JAMES MARION FIDLER is a gent who has got in Hollywood's hair on several occasions. He believes in straight talk. We submit this quotation from Jimmie's own splendid newspaper column.

"During the past few months movie production has resembled nothing so much as a 'smoking-car' story session. Each studio having tasted a few juicy financial returns from the peddling of salacious scenes, racy dialog, and anatomical exposure, now seems hell-bent on topping its previous breaches of good taste with others still more flagrant.

"But—a prophecy—the piper must be paid before long. The desk of this reporter, already covered with letters from indignant parents, is a warning . . ."

Jimmie Fidler wrote that exactly seven years ago. Recently he reprinted it with this remark: "The same paragraph could be written again today without changing one word."

Jimmie Fidler is more right than he is wrong. We have already called Hollywood's attention to the drinking-scene which is present in almost every movie. Jimmie Fidler's warning is another sign of which way the wind is blowing. Both Fidler and Movie-Radio Guide are interested in the continued success of the motion-picture industry.

These criticisms are meant to be helpful. We must not have another Legion of Decency crusade. But we must have a revival of responsibility on the part of all the producers. Only a few are offending today. It is those few who may infect the entire industry. An alert Motion Picture Producers' Association can stop the trend. We believe they will take steps to do so.

THE GIRL ON THE COVER: When Darryl Zanuck saw the lovely young ingenue of "The Male Animal" on Broadway less than a year ago, he knew that that actress—Gene Tierney—was just the person he was seeking for the leading feminine role in "The Return of Frank James." On the basis of that one look he offered her the part, she accepted and turned in such a fine performance that Zanuck then cast her in the coveted leading lady role of "Hudson's Bay," with Paul Muni. Her role in "The Male Animal" was Gene's first important part, and she went to the theater from New York social circles under protest of her insurance-broker father, Howard S. Tierney. her up for 'Second Chorus' she kicked off her shoes and I saw blood on her stockings. I insisted on looking at her feet. They were bleeding.

"When I asked her how it happened, she said it was from dancing. I told her she would have to give her feet a rest and a chance to heal or she would ruin them. She said: 'To hell with my feet, I'm going to put that dance over.'"

Burgess Meredith, star of stage and movies, has spent the last two months working with Miss Goddard in "Second Chorus," a musical in which she dances with Fred Astaire.

Burgess Meredith said—
"I think the greatest thing about Paulette is her sense of fun. Don't confuse that with sense of humor, because most of us lose our sense of fun while we retain our sense of humor. This quality fascinates all who get to know Paulette Goddard. It keeps everybody happy and does a lot to prevent friction.

"For example, we'd all been gradually growing more touchy over the limited accommodations of the studio where we were making 'Second Chorus.' And then, right under our noses, there suddenly appeared two beautiful white bungalows, standing side by side on the only green spot in the lot. We were told that one was for Vivien Leigh and one for Laurence Olivier.

"The day the honeymooning stars were to move into them we trooped off the sound-stage for noon and stood in front of the dungeons they called our dressing-rooms and glowered. I was

THE editor's letter said, "We want to present a complete picture of Paulette Goddard. After seeing her in 'The Great Dictator' and 'North West Mounted Police,' I feel that girl is going places. What does Hollywood think about her? Not just the people in the cafes, but the people who serve her and work with her and who know her best. Get me their opinions. Good and bad together, they should give the reader the best idea of a personality ever presented by a publication."

I said, "I'm talking to directors, make-up men, maids, fans, and even a guy named Joe. They know Paulette better than she knows herself. This story should be sumpin'."

Well, here it is for better or worse. Whether you like it or not, I'm certain you have never read anything quite like it. It proves one thing very definitely. It proves . . . but read these opinions and you'll see just what I mean. Here it is, a straight-from-the-shoulder consensus.

Dot Pondel has made up movie stars since the days of Gloria Swanson and Pola Negri. Many top-notchers won't

perform today unless Dot makes them up. Dietrich insists on having her. Hedda Hopper recently reported that two Paramount stars refused to sit for portraits because Dot was not on hand to do their faces.

Dot Pondel said—

"When Goddard wants something she really goes after it. My first memory of her is the day she said: 'If you'll make me up as "Louvette," the wolf-girl, in "North West Mounted," I'll get the part from DeMille.' I told her they were scheduled a week ahead on tests for Louvette, and that she would have to wait her turn, along with some pretty tough competition. But she said she didn't want a test, she wanted the part—and that if I'd fix her up she'd go over and cinch it.

"Made up, wearing the Louvette costume and talking the broken English she'd been practising for weeks, she broke in on DeMille and convinced him there was only one wolf-girl in Hollywood and she was it.

"She believes you can accomplish almost anything if you work hard enough. One day while I was making

about ready to throw a cobblestone through one of the bungalows when Goddard's maid Jennie came over and asked me if I would have lunch with Paulette.

"Where?" I asked, knowing Paulette's dressing-room was as skimpy as the others.

"In Vivien Leigh's bungalow." And that's just where all the cast did have lunch. Paulette had gotten in—through the window, I think—and had a real banquet sent over from the restaurant and spread out for us. There the dishes stayed, waiting to greet Vivien when she arrived.

"It's amazing what a little devilry like that did for the spirit of our company. That's why I think Paulette would be a swell person to have along on a shipwreck, or any time that things weren't going so good."

Nightly the somewhat plump figure of fourteen-year-old Jane Gorman circles and dodges the doormen at Hollywood's popular preview theaters, the American Legion stadium, and the broadcasting studios—in quest of autographs. Jane sells filled autograph books, and like the others in her business she instantly recognizes and pounces upon every star. Her opinion was based on personal contact.

Jane Gorman said—

"The kids who go to Catalina Island and have seen Paulette over there with her boat *Panacea*, and have seen her swimming and racing up and down the beach with Chaplin's two boys, say she's swell and a regular fellow.

"But the Paulette Goddard who hurries into the theater and brushes right past us—like she always does—isn't as popular. The other night when she did this I heard a man say: 'Who does she think she is?' The woman with him said: 'Isn't she supposed to be Chaplin's wife? I saw her in "Ghost Breakers," but I didn't see her do anything.'

"I've heard lots of nice things about Paulette Goddard, but that woman said she didn't like her in pictures because she thought she refused to autograph my book because she was stuck up.

"A theater doorman told me Paulette had signed an autograph once and it turned out to be a check or a bill or something that cost her money. But I don't know about that. Some stars make a circle around their name when they autograph—or draw a line through it, so it's safe. Paulette could do that, and then people wouldn't think she was stuck up."

