**A** YEAR and a half ago a couple of comics stepped up to the microphone of the "Kate Smith Hour" for a ten-minute, one-appearance guest performance. No one—with the possible exception of the comics themselves—had any idea that their appearance was anything other than the simple guest performance it seemed, for their comedy was rowdy, hilarious, low-born and, to use their own words, "the hokiest of hoke."

Bud Abbott and Lou Costello are still making their weekly appearances with Kate Smith, and this season are answering wider demands upon their services by bringing their rowdy comedy to the New York stage in that hit show, "Streets of Paris," as well. Which may go to show that we haven't changed our entertainment tastes much since the custard-throwing days of Mack Sennett. More likely, however, it proves that these two rascals of low-born repartee were exactly right when they maintained that, in times of stress, people like to have a little comedy that isn't so subtle and modern that they have to strain their gray matter to catch the point. What these two lads deal out is comedy that slaps you in the face.

For example, look at these lines from a recent show:

Abbott: "Costello, do you realize you've said hello to everybody on the program except Ted Collins? How did you come to miss him?"

Costello: "How did I come to miss him? He ducked! I'd have given him two black eyes if I hadn't been stopped."

Abbott: "Who stopped you?"

Costello: "Ted Collins . . ."

Or the time Abbott and Costello opened their dog-nursery:

"What did you do with those newborn puppies," Bud asked.

"I put them in the dog-incubator," Lou replied.

"We don't have any dog-incubator."

"No? Then what's that can in the back yard marked 'Deposit litter here'?"

On another occasion this irrepressible pair went in for football, and to Bud's dismay Lou got mad and quit the team. "I'll take my football with me, too," was Lou's parting shot. "You can use Ted Collins."

"Why should I use Mr. Collins for a football?" Bud asked, innocently.

"Because he's thick-skinned, tight-laced and a bag of wind!" came the quick—if high-pitched—rejoinder.

But the prize gags of this duo always end with the now famous "I'm a bad boy!" line. For example, Bud says, "Suddenly the lion roars! He leaps for you! It takes the two of us to kill that lion!"

"You're wrong," Lou says. "It will only take one of us. I ain't going to be there."

## SLAPSTICK

*On a  
Paying Basis*

Abbott and Costello stuck to custard-throwing comedy and grew to be its modern masters

"Isn't that something!" Very excited. "I figure out a scheme to make some money. Am I selfish about it? No. Did I try to hunt lions alone? No. I'm willing to let you capture the lion and what thanks do I get? You want to run away."

Lou, in his softest, most self-repentant tone, admits, "I'm a bad boy!"

The phrase has caught on. Kids repeat it in mock Costello tones, and school principals all over the country admit that Abbott and Costello, through their constant repetition of the line, have made children more "behavior conscious." Public School 17, of Manhattan, even decorated the pair with gold medals in recognition of their salutary effect upon its pupils. But while the phrase is well known, it has not been repeated as much as listeners think. As a matter of record, the "I'm a bad boy" gag is used only once on each broadcast.

The Abbott and Costello style of comedy—and they have set a style regardless of how much they belittle themselves and call the comedy they deliver "hokum"—isn't something that just happened. It was born of the combined experiences and reactions of two shrewd youngsters who knew what it was to be knocked about. By the time they met and joined their efforts, they had both reached the conclusion that the American public wanted a type of comedy capable of lifting them out of the drab, every-day struggle to exist.

Their answer was fantasy, and just as the movie producer found the public appeal of fantasy in "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" and musicians found it in swing music, so radio—and the stage—found fantasy in the unworldly antics of Abbott and Costello.

Abbott, tall and thin, is the straight man of the duo. He guides the conversation in a domineering sort of way and, as easy as pie, confounds the short, fat, moon-faced Costello into a state of complete misunderstanding.

Lou Costello (who is really Louis Francis Cristillo) was born in Paterson, N. J., in 1908, educated in the public schools and, despite the fact that he hadn't so much as appeared in a school play, found himself bitten by the Hollywood bug while in his junior year of high school. Being a man of action, he forthwith put his thumb to work hitchhiking towards Hollywood, which he reached in due time.

There he managed to land—after months of near-starvation—a job as a scene-shifter at M-G-M, eventually graduating into the ranks of stunt men, where he jumped from tall buildings, rode horses over cliffs and, in one picture, served as a tackling-dummy for the whole U. C. L. A. football team. The reorganization that followed the introduction of sound in Hollywood, however, left him out in the cold, and he started east. Half-way back, St. Joseph, Missouri, he landed a job with a vaudeville unit, then one with a burlesque show, where he was discovered by Jean Bedini, discoverer of Eddie Cantor, Al Jolson, Bobby Clark and others.

Hardly less eventful was the life of Bud Abbott, who was actually born under the canvas of Ringling Brothers' Circus at Coney Island on October 2, 1900. A taste for thrills was inherited from his mother, one of the most daring of bareback-riders with the show, while his judgment about entertainment and public appeal obviously came from his

father, publicity man for the circus. Bud's ambitions, as a youngster, leaped nimbly from auto-racing to lion-taming, the latter ambition suffering a sudden end when Bud watched his friend and tutor—Captain Bonevita, the Clyde Beatty of his day—lose an arm in the vicious jaws of a man-eating tiger.

He sold popcorn and orangeade after that, finally getting into the theater business through the purchase of a theater. The theater grew to a chain, but in 1928, as a result of overexpansion, he lost everything he owned.

One night in 1929, while Bud was working as cashier at the Empire Theater in Brooklyn, Lou Costello was booked into the theater. A few nights later, Lou's straight man was suddenly taken ill and Abbott offered to help him out for a few nights by doing the routine. The pair clicked so well that they've been together ever since.

That was ten years ago. Their joint


backstage as soon as the curtain had dropped and booked them for the "Kate Smith Hour." They've been there ever since.

