BETTE DAVIS first met the young actor who is now playing the newspaper reporter opposite her in "The Man Who Came to Dinner" on July 11 at Warner Bros. Studio. He is Richard Travis (nee William Justice), and his is the most important male character in the picture aside from the title role played by Monte Woolley. The news behind her meeting Travis is that Bette chose him without ever having met him! She recommended him after seeing

a screen test he made. Warner executives agreed with her choice, as they already had marked him as a corner. Travis, six foot three and blond, hails from Arkansas, where he achieved statewide fame as an athlete, a newspaper writer and film critic, and later as a radio and stock-company actor. THIS WEEK: Soon 900,000 more young men in this country will be deserting their customary walks of life for Army training. Perhaps one of them comes from your own family. Or he may be the boy next door. The chances are good that he may never actually go to war, so that should be the least of your worries about a loved one at the moment.

What should worry you, and worry all good Americans, is his state of mind. We personally wouldn't want any of these lads to see a movie cartoon we looked at a few days ago. It showed a soldier in the person of a duck being ordered to leave his sweetheart and join the Army by a pompous rooster which cackled at the girl that he'd see her later. The thought of what may happen to the girl or wife he leaves behind and the suggestion that officers may have special power or privilege beyond the line of duty is strictly un-American.

Movie-Radio Guide urges that Hollywood and radio producers begin to think heavily in the terms of the psychological reaction their entertainment may have in the minds of men training to defend this country. Movie-Radio Guide urges that the morale of our Army be preserved by thinking in terms of the individual soldier. Radio programs should be constructed to provide the type of entertainment he likes when he can listen. This may take sacrifice on the part of radio sponsors

and civilian listeners. Hollywood producers should make an immediate effort to determine the tastes of the soldier for particular types of movies. If "home, sweet home" stories irk him and he prefers something the Hays office would frown on, then it should be just too bad for "home, sweet home" and the Hays office.

The average soldier can't swagger around in a swank uniform, his thumbs hooked in a Sam Browne belt. His uniform, chances are, fits him ill. But he is more important to this country than the radio listener who buys soap, automobiles or razors. It may be, too, that this average soldier one day will, among other things, make this country safe for movie-goers as well as church-goers. So if he likes a particular type of radio show or movie, he should have it. And, if his uniform doesn't fit him well, get him a better one!

Movie-Radio Guide APPLAUDS *Citizen* Marlene Dietrich

ABOUT a year ago beautiful Marlene Dietrich became an American citizen. Previously she was a German national, but she had never agreed with the Third Reich and the Reich consequently would have none of her.

Today the glamorous Miss Dietrich is giving her all-out talent to entertain American boys in Army camps and Navy bases from San Diego to north of San Francisco, Calif. Between June 14 and July 3 she alone did seven shows at as many military camps, and at two of them spent extra hours going through the wards of military hospitals and repeating her act for lads who could not leave their beds. Nor did glamorous Marlene travel in a limousine on these appearances. No, sir, Marlene got there and back each time in ordinary buses and in Army Command cars.

Miss Dietrich insisted on no maid on these appearances. She did her own make-up and her own dressing, and for a dressing-room often used a tent with bare ground as the floor. At Hamilton Field it was quite cold when she worked, and while the soldiers themselves were wearing regulation Army overcoats, Marlene knew they wouldn't be happy seeing her in furs, so she took a chance on catching cold and appeared in her brief and slinky evening gowns.

Marlene works hard in her act for the soldiers. She sings at least six songs (always includes "Falling in Love Again") and then does a clever comedy sketch with whatever other entertainers are on the bill.

For genuine spirit of patriotism that this actress is showing most practically in these hours of national emergency, for her unselfish gift of her talents under difficult working conditions, MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE applauds new citizen Marlene Dietrich.

OFFICE BOY

NEWEST in the popular "Andy Hardy" series is "Life Begins for Andy Hardy"—and life really does begin in an exciting, dramatic picture which takes him through the period of making up his mind whether or not to get a job and go to work or to start to college in the fall. Like the others in this remarkable series, this picture is a combination of humor and pathos, another fine portrait of the growing-up process of a typical American boy. Andy, through his efforts to obtain a job in the city, faces some of the more unkind aspects of life for the first time. His final decision to go home and start college in the fall is a wise one, both from Andy's point of view and from that of the scenario writers, because this film's ending points logically to another Andy Hardy picture.

Judy Garland, making her first screen appearance since "Ziegfeld Girl," sings two songs and most capably enacts her role as Andy's sweetheart. Two newcomers to the series, Patricia Dane, who plays a discouraged dancer who commits suicide, fit into the plot excellently. "Pat" Dane recently was signed by M-G-M to a long-term contract after appearing as one of the beauties in "Ziegfeld Girl"; MacDonald is a nineteen-year-old dancer from Broadway, who makes his screen debut. With its fresh plot, new faces and, of course, Mickey Rooney, "Life Begins for Andy Hardy" is solid entertainment.

