

Broadcasters Wash Their Dirty Linen at Atlantic City, N. J.

AS WE go to press, the National Association of Eoadcasters is meeting in Atlantic City. We have just learned that this convention has approved a code and a standard of practise which contain some of the broadest listener benefits ever planned. Full details are not now available, but we know that such knotty problems as coloring of news, liquor advertising, pseudo-religious advertising, freedom of speech, length of commercials, political attacks, and patent medicines are disposed of in a manner guaranteed to make radio programs better and more acceptable to all the listeners. Important changes in

the policies of many stations impend under the new industry legislation. What, for instance, will happen to Father Coughlin? There is every probability that he will have to declare himself as either a religious broadcaster or as a political one. In either case, his talks will be limited to the terms of his declared classification. With all fairness and with com-

plete consideration for the principles of free speech, he will be required either to be a truly religious speaker, concerned chiefly with the spiritual welfare of his listeners, or abide by rules which affect all political speakers alike. Great good can come out of this code. Great promise is given that the broadcasters themselves can regulate their own affairs. If this proves to be so, the ghost of Government requlation will be laid forever. Neville Miller and his fellow members of the National Association of Broadcasters are to be congratulated.



"German Protestants and Catholics listened in vain today for religious programs on the air. Inquiry disclosed that Germany has banned radio broadcasts of religious services and that the Nazi government also is putting a curb on the sale of Bibles and church tracts . . .'

HUS began news stories out of Germany a few weeks ago. One step more in their unceasing warfare against religion and all things religious had been taken by the Nazis.

They had already confiscated abbeys, monasteries, convents, and other church properties. For daring to speak the Word of God, they had sent to hideous concentration camps literally hundreds of Protestant ministers, including the brave Niemoeller, wartime submarine commander. In conquered Austria they had allowed mobs of Storm Troopers to run amuck through the home of the venerable Cardinal Innitzer. They had denounced Christianity, in toto, as a degenerate heresy, basing their vilification on the ground that Jesus was a Jew. Actually they deified Adolf Hitler. He, Der Fuehrer, was the One Supreme Being.

Still, in spite of everything, the millions of Germans who still loved the

old faiths had one consolation. Their children might not attend Sunday school. But religious programs were on the air every Sunday. Tiny and weak though their little one-tube State-approved sets might be, they were good enough to bring in locally broadcast religious programs, and many a German family found through them the only services they knew-making their homes their churches, their radios their altars. Then suddenly one Sunday, when millions of devout Germans took their accustomed places around their radio sets to hear the divine services, no amount of dial-twisting could bring the programs in. They just weren't there. For the duration of the Nazi regime, there will be no more religion on German air.

Think of that, Mr. and Mrs. Americal As you listen to "The Bible School of the Air," "Highways to Heaven," "Meditation in Psalms," "Church in the Wildwood," "Highlights of the Bible," "Christian Science Service," "Salt Lake City Tabernacle," "Bowery Mission Services," "Catholic Hour," "Central Baptist Hour," "Ave Maria Hour," "Calvary Baptist Church," "Refugee Church of Christ," and so on down a long list. How would you feel if it suddenly How would you feel if it suddenly

became impossible for you to hear these programs?

You don't like it," you say. And you never will. Never is a tricky word. When you say that, you say, "It can't happen here.'

A veteran radio preacher told me the other day, "No one can say of anything, it can't happen here. Anything can happen, that included. I've often thought about it in recent months. I have had a rather unhappy personal experience. A colleague of minenaturally I can't tell you his name, and it is to protect him that I asked you not to use mine in your story—a colleague of mine was head of a pastorate in Hamburg, Germany. He disappeared, as nearly as I can tell, in March. I have here the last letter he sent to me. I'll read it to you.

Dear Brother: I am sending this letter into Switzerland with an Englishman who is going that way



and will post it for me in Geneva, and so I can speak freely. It is a relief to be able to speak as I please, even on paper. For months now, I have not dared to say what is in my mind. The least word, repeated by the professional and amateur snoopers who infest Hamburg these days, can mean the loss of one's church, imprisonment, even death

even death. These are hard times, and I cannot tell you how much I envy you in free America. I should like to come to your country, but the time when I might have done this easily is past now, and then, too, my duty and my place is here, with my peo-ple. I say, "my people," but that is not really true any more. The children are ours no longer, we all know that; they are Hitler Youth, Hitler Maids, Labor Corps workers, and a dozen other hideous things. The free and happy intercourse we used to have with the older parishioners is a thing of the past, too. Some of them, the sturdy and brave ones, still come to the church, but they are afraid, and that is as far as they will go. They do not like to be seen talking to

us. They know they will be plagued and harried by the bullies of the Party. It is so easy to hale a man into the police station and question him for hour after hour, even though he has done nothing and they know it. It is as easy to hurt his business, set his friends against him, even his children.

But although I dare not speak my mind in private, I still talk out in the pulpit. They have not yet destroyed the sanctity of the House of God, try as they will. Last week I had a small triumph. I was speaking of the necessity for bringing up the young in the way of Christ when a man who is a sycophant and informer of the local Gauleiter arose in his place and denounced me, saying, how could a man who had neither wife nor child speak with authority of the young? You may remember that such an inquiry was made, in just that same way, to a Catholic priest in Austria some time ago. I remembered that, and I did what the Austrian priest had done: I leaned over the pulpit, and I shouted in my loudest voice. "I will not have our beloved Fuehrer maligned in this House!"

I have a favor to ask of you, and this is what it is. As you may know, the radio is very important to us now. There are many religious programs still being broadcast. In the way of quality and attention value, however, they leave much to be desired. I would like you to write and tell me how religious programs are done in America. Please tell me in every detail—the material that is used, the method of presentation, the length, all. For I realize now that my work in the church, in the pulpit, is no longer very effective. I know that many who dare not come to church listen to these programs, and it is in my heart to see what I can do in this new field. If you will send this information to the Geneva address I have written below, my good Englishman will bring it to me. For this and all past favors, I thank you from my heart . . .

"The letter is dated April 3," the broadcaster told me. I sent him the in(Continued on Page 37)



Aírialto Lowdown

NEW YORK.—I was asked the other day to name the five young radio artists whom I considered to be the best bets for future stardom. Sounds easy, doesn't it? That's what I thought, too—until I tried it. I just couldn't find five names, and it set me to thinking. Isn't radio producing new talent any more? As far as I know, the industry hasn't developed a new personality of the first magnitude since Orson Welles. And

why not? There are certainly just as many young, eager, ambitious performers trying to crash through the fringe of stardom as there ever were. They want their places in the sun—and the public wants them, too.


Admittedly, the top-ranking stars of today are good and better than good, but that doesn't alter the need for new voices, new ideas, new personalities. It seems to me that if the broadcasting companies would spend as much time and money encouraging new stars as they do in the search for new programs and things like short-wave broadcasts to foreign countries, we'd have better listening. And right now, during the so-called "summer slump," when so many big stars are off the air, is the time to indulge in a little intensive talent-hunting.

Several new musical shows to hit the airlanes recently have all the hearmarks of good radio entertainment. "Singers Americana," heard Mondays and Fridays over NBC, featuring Frank Luther and Zora Layman, offer old American songs. On Monday nights at midnight (EDT), Tommy Dorsey has inaugurated a one-hour program of diversified music. The first quarter-hour is devoted to old favorites, the second to new songs, the third to selections rendered in true Dixieland fashion by Tommy's clambake seven, and the fourth is for the swingeroos, during which time the band promises to let off plenty of steam. It should prove very popular with the dialers.