Both boys are married, and the circumstances surrounding their joint courtship is in the best Abbott and Costello tradition. In truth, it's classic fantasy. They were playing a burlesque engagement in Washington, D. C., when two girls in the chorus got into a hair-pulling match backstage. Abbott and Costello separated them, soothed them, took them out to dinner. A few months later this amazing pair announced their marriages to the battling Amazons.

The Costellos live in Paterson, where Lou grew up, and the pride of their lives are two daughters, Patricia Anne and Carol Lou. Lou's hobby is making movies of them, and he has sound-equipment to do the job right. When you go out to see the Costellos, he'll

leave the stand. It invariably gets a laugh, and, more important, "it's lucky."

When the parts in "Streets of Paris" were offered them, both Abbott and Costello turned them down. The most important reason was that a stage show would keep them away from their homes more than they wanted to be away. A minor reason was that they had found a real success in radio and were not anxious to jeopardize it by doing a stage show which might flop. So they made up a number of conditions which they felt Harry Kaufman, producer of "Streets in Paris," wouldn't accept. These started off with a demand for five hundred dollars a week more than he offered and ended up with equal billing with Bobby Clark, long an established musical-comedy star. If all this failed to dampen Kaufman's ardor, Costello was to say that he had a lot of property in Hollywood that needed looking after.

trail now led through burlesque and along the gaslight circuits in vaudeville. Big-time bookers were wary of the low-born comedy they offered, and despite the fact that Abbott and Costello stole the show wherever they appeared, it seemed that they were doomed to obscurity because no one would give them a chance. Then Jesse Kaye, booker for Roxy's, decided to see whether the audiences in Podunk and Cabbage Center were any different from the audiences of sophisticated New York. He booked them into the Roxy for a week. After their first belly-laugh performance, the engagement was quickly extended another week, and they've been back several times since. But the ice had been broken. That was the important thing.

Other engagements followed, and one night while playing Loew's State they were seen by Ted Collins. He went

drag out a projector and show you a progressive history of their infant lives.

The Abbotts haven't any children, but at the moment they're all wrapped up in their new home at Stony Brook, Long Island.

In broadcasting, the pair have developed certain peculiarities or actions which they repeat "just for luck." If the script concerns itself with football, Costello wears a football uniform. He wears a different costume for every broadcast. Also, Costello is one of the few radio stars who never uses a script. He depends solely upon his memory for his lines. And the little laugh that always marks the end of an Abbott and Costello broadcast comes when Costello trips as he leaves the microphone. The first time Costello tripped, the audience laughed and the broadcast was a big success. So, every week now, Costello makes it a point to trip as he

Kaufman surprised them by acceding to their every request, so when the time came for Costello to pull the one about his Hollywood property he stood up and pounded the table.

"We'll sign this contract on only one condition," he shouted.

"What's that?" Kaufman asked.

"Get me two ducats to 'Hellzapoppin' for tonight."

He got the ducats, Abbott—for once—got crossed up by Costello, and Kaufman got their signatures on contracts. Now both boys are glad, because the show has been a hit, largely due to their efforts, and they're still two of the top comedians on the air.

# AIRIALTO LOWDOWN

**Sanderson-Crumit team and other shows spread \$2,630 over the airwaves every week**

NEW YORK.—"There's a Gold Mine in the Sky" wouldn't be too far-fetched a description for the current prize-giving spree radio has taken. If you add up all cash prizes handed out by sponsors, the result would be an average of \$2,630 a week. "Pot o' Gold's" weekly award of \$1,000 is the biggest plum of them all, but "Play Broadcast," a new MBS show which will premiere February 19 will run second with a \$500 prize. "Play Broadcast" will ask contestants to identify prominent persons, places or events from clues presented on the program. Clues will take the form of impersonations, songs, sports highlights or quotations. Listeners will get score sheets for playing game through meat markets and grocery stores . . . "Information, Please" gives away \$30 in cash plus \$150 Encyclopedia Britannica. "Don't Forget," "Quixie Doodle" and "Professor Quiz" are all big prize-givers, offering \$200, \$115, and \$150 respectively . . . Half a dozen shows, like "Battle of the Sexes," give away only \$30 but are none the less interesting for that . . . Not included in the count is "Court of Missing Heirs," CBS, which turns up a few thousand every once in a while for some person, nor shows on which contestants get money but listeners don't.

#### **Luck and Misfortune**

It was on "Court of Missing Heirs," January 9, that the story of James Jordan was dramatized. James died in Atlanta in August leaving an estate to which Henry, a brother, was entitled to the extent of \$13,000 if he could be found. Henry was found and, last week, came from his home in Philadelphia to claim his share. Those who saw Henry were happy, for he was a fifty-two-year-old crippled newsman and people were glad that luck had come his way. Henry, too, was happy. That is, he was until he left the studio. Waiting for him was Mrs. Loretta Jordan, the wife he hadn't seen in seventeen years. She was there waiting with a cop and a warrant charging non-support. Henry, on crutches, was escorted to a car, taken to jail. The case is still pending.

#### **Studio Chatter**

Ben Bernie is recuperating from an operation for appendicitis. His friend, Al Jolson, with whom Ben had been sun-

Blind fans of Richard Maxwell, CBS, have organized radio's first Braille fan club. Miss Mildred Smith, 8 West Germania Street, Ashley, Pa., is president. Your correspondent is an honorary member.

His chief has called him on the carpet to answer formal charges.



Helen Behmiller (Sarah Jane Kane in "Mary Marlin") has a new strutter-and-fretter named Rose Ann . . . And Floyd Holm of the Escorts and Betty expects to escort a new top tenor into his home in March . . . Jack Brinkley (Sam Jefferson on "Caroline's Golden Store") has an interesting collection of over fifty miniature models of ships, trains, coaches and planes outlining the history of transportation from chariots to streamliners . . . A hint: More later about a Mr. Davin and his idea for a really revolutionary show being readied for the air.

