HEDY LAMARR AND JAMES STEWART, comprising Hollywood's latest co-starring combine in "Come Live With Me," extract the last drop of sometimes light, sometimes deeply stirring whimsy from the amusing tale of a lovely Austrian refugee (Hedy Lamarr) who becomes the mistress of a wealthy American only to find that she will be deported unless she is married to an American. In a dingy lunchroom she finds a hungry, poverty-

stricken youth (Jimmy Stewart), who agrees to marry her for a weekly payment. But complications develop when both parties to the purely business-like marriage find themselves in love with each other. Miss Lamarr has her first chance at comedy not so hilarious as that of her last film, "Comrade X." For James Stewart, the role of the sensitive, down-at-the-heels writer is tailor-made, promises another great Stewart picture

boot a scenic blond in the bottom? Also hadn't he gone behind a bar to slug a harmless old barkeep in still another of his films?

And with what seeming relish did he perpetrate these acts of sadism!

Also true. Which only serves to make more glaring the conflict between Cagney the player and Cagney the person. They are miles apart.

In close-up James Cagney is a shy little befreckled man with a smile more often sad than sardonic, who hates violence so much that he never attends boxing-matches, talks in a low-pitched, clipped speech when he does talk (he prefers listening) and is at heart a farmer not a film player.

James Cagney off the celluloid is one of Hollywood's most unique practitioners. He has none of the chronic passion for being seen, noticed or mentioned in the press. He seeks out nobody and, on the other hand, accepts no would-be hangers-on and boot-lickers. He regards his employment as worthy and dignified but not

**S**HOOTING of "The Public Enemy" had just been completed, and a rough assemblage of the picture, fresh from the cutters, was being privately shown one evening to a group of Warner executives.

They sat there in the studio projection-room, spellbound and aghast, as reel after reel of terrorism, gang war, and mass murder unfolded before them. Picture over, they filed dizzily out into the daylight, almost nauseated with the hyper-realistic sequence showing the slaughtered James Cagney toppling over the threshold into his mother's house.

Unable to shake themselves loose from what they had seen, they marched over to the studio commissary taking their places without a word around a table, harking back, all of them, to that amazingly real representation of the life and death of a gangster that Cagney, a new arrival, had just portrayed.

Suddenly into this solemn group strolled Cagney, himself, and climbed up on a stool at the counter.

Rapt, they waited. Would the corpse speak? What command would it snap? A moment's deliberation and Cagney's voice rang out in modulated, scholarly tones:

"I'll have a tomato salad with mayonnaise and a pot of green tea."

The Warner men refused to credit their senses. No! No! It couldn't be. It was all out of focus. Gangsters don't operate that way.

This same refusal on the part of the

public to disassociate Cagney the actor and Cagney the man has been responsible for the fact that James Cagney is to the movie world at large the man nobody knows.

Wasn't he born in a flat above a saloon in the Upper East Side of Manhattan known as Yorkville? they demand. Wasn't he a veteran of numerous street fights? And wasn't he a grammar-school playmate of hoodlums who later graduated into the class of

top-flight criminals whose exploits were successful enough to get them an All-American ranking by the G-men?

You have to concede that the above is, in the main, true. And more.

Wasn't Cagney the man who startled the great film audience of this democracy by planting an escalated grapefruit in the face of a woman whose only sin was that of loving him too much? On another occasion, didn't he

glamorous. He is sociable to the nth degree, but it's the little man who gets the lion's share of Cagney's company. In fact, he treats his superiors (purely figurative) with a certain quiet contempt. His reasoning goes like this: The pictures in which he figures make money. That is all his masters ought to be concerned about. If they want to fraternize, let them pick out Errol Flynn on the same lot.

The press department of Warner's

has never given out the information, but Cagney is a fervent admirer of the ballet. Let any ballet of importance come to town and you will find him at the Hollywood Bowl, way up front. During the performance the Cagney features are lit up by a radiance never seen on land or sea. He's out of this world. Now and then when the music is singing and lovely, he will improvise in faint taps an accompaniment. This is a ghost out of his past making itself felt, Cagney the young hooper in the musical, "Pitter Patter," with Allen Jenkins doing some fancy stepping right next to him for twenty-five berries a week.

He's strictly a reserved gentleman. These things you don't hear from Cagney. When you meet him, he's more cordial than you'd expect, considering the fact that he's not terribly fond of interviewers. He rustles you up a drink, pours out a short one for himself and leans back.

If you're waiting for a cue, you're wasting your time. Eventually you lead out with a sappy "Exactly how old are you, Mr. C?"

He smiles that sad smile mentioned above.

"For real?" he demands.

then transplanting trees. When the winter blasts come and snow is piled up to the leeward eaves of the manor, Squire Cagney contemplates the glistening, white world around him and feels at peace with himself.

In Hollywood he finds his relaxation by chumming with a bunch of cronies, Hibernians, most of them, including Spencer Tracy, George Murphy, Lynne Overman, Frank McHugh, Pat O'Brien and Robert Montgomery. They take turns in playing host, meeting stag and making a night of it. Mostly they gab. Lynne Overman will tell about the time he got tossed out of the University of Missouri, and then Frank McHugh will tell even a better one. Maybe Cagney, who likes to listen, will get up to do a time step and will relate how Allen Jenkins tried to do it, when they were kids, and fell flat on his face. In a while all seven will be going at it, lickity-split, until the lady of the house puts in her appearance and demands to know what's coming off.

OR THEY will repair to Jimmy's stable at Santa Rosa where he's raising trotters to spend a week-end watching the nags go through their paces, while Cagney bares his great hopes for his super-colossal horse flesh. One subject they never talk about is pictures they have made or are making, unless it's to lampoon their own efforts, in which case all join in. But with malice!

One of Warner's top stars, he has a positive genius for timing and a sixth sense for knowing when a tag line sags in the middle. Take the time when Director Lloyd Bacon couldn't get a scene to come out right. The sock that the writers had planned just wasn't in the punch line that went something as follows:

"What was that foreigner's name—the guy who built the monster he couldn't stop?" Jimmy was supposed to ask with a sigh.

"Frankenstein," Joan Blondell was to reply.

"Shake hands with old man Frankenstein," was Cagney's come-back.

Even the electricians laughed. The scene was saved.

Empty lines are his most violent hate on the set. Any number of directors can tell a tale of how Cagney has said, "No dice. The guy's only speaking words." Then Cagney has introduced some by-play, or "business," worth a thousand words. Like the time, for instance, when he ad-libbed and administered a kiss to the startled Loretta Young instead of aiming a long speech filled with silly love-talk at her. The director let Jimmy's version stay.

A love of ballet is not the only Cagney skirmish with the arts. He plays the piano with the same hands with which he pummels a punching-bag every day. According to Cagney, he's an atrocious player. His pals tell you that he's wonderful. There was a time when he practised eight hours a day. He also strums a guitar but strictly private.

He delights in the fact that he can speak Gaelic. Few Irishmen can, much less a mere half-Irishman like Cagney, whose mother was Norwegian. He speaks Yiddish with an excellence that astounds his listeners. He is fairly good at German. Cooking is another one of his accomplishments, although he explains with typical Cagney self-deprecation that "I'm strictly a short-order cook." He likes to sail his boat,

# Pan-American Romance

**L**UCILLE BALL and Desi Arnaz may rise to greater cinematic heights, they may be toasted in the world's gayest capitals, they may become the idols of nations, but they will never know a moment more important than that one just a few weeks ago when they stood before a kindly, tolerant man who said, "I now pronounce you man and wife."

In that moment, they reached the beginning of whatever greatness is to come to them; for true greatness comes from within and not from shining electric globes. Then, they grasped the edge of such happiness as they themselves cannot possibly imagine, toward which they may pull themselves ultimately by their own mutual trust, sacrifice, and understanding.