TALMADGE MORRISON, Paramount still cameraman, has photographed practically every star in Hollywood, so he's immune to temperament. He shot Paulette Goddard daily on the "Second Chorus" set.

Talmadge Morrison said—

"The first thing I noticed about Paulette was how clever she is at posing. She knows all the camera angles, and when I started to tell her something she got it immediately. She'd turn her body just right to get the best effects. Of course, she learned that in modeling.

"She'd do anything to help me get a good picture, and never complained when I asked her to pass up a chance to rest between movie shots and pose for me. I don't think I ever saw her when she couldn't turn on a smile of greeting—or wasn't laughing.

"What strikes me most is that she never pulls any of that movie-star stuff on you—never high and mighty. And she's so much more feminine than most actresses. She's always the sweet type—never sophisticated. She isn't ever vulgar or loud. Yet she's always

in the center of the fun. She's so friendly.

"If all that's put on, like some people say, then it's an act she's been doing so long it's part of her. I know pretense and she looks real to me. She's so fresh and frank that she's like a girl from a small town."

Let's call this girl Mademoiselle X. She is a blonde, shapely, and intelligent in a peroxide sort of way. She is an extra and occasionally a bit player. Because pictures is her business, she has made a study of getting along with the right people.

Mademoiselle X said—

"I've been an extra for seven years. Once I thought I'd get real parts in pictures, but then I discovered that you have to have something I haven't got—and that Goddard has more of than anybody else in pictures.

"That's knowing how to play the game. I don't only mean by going out of your way to be nice to other players, like Goddard did when she watched a comedy scene in 'Second Chorus' a dozen times, laughing like

she was in stitches every time she saw it. But by being diplomatic in all sorts of ways and having the drive to push yourself places.

"Like Goddard, you have to radiate sincerity as well as being smart, so the people you're building up won't be afraid you're making fools of them, even though they love it. You got to make the men feel you're soft and idealistic—and the women feel you're regular and are kidding the fellows along because it's part of your job.

WHEN it comes to all that, and to handling people, Goddard's the smoothest of them all, and makes me realize that I haven't got what it takes."

Juliette of the House of Westmore is really Juliet Marglen. She is a businesswoman in her own right and Hollywood's last word in manicurists.

Juliette said—

"Paulette Goddard tries to buoy everyone up. She's the kind of person who goes to a theater and applauds

WHEN Brian Aherne decided, in July, 1939, to give a garden tea for Pierre Monteux, the orchestra conductor, the decision scarcely augured anything fateful. Monsieur Monteux had invited Mr. Aherne, the year before, to read Shakespeare with the San Francisco Symphony—an innovation that evoked pleasurable comment. What more natural than that Mr. Aherne should call to pay his respects backstage at the Hollywood Bowl when M. Monteux conducted there? Or that a garden tea should seem in order?

The trouble began when Mr. Aherne, having dictated a list of guests to his secretary, pursed his lips and added: "Include Miss Joan Fontaine. Her sister, Olivia de Havilland, will have her address." A memory had stayed with him, since that evening at the Bowl, of an odd and piquant face.

As the tea proceeded smoothly—in a Beverly Hills back garden, mostly lawn—the girl with the piquant face walked over to her host.

"How exciting, Mr. Aherne!" she commented. "That lady over there, who tells fortunes, predicts I am going to marry you."

"Very nice." Mr. Aherne's spoon rotated placidly. "Very nice, indeed." No exclamation points—merely a host's polite acquiescence.

"I don't know whether it'll be very nice for me," Miss Fontaine doubted. "I hear you're a bit of a stick-in-the-mud. You never go anywhere."

"Not at all," protested Mr. Aherne. "Most unfair." (That was a tender spot. When very callow he had gone dancing once with Mrs. Elinor Glynn, and that exponent of torridity stopped to admonish: "What you're doing's not dancing. Don't be a clergyman!")

Such early mishaps mark a man.)

Now, in his own garden, with an assured position in his particular field, Miss Fontaine's equally direct attack threw him off center.

"I do go out," he defended. "Why, I asked your sister, Olivia, for an engagement—a couple of times—a year or so ago, but she had something else on."

The face that had attracted in the half-light at the Bowl—and that spoke close now in California sunlight—disseminated a quality not unlike Elizabeth Bergner's. As if spirit underlay. And the surface—disturbing! The face's parts fitted only moderately well; freckles splashed a skin of exquisite texture. Ash-blond hair needed a tendril poked. Hazel eyes flashed candor and gaiety; in them pin-points of gold sparkled.

"Why," inquired this incitement to rashness, "don't you ask me?"

"Well!" Mr. Aherne stirred his tea agitatedly. "Well! I will. What day do you have available next week?"

"Either Wednesday or Thursday."

Never waste subtlety on man! During his early career Brian had refused eight Hollywood contracts on the plea, "If I lived in that place, sooner or later I'd do something incautious."

Now his teaspoon skipped round and round.

"I'll take Wednesday and Thursday."

Twenty days later, the suitor astounded Hollywood by flying north to ask the girl's mother for her hand. Eight days after that, Miss Joan de Beauvoir de Havilland became Mrs. Brian de Lacey Aherne.

An unusual and contrasting couple, the Ahernes challenge interest.

Brian's six-feet-two seems all com-

pact of mid-England reserve and thoughtfulness; yet looking into his blue eyes one reacts to zest as well as sureness. He has enjoyed life, in his considered way, while piling up stage and screen successes that "Who's Who in the Theater" requires almost a page to cite. Brian pilots his own airplane because he likes speed and the feel of power; he takes a nap before a flight so that his quite healthy nerves and brain will be at their best.

Joan is quicksilver to that steadiness. Born in Japan of English parents, with a flavor of French in the family strain, she was reared, American fashion, near San Francisco; returned to Japan for high school. Illness, each year through her thirteenth, caused almost every childhood plan (she was prolific of them!) to fall through. She tackled Hollywood at seventeen under a *nom de cinema* so as not to trade on sister Olivia's success. Followed four years' effort in a profession more often resembling a slot-machine than a career. For Joan, no jack-pot.

BRIAN faced his marriage with the pleased bewilderment of a confirmed bachelor who has discovered a happiness he didn't think existed for him. As change whirled forward for his way of life, he clung to the Englishman's dream—domesticity. "I want no actress wife," he said, and Joan agreed.

When this bride had been a small, freckle-faced girl, standing on the sidelines watching other children do things, she often told herself, "I'm good; I'll show them when I get the chance." To making marriage happy—a goal that swept all previous ones to insignificance—Joan brought more than enthusiasm—*resolve*. She chose

a formula: "I shall take away nothing—neither things nor people—from Brian's life. I shall only add."