#### What About Announcers?

Announcers are not just mechanical fixtures. They are, and should be, individual personalities. The mail from listeners shows that. They want to know things about their favorite announcers as well as stars. So I'll try to devote some special space here and there to these yeomen of the networks. For instance, here are a few bits about some of them: Durward Kirby gained wide attention with his broadcasting from Cincinnati during the big 1937 flood. Known for his breezy geniality, Durward is blossoming into an emcee on a local WENR program called "Ten O'Clock Final" . . . That announcers are human and like to have fun was vividly demonstrated when Fort Pearson and Charlie Lyon a few days ago sauntered into studio A during a Ransom Sherman "Club Matinee" session, dragging Bill, the NBC shoeshine boy, with them, and settled down at the microphone for a shine in the midst of the program!



## Headaches at the Ringside

READ THIS STORY BEFORE YOU TUNE

**T**HIS Friday night, when Joe Louis and Arturo Godoy meet in a world's heavyweight-championship boxing-match, millions of sports fans throughout America would gladly change places with Bill Stern and Sam Taub, who'll be down in ringside seats to broadcast a blow-by-blow description of the affray. Oddly enough, at the moment, both Bill Stern and Sam Taub would probably be happy to change spots with any one of the listeners-in, because there are plenty of headaches attached to their job and no one knows it better than these lads.

Sure, they get the best seats in the house and, what's more, they get paid to sit in them. But if you have any idea that these aren't the two hottest seats in the house, you should have a behind-the-mike look at what goes on.

Long before they walk down the noise- and smoke-filled aisle to their seats under the ring, they start worrying about the possibility of missing the actual knockout punch. Now, missing the knockout punch is an unforgivable matter with fans, and while a newspaperman—with time to spare—can find out about it later, the sportscaster must be able to tell at once whether it was an uppercut, a left hook or what. But suppose the fighter on the receiving end of the lethal blow has his back to the announcer at the second, thus shielding the blow? Well, all the sports announcer can do is hope.

The job of the man at the mike is to give a clear, authentic word-picture of what happens in the ring to a far-flung audience and—the announcer always remembers this—millions of the fans will go to the movies of the fight

later and check up on his broadcast. He knows that he must be accurate . . . and good. He mustn't let his excitement run away with his tongue, and yet there is no place for listlessness in his job. And above all, he must be aware that anything can—and does—happen in fight broadcasting. Experts like Bill Stern and Sam Taub and Clem McCarthy have developed techniques for coping with emergencies.

A certain amount of preliminary work is necessary to the job. Before the fight starts, there are people at the ringside—former champions and fight experts—whose comment is of interest. But the experienced fightcaster has learned to be wary of his choices. Often a witty and verbose speaker, faced with a mike, goes suddenly dumb and the announcer must be prepared to cover for him. On the other hand, men noted for brief talks have become tiresomely long-winded before a mike when listeners are in no mood for long talk.

Clem McCarthy usually points to his watch in an effort to adroitly cut such verbose speakers off, using less subtle methods if the occasion demands. Bill Stern has a different technique for handling the long-winded. He pulls the microphone away from them, saying, "Thanks a lot, but our air time is running out. We appreciated your comment."

Prior to the Louis-Braddock fight in Chicago, Clem McCarthy set up his mike on the sidewalk outside the stadium for sidewalk interviews. He noticed a mild-mannered little man in the front row.

"You'd have picked this little fellow for a gentleman for sure," Clem said,

"so I shoved the mike in his hands. His first remark was highly offensive and half of it got over before I could grab the mike back."

The cash customers behind the press section sometimes cause trouble. They get excited and yell and, quite often, what they yell is on the profane side. Then it's the announcer's job to shield the delicate-eared mike from the offending words. Often, fight broadcasters will spot friends out in this section to remind some of the more boisterous fans to quiet down.

**F**ROM this same section comes another broadcaster's headache—the fan who ambles up and pats him on the back, talks to him, becomes friendly while he's on the air. At a recent fight, a drunk approached Bill Stern and insisted on going on the air. Stern couldn't discourage him with gestures and, unable to leave the mike, brought his elbows back with all his force and caught the drunk in the stomach. The resulting groan was heard over a nation-wide network and the inebriate therewith gave up all radio ambitions. Again, there isn't much that a fight announcer can do about occurrences like these except to go on hoping that they won't happen to him.

The hand is quicker than the eye—and the tongue. So all of the punches traded can't be described. But the good announcer is careful to get all of the effective blows into his broadcast. When there is a lull in the fighting, he works harder than when punches are traveling fast and furious, for he must give a true picture and, at the same time, keep up the fans' interest.

Perhaps the most difficult job—especially in cases where names are alike—is to keep the names of the fighters from getting mixed up in the description. The announcer must decide beforehand what he is going to call each fighter and stick to those names throughout the fight. If they tried to use nicknames—especially the endless chain of nicknames given Joe Louis—their broadcast would be a confused jumble. Clem McCarthy—in the Joe Louis-John Henry Lewis battle—ran into a duplication of names that spelled trouble. He decided beforehand to call them Joe and John Henry. Fortunately—or unfortunately—the plan never got a real test, for the fight came to a climactic end in the first round. The Max Baer-Max Schmeling fight of an earlier day would have been a real headache, though, because it went ten rounds before Max Baer won on a kayo.

But the broadcaster's real battle begins after the fight is over. Radio fight fans have learned to expect a panting post-fight statement from the winning battler, and the announcer's battle is to get up into the ring with the microphone and to the winner before he is hurried off to his dressing-room. The ring is then a scrambling mass of policemen, photographers, handlers, reporters, friends, and dragging the mike and its lead to the fighter's corner is like playing tackle for a Rose Bowl football team. But it's even more difficult to get a fighter's statement once he's gotten to his dressing-room.

