Editorially Speaking...

NO ONE who knows Hedda Hopper would call her the shrinking-violet or clinging-vine type. Tall, dynamic, an individualist, purveyor of "Hedda Hopper's Hollywood" via CBS and writer of a syndicated newspaper column, Miss Hopper's rapiere-like wit is probably her most-admired characteristic, the largest collection of screwiest hats in Hollywood her greatest tribute to feminine frippery.

So when Hedda Hopper recently came out on the air in a one-woman crusade to influence the women of Hollywood to "dress up" again the cause gained a worthy if unexpected champion.

Said Miss Hopper: "When Clark Gable disrobed in 'It Happened One Night' and it was revealed he was without an undershirt, he sent the men's underwear business into a decline, which manufacturers estimated cut their business fifty percent within a year. That's why I'm fighting to get the women of Hollywood to dress up. Last night at a benefit at Ciro's for Bundles for Bluejackets, all the stars, the producers, brass-hats, etc., were present, but Dr. Emil Ludwig's wife and myself were the only two in evening dress, and it was nice of Dr. Ludwig (whom I'd never met) to come and thank me for dressing for

the occasion. You know I've been criticized here for saying that the stars must go on looking like stars. They should dress up for the Academy Dinner (ed. note—announced as an informal affair for the first time in years this year) for two reasons. One, because we're not going to let the Nazis or the Japs change our way of life, and because if Hollywood stops dressing up it's going to give the rest of the country an excuse for doing the same thing. And what's going to happen to the sewing-women throughout the country who have no other means of support? And I never knew one of them who didn't have a dependent or two she was taking care of. In England, after two years of war, they still dress for dinner . . .

"JOE SMITH, AMERICAN" is as timely as tomorrow's newspaper headline, as dramatic as life can sometimes be, as homy as your next-door neighbor. M-G-M's new, typical American-at-war film, starring Robert Young as an aircraft worker, with Marsha Hunt as his wife and Darryl Hickman as his son, may prove to be the most significantly

timely picture of the year. It's a picturization of a spectacularly popular Paul Gallico story which appeared in *Cosmopolitan*. In it Robert Young has one of those modern, realistic roles that he can do superbly, and Marsha Hunt gives evidence of why she is considered one of Hollywood's finest young character actresses. The plot itself is somewhat

melodramatic, involving a conspiracy to steal the secret of an American bomb-sight, kidnaping, amateur-detective work and sabotage. A few months ago the story might have been considered too far-fetched. But now—after all, we dare not be too sure such things cannot happen. The picture is an exciting, inspiring American document.

THIS IS THE REAL "JOE SMITH, AMERICAN,"



1. THIS is the house the Joe Smiths live in at La Crescenta, California. It has two bedrooms, a kitchen, bathroom and a combination living-room and dining-room. The Smiths get it, partly furnished, for thirty-two dollars a month. There's a garage and a back yard full of fruit trees



2. LEAVING for work, Joe gets a good-by kiss from wife Minnie Lee, whom he calls Min. Theirs has been an average happy married life for ten years—through some pretty tough times, for they were so brave as to be married "right smack in the middle of the depression"



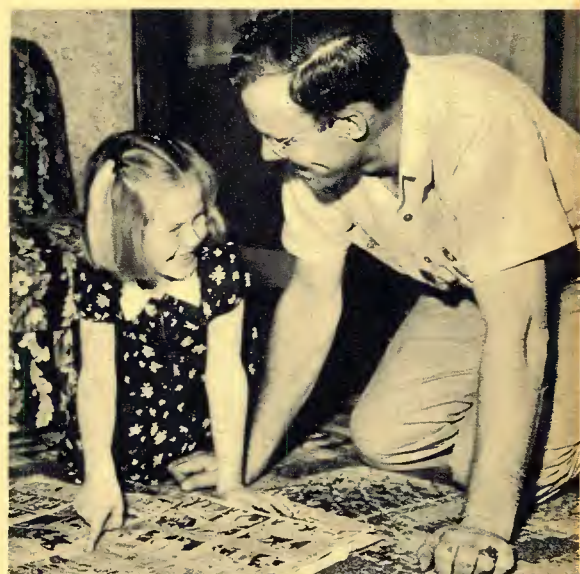

THE AVERAGE AIRCRAFT WORKER IS:

A SERIOUS chop of work, but off duty goes to shows twice a week and generally bowls or plays golf or poker once a week "with the fellows." He is married (seventy-six percent of the aircraft workers are) and has three children. He is between twenty and thirty years of age. According to a notional survey of aircrafters, he spends \$37.12 a month for rent or home-purchasing. He generally teams up with four or five friends to drive to and from work at a cost of approximately \$1.25 a week. He owns some kind of car (ninety-five percent do) and a radio (ninety-six percent do), takes his lunch to work. He is one of some 350,000 such workers, of which 125,000 are in California. Production plans for 1942 call for at least 250,000 more aircrafters to be employed

JOE SMITH, when beckoned by his foreman, George A. Morrison, at Lockheed's airplane plant in Burbank, Calif., put down his tools and met the man from MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE. This Joe looked to be just an average, clean-cut, healthy American, bent on doing his bit to lick the Axis and doing it in his particularly qualified way—which is riveting mid-sections of wings for PY-38 interceptors.