WINNER and newly crowned queen of the "Navy Blues Sextette" is pretty Peggy Diggins (indicated by arrow, right). Peggy amassed most votes in the recent MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE ballot, garnering 41.2 percent of total number of votes cast. Claire James was a close second. In deference to the four others, we will not list the order of selection. Let it be said the voting was close and heavy, conclusive proof that all girls in the "Floradora Sextette of 1941" have honest-to-goodness chances for stardom.

Selection of Peggy Diggins was as much of a surprise to her as it was to the studio, and should convince the latter that here is a girl with plenty on the ball, certainly deserving of a real break—and soon.

Who is Peggy Diggins? MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE interviewed her for you the day our cameraman, Bruce Bailey, made these pictures.

Peggy is a native New Yorker, born Margaret Mary Diggins of Irish-American stock. She attended a Catholic convent, later Mt. Vernon High School,



where she was active in golf, tennis, archery, basketball, swimming. She still enjoys these sports.

At sixteen she quit high school to be featured with Harry Richman and Milton Berle in a song-and-gag act. The break

that brought her to Hollywood was unusual. While dancing at the Stork Club with her boy friend, a syndicated columnist tapped her on the shoulder—and bingo! she was in pictures with a long-term contract at Warner Bros.

She made a promising start with parts in "Honeymoon for Three," "Santa Fe Trail," "High Sierra," and now with the sextette in "Navy Blues." Her career is definitely on the upswing, so watch her climb.

Peggy is a fine pianist. She lives modestly in the valley north of Hollywood with Marguerite Chapman, also of the "Navy Blues Sextette." Peggy loves clothes but keeps within her budget. Right now she is looking forward to the preview trip of "Navy Blues" to Honolulu. As for us, we'll be content seeing a lot more of her on the screen. —L. R.

HOLLYWOOD'S PUZZLING BACHELOR

To News Desk:

CARY GRANT will hit the screens shortly in another good picture. Nearly all of Grant's pictures are good. This one's very good. I know, because I "sneak" previewed it.

It's "Before the Fact," an RKO film with Joan Fontaine co-starring and Alfred Hitchcock directing. That last clause insures its worth, even if it didn't boast of Grant.

But the point about the story of "Before the Fact" that struck me as particularly fitting is that in the play Grant is a likable, improvident society blade. And that's just about the real-life role Cary has to play nowadays, much as he dislikes it.

You see, Cary would much rather live a life of ease and loafing than keep on being what he is—a high-priced Hollywood leading man, lionized by society and heckled by social niceties. But he's caught in a whirlpool of cinema success, and, try as he might, he cannot escape.

Last year Grant was the champion giver to British and American Red Cross. In one lump he donated

nearly \$125,000, his salary from "The Philadelphia Story," then almost doubled that with other sums.

This year is a duplicate of last year for Cary. He'd like to have had a vacation between "Before the Fact" and his next film—perhaps time to marry Barbara Hutton—but he decided otherwise. He remembered heartless bombings of Bristol, England, where he was born, set plans to do another picture for British War Relief, and has plunged into the work of aiding the U. S. United Service Organizations.

Money Grant raises or gives is never for munitions, and it's always spent in the U. S. The funds go for clothing, food and shelter for England's helpless, or in case of the U. S. O., entertainment for soldiers.

Grant isn't giving for publicity's sake. He'll be madder'n hops when he reads this story, true as it is, because he's just that sort of fellow. He's giving because he wants to, and he thinks that is his business. It is, but I think the public should know about it, too. —E. P.

Dear Public:

WE WISH you could have been with us this week when we paid a call on Miss Marlene Dietrich in her Beverly Hills Hotel bungalow. We have never been an ardent admirer of Marlene as an actress. We didn't know her as a person.

Now we admire her enough to tell you folks—a half million of you—about her. And we think that what we have to say should be read by movie producers too. A week or so back, MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE reviewers weren't too kind about Marlene in "Manpower." They said she was "posey," and she has been on the screen. BUT, Marlene has a fan following that has seen her as you and I never see her on the screen. This enthusiastic group is composed of more than 100,000 soldiers who have seen

her in the Army camps she has visited. (See page 2.)

When Marlene steps out on the improvised stage they throw their hats in the air and cheer her. What does she do that is so different from her movie work? Nothing much—she just "gives out" because she wants to make the boys happy. She is easy and natural. She isn't dressed up like a 1918 version of a movie siren. She doesn't hand out the "vamp" style of performing that has so typed her in pictures. Her delivery is strictly American, aimed at a male audience.

The point of all this is that Hollywood bosses should make a real American out of Marlene. That's what she is—she has her citizenship papers. Let's you may not quite believe this, we quote a letter she received from infantry Captain Frank F. Koops after a visit to Camp Roberts: "You may get the idea of what the men thought of you from the expression of one man who said, 'She's a regular feller.' Please believe me, I can think of no greater compliment to a soldier!"

Making Marlene a "regular feller" to the rest of us shouldn't be too big a job for the celluloid wizards. Or is it?