Bob Ripley's excellent suggestion on a recent program for uniform traffic laws has already met with the approval of governors of many states. By the way, if you call the Ripley office on the telephone, the operator doesn't say "Hello" when she answers. She says, "Believe it or not" . . . Budd Hulick, former partner of Stoopnagle, has a swell idea that he's doing direct from the World's Fair over WNEW. Any person appearing on the air will be permitted to send a Postal telegram to anyone in the United States without charge, providing he or she consents to reveal the contents of the telegram in a short interview with Budd. Some of the wires are very funny, as you can imagine.

Thinking Out Loud

The new Sensation cigarette program with Larry Clinton's orchestra lives up to the name of the sponsor's product. The Frazee Sisters, who are newcomers to radio but are well known to the better night-club audiences (they are now at Ben Marden's Riviera), do a grand job of vocalizing, which makes me wonder why they haven't been on the air long before this . . . Vivian della Chiesa, who came to New York the other Friday to guestar on the Raymond Paige show, should be heard regularly. She's slightly terrific . . . LeRoy Miller, on the announcing staff of KYW in Philadelphia, won the job of introducing the bands on the "Magic Key" show every Monday night. He is plenty okay and it isn't hard to understand why he was selected in a competitive audition with many of his colleagues . . . Kate Smith's



comics, Abbott and Costello, are featured in the new musical comedy, "Streets of Paris," and they're the big hit of the show.

Horace Heidt's wife got a divorce from the bandleader, and according to reports she was given custody of their daughter along with a nice cash settlement . . . Russ Morgan and his wife also have parted. What goes

with these bandleaders and their wives? Can't they learn to harmonize? . . . Bob Crosby is an exception to the rule. His wife presented him with a six-pound girl and apparently has broken the Crosby jinx, his brother Bing having four boys . . . At the Jack Benny party for the press boys in Waukegan someone sent a note over to Dorothy Lamour reading "Will you please tell the newspaper men to what you owe your success." Later, Phil Harris sent her a note reading "Whatever happened to Herbie Kay?" When Dorothy read it, she looked up and saw Phil laughing. She jumped out of her seat and approached our table, where Phil was sitting, and shouted at him very angrily, "I think you and that note are both very unfunny." Was she ever mad! 

ing America, and Miss Smith pulled one of the best bits of showmanship of radio history. She began waving the flag, and always ended her program with "God Bless America." And she moved ahead of Vallee in the radio ratings.

The race between Vallee and Smith perhaps is the hottest in the business. The same week, March 2, that Vallee presented Ethel Waters, Smith presented Raymond Massey. The next week Vallee won a round with Robert Morley, W. Somerset Maugham, Sheila Barrett and Richard Hayden, but the next week Smith evened things by presenting Tallulah Bankhead.

T'S a tough fight, but it's great for the radio world. One week Vallee gave us Claude Rains during the same hour when Smith was presenting Merle Oberon in scenes from "Wuthering Heights."

Everything even, Vallee is perfectly capable of meeting any competition, but he won't stay in New York and tend to his knitting. The man loves Hollywood and, wanting to be a great actor or producer, reckons the best way to be one is to be on the scene of action. Early this year he dropped his New York show and went west. The Endless VALLEE

More about the vices and virtues and vanities of Hubert Prior Vallee, radio's most expert showman

By James Street

THE multitude that believes Rudy Vallee, taxes and the poor will be with us always may be right. There are no signs that the poor and taxes will pass away, but there are definite signs that unless the Vallee runs into another mother-lode he no longer will command the following he has enjoyed for more than ten years. The Vallee is running down grade. And the time has come when Mr. Hubert Prior Vallee must decide whether he is to continue as one of radio's top-flighters or dive into the business he loves—producing and directing shows.

It's well to check up on Vallee's history before we attempt to explain his decline. When he hit his peak, he was arrogant and unreasonable, popular with the public that didn't know him, unpopular with his hired hands.

He wanted to be an actor. He wasn't. He flopped in Hollywood and turned all of his bubbling energy to his radio show. It became the best variety hour in the business. He found talent, developed it and lost it. He made no strenuous effort to hold it. The woods were full of talent and Mr. Vallee found it.

His list of firsts is far and away the most imposing of any program's, such names as Edgar Bergen, Bob Burns, Frances Langford, Tommy Riggs, the Strougs He introduced Eddie Cantor to

radio, and on his comedy spots he gave us Milton Berle, Bea Lillie, Phil Baker, Olsen and Johnson. Back in 1929 he was ten years ahead of the times and presented Grand Duchess Marie of Russia in his second hour. Then he began interviewing names—Joe Williams, the sports writer; Max Baer, La Guardia, Heywood Broun. He began a wave of interviewing celebrities and other programs followed his lead.

Then Vallee changed pace and began interviewing unknowns, folks with great stories to tell. Talent-scouts in New York sang his praises. They could scout night-clubs, department stores and find a person of promise. If Vallee would present the find, the scout and the find were in to make some money. It became a mark of honor for a person to say he had been on the Vallee hour.

IS showmanship was too good, his ideas too valuable for one man to monopolize, and other shows sprang up built on the idea of presenting the public to the public. There came "We, the People" and all those.

And all the time Vallee was finding and training talent, then losing it. He

was a tough man to work for. He would bawl out a player, rant and rave. But slowly he began settling down. Each week he presented a serious dramatic skit and brought to the air such names as Eva Le Gallienne, Ethel Barrymore, Helen Hayes, Walter Huston and others. His program was the tops.

EVENTUALLY the talent springs began to run dry. Vallee had not made a great effort to hold his finds. Two years ago he made Bergen, Riggs and the Strouds. Then the famine. However, he found the "Aldrich Family" and Ezra Stone, and his show was well balanced.

There wasn't much said when Kate Smith (off air for summer) began the hour variety show opposite him three years ago. Kate had a tough row to hoe, but she kept chopping away. Slowly her Crossley rating crept up to Vallee's. When Vallee goes to the West Coast, he leaves his show in the East. It saves money. The last time he went out, he left the "Aldrich Family" and Stone behind, and Smith grabbed them.

An epidemic of patriotism was sweep-

of his flop was heard around the world. He couldn't get talent in Hollywood. After all of the ballyhoo, New York still is the fountainhead. So Vallee came home. He is rebuilding his show. Some say he never will get back to the top of the pile. We will bet otherwise. Mr. Vallee has his faults, but in the long haul they are unimportant. The important thing is that the man has creative ability, something most radio names have not. He has imagination, courage to try something new. He always has been a pioneer in the business. He does not borrow ideas, he creates them.

Some will say he's pinch-penny. So what? Some will say he's conceited. Who cares? The big thing is, the Vallee is an artist.

He still is a Yankee at heart, suspicious, pinching, punctual, with tidiness inborn, and has a serious, dominating nature. He hates carelessness and untidiness. He hates red tape but expects others to abide by his rule-book, and he thinks up some tough rules. He does not work his employes with a halter and guide-rope but with bits and spurs.

The Vallee quibbles over change. He'll argue over thirty cents and then spend \$5,000 on his hobby—home movies. One day a musician asked for a small raise and Vallee told him

he could quit if he didn't like his pay. At the same time, Vallee was paying all expenses of another musician who was ailing in a hospital. Another of his boys got sick and Vallee kept him and his family in California for two years, paying all expenses while the man took the rest cure.

He'll fuss about a few dimes, but on the road or in Hollywood he figures \$150 weekly expense money for each member of his staff. That's not pennyhugging.

Vallee has never taken a vacation from his weekly chores since he began with his sponsor in 1929, although his contract permits a two-week lay-off without pay. He has missed only three broadcasts—when his mother died, when his estranged wife died, and when King George VI was crowned.

He worries himself, and others, about his health and daily undergoes sunbains, if possible or sun-lamp treatments when working nights. He takes some kind of exercise every day—tennis squash or badminton. His eyes are mopic and he wears olive-creen ultraviolet-filtering sun-glasses frequently, even in radio studios.