Swift upset lurked to wreck Brian's actor-plus-housewife dream of domesticity. Against the disappointment, he wore double armor—a sense of humor; deep-rooted belief that talent should find expression.

Joan's determination to "order" marriage might have caused trouble. (The grim approach to matrimony seldom wins loving-cups.) But she was blessed with that love of mischief and fun that had sparkled at the garden tea.

Joan's gaiety lit her most important morning. Brian drove by Olivia's to pick up his bride-to-be—a travel-symphony in green and gold.

They swung through Beverly Hills to head for Del Monte, where wedding and honeymoon waited.

Joan clutched Brian's arm.

"Wait. A bookstore!"

"A what?"

"A bookstore. I see one. Just a minute!"

Green and gold flashed back almost as quick as her word, bearing a dictionary and a standard work on etiquette.

"Already," Brian mock-grumbled, "you realize you'll have to correct my speech and manners."

But Joan laughed. "No. Really. They just seem two ideal books to start life with."

When the last wedding guest had sped and the couple were alone in the honeymoon suite at Del Monte, Joan dived into a suitcase. Out came the etiquette. "The first line my eye falls on," she announced, "will be our guide in life." Opening, she read, "In small houses, where there is no third footman, it is permissible for the boots to be cleaned by the knife-boy."

Hilarity at this had scarcely died when the phone rang.

"Each listen at an extension, please."

A wedding present of charm followed. Jose Iturbi, calling from New York, played them a half-hour of Spanish music—de Falla, one of their favorites.

Handsets were cushioned. That phone (which had lulled them) rang instantly again. Each picked up a receiver.

For Joan.

"About 'Rebecca,'" said David Selznick (they could visualize him—wearing glasses, slightly stooped, glaucous-looking), "I want you to make a final test."

Bride and groom smiled across the instruments. Joan had tested for "Rebecca" each month for ten months. She was glad now to clarify, "No!"

AFTER Selznick had repeated the phone call every day for a week, Brian—due to go down for costume tests on a picture of his own—asked Joan: "Why don't you come along? After all, you tested four times for Melanie and three times for Scarlett!"

Ingrained reasons led Brian to accept what ensued; we'll glance at the reasons later. Meantime, with only light words between them, they faced the old bugaboo—a double-career marriage. (It's a real problem. An eastern writer recently spent three months in Hollywood seeking, on assignment, four such marriages—happy—among top actors. He went away discouraged.)

In the exciting upset time, forethought on Joan's part now bore fruit. In her swift week between wedding ring and ceremony she (an enviable size ten who can dress smartly in hand-me-downs) had skipped all

Vivien Leigh's Birthday



Ian Hunter (father of Gene Reynolds) and Gail Patrick (mother of Bonita Granville) supply the love interest. Jackie and Bonita turn in their usual competent jobs of acting, and young Gene Reynolds does a very fine portrayal of the youngster who is the center of all the sleuthing. Leo Gorcey, William Tracy, Tommy Kelly and June Preisser cause many laughs as the adolescent companion members of the murder-solving gang.

The film brings Jackie Cooper back to the studio where he first soared to stardom in "The Champ," and many of the other faces seen with him are those of youngsters recently acclaimed for their work in "Strike Up the Band." More than one hundred youngsters of high-school age are in film.

"GIVE US WINGS" mixes the Dead End Kids with the Little Tough Guys in a sprightly, laugh-getting set of circumstances. It is good, clean, wholesome entertainment.

The plot of the story fits very well what movie-goers have come to expect from these clever youngsters, and gives them plenty of opportunity to shine as first-rate comedians of the slapstick school.

The five boys (Halop, Hall, Dell, Punsly and Jordan) tire of working as mechanics on government planes, jump at the chance to fly for Victor Jory, a crooked crop-dusting contractor. Arriving at the scene of their new jobs, they discover the planes are unsafe to fly. Then an accident occurs in which one of the boys (Bobby Jordan) is killed. The resulting flight of villain Jory, his capture and prosecution through the youngsters' efforts, provide fast action and thrilling suspense.

Bobby Jordan, as the young flyer who goes to his death, turns in a very fine job of acting. So do Billy Halop and the rest of the Dead Enders. It's good to see Wally Ford again (as York) in a part he can sink his teeth into. It's a safe bet more will be seen of him—and soon—as a result of his work in this picture. Anne Gwynne capably plays the only feminine role.

The theme is one which is particularly timely in a period when more and more of American youngsters are turning to aviation as a life's work. It details the difficulties entailed in getting ahead in the industry thoroughly and in an authoritative manner and, in an entertaining and thoroughly diverting way, outlines the requirements in education and physical assets necessary for an aviator. Particularly interesting are the details of the widely expanding uses of aviation in agriculture and the hedge-hopping, crop-dusting methods which have become the vogue in agricultural sections of the United States.

The story is simple, but complicated by many slapstick situations. Baby Sandy is cast as the child of widowed Una Merkel, whose hand is sought in marriage by fireman Stuart Erwin and his rival, policeman Jack Carson. Miss Merkel has decided, however, that she will not remarry until Baby herself makes the choice of her new father. The romantic rivalry is intensified when fire-chief Edgar Kennedy and police-chief William Frawley learn that Miss Merkel's father, councilman William Davidson, has appropriation funds of \$250,000 which are to be spent on either the fire, the police, or both departments. So the fire and police chiefs attempt to influence the funds in their respective directions by winning Baby Sandy and Una Merkel as relatives in marriage. The resultant tug of war offers the excuse for the comic happenings, and the picture chuckles itself forward to an exciting and serious chase-finish at the scene of a big fire. A GOOD solid western with plenty of excitement, drama and lively outdoor romance, this presents a picture of the Texas Rangers far different from that held by most movie-goers. While the plot is serious, hard-hitting and fast-moving, it is relieved by light sequences in which Ellen Drew and John Howard, with a definite flair for comedy, bring ready chuckles from their audience, while the able clowning of Akim Tamiroff and the grouchy performance of the always able May Robson also serve to lighten the tension of a plot which grips.

When cattle worth a third of a million dollars are rustled from the range of Granny Dangerfield (May Robson), the Texas Rangers are called in and Rangers John Howard and Broderick Crawford set out to find the thieves. They manage to "plant" themselves on the ranch as men wanted by the law, are taken into the rustling gang, win their confidence and get their men. In the case of Howard, however, he gets not only his man but his woman, too, in the person of Ellen Drew, granddaughter of the irascible May Robson.