Yes, this weekly sought out Joe to learn more about the man behind the production lines, one of the unsung heroes of this war.

It came about this way. Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer made a picture called "Joe Smith, American," which you'll be seeing soon and which you just read about on the preceding page. You'll come away from that picture realizing that the Joe Smiths in the war

manufacturing plants are pretty important guys, after all. So we thought you'd be interested in a real Joe Smith. We hunted one up and found he wasn't hard to find. At the Lockheed plant, there were fifty-four of them on the pay-roll. Twenty percent of them worked in the shop of the factory, and from this list we picked out Joe T. Smith, pictured here, as most typical of all aircrafters and defense-plant workers.

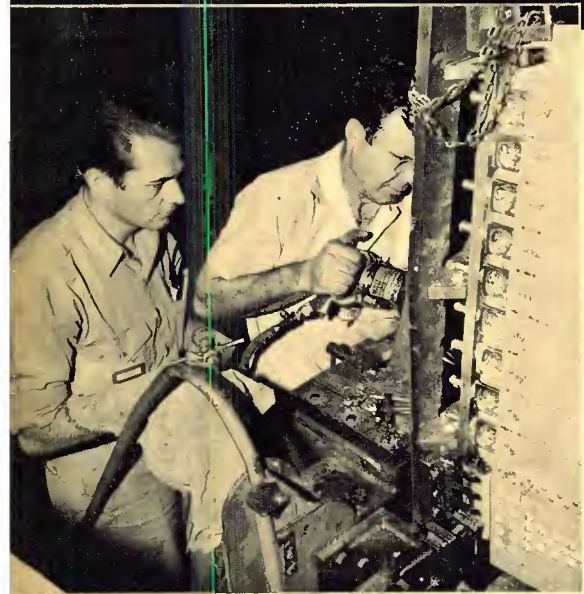
He's a very nice guy. You'll like him. And he has a modest, pretty wife and a well-behaved, attractive young daughter. Very swell people.

At first glance, we guessed and confirmed that Joe is twenty-nine years old. He stands six feet and weighs 180 pounds. He's what they call a "pick-up man" in department ten, is above average

intelligence, and is clock No. 81,939. He started to work for Lockheed on November 12, 1940, and it was his first airplane or manufacturing-plant job. He studied at a trade school to prepare for it. That was when he came to California from Texas, and after about two months of intensive training, he landed the job quickly.

Joe T. married Minnie Lee in June, 1932. He let Min, as he calls her, tell us a few things when we met her. "We come from Crosbyton, near Lubbock, Texas," Minnie Lee told us. "We never had got very far from there till we came out here. Joe had been a farmer, a cowboy and last was hired by the Government as a range inspector for the Agricultural Adjustment Administration. We'd gone together two years before we were married, but we

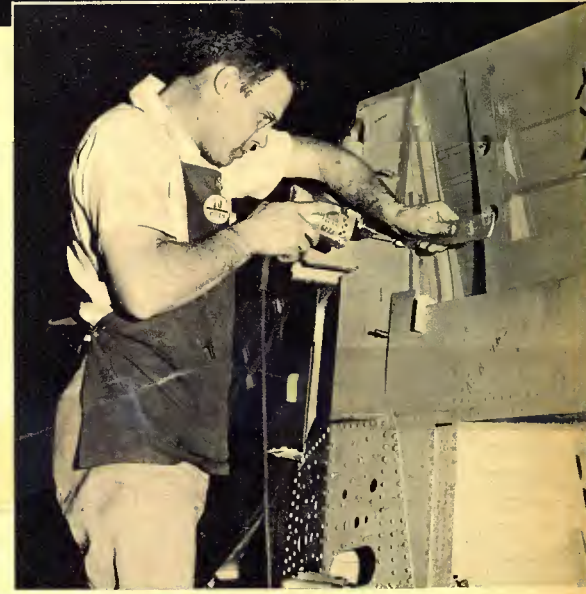
AIRCRAFT PLANT DEFENSE WORKER

had known one another ever since childhood, when we were neighbors.

"We were married right smack in the middle of the depression, and it was kinda tough going for a while, but we were farming then and had cows, chickens and a garden, so it wasn't so awfully hard to get along."

Here Dotty—more formally, Dorothy Jo—going on six, showed up from kindergarten. She is their only child. Another daughter, who would have been eight, died. Also included in the Smith household is Robbie Waldron, a niece of Minnie Lee.

But back to Joe. He and his family packed their favorite furniture pieces onto his 1939 Ford pick-up truck and came to Los Angeles in mid-1940. Joe sold the truck and used the money to keep ends

meeting and pay for his two months of schooling for an airplane-factory job.

He has been working steadily at the Lockheed plant since Armistice Day, 1940. He lives in La Crescenta, one of the healthiest communities in southern California. Joe and five other workers pool their transportation by riding the ten miles to the plant in one of the group's cars daily. The car Joe uses is an old model-A Ford he bought for \$75 and reconditioned himself.