He is very loyal to his old Connecticul Yankees, the musicians who rode to fame with him. He kept every one of them in his band as long as they wanted to stay. His household staff in New York and his staff at his Maine lodge have remained unchanged for many years. Marjorie Diver his secretary in New York, has been with him tem years. That makes one wonder

about the tales that Vallee is an impossible employer.

Vallee's temperament is almost chidish. He has a sity-editor complex flies off the handle without reasonable cause, fires right and left, then realizes what a fool he's been moans in his beard that he's misunderstood, and hires the boys back. He races mcmentarily, especially when carrying a heavy load of work. He generally is taut, nervous and irritable and bawls out his band, but not in the double-jointed, water-front vocabulary of Abe Lyman. Rudy will fire a man, then rehire him fifteen minutes later. However, his irasc.bility is on the wane He's cetting mentally sober.

He smokes and drinks, but doesn't seem to enjoy himself. His drinking usually is confined to one cocktail, just to be friendly, or to appear friendly. But Mr. Vallee is not the good-fellow type, and a barrel of liquor wouldn't change it. He was born in the same state as Calvin Coolidge—Vermoniand that explains a heap.

HE LOVES cogs of all kinds. His favorite was Himmel, a Doberman pinscher, until Himmel developed a nasty temper and Rudy was compelled to give him up. For many years, Himmel appeared in photographs with Vallee and on the Vallee Christmas cards. The Christmas cards one year showed Mr. Vallee standing by his fireplace with his dog at his feet. There was no name on the Christmas card. Mr. Vallee apparently reckoned everybody would

know who he was after one glance. He taught Himmel to hold a paw to his nose while his master crooned.

His friends believe he never will marry again, although he is not a woman-hater. Great stars, no!


Vallee seems not to care for children. They apparently bother him. He never makes over them. Children get in the hair of many persons. Mr. Vallee is not a hypocrite. He will not make a to-do over children just to create an impression. On the other hand, h∋ introduced the famous "Safety

Songs" of Irving Caesar because he honestly believed they would help save lives

He got sentimental over "All Points West," a songalog of the career of a rain-caller who died on his job. He even paid \$10,000 for the movie rights and hopes to produce it some day.

He always has worked for his dough. He sweated for his million, and he has saved his money and invested it wisely. He never has made the big money of some stars, but he has handled his for-

ROM farms scattered along the muddy banks of the Wabash and from back in the Indiana hills they had traveled the many miles to Washington for the Third Triennial Conference of Rural Women of the World. And now they stood before the microphone in majestic Constitution Hall to sing. They were not young-there were grandmothers among them—and their monotonous years of drudgery on the farm, of child-bearing and child-rearing had left their mark in deep-etched lines on faces that were weather-beaten and stern.

Then they opened their mouths to sing and, suddenly, you forgot the deep lines of their faces; the hours of drudgery-cows to be milked, butter churned, cream separated, meals cooked. I think they forgot these things, too. I think they forgot everything except the glorious music they were making. They sang Bach and Brahms and Beethoven -not the hillbilly ballads the audience had half expected—and they sang with all the rich gusto of enjoyment, with a technique that bespoke intimate knowledge and understanding. They knew this music and they loved to sing it. And when they were finished, Mrs. Roosevelt rushed to the microphone.

"I know this isn't my part of the program, but I think it's marvelous that our farm women can sing music like this!" She turned to the thirty-nine ladies still standing there. "I wonder if you'd consent to come to the White House this afternoon and sing for the

Radio and a professor and 4,000 Indiana farm women start a great musical renaissance in America

President. He would be so thrilled."

So they went to the White House and sang for the President—these farm women who, next week, would be back at the monotonous rote of their daily tasks. They sang Bach and Beethoven and Brahms. They sang his favorite, "Home on the Range," too. The President was thrilled.

AND to think," he told them, "that our farm people of the East and West, the North and South can be drawn together to sing one song!"

Unthinkingly, the President had laid his finger upon the key to the whole amazing concert he had just heard. Radio. It was radio that had drawn our farm people together so that they could sing, as if with one voice, a single song. It was radio that had whetted the appetites of all our people for a better music. And the voices he had heard—those of the Tippecanoe Home Economics Chorus from Indiana -were but an expression and a result of this stimulation. It was exciting to know that women like these could find such release from the drab and the dull at the loudspeaker's mouth. It was thrilling to realize that something was happening to America. America was learning to sing!

The Tippecanoe Home Economics Chorus was peculiarly the product of radio. Back in 1934, Albert P. Stewart youthful and energetic music director of Purdue University and its radio station, WBAA—wanted to stage a community sing. He called for volunteers from Tippecanoe County, where Purdue is located. Thirty-nine ladies responded.

"I learned then, for the first time, just what music can mean to women who have no other outlet, no recreation from the dull routine of their daily stint," Stewart said. "These women entered into rehearsals with enthusiasm

and the results were amazing.
"But what amazed me most," he continued, "was the type of thing they wanted to sing. I had thought of singing the old favorite ballads. But they wanted to sing things like Foster's 'Beautiful Dreamer'; Deppen's 'Japanese Sunset'; Gaines' 'Salutation.' Remember, these were farm women, big, husky, used to doing a day's work. I knew radio had been doing a big job, but now-for the first time-I began to realize just how big a job radio was really doing. A generation ago these women would never have heard of these numbers. Now, with surprisingly little work, they were able to sing them. But it went deeper than that. They understood and loved this music."

Then Stewart had an idea. His job at Purdue-where there is no accredited music school-was to bring music and music appreciation home to the individual of the state, and here was his grand opportunity. If these women were so enthusiastic about singing, why not keep them together, rehearse and put an even better musical foundation under their feet? They would each be a missionary for music in her own home. Other groups might follow in other parts of the state and Indiana would become the state of singing wo-

Gagging ad-lib, pulling embarrassingly funny jokes on members of the audience, using every trick of old-time vaudeville, radio comedians go right up to the last split second before broadcast time wowing their guests and by that time everybody has been drawn into the fun-making. E KNOW a guy who has lied his way to fame. Letters from the East and West, remarkably, pay tribute to his prevarications. We know that the fellow deliberately goes out of his way to contradict the facts of nature. Yet letters from the North and South condone his sinning.

He's the chap on the NBC "National Farm and Home Hour" who says, "It's a bee-oot-i-ful day in Chicago."

If you haven't heard him, tune in

some day and listen to Everett Mitchell.

He calls his fibs "little white lies."
He says the listeners like 'em and he has the papers to prove it. Most of those papers came not long ago when one day he left off his "bee-oot-i-ful" salutation, to the dismay of thousands. Protests showed him—and his bosses,

too—that this greeting had come to mean much more to the boys and girls at the other end of the line than an obviously erroneous report on one

city's weather. For example:

Mrs. S. J. O'Connor's postcard from Lowell, Massachusetts: "By all means tell us what a beautiful day it is in Chicago. Those few words cheer me up on a dreary day and make me feel glad to be alive on any day."

A mother in Washington, D. C., Mrs. Arthur Dixon: "Of course we want to

hear you say 'It's a beautiful day in Chicago.' My little girls look forward to it every day and on rainy days they say, 'It's raining out. Why does he say it's a beautiful day.' So I explain how the rain gives us our drinking-water, makes flower gardens grow and also cleans the air. In the winter I explain how the snow and cold weather clear the air and kill germs; so they, too, believe it's a beautiful day—rain or shine."

From Decatur, Georgia, A. J. Bellingrath: "You know I'd rather hear you say 'It's a beautiful day in Chicago' than to hear my Old Miss call me to dinner when I know we are having chicken on toast. Please don't disappoint an old man and his 'Old Miss'."

The Fleury Family of Mercer Island, Washington: "Not being members of the 'grouch club,' we miss your 'beautiful day' and the heartening lift it gives to each day. Seems like the 'Farm and

Home Hour' don't hit on all cylinders without that starter."