"Texas Rangers Ride Again" is a modern-dressed version of a plot many times told—the cattle rustlers, the rangers, the lovely young heroine. The sameness of the story is hidden behind many innovations and, on occasion, rich comedy. The film is particularly strong in the portrayals rendered by its very capable cast and for delicate directorial handling.





BASED on Somerset Maugham's famous story and play, "The Letter" is a stirring and emotion-packed picture which begins with a murder and ends with one, meanwhile giving Bette Davis an opportunity to add another powerful characterization to the long list which has won her so much acclaim. Since the story takes place on a rubber plantation in Java, two hundred rubber trees were shipped to Hollywood from that country for use in the picture. Tubs and cups for seven tons of liquid rubber, the rubber itself and rubber refinery and plantation equipment necessary for the setting of the picture also were imported. Although there are 280 nationalities, races and tribes registered in the real locale of the picture, only 230 are used in this film, since that's all the types that were available in Hollywood. Twenty-two languages and thirty-six tribal dialects can be heard in the crowd scenes. In order to be certain of accuracy, fourteen technical directors were hired, one of whom had the job of making certain that Chinese signs, used in various scenes, were not placed upside down by set-dressers. With the exception of several Orientals in the cast, and Bette, of course, the bulk of the principals are British. Gale Sondergaard, who is Danish, plays the role of the Eurasian wife of Miss Davis' secret sweetheart. Mongrel dogs, which wander through street scenes, were hired for five dollars per day; those which were required to do specific things made fifteen dollars daily for their owners. One hundred hammocks were imported for use in the picture, but cost more than the production department estimated. Three king cobras were hired at forty dollars per day each, but their deadly enemy, a mongoose, received only eight dollars. A bit crowded, and hard on the prop department, but accurate and true to life. Director William Wyler is a stickler for realism. He gets realism—and a powerful and entertaining picture as well—in "The Letter."

discussing the merits of one player over another. They beamed with pride when Richard Czerwonky, the eminent teacher of violin, offered his services as conductor.

Six months later, on April 12, 1926, the association was formally born. It became the only women's orchestra in the country to give a regular series of concerts since its first season. It also became the only women's orchestra to last for sixteen years!

Since 1926 it has been conducted by Ebba Sundstrom, a brilliant woman batonist, Alfred Wallenstein, Erno Rapee, Frank St. Léger and others, and is now under the permanent leadership of Izler Solomon. Lillian Poenisch, one of the original three, is assistant conductor.

The affairs of the orchestra are handled by a board composed entirely of women. Miss Poenisch was its first president. In those first difficult years she not only held this executive position but was first clarinetist and assistant conductor as well!

What sort of women are these who will sacrifice time, money and energy to an ideal, who have blazed a trail for sixteen years in order that their sex's ability might be recognized? What is the power of their love for notes and phrases that it draws seventy-five persons from all parts of a big city into a stuffy room to work for hours at a time without thought of remuneration?

I sat in their rehearsal hall and watched them. The room was long, thin and low. It was hung in faded, dismal green cloth which looked as if it had been there since the Chicago fire. Outside, elevated trains rattled back and forth endlessly. Inside, there were chairs and music stands arranged in a semicircle about a nervous little man with hands like a Hindu dancer's.

Work was in progress when I entered. Regardless of the trains which shook the building, the strings sang and the horns called to one another.

When the break came I met some of the musicians and began to see why this project succeeded where others failed. These people were workmanlike yet feminine. They knew their business yet they were attractive. All had a strange air of purpose about them.

Lillian Poenisch came first, a small, blond woman with blue eyes. She, as many of the others do, teaches. In her case, it is the clarinet at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago. Besides teaching and conducting the Woman's Symphony at occasional rehearsals, however, she is the conductor and founder of the Chicago Woman's Concert Band, which gave eleven performances last season.

She is not married, but there is

nothing of the "old maid" about her. She is as much of a "career woman" as an industrial executive or a movie star. She looks about thirty.

Miss Poenisch prepared for her work by studying the clarinet with Myer Lindemann, harmony with the famous Dr. Noelte, and conducting with Hans Lange, assistant conductor of the Chicago Symphony. Her orchestral experience dates from her teens.

Her loyalty to the Woman's Symphony is well known, of course, but once in a while it surprises even those who know her. For instance, I should like to see a male symphony member travel 1,800 miles to make one rehearsal!

A few years ago Miss Poenisch was on tour with the Dasch Little Symphony. The series of dates ended with a concert in New Orleans. After the final bars of that performance had been played, she grasped her clarinet firmly in one hand, her suitcase in the other, dashed for a train, fretted all the way to Chicago, leaped into a taxi, and made the rehearsal just as the first notes were being blown!

AFTER Lillian Poenisch came Evelyn Davis, the concert-master, who is remarkable not only in background but in musicianship and personal life.

Mrs. Davis began playing the violin at the unheard-of age of two and a half! She formally started her practice at four, and at nine played with the Chicago Symphony at Ravinia Park. She made her debut at Carnegie Hall in New York at fifteen and appeared there again at eighteen.

She is one of the few living persons who can say they have studied under the celebrated Leopold Auer, among whose pupils were also Fritz Kreisler and Jascha Heifetz. Auer, if the name is new to you, was to violinists what Toscanini is to conductors. Students fought to study under him. Mrs. Davis was such a fine instrumentalist that she was awarded one of his rare scholarships.

She married a violinist, just to keep the subject in the family. According to Izler Solomon, her present conductor, she is one of the few women to do this successfully. Fiddle-players are notoriously difficult to live with!

Mr. and Mrs. Davis have two children, a boy of eight and a girl of five. Asked how she reconciled her life as a mother with her work as a concert-master, she answered, "I just have to use the can-opener a little oftener, that's all! It isn't really hard. When it's maid's night out I have to get someone to stay with the children, but lots of people do that!"

What she didn't tell me—but what I heard from Mr. Solomon the next day—was a story about a serious ill-

IF YOU have listened to the Sunday afternoon schedule of the Columbia Broadcasting System you have heard a program entitled "Design for Happiness." It comes on the air half an hour after the concert of the New York Philharmonic-Symphony has signed off. It, too, is a symphonic program, but—outside of the excellence of the music—there the resemblance ends.

The orchestra which plays on "Design for Happiness" came up the hard way. It came into being with no money, no great conductor, and little prestige. It had the added handicap of necessarily breaking every precedent in sight.

Three young persons founded the Chicago Woman's Symphony. Lillian Poenisch, Lois Bichl and Adeline Schmidt, all excellent instrumentalists, discovered that no matter how well they played they still could not

get jobs in established orchestras because of their sex.