JOE has only a few hobbies. He likes to go to movies, play dominoes and read. He is studying to be a jig-maker, his next step up at Lockheed. He likes serious stuff on the radio. Min gets the news and drama when she listens. Young Dotty goes for

the "Lone Ranger." As for the motion pictures, Dotty worships Gene Autry, Min likes Alice Faye, Clark Gable and Don Ameche, and serious-minded Joe prefers "Dr. Kildare" films to any others. They go to the theater in Glendale, five miles distant, twice a week.

Min does all her own cleaning, laundry, ironing and sewing, makes most of her own and Dotty's clothes with an old pedal sewing-machine. She's a clever seamstress, likes to do that kind of work.

There's the Joe T. Smith family. Only one thing more: They buy defense bonds and give money to the Red Cross and Dotty saves a defense stamp a week from her allowance.

We salute you, Joe. Keep 'em flying—more and more.



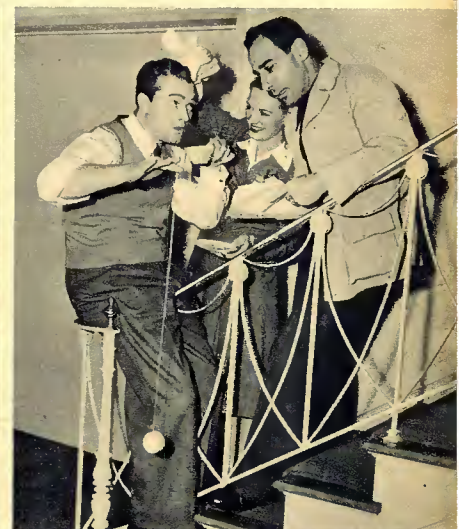

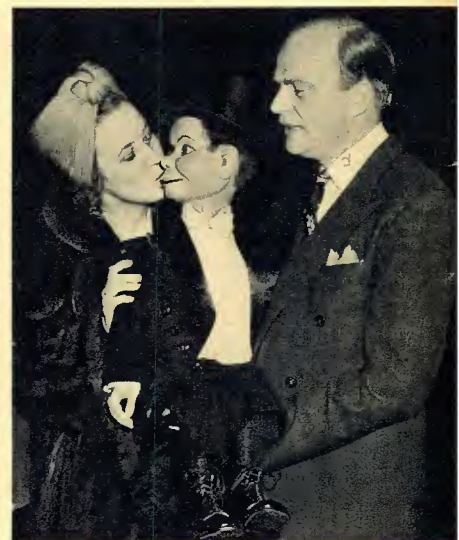

Screen Actors Guild Members Plan Free Entertainment to Aid War Effort

UNDER the aegis of their own professional organization, the Screen Actors Guild, Hollywood actors and actresses have banded together to form a \$1,000,000 "stock-pile" of free talent for patriotic purposes.

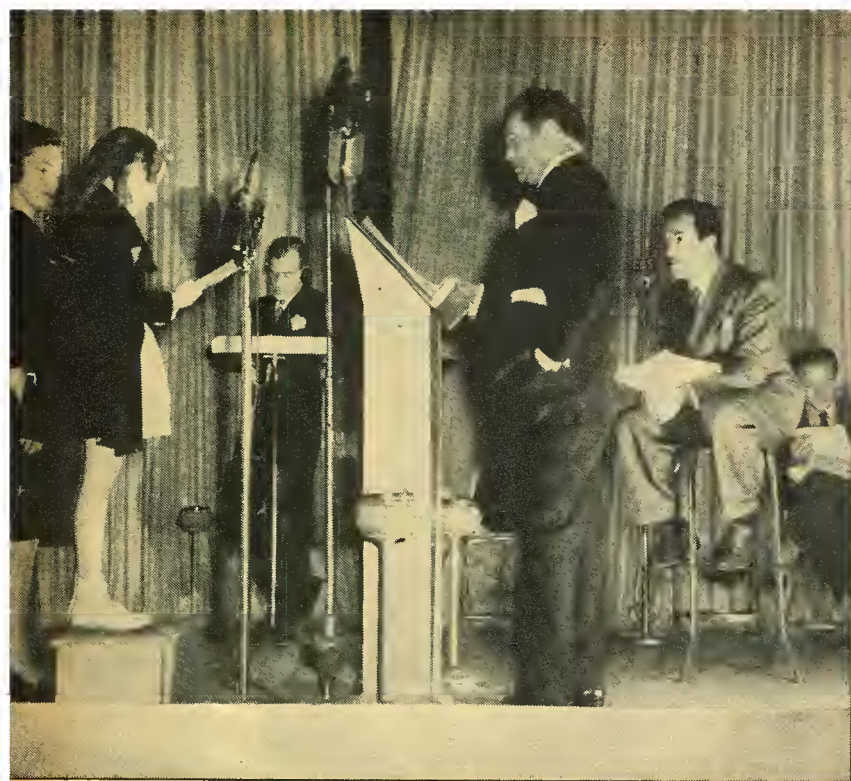
More than five hundred of the profession's top performers, called together in a great meeting at the Beverly Wilshire Hotel, cheered Screen Guild president Edward Arnold as he outlined the job to be done: To make Hollywood talent one hundred percent effective in providing soldiers, sailors and marines with first-rate entertainment, in aiding the sale of treasury bonds and stamps, in entering many other areas where entertainment-for-morale can make the war effort a success. To do this job the Screen Actors Guild, together with radio actors, legitimate-stage actors, writers, producers, broad-

casters and other organizations formed the Hollywood Victory Committee for Stage, Screen and Radio as a coordinating agency. Then, after President Arnold had announced the Guild's plan for a gigantic free talent pool, the stars dived into the pool by signing pledges. Fifteen stars were named as an actor group to serve on a general coordinating committee, with Clark Gable as chairman.