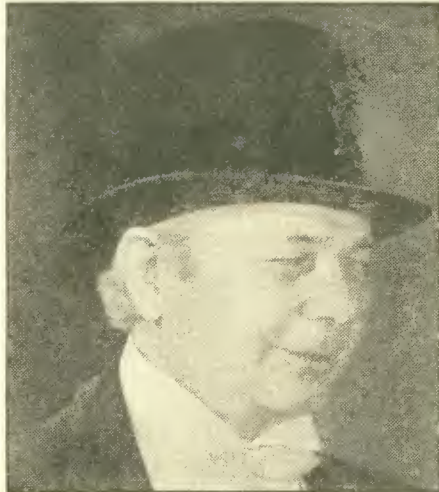

RADIO VIEWS by Martin Lewis

PROBABLY few listeners are aware that twenty-one years ago the stork in the person of several scientists delivered to a waiting public an infant which was destined to become a giant in stature and of immense public importance. I am speaking of radio, which was born on November 2, 1920, when station KDKA of Pittsburgh began a regular schedule of broadcasting with the Harding-Cox presidential election returns. Today, instead of one station broadcasting, there are 822, and, instead of a relatively few set owners, there are some 47,000,000. This growth, more than anything else, indicates that radio is justified in describing itself as having "come of age."

Since on this coming November 2 radio will celebrate its twenty-first birthday, this writer suggests that preparations be made to broadcast a gigantic "Cavalcade of Radio" program, with some of the entertainers who pioneered in that field invited as guests. They certainly deserve recognition, and, besides, there are millions of listeners who would take pleasure in hearing many of them who are no longer on the air.

I would like to see the networks combine, if possible, in an effort of this kind. I would like to see taking part some of the following, whose names are still revered wherever radio is a subject for discussion—early favorites such as George Jessel, Al Jolson, Jack Pearl, Ruth Etting, Gertrude Niesen, Morton Downey, Arthur Tracy, Harry Horlick's A. & P. Gypsies, the original Show Boat crew, Seth Parker and his gang, Ed Wynn,

Jessica Dragonette, George Olsen and Ethel Shutta, etc.

It would be thrilling to hear once again an excerpt from each of these and other top programs of yesteryear. Yes, a "Cavalcade of Radio" would indeed be a fitting way to celebrate radio's "coming of age." Drop us a postcard and let us know if you agree.

Oboler Leaves Radio

HOLLYWOOD.—Arch Oboler, well-publicized radio writer who exploded at and deserted his last sponsor over a matter of policy, will have no more sponsors to worry about. He has deserted radio and signed a writer-director-producer contract with 20th Century-Fox picture studios. But before he gets under way he will be tutored in film methods by Mark Hellinger.

Rudy a Corporation

HOLLYWOOD.—Rudy Vallee and several of his friends have filed papers with the California Secretary of State for a company to be called "Rudy Vallee Presents, Inc." The purpose of the new company is to supply entertainment to Army camps. Members of Rudy's radio program are slated to be used.

Rome Gags Broadcasters

ROME, ITALY.—All American radio correspondents in this capital have

been notified that the facilities of Italian stations are no longer at their disposal. This order applies mainly to NBC, as CBS has already suspended broadcasting following advice from its correspondent here that new and increasingly rigid censorship restrictions made further Italian broadcasts impracticable from a news standpoint.

CBS to FBI

NEW YORK.—All crank mail addressed to CBS will hereafter be sent to the Federal Bureau of Investigation, which will examine it for subversive characteristics.

Dorothy Thompson Talks

NEW YORK.—Dorothy Thompson, boldly speaking commentator and columnist, will broadcast over NBC a series of talks to America soon after she arrives in London for a several weeks' period of surveying the war situation.

Bergen One-Nighters

HOLLYWOOD.—Edgar Bergen has announced he plans to make a series of one-night appearances through the Midwest and East during the late summer and fall months. Several of his Sunday coffee programs may be broadcast from Chicago.

Stars Take Trips

HOLLYWOOD.—Bill (Wallace Wim-

ple) Thompson, his brother and parents are on a motor tour of Canada from Vancouver to Montreal; Crane Wilbur, producer of "Big Town," and wife Lenita Lane have headed north for Seattle and Alaska; Walter Pater-son, the Nick Lacey of "One Man's Family," is making a motor tour of the Pacific Northwest and western Canada, and singer Donald Dickson is showing son Kaye Don America first by taking him along with him in an automobile swing between his concert engagements in Ohio and Wisconsin.

Building "Banjo Eyes"

HOLLYWOOD.—Eddie Cantor, on vacation from his radio chores, is collaborating with screen-writer Gene Fowler and various gagmen in preparing the script of his next picture, "Banjo Eyes." It's to be a cavalcade of Cantor's career.

Hersholt Hosts Cripples

HOLLYWOOD.—Jean Hersholt was host at his "Dr. Christian" CBS program airing July 16 to eight members of the Crippled Children's Society of Glendale, Calif. The youngsters witnessed the broadcast from wheelchairs on the stage of the radio studio.

SIDELIGHTS

Lynne Likes Work

CHICAGO.—Evelyn Lynne, who just passed her twenty-first birthday, must be about the busiest girl vocalist in radio now. The Texas beauty has just succeeded Virginia Verrill (anticipating the stork) as soloist on "College Humor" and "Uncle Walter's Dog House." She is already heard as vocalist (alternating with Nancy Martin) on the six-hours-a-week shows, "Breakfast Club" and "Club Matinee." And she has been featured as singer-actress on "Whoopin' Holler," heard occasionally on Saturday nights.