For such a great romance as theirs there must be an appropriate continuation. Such a great romance . . . but shall we look into it closely and then decide?

The first sight they had of each other was certainly not love. It was horror. Six months ago, Desi, the dark-eyed Cuban singer who had smashed all records in New York as a night-club singer and as the lead in George Abbott's "Too Many Girls," was eating his first luncheon in the RKO commissary in Hollywood. He had stepped from his plane only that morning. His only anchor on reality was sitting beside him, George Abbott, who, having directed the stage version of "Too Many Girls," was now calmly putting away luncheon before starting work on the movie version. Between mouthfuls, he was telling Desi that the same cast would be used, with the exception of Desi's leading lady, who would be played by a movie actress, one Lucille Ball.

Desi nodded. He had seen her on the screen.

His mouth was full of baked beans when there came an interruption. Or an apparition. It was female. It had on a baggy coat, mussed red hair, and a black patch over one gigantic black eye. Desi looked at it, shuddered, and turned away.

The apparition talked with Abbott and vanished. Desi spoke up. "Who," he demanded of Abbott, "is that awful girl? Also, who hit her? Why doesn't she stay home with a black eye like that?"

Abbott grinned. "That," said he cheerfully, "is your new leading lady—Lucille Ball." He explained about the black eye. It was conceived in a make-up jar, not in a brawl, for her part in "Dance, Girl, Dance."

Desi felt discontent stirring within him. This Ball girl didn't promise much. One hour later, he changed his mind.

One hour later, the cast of "Too Many Girls" was seated around a table in a rehearsal hall, reading the script under Abbott's jaundiced eye. Desi, studying his, looked up to see directly across from him Lucille Ball, but how different now. She wore a pale blue sweater, tan slacks, and above them was the loveliest face Desi had ever seen.

Skillfully, he kicked her under the table. "Oh, pardon me," he murmured.

After the first reading, they began to rehearse. A carpenter working overhead, dropped a board and it struck Desi. He pressed his hands to his eye, groaning. Lucille ran for ice, brought it back, and applied it personally.

The touch of her fingers told him something. Never, so long as he lived, would he ever forget her touch on his forehead and his cheek. He groaned louder and louder. Lucille's solicitude increased accordingly. George Abbott looked at the eye, said "Hummmph!"

and the rehearsal was ordered continued.

He did a rumba. This dance had been done every night for a year, but this time it was different for a girl leaned lightly at the side of the piano. He finished with a flourish, put one arm on each side of her, pinning her against the piano.

That night Desi slid into a chair at Lucille's audition—and she stopped short in the middle of the song she was singing, which was "You're Nearer." All she could see was Desi's dark face above his white coat. Then she went on—but stumbling. It was the first time Lucille had ever fumbled a rehearsal of anything in her life. Director Abbott gave the whole thing up early, and Lucille and Desi rushed off into the night.

They went to a place that Lucille had never heard of—the Zerape Club. It's a Cuban night-club on Sunset Boulevard. When they walked in they saw George Abbott there ahead of them, with a girl. He beckoned. Desi asked Lucille if she'd rather sit with them—or alone? So they sat alone.

**T**HE next night they went to Ventura—a two hours' drive from Hollywood. Lucille had to be there for a personal appearance. Desi drove her in his coupe, which is battle-ship gray with a black top, red upholstery, and white tires. He drove at a hundred and three miles an hour—and he sang. He sang every song he had ever heard. He was showing off his voice, his car. They both knew he was showing off, and they had a wonderful time.

Their third date (the third night), they went to Ciro's night-club. Desi was in a dinner jacket, Lucille was in a flowing evening gown of white, and not wearing the first flowers he had sent her. They were orchids, and she hates orchids. But she didn't dare leave them in the ice-box at home, so she brought them pinned to her evening bag. She kept the bag on her lap, where they wouldn't show.

From then on, they went out every night for the duration of "Too Many Girls." Which means that they went out every night for three months. And if talking was something new for Desi, going out nightly was something new for Lucille. During her five Hollywood years, she had rigidly obeyed her own rule of not going out more than twice a month. But now she was out nightly, out until dawn.

They went endlessly to the Zerape, to Ciro's, to movies, to Grace Hayes' Lodge in San Fernando Valley, to dim little bars where Desi could talk. In Lucey's Restaurant, across the street from RKO studio, they met late every afternoon. Afterwards they often went to Desi's mother's for dinner—so that Mrs. Arnaz could cook Lucille her favorite Cuban dish, arroz con pollo. After dinner, they would begin their rounds. In the daytime, when they weren't acting, Lucille watched Desi play tennis or swim. Her only sport was badminton, at which she beat him.

A FEW STORMY moments and separations made their meetings enjoyable for Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz

She admired him as much as she obviously loved him. She liked his instant understanding of this strange new medium, the camera. She liked his technical knowledge of music, his sense of humor, his feeling for comedy timing—and the way he fought the title "glamour boy."

The calendar flipped to August 6, her birthday. He gave her five parties, one at the studio, at her mother's house, at Lucey's, at Grace Hayes' Lodge, and at Slapsy Maxie's night-club. There were birthday cakes and special flowers at all five. She received her first gift from him, a heart-shaped lapel watch.

Then came the end of "Too Many Girls." The last scene was shot and the next day she was to leave for San Francisco on a country-wide personal appearance tour. He was to leave for Chicago where "Too Many Girls" was to be on the stage again. They were very sad that night. Theirs was an exacting business and their careers pulled them inexorably apart. A year might pass before their life-lines met again.

So, like lovers down through the years, the "sweet sadness of farewell" was theirs that evening as they bowed to the inevitable. Tenderly, devotedly, resignedly, they parted.

So what happened? Who knows the vibration, the urge, or the occult influence that swept them out of their appointed grooves? The record says that Lucille Ball visited Desi Arnaz in Chicago in three swift, yearning visitations. The first was last Labor Day.

But a few weeks later, after one night stands all over the country,

Lucille's tour was completed. RKO wired her that she had earned a few days' rest before her next picture. She spent them in Chicago. Those three days of happiness were topped by their first bad quarrel. It came during their last hour together.

They had planned to spend it in the Colony Club. They were quiet, holding hands. A message for Lucille came from Charles Laughton at a near-by hotel. He wanted to talk to her, to explain why he wasn't going to do "Mr. Pinkie," the picture in which RKO had planned to star Lucille and himself. Lucille went for a few minutes, couldn't get back to Desi for thirty-five. When she returned Desi was outraged. He felt that he was more important to Lucille's last hour in Chicago than any business talk. When she returned he refused to speak to her.

So she got angry. She got up, stalked out, and began walking. A block away, she became aware of a disturbance behind her. It was Desi, in a taxi. He was cruising slowly beside her, pleading with Lucille to forgive him. After another half-block of walking, she did.

They had a hasty good-bye at the theater where he rushed onto the stage, straight from her arms. She sped to the airport, Hollywood-bound. Harriet, her maid, asked why she was so dejected.

"It's all over. I'll never see him again," Lucille said. "We'll be too far apart."

Back in Hollywood, Lucille found her mind uneasy. The symptoms were plain enough. Sitting on a chair and staring into space, staring into space while the mind toyed with a precious phrase or a word, or the sudden memory of fingers clutching her own and the hot, sweet strength of them.

She was playing Harold Lloyd's leading lady in "A Girl, a Guy and a Gob," and she had to force herself to think of her work. She was unbelievably lonely and depressed. Perhaps RKO's front office noticed this. They sent for Desi to come to Hollywood for the premiere of their movie "Too Many Girls."

Here was Desi's first wire to her:

Later Desi was wiring:

DARLING IT WAS WONDERFUL TALKING TO YOU TONIGHT BUT AWFUL WHEN I HUNG UP AND WAS LEFT ALONE. I LOVE YOU DEAR AND MISS YOU SO VERY MUCH. TAKE CARE OF YOURSELF AND BE GOOD. LOADS OF KISSES. DESI.