How this free talent pool operates is best seen in the scores of Army and Navy camps throughout the country. Official agency for entertaining the service men is U. S. O.'s Camp Shows, Inc., which already has twelve shows on tour, will soon have more. These shows have basic casts of musical comedy and vaudeville performers who are paid small sustaining salaries and play on regular circuits week in and week out. But appearing as

headliners are Hollywood stars—and they receive nothing for their services except the satisfaction of having a personal stake in the war effort. Thus Hollywood stars, through their Screen Actors Guild and the Hollywood Victory Committee are contributing thousands of dollars worth of talent every week for the camp shows alone. Besides this, with their pool, they are selling bonds and stamps, making war shorts and trailers without pay.

Patently, the report—which gained wide credence and was published in MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE—that the Guild wanted its members to receive pay is entirely without foundation. The Screen Actors Guild has released a million dollars' worth of free, gratis, for-nothing talent. With it the Guild as a unit, and the stars as individuals, are saying to Uncle Sam: "We'll Keep 'Em Smiling!"



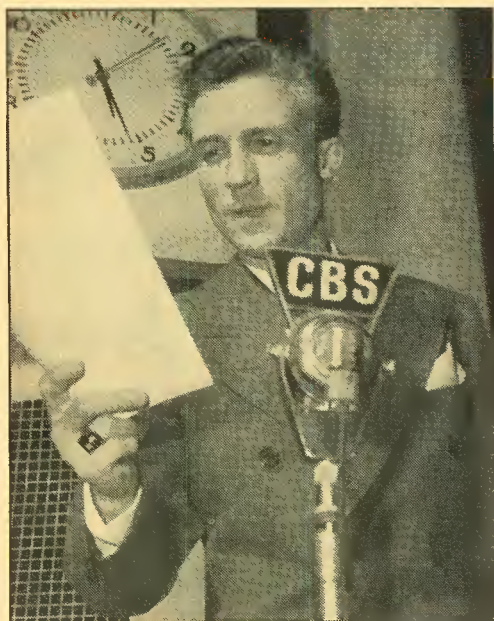

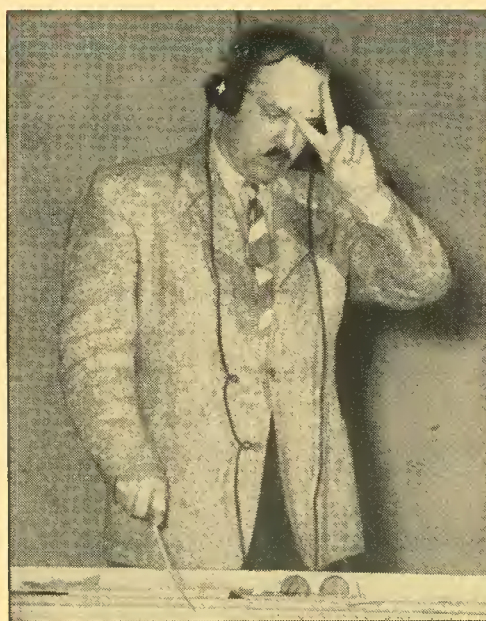
Movie-Radio Guide Visits:
EDWARD G. ROBINSON'S
"BIG TOWN"

EVER since "Big Town" came to the airlines five years ago, it has followed a plan that makes it something more than a good radio program. Namely, to present a cross-section of vital topics which represent interests and problems peculiarly of America and Americans.

At its original launching, "Big Town" crusaded against rackets and racketeers that infested a mythical American city; problems which nevertheless had their counterparts in many great metropolitan centers. In fact, each broadcast represented a tremendous amount of research work on the part of script-writers before the show was whipped into final form for the airways.

In the present season, although Steve Wilson (Edward G. Robinson) is still a crusader, he centers his editorial policy on the parade of headlines that deal with national defense, other problems of nation-wide interest, with only an occasional detour onto the old stamping ground of sawed-off shotguns and "pineapples."

Sponsors of show combed Hollywood and Broadway for star to play role of Steve Wilson before agency saw a reissue of "Five Star Final," in which Robinson played a hard-boiled managing editor, a natural for the role of "Big Town's" Steve Wilson. And from the beginning, as now, Robinson has figured in show's production, apart from his

role as star. For his story judgment is sound and his sense of the dramatic almost infallible.