Where's Jimmie?

NEW YORK.—So much trouble has been caused by the kids of "Reg'lar Fellers" attending the movies between the show's regular and repeat broadcasts that a new ruling is now in effect. Before leaving the studio after the main broadcast they must list the

name of the movie which they are planning to attend. The job of combing Times Square's myriad movie houses was too much for the studio's ushers.

Two Voices Change

CHICAGO.—Bud Barton, central character of "The Bartons," will grow up like a real boy, writer Harlan Ware has announced. Instead of remaining at a constant age, he'll grow older during the story. Controlling factor in this decision was the fact that juvenile actor Dick Holland's voice is changing, so Bud's must change on the air or sound silly.

Helps Write Laws and Jokes

CHICAGO.—Luther Patrick, U. S. Representative from Alabama, has a gag rule that has nothing to do with parliamentary procedure. He writes gags. Specifically, he has contributed for seven years to the stock of comedy dispensed by Pat Buttram, also a son of Alabama, on the "National Barn Dance." Congressman Patrick was an entertainer before a politician.

Not That Smith

NEW YORK.—Jack Smith, the vocalist on "Johnny Presents," is not the "Whispering" Jack Smith of early radio days, although a good many listeners fondly hold to this belief. The new Jack Smith got his solo start after having sung in Ray Block's Swing Fourteen Chorus. The "Whispering" Jack Smith many radio listeners came to know and love is broadcasting over WEAJ in New York.

CONTROVERSY

Too Many "Claudias"

NEW YORK.—CBS' Forty-fifth Street Theater no longer has a sign on its marquee announcing the broadcast of the serial "Claudia." The show is now heard in a studio. Reason given for the change is that the play "Claudia," which occupied a theater directly across from CBS' theater, didn't like the idea of having to compete with a free radio show of the same name. The radio program, moreover, has been renamed "Claudia and David" because of objections from producers of the stage play.

Dam That "Mill Stream"

HOLLYWOOD.—It was very embarrassing on one of those quiz shows from here last week when an audience member was asked to sing an old tune. He started to warble "Down by the Old Mill Stream," but that tune is controlled by ASCAP (at war with radio), and since there was nothing the audience-canvassing announcer with mike in hand could do, the producer signaled the engineer to cut the program off the air. It was cut too

until Mr. John Q. Public wound up his old selection!

And "22" Is Kisses

WASHINGTON.—The FCC reports that it has no authority to ban Paul Sullivan's sign-off. "Good-night and thirty," the use of which has been protested by many listeners. Apparently most of those protesting the sign-off don't understand its meaning. According to the FCC's research department, in the old days when tele-

graphic copy was handwritten the telegraphers would mark the copy's end with three X's, the Roman numeral for 30. Incidentally, you might like to know that "73" means "Best regards."

Campbell Burns' Angel

HOLLYWOOD.—Campbell's soups and beans are the sponsors who will bring Bob Burns' own "Arkansas Traveler" shows to CBS airplanes starting September 19.

Berle with Laughton

HOLLYWOOD.—Charles Laughton is to be teamed with Milton Berle in a new commercial program series to begin over MBS from here starting in September.

Television Gets Sponsors

NEW YORK.—Television has already landed four sponsors, although it has only been available for commercial sponsorship since July 1. The programs being sponsored are Lowell Thomas' news program, which was formerly televised on a non-commercial basis; "Uncle Jim's Question Bee"; Ralph Edwards' "Truth or Consequences" and Bulova Watch time-signals. The latter manages to be televised by showing a clock with appropriate chimes.

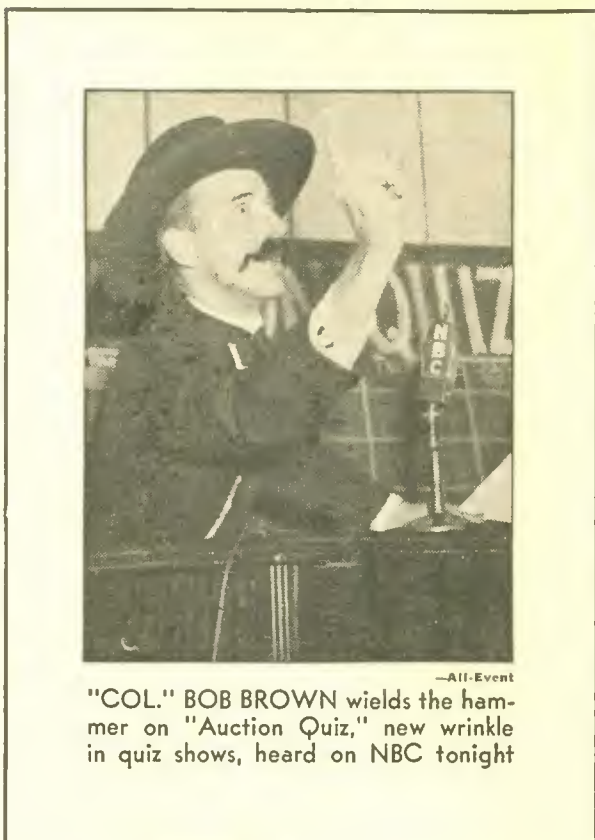

Here's the lowdown on Goebbels' "gagman" E. D. Ward! Also: Important changes in transmissions

