## The "POT O' GOLD"

### An Open Letter to the "Pot o' Gold"

Gentlemen:

There has been some talk that your program is a lottery. It is not, that we know. Uncle Sam and the National Broadcasting Company and the FCC must be agreed on that. Your weekly \$1,000 award is a gift, pure and simple. Just as old John D. Rockefeller went about giving people dimes, you give them \$100 or \$1,000 or more.

At first blush, one would think that such an arrangement would make millions of friends and no enemies. Everyone likes to get something for nothing. That is the way it looked in the beginning, but today things are being said that are not quite friendly.

Frankly, MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE is concerned because we were one of the first publicly to admire your new program idea. The public likes the show as the record shows. But we are now convinced that both the public and "Pot o' Gold" should be protected by a clear understanding of what is implied by your air offers and telephone calls.

In the case of J. A. Planting of Anaheim, California, the dispute is simple. He says he answered; you say he didn't. That might happen again, in which case, whose word is the public supposed to take? In the case of Mr. Dumont of Albany, New York, his name was selected and the number indicated was called but that number no longer belonged to Mr. Dumont. What happens there?

Will you please consider the following questions, gentlemen, and then give us your reply? We have outlined various imaginary situations. The "Pot o' Gold" may continue for years without encountering them, but on the other hand any one of them might turn up this Tuesday night.

Your answers will protect the public.

Your answers will protect the "Pot o' Gold," for they will show that you are interested in living up to both the letter and the spirit of the gift agreement you make when you attempt to contact by phone any person designated by your "selector" wheel.

Here are our questions:

1. When a call is placed with the phone company, who is being called? Are you calling the name selected by the wheel or the telephone number?

2. If Mr. Brown is being called but Mr. Brown has moved and now a Mr. Johnson has the number that was formerly Mr. Brown's, who gets the \$100 if the number does not answer or \$1,000 if the number does answer?

3. If Mr. Brown is called but Mr. Brown's apartment and phone have been subleased or taken over tempo-

rarily by Mr. Johnson, who gets the money?

4. If Mr. Brown is called and his phone is answered but you learn that Mr. Brown himself is dead, who gets the money?

5. What happens if you get a busy signal?

6. What if there is telephone-line trouble which prevents the call from going through? Does the wheel spin again? Does the party called lose his chance at the \$1,000 gift?

7. Since the appeal of the "Pot o' Gold" is influenced somewhat by the size of the pot, is it not conceivable that some overzealous employe, desiring to build up next week's gift, might deliberately and knowingly pretend that there is no answer to your call?

8. Has the hearing of those who might

handle your long-distance calls been checked in order to certify that all answers will be recognized and reported?

9. What if a Mr. Brown's name and number are selected and the call is placed properly but Central calls a wrong number, does Mr. Brown get \$100 if he was not at home or \$1,000 if he was at home? Or what if Mr. Brown was not at home but someone answers the wrong number, thereby "completing contact" with the announcer in your studio. Does Mr. Brown still get the \$1,000?

10. How often are the Tums telephone books brought up to date?

11. What is your explanation of the Planting and Dumont "situations"?

There they are, gentlemen. Some of the situations represented above are incredible. But so is one in which an honest man says he answered his phone and heard Heidt's music, and an equally honest man says he heard no answer. So we urgently ask your consideration. In particular, we ask you not to disregard our question about the hearing of those who handle your long-distance calls.

In conclusion, we state clearly that we have complete confidence in the "Pot o' Gold" and its sponsors and producers. We want everyone to have that same confidence. Therefore, we present the above questions and throw open our columns for your considered response. If, in addition to explaining your own attitude on the matters presented, we of MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE can be of service in arbitrating any dispute that may arise we are yours to command.

Last fall the Tums "Pot o' Gold" program, with music by Horace Heidt, started broadcasting each Tuesday evening a novel gift scheme by which some of the 20,000,000 telephone subscribers in the United States would benefit by from \$100 (if a phone call went unanswered) to \$1,000 or more in cash if the subscriber answered. If, during any week, \$900 was saved when party called failed to answer, the next week's capital "gift" became \$1,900.

Each week a giant selector wheel is used to point out the telephone book, the page, and the name to be called. The program has become a hit. Recently, however, two events have upset the smooth routine of mailing out checks to lucky telephone subscribers.


The first took place the evening of Oct. 31, 1939. That night the Tums broadcast was from Philadelphia. The "selector" wheel chose the name of J. A. Planting, who lives at 924 West Broadway, Anaheim, California . . .

"ANAHEIM 4353." Mr. Planting says he answered the phone. The "Pot o' Gold" says he did not.

The second event took place the evening of January 9, 1940. Horace Heidt was broadcasting from California. The "selector" chose the name of Cornelius C. Dumont . . . "ALBANY 4-6097." That number was called but it was not answered. But Cornelius C. Dumont was home, he claims, and he was not called by the broadcasters.

Movie and Radio Guide believes it is in the public interest for several obvious questions to be answered by the makers of Tums, or by the Stack-Goble Advertising Agency, which produces the program for Tums. For that reason, we have addressed to both Tums and the Stack-Goble Agency copies of the open letter published on this page. We believe that their answer will shed much needed light on the interesting account published opposite of what happened in the J. A. Planting home.

# Runs into Trouble

By J. A. Planting  
as Told to Evans Plummer

"CAN I give you the details of that telephone call? I sure can. It happened on last Hallowe'en, and people around here just won't let me forget. Some of 'em tell my wife we ought to be happy that we got the \$100, and then others say we ought to make the 'Pot o' Gold' folk pay us the rest of the \$1,900. Why, it's gotten to be a regular community debate, it has.

"I'm a maintenance man over at the Union High School here and I'm generally through my work around four o'clock in the afternoon, so we have an early dinner. On Hallowe'en night, the four of us—that's my grown (twenty-four years) daughter Nona, my sixteen-year-old son Jack and my wife Grace and I—were seated at dinner in the breakfast-nook in our kitchen—which is only about eight feet away from our telephone on the kitchen wall by the door.

"A couple of our friends from Santa Ana, Rollo Luhring and his wife Florence, were visiting and waiting for us to eat, after which we were all planning to take in the Hallowe'en parade at seven o'clock in Anaheim that would go down Broadway and turn just a half-block away from our home.

"Well, about five minutes to six p.m. our phone, eight feet away, rang two quick rings and my son Jack rose and answered the phone saying, 'Hello,' and the Anaheim operator said, 'Philadelphia calling. Is this Anaheim 4353?'

"Jack answered 'Yes' and said to me, 'Dad, Philadelphia's calling.' I jumped up and went to the phone and repeated to the operator, 'Yes, this is Anaheim 4353.'

"The operator told me to wait, which I did, right there at the phone and holding the receiver to my right ear.

"I didn't know anything about this

'Pot o' Gold' program then. We hadn't even heard about it. But while I was waiting on the line, I could hear the music (I guess that was Horace Heidt's) coming through the receiver loudly. Why, even Mrs. Planting could hear it at the breakfast-nook table and she said, 'Who do we know in Philadelphia? Whoever it is, I hear music; they're having a party.'

"I didn't time how long I was waiting there, but finally the Anaheim operator said, 'Go ahead, Philadelphia.'

"Then for a while all I could hear was the music until I heard a voice come on the line and say, 'Cancel the call.' You know, that seemed kind of funny to me. At first I thought someone might be kidding us, but just before this point and the cancellation I had learned that the call must be authentic and had something to do with a big prize of cash some radio program wanted to give us. Here's how I got the news right while I was at the phone:

"Mr. J. Francis Addy, our next-door neighbor, who lives at 928 W. Broadway and who knew we were home, came bursting through the door shouting, 'Hey, Planting, what's the matter? Why don't you answer your phone?' Then he saw I was at the phone. He said that he had just heard from a friend of his that the 'Pot o' Gold' people had selected my name and were trying to reach me to give me \$1,900 but that I had to answer the phone.