With versatile Leith Stevens as conductor of music, and Crane Wilbur, veteran writer-actor-producer, at the helm, "Big Town" is setting a new record for itself in radio shows.

Three years ago Ona Munson took over the role of Lorelei at the suggestion of Mr. Robinson, with whom she played a sob sister part in "Five Star Final." For he hadn't forgotten her swell work in that role.

After "Big Town" broadcasts, Robinson holds impromptu receptions backstage at CBS Hollywood studios, greets service men, other guests.

Charlie Chaplin Reissues "The Gold Rush"; Abbott and Costello Plan Bomber-Buying Junket; Judy Garland Autographs Hat-Bands for Doughboys

CHARLIE CHAPLIN, who speaks little and hides much, is good for a headline whenever he talks, and last week he told of his work, since "The Great Dictator," in cutting, re-editing and putting sound on his old success of sixteen years ago, "The Gold Rush." Charlie wants to premiere the revamped picture at New York to a \$10-a-seat first-nighter audience and turn over the proceeds of the film there and everywhere else to the American Red Cross. Meantime, Charlie has tabled his idea of creating a new, self-starring picture based on the French Bluebeard, wife murderer, to produce another comedy in which he will not appear. For my money, Charlie could start right now in re-working and adding sound to his "Shoulder Arms," another oldie that would be just as funny today to the men in the service . . .

Abbott and Costello, Universal's laughable gifts from Heaven who are the Chaplins of 1942, are taking time out from film-making late in April to embark on a personal campaign to buy a bomber for Uncle Sam. A bomber costs upward of \$350,000; they will raise the fund by making personal appearances on a victory tour of the nation's theaters. Every cent they earn on the trip will go into the bomber fund; they'll pay their own traveling expenses, meals and hotel bills! . . .

The screen actors are not alone in

their patriotic effort, however. The movie directors, too, have volunteered to do whatever they can do best for Uncle Samuel. Famous Frank Capra, now that he has completed his editing of "Arsenic and Old Lace" for the

screen, has gone to Washington as a major in the Army Signal Corps. He is attached to the General Staff in Washington—and this is his second war, for in World War I he was a private. Bill Wyler, director of "The

Little Foxes" and many other outstanding pictures, has likewise reported for duty as a major in the Army. He probably will be assigned to work in making training pictures and official, documentary films . . .

Type of Picture: A drama with some unusual twists, a movie background, and Joel McCrea, Veronica Lake doing some excellent work in roles of director and disappointed movie actress.

This Is the Story: A wealthy and successful young movie director (Joel McCrea) decides to make a motion picture based on the great masses of humanity but realizes that he knows nothing about the subject. To get first-hand information, he sets out with a dime in his pocket and a pretty girl (Veronica Lake) by his side to see how the other half lives. Both meet suffering, privation, with McCrea finally being thrown into prison, an experience flavored by old galley-slave days. Ending leaves movie-goers with something to think about.

Verdict: An unusual picture packed with a mixture of comedy, drama and melodrama, which the whole family will enjoy.

This is just about the time of year agencies start thinking about summer replacement shows and we suggest they give a listen to any of the above-mentioned programs . . .

Here's a very interesting story from CBS concerning Edward R. Murrow, their European chief. When Murrow arrived in this country in December, some of his colleagues cornered him and suggested that he take advantage of the opportunity to cash in on his experiences by going out on a lecture tour. Murrow didn't like the idea at first, but when he was told that he could make about \$25,000 in a short time, which is a lot of folding money for any foreign correspondent, he consented to the tour. So what do you think happened? On the last lap of his tour, after having spoken before packed houses wherever he appeared, Murrow publicly announced to his audience that he has decided to donate all the profits from his lecture tour to the R. A. F! . . .

For many months now, some of our most important radio shows originating from the West Coast have put on their programs at Army camps or Naval bases for the entertainment of our soldiers and sailor boys. For some time we've been wondering why some of the New York shows didn't follow this patriotic example. For that reason, we were pleased to learn of Ted Collins' decision to take the entire "Kate Smith Hour" to the Great Lakes Naval Training Station, from where the program originated last Friday. Kate and Ted are footing all expenses for the trip, for which we take our hats off to them. A tip of the hat also to "Wheeling Steelmakers" of Wheeling Steel, who broadcast their show last Sunday from the Great Lakes

Naval Training Station, too . . .

Edward G. Robinson has been broadcasting his "Big Town" program from New York for the past two weeks. At the rehearsal of his first show there were two familiar fellows who looked very much alike reading lines in front of the mike. They were brothers Johnny Monks, who wrote the famous play "Brother Rat," and Jimmy, one of the five sons in "How Green Was My Valley" and who also plays the part of an R. A. F. pilot in the current RKO picture, "Joan of Paris." Johnny and Jimmy have been acting before the mike for years, but this was the first time they appeared on a radio program together . . .

Those of you who have been fortunate enough to witness a broadcast from Radio City's studio 8-H won't recognize it the next time you see it. For the next five weeks it will be getting a thorough overhauling, with engineers improving its acoustical qualities and new and more comfortable seats being installed. The more comfortable seats, incidentally, won't at all displease this reporter and other spectators . . .