Then, November 1:

BABY DARLING I RECEIVED YOUR WIRE AND LOVED IT. I'M WRITING YOU A BIG LONG LETTER TOMORROW. I MISS YOU SO TERRIBLY AND LOVE YOU SO VERY MUCH THE DAYS DON'T SEEM TO GO BY. HOPE TO GET OUT OF THE NEW SHOW AND NOT HAVE TO BE AWAY FROM YOU AGAIN.

MILLIONS OF KISSES AND ALL MY LOVE. DESI.

November 5th:

I'M GETTING A RELEASE FROM THE SHOW. HOPE TO BE ABLE TO SEE PALM SPRINGS. WHOOPEE! LOVE, DESI.

November 8:

SWEETHEART IT IS WONDERFUL TO KNOW EXACTLY WHAT ONE WANTS. THESE FEW WEEKS AWAY FROM YOU HAVE BEEN VERY SAD AND PAINFUL BUT THEY HAVE SHOWED ME THAT I WANT YOU AND YOU ALWAYS. SO MAYBE IT WAS WORTH IT. I LOVE YOU VERY MUCH AND I WANT TO SEE YOU VERY SOON. DESI.

Through these wires, you follow the story. Desi had given up another Broadway show because it would have tied him down. After three weeks at the Versailles, he had agreed to four weeks at the Roxy Theater. But the future was open. And into the present—which was the Roxy commitment—Lucille was coming. She was coming East for a New York radio broadcast, and a one-day benefit in Milwaukee. So they would see each other.

But barely. Lucille spent two days in New York, then was off for Milwaukee. During those two days, Desi was playing five shows a day at the Roxy, the first at noon, the last at nine-thirty at night. "But don't worry," Lucille told Desi. "I'll be back in a day. It's a one-day benefit in Milwaukee."

Only it wasn't. The other four Hollywood actors scheduled to appear the following four days after Lucille couldn't get away from movies in which they were acting. So Lucille stayed on. One, two, three, four—and finally five days.

Desi called her every night, shouting—

THE almost universal desire mortals share to become invisible and wreak vengeance on someone for a fancied wrong, or merely to eavesdrop, is capitalized upon by this smart comedy co-starring Virginia Bruce and John Barrymore.

Barrymore is cast as an aged and absent-minded inventor, but he doesn't let that deter him from stealing scenes or injecting laugh lines.

Story concerns spendthrift playboy John Howard, whose last hundred thousand dollars has been paid out as heart balm and who must close

his mansion and cease financing scientist John Barrymore (previously sponsored by Howard's deceased father). Barrymore for the past ten years has developed no money-making inventions, but, just as Howard is to make the necessary retrenchments, he comes up with the invention of all inventions—a device to make animals or people invisible and keep them so for some hours at a time. With this, scientist Barrymore plans how he will recoup the Howard fortune. Model Virginia Bruce answers a blind ad for a subject with whom to make the initial experiment upon a human being. She cooperates because she sees a means of getting even with her employer. Exciting climax comes as a gangster attempts to wrest the invisibility secret from the professor and John Howard falls in love with Virginia Bruce.

PREMEDITATED murder, to rid the world of a scheming, evil woman, is the premise upon which this unusual story hangs, and it hangs high due to the excellent acting of Thomas Mitchell, who is aided effectively by Mona Maris, Geraldine Fitzgerald, Jeffrey Lynn and James Stephenson. "Flight From Destiny" is a psychological play. It probably is too much for the youngsters to comprehend, but adults will leave the theater enthusiastic over as good a group of performances as they have had the chance to see in many a day.

Thomas Mitchell is a college pro-

fessor doomed to die from heart trouble, Jeffrey Lynn is his star student, James Stephenson his friend and doctor, and Miss Fitzgerald plays Lynn's devoted wife. Mona Maris is the villainess of the piece and her portrayal is one for the record.

Mitchell, with a few months to live, becomes imbued with the illusion that he should do something for humanity before his passing. Learning then that his taking of the law into his own hands has caused a public wave of imitation, he decides to face his execution to set an example for others.

**M**AISIE, again in the person of Ann Sothern, turns from the troubles of the poor to those of a botched-up rich family in this, fourth of M-G-M's Maisie series, and in so doing she gains new laurels for her ability as a talented comedienne, and her performance is excellently supported by Lew Ayres, Maureen O'Sullivan and C. Aubrey Smith.

Despite these few script weaknesses, "Maisie Was a Lady" alternates laughter with tears most entertainingly, and tells the story of how Maisie loses her job as the "headless" woman in a carnival because of the

drunken mischievousness of Lew Ayres, wealthy playboy. Haled into court for his escapade, the judge forces Ayres to employ Maisie for the equivalent wages and over the same period of time she would have been employed at the carnival, and in "an occupation to her liking." Ayres takes her to his huge family mansion (recognized as the same mansion used in "Rebecca" as Manderly), where butler Walpole (C. Aubrey Smith) places her in service as a maid. The little toughie soon decides that the whole set-up is wrong, comes to the rescue, tells off the wealthy but careless father of Ayres and his sister. Maureen O'Sullivan, reforms Ayres and sets him once more upon the path of his stymied career, and wins his heart!

Final fadeout finds Maisie agreeing to be the lady of Ayres, but how the writers are going to get themselves out of this corner critics are still wondering. Maisie can't be tied down.

**L**OVERS of mystery will get their money's worth in this new Saint thriller, with murder at no premium. It's exciting stuff with a Palm Springs background that makes the real resort look dull indeed.

Returning from a trip abroad, the Saint (George Sanders) becomes involved in the safe delivery of three stamps, valued at \$65,000 each, to Wendy Barrie, heiress. Their delivery becomes a matter of no little consequence, as he soon discovers. Attempts are made on his life, and before the stamps are safely delivered to the girl three murders have been committed. However, the murderers are

captured, and Wendy keeps her stamps in the final reel.

Paul Guilfoyle is presented in this picture as Pearly Gates, a light-fingered individual who is trying to go straight and has landed the job of house detective. While he helps the Saint solve the mystery, he almost loses his job because the Saint assigns him to pick the pockets of practically all of the hotel guests in an effort to recover the stamps.

George Sanders is his usual suave, imperturbable self in this film, and Wendy Barrie provides feminine interest. Linda Hayes and Jonathan Hale give good performances.

MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE hazards the opinion that regular followers of the Saint series will find this latest picture highly diverting, although there was quite a difference of opinion among professional reviewers on the occasion of its preview.

# Parents

## SHOULD BE SEEN AND NOT HEARD

Meet a couple of chaperons who are really fun — Jane Withers' parents

IF THERE is one odious word in the English language, I would say it is the little number "chaperon."

Yet chaperons can be fun and can have fun, and do it with no loss of face by youth or essential dignity by adults. The secret is in knowing how.

I witnessed proof of that the other day when I talked to fourteen-year-old Jane Withers and one of her boy friends about their chaperoned dates, and watched her devoted parents, Ruth and Walter Withers, skillfully and unobtrusively guide her through an evening with a sixteen-year-old beau, Buddy Pepper.

To me it was an eye-opener, not in the behavior of young people, of which we read and hear so lurid much, but in the conduct of elders, of which so little ever seems to be printed!

All Hollywood knows that Janie is escorted everywhere she goes, and that every date with a young man (permitted only in recent months) carefully is chaperoned by Mr. and Mrs. Withers in person. Like others, I suspected this strict state of affairs rankled the pride of the kids considerably. It is common knowledge that most boys and girls, even in their younger teens, kick up one whale of a fuss when informed their dates must be chaperoned or else. It springs a deluge of tears and recrimination with the young ladies wailing, "You're treating me like a baby!" and the young gentlemen angrily snorting, "Oh, my good gosh!"