"Then I heard a voice on the line say, 'Cancel the call.' Well, by now our house was wild with excitement. I jiggled the telephone hook right away and called the Anaheim supervisor and asked why had the call been canceled, and asked her to trace the call.

"The supervisor said she would. While I was waiting on the line, I could hear parts of her conversation. The Philadelphia operator reported

back and I could hear her say that there was so much noise and confusion at the Philadelphia end that 'they' couldn't hear Mr. Planting and that 'it would be taken care of tomorrow.'

"Then the Anaheim supervisor started talking to me and she repeated the Philadelphia operator's words about the noise and taking care of it tomorrow. By now I knew that I stood to lose \$1,800 by someone's mistake or bad hearing, and I didn't intend to leave the matter end right there. I asked the supervisor to connect me with the Anaheim exchange manager, but he wasn't in. So I asked her please to make a record of the call.

"In the meantime, I understand that Ben Grauer had announced that the Plantings didn't answer, that they evidently weren't home, and that therefore the next week's 'Pot o' Gold' would be \$2,800. Why, they already had declared me out! My \$1,900 was being added on to the next program!

"At about 6:30 p.m. the Western Union office called up to say that they had a telegraphic money order for us for \$100 from the 'Pot o' Gold' program and that it would be delivered in the morning.

"Well, of course, we were tickled to get the \$100 but the \$1,900 would have been a fortune to us. We are modest people, and if they had only sent us the \$1,900, say!

"We were so excited, we never did finish our dinners, but we finally calmed down enough to join the Luhrings and walk on up the block to see the Hallowe'en parade. But when we returned, the telephone started going crazy with calls. It kept ringing with calls from friends and even strange people, all of whom wanted to know why we 'hadn't answered our phone.' That was exasperating. We wouldn't have minded if we hadn't been home, but to have been home and answered

the phone and then being ruled out, that was the last straw.

"Well, there the phone was that started all the trouble. It was ringing its bell to pieces, and every time it rang Mrs. Planting would get excited and jump, thinking it might be the 'Pot o' Gold' folk calling up to make good the full \$1,900. . . . But it never was.

"The calls and ribbing continued heavy for two to three weeks and our friends still bring up the subject even now. We wish they'd let us forget all about the whole incident, but I guess they just can't do it. Everywhere I went, for a while, someone would yell, 'Hi, Planting, why didn't you answer your phone?' It wasn't so funny to me, I tell you.

"When MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE started checking up on what happened, I was glad because it would give me the chance to tell the whole true story from beginning to end. After people read it, maybe they'll give us a chance to return to our normal, peaceful lives.

"Why, we're still getting mail from all over the country.

"But let's get on with the story of how I tried to collect what I still think is due me, and how I've failed up to now."

●  
Installment Two of Mr. Planting's interesting story will be published next week. Movie and Radio Guide takes no sides in this case. From Mr. Planting's point of view he has the following facts in his favor: (1) He has witnesses to testify that he actually answered his telephone, (2) he heard Ben Grauer's voice in Philadelphia, (3) he heard Horace Heidt's music, (4) the telephone operator in Anaheim told him Philadelphia was calling and told Philadelphia to "go ahead." On the other hand, the Tums people maintain that the call was not completed. Ben Grauer, who handled the call, says he heard no response to his call. Each party assumes sincerely that it is in the right. The honesty of each party is unquestioned. Quite possibly each is right. Because such a thing might happen to any of us who listen to the "Pot o' Gold" program, next week Movie and Radio Guide will continue this investigation of what happens when a lucky call turns unlucky.

# ALONG *the* AIRIALTOS

Barbara Luddy in auto accident . . . CBS' William Paley top radio wage-earner for 1938 . . . 10,000 New Yorkers see television

On this page will be found general news of the radio world. On the succeeding pages, news of New York, Hollywood and Chicago will be found as usual.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Death knell of the Mexican border stations—long the scourge of good reception in U. S. and Canada—was sounded with the sudden and unexpected ratification of the Havana Treaty by the Mexican Government more than two years after U. S. and Canada had accepted its terms. The treaty provides for assignment of wavelengths cooperatively between the three countries to avoid interference in reception in one country by stations in another.

Bad news accompanies the good—for everyone except radio service men—for approximately nine out of ten American stations will have their wavelengths altered in a gigantic reallocation which FCC hopes to complete by July 1. To the more than 8,000,000 users of push-button sets, reallocation will mean a resetting of automatic dials. To hand-tuners, it will simply mean learning the new spot on the dials at which old favorite stations will then be heard.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Representing himself as an important radio broadcasting executive over telephone to Lotte Lehmann, Met Opera singer, a certain Mr. Crawford, who loves music when he's had a few drinks, soundly berated the star for not appearing on a "March of Dimes" concert. He then threatened to blacklist her on all networks unless she sang into the phone while he had a transcription made of her solo. Miss Lehmann, startled and surprised, obliged.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Winners in the essay contest of "America's Town Meeting" are (in adult group): First prize, \$500, Rev. Aubrey Young, of Quarryville, Pa.; second prize, \$200, George N. Leighton, of Harvard University; third prize, \$100, Caroline Anspacher, of the San Francisco Chronicle. In high-school group, Frank W. Kerr, of Seattle, first; Mary Louise Ralph, Washington, D. C., second; Nobuyuki Nakasone, Maui, Hawaii, third.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The FCC is currently investigating television at various points in the United States with a view to making a decision as to whether television broadcasting stand-

ards should be "frozen" or set at present broadcasting standards or permitted a free hand to develop further.

Certain television manufacturers feel that, if definite regulations were set up now, they could begin wholesale manufacture of reasonably priced receivers for the general market. Others—and especially the smaller, independent manufacturers—feel that it is too early to set up strict regulatory machinery which might hamper development of television. The FCC ruling will be given at the end of its current investigation into what television broadcasters are doing.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—When FCC investigators reach New York, they will learn that more than 2,000 television receivers are in use in New York City, that an estimated 10,000 persons have access to these sets, that currently broadcast programs average 38.2 percent live talent; 31.9 percent films, and 29.9 percent outside special events. One hundred and forty-eight of the

programs televised to date have been commercial programs.

Also, RCA announces the perfection of a television relay method which will permit television shows to be relayed from city to city, as are regular network shows. Thus far, broadcasts for much more than fifty miles have been unsatisfactory.

MONTREAL, CANADA.—Network broadcasts of the General Election, March 26, will be prohibited until the polls are closed in all parts of the country. In past, results in the Eastern Provinces of Canada were heard in the West before polls closed, possibly had some effect upon voting. Also, political speeches in the campaign will be under a censorship this year, Canadian Broadcasting Corporation pointing out that this is a war censorship—nothing more.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Top radio wage earner for 1938 was CBS President William S. Paley, United States Treasury figures revealed. David Sarnoff,

President of NBC's parent company, got \$100,220. Of artists in top salary brackets, Bing Crosby was listed at \$260,000; Jack Benny, \$250,000; and Bob Burns, \$155,952.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Immediate policing of the "Pot O' Gold" program is being urged by Congressman Rudolph G. Tenerowicz, of Michigan. He says, "Many theater owners have complained, and to me it is palpably unethical intrusion and a matter that deserves immediate policing by the FCC."