Lakeland, Florida, postcard from Mrs. M. W. Henry: "... the first time I heard you omit 'It's a beautiful day in Chicago,' I thought something terrible had surely happened."

RS. J. MOTT of Moscow, Pennsylvania: "Please do continue telling us that 'It's a beautiful day in Chicago,' for it seems to make the day a little more beautiful here in old Pennsylvania to hear you say it...."

From New York, Mrs. B. Van: "Please do come back on the 'Farm and Home Hour' telling us the weather conditions in Chicago and what a lovely day it is to be alive. It gives one such a pick-up to learn someone else feels life is really worth while."

It was back in the depression days of 1933 that announcer Everett Mitchell first started greeting "Farm and Home

Hour" audiences with the "bee-oot-i-ful day in Chicago" line. We can remember that general conditions were particularly bad then, and about the only thing that most of us could look to with hope was the weather. Optimism was at low ebb, so when Mr. Mitchell hit upon that simple greeting he used it, giving the line all the cheer, hope and enthusiasm his voice could muster. For the more than fifteen hundred broadcasts that followed he continued to use the same salute until it became so much a part of the program that the "National Farm and Home Hour" did not seem the same without it.

One day last spring he opened the program with a different line, because someone had complained that his lie about the weather was just a lot of Chicago propaganda. NBC even announced on the program that the "white lie" would be dropped to see if it made any difference to the listeners. That it did make a difference has already been demonstrated.

THIS CENSORSHIP OF FEAR

BY CURTIS MITCHELL



Radio Headache No. 2: John the Unpredictable Barrymore, whose spicy remarks on the air put one manager behind the eight ball

Radio Headache No. 1: The Mae West fiasco, result of her sexy radio skit in 1937, first brought FCC censorship into the open

Why is this censorship, imposed by the small body of men who make up the FCC, a radio-station manager's biggest headache? Why is it also your headache? How does such censorship come between you and your programs? Radio Guide presents herewith the first of a series of editorial commentaries intended to inform you of your stake in this greatest problem of contemporary radio.—Editor.

Y FRIEND, the radio-station manager, was not himself. He toyed with his food, played with his spoon, was frankly worried. When I had left him a few hours before, he had been excited, elated.

John Barrymore was in town with a show and he had arranged an exclusive interview over his station. Something must have gone wrong, I thought. And then he was telling me about it.

"It was awful. Barrymore, the unpredictable, took the interview into his own hands. He asked himself questions and then answered them, spicily, until we cut him off." It sounded like a good show and I wondered "why it was cut off the air. I soon learned.

"And it had to happen right now, when we're coming up for a new license. There's always some crank who'll write a letter to the FCC (Federal Communications Commission) and tell them all about it. And you know how the FCC is."

He spoke of the FCC in the same tones one uses in speaking of God, and his apparent unease seemed unnecessary to me. Why, the FCC was just a body that kept the airlanes clear, like a traffic cop, I thought. There's no need to get all excited about a little incident that couldn't be avoided. But I didn't know how completely the FCC had taken unto itself powers actually prohibited by the very Act which created it. A study of some sixty broadcasting stations across the United States has given me a new slant on radio's biggest headache—P. L. 416, or the Federal Communications Act of 1934.

But don't feel that this matter is entirely the headache of radio executives. It might easily become your problem—as it has in Germany, Italy and other countries where the public is permitted to hear only those programs and news

items which the head of the government wishes it to hear. As a matter of fact, it is already your problem, for broadcasting in America is subject to a censorship based not upon law, not upon a code set down in black and white, but upon fear.

President Roosevelt, a few weeks ago, declared that the radio function of the FCC is confined to "such controls of operation as are necessary to prevent complete confusion on the air" and that "in all other respects the radio is as free as the press." The President expressed the original purposes for which radio legislation was enacted—to assign frequencies and mechanically govern the use of the air.

"The wave-lengths are the property of the American people," is a favorite dogma of the FCC. And to protect that property right, a clause insisting that stations be operated "in the public interest, convenience and necessity" was inserted in the radio Act. The clause has had an opposite effect. Upon it, the Commission bases what little reason, what little justification it might find for its recent attempts to control program content. For the phrase "in the public interest" lends itself to many interpretations.

But while the chief basis for censorship by the Commission is found in the 'public interest" clause, the Big Gun which makes FCC censorship effective lies in the licensing powers granted it. A radio station—like your automobile must carry a license-plate before it is permitted to use the airwaves, and, at the present time, licenses are granted for a short, one-year* period, whereas, under the law, the Commission might grant them for a period of three years. The power to license—or not to license is the power to destroy, and the fear of destruction undergone by radio-station owners and operators every six months has resulted in a censored broadcasting system for the American people.

"Until a few weeks ago, licenses were granted for a period of only six months.

You may say, "But the law specifically says that Nothing in this Act shall be understood or construed to give the Commission the power of censorship..." And the law says just that. But let's see what's actually happening.

A short time ago Representative McLeod, of Michigan, rose to his feet in Congress to demand that President Roosevelt ask for the resignations of the entire membership of the Commission. Reason for Congressman McLeod's demands was an unprecedented ruling of this little body of political appointees. The Commission had laid down a set of censorship regulations governing program content of American stations making international broadcasts.

It is not important that many such international stations would give up their licenses rather than submit to such censorship. The importance lies in the precedent such a ruling sets and in the obvious evidence that the FCC believes censorship is a part of its duty in spite of the safeguards Congress set up against just such a possibility in its legislation. Attorneys are agreed that, if this ruling holds, there is nothing in the Act to prohibit imposition of the same censorship upon local stations, governed by the same provisions of the same Act.

BUT censorship of fear is not a recent development in the policy of the commissioners. On December 12, 1937, Mae West performed a skit over a network of some forty radio stations, and a number of complaints were filed with the Commission. It immediately asked for a copy of the program and a list of stations carrying the program. Then, on January 14, 1938, the chairman of the Commission wrote the president of the network: "... The Commission has no power of censorship but . . . the stations which carried it (the Mae West skit) cannot be excused on the ground that such program was received over the network . . . and upon application for

renewal of the licenses of the stations carrying this broadcast, the Commission will take under consideration this incident along with all other evidence tending to show whether or not a particular licensee has conducted his station in the public interest."

The Commission admittedly has no power to censor and yet it will take program content into consideration in renewing licenses! Call it by any name you will, this is censorship of a most dangerous and effective sort. Here stations were threatened with loss of licenses and life upon a matter purely of program content.

There have been other incidents of the sort—the broadcast, for example, of Eugene O'Neill's classic, "Beyond the Horizon"—and they are all living evidence of the power of censorship exercised by a Federal government agency over a most important means of mass communication.

Because of the arbitrary and dictatorial powers of this little group, there have been few in the radio industry—with their life-work at stake—who dared to speak out against the throttling censorship which has sprung up. Elliott Roosevelt, president of the Texas network and son of the President, from the security of his position, has been one of the few who have spoken.

"I believe that there is—although the Commission may not realize it—a censorship of fear operating today in the radio industry," he told them. "I believe that many stations are fearful... that if they carry a certain type of program they will be in danger of losing their license if the Commission did not happen to think that the program was in the public interest ..."

But perhaps the most important indication of the ambitions of this little group with regard to censorship was revealed at a recent hearing of the Commission on extension of its licensing power to the network companies. The networks, as you know, are the program builders. The few key stations they operate are duly licensed in accordance with the law. There is no reason, then, for the extension of the licensing power to such program-building agencies unless it be with the purpose of gaining control—and censor-(Continued on Page 39)

Censorship Blights Your Programs



Teenaged Barbara Fuller, the Barbara Calkins of "Scattergood Baines" and one of the youngest actresses on the air, got her baptism of fire recently when she worked in four air shows, including rehearsals, in one day and then collapsed when the last show was over.