We were quite surprised not to see Donna Dae among those present when we stopped in to catch a Fred Waring broadcast. Donna is visiting her grandparents in Long Beach, California, taking her first vacation in the three years she's been with the Waring organization. By the way, you out-of-towners who come to New York for a visit and want to see a swell radio show, we heartily recommend you write for tickets (well in advance) for a "Pleasure Time" broadcast. Fred and the whole gang entertain the audience for almost an hour after each

broadcast, and it's one of the best radio shows in town to visit . . .

Did you know Mrs. Ruth Cornwall Woodman writes "Death Valley Days," oldest dramatic show on CBS? (It's been on the air without missing a week for twelve years.) Wife of an investment broker and mother of two children, Mrs. Cornwall is a native New Englander, lives in a suburb of New York and prior to writing the scripts for this program had never been out West. Now she goes to Death Valley only once a year to gather material for a whole year's dramatizations of true western stories.

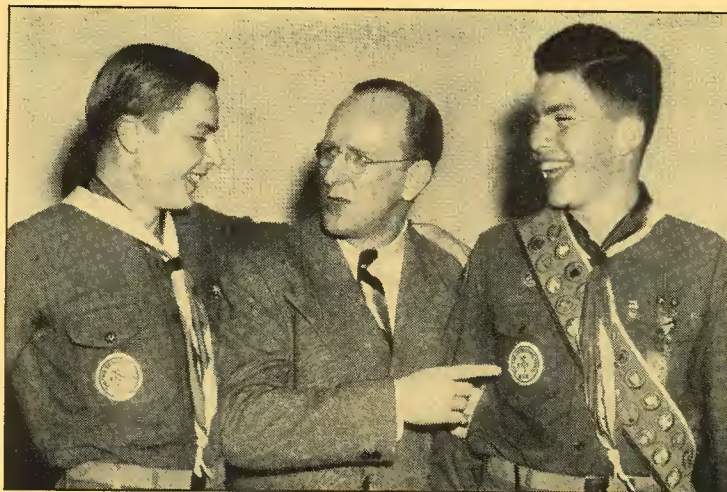

The Heart-Warming Story of Why "Darling Nellie Gray," a Song That Sold Millions of Copies, Was Written, Will Appeal to Music-Lovers Everywhere

WE ARE indebted to Earl R. Hoover, ex-president of the Otterbein College Alumni Association and a member of the college board of trustees, for a most unusual story. Ordinarily the following account would belong in the category of popular music, but because it concerns what we may term a "classic" of American folk literature, "Darling Nellie Gray" and its composer, Benjamin R. Hanby, and also because it is so human and interesting, we can assign it to no other place but this column.

"Darling Nellie Gray" is one of the standards of the American song archives. Radio programming of the piece is frequent and well-known concert artists have found it important enough to include it in their libraries.

Hanby wrote "Darling Nellie Gray" in 1856, when he was a sophomore at Otterbein College, Westerville, Ohio. He sent his manuscript to a Boston music publisher and learned it had been printed only when he heard that it was being performed in a near-by city. Its success from that point on was sensational. It swept the country. It hurtled over oceans into strange countries. It was translated into many foreign tongues and sold millions of copies.

The text of the song is based on the escape of a Negro slave, Joseph Selby, after being separated from his sweetheart, Nellie Gray. The verses tell of his desolation at discovering that she had been sold and taken to Georgia,

his hope of buying her freedom, and later of the awareness of impending death.

It happens that Selby, in his mad dash for freedom, stopped at the home of the Hanbys in central Ohio. The composer was then a very young boy, but the circumstance left its impression on his mind. Many years later Hanby was working in Kentucky during one summer vacation and the sight of slaves being sold on the auction block moved him strangely. His great compassion for the pitiful victims reminded him of the Selby incident and he set his feeling to words and music. The song was the result.

Mr. Hoover tells us that he took an unexpected motor trip through Rushville, Ohio, and there found a little grave in an old cemetery, Selby's grave, giving his death date as 1842. Thus, this year marks not only the seventy-fifth anniversary of Hanby's death, but also the one hundredth anniversary of the fugitive slave Selby's.

Hanby, it develops, wrote several songs that became popular, proving that the success of "Darling Nellie Gray" was no mere accident. His "Up on the Housetop," a children's Christmas song, had been, till recently, of unknown origin. Mrs. Dacia Custer Shoemaker, Hanby biographer, came upon the truth while poring over some old manuscripts, conclusively proving his authorship.

Another composition of his, the hymn "Who Is He?," is not well known here, but it did make a great success in England and, as Mr. Hoover puts it, "wherever the British flag flies."

Interpreters of Verdi

The list of artists who have ap-

peared in Verdi's "Un Ballo in Maschera" (The Masked Ball), the Metropolitan's broadcast selection this week, reads like a who's who in operatic music. The first Metropolitan performance, on December 11, 1889, was given in German with Lilli Lehmann as Amelia. It was performed in Italian on February 23, 1903, with Johanna Gadski, Fritz Scheff, Louise Homer, Emilio de Marchi, Giuseppe Campanari, Edouard de Reske and Marcel Journet.