Yet they knew almost a hundred women whose musicianship was unquestioned. Discussing the situation among themselves, they decided they could form an orchestra composed of women and managed by women. It had never been done successfully before, but they could do it!

Inasmuch as they wanted this organization to be noncommercial, to be a unit held together solely by its members' love of music and of instrumentalism, they knew that the players they secured would receive no pay. They would have to donate their talents. The only means of holding the group together would be to create an enthusiasm so great that they would be willing to work for nothing.

The three began combing the city for prospects. They held auditions. They had long hours of conferences,

ness which her little boy went through a short time ago. The child had a mastoid which developed into spinal meningitis. And that isn't fun! Mrs. Davis was at the hospital continually. She had to miss rehearsals for the concert which was coming up at the Auditorium. The night of the performance, however, they could not keep her away. Regardless of her worry over her child, she knew the orchestra needed her, too. She played that night, wonderfully, and returned to her vigil. If there was any reason for her son's recovery, I would say that he had inherited strength and stamina from his mother!

Many of the members of the orchestra are married, as you may have suspected. One summer three of them were pregnant. I asked what they did about concerts at that time. The answer came back, "Oh, they just played!"

Stella Roberts, the first violinist, told me some of the personal details of the group. When there is a party, she said, the whole lot of them go together. They talk a lingo all their own. They have reams of stories which only they can appreciate, things which have happened in rehearsal or in performances. Sometimes they are a bit blunt with an outsider who tries to enter this sacred humorous circle.

They are kind to one another. When a member could not afford a necessary operation, the orchestra made all the arrangements for her to go to the hospital. They saw to it that she had a good doctor, and that her room was filled with flowers during her recuperation.

Stella Roberts, the violinist I spoke of a moment ago, is another remarkable person to me. In appearance she is a handsome, intelligent-looking brunette with black eyes. She dresses smartly, and the impression one gets from talking to her is one of wisdom and humor. She is intensely serious about the work of the orchestra, and—I gathered from other sources—one of its main supports.

She has been playing since she was six years old, has given recitals with the Chicago Symphony, and teaches theory and composition at the American Conservatory. Her professional schedule there includes seventy lessons a week.

She is outstanding in that her own training has been under Franz Kreisler for viola and Boulanger in Paris for composition. You will get some idea of Boulanger's importance when I tell you that Gershwin was also one of her pupils.

Miss Roberts told me that it had been a dream for a woman to conduct the organization, but somehow the members did not feel as if they "clicked" with a female on the stand.

They tried several men—Wallenstein, Czerwonky and Rapee among them—but still had not reached the pitch they wanted. The reason for this was that to those men the orchestra was not made up of *musicians* but of women. Masculine conductors could not forget that the bass-fiddle players wore skirts. Rather than taking the woodwinds on the merit of their musicianship, the conductors looked at their faces and became patronizing. The orchestra was somewhat of a joke to them.

The board and the members, according to Miss Roberts, heard about a young man of twenty-eight who was doing great things with the Illinois Symphony, a WPA unit. They went and heard him. Regardless of the fact that many parts of that group were weak, he was drawing music out of his men. Furthermore, he was introducing new music to Chicago. His audiences heard the first American performances of two Sibelius symphonies, besides many world premieres of important native works. Instead of lamenting the fact that his orchestra was not composed of virtuosi, this chap was making his concerts exciting. He was getting recognition from hard-headed and exacting sources. *Time* devoted a column to him. Samuel Chotzinoff sent for him to conduct the NBC Symphony. He was a young man worth watching.

He was Izler Solomon.

THE Woman's Symphony set about to entice Solomon away from the WPA and succeeded. Now came the old question of his approach to their sex. Would they be ladies or musicians?

At the first rehearsal, after meeting some of the members, Solomon stepped on the stand. He lifted his hands. "We'll begin 'Die Meistersinger,'" he said. That was all. But the Woman's Symphony had found a conductor at last.

Solomon has been good for the orchestra in more ways than one. He has given them confidence and excellent training. He has weeded out the less important members until today ability to play with the group is synonymous with excellent musicianship.

Because of his particular background, he has been the one person to create something great out of something merely good. He himself broke







ON A recent Saturday evening we were late getting home—we meaning Charlie MacArthur, my husband, and I. Traffic was heavy and I wished for an autogyro that could lift our car and fly it over the tops of all the other cars in that interminable line. The President was on the air that evening and we rushed through dinner, hurried into the living-room, and tuned in on the radio just as he was announced.

"Shall I light up?" Charlie asked. "No, don't!" I said. "The dark's peaceful and quiet."

When the President finished his speech we both realized we had made a discovery. For sitting in the dark, with nothing to obtrude upon our visions and then on our minds, we had been completely caught up by what was said—the way you're caught up by what the players say on the stage when you sit in a dark theater. Charlie hadn't been distracted by my new dress, which, now that I've worn it and it can't be exchanged, I discover is a color he dislikes. And I had had no lapses of concentration while I considered how the winter curtains should be hung or how the tufting had worked loose on a chair that had been re-covered only a month ago. In the dark we had listened deeply. And, consequently, we had gotten more from the President's speech than we would have otherwise—we hadn't cheated ourselves!

I also find it profitable to be alone when I listen to the radio. Some time ago I bought a small portable radio for my bathroom. And in spite of the fact that we have a Capehart in our house which we bought in a burst of self-indulgence we have never regretted—one of those bursts of self-indulgence which, I think, are seldom regretted—I've long chosen to listen to any program that promised to mean anything to me on this little machine.

My bath, I must explain, is actually a dressing-room with carpet on the floor and paper on the walls. So there isn't the reverberation there would be in a room all metal and tile. But best of all, here I can close my door on all family and household interruptions and distractions momentarily. Our daughter, Mary, can't tiptoe up to whisper, "Is it tomorrow we're driving to town with you, or the next day?" Our son, Jimmy, can't interrupt less discreetly but no more thoroughly by pushing his fire-engine back and forth across the door-sill. If the vacuum cleaner is being used—and it is, practically always—its drone sounds far away.

And I don't hear bells ring either.

Things are very different now than they were in our grandparents' time or even in our parents' time. If our grandparents or our parents wanted to hear Melba or Patti, wanted to see John Drew or Edwin Booth, Leslie Carter or Ellen Terry, wanted to hear the things presidents and statesmen and kings had to say in time of crisis, usually it necessitated both a journey and expense. So, too often, they never heard even that one glamorous or celebrated figure who, for them, stood out above all the rest. Whereas we sit in our favorite chair and the radio, like a magic carpet, brings the President, Winston Churchill, young Princess Elizabeth, Kirsten Flagstad, Toscanini, the greatest minds, the most colorful personalities, and the greatest artists who live today into our living-room. And because it is this easy for us we only half listen. When we aren't interrupted we interrupt ourselves. We get up for a glass of water. We straighten the blinds. We telephone a friend to suggest they tune in on the program to which we are listening because, indulged and sated, we pronounce it "not bad."