Ransom Sherman would be the last guy to claim a bigger audience than Charlie McCarthy, but there surely can be no question that he's the writingest comedian on

the air. Investigation disclosed the following revealing facts and figures:

Ranse writes and presents three onehour "Club Matinee" shows a week; one half-hour program, "Ransom Sherman Presents"; and one half-hour com-mercial, "Smile Parade" (the only show on which he has any writing help). The average "Club Matinee" script contains 7,500 words and takes four and onehalf hours to write. Average writing time for "Ransom Sherman Presents' is six hours, and for "Smile Parade" three eight-hour periods, allowing for rewriting and editing.

Sherman is now in the five-hundreds with his "Club Matinee" scripts, and in two and one-half years with that show he has practically worn out two type-writers with his dual-digit system; has used a typewriter ribbon a week; and has rolled up about 2,500 hours of writing. It all adds up to a record of real accomplishment for bland "bow-tie" Sherman in these days of "you write 'em, I'll read 'em" comedy.

Tommy Bartlett, red-haired CBS announcer and "fair-haired boy" of women's programs, acted as best man at six weddings in two weeks, and traveled over 11,000 miles to do it, then settled back down to routine duty with sound mind, body-and heart . . . 



Tomfoolery in Tone

CUMMER continues to keep this commentator in lighter musical vein after a winter of symphonic seriousness. And let no one say that music and musicians are lacking in humor, even as far back as when Bach composed his facetious cantata on the subject of coffee-drinking, and Abbe Vogler told the keyboard pupil, "Let not thy right hand know what thy left hand doeth."

Those comicalities stir the memory of other early witticisms by the wags and merry-andrews in music. Like the time when Brahms and Billroth (the cellist) were playing a sonata by the former. Brahms' pianism always had more enthusiasm than restraint and suddenly Billroth called out: "I say, Johannes, you're so loud that I can't hear my cello." "You ought to be glad of that," yelled the composer, continuing with fire and fury.

Milloecker, Viennese composer of operetta, received this invitation: "Do come and dine with us midday Sunday. My wife and daughter will do a little home music for you from twelve to one o'clock and then we shall have our Milloecker replied: "Thanks meal." for the invitation. I'll be there punctually at one o'clock."

Which recalls the anecdote about Wilhelmi, eminent German violinist, to whom a hostess wrote: "Please give us the honor of your presence at dinner tomorrow. P. S .-- And may I ask you to bring your violin?" Wilhelmj's answer: "I'll come with pleasure. P. S .-I'm sorry, but my violin never dines out."

Mahler, the Viennese conductor (once of the Metropolitan Opera and New York Philharmonic), was known never to leave the hall while rehearsals were in progress, but on one occasion he suddenly handed the baton to his assistant and said: "I shall have to be away for an hour." Returning at the end of that time, he explained: "Sorry. I went out to get married." (His widow is now the wife of Franz Werfel, author of "The Forty Days of Musa Dagh.")

Speaking Up

MORT, dark, bouncing around with the energy of a dynamo, George Sebastian has seen a lot of the world in his thirty-six years. He has conducted all over Europe, including his native Hungary, and for five years was musical director of radio in Soviet Russia. Now he has just been appointed conductor of the Scranton (Pa.) Orchestra, and is making his American radio debut with the Robin Hood Dell Concert this week.

In Russia, Sebastian worked out and carried through a five-year music plan. It included the formation of two independent orchestras of one hundred men each for the Moscow radio station, one for symphonies and one for opera; a huge choir of 240 mixed voices; and a radio opera company His programs for the five years included cycles of the great classic and romantic composers, operatic as well as symphonic, and performances of modern music. He held an annual competition for young composers, and trained a jury of prominent Moscow musicians to decide which works were to be performed the following season.

In his spare time (don't ask me when that was) he toured Russia with the Moscow Philharmonic Orchestra, and came to know the country from Siberia to Baku. He conducted in factories and warehouses, in abandoned churches and shining new auditoriums. And everywhere the response of the people was overwhelming. He likes to remember the time a fisherman in Siberia brought him three fat herrings as a tribute to his performance of the music of that sad Comrade Mozart. He can still smell the herring.

Sebastian conducts from memory and carries around something like 250 symphonic compositions and seventy operas in his head.

Scranton probably won't keep Sebastian as busy as Russia, but you can be sure he'll keep Scranton on the

In this list, Dr. Black includes a lesserknown Tschaikowsky piece, the "Hamlet" Overture-Fantasia. Like the more familiar "Romeo and Juliet" Overture, the "Hamlet" was not written as an overture to an opera but as a depiction in music of the Shakesperian play. It is not as dramatic or lyrical as the "Romeo and Juliet," but has moments of great beauty, notably in the Ophelia theme.

The work opens with a long, solemn introduction, indicating Hamlet's grief over his father's death. Twelve strokes are heard on the horns, suggesting the hour of midnight and the appearance of the ghost. The main part of the piece concerns itself with the theme of Hamlet's indecision and the Ophelia theme intermingled. The overture ends with a stirring march.

The Sleeping Beauty Waltz is from a ballet which Tschaikowsky wrote in 1888 for the Imperial Opera. The story is taken from one of Perrault's fairy-tales and deals with the sad fate of the Princess Aurora, condemned by a wicked fairy to perpetual slumber. But a good fairy intervenes and decrees that the princess shall awake when a prince kisses her back to life. The waltz occurs in the first act of the ballet. Particularly charming is the sound of little bells in the middle section.

blindness and indifference of musicians and public to certain compositions at the time of their first hearing. "Carmen" and "Tannhaeuser" were howled off the boards and the D Minor Symphony of Cesar Franck completely ignored when they were first performed. Indeed, Charles Gounod, who was in the audience at the first performance of the Franck work, left with the remark that the symphony was "the expression of impotence raised to dogma." Today no opera house repertoire would be complete without "Carmen" or "Tannhaeuser," and no symphony orchestra fails to include the Franck symphony at least once during its season.

During the last movement of the sym-

phony, Franck repeats themes from both the first and second movements, something not usually heard in a symphony

Did Bird Songs Evolve into Art Songs?

CAN'T answer the question in the foregoing title: I'm only asking. The moment when a researcher gropes into the earliest origins of anything in music, he bumps up against the most impenetrable mysteries. One of them is the matter of song.

Probably song has always been since birds and people came into the world, and maybe birds were the first to sing. What with dinosaurs and saber-toothed mammoths abroad, humans didn't have much to sing about. But once they burst into such utterance, no songless people has since existed anywhere on earth. Even the most uncivilized tribes in Australia today, while they have no musical instruments, indulge in ordered rhythmic

While the subject is fascinating, this essay has not the space to follow completely the development from speech into human song. It is enough to say that it seems to be a natural, primitive means of self-expression. Very young children unconsciously sing, hum and drone, sometimes even melodic phrases of their own composition.

The Christian church early took over song, but the savage races had long before chanted part of their religious ceremonies. In feudal times the castled lords and ladies patronized wandering minstrels, troubadours, trouveres, minnesingers and meistersingers, most of them creating the poetry and music they performed. (The first song recitals!) The peasantry and lowly urbanites adopted some of those compositions and evolved others, and so came folk-songs and ballads. In the early seventeenth century opera burst upon a delighted world. The beginning of the nineteenth century saw the great romantic movement, whose songs crystallized into the German lied,* the highest form of the pure art-song, as distinguished from opera. And here ends our chronological-historical sur-

There had been some lied-composing (Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven) before Schubert, but he was its first real master, taking the form far in advance of the others and originating the method of varying the music to suit all the changing moods of a poem, instead of merely repeating the same melody and accompaniment for all the verses irrespective of their character. Schubert's vast output numbers about six hundred songs (on one day in 1815 he wrote eight), among them some of the best-beloved of our present day-"Ave Maria," "Serenade," Wanderer," etc. — poétical, merry, highly dramatic, and all drenched with melody. Contemporaneously the German, Carl Loewe, formulated and perfected the descriptive ballad, now, however, fallen into some disuse. His graphic and powerful "Edward" is the only well-known one from his pen. Schumann, of soaring fancy and

fertile melodic wealth, built upon the Schubert model but invented more subtle characterizations and harmonies and more elaborate accompaniments. His "Dedication." "Spring Night" and two immortal cycles, "Poet's Love" and "Woman's Love and Night" Life," are abidingly in the recital repertoire

Mendelssohn had a gift for songcomposing but did not employ it as largely as his bent for other kinds of musical expression. His "On Wings of Song" is one of the loveliest of all lyrics. Liszt made a beautiful piano transcription of it, as he did also of some of the songs of Schubert and Schumann. Liszt himself tried his hand at original vocal solos, and succeeded admirably.