NEW YORK, N. Y.—To encourage undergraduates in the field of music writing and to increase the source of its material, ASCAP (American Society of Authors, Composers and Publishers) is offering a series of fellowships and cash prizes in the field of musical plays, operettas, operas and comedies.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—To spur interest in Metropolitan Opera Fund raising campaign, a letter-writing contest—with free trips to New York and the honor of being guests of the Metropolitan Opera Company and NBC at the opening night of the 1940-41 season—has been announced. The letter must be on the subject, "What the Metropolitan Opera broadcasts mean to me," letters must be submitted before Saturday, March 23, and five winning letters from five different geographical divisions will be chosen.



"Dagwood" of "Blondie," and his bride, Pat Van Cleve, will shortly visit Manhattan to gossip with Arthur's sister, Florence, who has been doubling for Arlene Francis on the repeat performance of "What's My Name?"

#### Frank Munn Clowns

Frank Munn, tenor of "The American Album of Familiar Music," demonstrated his clowning abilities backstage at the Met when Jean Dickenson, his radio co-star, made her debut. Putting on a woman's gray-curled wig, he put hands on hips and did a bump or two for the scores of visitors who lined the hall leading to Jean's dressing-room.

Deems Taylor has just published a new book, "The Well-Tempered Listener" . . . A cigarette company has bought rights to the home games of the Giants and Yankees at a cost of around \$300,000 . . . CBS' adaptation of a section of "Grapes of Wrath" on "Pursuit of Happiness" proved that the movies do the best job on this story . . . "Pipe

Smoking Time" with Howard and Shelton has been renewed for another year . . . A new lineup of stations over at Mutual gives that network 118 stations.

#### The New Yorker Didn't Know

NBC's "Name It and Take It" is attended by a lot of New Yorkers who don't know their New York. Recently the question was asked: "With regard to consecutive order, Mayor LaGuardia is the — Mayor of New York City?" The New Yorkers guessed mostly around twenty-five. Eddie Cantor will m.c. the show, and among the guests (all of whom were helped along their way to radio fame by Vallee) already signed to appear are George Burns and Gracie Allen, Frances Langford, Joe Penner, Alice Faye, Bob Burns and—of course—Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy! . . . Vic Knight, who produced the two excellent MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE transcription programs of salutes from Hollywood radio stars, will handle the Vallee reunion airing, as he will likewise the Vallee Sealtest show to begin March 7.

#### Hats Off to Eddie Cantor

There's a grand story in how swell Eddie Cantor treated Vic Knight, who—until Vallee requested him—was Cantor's radio producer. (And you can cross off those stories about Eddie's mistreatment of singing-mikeman Bert Parks; 'tain't true, just an overzealous talent agent's dream.) Anyway, Cantor, who had been idle all year, continued to pay the salary of Knight without a squawk, and when Cantor played theaters, he paid the producer DOUBLE salary, although his contract did not require it! Vic was continually being given bonuses, too, by the goggle-eyed comic when Cantor was on the air—which he may be soon again . . . Your reporter visited Knight at his home last week and was met and welcomed by his puppy, "Boots." The pup acted very friendly, whereupon Vic observed, "That's very funny. He hates Cantor." And with that name, the pooch jumped up and bit me in the nose! So help me, it's the truth!

#### Jack Benny in New Dicker

You can laugh off any of those rumors that top-audience-rating Jack Benny and Jell-O are about to part company at the end of the season. Incidentally, Gene has signed the Brewer kids—Monty, seven; Eileen, eleven, and Betty, twelve—for Gene's next Republic picture and to appear as guests of his broadcast. Mary Lee, who swiped scenes from him in "South of the Border," will also be in his next film.

#### Artie Shaw and Other Rom-Antics

The much-discussed Artie Shaw attended Bob Hope's Sunday night preview show February 4 and waited patiently an hour and a quarter for Judy Garland to finish panicking the studio audience with Bob. Then he squired her from the NBC studios! And who was that syndicated columnist who said that Betty Grable's locket still contains Artie's picture? . . . Edward Byron, "Pot o' Gold" producer, and Maxine Jennings, ex-RKO film actress, will say the words any day.

#### Stork Visits "Amos 'n' Andy"

Old Doc Stork arrived at Cedars of Lebanon Hospital early in the morning of February 1 and delivered, with the help of Dorothy Alyce Correll, a six-pound fourteen-ounce daughter to Charlie, the Andy of the "Amos 'n' Andy" team. # OH JOHNNY, OH BONNIE

*Whoops!*

They put over 1940's smash song sensation—here's how!

**T**WENTY-THREE years ago—and two years before a dimpled baby daughter with large brown eyes was born to a Houston, Texas, pharmacist—a song about a chap named Johnny—who, according to the ballad, was no small shakes as a great lover—was being given to an America that was dancing furiously to forget the more serious business of the war into which we had just entered. When you consider that the same song is still being played on the "Hit Parade" when less bewhiskered and perhaps more meritorious numbers go a-begging, you have to admit that the song has something.

That something happens to be Wee Bonnie Baker, the pharmacist's daughter, who, in collusion with one Orrin Tucker, bandleader, robbed the grave to bring "Oh, Johnny" back to the land of the living. But the transaction wasn't all one-sided. "Oh, Johnny" has done something for Bonnie, too. It's put Bonnie and her maestro, Orrin Tucker, on the "Hit Parade" as well, which all adds up to the fact that the right band plus the right vocalist plus the right song equals a smash hit. And with that formula in mind, let's look at America's newest three-ring sensation.

In the first place, Bonnie is not a Cinderella snatched from poverty to riches overnight on the magic notes of a song older by two years than herself. Bonnie is a singer who sings for love. In other words, she doesn't have to sing for her supper.

"I have always had everything I wanted," Bonnie said. "My father is

fairly well-to-do and there was never a real shortage of money in the family. But singing was fun for me. I used to sing at school proms and parties when I was at Mount De Sales Academy in Macon, Georgia, and the only thing that surprises me is that people used to want to hear me sing when there were so many other girls there who had much better voices."

And unquestionably there were—and are—plenty of girls who can sing rings around Bonnie. But if you've ever heard her—as who hasn't?—you begin to get a small picture of why people did ask her to sing at their parties and dances and why, in almost no time flat, a local orchestra-leader with ambition and an idea of what people wanted had her signed up for his group. Singing with a band was ducksoup for Bonnie, who—remember—sings because she loves it, and again, in almost no time flat, she was singing with a band at the Hotel Claridge in St. Louis. And at this spot, let's leave Bonnie while we prepare the stage for Orrin Tucker's entrance.

**O**RRIN TUCKER grew up in Wheaton, Illinois. The very fact that he grew up at all smacks of the miraculous, he admits, because he was a saxophone-tooter, and you know how saxophone-tooters get along in quiet cities. By the time he entered Northwestern University to study medicine, he found himself playing so many dance dates that they began to interfere with his studies. Finally, in self-defense, he transferred to North Central College, which, far-

ther away from Chicago, allowed him some little time for his text-books.

You see, Orrin—like his namesake, Tommy, and unlike Bonnie—did play for his supper . . . and to pay his tuition and support himself generally. But at North Central he found a job where he played only three nights a week. And then an odd thing happened to him. A booking-agent watched him work one night, offered him a job leading a band at a New Orleans hotel, and for a whole week Orrin wavered between the baton and the scalpel—and finally chose the baton. It was at the end of his New Orleans engagement that he took his band into St. Louis at just the right moment to catch Bonnie at work in the Hotel Claridge.

"The minute I heard her, I was struck by her voice. It had an unusual quality. All the shyness and modesty that is in Bonnie herself is in her voice, too, and that makes her different from radio's usual glamour girls."