ON TUESDAY and Thursday evenings at 10:20 p.m. EDT, E. D. Ward (alias Edward Leopold Delaney), Berlin's "gagman," is introduced as follows: "The facilities of the German Shortwave Station have been extended to E. D. Ward. His opinions and views are his own, not necessarily those of the station." (If you believe this you'll believe anything.) Ward's dry, harsh style of speech—reminiscent of Ned Sparks—was probably acquired when he was a Manhattan burlesque barker. His lingo, strictly American, is full of slang and the kind of racy wisecracks that are considered snappy along Broadway. Example: "Roosevelt and Knox are determined to make Communism as innocent as Shirley

friends, "Hal and Olive," of Glenview (a small town near Chicago), Illinois. American reporters discovered that Hal and Olive were actually Harold and Olive Kennicott, once fellow troupers of an Edward Leopold Delaney, whom they finally admitted was the E. D. Ward of the German Shortwave Station. A little judicious pumping and some subsequent sleuthing revealed most of the facts about Delaney's life.

Little is known concerning Delaney's early youth, but it is believed that he was born of a poor Irish family in southern Illinois. His acting career started in 1910 when he became Blackie in a road-show edition of "Get Rich Quick Wallingford." Mrs. Olive Kennicott—now fifty-two, still attractive—played opposite him in this road show. He left the troupe in 1915 to travel to Australia, where he became the killer in the thriller-diller drama, "Seven Keys to Baldpate." The year 1920 found Delaney back in the U. S. A., this time managing a road tour for the "Our Gang" kids. In the years that followed, Delaney held various jobs—Broadway press-agent, movie advance man and barker for a burlesque show. Although he was away from America several times, the bright lights of Broadway always drew him back to New York like a magnet.

In 1934 Delaney decided to try his hand at fiction, wrote "The Lady by Degrees," later "The Charm Girl," both racy and rather tawdry books.

DELANEY was in Europe when war broke out in 1939 and returned to the United States aboard the same ship that carried the survivors of the ill-fated *Athenia*. Almost immediately he scurried off to Germany, where he obtained a job working for Goebbels.

In January, 1940, Delaney (still unidentified but now calling himself E. D. Ward) first appeared on the programs of the German Shortwave Station. As a roving reporter Ward marched with the German army as it

went into Denmark, Norway, the Lowlands, France, making "supposedly" independent observations which were recorded and later broadcast over the German Shortwave Station. After the fall of France, Ward, presumably so instructed by Herr Goebbels, began to turn the major share of his attention to the United States. It was hoped that his American slang and wisecracks would appeal to his fellow countrymen. His talks thus became thrice-weekly features of the German transmissions to North America. He also doubles frequently as an actor, doing risqué lines in the Berlin "Cabaret" broadcasts.

E. D. WARD is the right-hand man of Fred Kaltenbach (whom we will discuss later). Kaltenbach is the chief of the staff of Berlin propagandists who broadcast to North America. Ward's talks are simple and homely, often coarse and blunt. He calls a spade a spade (even though he usually calls the wrong spade).

In listening to Ward, remember that he is not a military expert, not a statesman, not even a keen student of international affairs but an ex-ham actor, burlesque barker and writer of tawdry fiction now employed as a clerk in Papa Goebbels' propaganda warehouse who, by catch-phrases, wisecracks and Americanisms would like to sway American public opinion.

Ward, a handsome man now in his late fifties, his once coal-black hair tinged with gray at the temples, has always been very reticent about his private life, and he tried hard to preserve his incognito at the Berlin Shortwave Station. From precocious childhood to talented womanhood, these stars worked hard for success — and found it!