Brahms carried on in the Schumann spirit but voiced deeper emotion, greater drama, and more varied and 'symphonic" piano accompaniments. His "May Night," "Forest Loneliness," "Cradle Song," and "Futile Serenade" are outstanding masterpieces.

Richard Strauss, in his seventysixth year, reigns as the living monarch of song-writing in this century, although he abandoned that field when he began to win success with his operas. "Serenade," "Cecilia," "All Souls' Day" are gems of melody and feeling, exquisitely harmonized.

Other countries produced eminent song-writers even in early times, and French, Italian and English classics are cultivated assiduously by the recitalists of today. No modern Frenchmen have equaled Debussy and Ravel in febrile imagination and delicate impressionism. Contemporary Italians write no concert "best-sellers." The present school of English and American composers are essentially fashioners of ballads rather than of the lied. Mac-Dowell has some splendid examples which do not deserve their wide neglect.

Russians have done well with songs; Moussorgsky's grim "The Flea," Tschaikowsky's gripping "None But the Lonely Heart," and Rachmaninoff's "Lilacs" are lastingly popular with our artists and public. From Czecho-slovakia came Dvorak's soulful "Songs My Mother Taught Me." Grieg made marvelous use of Norwegian tunes and colorings with "The Swan," "Solveig's Song" and other material still very much alive. Spain supplied exotic and rhythmically compelling songs by Albeniz, Granados, De Falla, Nin. Sibelius has interspersed his symphonies with some fine vocal pieces in the lied

Song recitalists of today have a rich treasure of repertoire to draw from. and are expected to deliver their songs in the original languages of the composers. Opera artists, with a few exceptions, are not expert concert-singers. To present a program of arias, often vivified by gestures and posturings, is not to achieve a song recital in its highest sense. -L. L.

FTRD in Danger

The Federal Theatre Project has been abolished by Congress,* and as this is being written there is a strong possibility that the Federal Theatre Radio Division will also go down with the blow. In view of FTRD accomplishments, both as a Government project and as a public-service agency, this would be a shame. American radio needs an organization that will work as aggressively in the interests of educational and cultural broadcasting as has the FTRD.

As a Government project, the FTRD has been instrumental in preserving the talents of unemployed artists, in whose ranks many have been found with the ability to meet the extremely trying demands of radio work. In the capacity of an organization that trains those inexperienced in radio, the FTRD has functioned as a unique conditioning school that can boast a return to private employment of fifty percent of its personnel, which has never exceeded two hundred persons. Outstanding on a long list of those who have been returned to work, often in highly paid positions, are the names of Alfred Kreymborg, who was commissioned by NBC to write ten poetic dramas; Ira Ashley, now a CBS director; John I. Mole, now writing "Gang Busters" and other commercial shows; Lester Scharff, now with M-G-M's Hollywood directorial staff; Rose Rubinstein, now with Music Hall, Radio City.

As a public-service agency, the FTRD has pioneered in the field of educational and cultural broadcasting to a greater extent and with a keener appreciation of the needs and welfare of the American people than any other national program-producing unit. As a result, to FTRD productions is due much of the credit for advancing the general cultural level of the listening public and furthering the significant progress of

Imposing is the fact that the networks have often followed in the wake of FTRD experiments. First to delve into the writings of Shakespeare and O'Neill for radio, the FTRD surveyed the possibilities in these previously unworked fields before either NBC or CBS made efforts to dramatize the classic works. Today the Shakespeare and O'Neill dramatizations by the networks are looked upon as merit-worthy contributions of radio to the American public.

Highly esteemed by broadcasters, the FTRD has been recipient of several million dollars worth of valuable radio time. This, their record shows, they have converted to excellent purpose in the presentation of programs, much better than average, to an estimated weekly audience of ten million listeners.

Respected by contemporary professionals, the FTRD has gained many of the works we now look back at as radio classics through the generous offers of such distinguished authors as Mary Roberts Rinehart, James Truslow Adams and Paul de Kruif. Witness the "Tish" stories, the "Epic of America"

*Legislation may be introduced before Congress adjour to save the FTP from extinction. Meanwhile FTP admint trators are discussing plans to disband the project. A effort will probably be made to reinstate it by fall.


series, "Men Against Death," "Their Greatest Stories," to mention only a few instances.

It may be definitely said that the FTRD has helped accelerate the trend of networks toward more intelligent, worth-while broadcasts. That the agency which has donated so much to this cause should be threatened with extinction is a sad turn of events. It is not too much to expect that the FTRD be kept alive and organized upon a more substantial support basis. In some quarters the suggestion is being made that this Government project be carried as a part of the WPA Information Service. Better suggestion, however, is that it become a production unit for the various Government agencies, not only to carry on its present work but also to familiarize America with the work of the Government. If no one else comes to the rescue, there is a possibility that the National Emergency Council may decide to keep it intact. If it is abolished, such productions as "The History of the Business Man," "The American Panorama," "The Nation's Health," "America in Midpassage" and other series originally planned for release in the near future will never be heard over American airwaves.

Quoting FTRD Director Evan Roberts: The American Legion once said, 'We have served with them (the FTRD) for America'; we would like to continue doing that."

Yes, Mr. Roberts, and when I say that I too hope the fine work will continue, I know that I am expressing the wishes of millions of American listeners who have enjoyed and benefited by the excellent radio programs the FTRD has made possible. —J. H.

 Latest press reports say that the Federal Theatre Radio Division will not be disbanded, pending Congressional consideration of transfer to another Government department. The WPA's Department of Information and the Department of the Interior's Office of Education stand out as likely choices. In this writer's opinion, the last named would be most ideal to guarantee the continuance of the Federal Theatre Radio Division's work to create and promote educational programs.

Roadside Wildlife

"Nature Sketches" on July 22 will come from a parking-area about 10,000 feet above sea level, on the world-famous trail ridge road. There Park Naturalist Raymond Gregg and the Junior Nature School will make friends with chipmunks and ground squirrels which have become so tame as to feed from the hand. You will hear related some of the interesting stories and anecdotes concerning the lives and habits of these small roadside dwellers; and birds of the high mountain forest which will appear during the program will be discussed.

"The little convict" is a term used by Mr. Gregg in introducing the chipmunk, whose quaint habits and unpredictable antics will be described.
"Lazy man's load" is the theme of the discussion of the Say ground-squirrel's feeding-habits. "When there is inflation about the head of these little fellows," says Mr. Gregg, "It's not the mumps; it's peanuts."
A sharply marked gray-white and black bird with strong bill is expected to fly about the trees within view of the Junior Nature School class, who will hear Mr. Gregg tell why this bird is called a Nutcracker.
Quietly slipping through the forest, the Camp Robber, a distinctive western bird with unusual habits, sometimes called Whisky Jack or Rocky Mountain Jay, is likely to enter the discussion.



men, of singing mothers. What a rich heritage for children already living in or yet to be born into such homes!