Subsequent performances boasted such immortals as Emma Eames, Emmy Destinn, Frieda Hempel, Margaret Matzenauer, Enrico Caruso, Antonio Scotti, Pol Plancon and Pasquale Amato.

The original libretto of "Un Ballo in Maschera" called for a conspiracy, "resulting in the murder of a king on the stage." The work was to have its premiere at the Teatro San Carlo in Naples during the Carnival of 1858. However, owing to the attempt on Napoleon's life in January, it was deemed a dangerous, and possibly provocative, thing to enact a stage assassination. Hence, the management of the San Carlo made all sorts of difficulties about producing the work.

Considerable excitement among the people followed, for they were irritated by the delay. A compromise was reached with the transference of the action from the original Sweden to Colonial Boston, and the King of Sweden was miraculously made into an imaginary governor of Boston. The locale of the premiere was changed, further, from Naples to Rome, so that the first performance of the opera took place in the latter city on February 17, 1859.

Some of the important numbers in the score are the three first tenor

arias, "La rivedra nell'estasi," "Di tu se fedele," and "Ma se m'e forza perderti"; the famous solo, "Eri tu," as well as "Alla vita che t'arridi," for baritone; the contralto solo, "Re dell'abisso"; the song of the Page, "Saper vorreste"; the quintet in the first act and the finales of the second and third acts.

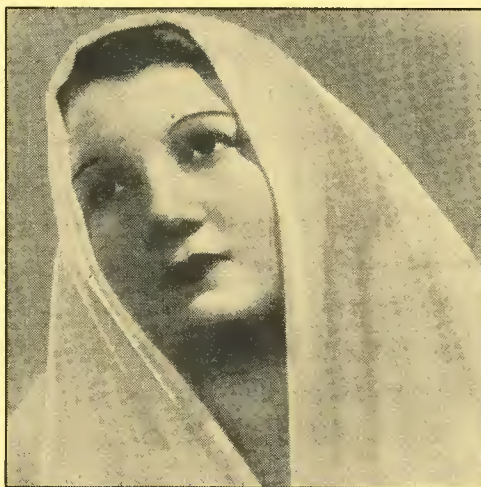
The Sea in Music

Claude Debussy, who had never voyaged much by boat, save for one or two crossings of the English Channel, yet captured the mystery of the ocean's endless expanse, its teeming moods, its colors and enchantments as no composer has done. His score is by no means an imitation of sea sounds, rather has the composer labored with the idea of the spirit of the sea, its beauty, its awesomeness, its mercurial changes of humor. Debussy possessed the equipment for such a work in his masterly manipulation of orchestral colors, in his exotic harmonies.

He began sketches on this magnificent work during a stay in Burgundy. In describing his plans to Andre Messager, he wrote: "You will say that the ocean does not exactly wash the Burgundian hillsides—and my seascapes might be studio landscapes; but I have an endless store of memories,

and to my mind they are worth more than the reality whose beauty often deadens thought." Though he wrote most of "La Mer" ("The Sea") in Paris, he put the finishing touches to it at the smart English watering-place of Eastbourne. Serge Koussevitzky, who conducts the Philharmonic-Symphony broadcast, is a noted interpreter of Debussy's fanciful score.

A Song of Impatience

Tschaikowsky admired the great Russian poet Pushkin almost to excess. One of the latter's works, the verse novel "Eugen Onegin," the composer, with the aid of K. S. Shilovsky, made into an operatic libretto and then he wrote the score for it. He did not consider the work actually an opera, but a succession of "lyric scenes" and therein lies a tale.

It appears that Tschaikowsky hated almost to distraction the obvious elements of the operatic stage. In a letter to his brother he wrote: "How delightful to avoid the commonplace Pharaohs, Ethiopian princesses, poisoned cups and all the rest of these doll's tales. (Verdi and Wagner please note.) 'Eugen Onegin' is full of poetry. I am not blind to its defects. I know well enough the work gives little scope for treatment and will be deficient in stage effects; but the wealth of poetry, the human quality and simplicity of the subject, joined to Pushkin's inspired verses, will compensate for what it lacks in other respects."

The three-act opera is one of the most popular in the Russian repertory. The Air de Lenski, which is to be sung by James Melton via the NBC "Telephone Hour," is a song of impatience. Lenski, who is waiting for the other principal in a duel, Onegin, frets and fumes and philosophizes about the delay of his opponent.

Some Worthy Recordings

Leonard Warren's magnificent voice is heard to excellent advantage in his recording of *Avant de quitter* from Gounod's "Faust" and *Scintille Diamant* from Offenbach's "Les contes d'Hoffmann." Two rarely heard arias, *Lift Thine Eyes* from Goldmark's "Queen of Sheba" and *Daglis immortalis vertici* from Verdi's "Attila" are delivered by Igor Gorin (Victor).

POPULAR MUSIC

If the idea has gotten around that the Andrews Sisters can sing only swing tunes, there is refutation in the fact that they do an expert job with such a straight ballad as "The Shrine of St. Cecilia." The tremendous sales of the Decca record by the Soeurs Andrews is already challenging the sales mark set by another disc of theirs, "What to Do?"