WE'RE spoiled! And because we're spoiled we're losers. For surely this is certain—when we only half listen we get only surface values, we miss the heart of the speech, the symphony, the drama, or the song. Actors and actresses have particular opportunity to know this is true: For, boring into the lines we study, greedy for every crumb of meaning, we many times come to an underlying theme. We try to pass this on to our audience. But, at our best, we succeed in doing this only for those who listen carefully enough to get undertones.

Take "Farewell to Arms," a very particular favorite of mine, which we did several weeks ago in the "Helen Hayes Theater." On the surface this is an exciting love-story about a soldier-adventurer and a war nurse. But underneath it tells how Catherine Barkley and Lieutenant Henry, never failing the love they know for each other and never stepping back to count costs, win even though they appear to lose.

I'll never be so old or impassive, I hope, that I won't be touched by the passage where he, telling their story, says:

Often a man wishes to be alone and a girl wishes to be alone too, and if they love each other they are jealous

of that in each other, but I can truly say we never felt that. We could feel alone when we were together, alone against the others. We were never lonely and never afraid when we were together. Not even at night. And the night can be a dreadful time for lonely people once their loneliness has started.

She's far less complex in her mental processes, but she speaks for all women who love when she tells him, so simply:

I want what you want. There isn't any me any more. Just what you want.

It's too bad not to listen—really listen. For we enjoy things only in proportion to the way in which we respond to them, and when we only half listen our response is only half what it could be.

"Victoria Regina" is a splendid illustration of everything I mean. Half listening to "Victoria Regina" you get the story of a little princess who became a great queen, but you're likely to miss a fine story of gallantry. When I first rehearsed the role of Victoria, which I played on the stage for a long time and more recently on the radio, I had a bad time with myself whenever I came to Victoria as an old lady. We're always touched, I think, when someone who is gallant does a good job and comes to the end of it.

It can't be easy to be a queen when you're a woman loving your husband and devoted to your children, and always those whom your heart prompts you to put first you must put second to your realm.

BECAUSE I found an underlying story in "Victoria Regina" I'm undoubtedly much more interested in Queen Elizabeth of England than I otherwise would be. I think she, like Victoria, knows the personal cost that is involved when a woman not destined or trained to be a queen is crowned. Elizabeth, unlike Victoria, isn't a ruler. But in the eternal details of human behavior—or royal behavior—the demands which once were made upon Victoria and now are made upon Elizabeth are identical. After Queen Victoria had been shot at while she drove in Hyde Park she bowed and smiled at those who lined the avenues down which her royal carriage passed, giving no sign that she was troubled. And not long ago Queen Elizabeth, walking through bombed areas of war-

stricken London and talking with those who were homeless, gave no sign she was apprehensive about a time-bomb which lay in the palace gardens below her apartment, or that fear is constant in her heart because her two daughters, being of the royal blood, cannot seek sanctuary in a safe land like other children, but must remain at home where bombs seldom cease falling, fires never cease raging, and epidemics and plagues are imminent.

Undoubtedly in this age of the radio—when beauty and drama, wisdom and humor are offered us daily—we can be happier if we'll but listen.

GREAT dramatists—to concentrate on the benefits to be derived from drama alone for a moment—are, for the most part, men and women rich in observation and understanding. And you will find the vicarious experiences to which their dramas introduce us can help you tremendously in your personal life. For, obviously, the more familiar you are with the many faces life can wear, the better able you will be to cope with whatever comes.

All of which brings me straight back to the need we all know to listen, really listen, to the radio, which is too likely to be accepted as an accompaniment for a game of solitaire or a casual glance at the evening paper. For the radio presents us with the greatest opportunity for both enjoyment and enrichment that men and women have ever known.

Because of that night when the President spoke and my husband and I, by fortunate chance, listened in the dark, I recommend doing this as a means of inducing greater concentration. And I also recommend listening where you can be alone.

Curtis Mitchell, editor of this magazine, tells me he listens to the radio best when he puts himself flat on the floor, oftentimes with his feet on a chair. He says: "In addition to this being a beneficial posture, it places me on the physical defensive. I listen without any impulse to get up or dash away on some whim or pretext. I listen because I'm interested, and I stay put because I'm lazy."

Everyone should seek to discover the way that is best for them to listen, the state of affairs that is most conducive to them giving a whole ear. For such richness flows into our lives via the air today that we impoverish ourselves foolishly when we're content with the half-loaf that is our portion when we only half listen.

PIONEER among the great of the theater in realizing the potentialities of radio as a medium of dramatic art, Helen Hayes has lent her talent to many broadcasts in recent years. Now she comes to the airwaves with her own radio theater—"Helen Hayes Theater." ON THE BANDWAGON



ACCIDENTS seldom bring anything but bad luck, but it was an accident which helped to shove Dick Jurgens along on the road toward fame and fortune. While just an ordinary trumpet-tooter in a small-time band, an auto crash caused an injury to his lip which necessitated his giving up trumpet-playing for a while. It was this incident which decided the boys upon the question as to who should be leader. As you will surmise, Jurgens was selected, and from the day he assumed the post the Jurgens band has steadily climbed the ladder to the point where at present they are regarded as one of the most popular orchestras in the field of entertainment. The Jurgens band, primarily noted for its sweet, smooth rhythm, can also "swing out" when the occasion demands. Added to these two accomplishments is a faculty for rendering side-splitting novelty numbers which have done much to make the Jurgens crew well known. Also a feature of the band's music is the playing of the celeste. For the information of those unaware of the nature of this instrument, it is small and upright, somewhat similar in looks to a studio piano. Music is produced by striking keys which in turn actuate small chimes that resound in a most pleasing tone. It is the use of the celeste, incidentally, which has done more than anything to give the Jurgens orchestra a mark of distinction. As a matter of fact, Ginny could have had a spot on the "Hit Parade" if Bing Crosby had accepted that ciggie sponsor's offer to head the show at a phenomenal salary. The idea was to team Bing and Ginny, but Mr. Crosby prefers to live on the Coast, so the deal has been dropped for the time being.