For all of its modern conveniences, he knew farming was still no bed of roses, and when, month after month, these women continued to attend rehearsals and there was no abatement in interest, he kept his fingers crossed. They rose early, he knew, and performed a multitude of tasks before his alarm even went off. Then, to get into a car and drive over muddy or icy roads twenty or thirty miles-as many of them did—to attend a rehearsal . . . It was asking too much.

But the movement grew with the steady, healthy growth of all soundly based movements. The Tippecanoe Chorus made many radio appearances that first year and, after each appearance, Stewart was swamped with letters from farm women who wanted to organize similar groups. How should they go about it? Stewart decided to make use of the extension service of

Purdue to reach them, and today there are eighty-six such groups scattered over the state, with more than four thousand voices, largely guided by Albert Stewart, at Purdue. At a recent music festival held in Lafavette, nine hundred women attended, sang rich. cultural music as a gigantic chorus to a listening audience of more than two thousand.

Go into any one of these farm homes when the day's work is done and you will find the family group centered about the radio. From the tiniest tots to the married sons and daughters, the people of Indiana have learned to listen to good music intelligently, appreciatively. This is not surprising when you understand that four thousand missionaries are abroad in the state, working to bring about this musical

In Romney, ten miles from Lafayette, I visited Mrs. O. L. McCay, wife of a country doctor and a charter member of the Tippecanoe group. She is a huskier, sturdier version of Eleanor Roosevelt, enthusiastic and filled with a joy of living.

Why do you sing?" I asked bluntly. The striking thing about the whole movement was that people who seemed to have such little reason for singing sang with such gusto.

"Why—why, it's the most wonderful thing that ever happened to us," she told me. "You know, it isn't just singing that's important. We get a new meaning from every worth-while radio broadcast that's made now. We understand the difficulties and finer points of rendition and we've passed them on to our families. When a number has been finished, you'd think you were sitting in the critics' row at the Metropolitan Opera House if you could hear us talk. And that's more than just radio listening. It's radio learning."

She pointed to the picture of a smiling girl on the radio cabinet.

That's my daughter. She's fourteen now, and I think she's the most wonderful thing in the world. Well, she has as much fun studying the numbers I bring home as I do. And now, with the training we get in our chorus, I'm

really able to help her with her breathing and interpretation. That isn't exactly an answer to your question, but it's reason enough for singing-for driving a twenty-mile round trip winter or summer to get to rehearsals."

I learned how their repertoires were built-from selections heard on the radio, and how interpretations were changed, new arrangements made after radio listening. I learned that there was a much-used radio in every one of these homes.

I learned, too, how important a social body the chorus had become in the community. And this was not alone in its participation in civic entertainments but in the actual round of activity which is a result of the organization's exist-

For example, last spring the Tippe canoe group was invited to sing at the National Federation of Music Clubs convention in Baltimore. How to get there! The matter of transportation and expenses was important to women from the average farm home. So they put

O THE left, as the ferry-boat approaches the magic portals of the Golden Gate Exposition — manmade dream city rising mystic and shimmering on Treasure Island in San Francisco Bay—one can see numerous wires festooned from large poles. From these temporary but efficient short-wave beam aerials the programs of General Electric's station W6XBE are radiated daily to the Orient, to Latin America and to South Africa. So pop-America and to South Africa. So popular are these programs becoming, says Buck Harris, genial manager of W6XBE, that they have already become a daily listening habit with thousands of foreign listeners, this fact being readily confirmed by the more than 150 letters that pour into the correspondence department each twenty-four hours. These letters bear the postmarks of Sydney. Singapore, Capety-four hours. These letters bear the postmarks of Sydney, Singapore, Capetown, Buenos Aires, Shanghai and many other far-away cities. Typical of these communications is one from W. J. Dowd at Kotzebue, Alaska, who states: "Just a line to let you know we have been enjoying your programs." Silve since the inauguration of your daily since the inauguration of your broadcasts from Treasure Island. They are surely enjoyed by us here on the ice-bound shores of the Arctic Ocean, just a stone's throw from Siberia and next door to the North Pole." W6XBE's next door to the North Pole." W6XBE's transmitter is mounted on shining blue panels and is controlled from a small but adequate combination control-room and studio. An adjoining luxurious lounge provides a pleasant meeting-place for the station's visitor-listeners from the far corners of the earth. The station is part of General Electric's station is part of General Electric's interesting exhibit in the Hall of Elec-

Adjoining the station in the same hall is RCA's television exhibit, so amazingly popular that it has already attracted almost a million visitors. On one side is the television studio, where, bathed by 40,000 watts of flood-lights, the announcer interviews selected visitors under the sensitive electronic eye, which transfers the images to several visual receivers placed in a small studio next door. Here the pictures are impressed on a small 7½ by 10-inch screen. The images were remarkably clear, distinct and true to life, while clear, distinct and true to life, while the accompanying sound reproduction was practically perfect, the usual char-acteristic of television sound since the ultra-high frequencies used allow for extra-high fidelity. When questioned concerning television the manager of the exhibit was quite enthusiastic about its present perfection and its future its present perfection and its future possibilities, but he seemed to feel that possibilities, but he seemed to feel that wide-spread usage of television might not come for some years. He inferred that recent developments having to do with the transmission of television over ordinary telephone wires might in time open the way for network telecasts. I was very much impressed with the interest and enthusiasm which everyone who visited the display evinced. Only a few seemed skeptical and the usual queries were: When will television be available in our locality, and how much will a set cost?

Equally interesting and certainly of Equally interesting and certainly of more immediate practical value was the display dealing with facsimile reproduction, the transmission of printed matter and photographs by radio. Unrolling in a business-like manner from neat little wooden boxes were strips of paper about nine inches wide, upon which was reproduced a neat little which was reproduced a neat little radio newspaper complete with head-lines, cartoons, photographs and the usual printed matter. Received by radio from a Sacramento station about one hundred miles distant, the reproduction of printed copy was quite legible and the photographs were particularly distinct and clear cut. Large

size photographs of movie stars came size photographs of movie stars came through so well indeed that they were eagerly sought for souvenir purposes, comparing favorably with the usual magazine half-tone. Facsimile—that little device which, attached to your radio, will print a complete radio newspaper while you sleep—will soon be with us be with us.

Another new station, SBU (9.535), is on daily from 5:15 to 6:00 p.m. EDT, in parallel with SBO (6.065) A report to CXA6 (9.62) of Montevideo, Uruguay, was verified on a small silver card which stated that the station was a 20,000-watt one licensed to operate as CXA4 on 6.125; as CXA10 on 11.895 and as CXA18 on 15.3 megs. The address is Servicio Oficial Difusion Radio Electrica, Mercedes 823, Montevideo. Mr. Legge believes the mystery station on 15.41 megs, identified by some listeners as "Radio harest," is a Soviet one. is a Soviet one.

formation he wanted, of course, told him exactly how I conduct my own program. I have not heard from him, and neither has anyone else. He just disappeared. Perhaps some day they will bring him back to his church-in the customary box. If he is not dead, I think he might better be, although surely that is a hard thing to have to say. The thing that hurts me most is the thought that my last letter to him may have been intercepted. Possession of such a letter, of course, full of the description of American radio programs, would be a crime in the eyes of the Nazis. Indeed, for all I know, that letter may have had something to do with the discontinuance of German religious broadcasts. How is one to know?

Those are the things I think of when I sit down on Friday nights to write my own broadcast. For doing what I do freely, with the understanding and the full cooperation of the Government, my friend was destroyed. Can the same thing happen to me? It seems fantastic, yet I must remember that five years ago my triend would have said that, too. Since that letter came to me, I think my own broadcasts have been stronger, better. At least my poor German friend has been able to do that much for his God."

tune more wisely than many of the glamour group. From radio, records, songs and screen, his best year netted him less than \$200,000. During the ten years with Standard Brands there have been several option points in his contracts and several big opportunities where he might have jumped to other sponsors and trebled his income, but, besides being loyal to his first and only sponsor, Vallee has been smart enough to realize the value of cumulative build-up.