And Tucker was right. Wherever they went, Bonnie's shyness and her simple, unaffected way of rendering a number proved one of the band's chief appeals. And yet months passed into years and years passed, but neither he nor Bonnie caused income-tax collectors to lie awake nights over large columns of figures. Almost four years went by and then . . .

Enter "Oh, Johnny"!

The Orrin Tucker entourage had been booked into the Palmer House in Chicago, a dignified old-fashioned place with large columns and gold leaf and rich, heavy drapes—a setting out of the past. In order to be in tune with the atmosphere, he needed an old number for Bonnie to sing. He searched his memory, and suddenly he recalled an old tune his mother used to hum when he was just a kid. It was something about a guy named Johnny . . .

All that afternoon he worked over the old melody, adapting it to his band and to Bonnie, and that night Bonnie sang it. She sang it without fanfare and without introduction, and the Palmer House patrons accepted it in a lukewarm way.

Then the band went on tour. To both Orrin's and Bonnie's amazement, they were famous along with "Oh, Johnny." Everywhere people were singing "Oh,

Johnny" and everywhere Bonnie was hailed as the "Oh, Johnny" girl. And no one was more astonished than Bonnie, who overnight, on the notes of an old song, had leaped to a sudden fame.

What had happened was this: While still playing the Palmer House engagement, Tucker had made a recording of "Oh, Johnny" and this record, scattered to the four corners of America—to taverns and college campuses and high-school sweet-shops—had caught on like wildfire. In the formal, rather stiff atmosphere of the Palmer House, "Oh, Johnny" was just so-so. But in other spots, where guests were relaxed and ready for anything, "Oh, Johnny" was like a shot in the arm. It clicked. It wowed listeners. It was an overnight sensation. And so was Bonnie.

Bonnie's radio style is simple. She stands before the microphone with hands at her side and sings. She makes no motions, no dramatic gestures, and her renditions are always simple and straightforward. The mention of a Hollywood career brings no added sparkle to her deep brown eyes. She feels that a person who is too ambitious can never be happy.

**B**UT—and this comes straight from headquarters—there is nothing more than friendship between Tucker and Bonnie. Orrin says, "I'm sorry to fail you on the love interest, but there isn't any truth to it. I think the world of Bonnie and I hope she feels the same about me. But there's absolutely no romantic side to our association."

Bonnie, at the same time, chimes in with, "There couldn't be any romantic side. I'm really one of the family. You see, the real sweetheart of the band is Orrin's mother. She travels with us wherever we go and takes care of all of us. She's practically adopted me. So that makes Orrin just a big brother."

At twenty-one, Bonnie Baker has found the formula not only for a great radio success but for success in life and living as well. Her secret? The secret of simply being herself!

TWO more of the excellent New York Philharmonic Children's Concerts are featured again this week, one on Saturday morning and another on Monday afternoon.

John Charles Thomas appears with Ford, and the "New Friends of Music" presents the Mozart Clarinet Quintet which Benny Goodman has recorded with the Budapest Quartet. The New Friends performance presents Augustin Duques with the Gordon Quartet.

So easily did the genius create that when, six months after the symphony was completed, his father returned the manuscript to him the son wrote, "The music quite astonishes me, for I do not remember a note of it. It must be very effective." Incredible Mozart!

Brahms was forty-four (1877) when he composed his second symphony, only a year after his first in C minor. For a while the second had more popularity than the other but now the case is reversed. The work heard today is, however, deeply feeling and imaginative, with contrasting stretches of tenderness, tragedy and ingratiating sim-

Brahms' vocal duets and romances include "The Sisters," playfully telling of their love for the same man; "Convent Maid," sounding her longing for the outer world of joy; "Phenomenon," promising love to even the patriarch; "Messengers of Love," wooded paths that bear tender letters and hurrying zephyrs and running brooklets that carry kisses; "Edward," a gruesome ballad of a son who slew his father at the mother's bidding; "Good Advice," a mother warning her daughter against following a vagrant horseman; "So Let Us Wander," the romantic swain and his beloved setting out for adventurous life in the woodlands; "Witches' Night," a daughter discovering that her mother has been to the carnival of evil spirits on the fabled Brocken Mountain.

One of the loveliest examples in all chamber music is Mozart's Quintet in A Major, of idyllic and pastoral charm. The clarinet, which the composer especially admired, has prominent place in the four movements, the second of which has truly celestial melody.

The air, describing the cooling shade of a palm tree, is one of the best-known pieces of music in the world.

Eugen Zador, a Hungarian, recently settled in New York, furnishes a bright transcription of Moszkowski's (1854-1925) glittering piano piece, so often played by Josef Hofmann.

Harry Burleigh, New York colored composer, pupil of Dvorak, has made many song arrangements of spirituals. Jerome Kern's lasting fame probably will come through his great modern folk-song, "Old Man River."



## What Our Readers Think

THE mail to this department is steady, interesting and frequently helpful. Sometimes correspondents' remarks are in fact so unusual that they deserve much more space here than they may be given.

So, for example, the letter from Frank Ryan, of Auburndale, Massachusetts. He writes:

"What would the immortal Mr. Bach say if he could hear some of the organ music played on the air? His specially written works for organ are shunned in favor of operatic airs, dainty minuets not suited for organ, swing and every type of music except the fine fugues, etc., by him and other composers familiar with the organ—works written to bring out the depth, tone, and religious quality of the organ. Can't you reach the organists through your columns?"

There can be no refutation of Mr. Ryan's opinions. It hurts many of us to hear the noble organ do torch music and syncopated rhythm numbers. The instrument is entirely unsuited to such stuff, no matter how cleverly written. While orchestras, bands and pianos are available, there is absolutely no need to impress the organ into undignified service. So please, Messrs. Organists, consider yourselves reached through this column.

Mr. Henry M. McLaughlin, of Alsey, Illinois, communicates as follows:

"I should like to suggest something that might possibly become another program of good music on the air. We have a 'Hit Parade' of popular tunes. So why not also a 'Hit Parade' of classical works or something similar? Perhaps it could be worked out. What do you think?"

I think it is a desirable plan but would be difficult to undertake. The present "Hit Parade" bases its programs on the current universal popularity of certain light songs and instrumental pieces. The only way to air a "Hit Parade" of the classics would be to find out which the majority of hearers might prefer. A ponderous job, but not an impossible one. A better idea might be to use the lighter classics and select those known to be generally familiar. At any rate there is Mr. McLaughlin's suggestion for ponderment by the radio studios, sponsors and agents.

Lastly let me quote from Mrs. John McClure of Auberry, California. She agrees with the oft-expressed wish of this editor to see radio put forth a complete opera company of its own, now that the NBC Orchestra is a fact. Furthermore, Mrs. McClure gives the advice that "the major networks should duplicate what was done locally in Los Angeles last year, when an opera was broadcast by a cast of singers under the age of twenty-one. A milk company sponsored the program."

## Musician of the Week

(Bruno Walter)

THE thing that strikes one most strongly about Bruno Walter is his astonishing optimism. He looks out at the world with clear eyes, eager and expectant, as though life were still an exciting and unpredictable adventure. Although the war affects him deeply, as a German by birth, an Austrian by adoption and a Frenchman by recently acquired citizenship, he does not believe it means the end of civilization.

"Evil always makes itself felt more violently than good," he says. "Good is passive, but its very passivity is active, in that while evil burns itself out with the very intensity of its fury, good is attracting strength and power, quietly but effectively. I still think we shall see a better world and very soon, too."