As result of the unholy commotion, the harassed parents are forced to feel as antiquated as dodos, or, if they yield the point, helplessly to sit at home worrying about their youngsters running around loose at night, heaven knows where or in what kind of company.

Offhand, there would seem to be more basis for resentment against the chaperon system in a case like Buddy and Jane than with the average boy and girl of their age. Jane has been a focal figure in a grown-up world for the past seven years of her movie career, treated pretty much as an adult by adult executives, directors, writers and so on connected with the studio.

Buddy, too, has been in the public's eye since he was a shaver of seven, when he made his first public tour as a concert pianist. At eight he was the star of his own radio program on station WHAS in Louisville, Ky., and

at eleven was the piano soloist of the Louisville Philharmonic Concert Orchestra. Most recently he has had important roles in Disney's new epic, "The Reluctant Dragon," and Janie's new picture, "Golden Hoofs."

Two such young people as Jane and Buddy, you must admit, would seem capable of making their way quite nicely in an unchaperoned world, and well might be expected to resent interference on the part of their elders. That's why I was amazed, to put it mildly, at their reaction when some friends were twitting them recently about the parental nursemaids who dogged their dates.

Janie just looked puzzled. "You're crazy," she answered them. "What you don't seem to understand is that Mommie and Dad make everything more fun!"

"And how!" Buddy echoed. "It's swell having them with us. They're modern, and they don't butt into things, and they're young, and they don't snoop, and—well, heck, they're not stuffed shirts. they're regular!"

Here was something new under the sun! Two healthy, normal American kids in the sophisticated setting of Hollywood actually defending chaperons and meaning it!

ASIDE from having a famous movie star for a daughter, and perhaps a little more of wordly goods than you and I, Ruth and Walt Withers are pretty much average American parents of today. I'd say they were near their forties, with all the outside interests natural to that age. She is a pretty woman with flashing black eyes, an excellent homemaker and charming hostess. He is a very tall man, concerned with his furniture business, fishing and penny-ante poker. She smokes a cigarette every once in a while and he takes an occasional scotch and soda. Neither is as good a dancer as you would expect with a famous "hooper" in the family to teach them the latest steps. I would call them no more and no less alert, well informed, or broadminded than other parents of their age.

How is it, then, that they manage to make the chaperon system work without estranging the confidence and companionship of young people? By what means do they succeed where other frantic parents fail?

The answer, I think, lies in their concept of the chaperon's duties and her fundamental function. Here is

the way Mrs. Withers expressed it:

"Because I insist on chaperoning Janie and her young men on dates does not imply either Mr. Withers or myself believes they would do anything wrong or misbehave if we were not there to prevent it. Emphatically not! Our experience with youngsters of today has taught us what inherently fine persons they are. But they are young and their sense of values and judgment necessarily must be equally immature. Unexpected situations can and do arise which call for steadier thinking and action than they can manage. That's where a chaperon should function."

The basic error many chaperons make, Mrs. Withers said, is the attitude they adopt toward their young charges. In effect it is a watchful-waiting disapproval, a presumption of guilt until innocence is proved. Immediately the all-important bond of confidence is broken and the implied distrust becomes mutual.

"I would say this to chaperons," she said: "Stop saying 'Don't' to the young people and start saying it to yourselves! Don't object to everything. Don't expect youth to act your age. Don't be so ready to find fault. Don't forget you are the fifth wheel of the party, not the mainspring. And above all, don't try to ape your youngsters, either in dress, talk or manners. If there is one revolting spectacle it is the middle-aged man or woman who desperately tries to be as coy and cute as the young people they are escorting. The youngsters may appear to approve and applaud such didoes for politeness' sake, but inwardly they are disgusted at your loss of dignity. When you kill their respect, you kill all control."

Once, Mrs. Withers said, she invited a group of young people to express themselves frankly and honestly on how chaperons "crab" a party, the commonest complaint made against them. Their answers gave considerable food for thought.

"They (the chaperons) object to noise," said one.

"They object to jitterbug dancing," said another.

"They correct your manners, like saying 'Sit up straight,' or 'Don't eat so fast.' It's humiliating."

"They threaten you, like saying, 'If you don't behave now, I'll not let you go out again.'"

"They butt into your conversation."

"They insist on limiting conversation to certain subjects, like school work or hobbies."

"They insist you play games, like spin the bottle, whether you want to or not."

"They're always sticking Emily Post under your nose. 'It's not proper to do this or that.'"

"They make you sit at the table and finish a course when the band is playing your favorite dance number."

Quite a bill of complaints, Mrs. Withers decided, and most of them justified because they added up to the one word, intrusion.

"By all means, participate in the

activities of the young people, but do it only at their invitation," Mrs. Withers recommended. "Never make them feel they must include you, and when you do join the fun, do it wholeheartedly in the gay spirit of things. None of the long-suffering martyr or see-what-a-good-sport-I-am nonsense.

"Be tolerant of horseplay, stunts and clowning, of squeals and shouting and sprawling in ungraceful positions. Youth naturally is noisy and physically exuberant, and there's no harm in it."

Although the Withers do not object to Janie having an occasional dinner-dance date at a night-club, a session at the bowling-alley, or an evening at the theater, they prefer to have her entertain her company at home, and toward that end encourage the young people to come by, suggesting parties, stunts and so on.

"THERE'S one bit of advice I would give parents," Mrs. Withers said. "Don't wait for your children to ask if they may have 'the gang' in for the evening; make the suggestion yourself and follow it up with the necessary provisions in the food line. Leave the actual plans to them, however; nothing crabs a party more quickly than too much evidence of parental supervision. You'll be surprised how eagerly your invitations will be accepted, particularly when the boys and girls realize you neither order their routine of fun nor spy upon them while they're having it."

Problems confronting chaperons when they escort young people in public at night are pretty much the same in Hollywood as in Lincoln, Nebr., or Squa Pan, Me. It's knowing how to handle them that spells success or failure. Here is the plan Walt and Ruth Withers follow:

**Night-clubs**—The reputation of the place is thoroughly investigated first, and if possible a visit is made to it without the young people to look over the floor show and general behavior of the older guests. If they are chaperoning only Jane and her beau, they sit at the same table with them; if five or six couples are under their care (which they prefer), they have a table for two by themselves and let the young people have a large table to themselves, usually ten or fifteen feet away but close enough for the public to recognize their presence. They do not expect the youngsters to dance with them, but do not refuse if they are invited. They keep a discreet watch over things, but never deliberately spy or eavesdrop.

**Drinking**—Soft drinks only are served the young people, a point understood in advance. Mrs. Withers never drinks an alcoholic beverage, but Mr. Withers has one or two if he feels like it. Any other action, he feels, would be hypocritical and would be judged by the young people as such. He believes, however, that adults should limit their drinks in front of young people, no matter how well they may be able to manage a dozen or more. The same rule applies to

smoking, taboo for the youngsters and indulged in moderately by the elders. If a boy or girl under legal age presumes to drink or smoke, Mr. Withers does not forbid it; he says only, "I don't believe I'd do that this time; none of the others are, you see." It always is sufficient deterrent, with no one embarrassed by the incident.

**Deadline**—This is agreed upon by the entire party in advance, much the same as a time limit is set for a friendly poker game. Eleven-thirty to midnight, or until the first floor show is over, is the customary curfew for night-club dates, and ten-thirty is deadline for bowling, skating and such.

**Finances**—Everyone pay his own way at sports events. If the Withers invite the young people, Mr. Withers pays the entire check at night-clubs. If they are invited by the young people to chaperon the affair, the check is whacked up equally between Mr. Withers and the other "men." He believes this not only feeds their self-respect and pride but teaches them valuable lessons in keeping their spending within their means.

