

He just sort of looks at me sorry and says: Sounds, if you're going to amount to anything in radio, you've got to use your head. Radio has a great future, he says. Let's hear the rain effect.

Then I turn on the rain-machine and he says, sadlike: Listen, Sounds! I want a rainstorm. I don't want it to sound like piddling against the wind.

So I dump another scoop of barley in the rain-machine and turn the handle and the barley pours down on the piece of tin. And Mister Sweet says: Sounds, do you know what that sounds like? I say: Rain. And he says: Nuts! It sounds like barley dumped on a piece of tin. What do you think the sponsor will say?

That's all anybody wants to know. What do you think the sponsor will say? Having auditions for sponsors is what stunted my growth. This is the way auditions are fixed:

The salesman goes and sees Mr. Wise; he's the advertising agent for Sweet Wheat Mush. He says: Look, Mr. Wise. I know you've got confidence in me, and I want you to believe me when I say Sweet Wheat Mush ought to be on the air, and we've got just the program for you. Mr. Wise says: What is it? And the salesman says: Look! It's a humdinger! It's a wow! It'll lay you in the aisle.

Mr. Wise says: Sure, but what is it?

And the salesman says: The biggest thing we've ever had up our sleeve. Crossley rating in the upper brackets. We've got all the oil-companies fighting for it, but I said: No! Nothing doing! It's a natural for Sweet Wheat Mush and nobody but Sweet Wheat Mush is going to get it.

Sure, sure, Mr. Wise says. But what's the idea?

The salesman says: Well, Mr. Wise, I'm not going to tell you the idea. I'm going to ask you to have confidence in me and let me put on the audition without telling you a thing about it. It's a surprise and I don't want to spoil the punch by telling you ahead of time.

Wise says: I suppose you've got Charlie McCarthy tied up?

And the salesman says: Mr. Wise, I want you to believe me when I tell you if we had Charlie McCarthy and Orson Welles doing an original script by Dorothy Parker with music by Noel Coward it wouldn't touch this idea. Do I get a chance to show you the audition?

They talk some more and don't say anything, and then Wise says: Okay, lad. Put on your audition. But don't pull another dud. Remember the time you made me listen to the Laramie Cowboy Four telling how they ate

Sweet Wheat Mush every morning before they rode the range.

So all the salesman says is: Leave it to me. Just leave it to me.

Then he goes to the head of the sales department and tells him the Sweet Wheat Mush folks want an audition; they don't care what it is as long as it sells mush.

The head of the sales department has a conference with the station-manager, and the station-manager has a conference with the program-director, and the program-director presses a buzzer and in comes the production-manager, and the program-director tells the production-manager, because the production-manager isn't allowed to talk to a salesman or vice versa.

The production-manager says: How about the Laramie Cowboy Four, and everybody jumps up and begins pounding the desk and the production-manager says: Well, I only meant . . .! And the station-manager says: For God's sake, give!

So he gets three ideas for "westerns," and the lad who's buying dinners for Little Lolly Lee, the Sweet Singer of Radio, suggests Little Lolly Lee and the organ in a program of old-fashioned songs to be called "Twilight Reveries." And that doesn't click, because twilight is a bad slant for breakfast food. So the production-manager tells the department they're a lot of nitwits and can't he get any cooperation from anybody, and then he sets up an audition of the Laramie Four and changes their names to the Voices of the Wheat Fields.

Mr. Wise listens to the audition and gets mad and then goes to sleep after the first song and makes up his mind to stick to outdoor advertising.

Mr. Sweet's the director in charge of dramatic production. He isn't like the brass hats; he takes an interest in me. Says I've got to have ambition to get places and just wait till we have television; then you watch where radio drama goes.

HE SAYS: Understand this, Sounds.

When television comes in, talent auditions will be different than they are now. You won't be herding a bunch of nitwits into a studio and piping their voices downstairs to the conference-room. No, you'll be watching for faces with looks and faces with character. And believe you me, when you have a baby crying in some man's family show it'll not be a forty-year-old fat-faced dame crying into a hunk of cotton-batting.

And another thing. You'll not be able to crash television without you've got something behind you besides a broad beam. Like take the gal who came up for an audition last Friday. Mr. Sweet said to her friendly:

Have you had any stage experience?

And she said: Unh unh.
Mr. Sweet said: Any radio experience?


And she said: Unh unh.
So he says: Well, I suppose at one time you played a lead in your high-school dramatic club?

And all she says is: Unh unh.
So Mr. Sweet said: Jeepers creepers,

then what in the hell are you doing here wanting a audition?


And she said: Well, my boy friend says I have a elegant speaking voice. Especially on the telephone.

That'll all be out, Mr. Sweet says, when television comes in. And more than that. These people who have idiocyn, who have screwy habits when

Get it? You'd hardly hear the hoof-beats. And if you can't get a soft sound out of coconut shells, go out and buy a couple of water-closet plungers.

That's the kind of thing that gets me in radio. I'll be down on my hands and knees on the studio floor, beating hell out of a couple of water-closet plungers, and some pretty girl comes up to the studio window and looks at me and laughs. But it's worse when Mr. Sweet says: Don't beat them on the floor; beat them on your chest.

Mr. Sweet says: You think you've got troubles, Sounds. Well, you should have my troubles. Females writing dramas that stink. Don't know as much about writing radio dialog as Shakespeare knew about writing for Hollywood.

Then I ask Mr. Sweet when we're going to have television, and he says: Well, Sounds, it's just like I've been saying for the past fifteen years: It'll be another five years before television really gets here.

That shows you how reasonable Mr. Sweet is. I only saw him get real mad at me once. That was the time he called me into the sound-effects room and said: What do you think of that, Sounds?

It was a great big thing, about six foot by four foot with a million iron wheels in it. And iron arms coming out of it. It looked like a Rube Goldberg invention. So I said: What is it? And he said: Don't ask questions. Help me set it up in the studio and then you can go in the hall and listen to the loudspeaker and tell me what you think.

So we set it up and Mr. Sweet plugged three electric plugs into electric outlets and I went out in the hall and listened. It sounded swell. Then Mr. Sweet came out and said: There you are, Sounds. What's it sound like?

I said: It sounds like a riveting-gun on a steel girder.

And he said: That's what you call art, Son. That's what it's meant to be. The noise of a riveting-gun. That contraption cost seventy-six dollars to build.