The dressing-room becomes the site of a miniature riot, with reporters working feverishly to score beats on their

## The Power of the Press

By Leonard Lieblich

FOR nearly six months (two of them with my participation as judge) the Sunday radio broadcast called "So You Think You Know Music" ran its smooth, untroubled course until the CBS powers decided that it had outlived its novelty, and on January 7 the program said reluctant farewell. However, exactly three weeks after, January 28, saw its return, again fathered by CBS on the same station and at the same time as before. Thereby hangs a tale, most complimentary to RADIO GUIDE readers and most astonishing to the radio corporation, to Ted Cott, master of ceremonies and myself. Let me relate it.

Hardly had twenty-four hours passed after our closing on the air, when letters of displeasure, pleading and protest began to pour in on CBS, with some of the writers feelingly sad and others genuinely angry. In the first week of our hiatus, nearly 800 such communications staggered the postman and the CBS executives, the correspondence coming from every part of the country. In addition, similar comment appeared in the press from many leading radio columnists and editors. It was, all told, an amazing demonstration, for the broadcasts had gone over only a limited network.

Then it was that the restoration was decided upon, and so we had the flattering distinction of being the first discarded CBS program to return to the air after so short a time.

I am recording this story not on account of any egotistical satisfaction but because I was as much astonished as anyone else in radio at the extensive gallery of listeners we were holding, and at the fact that they looked upon the program in such a personal light. Many experts considered all radio quizzes as having lost interest, but they seemingly left the attraction of "audience participation" out of their reckoning. Our experience proves that such quizzes will not soon lose their popularity; and also that listeners who like good music and wish to know about it are immensely more numerous than the radio companies and sponsors appear to know. If so many persons took the trouble to write and pay postage, there must necessarily be legions of others who are interested but did not express themselves in letters.

Let me thank RADIO GUIDE readers for their help and cooperation, as I feel sure that a large percentage of the missives came from them.

While on the postal subject, it is timely and only fair to mention, too, as a contrast, that I received a dozen or so letters about something I wrote some time ago concerning the Ford Sunday Evening Hour, whose recent programs I called a misuse of the possibilities offered by its excellent orchestra and splendid soloists. Only two of the writers agreed with me, and the rest differed. They declared that they are satisfied with the music offered, even if it is not consistently "highbrow," but overlook the fact that I said it pleases many persons. The letters do not change my viewpoint. To the objectors, I can only repeat it anew and quote the words of Lincoln about something else: "It's all right for those who like it."

## Musician of the Week

(Vera Brodsky)

SOME years ago a team of young pianists startled the musical world with their extraordinary technique, their impeccable sense of rhythm and the verve and fire of their playing. In a very short time Vera Brodsky and Harold Triggs were numbered among the few first-class duo-piano teams. Not only did they capture the admiration of the public but they were the very special favorites of pianists like Josef Hofmann, Leopold Godowsky and Josef and Rosina Lhevinne.

When the team broke up two years ago for a variety of reasons, an atmosphere of gloomy foreboding met Vera Brodsky wherever she went. Could she maintain alone the reputation she had acquired with Triggs? She set out to prove that she could, that Godowsky, Hofmann and the Lhevinnes were not wrong when they called her one of the finest young pianists in America.

Today as a member of the music staff of CBS and with her own half-hour weekly radio program, she has amply proved her point. Her program on Saturday afternoons is not only remarkable for the fine quality of her playing but also because of the originality of her choice of music.

Born in Virginia, she is really a New York girl, having spent most of her life there. She was a pupil of the Lhevinnes and a protegee and warm friend of Godowsky. Striking in appearance, she is tall with a long mobile face, large dark eyes and a wide smile. She favors tailored clothes, which always look poured onto her, but tries the patience of her friends with an incurable passion for crazy hats. Her wit is as flashing as her piano playing. She has an inexhaustible fund of stories and is a wicked mimic. She takes instant and strong likes and dislikes to people. She appreciates good food and wine, is a theater and movie fan, thinks most outdoor sports are a waste of time. She'd like to spend most of her life traveling and, to quote a well-known playwright, she's "boat crazy." She is always searching for new and unusual piano music, and this Saturday plays three pieces by her former partner, Harold Triggs. In spite of many ups and a lot of downs, she still thinks playing the piano is more fun than anything else on earth.

WHO has not heard, or at least heard of, the "Sextet" and the "Mad Scene" from Lucia? Barrel-organs have made the former familiar to the multitude, and coloratura sopranos have rouladed and trilled the latter into popularity with the patrons of opera and concert.

However, there is more in Donizetti's work than that, even though some of the other fine solo numbers and resonant choruses have seldom or never been performed away from the lyric theaters.

"Lucia" (premiered 1835) belongs to the period when romanticism began to flourish in music, poetry, drama and literature. Opera plots mainly presented elemental emotions and picturesque personages, framed by colorful scenes and brilliant pageantry. Composers were less concerned with verity than with vividness; less with psychology than with star singers whose specialties had to be exploited. It mattered little whether the librettos were silly or jumbled; whether the music expressed the mood of the words. What mattered were melodies that caught the ear attractively, and the orchestral score mostly functioned as mere accompaniment for the singers.

If the listener can get himself into the

of Ravenswood, but her brother Henry (Enrico) wishes her to marry Lord Arthur Bucklaw (Arturo) so as to save the fortunes of the house. The lovers meet before Edgardo's departure on a political mission and exchange renewed pledges of faithfulness.

The second act opens with preparations for the wedding of Lucia and Arturo, to which she has consented after being shown a forged letter seemingly proving Edgardo's unfaithfulness. He returns unexpectedly, tries vainly to stop the ceremonies, but is overpowered. He curses Lucia and tears the nuptial ring from her finger.

In the third act, Enrico and Edgardo meet to engage in a duel just after the marriage of Lucia and Arturo, but Raimundo, her teacher, announces that she has fatally stabbed her bridegroom. Suddenly insane, she makes her appearance. (Mad Scene.)