**Plays and Movies**—The nature and content of the play is investigated by Mrs. Withers before plans are completed for attending it. Should some unforeseen and distasteful feature arise, they sit through it quietly and leave at the end of the act. To founce out in indignation at the time of the occurrence, Mrs. Withers feels, only places undue emphasis upon the unfortunate matter.

**PERFECT** proof of the wisdom of such a course was demonstrated at a night-club recently when the Withers chaperoned Jane and Buddy on a date. A new number was added to the floor show, an extremely sensual dance by an extremely undressed woman. Mrs. Withers was sick with concern. Suddenly Buddy addressed the table.

"Gee," he said innocently, "she reminds me of an old history teacher I had in Kentucky!"

Hilarious laughter naturally greeted the remark, and the dancer and the dance were forgotten.

Mr. Withers summed up the essence of successful chaperoning in this fashion:

"It's not so much what you say and do as the way you say and do it. Differentiate between a command and a request and youngsters will cooperate one hundred percent. No one wants to be told to carry out an order, but everyone likes to grant a favor. This is particularly true of young people in their relationship to their elders."

Nor is the debt all on one side in this chaperoning business. Being around young people, joining in their activities and fun strips years away from parents and makes them young again. That's something no money can buy.

"It's also good for the waistline," Mr. Withers added with a chuckle. "Since Jane and her friends have been chasing me all over town, I've lost forty pounds around the middle!"





## Event of the Week: The Inauguration

AFTER the delivery of Lincoln's inaugural address, Chief Justice Roger B. Taney administered the oath of office in the presence of thirty thousand people." So says an Inaugural Souvenir of the year of 1901.

At this moment in Washington there is a veritable frenzy of excitement and preparation for the Day of Destiny, January 20, 1941. This year we prepare not for thirty thousand visitors but for four hundred thousand. In most available spaces along the line of march stands are being constructed. Every window, every nook and cranny that is available for onlookers is being booked. The 1941 Inaugural Committee is up to its ears in work.

In this year 1941, however, half a million people is a small percentage of our population. Across the length and breadth of America are settled one hundred and thirty-one million more citizens, most of them anxious to have an eye-witness account of the pageantry of the most spectacular event in America. It is for those millions that the Columbia Broadcasting System, the Mutual Broadcasting System and the National Broadcasting Company will exert themselves to the fullest. Unlike the day of Lincoln, when only thirty thousand were present, today due to radio a presidential inauguration is of the people, by the people and for the

people of the entire United States, not to mention the millions of listeners in foreign lands.

Radio came of age on March 4, 1925, the date on which Calvin Coolidge was inaugurated President in his own right. On the night before Mr. Coolidge's inauguration, Kenneth Berkley of WRC, a Washington station, phoned Frederick William Wile, newspaperman and first radio political commentator.

"We've gotten permission to have you broadcast from the inaugural microphone tomorrow," he told Wile. "Can you have a ten-minute talk ready?"

It was the first time on record that a private citizen was privileged to stand in such a spot immediately before the induction utterance of an incoming President. Frederick William Wile, as a private citizen, uttered some fifteen hundred pungent words anent the presidency. Today we "private citizens" of CBS, MBS and NBC are up to our ears in preparation for the approximately 100,000 words that will pour from loudspeakers on the afternoon of January 20. That estimate, incidentally, does not include the innumerable pre-inaugural broadcasts that have commenced even as you read these lines.

Of the last four inaugurals, two have been wet. Mr. Hoover was thor-

oughly drenched in 1929, Mr. Roosevelt in 1937. On such occasions the crowd thins out perceptibly. Speaking of the 1937 event, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt said, "If anyone asked me my impression, I would say umbrellas and more umbrellas."

Radio's business is to be on hand regardless of the weather. Umbrellas or no, some two hundred persons actually will be involved in bringing the three-hour drama to the ears of the world. The engineers of all three major networks are busy, cocking an eye at strategic spots for microphones, cajoling authorities into granting permission for this or that pet stunt, completing the most elaborate plans for the most extensive coverage of any single event in any single city. In short, radio is having a field day.

The King and Queen of England received no such attention as is being planned for Washington. Franklin Delano Roosevelt on his third fateful trip down Pennsylvania Avenue to the shadow of the Capitol dome. From the moment that the President leaves the White House until he reaches the reviewing stands at the east portico of the Capitol, he will be under the constantly alert eyes of radio announcers and commentators. The three networks have each chosen some thirty pick-up points.

Ambulant announcers probably will stroll the Avenue, carrying small microwave transmitters powered by dry cells. Mobile units, which are more powerful transmitting stations on wheels, will dash madly up and down the line of march before and during the parade. On the reviewing-platform where the President will be administered the oath of office by Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes, stationary mikes of course will be placed. Along the route will be radio's "private citizens." Atop the Treasury Building, perhaps, Hugh Conover of CBS, Stephen McCormick of MBS, Bryson Rash of NBC. Farther down the line, mayhap perched in a tree or atop the Post Office Building, Frank Blair or Ted Dunlap of Mutual, Ray Michael or George Gunn of National, Charles Daly or Joe King of Columbia. At the Capitol, Carleton Smith of NBC, Bob Trout of CBS, and Mutual represented by the writer. We, among others, are familiar with the Washington scene. From New York, Chicago and other points will come more "ad-lib experts."

Crack commentators of all the networks will be on hand. Al Warner of CBS, Fulton Lewis, Jr., of MBS, H. R. Baukhage and Earl Godwin of NBC, trained men all, wise in the ways of Washington, ready to interpret every word, every gesture.

Maybe you don't know it now, Mr. and Mrs. America, but you've been presented with a seat, fourth row center, at the greatest American pageant of our time!

THE NEW YORK PHILHARMONIC ORCHESTRA, CBS. Bruno Walter, conductor. Symphony No. 3 "Eroica" (Beethoven), La Mer (Debussy).

This, from every angle, is the most exciting program of the week, not only because of the two great works listed but because Bruno Walter is one of the few outstanding conductors of our time.

Beethoven's "Eroica" Symphony meant to depict the life of a hero, was originally dedicated to Napoleon. In fact, the idea for it was suggested to Beethoven by one of Napoleon's generals. Beethoven, always a liberal in his political viewpoint, admired Napoleon as the champion of the people. But when Napoleon made himself emperor, Beethoven retracted the dedication, and this writer has seen the score on which he scratched out Napoleon's name so savagely he left a hole in the paper. From beginning to end the symphony is a work of tremendous strength and nobility, with an exultant, triumphant finale.

In "La Mer" (The Sea) Debussy tried to express three moods of the sea, "From dawn till noon," "Play of the waves," "Dialog between the wind and the sea." The music is misty, evanescent, follows no definite pattern of melody but breaks over one in shimmering waves of sound. Don't concentrate too hard as you listen to it but let your mind wander where it will. You will find that the music fascinates you and impels you to day-dreaming.

### THIS WEEK'S OPERA: "Otello" on NBC Saturday

"OTELLO" is based on Shakespeare's "Othello," story of the Moorish governor of Cyprus who is deceived by his false friend, Iago, into believing his wife, Desdemona, unfaithful. He strangles her and learns too late of her innocence. In the first act, crowds await Otello's return from the Turkish wars. Iago connives with Roderigo to get Cassio, Otello's friend and lieutenant, into trouble. Otello dismisses Cassio for being drawn into a brawl. In Act II, Desdemona pleads for Cassio, and Iago convinces Otello that her pity for Cassio is a sign that she loves him. Otello falls into a rage, and Desdemona, in an effort to quiet him, wipes his brow with her handkerchief, which she drops unnoticed. Iago retrieves it and tells Otello he found it in Cassio's room. In Act III, Otello, insane with fury, insults his wife publicly, is relieved of his post as governor and replaced by Cassio. Otello enters his wife's room and, shouting recriminations, strangles her with a pillow. Too late, Iago's wife, Emilia, reveals the plot; overcome with remorse, Otello stabs himself. But it all turns out happily and leaves a pleasant ring in your ears.