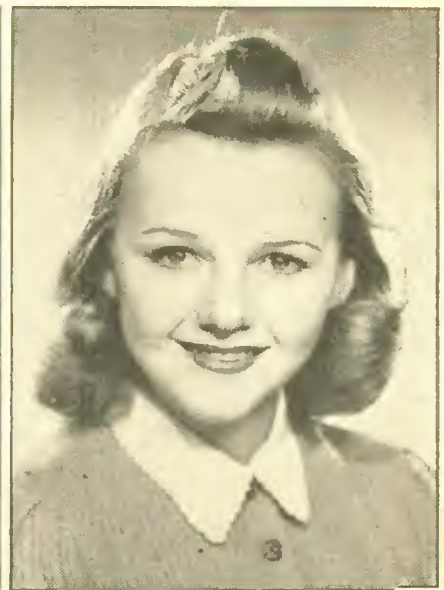

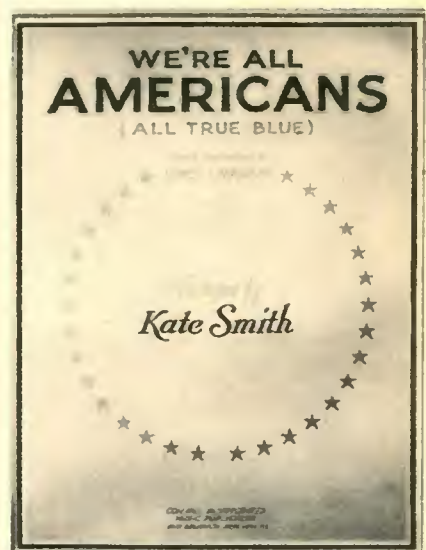

Tin Pan Alley's Defense Program



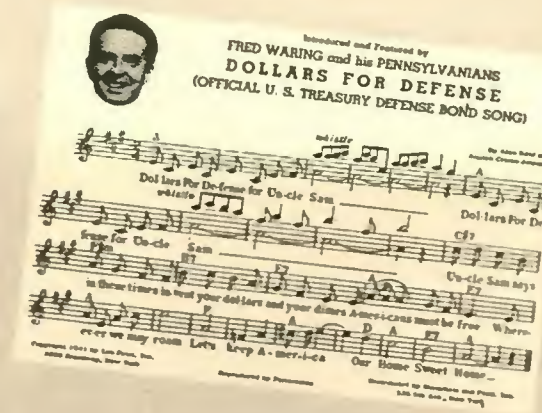
SEEING THE NEED for great patriotic songs before most song-writers, Irving Berlin (with Kate Smith, who introduced his "God Bless America") leads cohorts of music-makers in defense effort



AMERICA'S Tin Pan Alley has always been hypersensitive to the state of the nation. In 1917 its tune-tinkers wrote marching songs. In 1932 they wrote depression blues. Today they're going all out for national defense and inspired patriotism. Starting the procession several years ago, Irving Berlin, master song-writer for the masses, came out with "God Bless America," which has stirred the imagination of the people as no other patriotic song of the day. When the ASCAP-BMI struggle forced Kate Smith to drop "God Bless America" from her broadcast, she introduced another, James T. Mangan's "We're All Americans." These are songs carrying a broad appeal to patriotism. Others, like "\$21 a Day—Once a Month" and "Gone with the Draft," are gag songs for the moment. More specifically pointed toward national defense are those such as Irving Berlin's latest, "Any Bonds Today" and "Arms for the Love of America." No one knows which will win the heart of 1941 America as "Tipperary" and "Over There" won the heart of 1917 America. Even in Britain on the front line of fighting, great new songs have been slow coming and old standbys like "Beer Barrel Polka" are still the popular ditties. But Tin Pan Alley will keep grinding out its tunes—always patriotically alert to the needs of U. S. A.!



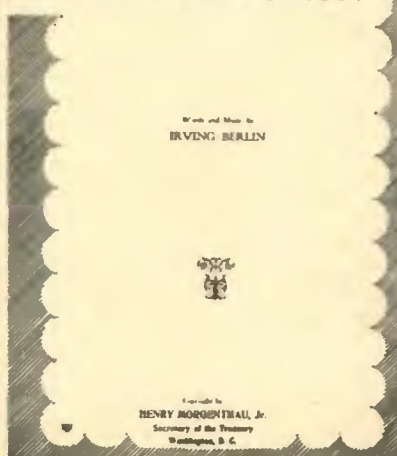

"Truth or Consequences,"



FOR THIS LADY, as it does for all "Truth or Consequences" contestants, the crucial moment has come. ALL the words you can think of that mean "wacky" will not adequately describe the program Ralph Edwards runs on Saturday nights over NBC. Actually a sedate, old parlor game taken out of moth balls, "Truth or Consequences" has clicked as the greatest game program in radio.

Listeners to four CBS stations heard Edwards' phenomenal program for the first time on March 23, 1940. Five months later it was graduated to a Coast-to-Coast NBC network and just recently it was renewed for another year. Months ago it was playing to packed theaters throughout the country.

Ralph Edwards—then a plain but very good and very high-priced announcer—got the idea for his show at a house party when the grown-ups were roped into a children's session of "Truth or Consequences" and had more fun than the kids. He adapted the game for radio, planned to ask con-

testants questions and, if they failed to answer correctly, to impose a penalty in the form of a ridiculous "consequence."

Any doubts that listeners, being able only to hear the proceedings, might not find them so funny were quickly resolved. The "consequences" Mr. Edwards selects from listener suggestions are so fantastic, so ludicrous that listeners may still doubt, even after this MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE visit to the broadcast, that the studio audience could possibly have more fun than they. A husky construction foreman, failing to answer correctly, is asked to imi-

tate a baby crying for his bottle—and to make it realistic. Given a nursery bottle and a bonnet, he quickly has the audience in hysterics. A business executive, given a ten-gallon sombrero, is asked to sing "I'm an Old Cowhand," at the same time shooting a cap pistol and riding a bucking electric horse. A man and wife are confronted with a young soldier who is to be married the next day and told to advise him about matrimonial shoals ahead. Another participant is blindfolded and equipped with rubbers, then told to wash a pile of dishes, fixing soap and water.