When he talks, Walter waves his square, strong-fingered hands in emphasis of each point he makes. His voice is deep, and the foreign accent, while marked, is not unpleasant. It has the Austrian softness rather than the German gutturalness. Not very tall, his shoulders are wide, and his head big, crowned by what was once a leonine mane of dark hair, now thinning a bit. His mouth is wide and friendly, and his whole expression is distinguished by a sort of radiant kindness. One can understand why orchestra players adore him, and why they give him the enviable reputation of being the politest and also most considerate of conductors.

Born in Berlin (1876), Walter was for many years director of the Vienna and Munich operas, and has conducted most of the major symphony orchestras of Europe and America. He is also a first-class pianist, and a rare and delightful musical experience is to hear Walter both play and conduct a Mozart concerto, which, unfortunately for radio listeners, he is not scheduled to do during his present NBC series.

Although he is an ardent champion of modern music, Walter's programs are usually made up largely of what he calls "bread and butter music." He believes that the radio audience in particular prefers Bach, Beethoven, Mozart, Schubert, Schumann, Brahms and Wagner to more experimental and less tried and true music.

"The standard of radio listeners is high," he insists, "and conductors make a mistake in playing down to them. It's true that they like familiar things, but not bad ones."

As things look now, Walter will probably remain in America. He has been engaged as guest conductor of the New York Philharmonic for next season, and no doubt will appear again with the NBC Symphony.

but bids him to a duel to the death on the morrow. Sieglinde gives her husband a sleeping draught, and tells Siegmund of a fabulous sword which a mysterious stranger at her wedding had imbedded deep in the trunk of the tree around which Hunding's hut is built. Only a hero in distress could withdraw the weapon, spoke the stranger (Wotan). Siegmund secures the blade, and he and Sieglinde elope into the woods. The second opens with Fricka, goddess of matrimony and wife of Wotan,

FOR a full understanding of Wagner's "Die Walkuere" (The Valkyrie), of course one must know the complete plot of the four music dramas that constitute the cyclic "Ring of the Nibelung." However, as the entire time required for their performance is about fourteen hours, readers of this department may readily see how impossible it is to go into detail within the space of the present short article.

In "Die Walkuere," second of the "Ring" music-dramas, the god Wotan has raised a family of heroic sons and daughters (the latter, the Valkyries) who shall protect him and the other gods in their castle stronghold called Valhalla. Among Wotan's children are Siegmund and Sieglinde, who, however, have never known their father and become separated almost as infants. Sieglinde has been carried off and forced to marry Hunding, one of the grim enemies of the gods. Siegmund, a forest wanderer, pursued by Hunding and his tribesmen seeks refuge in a woodland hut which turns out to be the home of Hunding.

Siegmund is given food and drink by the lovely Sieglinde. They exchange stories of their misfortunes and mutual sympathy quickly turns to love. Hunding returns, spares Siegmund's life because of the strict laws of hospitality

demanding the death of Siegmund for violating the domestic hearth of Hunding. Wotan is compelled to obey the laws of the gods. Enters Bruennhilde, leader of the Valkyries, with her famous cry of "Ho-yo-to-ho." Wotan informs her that she must not protect Siegmund (although he is a hero) in his coming duel with Hunding. The eloping pair rush on, barely ahead of the avenging Hunding. Sieglinde drops into exhausted sleep, and Bruennhilde, bathed in mystical light, appears to Siegmund and announces that he must soon follow her to Valhalla. He refuses, unless Sieglinde be allowed to accompany him. Bruennhilde, touched by his love and devotion, resolves to help him kill Hunding, who soon finds Siegmund and then engages him in fight. Just as Siegmund is about to slay his enemy under the protecting aid of Bruennhilde, there is a blinding flash of light, Wotan stands before the group and, with his magic spear, shatters Siegmund's sword, who thereupon falls victim to Hunding. Wotan kills the murderer with a glance.

In Act 3 (preceded by the orchestral prelude, "The Ride of the Valkyries") Wotan punishes Bruennhilde for her act, but as she sinks to sleep Wotan sadly bids her farewell.

**E**AST met West, a New Yorker fell in love with a San Francisco Irish girl and out of the romance came the smoothest-working comedy team in radio and a marriage that is a model by any standard. For George (New York) Burns and Gracie (Frisco) Allen have made a success of everything they ever have tried to do—well, almost everything.

They have been associated for about half of her life, but before they happened to meet backstage in a New Jersey theater in 1922 their lives were as far apart as the poles. And their marriage proves that neither race nor creed is a barrier to happiness.

Gracie is as Irish as peat bogs and as sharp as a brier. She was born in San Francisco on July 26, in 1904 or 1906. She thinks her age is nobody's business but her own. Her father was a song-and-dance man and Gracie made her first appearance in San Francisco when she was three and a half.

"Prior to that time I was just a mere child," Gracie said. "But after three years of loafing I decided to make something of myself. My father bought me a full-dress suit with a top hat and a pair of red sluggers. Sluggers were red whiskers that roamed from ear to ear. I was quite a hit at three and a half. Mother wanted me to take dancing-lessons, but I wanted to continue my career. I made a great decision, one

of the first of my life. I rebelled against my mother's demands and ran away, about three blocks. But I got hungry and went home and started taking dancing-lessons."

She went to school at Sacred Heart Convent in San Francisco and at thirteen was doing singing-and-dancing bits on California stages. With her three older sisters, she formed the vaudeville team of the Allen sisters and eventually they joined Larry Reilly's company, where Gracie did a colleen part.

"Later, in Hoboken," recalls Gracie, "I was going to the theater one day and saw that we were billed simply as 'Larry Reilly.' He had dropped the '& Company.' Nobody can get away with cutting me out of the billing, so I quit."

For six months she hunted a job in New York and even took a stenographic course. "I don't think schools can teach you much," she said. "Otherwise, why do teachers stay in the same grade year after year?"

One day Gracie played hookey from the business school and went over to see her friend, Rena Arnold, who was playing in a theater at Union Hill, N. J. On the same bill was an act called Burns and Lorraine, and Rena introduced her to Lorraine, who was leaving his partner. Rena reckoned Gracie and Lorraine might work up an act together. But she also met George Burns,

Lorraine's partner, and George agreed to help them write an act. In fact, he wrote so much of it and thought it was so good that he decided to keep the act, and the upshot was he and Gracie agreed to work together and Mr. Lorraine did something else.

That was in 1922.

George Burns was born Nathan Bernstein (or something like that) in New York. He began trouping at the age of eight with the PeeWee Quartet. George had a good tenor voice in those days, but he often sang outdoors and the damp air affected his throat, ruptured his growing vocal cords and ruined his voice. That's why his voice is hoarse now.

**A**T THAT time Eddie Cantor was headlining week-ends at the Cannon Street Theater in New York for \$5. The PeeWees were glad to work on the same bill with Cantor for nothing.

At twelve George went into a sweatshop in the Bronx as a size-ticket boy and earned a few nickels by putting size tickets on garments. He went A. W. O. L. one day to go roller-skating and got the sack. He enjoyed roller-skating so much that he and a friend organized an act and opened at the Dewey Theater on New York's Fourteenth Street. Things were going all right the first night until George lost his balance and took a nasty tumble. He thought his career was ruined, but the audience howled. There is a bit of sadism in everybody and the boy had touched it by hurting himself.

He failed to fall in the next act and the crowd was cold, so on the manager's orders he took a tumble during each act—and it worked. Before he was thirteen he was playing comedy roles in Minor's Theater, and until he met Gracie he was with scores of acts, none of them anything to get excited about.

When George wrote the act for him and Gracie back in 1922 neither ever had done dialog. George made himself the funny member of the team and Gracie asked him questions. Their first booking was at the Hill Street Theater in Newark—\$15 for three days. But Gracie was funny even when she tried to be serious and got the laughs, so George switched the act and played straight.