Bandata

Jimmy Dorsey and his band start a new series over the NBC-Blue network on January 3 called "Happy Birthday to You," which will have to be changed if the battle between the music publishers and the radio industry is not settled by that time. Benny Goodman has been breaking in his new band in small towns around New York before bringing it to the big city. There's talk that Count Basie may break up his band to join Goodman, which would make it quite an outfit, with Cootie Williams' hot trumpet already part of the band. Goodman has organized a sextet replacing the former quintet, and they tell me it's really something for the swing fans to hear. Before leaving on an automobile trip to Texas, Paul Whiteman auditioned his band for a soft-drink sponsor, as did Andre Kostelanetz. Woody Herman has insured himself for \$150,000. Guy Lombardo was plenty peeved at the Mutual network when they cut him off the air because he hadn't played the required number of BMI tunes up until a certain time. If you don't hear Guy over MBS from the Roosevelt Hotel, you'll know he's still mad at them.

ALONG THE AIRIALTOS

New York By Wilson Brown

ROBERT STRAUSS, the fifty-five-year-old radio actor who portrayed Lively in "Our Gal Sunday," is dead. His body was found in his car on his estate outside of New York Nov. 11. He died of carbon monoxide poisoning. Strauss left two notes. In one he blamed financial difficulties.

"HELLO, everyone. United Air Lines time. Boake Carter speaking. Near Centreville, Utah, a group of veteran airmen and aeronautical engineers are methodically and painstakingly going about the important job of tracking down in every detail the cause of an accident to a United Air Lines plane which occurred this morning. Aboard the ship were five passengers, a United employe and his wife, and a crew of three. The ship was found late this afternoon with no survivors."

So spoke commentator Boake Carter on MBS the other day in one of the finest examples of freedom of speech and freedom of sponsor cooperation radio has yet experienced.

Ten persons, flying in a United Air Lines plane, were killed. Boake Carter, on the air under United Air Lines sponsorship, told the story frankly and fully. Through one and three-quarter pages of script Carter read, giving the story. Not out of consideration for his sponsor but for the assurance of the flying public, Carter wound up his reporting of the accident with the information that, up to that morning, United had flown 38,500,000 safe miles and had finished a billion revenue passenger miles without accident. Pointing out the fallacy of the public to consider only the accidents, seldom the other side of the picture—the safety side—Carter ended by saying: "Trouble is we don't think of this record (safety), simply because it's so routine it ceases to be news."

A Curb on Freedom

Not so cooperative was one of Dorothy Thompson's sponsors. This commentator, also on Mutual, announced

at a luncheon day before the election that she was threatened with the loss of a radio contract because of criticisms she made of advertising agency "fear" campaign technique in the presidential campaign. Fred Mayer, who handles Miss Thompson's radio activities, confirmed the charge but added that the unfair sponsor couldn't cancel because of contract obligations. When this first thirteen-week series is over and contracts are due for renewal, we'll see if the threat is carried out.

The Election Wind-Up

If the political parties pay their bills, radio stands to make a lot of money out of the campaign. October billings at NBC were \$5,045,694; CBS, \$4,023,617; MBS, \$784,676. Included in these figures, and in the early November income, were the following political bills:

At NBC: Democrats \$350,000, Republicans \$300,000; CBS: Democrats \$319,300, Republicans \$274,600; MBS: Democrats \$133,310, Republicans \$127,260. Of course individual stations throughout the country got a slice of the political money over and above these figures. Whenever a political broadcast caused the cancelation of a commercial program, the political party had to reimburse the sponsor for his time and talent.

Gossiping About Personalities

Gabriel Heatter, long in ill health, is now doing his Mutual news broadcasts from fully equipped miniature studios in his New York apartment and his Long Island country home. . . . In the twelve years "The Goldbergs" have been on the air, one of the most famous characters of the

sketch has never been heard—Mrs. Bloom. . . . Rumors persist that the Friday night "Cities Service Concert," oldest commercial on the air, will soon fold. . . . Alois Havrilla, veteran NBC announcer, has joined the MBS staff. . . . Al Helfers, 255-pound MBS sports announcer, is the father of a second son, Ralph, born November 7. The baby weighed eight pounds fifteen ounces. . . . Minnie Dupree, "Aunt Jenny" actress, has a bandaged cheek, resulting from a peck by her pet parrot. The bird, says Miss Dupree, apologized in its best language. . . . "The Barn Dance" may make a visit to New York, the first time in eight years it will have operated away from Chicago. . . . Bob Ripley and B. A. Rolfe have been made members of the Winnebago Indian tribe of Wisconsin. . . . Red Barber and Russ Hodges will call the Army-Navy game for MBS listeners November 30. Hodges, new to the networks, has previously worked in Chicago, Pittsburgh, Washington and Charlotte. . . . There's a possibility that a new program, with Andre Kostelanetz and John Charles Thomas, might hit the air this winter. . . . "Plot to Overthrow Christmas," done on "Columbia Workshop" two years ago, will be repeated Christmas eve.

Local Color

An interesting tidbit came from Ed Murrow, broadcasting from London over CBS. A British dowager, he said, was climbing into a taxi as a bomb burst near by. "Wasn't that a bomb?" she asked the driver. "Why have we had no sirens or whistles?" "Lady," he replied, "we've got bombs. Don't worry about no whistles and no sirens. We can't have everything."



FM BROADCASTING GETS "GO" SIGNAL

AS A result of a public hearing last March, the Federal Communications Commission officially conceded the superiority of FM (frequency modulation) broadcasting over the type of transmission now in use and opened the way for its widespread adoption by providing thirty-five high-frequency channels (43 to 45 megs) for its exclusive use.

FM broadcasting offers a greater tone range than standard broadcast, thus appealing particularly to those desiring fidelity of sound. It is static and noise free, and allows the operation of an almost unlimited number of stations on the same channel without interference.

Engineering standards for the new service were set up in June. Under the FCC regulations, FM stations are available to every community. They are not subject to the same interference as standard-broadcast stations and, therefore, can operate on the same channel with less mileage separation. However, FM stations serving the same area are not assigned adjacent channels. As many as a dozen or more different FM stations using alternate channels may operate in a large metropolitan area. The stations are authorized to serve a specified area in square miles. To obviate possible monopoly and to encourage local initiative, no person or group is permitted to control more than one FM station in the same area and not more than six in the country. At the outset, FM stations must operate at least three hours during each day and three hours at night (except Sundays). One hour a day at least must be devoted to programs not duplicated simultaneously in the same area, which means programs distinct from standard broadcast.

On October 31, the final "go" signal for FM broadcasting was

given by the Federal Communications in authorizing fifteen applicants geographically scattered throughout the nation to engage in this new type of service on a commercial basis as soon as they are able to do so. More than twenty-seven million persons are embraced in the 110,000 square miles to be potentially served by these stations. The list is given below.