Well, the story isn't finished. The next day I said: Look, Mr. Sweet, I've got a sound-effect I'd like you to listen to. Would you go out in the hall and I'll set it up in the studio. So he says: I'm glad to see you using some initiative, Sounds. And he went out in the hall and I turned on the effect. And then I went out to him and he said: That's perfect. That sounds even more like a riveting-gun than my invention. How'd you do it?

And I said: I rented a riveting-gun for fifty cents and worked it against a piece of steel girder.

Well, that was the time he got mad. He called me a dirty little so-and-so and said a lot of things about my mother

and left my father out of it altogether, and I said: What's wrong?

And he said: Wrong! How in blazes do you expect me to get requisitions to build sound-effects if you go doing things like that. What are you trying to do: make a fool of the department?

Then he was sorry and patted me on the back and said: Sounds, don't forget the sound-effects department has a responsibility. Why, where do you think radio drama would be without sound-effects. In fact, where would radio be without sound-effects?

I got a sneaking hunch he's right there. But then, take the directors. They say: It's the production staff that makes radio. Without directors to build the programs and time them and rehearse them, there'd be no radio.

And the announcers say: Oh, yes? Well, you directors can do all the building and timing and rehearsing you want. But it's the announcer who puts the program on the air and don't you ever forget.

And the musicians and singers and actors give the whole kaboodle the laugh and say: I suppose you bohunks think there'd be programs to announce or direct without artists.

AND all the time there's a screwball standing in the background with a dirty laugh on his face. He's the technician. The technician says: When you guys get all through talking you can just get an earful of this: The technician is the beginning and the middle and the end. We put you on the air and we take you off the air and without us on the controls there'd be no air. And what's more, we can make Annie Glutz sound like a canary and we can make Lawrence Tibbett smell.

Well, since the time I pulled the riveting-gun stunt, I've did what I was told to do and haven't done any experimenting. But believe me, I could save the department a lot of money. Like what's the use of getting a complicated piece of machinery to make a noise like a grass fire when I can get just as good an effect by yanking off about three yards of wrapping-paper and rumpling it around at the mike.

And Mr. Sweet says: Don't you start in, Sounds. That's the trouble with radio. Everybody trying to save money. If they'd really save, I wouldn't say. But they argue whether they'll pay a staff artist four dollars extra to air two extra programs in a week and then they'll turn right around and pay some Hollywood glamour gal four thousand dollars to read ten lines in a drama. And they may be good on the films but they're lousy on radio, where you can't see them.

Sometimes I get discouraged. Sometimes I think I'd be better off in the stock-and-bond business.

they're broadcasting—they'll be out, too. Like the gal who always held her script in one hand and scratched her neck with the other while she was at the mike. And like Nelson Eddy, who holds onto his ear while he's singing so he can hear himself better—there isn't going to be any of that.

Well, that's the kind of talking Mr.

Sweet dishes out to, what he says, guide me on my way. Then two minutes later he'll be looking like he had cramps from eating chow-mein, and he'll say: Sounds, these horses' hoofs sound like they're running on a cement sidewalk. The horses are supposed to be running on the range and I don't mean the kitchen range. Soft ground!

NEW YORK.—Matrimonial intentions of two of the Andrews Sisters is believed to have caused the recent trouble in the Andrews family. On Tuesday, January 30, the father of the famous swing trio was taken into custody by New York police when a gun was found in his possession in a West 45th Street hotel. Accounts of how police heard of the gun, and a threat alleged to have been made by Andrews on the girls' lives, differ widely. Most common belief is that Patty and Maxene announced their intentions on the previous Sunday night of marrying Vic Schoen and Lou Levy respectively—Schoen being their arranger, Levy their manager. Mr. Andrews, a Greek Orthodox, had objected to the marriages on religious grounds and had supposedly threatened their lives. Result: Patty and Maxene walked out in a huff, Mr. Andrews landed in jail, Mrs. Olga Andrews appeared in night court and posted \$500 bond for his release. The Andrews Sisters are featured now on Glenn Miller's CBS programs.

Though "Ellen Randolph" is the story of a minister and his wife, and the old-time serial "Chandu" was a Hindu mysticism, the two shows have four personalities in common: The author, Vera Olaham; the director, Cyril Armbrister; and two actors, Bob Regent and Lindsay MacHarrie.

the silent films to "Cross Roads"; Barbara Weeks becomes the voice of the sponsor on "Good Will Hour."

Remember Elaine Barrie of John Barrymore fame? Well, she's the vampire you hear once in a while on NBC's "One of the Finest" serial dramas. The director says she's about the best vampire he's ever had. Carleton Young has left the role of "Tom Quinn" in this show and has been replaced by Leif Ericson, husband of Frances Farmer of the screen.

Ronald Liss, "Tiny Tim" of "Hilltop House," last week was called to Washington to appear in "Big Town" and make an appearance at the President's Birthday Ball for the benefit of crippled children. The character "Tiny Tim" is that of a cripple!

Agnes Moorehead is doing a double-feature bill—stooging for Tommy Riggs on Mondays and playing "Mrs. Polard" on "Big Sister" Mondays through Fridays.

Information, Please?

We were inquiring into a few of the habits of Oscar Levant, problem child of NBC's "Information, Please." Here's the information we gleaned: O. L. goes to bed at 5 a.m. and arises at noon; drinks from twenty to thirty cups of coffee daily; drinks no hard liquor at all; uses sleeping-tablets nightly; never bothers about having his clothes pressed; is a nut about baseball; dislikes posing for pictures.

Attention, Wyoming!

According to John ("Strange As It Seems") Hix, all the citizens of Wyoming would today be living in Cheyenne if the Congress of 1865 could have pronounced the name. In that year a bill was introduced to establish a territorial government in what is now Wyoming, but the sponsors of the bill wanted to call it "Cheyenne" so the bill was shelved and remained shelved until 1865, when the territory was officially organized and then received its present name—apparently because the solons could handle the name then without difficulty.

Radio Headaches

Comes the Federal Communications Commission with a list of complaints reaching it. Most of these complaints, say the FCC, were dismissed as frivolous, unsubstantiated or not warranting investigation. Here are some of 'em: Sixty-nine complaints of censorship, denial of free speech and refusal to broadcast particular programs. Only two were investigated. Six hundred and twenty-five complaints against the Orson Welles Mars scare. A general investigation brought a mild reproof. Forty-nine complaints against Fred Allen. None was investigated. Ninety-three complaints of obscene, indecent or profane language. Sixty-seven were investigated. Of complaints of medical programs, fifty-five were closed after investigation, nine were later set for hearing and closed, and one is still

pending. Fifty-two complaints of general inferiority and excessive advertising. Forty-six were dismissed. Then there was a lot of "fan mail," typical of which were the 21,118 letters received during a fifteen-day period beginning January 16, 1939, and concerning broadcasts of the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin.