Their show was known as a "disappointment act." They didn't have regular bookings but were substitutes. The idea was to stay right by the telephone until 2 p.m. on Mondays and Thursdays, the days theaters changed bills. Some regular act always failed to show up somewhere in the metropolitan area. The manager then would call Burns and Allen. "You'll have to fill in," he would say; "we can't disappoint the public."

A good "disappointment act" could get seventy-five books a year, which was better than regular bookings. Gracie and George were on a 60-40 basis, he got sixty percent and she got forty.

"I wasn't satisfied," she said. "I didn't like that 60-40 business, so we made it 40-60. I got forty and George got sixty, which was better for me."

# The WIZARDS of FARCE

Being the mad, merry story of how Burns met Allen to form radio's smoothest yet screwiest comedy alliance

They were doing all right. George wrote a new act called "Lamb Chops," and they gradually broke it in.

"While we were breaking in the new act," Gracie said, "George apparently got the idea that maybe I'd try to steal his new material. Anyhow, he announced that if I couldn't think up a good reason why I shouldn't marry him within ten days, we'd have to split up. I thought and thought for nine days, but I've always been unlucky at guessing games, so I decided to marry him on the tenth day."

It was 1926.

Now, that's Miss Allen's story, and it's very nice and all that, but it's not exactly true.

George had been proposing to Gracie at regular intervals during 1925, but Gracie had another boy friend who was taking a lot of her time and demanding all of it. Gracie kept telling George she didn't know if she loved him or not and finally George delivered an ultimatum:

"All right, all right, so you don't know if you love me? Either we get married in ten days or we bust up the act. I can't go on working with you this way."

That was Christmas, 1925. There was to be a Christmas party that night for the troupe, with a tree and everything. George was to be Santa Claus. But Gracie failed to show up at the party. She was with the other man. George was a bum Santa Claus, and after the party he rushed to his hotel, bolted the door and refused to see anybody. Late that night Gracie telephoned him. "I've been crying all night over the thought of losing you," she said. "I guess it must be love. We'll be married."

They were to be married in Cleveland. "The night before we left a town about two hundred miles from Cleveland," Gracie remembers. "We didn't take a sleeper because we were shy of money, but sat up all night. We got to a hotel in Cleveland at 5:00 a.m. George discovered that if he registered before seven o'clock we would be charged for a full night, so we sat in the lobby from five to seven. The justice who married us had wanted to go fishing instead and was in such a hurry he read the ceremony in double talk. He did such a quick job that when we came out the cab motor had rung up only ten cents for standing-time. We headed for New York. I had a new husband and we had a new act. It was such a sensation that we got three whole days at the Jefferson Theater. I don't remember whether they paid us or not, but we were a big hit."

They got a contract with R-K-O for six years. They played from Coast to Coast and in Europe and were offered several Broadway jobs but couldn't take them because of their contract. In England they appeared for the British Broadcasting Corporation, but were not too hot. The dizzy Miss Allen doesn't appeal to the British humor. They take her seriously.

The R-K-O contract expired on January 8, 1931. The next day they signed a Paramount movie contract, but in the meantime a seemingly unimportant radio incident occurred which changed their lives. During the last nine months of their R-K-O work they worked seventeen out of eighteen weeks on Broadway, and while at the Palace Theater Eddie Cantor, on the same bill, asked Gracie to do five minutes with him on

the old Chase and Sanborn program. She clicked and four weeks later Burns and Allen made their regular radio debut on CBS for the Robert Burns Panetela program.

"We've had many big thrills during our careers," Gracie said. "There was the time we were honored by being asked to take the places of Fred and Adele Astaire, who were then playing 'Funny Face.'"

"I can never forget our first movie appearance, a Paramount short. We had just come off the boat from England when we were asked to take Fred Allen's place in a short because he had been taken ill. After George had agreed, he discovered the picture was to be started the next morning. There was no time to write special material, so all night George muttered in his sleep as he tried to switch an indoor stage routine to fit an outdoor movie set.

"Next morning on the set George ran into Murray Roth, an old friend. When Murray told George he was the director of the picture George wouldn't believe him. To prove his point, Murray shouted 'Lights!' The lights went on and George fell back in awed respect.

"After about three years of broadcasting and movies came the biggest joy of our lives, the adoption of Sandra Jean Burns, followed by Ronnie."

In the old vaudeville days, Gracie and George were never happy unless they were living in a small hotel-room in the middle of New York's show life. But in 1934 they adopted Sandra, an Evanston Cradle baby, and their lives changed. They went to Hollywood and took an apartment, the first they ever had. They got rid of their wardrobe trunks, which, to a vaudeville trouper, is like parting with his booking-agent. Sandra made them realize they needed a home. To keep Sandra from being a spoiled only child they adopted Ronnie, then built a twelve-room house with all the trimmings for the children.

The lives of Burns and Allen now revolve around the children. They even go around telling their friends what the kids said that day. Their friends must be true friends to put up with it. Gracie went around Hollywood recently telling her friends about Ronnie's latest show of brilliance. "Mama," the child is accused of saying, "I've been a good boy today. I only hit Freddie (Astaire, Jr.) one time."

**G**EORGE BURNS is one of the best script-writers in the business. It was George and three associates who concocted the best radio build-up stunt in history—Gracie's missing brother. She got 350,000 letters from folks who wanted to help her find her brother. It just happens that Miss Allen has a brother, George Allen, a nice fellow who added figures for an oil company in San Francisco. He was plugging away one afternoon, never aware that 3,000 miles away in New York four men were plotting to change his life.

The plotters were George Burns, a press-agent and two representatives of the B. & A. radio show.

"Gracie is funny," said one of the men, "because she's always so dead wrong and so sublimely sure that she is right."

"Yeah," said George. "If there was an elevator strike, Gracie would ride up somehow, with a silly little smile on her face."

"I wouldn't be surprised if some night she popped up with a head full of crazy questions in the middle of an Eddie Cantor broadcast," said another.

"If she did, you'd have something," said the press-agent.

The following Sunday Eddie Cantor moaned into the mike, "There's a crazy woman here."

The woman said, "Oh, no. I'm Gracie Allen. I'm looking for my brother."

Half an hour later she popped in on the Jack Benny broadcast pleading, "Have you seen my brother?"

People began pointing to George Allen on the street. "There is the missing man," they said. He went into a movie, disguised. There he saw Gracie in the newsreel, pleading for help in the hunt. One lady next to the missing man said, "She'll never find him, she's too dumb."

It went on for weeks. Poor George Allen's life was not worth living. People would see a worm and say, "Don't step on it, it might be Gracie's missing brother." Showmen offered George Allen fancy dough to go on the stage. Photographers camped on his lawn. In New York one store advertised: "Visit our bargain basement. Yardage at great reduction and a chance to see Gracie's missing brother."

George Burns spent several hours each day wiring prison wardens who picked up suspects. The New York

Police Department, always ready for fun, dragged Fred Allen into headquarters and questioned him. In San Francisco, the police demanded of George Allen if his sister really knew where he was. In Europe our "superiors" remarked the hunt proved the American intellect still was in the incubator stage.

The hunt finally got George Allen down and he wired Gracie, "Can't you make a living any other way?"

And he left town. He really became a missing brother. Gracie then tried to cool down the hunt, but it wouldn't die. It took weeks to kill the stunt. The brother finally came back to his job. But he's always introduced as Gracie Allen's brother and the folks want him to do parlor tricks, and all. "I'm not funny at all," he moans. "I'm an accountant and just want to make a living."