For many years, Thursday to the radio world meant Rudy Vallee. If he should go to another sponsor, his hour would be changed.

His immediate ambition is to be a good actor, then a good screen actor and next a great actor and perhaps a producer. For more than a year he begged the advertising agency that backs his show for a chance to act. He finally won his point and now acts nearly every Thursday. Some believe he is author of "Ships That Pass," a little thing in which he co-starred with Gale Page. He announced that the show was written by "Lee Lynch." But many believe Vallee told his producer a man named Lynch wrote it so the producer would use it. It's possible that if he had told his producer he wrote it, the producer would have turned it down on the premise that Vallee could not possibly write a play. Some producers are that way.

Vallee has few friends, real friends. Hymie Bushel, his manager and attorney, is his closest friend. Rudy never has been able to make many close friends. He's aloof. He cannot separate the real from the phony. He is not a social climber. He doesn't understand society and doesn't ask it to try to figure him out. Mr. Vallee says in so many words, to society, "Here I am just as I am; if you don't like me go jump in the lake."

And society doesn't like him or dislike him, but ignores him.

He comes from a Roman Catholic family but is not particularly religious himself.

His inability to handle men is illustrated by this little incident. One of his musicians quit after three years to join Paul Whiteman. He could have staved with Vallee, but he preferred Whiteman. About six weeks later Whiteman fired the man. A friend happened to ask him, "What sort of a guy is Vallee?"

The musician low-rated Mr. Vallee. "He's a so-and-so, but take Paul Whiteman—there's a great guy for you."

Rudy heard the story and checked it. He was amazed. He had been fair with the musician and was mystified that Whiteman, who had canned the fellow, should be better esteemed in six weeks than he was in three years.

Despite his reputation of nickel-hugging, Vallee always goes overboard at Christmas and gives his employes expensive presents. He selects them him-

Vallee has great powers of concentration. He prefers to dominate the conversation. If a remark can be taken two ways, he usually takes the serious angle. If by any stretch of the imagination a remark can be construed as a slap at Vallee, he will take it that way.

At rehearsals he is brusque and quick. He expects his musicians to grasp his ideas almost immediately and gets sore if they do not. He pinches the lobe of his left ear when thinking.

Vallee has a hankering for mechanical gadgets and has his own idea of a super-automatic microphone that will adjust itself to the proper volume level, or perhaps a less complicated microphone that would have a meter on it to show how a guy was doing and perhaps suggest corrections. Maybe the Vallee microphone would tell a singer to croon softer and knock him over the head with a beer bottle if he didn't follow instructions

Mr. Vallee often has said, "Think of it! An eighty-million-dollar business going through a \$100 microphone.

Surely Mr. Vallee knows, or should know, that many engineers have thought of it and that microphones are being improved yearly.

He takes excellent care of himself. He's a good boxer. He always naps before dinner and is a light sleeper.

He never keeps one band together long. That's partly because of a union rule and partly because Mr. Vallee will not pay men unless they work. If a band goes from New York to California, the musicians must wait six months before they can get a union permit to play on the air from the West Coast. Naturally Mr. Vallee would have to pay them six months' salary for no work and hire California bands to carry on in the meantime. It's a union rule. So when Mr. Vallee changes engagements, he often changes musicians, except his three or four key men.

THE Vallee character sticks out of every corner in his Maine lodge. The lodge accommodates forty-five guests. There is a main building and four bungalows. In each guest room there is a set of house rules. The quest is supposed to read the rules and abide by

The rules say, "Remember you are a guest." They also instruct the guest not to throw his clothes around. Some more rules are:

Please cap your toothpaste and shaving-soap tubes.

Don't make cigarette burns.

At the table, take all you want, but don't take more than you want to eat. Remember, there are many quests, so please don't overtax the servants.

Each room is named after some song Mr. Vallee wrote or made famous. Which seems quite funny. How would you like to spend the night in the Maine Stein or in The Vagabond Lover?

The toilet tissue at the lodge is monogrammed "R. V."

And all day the guests hear an automatic phonograph grinding out recordings of a crooner.

Sorry, folks, you are wrong. Mr. Vallee doesn't impose himself upon his regimented guests. He passes the buck to Bing Crosby.





ship—of radio program content.

Mr. Sarnoff, president of RCA and chairman of the board of NBC, told the Commission that licensing of programbuilding bodies would be the first step in reducing American broadcasting to the status of government-controlled broadcasting abroad.

At the present time, various agencies in radio are at work on a self-regulatory code, and all that radio asks is the same opportunity to govern its program content that is given to the motion-picture industry. Radio recognizes that regulation is necessary for its own protection, and is willing to pay for such regulation and the security that would accom-

For we cannot escape the fact that the licensing power of this little group of

men-employed as it has been with short-term issuance of licenses-has resulted in a definite government censorship of radio. In some stations, I found news commentators operating under strict orders to avoid all controversial issues-matters upon which the public has every right to hear both sides. And the fact that this censorship is imposed by the station manager in an effort to protect the investment entrusted to him does not eliminate the fact that the censorship stems from the fountainhead of the FCC, in Washington, and from the fear that body universally inspires.

Recognizing that such a censorship

exists, we must recognize, further, that it becomes more than just the radiostation manager's headache. It's everybody's problem-everybody born with a love of freedom and a thirst for the liberties which are our birthright.

their heads together. The result was a curious hodgepodge of money-raising activities and social affairs.

They held bake sales where the delicious, home-cooked delicacies of the farm kitchen were offered for sale to the town dwellers. Card parties, at which door prizes of butter and eggs and cream were offered, were staged. But the master stroke—and one which assured their trip-was the making of a name quilt. It cost citizens of the community ten cents to have their names embroidered on the quilt. There were nine hundred blocks. Then, because there were ladies in the chorus who would have raised their eyebrows at the sale of chances on it, the ladies sold pencils for ten cents each and gave a free chance on the quilt with each pencil.

What made these pencils sell like hot cakes was that Mrs. Rooseveltwho still remembered the chorus from its Washington appearance—had embroidered her own name upon one of the nine hundred quilt-blocks.

No Saturday afternoon musicales were these, but a gathering of real people to do a real job of singing or entertaining, as the case might be. And whether they were bringing Brahms to the music-starved community or card games and fun to a locality where there had not been much fun before. they went about their task with an enthusiasm remarkable in the face of their other duties.

On the campus of Purdue University, a great skeletal frame rears its head against the sky. It is a new music building that will—when completed next spring—seat more people than Music Hall, in Rockefeller Center.

"It is no accident," Mr. Stewart emphasizes, "that this building is started now, after the day of radio. It is the symbol of a musical renaissance which is taking place all over the nation. In a way," he continued, "it is a magnificent tribute to Indiana's singing women. For they-in finding release from the drab and the dull-have sounded a new, a richer note in the American way of living. It must be, too, a standing tribute to that force which is, basically, responsible in a large measure for the fuller and finer appreciation of music we are finding now—radio broadcasting."

Suddenly the new building wasn't important. What was important—vitally important—was the light and the joy I had seen in the eyes of these singing women—some of them grandmothers, all of them marked by long hours of drudgery and labor. What was important was that good music can make a drab life exciting—exuberant, even and that here in Indiana it was doing just that. And I felt a thrilling surge of pride when I remembered that what was happening here in Indiana could happen anywhere; that radio, which has brought to the farm homes of Indiana a force that is good and rich and full, at the same time is bringing those things to every other listener throughout America.

The Tippecanoe Home Economics Chorus, as well as similar choruses of other Indiana counties, are not scheduled for summer broadcasts, but are heard frequently over Indiana stations throughout the winter.