Her Memory Lives

Elizabeth Craig McBride died January 16, in Winter Park, Florida. To the many listeners of Mary Margaret McBride (also known on the air as Martha Deane), this news means the loss of a friend. For Miss McBride often took her listeners into her confidence and told stories about her mother so that many women of the United States came to know the elder lady as well as her famed daughter.

Mrs. McBride was a true pioneer American mother. The daughter of a Baptist minister, she fell in love with Thomas McBride at a county fair, where he drove a pair of high-stepping horses and "paid pretty compliments to all the ladies." They settled on a Missouri farm, where she gave life to four babies. She made butter in an old wooden churn, and rendered lard from hog meat over an open fire. She canned enough fruits and vegetables in the summers to run the family through the winters.

She called Mary Margaret "Sister," and "Sister" adored her. Death came in the home that Sister prepared for Mother in the Florida sunshine. Sister hurriedly flew to the scene on Tuesday, attended the funeral on Wednesday, and on Thursday was again at her microphone in New York. Mother would have wanted it that way.

Skunks and Talking Cows

Anything can happen these days in the studios. In the last five weeks, "Hobby Lobby" has paraded to the mike such items as a seal, several snakes, a cow and an albino skunk. (What a swell spot to make a crack about program odors!) The story we like is about that cow. When Elsie, Borden's oomph cow, was being unloaded, bystanders almost passed out when they heard Elsie speak, and plainly. She instructed her handlers to place the ramp just so, told them to hurrah, as she was getting cold, howled for another blanket and then, as she walked down the ramp, bowed and greeted folk with a sprinkling of hellos. Before she disappeared into the stage door, Elsie paused to say, "Bring the car back in a half-hour, boys." And as

Elsie went through the door, a grinning bystander followed. He was Isaac Tenenbaum, Louisville clothier, another "Hobby Lobby" guest who was to demonstrate his hobby—ventriloquism.

Believe It or Not

Now that Robert Ripley is to return to the air (10:30 p.m. EST Fridays starting February 16 via CBS), it is appropriate to point out that Bob is the biggest "Believe It or Not" of all. He ought to be in his own cartoons—which he draws upside down, mostly—for he's an amazing fellow. He owns five cars, yet has never learned to drive; but he has piloted a plane! He has made more trips to several foreign countries than he has to his own New York office, preferring to work at home. And here's what happened on his most recent trip to Yucatan: A year ago Ripley was passing through Panama on his way back to New York. In Cristobal he bumped right into B. A. Rolfe, orchestra-leader. Rolfe was homeward bound on a Caribbean cruise and he and Bob rol-

Virginia Lang represents the advertising agency on the "Court of Missing Heirs" show, making last-minute script corrections. Beth Howard casts "Manhattan Mother" and about a dozen other shows. Florence Spurlin is responsible for casting "Against the Storm." Bob Crosby's personal affairs are handled by Paula O'Brien, and

Eleanora Goodfellow serves as buffer for Tommy Riggs. Bob Trout's wife, Kit, looks after his financial interests, and Lanny Ross' wife, Olive, is his backstage public relations counsel, while Reggie Morgan supervises Lanny's scripts. Lillian Lowans sits in on all "Your Family and Mine" broadcasts as author of the commercials. Elaine Sterne Carrington authors "Pepper Young's Family." "Hilltop House" is the brainchild of two young women. Edith Meiser authors "Sherlock Holmes" and Ben Grauer's new quiz show, "What Would You Have Done?" There are many more.

Chatter

Anne S. Hummert, outstanding radio writer and producer, and vice-president of Blackett-Sample-Hummert, Inc., has been chosen by Durward Howes as one of the nation's ten outstanding women in his biographical dictionary, "American Women" . . . On Thursday, February 15, Lanny Ross will give the semi-classical winner of RADIO GUIDE's National Song Search its air premiere. The song is "I Walked in Your Little Garden," and James Carlton Balfour of Kansas City, Missouri, wrote the music to Nancy L. Lingle's words.

On February 1 from New York harbor sailed nineteen men and a woman in a three-masted schooner with sails to the southward. The second Fahnestock expedition was under way. 

DEAR DAUGHTER

Here is what Sam of "Bachelor's Children" wrote to his new baby

THE young man looked yearningly through the heavy glass of the nursery window. Within, he saw row after row of bassinets; there were red faces and wrinkled faces and faces plump with sleep, and then there was a nurse lifting one tiny body from its crib and bringing it toward the window.

Sam Ryder, who is one of the "Bachelor's Children" cast, watched every movement. He pressed his nose close to the pane. His lips made baby-talk and a chuckle of deep contentment rolled through them. His baby's face was still deeply pink. Her eyes were closed, but one chubby hand was spread fanwise across the pink blanket and some movement of the nurse caused it to appear to wave directly toward Sam Ryder. The man's heart swelled with awed delight. So this was fatherhood? So this was how it felt to reproduce one's own kind? He felt very humble and very honest, suddenly aware of a great many intimate and important things.

Cold type cannot convey the warmth of a dramatic situation fired by the richness of an actor's voice. So these type lines are probably a chill preamble to the letter which Sam Ryder wrote that day to his one-half-hour-old daughter. That letter, as read on the air recently, bids fair to become a radio classic. It climaxes what has been one of broadcasting's most interesting serials.

"Bachelor's Children" started four years ago with a stimulating idea behind it. That idea was that Doctor Bob Graham should find himself called upon to make good his promise to his former wartime top sergeant to take care of the latter's twin daughters. Sending for the twins, he learns they are beautiful and young, just eighteen,

and full of love and mischief.

In the past three years one of the twins has married Doctor Bob. The other, Janet, has married Sam Ryder, an insurance salesman. Janet and Sam's new baby was born on Christmas day.

We present, at the request of many readers, a copy of Sam's letter written to his first-born. We present it as a tribute to Bess Flynn, who has written "Bachelor's Children" since the beginning, and as a document of such great interest and potential good we believe every father and mother should read it and share again the precious unity of those first moments of parenthood.

Here it is:

"My beloved little daughter: I've only seen you once, and that was a half-hour ago—through a glass window—when the nurse held you up for me to see. You'll never know just how I

felt when I looked at you wrapped in that blanket with your tiny little fist pressed against your small face. My daughter—a miracle that I had had a part in bringing into being. Yesterday—or was it today?—time seems such an eternity when you're waiting—I almost wished you weren't coming to us, since you were causing your mother so much suffering. But now that you're here, and your mother is going to be all right, all that feeling is gone! I'm in her room with her now—and she's sleeping. We owe her a lot, little daughter, for all she's been through for us—and no matter how much love we give her in the years to come—it won't be enough.