He lives the life of a recluse. The sight of a camera strikes terror in his heart. He won't be photographed, even at family reunions. And he won't even listen to a radio any more.

Burns and Allen may be heard Wednesday over a CBS network at EST 7:30 p.m. — CST 5:30 p.m. MST 8:30 p.m. — PST 7:30 p.m.

**T**HE whirling black disks that go 'round and 'round on home phonographs, nickelodeons and radio turntables today spin a 700% sales increase over 1933, ebb-year for the recording industry. This revived interest in recordings is evidence of a significant note. America is more popular-band conscious than ever before in its history. A decade ago you could count big-name bandleaders on the fingers of one hand. Today there are at least thirty. And another thirty are at the jump-off, waiting to vault into the big time. This tremendous popular band interest has had varied causes. There was, of course, the advent of swing with its resulting publicity for bands and instrumentalists. Local popular-record programs in every leading American city have been another potent force. And some 300,000 automatic phonographs daily grind out popular musical wares in the country's taverns, restaurants and ice-cream parlors. Popular music cannot be denied. It's as much a part of the present-day American scene as baseball and radio.

Nor is there a maestro who will deny the power of one sensational recording. Witness *bandom's* most recent sensation, Orrin Tucker, and with one recording, "Oh, Johnny." Witness the *Inkspots* Quartet, who knocked about for years before a Decca waxing of "If I Didn't Care" catapulted them to the fore. Witness Artie Shaw's "Begin the Beguine." Your average maestro today hunts for one thing—one record.

A national association of florists recently selected Bea Wain, comely Hit Parade and Victor song stylist, to be "The Valentine Girl of 1940," and presented her with a huge heart of flowers. Bea took the heart home and set it up in her living-room. Now she wishes she hadn't. Because her cocker spaniel pup,

showing un-Ferdinand-like tendencies, ripped into it and Bea barely managed to separate the pup from the flowers before he mangled them.

#### Behind the Podium

Plenty of celebrating in the Bob Crosby camp these days: Trumpeter Billy Butterfield and trombonist Warren Smith are passing around cigars in honor of newly arrived heavenly bundles . . . The Ozzie Nelsons are due to pass the cigars in April . . . Erskine Hawkins' Bluebird waxing of "Tuxedo Junction" has clicked so well that the twentieth-century Gabriel is adopting it for his theme . . . Rumors flying thick and fast as to Artie Shaw re-entering the band business with a new combination . . . From an authentic source we have word that Artie will definitely return some time in February, and that he will return via the medium that first projected him to the fore—recordings.

#### Horse Appeal

Paul "Pops" Whiteman is probably the only maestro in the business to have "horse appeal" as an adjunct to the musical virtues of his band. Hal Kemp's band really hit the romance jackpot on its recent tour through snowbound Dixie. Hal and Martha Kemp celebrated their first wedding anniversary in Atlanta, scene of their honeymoon. Two days later, in the same city, saxophonist Johnny Van Epps married Elizabeth Little, his childhood sweetheart. That set trombonist Leo Moran thinking. He wired Rosa Sara, his childhood sweetheart, in New York. Down came Rosa to Atlanta by the first train to become Mrs. Moran. Two hours after the Moran nuptials, comic vocalist Jack LeMaire received word from New York that his wife had given birth to a seven-pound boy. Only shadow cast on the Kemp band's domestic bliss came when a trailer, in which vocalist Bob Allen and three of the musicians were riding, skidded on an icy road near Lula, Ga., and overturned. ## HOW TO LISTEN TO JUGOSLAVIA

THE kingdom of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes, officially known as the Kingdom of Yugoslavia, is, because of its strategic position as a key-piece in the Balkan jigsaw puzzle, coming in for more and more attention these days. Belgrade (Beograd), the capital, has boasted a 1,000-watt short-wave station, YUA, for some time. To supplement this low-power station, a new 10,000-watt transmitter was installed by the government last spring at Zenum, near Belgrade. An array of directional antennae was set up to make it possible for the new station to broadcast programs beamed on certain countries at will. The following calls and frequencies were assigned: YUB (6.100); YUC (9.505), omni-directional; YUD (9.505), directional to South America; YUE (11.735), directional to North America; YUF (15.24), directional to South America, and YUG (15.24), directional to North America.

YUB (6.100) comes on the air daily at 11:43 p.m. CST. WNBI of New York City occupies the same frequency until 12 mid. CST, but, surprising as it may seem, the Yugoslav station often overrides the more powerful domestic station. YUB is being heard with good signal strength; in fact, frequently louder than GSA (6.05), London, up to its sign-off at 1 a.m. CST, YUC (9.505) and YUA (6.100) broadcast expressly to Europe daily from approximately 11:50 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. CST. This program includes news periods with corresponding announcements in Albanian, Turkish, Greek, Rumanian, Italian, French,

German, Hungarian and English. The English news period, usually broadcast at 3:30 p.m. CST, is audible over YUC in the eastern part of the United States when reception conditions are favorable.

Operating as YUF (15.24), "Radio Beograd" broadcasts to South America nightly from 5:55 to 6:55 p.m. CST; as YUG (15.24), "Radio Beograd" broadcasts to North America nightly from 7 to 8:03 p.m. CST. Neither of these transmissions have been audible in North America, since winter reception conditions made the 19-meter band unsuitable for evening broadcasts from Europe. Although these programs should have been broadcast on a lower frequency months ago, it was not until January 21 that YUE (11.735) on the 25-meter band went into operation on an experimental basis nightly from 8:05 to 9:00 p.m. CST. This channel is much more favorable for this time of the year and this program is being reported with signals ranging from fair to very loud. Due to its location in southern Europe its signals are often audible when no other European stations can be heard. I suggest RADIO GUIDE reader-listeners write to YUE, "Radio Beograd," Belgrade, Yugoslavia, requesting that YUE (11.735) be used on all regular evening programs to North America, and that English news and announcements be included in these broadcasts.

Jugoslav programs open and close with the national anthem, consist in the main of folk-songs and folk-music, and short talks in Serbo-Croat and Slovene.

**BROADCASTS FROM THE FAHNESTOCK EXPEDITION:** As a supplement to Wilson Brown's item in last week's issue of Radio Guide, readers will be interested to know that all transmissions from the schooner "Director II," which is now bearing the Fahnestock Expedition on the first lap of its lengthy cruise to the South Seas, will be made over a 1,000-watt short-wave transmitter on one of the following frequencies: 4.797, 6.425, 9.135, 12.862, 17.31 or 23.100 mcs. As one of the primary objectives of the expedition is to collect and record primitive music of the native islanders, you can bet short-wave listeners will be in for some unusual reception thrills from out-of-the-way and colorful spots.

**FROM THE EUROPEAN ARENA:** Maybe you can help Desmond Callan of Readville, Massachusetts, identify these mystery stations. The first, announcing as "Radio Podedrad," broadcasts daily on a frequency of 9.98 mcs—in Italian from 1:40 to 1:50 p.m. CST; in English from 1:50 to 2 p.m. CST, and in

## WALT DISNEY'S "PINOCCHIO"

A Review

Producer: Walt Disney; story based upon Colodi's immortal story of same name; supervising directors: Ben Sharpsteen, Hamilton Luske; characters: Pinocchio, the puppet; Geppetto, the wood-carver; Jiminy Cricket, the puppet's conscience; Figaro, Geppetto's cat; Honest John Foulfellow, the villainous fox; Giddy, his assistant villain, a cat; Stromboli, villainous puppet-master. An RKO picture.

**W**ALT DISNEY has done it again. First with "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," now with "Pinocchio," the incredible Mr. Disney and his resourceful associates have produced a picture which will go down in history as one of Hollywood's greatest.