Smartly Edward G. Robinson and "Big Town" capitalize. This week Steve Wilson, himself an editor-publisher (but a humanitarian first), runs into a hypothetical but realistic offshoot of the issue. Steve probes

into the balking of a plan to clean up "Big Town's" slum areas. When he attacks the politicians behind the situation, they try to curb his *Illustrated Press* by the enactment of legislation. Resourceful Steve has the answer.


## PLAY OF THE WEEK:






## "JOYCE JORDAN, GIRL INTERNE"

**P**ROBLEMS of a profession and problems of the heart—these two seem to conspire against the happiness of Joyce Jordan, *Girl Interne* (portrayed by Ann Shepherd Monday through Friday over CBS). If one kind of problem is solved, the other kind arises, and both are inevitable for a career woman in love. At least that's the way the serials have it.

Joyce turns down one proposal of marriage because she is unwilling to let love interfere with her career. Engaged to Neil Reynolds, a hospital trustee, she breaks the engagement because he wants no career woman for a wife and insists that she forsake medicine. Later she meets Paul Sherwood, a newspaperman (Myron McCormick). Tired of Neil's old-womanish ways, she is attracted by Paul's outwardly flippant attitude, and as the culmination of a triangle affair in which Paul resists the amorous advances of nurse Hope Alison (Charlotte Holland) and becomes steadily more in love with Joyce, the two are married. Joyce continues her hospital work while Sherwood is scooping all of the foreign

correspondents in London regularly. Encouraged by his wife, he continues his work and is making a name for himself as they keep in touch with one another through endless transatlantic telephone calls, which are conveniently arranged without regard to cost in the world of serials.

Meanwhile, Joyce plugs bravely along, greatly assisted by the kindly Dr. Hans Simons (Erik Rolf), head of the hospital staff. She needs his help. *Girl internes*, if Joyce is a fair example, have a hard row to hoe, faced as they are with the usual hardships of internship in addition to difficulties injected by unfriendly women who attempt not only to ruin a girl's career but her romantic life as well. When listeners heard Paul take off on the *Clipper* for London they thought Joyce's problems would now be confined to her work. In this they were mistaken, for Joyce is now in the throes of another problem. No doubt listeners will hear it solved—and another will speedily arise, for all sunshine and no shadows would make Joyce a very dull girl indeed.



## WHAT YOU CAN LEARN FROM LILY PONS

And why she's the best-  
loved of the prima donnas

**T**RUE gaiety is of the spirit. It is enhanced of course by perfect physical health but one of the gayest women I ever knew was ill for the major part of her life. A successful and beloved stage actress, she was forced to interrupt her stage career and for seven long years adapt her brilliant mind and gay, generous heart to the life of an invalid. All through those years she was amusing, entertaining, courageous—and a student. She studied and read and, when she went back to the stage, returned in triumph without any extra rehearsals, without terror. For years thereafter she was one of the finest of our actresses—but never strong. After the war, in which she spent herself for others, she was definitely through as far as the stage went . . . or was she?

Suffering from a malady which attacked her eyes and forbade her the joy of reading, suffering from a throat affliction, and later from a broken hip, she made her life a shining example to those who knew her. Gaiety bubbled from her as champagne sparkles in a glass . . . true gaiety, of the soul. She had endured the most crushing of personal emotional sorrows, she had triumphed over a fragile body. She never lost her zest for life, her interest in young people. She occupied herself with a little theater which was built for one of our colleges and named after her. She even played there . . . in a Browning piece which called, I believe, for one exit only. Everyone adored her, and from her friends derived strength and gallantry and something of her own

gaiety. When she died a few years ago for many people a shining star left the sky. I know it did for me. Her name was Annie Russell and she was a very great person.

Gaiety is not wise-cracking. It is not finding the chink in another person's armor and widening it by the application of a verbal crowbar. It is not wit at another's expense—the sort of wit which is praised by the crowd and considered smart. It is not making a fool of yourself—or of anyone else. It is not callousness, and it is not achieved through stimulants. It springs from within, it is a flowering of the spirit, a quirk of the mind, a love of life, a sort of inner happiness which comes through, smiling, no matter what one's personal disasters may be, no matter how difficult the struggle.

One of the great personages of opera and screen is Lily Pons. She is a near neighbor of mine in Connecticut.

From the tremendous demands of opera to the equally tremendous but dissimilar demands of the screen . . . and then back to opera and concert again—that's Lily Pons. The career of an opera-singer must be approached with gravity and a dedication to what is perhaps the most difficult of all the arts . . . the most exacting, both technically and emotionally, and the most perilous. When a prima donna makes a screen picture and finds she has a sore throat, production can be held up until she has recovered. But when she is scheduled to sing on a certain night in the Metropolitan and finds that she cannot—well, the opera goes on but she does not . . . or there is a last minute change in the bill.

**T**HE opera-singer has as a rule a very delicately balanced physical and emotional nature. She is subject to depths of despair and to great fatigue and worry. In other words opera-stars do not always hit just the high spots, emotionally, but the low ones as well. Most of us know this temperament, share it ourselves, the up-swing, the down-swing. But the really great artist knows it, more thoroughly, and more often, than the rest of us. Do not confuse this with the ordinary interpretation of temperament which is so often plain bad temper, lack of control and self-discipline, jealousy, or just an act. This balance, easily disturbed, between heaven and earth, is true temperament and is born into the world with its possessor. Lily Pons knows all about it, and it appears that she has learned to be gay in order to give herself some emotional protection.

In a picture she once made Miss Pons played opposite that magnificent clown Jack Oakie. One hears that he treated her rather as if she were his stooge and that, far from rebelling against this, she loved it. Long before the picture was finished she was copying his methods, his technique. Occasionally she might object to or postpone something the director wished her to do—which was Mr. Oakie's cue to remark, "Come on, Sister, show 'em that fighting spirit!" And in a few moments Miss Pons would be laughing with him, clowning a little herself, and afterwards, nothing was too hard or too unusual for her to do. When she left the set to drive to her dressing room, Mr. Oakie would insert himself in the driver's seat with an air of greatest dignity and solemnity, but the tiny Miss Pons would sit on the top of the back seat of the open car, graciously blowing kisses and behaving generally as a returned Channel swimmer or Atlantic flyer.


She might have made it heavy going for all concerned. She might have made difficulties and taken herself with a deadly seriousness. She did not. Her gaiety arises from her race, and from her heart and soul. She has learned how much good it can do her and others. And as far as I know it has never been employed to hurt other people. In other words it is true gaiety, the expression of a real person, without artificiality. Perhaps the Greeks had a word for it. Undoubtedly the French have. The word in Italian which most nearly expresses, for me, the sort of nature from which true light-hearted gaiety is inseparable, is *simpatica*. Lily Pons is gay, friendly and happy-hearted . . . and *simpatica*.