"All these long months I've been waiting for you, I've been wondering just what it would feel like—to be a father. What I would think—what I would say—and now that you're here

I can only wonder why I, so undeserving, should be so blessed. I wish so many things for you as you stand on the threshold of life. That I were more worthy to be your father—that my life had been a finer thing than it has been so far—that I might have a greater wisdom to guide your little feet as they walk the path of life.

"I never realized till now just what a responsibility it is—this being a father. Some day, when you're older, I'll be writing you other letters, no doubt. But some way I feel that in none of those letters will I be able to open my soul to you as I am now. You see, darling, while I waited those long hours for you to get here—wondering if your mother was going to pull through—I learned a great many things—things that, even as much as I love her, I can never tell your mother. But you, so newly come from God, will understand the things I want to say—even though I can't put them into words. Perhaps never again will I be able to drop all reserve and see myself and life and its meaning as clearly as I do now.

"I think, while your mother still sleeps, I'm going back to the nursery and ask them to show you to me again. Only in that way can I reassure myself that you are really here—that it isn't all a dream from which I will presently awaken. I'm going to save this letter, and some day maybe I'll show it to you. I love you very much."

SPELLBINDER for an ELEPHANT

Meet G. O. P. glamour boy Tom Dewey. His hat is in the ring

WHEN Thomas E. Dewey embarked on his current speaking campaign which will carry him from one end of the country to the other and end—he hopes—in the White House, Democrats were quick to point out that "Mr. Dewey had tossed his diapers in the ring." It was a popular way of intimating that Mr. Dewey was much too young for the job. Then they went on to ask, "What has Mr. Dewey done? How does he stand on national affairs? Surely, conviction of a bunch of racketeers in New York doesn't prove he's Presidential timber."

Republicans, on the other hand, haven't been quick to answer these queries. But in the back of every Republican's mind Mr. Dewey has etched certain ineradicable memories. Republicans remember that he came so close to defeating Lehman for the governorship of New York last year that, in a Presidential election, he could easily deliver that state's electoral vote, without which Republicans cannot hope to win. Also, they are aware that Dewey, handsome, witty, with a charming manner and a splendid speaking voice, would be the type of spellbinder the G. O. P. has sorely lacked in recent years as an antidote to Roosevelt.

In fact, there's more to this youthful New York prosecutor than meets the eye, and not the least of his assets is an ability to deliver votes through a popular grip upon public imagination few other likely candidates in his party possess. This alone makes him a man to watch. Neither can his vigorous prosecution of the lords of vice and corruption in New York City be lightly passed over, for they demonstrated that he is not only an idealist but an idealist tinged with the most practical type of realism and possessed of executive ability of great proportions.

Dewey's prosecution of the Jimmy

Hines case, and his eventual jailing of the powerful Tammany leader who had done everything within his power to block Dewey's appointment as special prosecutor for New York County, proved the real stepping-off point for his Presidential race. Here he bared the close affiliation of a powerful political leader with the underworld in a fearless prosecution that focused the eyes of America upon him. But it was to his prosecution of Waxey Gordon that Dewey owes most.

Waxey Gordon headed a gigantic beer-distributing syndicate which had operated for years with seeming impunity. Tom Dewey was a young assistant U. S. attorney who had come out of his home town of Owosso, Michigan, but a few years before to study law at Columbia, and there were those in the courtroom that day in 1933 who felt sorry for the young attorney. He was matching his inexperienced hand against one of the most powerful racketeers in the city, and it seemed rather a hopeless case. No one could succeed in bringing Waxey to heel, seemingly.

But Mr. Dewey had brought more into the courtroom than youthful zeal. He brought a carefully prepared case with witnesses to rebut Waxey's every contention. For example, Dewey and his aids had traced more than a hundred thousand telephone calls in gathering evidence. They had spent months

going through books seized suddenly and before they could be destroyed. Mr. Gordon was easily convicted. But he was convicted of income-tax evasion, and it hurt Mr. Dewey to feel that the Government must ignore the real crime in order to get convictions.

After that, Dewey cases specifically charged offenders with the actual crime they committed. Older attorneys told him he was unwise, that he couldn't make the cases stick, that he couldn't even get witnesses who would dare testify against the powerful underworld leaders he sought to convict. Mr. Dewey proved they were wrong by the simple process of protecting witnesses. If a witness were important, the young prosecutor gathered him—with others—in houses carefully guarded against "accidents." And he gathered both witnesses and data by swooping raids, carefully planned with picked men and executed without a leak. Most famous of the Dewey raids was when he was preparing his case against Hines. Scattered throughout Harlem were several hundred selected officers. At a signal from Dewey, they struck a swift, sudden blow at hundreds of "numbers" headquarters, gathering small book-makers and records before they could be destroyed.

Later, as special prosecutor for New York County, he continued his crusade, placed crime and vice on the defensive,

shattered the political set-up which had given to criminals the protection they needed to operate. And this is no small achievement. Theodore Roosevelt's rise to fame and the Presidency was remarkably similar.

Unlike his father, who edited a weekly newspaper, Tom Dewey was destined to make headlines rather than write them, and with Theodore Roosevelt as his idol, he studied at the University of Michigan and Columbia Law School. Shortly after his graduation from Columbia, he became assistant U. S. district attorney in New York and, in 1935, was appointed special prosecutor for New York County following a grand-jury investigation into vice, which opened the public's eye. Dewey's fearlessness, coupled with a practical ability to get convictions, caused Governor Lehman to name him after more widely known attorneys stepped aside to permit his appointment.

The Deweys—he's married to Frances Hutt, a young concert-singer whom he met while studying voice in Chicago—live in a pleasant eight-room apartment overlooking Central Park at Ninety-sixth Street. There are two sons—Thomas, seven, and John Martin, four. Mrs. Dewey will tell you that Thomas only sleeps there, for this business of being prosecutor for New York City isn't handled in jigtime. Dewey's day usually starts at 8:30 a.m., ends at 7:30 p.m. Regardless of what goes on, they always spend Saturday evenings together. It's an old ritual. Usually it's a quiet evening of bridge or music with a few friends in.