Some of these stations have been operating experimentally and hope to start commercial operation almost immediately; the rest have construction work to do before going on the air. More than fifty additional applications are awaiting early action by the FCC.

Introduction of FM does not make standard broadcast obsolete. FM has a more limited range and the rural areas particularly must continue to depend upon the present type of broadcasting for years to come.

Because of their different positions in the spectrum as well as other technical considerations, FM can not be received on standard broadcast receivers and vice versa. That is why certain manufacturers are making separate FM sets or a combination of the two. FM receivers are already on the market or will be placed on sale this fall by all leading manufacturers. Prices for FM receivers will range from approximately seventy-five dollars up. Combinations including all present broadcast and foreign bands as well as the new FM bands will be available at higher prices. General Electric is marketing a "translator" which, when used with a present-day receiver, will permit the satisfactory reception of FM programs. The price is fifty dollars. FM is definitely here to stay and persons purchasing new receivers—especially those in metropolitan areas—should be sure their new set includes the FM bands.

the worst act on the bill until she builds it up to where the actors outdo themselves. She'll laugh at your jokes and praise your work because she wants you to have confidence and make good.

"When I was starting out in business I had a hard time and was about ready to give up. I told Paulette I didn't think I could make a go of it.

"Don't be silly," she laughed. "Of course you'll make a go of it. With all the work and time you've put in—why, it just can't fail. Don't think of such a thing for a second. It's just got to come out right."

"That pep talk wasn't the only thing Paulette contributed. Without saying a word about it, she sent me a check for enough to carry me over the critical period.

"If you could see her smile and hear the ring in her voice you'd realize what I mean when I say that spiritually she seems to put her hands under you and gives you a lift. Her philosophy of life is never to fear anything—never to worry but just work and know things will come out all right."

Fred Astaire has a reputation for wanting his own way. As a dancer he is so far ahead of almost anyone else in Hollywood that he must choose a partner with great care. Significantly, he recently chose Paulette.

Fred Astaire said—

"I think Paulette Goddard is one of the most alert persons I've ever known. I was reluctant to dance with

her at first, but after a few rehearsals I was amazed how quickly she caught on. She seemed to learn not only the steps but the mood and rhythm of dancing. No doubt her athletic ability, her love of music and the thrill she gets out of life gives her the 'lilt' that expresses itself in dancing."

Boris Morros, producer of Paramount's "Second Chorus," starring Fred Astaire and Paulette Goddard, fought for weeks to induce Fred to dance with the fast-climbing Paulette.

Boris Morros said—

"When we decided to cast Goddard opposite Fred Astaire, I called her into my office and said: 'Paulette, we want you to dance with Astaire. But we can't expect him to agree to that until he sees what you can do. That means you'll have to spend seven or eight hours a day for six weeks or more learning to dance—and do it before you go on salary. And I'm not sure that even then Fred will dance with you. Are you willing to take that chance?'"

"She said she was and started taking dancing-lessons the next day.

"Some weeks later, after we started the picture, I told her that a badly executed dance would hurt Fred's reputation, and that he wasn't yet ready to consider dancing with her. 'I don't know what more I can do about it,' I told her, 'so now I guess it's entirely up to you.'

"She just nodded, then asked: 'Can you make me a record of the music we're to dance to?' I did, and she got a phonograph to carry around in her

car and played that music wherever they drove. She wanted to saturate herself with it so its rhythm would be second nature to her.

"She was working in the picture, rehearsing seven or eight hours a day with Fred and taking dancing-lessons at night. One Sunday I happened to go on one of the stages early in the morning and found her out there practising dancing to the record I made her.

She loves to go to the pool with her two great Danes. If she's not working, the three of them are in the water by nine o'clock.

"Miss Goddard has a most wonderful figure, and when she comes out of her bath she's beautiful. She doesn't worry about getting fat. Never diets, and eats anything she wants.

"Miss Goddard likes honest opinions. She's generous and she's sincere."

Cecil B. DeMille has been called the world's greatest showman. He rec-

ognizes showmanship in others. He produced "North West Mounted Police," in which Miss Goddard played Louvette.

Cecil B. DeMille said—

"Once Paulette Goddard grips an idea, no amount of discouragement can make her let go. For years she has wanted to be in one of my productions, and determined to make me Goddard-conscious. precedents as a child, he was a prodigy on the violin. He played his first concert at the age of seven in St. Paul, his birthplace. Later, when his family moved to Kansas City, he was chosen by a group of businessmen as a young person with a talent worth fostering and sent to New York. (This same group also became the god-fathers of Marion Talley.)

In New York he was a pupil of Michael Press, and went abroad with him. While studying on the Continent, Press received an invitation to come to Michigan State College in Lansing as head of their music department. He was to bring an assistant. Solomon, therefore, found himself an assistant professor at the age of eighteen, with a scholarship for further personal study, and a means of supporting himself.

A few years later he was made head of the WPA music in Michigan. He also formed the Lansing Symphony Orchestra, an organization remarkable for the fact that all its members were factory workers in and around the town. Some of them had to come as far as forty miles for rehearsals. Their concerts were free, but pie-plates were passed during intermission. Unorthodox, of course, but the men had to have scores.

Gabrilowitsch played with the Lansing Symphony, and was so impressed with Solomon's work that he personally donated three hundred dollars toward its success. Eric DeLamar conducted the orchestra, and took back tales to Chicago of the young man who was not afraid to attempt the impossible. Soon Solomon was called across Lake Michigan to head the WPA music in Chicago and to resurrect the Illinois Symphony.

In his work in Lansing and Chicago, Solomon learned how to build a symphonic group. He had taken factory hands and men on relief and created units which stood together, no matter what music was played. With the Woman's Symphony he was given a chance to work with seasoned and well-trained musicians. He had an opportunity to build something not merely good but great. The past two years have shown how formidable his success has been.

Credit for that success also must go to the women who follow their conductor's lead. Now some of the struggle of the first years is over. The Woman's Symphony has been recognized for what it is—a serious and hard-working aggregation whose love of music and faith in themselves have made them stick together.

Under thirty-year-old Izler Solomon they are introducing new works to American audiences via the radio and their monthly concerts in the Auditorium. They are opening a path for other women's symphonies to follow. They are proving that women are as important and responsible as men in the concert field.

And they are earning money, after sixteen years. Each Sunday they are being heard Coast to Coast on a program which pays enough to support them. It seems that not only that program but their work itself could be called a "Design for Happiness."