All the "consequences" are selected on the basis of their audible appeal. With additions of gentle sarcasm and hilarious kidding by Edwards, little is left to the imagination of listeners. What is left is supplied by these action pictures shot at a "Truth or Consequences" broadcast. —J. C.

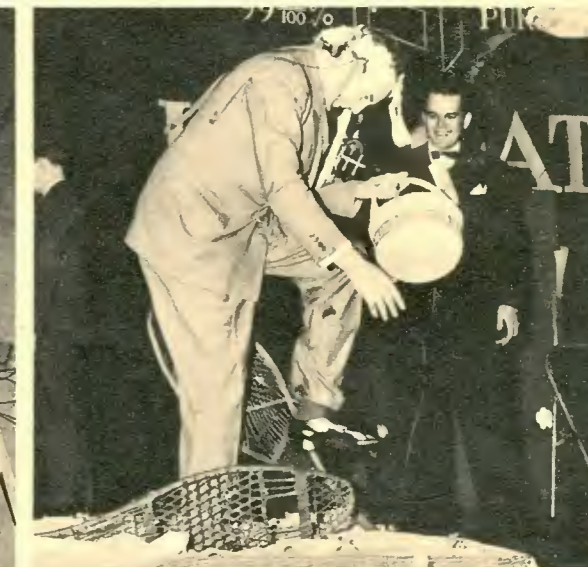

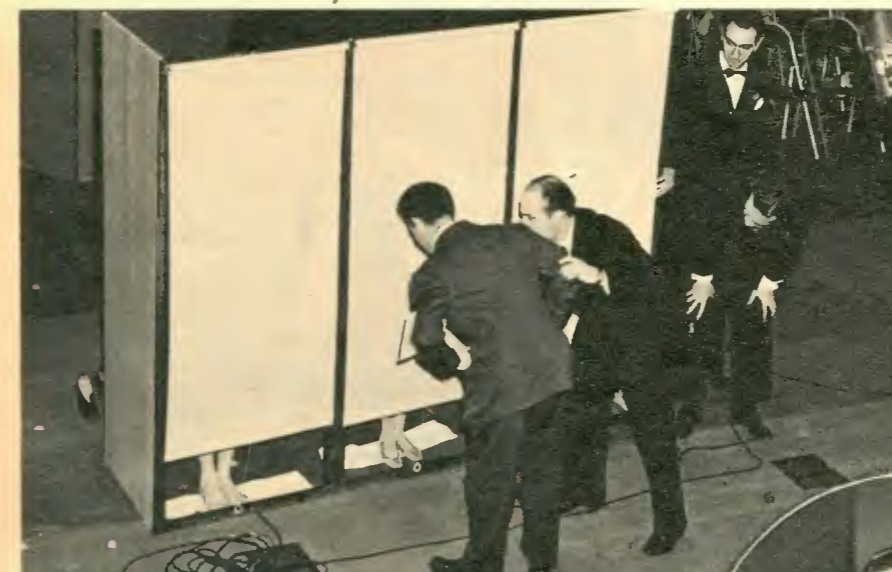

AT WORK and PLAY



LAST year Jimmie Fidler left the air. The story was that he had stepped on the toes of certain important movie people, that he had outraged certain sensitive stars, that no sponsor was willing to sponsor his bold, independent gossip broadcasts. But today the irrepressible Jimmie is broadcasting again—Fridays on a Pacific CBS network, which presages a nation-wide network by fall—and with no punches pulled when he believes Hollywood deserves hard but honest criticism. As most people, Hollywoodians find themselves paradoxically respecting a man who tells the truth, however irritating it may be. Jimmie Fidler's frankness has proved to be his big asset. With his new sponsor, Tayton Cosmetics, Fidler has a contract unique in radio. It is for three years without the usual renewal clauses, and can be cancelled only if Tayton sales don't increase according to expectations. Fidler receives a percentage of gross receipts in addition to his salary. Now that broadcasting is added to his newspaper work, Jimmie relies more than ever on his battery of telephones. It's a twenty-four-hour-a-day job he's tackling, and these pictures show how he combines work with pleasure to do it.

BANDSTAND NOTES

UP UNTIL this moment your correspondent has kept quiet about bandleaders appearing in motion pictures. Frankly, we were a little critical of the idea from the very beginning, but before saying anything we wanted to be sure that our judgment was borne out by facts. We believe that it has been. Our criticism of this practise is based upon the belief that most bandleaders are not good movie actors. With the exception of Kay Kyser, whose pictures have been good because he is a natural showman, most bandleaders have been flops in the movies. Those of you who saw Tommy Dorsey in "Las Vegas Nights," Orrin Tucker and Bonnie Baker in "You're the One," and Bob Crosby in "Rookies on Parade" will doubtless agree with me that their performances left something to be desired. The trouble with star roles in motion pictures is that they require no little acting ability, and that is something which a bandleader cannot expect to gain unless he devotes himself exclusively to that business. In this writer's opinion, it would be far better for all concerned if our bandstand favorites stayed out of the movies or else assumed a minor role, one which would not project them into the spotlight and thus bring out their acting faults. We hope the boys who wave the batons will take this hint which is passed along in good faith. Like the shoemaker, let us all stick to our lasts.