At the age of thirty-eight—just three years above the Constitutional minimum age set up for the Presidency—Thomas E. Dewey has become something of a barometer of Republican prospects in the approaching campaign. His campaign for nomination by his party is expected to prosper in proportion to Republican estimates of their chances of winning. If, as the time for the convention approaches, G. O. P. outlook is good, Dewey will probably be shelved for a more experienced nominee.

If, on the other hand, the G. O. P. cause looks like a lost one, Dewey's chances will soar skyward. After all, Republicans—as well as Democrats—know what goes on in the land, and if they would quench the fire which is President Roosevelt in a political campaign, they're smart enough to know that they can't do it with a wet blanket.

Well, Dewey's no wet blanket.

FORECAST

GUESTING while Toscanini still vacations, Bruno Walter conducts the first of his five concerts with the NBC Orchestra. Two new young American writers have premieres by the League of Composers. The New Friends of Music present the four seldom-heard "Serious Songs" by Brahms, sung by the grandly gifted contralto, Enid Szantho. Jan Peerce and Henrietta Schumann add to the luster of the exceptionally engaging matinee of "Radio City Music Hall of the Air," under the stimulative Erno Rapee.

of performance by the famed and fine Stradivarius Quartet, all playing instruments made by that fashioner.

Quincy Porter (born New Haven, Conn., 1897) and Walter Piston (born Rockland, Me., 1894) are the best known of the present four and have employed many of the larger forms of composition. A pupil of d'Indy and Bloch, among others, Porter is understandably modern in thought and feeling, and possesses high adeptness both in solo and ensemble writing. The No. 6 quartet dates from 1936.

Piston's Concertino for piano and orchestra has been on the air successfully and perhaps his second quartet (1935) may bring him further favor with the dialers. He was, by the way, one of the first six Americans to be

templative, but nevertheless strongly expressive. The following slow section has melancholic spirit, ending with glorious affirmation. In the lively third part, scherzo, we seem to hear a description of the hunt, with fanfares and gay excitement. The finale brings the return of some of the material previously heard, added to which there are some new themes. The whole movement breathes uplift and exaltation. Let Beethoven and Mozart sound their familiar and always compelling voices without any fresh encomiums from this department just now. The trio for violin, viola and cello was composed in 1798; and eight years earlier Mozart finished his quintet for two violins, two violas and cello.

Brahms' four "Serious Songs," of extra significance because they were the last of his works published while he was alive (and one year before his death in 1897) appear to express premonition of his approaching end, for he was already seriously ill of cancer of the liver. Tender yet lofty in feeling, the music (with texts taken from the Bible) represents a series of tonal meditations on the vanity and transitoriness of human life, with the underlying philosophy that death is better than life.

Certain it is that the much-discussed Austrian composer has large stretches of poetical and dramatic fancy, and although also large stretches of lesser import, his symphonies may be enjoyed by those who listen with patience and receptivity.

He gave the subtitle "Romantic" to his fourth symphony, and it may be looked upon as his musical conception of nature and its Creator. Like Beethoven, Brahms and Mahler, Bruckner especially loved the outdoor works of God.

The first movement is chiefly con-

Crises at the Metropolitan Opera

OUR radio public and the musical public at large doubtless experienced some panic when reading the stories in the daily press last week about the financial and other troubles besetting the Metropolitan Opera. One report had it that if it is impossible to clear away those difficulties in a few months the venerable and distinguished institution might have to close its doors permanently. No wonder consternation reigned when the alarming news was published in the press, and given out during the latest Saturday matinee radio broadcast of the Metropolitan.

However, already relief is coming through donations received in sums ranging from one dollar to one thousand, radio listeners being numerous among the contributors. It is my own firm belief that by next May (the deadline set for the acquisition of the needed money) there will be no further danger of the abandonment of America's most eminent company of lyric artists.

The root of the crisis is that the wealthy and fashionable holders of the Golden Horseshoe boxes are no longer willing to subscribe annually for that privilege. Of the total sum collected, it has heretofore been the practise of the Metropolitan to devote part toward running the performances and the rest to the real-estate company which owns the famous home of song.

Now the Metropolitan Opera Association wishes to buy the edifice, which can be done by a preliminary payment next May of \$500,000. A like sum is to be allocated to renovating and air-conditioning the house, purchasing new scenery and laying aside a reserve fund. It is purposed also, say Edward Johnson and his board of directors, to "popularize" the Metropolitan, and make it part of New York civic life by doing away with some of the boxes and using the space for tiers of comfortable seats.

It is easy to guess that everybody is holding thumbs for the success of the present drive, and that the dialers will help as much as lies in their power. Were the Saturday broadcasts to go off the air, radio would suffer the severest loss of caste in its history. The amount

paid at present by NBC for the exclusive rights of presenting the Saturday performances is understood to be about \$100,000 per annum.

Further clouds gathered at the Metropolitan when the news-dispensers published facts about the "war" between Erich Leinsdorf, the new young Wagnerian conductor, and a number of the German-branch singers headed by Melchior and Flagstad. They were alleged to have objected to Leinsdorf's lack of experience as the sudden successor of the late Artur Bodanzky. However, a few days ago the tales were pooh-poohed by all concerned, and the curtain-calls at the Wagner performances since then found supposed contestants exchanging effusive handshakes and cheek-kissings. Edward Johnson publicly backed up Leinsdorf, but since then declared the whole thing to have been merely "a tempest in a teapot." (It was not, you may believe me.)

You have all listened to Leinsdorf's remarkably fine work with the baton, and probably agree that he has been guilty only of what an ancient English statesman once characterized as "the atrocious crime of being a young man." Even Toscanini was such a criminal once upon a time.

Another contest, more agreeable than the one at the Metropolitan, has been engaging my attention for the past five weeks or so. Engaging my attention? I had better say almost monopolizing my attention.

On January 6, RADIO GUIDE ended its National Song Search contest for a semi-classical song (for a first prize of \$200 to the winner), of which I had the proud and painful distinction of being the sole judge. Immediately after the close of the Search, a half-dozen large cases of songs reached me from our Chicago headquarters and since then I have been practically buried in the black-and-white flood of manuscripts. I did not count them, but they probably were not far under one thousand.

If my hair has turned slightly whiter recently, it was not so much on account of the work of examination but because of the problem of making the final selection from so astonishing a percentage of meritorious songs. There was to be a single winner, five seconds and six honorable mentions. It took three days and innumerable sessions at the piano for me to make the ultimate choices from the eighty or so I had segregated from the total number.