The final episode is in a graveyard, where the duel is to take place. The bell for the dead is tolled. Lucia has died. Edgardo, realizing her innocence, ends his own life.

The "Sextet" occurs in the second act, just after Edgardo's entrance during the preparations for Lucia's marriage.

Ryan productions for Paramount release, and has been actively engaged in grand opera and operetta productions for years. His illness has kept him in western hospitals for several years. It was there that he learned about radio.

IT WAS all so strange, so quiet. And now it was dark. And I was in one of those high, narrow beds; and there were two rows of other high, narrow beds dimly outlined in the long, narrow building, and I was weak and very discouraged. And the doctor's words paraded back and forth through my mind: "Your lungs . . . far advanced . . . take a rest." And then downright discouragement set in, and the tears would not stop . . . Suddenly a loud laugh split the silence. Then another, and another.

I sprang up in bed, nervous and trembling . . . The shock of that sound had seemed terrific, and I thought the patients were laughing at those tears. Still, it was dark, and surely no one could see me. Then the colored boy on my right let out a roar, raised up, and whispered, "Pssst! Hey—you!"

"M-me?" I stammered.

"Sure, you! Why don't you listen?" "I am listening."

"No, no! Ah means grab yo'self those headphones over yo' bed and get a load of this—Haw, HAW, HAW!"

And the beds up and down the ward echoed with laughter.

I ran my hands over the wall and located the headset. Then I sank back, dizzy with the effort. But the next moment I was transported out of it all and found myself once more in the land of the living . . . Yes, back at home in my favorite easy chair beside the radio, listening, and laughing at one of my favorite programs.

That, briefly, was my re-introduction to radio—and life. And for almost five years since that time, radio has been about the only life I have known.

Olive View Sanitarium, where I now found myself, is thirty-five miles northwest of Los Angeles, at the foot of the southern Sierras. In reality it is a small city devoted entirely to the cure and treatment for tuberculosis. It houses over one thousand patients, segregated in separate ward buildings, with an average of about twenty-eight beds in each. It has its own post office, fire department, chapel, library, numerous buildings for several hundred employees, and a "city hall," or administration building. And just to bring matters up to date, it has its own broadcasting system. Its call letters are PFC, and they stand for Patience, Faith, Courage.

Each ward has its own radio receiving-set, operated by a patient appointed

by the ward doctor or nurse and connected to a headset over each bed. Programs are chosen by the ballot method. Once a week PFC is "on the air," when a switch in each ward connects the entire city of beds to a broadcast piped in from the "city hall." These broadcasts consist of medical talks, patient announcements, and holiday programs.

But aside from this, each ward is absolute boss of its programs—and woe be unto the operator who does not heed the popular choice, for radio is the one great thing in the patients' lives that illness and years of confinement cannot take from him. It is at once his magical carpet of escape, entertainment and information; a release, if you please, from absolute boredom, for in many cases of tuberculosis little or no pain is felt.

Interest is always at a high pitch when the balloting begins, with the voting oftentimes taking on all the importance of a hotly contested political issue or referendum. Various cliques form readily, and lobbying for their favorite programs (page Dave Elman!) soon becomes a very serious hobby with many. My initiation into this unique procedure began precisely at sunrise my first morning there.

I was still half asleep when the patient on my left introduced himself with the scrambled information that: he was an "Up" patient (one allowed certain walking privileges), that he was there for a "rib" (compression operation), and would I kindly do him a personal favor by voting for the "Lux Radio Theater." Then the colored boy joined in with an explanation of the ballot system, adding the information that he also was a Lux man . . . Before he finished, the nurse handed me a note from a throat case (a patient not allowed to speak above a whisper). It said: "Please to having the de luxe dramatics for your choose. I am gratified to listen." It was signed by a Japanese name.

LUX won that one by a margin of several beds.

Shortly after this I was in another ward, where an energetic "Up" patient wanted a certain program that several hooted down. He approached the operator but was told to take a ballot. Thereupon, the "Up" went across the hall and into a high-pressure sales talk to a large group of Mexican patients, most of whom understood nothing but the word "program." And, since most Mexican patients are an agreeable sort, the "Up" soon had them stampeded into signing the ballot.

Then he returned to the operator.

"Here," he said, waving his evidence. "Read it and weep, brother—a majority if there ever was one!"

The operator said nothing, but took the ballot and turned on the program.

Satisfied, our super-salesman got into bed, put on his phones, and prepared to enjoy the fruits of his labors.

But now the operator slipped out of bed, took a blank ballot, and also paid a visit to the Mexican side.

"You quiere (want) thesa same program that's on now?" he asked.

"No," they replied.

"You quiere (want) musica de Guy Lombardo?" he queried.

"Si, senior, si, si!" they chorused.

"Okay," he said, "sign here, please—on the dotted line. Muchas gracias."

And he returned to bed, switched on to Guy Lombardo, and waited for the explosion from the super-salesman. It came—right on schedule. But the boys laughed him down. He never again made the mistake of crossing up the Mexicans.

Most Mexican patients speak both languages, but the average ward devotes one to two hours each morning to Spanish language programs, follow-

ing the newscasts from KNX and KFI. This also aids many American patients who are studying Spanish, while the rest are free to attend the clinics or write letters.

But the morning hours provide a veritable harvest for the women's wards, where the Helen Trent type of program is a big favorite. And here's a "Believe It or Not" for you: There is one women's program that is also very popular with the men. It is Fletcher Wiley's daily discussion. Reason: Because he chooses topical and widely varied subjects.

The clinics represent the only opportunity for the male and female patients to meet, as the men's and women's wards are separated by a divid-



ing line. Generally, there is a nurse or attendant on hand in the clinical waiting-rooms; but, somehow, romance and friendship often spring up—and soon the local post office has two new customers. A few letters later, the wheelchair Romeo quite often sends his stretcher patient Juliet the word: "Listen to station so-and-so Wednesday morning at eight. I'm requesting them to play a Bing Crosby record for you." A bedside serenade—by proxy. Some of the sanitarium romances have resulted in marriage.