## ON THE BANDWAGON

**A** SURPRISE to many Americans will be the fact that Hawaiian music is not usually preferred by Hawaiians. But that does not mean that Hawaiians do not know their music or its makers. Ask any Islander who is the best interpreter of their rhythms and he will say, Ray Kinney. The reason is simple. Despite his Irish name, the Kinney lad is half native Hawaiian. As a result Ray's music naturally reflects the spirit of the Islands. After receiving his primary education in the Hawaiian public schools, Kinney went to Salt Lake City where he obtained his high-school and college training. It was while at college that Ray and his brother formed an orchestra known as the Kinney Brothers' Orchestra, and played for most of the big school dances. But when school days were over the band was broken up, Ray returning to the Islands which he loved so well. This sojourn in the land of "Aloha" was interrupted by several trips to the U. S. during which he worked on a number of radio programs, acted in a musical show and in the movies. One of the movies in which he appeared was Bing Crosby's "Waikiki Wedding." Ray and a band which he formed, also made a number of records of island music. He is credited with popularizing such hits as "Sweet Leilani," "To You Sweetheart, Aloha," and "My Little Grass Shack." In 1937 the Kinney recording band became a public dance band when it was engaged to furnish authentic Island music for the now-famous Hawaiian Room of the Hotel Lexington in New York. The band, while there, hung up a booking record, playing for twenty-two months without a break. In January of 1940 Kinney and his band made a trip to Hawaii, being triumphantly received. Kinney and the band are now on a

cross-country tour of theaters and hotels. With them are the famous "Aloha Maids"—who are lovely to look at. Charlie Baret, who has been p-f-f-ting with the musicians' union, has agreed to forget and forgive. Maybe it was his recent marriage to his vocalist, Harriet Clarke, which had something to do with the change. Sammy Kaye and Bea Wain have contributed one hundred hit records to the Bundles for Britain organization. They will no doubt serve to enliven the gloomy atmosphere of London's air-raid shelters . . . Two of Erskine Hawkins' band are now one. They are trumpeter Marcelius Green and warbler Dolores Brown . . . Jimmy Dorsey's band boasts thirteen dogs—and that's no insinuation, either . . . When Gene Krupa gets through with his music-playing every night, he tosses his drumsticks to the dancers just like a bride throws her bouquet to the bridesmaids, and you should see the wild scramble that goes on . . . Speaking of sticks and stuff, have you ever seen the baton that Jimmie Lunceford uses? It measures forty inches at least, and if anyone uses a longer one we have yet to see it.

## News from the Music Front

CONTROVERSY still rages fiercely over Walt Disney's "Fantasia," both in and out of musical circles. It moved Dorothy Thompson to a now celebrated diatribe in her column, savagely decrying the film as degrading. Musicians are firmly planted behind opposing barricades of opinion. Non-musicians flock to see it and come away with a bewildering assortment of reactions. The whole issue won't have any visible effect on the fate of the world, but Disney certainly started something that will take some time to settle.

It seems to me that in the big battle of "Is 'Fantasia' in good taste or not? Does it help or harm music to illustrate it?" the adversaries have, as usual, forgotten the vast general public, who don't care a hoot about such matters but go to the movies to be entertained. Is it really hurting them and not the music to see a Disney

vision of Beethoven's Pastoral Symphony? Or is it creating an enormous potential new musical audience by exposing good music to thousands of people who consider it an unapproachable, highbrow art, in a class with the Einstein theory? I contend the latter, and am so firmly convinced of it that I'm conducting an experiment. The switchboard operator in the New York office of MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE, Miss Renee Rinner, is a young, charming and intelligent girl, up to date on all the latest shows, movies and books but to whom good music is a closed book. She gets a frightened look at the word "symphony." Soon she is going to see "Fantasia." She is going to give me her reaction, which I shall pass on to you in this column next week. What I believe is that she will be so interested by what she hears as well as by what she sees that the next time one of the "Fantasia" numbers is played on the radio, she will listen to it and not turn on another program. And if "Fantasia" can accomplish that with at least one out of every ten people who see it, then its job is done, musical purists to the contrary.

If you remember the picture "Golden Boy," in which a violinist becomes a boxer and then realizes

that boxing has ruined his hands and his musical career, you probably thought the story was far fetched. But such a case actually exists, although the musical career was saved in time. William Primrose, acknowledged by many as the world's foremost violist, was a boxer once, and gave it up because it was spoiling his hands. He was also a referee, and a few weeks ago went back to his old job for one night, when he refereed boxing matches at New York Lotos Club. From all accounts he knew his business. Among the interested spectators was Emanuel Feuermann, the cellist, who was seeing his first boxing match. He liked it and came away with a taste for more. Which reminds one of the story of the famous Russian pianist, who was taken to see his first prize fight at Madison Square Garden. Casting an eye over the huge crowd, he asked:

"How many people are here?"

"About twenty-five thousand."

"How much do they take in?"

"As much as two hundred thousand dollars."

The pianist looked thoughtful for a moment and then sighed, "I think I chose the wrong profession."

### Record Review

Last summer Leopold Stokowski assembled an All-American Youth Orchestra, with which he toured South Amer-

ica. Its few appearances in this country brought cheers from the critics, and there was a general demand that the orchestra be subsidized to prevent its breaking up. The protest was not strong enough, and the organization disbanded. But its melody lingers on in several recordings, notably the new Columbia release of the Tchaikowsky Sixth "Pathetique" Symphony (M-432, \$6.50). In it you will find Stokowski at his best and finest, the best happily overshadowing the worst. The tendency to exaggerated sentimentality is forgotten in the tremendous climaxes and glowing passion which Stokowski evokes. The recording is a good one, and although there are other recordings of the "Pathetique" that might be preferred, this certainly ranks among the best of them.

## Musician of the Week Helen Traubel

First American-trained Wagnerian soprano; she's never seen Europe

SOME years ago the late Otto Kahn, banker and famed patron of the Metropolitan Opera Company, was asked by a reproachful music critic why the Met did not use more American singers.

"But my dear man," Kahn protested, "that's not our fault. Of course we know that there are hundreds of fine young American singers. But take the women, for instance. The majority of them are light sopranos, who all want to sing Mimi in 'La Boheme,' or 'Madame Butterfly,' or 'Manon.' Where are the girls who can do Isolde, Bruennhilde, Sieglinde or some of the many other great dramatic roles? Show me one, and we'll sign her up at once."

The critic had no answer to that. But today he would have had. Because now we have such a singer, who not only sings those roles but who learned them in America without benefit of any European training. In fact, she's never been to Europe. Helen Traubel is the first American-trained Wagnerian soprano this country has produced. And she has turned out so well that conductors like Damrosch, Barbirolli, Stokowski and Toscanini clamor to have her appear with them.

Helen Traubel looks like a prima donna of the old, heroic tradition, but the old-fashioned prima-donna temper is lacking in her, too. Her robust sense of humor wouldn't permit it. She is overflowing with kindness and good sense, and is a spiritually expansive person, rich in emotion. She has the figure for the Wagnerian roles—tall, majestic, crowned with a head of red-gold hair. Her eyes are what used to be called hazel, her skin is fresh and fair. The most striking thing about her is her speaking voice. It is low, clear as a bell, and she enunciates each word precisely. It is a pleasure to listen to her talk. She learned that from her mother, who was

also a well-known singer, and who believed in training her child early. Also, Miss Traubel spoke German as a child, having been brought up in St. Louis of German-American parentage, which accounts for her perfect German diction when singing Wagner. She studied for a long time before she made up her mind to sing professionally. It was Walter Damrosch who finally decided her. He heard her in St.

Louis, and promptly engaged her for the leading role of his opera "The Man Without a Country" at the Metropolitan. With his advice and encouragement she then retired for a year and a half to work and prepare roles. Her first New York recital a year and a half ago knocked the critics off their feet and resulted in an immediate permanent Metropolitan engagement. Her fame has been climbing like a plummet in reverse ever since.

This year Miss Traubel will sing Bruennhilde in "Die Walkuere" for the first time, a role sung by other Wagnerian sopranos now at the Met. There is a friendly rivalry among them and Miss Traubel is quick to relate how helpful they have been to her, particularly Kirsten Flagstad, whose generosity toward colleagues is prodigal. Also, Miss Traubel is wildly excited over singing a Wagnerian program with Toscanini on February 22 (mark the date on your calendar now). She has just finished making records of Wagner songs with the Philadelphia Orchestra under Leopold Stokowski.