The Search was confined to "semi-classics," and that is a hard term to define. I would rather call them melody songs. The prize-givers commissioned me to judge the works solely on musical merit and to discard the texts. To me, musical merit meant proper writing, quality, appeal and singableness. Striking originality was in none of the manuscripts, not even the winning ones. Many of the others I examined had tunefulness and atmosphere, but they grazed the "popular" type too closely to be considered "semi-classics."

On Page 45 the names of the Semi-Classical Contest winners and of their songs are set forth . . . four men and eight women! I congratulate the fortunate composers and to the rest I say, better luck next time . . . And now I shall be able to enjoy untroubled slumber again.

but she returns almost at once, believing that she has left her key in the poet's studio. Now his candle extinguishes and in the dark they grope on the floor for the lost key. Their hands meet and remain clasped. They tell each other of their lives and struggles.

In the second act we see the Christmas festivities in the Square outside the cafe. Musetta and Marcello are sweethearts, but always quarreling because of her coquetries with rich admirers. She is accompanied by one of them, old Alcindoro. The Bohemians trick him into paying their bill and leaving in anger. Marcello and Musetta

A MERRY crew of youthful writers, poets, painters, musicians live their picturesque, hand-to-mouth lives in a Paris garret during the glamorous Bohemian days of the early nineteenth century—about 1830. They enjoy adventures with art and with the girls of the Latin quarter.

Here we have personages and a locale and background that fairly cry to be subjects for novel, play or opera. Well, all three came to creation, the most successful mediums being Henri Murger's novel "La Vie de Boheme" (Life of the Bohemians) and the opera Puccini and librettist made from it.

The story of the opera opens on Christmas Eve, when Rodolfo (poet), Marcello (painter) and Colline (philosopher) are gathered in the attic room of the first-named, cold and hungry. They make a fire of one of Rodolfo's plays. Schaunard comes with food and drink, having picked up a little money somewhere or other. Later, Rodolfo's friends depart and he promises to join them for an evening of merrymaking. Mimi, who fashions artificial flowers, is Rodolfo's neighbor, but they have never met. She knocks at his door, and begs a light to her room, her candle having blown out. Rodolfo obliges her,

are reunited . . . but for how long?

When the third act starts, Mimi, frail, ill, coughing violently, seeks Marcello at the tavern where he and Rodolfo are living, and tells of her lover's jealousy which is forcing her to leave him. She hides as Rodolfo enters and hears him confide to Marcello that she is dying of tuberculosis. Musetta comes to find Marcello. They fight. Marcello brings Mimi and Rodolfo together and Mimi takes sad farewell of her beloved, while Musetta runs off, Marcello following.

The last act is the scene of Mimi's death. Musetta brings her to Rodolfo's garret, interrupting the revelries of the Bohemians. The despairing little band tries to comfort the doomed girl; Musetta gives Mimi her muff; Colline leaves to pawn his coat and Musetta's jewels in order to buy delicacies for Mimi. She and Rodolfo recall their happiest moments and suddenly she sinks into death.

The popular musical moments of the opera are the narratives and the duet of Mimi and Rodolfo in the first act; Musetta's famous waltz-song, second act; Mimi's farewell, third act; and the tender and touching strains preceding the end of the pathetic heroine.

HE PUTS in a total of less than an average eight-hour day each year and yet he's one of the busiest radio artists on the air today. So busy, in fact, he hasn't had a vacation in the nearly four years since the program's inception.

We're speaking of Stanley Davis, NBC baritone, who whistles and sings the theme song to his own guitar accompaniment on the popular five-a-week dramatic serial, "John's Other Wife," broadcast at 10:15 a.m. EST over an NBC network.

Stanley's job is to prepare listeners for the story to come by whistling and singing a few bars of Stults' "Sweetest Story Ever Told." He likens it to the ingenious method adopted to rouse the old master, Rubinstein, from his nightly slumbers. Each morning a member of the household used to play a chord on the piano that demanded completion. When he heard it, Rubinstein would leap into a shabby bathrobe and hasten downstairs to the piano to finish the chord and satisfy his compulsion for musical perfection.

Similarly, Davis' assignment is to set the mood for the story by performing a few bars of the theme, leaving listeners in a state of anticipation, waiting for the day's episode and its conclusion with the final bar or notes—if the timing is wrong—of the theme.

For nearly four years now Stanley has done just that and he considers it a very exacting job. He's never missed a program, even did one in a wheel-chair, and is the only survivor of the serial's original cast and writers.

Stanley knows his role and its requirements thoroughly. The precise bars that fill a given number of seconds, the exact informal style in which they must be sung in order to set the stage and finally ring down the curtain. It would take months of practise to develop an understudy for him, so the directors of the program have relied entirely on his well-being. Cognizant of their trust and faith, he has even moved to within three minutes of the studio further to insure his appearance at each broadcast.

Davis is heard for about a minute and a half on each program, totaling approximately seven and a half minutes a week or slightly over six hours each year. Nevertheless, those seconds are spotted throughout the drama and he

must always see to it that he fills the required number of seconds with some excerpt that leaves the listener in suspense.

Then, too, with the precision of a delicate watch movement, he must watch the studio clock and fill in the closing seconds of the program with the precise number of bars, so that the final note is struck a split second before the announcer says, "This is the National Broadcasting Company," leaving the required twenty seconds for stations on the network to identify themselves.

Of serious mien, Stanley has diligently taken the "Sweetest Story Ever Told" and broken it into numerous segments, categorically timing each one or various combinations to fit any conceivable "fill-in" period, carefully insuring that each excerpt is a theme in itself, never ending in a note of finality that might indicate that the program is ended. Thus the listener knows that only the final strains of the theme signify the end of the episode.

As a further precaution, Stanley checks his guitar with a newsdealer in the lobby of the RCA Building. This after careful consideration. A brief interview revealed that the dealer closed on only three holidays a year, fitting perfectly into his broadcast schedule. Each morning Stanley arrives promptly at 10:00 a.m., picks up the instrument and proceeds to the studio. A few times he's barely made the dead-line, but always the dealer held the guitar out and Stanley snatched it on the dead run. More evidence of perfect timing.

In his spare moments Davis secludes himself in his bachelor apartment, just six blocks from the studio, and devotes himself entirely to composing serious music. His one ambition, in addition to performing his entire theme song on some hazily distant program, is to write classical lullabies and "little suites." He also hopes to write music for Walt Disney, whom he considers "a really great artist." He's dead earnest about the latter and already has written a song, "Lullaby for a Baby Goblin," which he's going to submit to Disney in a few days.