Practically all of the big network comedians are popular with the patients. Laughing, you see, is one thing they never seem to get enough of. But ranking on a par with the comedians is the program of the "Gang Busters," "Mr. District Attorney," or "Calling All Cars" type. The "chase" provides a thrill for these bedridden buckaroos that nothing else can supplant, and if a comedian competes with any of these programs, he'd better be good or the boys will have none of him.

The Professor Quiz type of program is also very popular—and the ward is usually silent when he is on. There was a time when it was loud—with answers. But now the boys tell "the ones they know" after it is over. Of course, the patients are drama-minded. Many of them, for instance, have followed "First Nighter" for years. And they pay strict attention to all dialog. Perhaps that is why Orson Welles' Martian

fantasy caused no alarm in the sanitarium.

There are a number of programs after 9:00 p.m. that make "outlaws" of the boys if they listen in. Kate Smith is one of these, for the sanitarium rule of all radios off at 9:00 is absolutely irrevocable. But witness this method of circumventing the "law": (Don't let 'em hang me for telling this one, Steve Wilson!) An "Up" patient would disconnect the phones in the nurses' office at 9:00 p.m. and the operator would turn down the volume. Then another patient, whose bed was on the porch, would keep a weather eye on the road for the supervisor. If she showed up, he'd pull a string running into the ward and attached to the operator's wrist—and off would go the radio. When the "cat" arrived, she would find the ward snoring most ambitiously. The moment she would leave, however, the string would again jerk and the sky-larking would resume in safety and comfort.

I HAD never seen a modern jitterbug, nor witnessed a rugcut, until a young patient I will call Jack Jitters joined us one otherwise calm morning—and promptly announced that he expected to hear swing and plenty of it. Amused, the boys agreed to allow him half an hour each morning. But this satisfied neither Jackie nor three converts he soon made; so one of them, remembering it was the operator's birthday, presented him with a package of ciga-

rettes—and asked him to "forget" the exact time-limit.

When the boys discovered this, they "recalled" the operator and obtained the installation of a gent with a name similar to Mulligan. But the swingsters wanted no part of Mr. Mulligan; and Jackie countered by ordering his own radio—and setting up a rival "network" via a connection to the headphones of his pals. Then they really began going places—until the doctor told them to calm down or dismantle. I offered my sympathy by suggesting an operetta, but they shied from me as though I were poison.

In general, the patients prefer sweet music. Wayne King, for example, is a "must" in all wards. And the spectacular Whiteman, the fanciful Kostelanetz, Fred Waring, et al, have strong followings. Usually, the longer a patient is in bed, the more he leans to melody, symphony and opera.

My first two years in bed were spent lying motionless for hours at a time, the receivers practically glued to my ears. Physically, my body was there—for repairs. Mentally, I was soaring the heights, hearing things and "seeing" places I never before had time for.

One evening a series of experiences began that at first almost seemed like an impossible dream; for my receivers suddenly began bringing me several of my personal friends from the newspaper, operatic, and theatrical worlds! I was too weak for visitors; in fact, few


of my friends knew my whereabouts or even that I was ill—but now they could, and did "visit" me, "talk" to me, and cheer me. For many months they did this absolutely unaware that they were helping to pull me through one crisis after another.


Matt Weinstock, popular columnist of the Los Angeles Daily News, was one of them. Mario Chamlee, leading tenor of the Metropolitan Opera, was another. (Remember him in the Tony and Gus series?) Later, as my course changed and I once more became something of this earth, both Mario and Matt also became visitors in the flesh . . .

Today I am in a convalescent home "hardening up" before my release. But if you think my metamorphosis rather unique, then get a load of this, from a letter our old friend Jackie Jitters, who is still up there flat on his back. He said, "Last night I heard the Thursday evening operetta program over KNX with Mario Chamlee singing in 'The Chocolate Soldier' . . . Boy, was it keen! I never knew before that operettas had such good stories and swell tunes . . . Say, Hart, could you get Mr. Chamlee to send me an autographed photo? I want to put it beside my radio . . ."

Well, that about makes our transformations complete. But just to cinch it all around, I'm going to see that Jackie gets that photo—and in a frame. I'm buying the frame myself.

Here is the heartwarming story of how radio enters a sanitarium to re-introduce desperately sick men and women to life—and to health

# YOUNG MAN WITH A TONGUE

## Can Bob Taft shoot Santa Claus and become U. S. President, too?

**T**WO years ago, Robert Alphonso Taft decided that it was his duty to his community and to his country to run for the United States Senate. He was not an ambitious man and he had a good law practise, a happy married life and friends who said, "You're not colorful enough, Bob. And besides, this is a New Deal era with no spots open for a corporation counsel." They also told him that, despite the fact he was the son of a former President, his name was scarcely known even in Ohio, where he had led a retiring sort of life.

But Taft ran anyway. Where before he had been shy and retiring, he suddenly became verbose, discovered that he had a tongue in his head, and during that first walloping, two-fisted campaign, he pulled no punches, traveled some thirty thousand miles to speak to anyone willing to listen and won the primaries in a walk. After that, employing the same tactics, he went on to defeat the Roosevelt-endorsed Senator Bulkley by a majority that amazed even the inexpressive Mr. Taft. After that, there was no stopping him. On the floor of the Senate and in the countless speaking engagements he has filled in the past year or so, Mr. Taft has demonstrated that he not only has learned that he has a tongue but he knows what God gave it to him for.

So Robert Alphonso Taft has talked himself from obscurity to the forefront of Republican Presidential possibilities for 1940. And this is an amazing feat. Most candidates who start talking so early in the campaign—and manage to say something—usually find themselves relegated to a back seat long before now. Oddly enough, Taft seems to be talking himself—if not into the Presidency, at least to within shooting distance of it. And he's ignored every rule of good political strategy in doing it.