In speaking of her work, Miss Traubel's face glows with feeling, and it is easy to believe that it fills her whole existence. She is married and her husband is also her business manager.

**BERLIN REPORTER Edwin Hartrich, of CBS, in New York on vacation, has been told by the Nazis that he may not return. He talked too much. CBS' Bill Shirer, also in U. S., is reported to be watching his words.**

THE first blast in the war of music (ASCAP vs. BMI) came just twenty-one hours after the December 31 deadline when NBC, CBS, MBS and many independent stations throughout the states chucked ASCAP out the window. It came with the opening of the "Texaco Star Theater," the Fred Allen-Kenny Baker hour of fun and song. ASCAP claims that those opening bars of music either was "Wintergreen for President" or a steal from it. Whichever it was, if it was, ASCAP claims infringement of copyright because "Wintergreen for President," by the late George Gershwin, belongs, stock and barrel, to ASCAP. Of course the "Texaco Star Theater" claims that ASCAP is all wet, that the theme music used was an original composition by the program's maestro, Al Goodman. It will, however, take a court trial to decide. Defendants in the trial will be the sponsor, his advertising agency, CBS and every station on the network that broadcast the program. And if ASCAP wins, it will cost each station a \$250 fine—and there are eighty-seven stations involved.

The second blast came three days later when Sammy Kaye, currently at the Hotel Commodore and the Strand Theater, and Eddy Duchin, now at the Hotel Waldorf-Astoria, balked at signing indemnity papers and refused to broadcast their sustaining programs. At this writing Richard Humber, Artie Shaw, Shep Fields and Raymond Scott are debating whether to take their lawyers' advice and stop their sustaining broadcasts.

Listeners, following the war, must not lose sight of the federal suit against CBS, NBC, ASCAP and BMI charging that all are monopolies.

Yes, this war of music is becoming involved. Almost anything can happen now.

PASADENA'S Tournament of Roses Parade and the Rose Bowl football game January 1 gave real headaches to the National Broadcasting Company in its effort to see that no music controlled by the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, now at war with the radio networks, could possibly leak onto the air. Should such a leak have happened, NBC would have been liable for a \$250 damage fee for each of the 120 stations carrying the parade and football game, or a total of thirty thousand dollars for each mistake.

Two Hollywood NBC music-clearance men, Alec Petry and Bill Marshall, marched along with the bands in the Tournament of Roses Parade just previous to each band's passing the NBC microphone pick-up. They saw to it that the bands played no ASCAP music when within range of the mikes, but devoted their instrumental talents to the rendering of public domain, or BMI (Broadcast Music, Inc.), tunes, which are not held by the ASCAP music monopoly.


At the game broadcast, sportscaster Bill Stern sat in a sound-proof booth through which no music could penetrate, and the music-clearance men again checked the college bands and switched off microphones when ASCAP tunes were imminent. To fill the gap Stern had armed himself with practically the entire history of football and the facts of every game ever played in the United States. Also helping to fill the void when collegians played barred music was the presentation of a special award to Graham McNamee as pioneer Rose Bowl broadcaster. Stern, by the way, will stay in Hollywood to make a feature-length picture for Warner Bros. entitled "Listen, America," with a plot based on Stern's adventures as a sports broadcaster.

There was little question that the youngster had talent, so Cantor dug down into his pocket to finance the training of her voice for the past eighteen months before bringing her to the microphone. Immediately after her singing of "Silent Night," messenger boys began to beat a path to Cantor's studio door with telegrams applauding the young lady. To date, her audience-mail response has been fifty percent greater than was Deanna Durbin's when Cantor first introduced her. Incidentally, Cantor will again be the "March of Dimes" broadcast's master of ceremonies, a title which he originated when he pioneered several years ago in this endeavor, the funds from which go to the Infantile Paralysis Foundation. The show will go on the air Saturday, January 25, and will be bigger, better and more dramatic than ever before.

British war refugee children in the Los Angeles area started the New Year very happily, thanks to Bob Hope, Irene Rich and the B-Bar-H dude ranch at Palm Springs, Calif. ## TUNING-CHART FOR SOUTH AMERICAN SHORT-WAVE STATIONS

WITH European war news and propaganda broadcasts dominating the short-wave dials we are prone to overlook the fact that there are almost one hundred short-wave stations in South America broadcasting daily programs of culture and entertainment. While it is true that most of the programs from South America are Latin in nature and announced in Spanish or Portuguese, we can at least understand and appreciate the excellent music, ranging from opera to rumba, available from these stations. Latin programs are best received in North America from sunset to 10:00 or 11:00 p.m. EST. The large majority of South American stations are grouped on the 60-meter (4 megacycle) and the 85-meter (3 megacycle) bands. The call-letters of these stations are frequently given in Spanish. You will soon be able to identify the various stations if you familiarize yourself with the following simple table giving the English equivalent of the various letters and numerals in the Spanish alphabet:





ing. Nightly, he grew more enraged at Lucille's lengthy visit. Nightly, she grew more confused. Why, she wondered, was Desi so upset? On Thursday, the last of her five days, Desi called five times. The last call was an unbroken forty-five minute monolog. Little did Lucille know why Desi was so persistent. Every day (without benefit of proposal) he had been arranging their elopement. Then Lucille had been held over—and Desi had rearranged everything. His plans had shifted from Norfolk, Virginia, to Richmond, Virginia. Then Elkton, Maryland, had been the chosen spot. Now he had definitely made up his mind on Greenwich, Connecticut. All that was left was to get Lucille back in New York.

IT'S SO WONDERFUL WE ARE AFRAID WE'RE GOING TO WAKE UP AND FIND IT WAS ONLY A DREAM. STOPPING AT THE PIERRE. MUCH LOVE. MR. AND MRS. DESIDERIO ALBERTO ARNAZ Y DE ACHA JR.

This was what Desi sent to his father in Santiago, Cuba:

DEAR POP I JUST WANT YOU TO KNOW THAT YOU HAVE JUST ACQUIRED A DAUGHTER AS I GOT MARRIED THIS AFTERNOON TO LUCILLE BALL THE MOST WONDERFUL GIRL IN THE WORLD. LOVE. DESI.

So there is the record of Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz, young movie stars, whose careers start in a blaze of pan-American glory. One year from now or forty years from now the memories of this romance may bless or burn, but they will never be forgotten.

For they are the precious recollections, in some degree at least, of every boy or girl of every generation who has grasped fate by the forelock and reached hungrily for the moon.



when to put water in the battery, when to have it recharged, when to fill the tires, where oil goes and what spark plugs are for. It's all weird to Cagney.

"I don't know what makes my watch run, do I?" he asks. "Why should I have to learn about this juggernaut?"

Eight years have passed since Cagney came to Hollywood. He hasn't changed much. His philosophy has mellowed, but he's still the same Cagney, fiercely devoted to his family which includes a sister Jeanne (hell-bent for stardom even though Paramount just released her) and a brother Bill, a Warner producer, who oversaw the making of "City for Conquest," Cagney's latest.

To the charge that he is an enemy of Hollywood, he will say, and has:

"I don't believe I'm very different from other people. In the East we used to look at Hollywood—and some of the Hollywood manners—and try to keep from laughing. I'm still trying, now that I'm out here where it's all going on.

"But I think I have come to have a more real appreciation of why Hollywood is like it is than I used to have. You can't get close to a thing without knowing more about what makes it tick. It makes you more tolerant. But if ever I blame Hollywood for anything, it will be for trying to appear what it is not. You can forgive a man for being any kind of a fool, if only he does the thing without trying to make you feel he was being very wise all the time. Hollywood is like that. It's a place to make pictures. It's full of hard-working people. I like them. I hope they like me. But I don't want them to pretend they do when they don't. In turn I want to feel free to say my say without fear of being thought too good for the place."

Perhaps Hollywood could do with more than one James Cagney.