"THE Pursuit of Happiness," the half-hour broadcast which campaigns for American life in its gayer and more comfortable moments, paraded again Sunday with top-line entertainers carrying on the propaganda. In the thirty minutes presented there were: one streamlined Broadway hit, a skit from Hollywood, a short dramatic cutting, a comedy routine, and a generous interspersment of explanations by Burgess Meredith, master of ceremonies.

The program opened with a story-telling spiritual from the long-living Broadway hit "Pins and Needles." This was a bit from the New York Garment Workers' production, which has had the critics' okay since its opening more than 930 performances ago. Dorothy Harrison backed by the show's chorus did her song selling in a spirited, almost fanatical tempo. In this stint the Negro's contribution to Americana was heralded. Danny Kaye, comedian, played a return engagement on the series, appearing in a parody on Russian life. It was mildly entertaining for the air, but apparently riotous for the studio audience. The latter conclusions are based on the cheering which seeped through the microphones.

A switch to Hollywood brought a lively little scene from "Pinocchio," the child-book, which has been adapted for the movies by Walt Disney. Radio director Irving Reis, like Cecil B. DeMille, borrowed the movie's dialog and sound-effects for the air presentation. DeMille gave the show in its entirety as the "Lux Radio Theater" show on Christmas Day.

Richard Bennett, who for nearly half a century has been known to theatergoers, was co-starred with Whitford Kane in a short drama woven from the Washington Irving story, "The Devil and Tom Walker." "The Pursuit of Happiness" offered this play to mark the issuance of the new Irving stamps by the United States Post Office. Bennett, always a fine and versatile actor, turned in another creditable performance.

Choice of material and entertainers on this Sunday echoes back to the beginning broadcasts of "The Circle," when that series gave promise of being one of the best periods on radio.

This program could have done with a little more music, and many times there could have been a little more subtlety used in the "flag-waving speeches."

But then, it is Burgess Meredith who makes those wistful speeches and he ranks as one of the finest personalities in radio. It is Meredith who makes you turn to the show Sunday after Sunday. At times when one feels that one is being tossed a little too much propaganda, it is Meredith's fine acting and nearly perfect emceeing which saves the day.

There is an over-all freshness about the presentation. The constant changing of its stars and the precision production by Norman Corwin give the

"WHAT becomes of a woman like me . . . in a city like this . . . when her money's gone?"

Thus did the aerial curtain ring down

on one of last week's episodes of "Life Begins," a new serial drama by Bess Flynn currently heard from CBS stations, 11:15 a.m. EST five days a week.

Thus, too, might the theme of the play be summed up. It is the story of Martha Webster, a woman of perhaps forty or forty-five who suddenly is thrown upon her own resources in a big city. The familiar, heartbreaking devices to which every job-seeker resorts . . . ads for "situation wanted" in the newspapers, hours of waiting and miles of walking in the search for work of any kind . . . are hers.

The plot is not a pretty one, but even this male reviewer, who heartily dislikes the average serial drama, must admit grudgingly that "Life Begins" does conform to one pattern of ex-

istence. Miss Flynn, one of those doubly talented persons who also acts in the scripts she writes, has pointed the tale directly at a large audience.

In the light of other, too many other, similar efforts, the first week's broadcasts were of a decidedly superior quality. Production was excellent, principals were well cast and the cast was well rehearsed. Sound effects were skilfully inserted. The net result was a vast improvement over the majority of network continued stories.

The actor-playwright is a somewhat rare bird and Miss Flynn in taking over the chief role in this unhappy dramatic narrative again places herself in rather distinguished company, apparently nothing new to her. Her "Bachelor's Children" is an old favorite with fans.

IF YOU like Kay Kyser's musical quiz, you'll also like "Beat the Band," a new program which took over the "Grouch Club's" spot and sponsor January 28. It's a reverse "Kyser's College." The basis of the quiz is musical—but instead of emcee Garry Moore asking questions of audience contestants, he pops them at the members of Ted Weems' band. They try to answer correctly and furnish musical samples. Each one who fails plunks a half-dollar onto the bass drum as a "kitty" which the session's winner in points collects. If nobody gets the answer they all feed the "kitty"—a clever twist and an intriguing sound-effect!

Weems' flexible, substantially sweet music speaks for itself. His outfit is one of those that have become so solidly and favorably established that they are accepted as institutions without all the furor that attends the upshooting of each new dance-band mushroom. There is a distinguishing trait of Weems' band, however, that makes it ideal for this particular set-up. We might call it the "Band of Plural Personality." It features more "names" than any other orchestra, not excluding Kyser. Therefore, the pointing of questions at individual musicians makes full use of this name value. You've undoubtedly heard Perry Como's romantic baritone, Elmo Tanner's lilting whistling, Red Ingle's burlesques, Parker Gibbs' novelties, "Country" Washburn's comics, and Marvel Maxwell's nice, nineteen-year-old voice. Now you can hear all these personalities in an informal session of fun and music.

Garry Moore handles the quizzing in lively and temperate fashion. Fort Pearson, one of radio's smoothest announcers, delivers standard, not-so-startling commercials.

SHORT-WAVE BROADCASTS FROM MANCHUKUO

ON JULY 20, 1939, world-wide short-wave transmissions were inaugurated in Manchukuo, the northeast provinces of China, formerly known as Manchuria but proclaimed an independent state in 1932, with the help of the Japanese army. Manchukuo has not been recognized by the United States or other leading countries.

Short-wave programs from Manchukuo are broadcast over the new 20,000-watt station of the Manchuria Telephone and Telegraph Company at Hsinking, which operates on 11.775 megs, using the call MTCY, daily as follows: Transmission 1, from 11:30 p.m. to 12:20 a.m. CST, directed to North America and Hawaii; transmission 2, from 8:50 to 9:55 a.m. CST, directed to China, Australia and the South Seas, and transmission 3, from 3 to 3:50 p.m. CST, directed to Europe.

MTCY (11.775) is easy to locate on the 25-meter band, as it comes in on almost exactly the same dial-setting as DJD (11.77), Berlin.

The transmission for North America is well received in the western states and with fair signals in the middle and eastern states. The station often comes on the air at 12:20 a.m. CST, with ten minutes of pho-

nograph recordings preceding the regular sign-on. Soft chimes—similar to those heard on the Japanese broadcasts—usher in the programs, which conclude with the playing of the Manchu national anthem.

The morning transmission to China and the South Seas is fairly well heard in the United States but with considerable interference from "Radio Saigon," operating on 11.78 megs.

The afternoon transmission to Europe is occasionally heard in the United States but it suffers badly from interference caused by DJD (11.77), Berlin, on one side, and WRUL (11.79), Boston, on the other.