In the first place, a new Senator is expected to sit silently—and somewhat reverently—in his seat and listen to his elders. But Taft made it a point to rise to his feet and speak whenever he felt he had something to say. It didn't matter that his delivery was poor, that he spoke not in the round, sonorous phrases of the orator. When Taft rose to his feet, he definitely told what he thought and how he stood about the point under discussion. He has constantly refused to perch on the fence, and never has a self-avowed candidate for the Presidency so completely put himself on record about the issues in an approaching campaign as has this amazing young newcomer to the national scene. He has been voluble and, more, he has said something that voters and opponents can, afterward, lay their finger on and point out. This policy would be, for a less sincere person, political suicide, but for Robert Taft it has proved an open sesame to success.

There are other reasons, too, for his quick rise to prominence in national politics. There is—in spite of his intimate friends—a certain magic in the name of Taft. The elder Taft, while not

a startling success as a White House occupant, is still pleasantly recalled. He presided at a time when people were prosperous and happy and he is associated now, when things are not so prosperous, with that era. And upon his defeat for re-election, he did come back to become one of the really great Chief Justices of our Supreme Court. There is a magic, too, in the Buckeye state with its large vote and variability between Republican and Democratic ranks, and the fact that most of the Republican Presidents of recent years have come from Ohio bears this out. But these are only minor factors in Taft's rise in Republican ranks.

A more unusual candidate for office has never made his appearance on the national scene. Robert Taft was an undergraduate at Yale when his father occupied the White House and, already a shy youth, the prominence of his father's position drove him deeper into his shell of reticence.

"I had a deathly fear that I would be accepted because of my father and not for myself," he admits now. And

this unexpressed but ever-present fear made him an honor student. Both at Yale and, later, in the Harvard Law School, he studied hard and planned his career carefully so that he might succeed in his own right and in his own work by his own efforts.

Graduating Harvard, he returned to Cincinnati to practise law, and over a long period built up a comfortable practise in corporation law. During this period, while building his practise and rearing his family—he has four sons—he kept his eyes away from the field of politics. Shortly after his graduation, he was married to Martha Bowers, daughter of Lloyd W. Bowers, solicitor general under the elder Taft. This marriage is easily the second most important factor in his political rise, for Martha is everything that Robert is not—witty, affable, charming, personable. During his campaign for the Senate, Martha's campaigning cannot be ignored. She traveled fully as far as he did, speaking almost as often and easily more effectively.

Neither of the Tafts is politically am-

bitious, but both Martha and Bob—and that's how voters of Ohio came to think of them during the last campaign, as "Martha and Bob"—feel that it is his logical duty to bring his ideas and philosophy before the people for their betterment. Otherwise, their lives are full and rather complete in their family and their present comfortable way of living on a sixty-acre farm near Cincinnati. This probably accounts for his frank and open way of addressing public groups—this belief that what he has to say must be said for the good of the people.

Actually, his political views are nothing more nor less than an old-fashioned Republicanism with a painful and rather stiff bow to a few of the New Deal agencies and policies he recognizes as good. But even there, he assails their administration, pointing out that Republicans are notoriously better administrators than Democrats, with a grand disregard for the Harding administration.

Taft has gone merrily on his way from obscurity to the foremost ranks of Republicanism on what, in any other candidate, would have been considered the rankest political errors and ineptitude. To his credit thus far have been such goings-on as his condemnation of corn loans in an Iowa speech the very day after the Department of Agriculture loosed \$70,000,000 worth of such corn loans in Iowa. You begin to wonder why he hasn't been tarred and feathered before this, but instead, his political star continues to rise.

Recently the President offered Mr. Taft a prize if he could point out a way to balance the budget. Mr. Taft used that offer in a Chicago speech to reply that Mr. Roosevelt, in making such an offer, admitted his own inability to get the job done. He then went on to enunciate five points for balancing the budget, all of which really boiled down to one—pruning the Federal payroll and abolishing Federal aid; to turning relief back to the states. Ordinarily, a man who promises to shoot Santa Claus can hardly expect to get first base. But the unusual Mr. Taft not only expects to get to first but expects to get home as well. The odd thing about him—and the thing that makes him a man to watch in 1940—is that he might turn the trick.

You see, Bob Taft is unpredictable. He'll tell you, "I haven't any color. You won't find me exciting." He's heavily bespectacled with blue eyes that have no sign of humor in them. He's not the jovial, lovable character his father was. But Bob Taft is wrong. Bob Taft is exciting. More than that, he has made old-line Republicanism exciting. I suggest that anyone who can do that is not only a definite threat in any man's political campaign. He's a downright magician.

### AUSTRALIA BROADCASTS TO THE WORLD

THE first short-wave world broadcasting service ever to be undertaken by a British Dominion has just been introduced by the Australian Broadcasting Commission. Designed to cover all parts of the world, the new service is divided into nine transmission periods each day. Special broadcasts for North America are made as follows: From 6 to 7 a.m. CST, directed towards eastern United States (talk in English at 6:30 a.m. CST), and from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m. CST, directed towards western United States (talk in English at 10 a.m. CST), over VLQ (9.615) at Sydney, East Australia. These programs are being well received throughout North America, except for occasional severe interference from TIPG (9.62), San Jose, Costa Rica, which is only five kilocycles away from the Australian station. VLQ (9.615), at the high-frequency side of the 31-meter band, is not hard to locate on the dial, as all announcements are in English and program material is similar to that used over the London stations. Australian transmissions for other parts of the world and sometimes received in the United States are as follows: From 1 to 3 a.m. CST, directed towards northern Europe, over VLQ (9.615); from 1:30 to 2:30 a.m. CST, directed towards southern Europe and northern Africa, over VLQ2 (11.87) at Sydney; from 5:30 to 6 a.m. CST, directed to-