Although *MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE* originally scheduled "Pinocchio" for review next week, later arrangements were made to preview this film in Hollywood before the New York world premiere. In keeping with our policy of "All the news and all the reviews—first," we present it herewith.

More than 400 of the sophisticated reviewing press of Hollywood trooped to the Ambassador Hotel Theater on January 29 to see the film. The opening scene set the key and established the amazingly high standard of entertainment to follow. We heard a lovely voice singing a romantic lyric, "When You Wish Upon a Star . . ." You'll come away humming it, incidentally. Before the song's end, you learn that the singer is a ludicrous but very human little insect, Jiminy Cricket. From that moment on, "Pinocchio" is all wool and a yard wide.

Comparisons with "Snow White" are inevitable, and while the story is perhaps not as strong as that of "Snow White," it is much richer in humor while the cartoon and photographic effects are far ahead of the first Disney feature. A new multiplane camera has given a third dimensional quality to the film, which places it in a class by itself. Just as "Dopey" proved the scene-thief of "Snow White," so Jiminy Cricket—the earnest little insect assigned to be Pinocchio's conscience and guiding light—promises to become filmdom's "Man of 1940" when the scores are counted at year's end.

## "DR. EHRlich'S MAGIC BULLET"

A Review

**F**ROM the same studio which gave us the vivid and still-remembered "Confessions of a Nazi Spy," which marked a revolutionary departure into a new field for motion pictures, comes this film story as gripping, as authentic, as revolutionary in another field—that of social medicine. Without fanfare, fuss or the blare of trumpets, the press went to Warner's Hollywood Theater on February 4 to see, for the first time, an Edward G. Robinson who wore a beard. In fact, it took make-up men two hours each day to prepare him for the camera, and Robinson's son, visiting the set, failed to recognize his own dad in character. The press saw, too, for the first time, the entrance of motion pictures into the formerly tabooed field of social medicine, saw how delicately the subject may be handled under superb direction and skilful acting.

No less dramatic and gripping because it is the real story of a man who lived as recently as 1915, "Dr. Ehrlich's Magic Bullet" unreels the magnificent story of a medical pioneer who comes vividly alive in the excellent delineation Robinson brings to the screen. It is easily the best role this sterling actor has yet had, and he plays it for all it's worth. You follow him breathlessly through his heartbreaking experiments, through his battle to make German society of the early 1900's recognize his work on behalf of civilization, through his trial for murder when 38 men die as a result of his treatment. You will come away from the theater with a lump in your throat.

As the delicately executed story of a man who lived and died to better humanity, it is a picture every adult must see. However, we advise you not to take the children.

It wasn't because Mickey didn't wow audiences. He's never been accused of that. It was only that his parents decided he was too young for the stage, a decision from which Mickey ardently dissented.

**H**E SPENT the next year brooding over a fate which confined him to a backstage dressing-room while the elder Yules were out in front taking the bows, and when he was almost two years old, he decided to do something about it. What he did was to crawl through the door of the dressing-room and out onto the stage. There, in the spotlight, he interrupted the Yules' act with a sneeze that brought down the house, and completely stole the act when his dad gave him a French harp and let him do his stuff.

Today, Mickey attributes his love of music to the fact that a French harp gave him his start. (It's also true that



he's been stealing scenes and acts ever since.) Anyway, from that time on, he was a regular part of the act, working under a special permit given him by the then Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York. Governor Smith, at the same time, made him a special fireman also. Governor Smith, like Mr. Mayer, is still a very special sort of Mickey Rooney fan.

**A**T the age of six, Mickey's work gained the attention of a movie studio, which brought him to Hollywood to play the part of a midget in "Orchids and Ermine." One of his embarrassing moments came during its filming when, as he chewed a large, fake cigar in a very emotional scene, one of his baby teeth fell to the floor. The loss of the tooth proved a blessing in disguise, however, for it won him the tough-guy part of "Mickey McGuire" in a new series of Fontaine Fox comedies about to be made. It was as Mickey McGuire that young Joe Yule first became famous.

It was a sad day for Mickey when, at the age of twelve, he was adjudged too old for the part and dropped from the cast. In fact, he'd reached the awkward age—or so they thought—when his commercial value to Hollywood was exactly nil. But what hurt as much as anything was the fact that, when he left the cast, he was also forced to leave behind the name, Mickey McGuire, which he had made famous. The Mickey Rooney which he took at that time was a compromise name for the personal-appearance tour he planned, a name which, without infringing upon the protected Mickey McGuire, would still associate him with the character to theater audiences.

Back in Hollywood, Mickey swallowed his pride and the memory of his starring years and took bit parts and extra work that came his way. A hard worker with an amazing memory for lines and a fine flair for comedy—true comedy that ran the gamut from belly-laugh to the edge of heart-break—Mickey was soon very much in demand. Finally, for his work in "Hide-out," with Robert Montgomery and Maureen O'Sullivan, he was given a long-term Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer contract.

Mickey really went to work. A veritable avalanche of parts descended upon him. Then he was cast in a simple, inexpensive picture called "A Family Affair." "Family Affair" introduced the Hardy family to America, and no one was more astonished at its turning out to be a smash hit than was Mickey. It was clear that America had taken Andy Hardy to its heart. And it was plain that Mickey Rooney was Andy Hardy. That was four years ago. One Hardy picture has followed another, and as far as movie-goers are concerned, they can keep on forever.

**I**N his successful teens, Mickey "Andy Hardy" Rooney lives with his family in a comfortable, rambling house in Encino, a San Fernando Valley suburb. The family consists of Mickey, his mother, his stepfather, Fred Pankey, and Dick Paxton, his stand-in.

The Rooney house is on a five-acre plot, which furnishes the family its vegetables and garden stuff. There's a swimming-pool, but the house is in

no way gaudily luxurious. As a matter of fact, over the telephones are warnings, "Pay Phone" and "Take It Easy."

In the living-room, the Mickey influence is more keenly felt. One corner is jammed with drums and percussion attachments, and a beautiful piano—with a phonograph-radio attachment—is at the other end. The piano is Mickey's gift from his mother last Christmas. He once headed an orchestra and drove M-G-M bigwigs nuts with his solicitations of business. Mickey, you see, doesn't get his hands on much of that \$5,000 a week he rates. Half goes into a trust fund, the other half takes care of expenses, managerial cuts, taxes, etc. Mickey operates on a fifteen-dollar-a-week allowance and the band venture put extra spending money in his pockets.

**T**HE Rooney taste in food is simple. All he'd eat is steaks smothered in onions if "Mom" would let him. She doesn't. He also smokes occasionally and has a large collection of pipes, sent him by fans and directors and co-stars. In his bedroom closet are a dozen suits—business, sports and tuxedo—and seventeen pairs of shoes. His favorite sport is golf. One afternoon, Franchot Tone, Ed Sullivan, David Niven and Bob Montgomery—with an idea of deflating his ego—invited him to join their foursome at the Bel-Air Country Club. He did. More than that, he trimmed them!

Politeness is a virtue seldom associated with Mickey by fans. Yet he's a stickler for it. He never—as so many juveniles do—calls directors by first names. He's polite to strangers, even to autograph-collectors, and much of the criticism that has been leveled at him by columnists is due to this politeness. When a news cameraman asks him to do a screwball pose for a picture, Mickey is too much of a gentleman to refuse. And often gets criticized for so doing!

Andy Hardy is really responsible for much of this consideration. Mickey's whole philosophy of life has been tempered by Andy Hardy. "Andy's a swell kid and I try not to do anything Andy wouldn't do," is the way he puts it.