to get an awful shock. The man who wouldn't play with Benny at a concert recently will find that harmonica-playing Larry Adler is the featured soloist . . . Bob Astor certainly moved fast after organizing his band. Within two weeks after the group began playing they were invited to appear on the Fitch Bandwagon radio program. This is an honor for which most young bands have to wait a considerable length of time . . . Vincent Lopez, who took up astrology and numerology as a hobby, will write a column on the subjects for a news syndicate . . . Four of Skinnay Ennis' crew were injured recently in a bus accident. These innumerable accidents involving bands must make the insurance companies feel awfully low . . . Johnny Long's sweet band is proving very popular at the New Yorker, where swing bands have long reigned supreme . . . Woody Herman will undergo an operation. Tommy Dorsey is another who submits to the knife soon . . . Bob Crosby denies that his band has broken up. He says that the boys are taking a much-needed rest. They started on their vacation July 6 . . . Sammy Kaye has been awarded the annual certificate of merit by the Ohio University

Alumni Association. He is the youngest alumnus to receive the honor, and the only bandleader . . . Will Osborne's band, which he organized in Hollywood several months ago, has been scrapped. He will start all over again.

BMI reports that in its first year of operations it brought the music of more than five hundred previously unknown writers to public notice. The music, says that organization, came from all parts of the country and from all walks of life. What's more, says BMI, it did not reflect the ideas of any one group but included the work of those who devote their entire time to the creation of music and those to whom this creation has been a sort of spare-time avocation. Incidentally, BMI's top tune-writers possess unique backgrounds. The composer of the currently popular "Hut Sut Song" wanted to be a singing evangelist; Helen Bliss, who wrote "I Went Out of My Way" and "The Moon Won't Talk," formerly worked in Macy's Department Store in New York, and is now a dentist's assistant; Una Mae Carlisle, the author of "Walkin' By the River," got tired of singing others' tunes and wrote one of her own which is now in the hit class. We could, of course, mention others, but perhaps by now you have an idea as to the wide variety of backgrounds which BMI composers enjoy. The leading song-writers of today are no longer Tin Pan Alleyites. In fact, one of them may be living next door to you.

You're Prettier Than You Think

WHATEVER you call your facial faults can be minimized by what make-up you use and where. You already know this if you've listened to Richard Willis on WOR's "Here's Looking at You" program, for at each broadcast a member of the studio audience is analyzed and prescribed for, and the results are astounding!

Mr. Willis' advice is very sound and worth passing along to all of you who cannot come to the studio for personal analysis. The basic rule for loveliness through make-up, according to Mr. Willis, lies in the proper selection of color and the elimination of excess cosmetics. In other words, select the proper make-up and use it well.

Cosmetic manufacturers favor this theory too. That's why they make a point of bringing out a complete line of colors that blend together naturally, making it easy for you to choose the "right" make-up for yourself. You don't have to feel, either, that a complete set of matched make-up must be expensive. For example, almost every five-and-ten-cent store in the country carries Irresistible cosmetics, which are planned especially for women who know the importance of proper color selection. 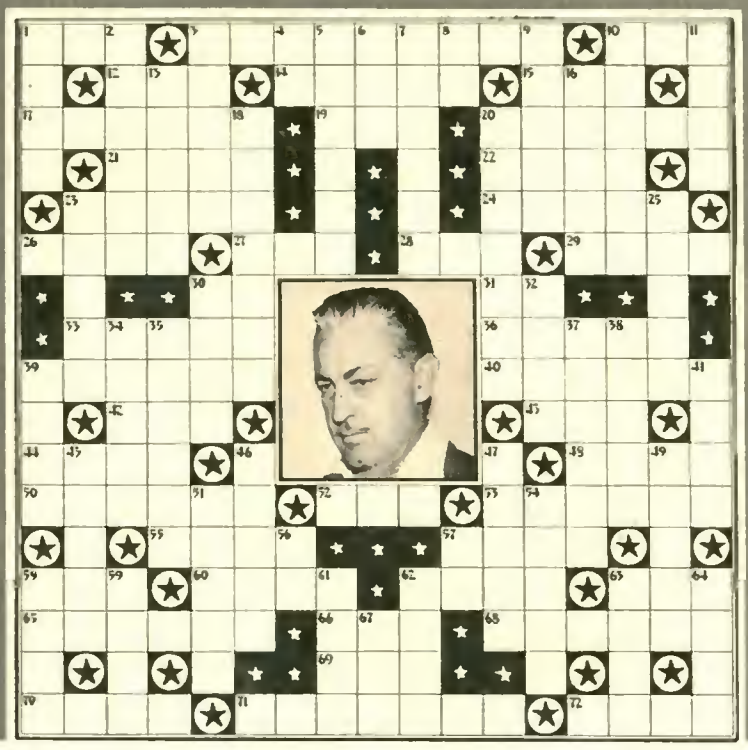

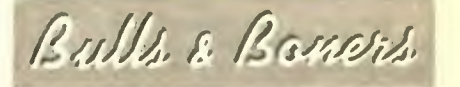