wards South America, over VLQ (9.615); from 7:15 to 7:45 a.m. CST, directed towards India, over VLQ (9.615); from 8 to 8:30 a.m. CST, directed towards the Dutch East Indies, over VLR (9.58) at Melbourne, East Australia; from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. CST, directed towards Africa, over VLW3 (11.83) at Perth, West Australia, and from 5:35 to 6 p.m. CST, directed towards Japan and the Philippines, over VLR3 (11.88) at Melbourne. Reports from listeners will be welcomed by the Australian Broadcasting Commission at 264 Pitt Street, Sydney, N. S. W., Australia . . . The new short-wave station at Perth, West Australia, broadcasting at present on a frequency of 9.645 megs, using the call VLW2, is being very well heard throughout North America, up to its sign-off, weekdays at 9:30 a.m. CST, Sundays at 8:30 a.m. CST. Reception reports should be sent to Chief Engineer, G. P. O., Perth, West Australia . . . The remaining Australian short-wave station, at Melbourne, broadcasts as VLR (9.58), daily from 1:30 to 8 a.m. CST and as VLR3 (11.88), from 2:30 p.m. to 1:15 a.m. CST. Other stations such as VK2ME, Sydney; VK3ME, Melbourne, and VK6ME, Perth, famous in years past, were operated under experimental licenses by Amalgamated Wireless, Ltd., of Australia, and closed down at the beginning of the war last fall.

**SPECIAL BROADCAST FROM ETHIOPIA THRILLS LISTENERS:** The International DX'ers Alliance special broadcast from Addis Ababa, Sunday, January 21, from 4 to 4:30 p.m. CST, over 12AA (9.65), was heard with remarkable signal strength and clarity. The program opened with chirping of birds, tolling of church bells and the playing of the Fascist anthems, which usher in all Italian broadcasts. Then followed greetings to short-wave listeners in the United States; the singing of the Ethiopian Song of Honor by a native chorus, to the accompaniment of tom-toms; an interesting talk by American journalist Duncan C. Henry; a hair-raising tribal ceremonial dance selection accompanied by wild chanting; weird native music, rising and falling in volume, punctuated by the beat of tom-toms of varying pitch, working up into one grand climax of fury, then sudden stillness; and concluded by a short talk by Mayor Boidi of Addis Ababa.



## Person-to-Person . . .

Teachers using radio in their classrooms will be interested to learn of a new educational series recently launched over NBC in cooperation with the Field Museum of Natural History and University Broadcasting Council. The series, titled "How Do You Know?" presents questions regarding scientific facts and theories which are answered in turn by summaries of the evidence obtained from research by members of the Field Museum staff and other scientists. With NBC's Judith Waller and UBC's Allen Miller supervising the presentation of the series and with the Field Museum contributing the scientific data upon which the programs are based, the success of this series is very promising. Texts will be made available in published form by the Columbia University Press.

Those who listened to the experimental run of the University of Chicago's "The Human Adventure" series last summer will note a number of significant changes in the form of the programs when the series returns to the air over CBS on February 3. One important change, that coincides interestingly with similar changes in the commercial field, is the reduction in the length of the show from one hour to thirty minutes. This will enable the producers of this series to maintain the tempo and tone of the show, permitting the action to move more rapidly. Another change that others who produce educational programs should note is the decision to devote each broadcast to a single subject, limiting the episodes dramatizing the subject to two on each broadcast. The emphasis in the re-

vamped plans for this series is on human interest, using a more personal approach to the men who solve the problems of research. Brewster Morgan, who will be remembered as the producer of Columbia's memorable "Shakespeare Cycle" a few seasons back, will direct the presentation, with Sherman Dryer, University of Chicago radio director, collaborating.

Word comes from W. W. Charters that the dates April 29-30 and May 1 have been selected for the eleventh annual meeting of the Institute for Education by Radio.

Luella Hoskins, George Jennings and O. J. Neuwerth, members of the Chicago Board of Education's Radio Council staff, are conducting credit courses in various phases of radio at Lewis Institute (Chicago). Miss Hoskins is conducting a course in radio in education, Mr. Jennings has a class in radio writing, and Mr. Neuwerth is instructing a group in production and rehearsal of radio programs.











Into such a dressing-room—Joe Louis' after the second Schmeling bout—struggled Bill Stern with a microphone. As he fought his way towards the Brown Bomber, at the far corner of the room, he kept up a stream of talk for his listeners. He told them of his progress, described the mad scene, promised them an interview with the winner. But when he was within ten feet of where the Bomber sat, he came to a sudden halt. He thought someone had stepped on his lead wire. But no. He didn't have enough wire to reach Joe—and the champ wouldn't come to him!

One of the classic post-fight statements was never broadcast. It was Jack Dempsey's honey given his wife when she asked him "How come?" after the second Tunney fight. Jack's brief answer was, "Honey, I forgot to duck." But Max Baer—on a Coast-to-Coast network—topped Jack's high with his famous "I'm glad Braddock won because Jimmy has to face his kids and I don't know where mine are!" Most post-fight statements, however, don't mean a

thing. The fellow who first said, "Hello, Ma, I'll be right home," has had too many imitators, as has Joe Jacobs with his "We was robbed" line.

With all these headaches, however, the sports announcer wouldn't really trade places with anyone. They love their work—headaches and all. And Bill Stern, for one, is thankful that he gets more fights to cover than wrestling-matches. A wrestler was once dumped out of the ring and onto Bill's lap, which infuriated him no end. Before climbing back into the ring, he reached for the nearest object to use as a cudgel on his opponent who had treated him so roughly.

It happened to be Bill's microphone! With one glorious swoop of his brawny hand the wrestler snatched the microphone from its socket and, with the wires dangling in midair, started for his adversary. For Bill, it was just another headache.
