a girl. The latest news from the night-club front was that he was trying to date Norma Shearer, and not getting very far.

He seems to favor small brunettes, and he has his own specifications for the future Mrs. Bergen, if ever. She must be vivacious and amusing, but not too intelligent. He wants her to lean on him.

Bergen is bewildered by his success and often pinches himself to see if he's dreaming. He loves to talk about the tough days when he was coming up the ladder.

"I look back on the bad old days sometimes and decide they were pretty good at that," he said. "I had a lot of fun and made a lot of friends—not much money, but good friends."

He thinks it's all sort of cock-eyed and amusing that after a dozen years in vaudeville all over the world he should go into a night-club and be discovered as a great entertainer, and that he should go on the radio and be discovered as a comedian.

Don't let that worry you, Brother Bergen. The world didn't realize "Alice in Wonderland" is marvelous satire until the author was dead. And, by the way, you should add that book to your library, for you, too, stepped through a looking-glass.

Letters to the Editor

Editor, RADIO GUIDE:

In reply to recent criticism of sound-effects, let me say that as supervisor of the sound-effects department of the NBC central division I am called upon to deliver a multitude of sounds. I have found that the best means of reproducing the sound of an object usually is to use that object. Wheels make the sound of wheels. A splash of water is real water splashing. An auto horn is an auto horn and the sound of a door is the sound of a real door.

Obviously, there are some sounds that must be produced artificially. It would be impossible to bring enough tall grass into the studio to make the sound of someone walking through a field. This sound is made by rustling a sheaf of broom-corn. Since we cannot build fires in our studios, we crumple a sheet of cellophane to simulate the crackling of a fire.

On the whole, however, the most convincing sound-effects are made by using the thing that in every-day life would make that sound. Experience has taught us that "faking" is usually not the best way to obtain the most authentic results.