Manchukuo programs include news, informative talks, eye-witness accounts and music. All announcements and talks are in English, with the exception of those in the China transmission, which are also made in Japanese and Manchu.

Reception reports are welcome and should be sent to the Hsinking Central Broadcasting Station, Manchuria Telephone and Telegraph Company, 601 Daido-Taigai, Hsinking, Manchukuo. Listeners submitting correct reports will receive an attractive folder-type verification booklet.

SHORT WAVE LINKS BYRD EXPEDITION WITH CIVILIZATION: Short wave is again supplying the intangible link between civilization and the United States Antarctic expedition, now at "Little America." A series of popular programs, including a radio mail-bag with personal messages from friends and relatives for members of the expedition, sponsored by prominent newspapers, is being broadcast from the Antarctic every other Friday night from 10:30 to 11 p.m. CST over WGEO (9.53) of Schenectady, New York, and the Red network of the NBC. As soon as technical details have been arranged, broadcasts direct from "Little America" will commence. The transmitter in the snow cruiser is already conducting tests with the United States and the West Base station should be in operation soon. Watch particularly the experimental frequencies of 17.31, 12.862, 11.06, 9.135 and 6.425 megs if you are interested in reception from the South Pole.

EUROPE'S PROPAGANDA VOICES: Berlin now broadcasts an additional program to North America daily from 10:10 to 10:40 a.m. CST over DJB (15.20). A topical talk in English is heard at 10:20 a.m. CST. Night reception from Germany is far from satisfactory right at present. DJD (11.77) fades out too early; DXB (9.61) suffers from severe interference imposed by HP5J of Panama City, and DJC (6.02) is usually pretty well covered up by Latin stations operating on adjacent channels, although this channel is frequently in the clear and heard with good signals late evenings. Vatican City radio station "Radio Vaticano," HVJ, is now sending out semi-weekly programs to the Americas, as follows: On Sundays from 7:30 to 8 p.m. CST, to Brazil, in Portuguese; from 8 to 8:30

Some important changes have been made in the North American programs from "Paris Mondial" in Paris. The midday broadcast on 11.843 megs, is now being broadcast one hour earlier, from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. CST; the evening broadcast, from 7 to 11:30 p.m. CST, is now being radiated on a new frequency of 9.52 megs. Much better reception is afforded on this channel, but Danish listeners are bitterly complaining that it completely knocks out reception of the evening program from Copenhagen, which is sent out over OZF, also on a frequency of 9.52 megs. There seems to be little sportsmanship between nations when it comes to short-wave broadcasting—just a dog-eat-dog proposition reminiscent of the early days of broadcasting in this country.

NEWS IN GENERAL: TFJ (12.235), Reykjavik, Iceland, has discontinued its Sunday broadcasts, due to the European situation. George Saunders of Glendale, Calif., reports hearing a new Mexican station, XEFA (9.56), at Monterrey, which relays broadcast station XEFB, daily from 9 a.m. to 11 p.m. CST. According to Warren Stark of Wauwatosa, Wisconsin, a government experimental station on the island of Barbados, B. W. I., broadcasts news bulletins daily from 3:30 to 3:45 p.m. CST, on a frequency of 3.90 megs. CB1180, Santiago, Chile, and best heard of the Chilean stations, has again shifted its frequency, this time to 11.945 megs.

To launch the course, Director Kenneth B. Olsen of the Northwestern University School of Journalism will be heard on the broadcast of February 13, outlining the course and explaining the contemporary literature series which will feature authors of today on the program.

● On Sunday, February 11, radio's oldest educational program, the "University of Chicago Round Table Discussions," enters its tenth year on the air. The "Round Table" was the first regular program to be produced entirely without prepared script, and also the first broadcast series produced by a university from its campus. When it went on the air for the first time in February, 1931, neither station WMAQ (which carried it first as a local feature) nor the University of Chicago could have predicted its future.

At that early date in radio a spontaneous discussion—even by agile professors—was a daring venture. No one was certain that the three speakers would have anything to say, or that they would be tongue-tied before the mike. The topic was "warm." The first "Round Table" discussion was devoted to the Wickersham Commission's report on prohibition . . . it went over, and has been going full blast ever since.


Credit for formulating the plans for the "Round Table" is shared by Judith Waller, NBC's educational director in Chicago, then manager of station WMAQ; Allen Miller, University Broadcasting Council head, then radio director at the University of Chicago; and T. V. Smith, professor of philosophy at the University and now also congressman-at-large from Illinois.

With an eighty-five station network which blankets the nation and overflows into Canada, Mexico and the Caribbean countries, the "Round Table" enters its tenth year with an estimated audience of five million listeners. As the oldest educational program on the air, it continues in its traditional role of interpreter of currently important national and international issues of a social, political and economic nature. By its traditional form it sets the pattern for the preservation of American democracy through the exchange and balancing of opinions in the search for the best possible answer to fundamental problems.

T. V. Smith best describes the "Round Table" with his definition of educational broadcasting: "Intelligent people talking about something important."







The two units are kept strictly separate and the Hollywood portions are as gaily informal as the dramatic presentations are formal. Because Hollywood rehearsals are even more fun than the actual performance, Radio Guide includes listeners in the merriment by showing candid shots of the stars during a typical rehearsal.





THE new musical stars and stripes unfurled on the NBC-Blue network January 25 by Patriots Taylor, Paige and Cross is a flag-waver for native music. Sponsored by the Westinghouse Electric Co. and titled "Musical Americana," the program runs the gamut of American music from Friml to Scott. Using a 100-piece orchestra composed of members of the Pittsburgh Symphony and some twenty "hot" musicians from KDKA, and a large chorus of native Pittsburgh singers, the program glorifies the sponsor's home town as well as the nation. What it lacked in smooth performance this opening broadcast made up in enthusiasm.

The orchestra scored with its arrangement of "In an Eighteenth Century Drawing Room" as originally composed by Mozart and later repopularized by Raymond Scott. The Friml "Chansonette" from "The Firefly" was also well done.

Deems Taylor is his engaging self in the role of commentator of ceremonies. The commercials, as read by the faultless Milton Cross, were in excellent taste. We also were pleased by the poetic tribute to America, which was read in the middle of the program. It was well written and equally well presented to a musical background.

The idea of the program is excellent. In Taylor, Paige and Cross, Westinghouse has three of the best men in their respective fields. We also like the idea of originating the program in Pittsburgh with local musicians. Radio could stand more big programs from centers other than New York, Chicago and Hollywood.