Harry James, now being called the nation's No. 1 trumpet man, is proud of a new possession, the horn that once belonged to King Joe Oliver, one of the immortals of jazz.

Ray Block, who began his radio career some years ago as arranger and pianist for the Eton Boys, is now a veritable Jack of all trades. He composes "mood" music, he arranges, he conducts symphonic or dance orchestras with equal aplomb. And on his day off—Wednesday—he remains in bed, planning the next week's duties.

And another odd item about Block: His orchestra for the Philip Morris shows boasts five well-known leaders—count 'em—Nat Brusiloff, Johnny Augustine, Bob Knight, Johnny Williams and Vladimir Selinsky. One of the vocalists for these programs, Judy Fredland, wrote the song hits, "Dreamville, Ohio" and "B-I-B-I," both you've no doubt heard from morning till night.

Recommended Popular Records

Tommy Dorsey and his orchestra really give in Cole Porter's "What Is This Thing Called Love?" and the old familiar "Love Sends a Little Gift of Roses." Both of these represent the young maestro and his cohorts at their best (Victor 27782). Claude Thornhill's dishing of "Somebody Else Is Taking My Place" and the oddly titled "Ya Lu-Blue" (borrowed from Mozart's G Minor Symphony No. 40) are first rate (Columbia 36512). Of course, you can scarcely leave Glenn Miller out of the reckoning, for he does again one of his thoroughly capable jobs with "Let's Have Another Cup of Coffee" and "Chip Off the Old Block" (Bluebird B-11450). And there's more truth than poetry—literally—in the title of Les Brown's choice, "Everybody's Making Money but Tschaikowsky," which is coupled with "Hereafter" (Okeh 6573).

Short Waves

Vichy Radio Goes on 24-Hour Schedule; Soviets Install Powerful Transmitter

True Perspective on War

IN MY opinion, H. Wickham Steed is the most able political commentator who broadcasts over the London short-wave station. His long-range outlook, his true evaluation of current incidents, his ability to get to the bottom of any situation have come only through nearly a lifetime of keen political analysis. When the news is bad, he does not hesitate to say so. He believes we should look at the present situation squarely, for only by realizing the magnitude of the task ahead of us can we steel ourselves to the hardships and personal sacrifices that we must make to win. And yet Wickham Steed is not a defeatist. Far from it, he firmly believes in the ultimate victory of the United Nations. The other night he pointed out that in China and India alone live nearly one-third of the world's population. Add to these the untold millions in the balance of the British Empire, in the Americas, in the occupied countries of Europe, and you have a preponderance of manpower that can only bring one result in the end. Germany and Japan knew what they had to do and set about to do it. We knew what we might have to do but were not really ready to do it until we were surprised. Now those who would spread the doctrine of ruthless brute force have the initial advantage. While not discounting their immediate seriousness, Wickham Steed feels we should regard the present setbacks as merely incidents in a mighty world revolution. We must realize, he said, that we will probably have more reverses to contend with. Hitler is about set to stage a grand all-out offensive in an effort to postpone the day of reckoning. We do not know how long the war will last. We must hold on and fight hard with every weapon at our disposal. To give us courage we must realize that in this great revolution which is shaking the world a new world order is taking shape. Its outlines are only dimly seen today but we do know that when it emerges we will have had a part in molding it. We do know that it will be a world in which brute force is forever outlawed, in which nations can cooperate upon a peaceful and equitable basis, in which social justice and the rights of man will be uppermost.

"Radio Vichy" is one of the best-received stations in North America, uses a single gong stroke for identification, sometimes employs a metronome with slow tick-tock prior to the start of a broadcast.

New Soviet Transmitter

According to advice from the Soviet Embassy in Washington, a powerful new Soviet short-wave transmitter was inaugurated at Komsomolsk on Amur on January 16. Simultaneously with the opening of the new station, the Soviet transmissions for North America were completely revised and now operate on the following greatly expanded basis (EWT):

Reports from all parts of the country indicate that these new transmissions are being received with very good signal strength. Each transmission includes an English news bulletin

which goes on approximately five minutes after the opening of the broadcast. The announcement is still "Radio Center Moscow," from which it may be assumed that the broadcasts still originate in Moscow studios but are actually put on the air from the transmitter at Komsomolsk on Amur. The usual woman announcer presides over the microphone.

Berlin Adds English News

On February 9 the German short-wave station completely revamped its service to North America. Instead of the usual formula which has been in existence for several years, news bulletins in English are now radiated daily from 7:00 p.m. to close-down, each hour on the hour, that is, at 7:00, 8:00, 9:00, 10:00 11:00 p.m., 12 mid. and 1:00 a.m. EWT. Each fifteen-minute news period is in turn followed by a fifteen-minute talk or commentary in English by one of Goebbels' gabblers. The Berlin program is broadcast over DHE4C (11.88), DJD (11.77), DXC2 (11.74), DZD (10.543), DXJ (7.24), DXP (6.03).

According to an announcement heard over Tokyo Radio, English news bulletins are broadcast daily at 5:00,

8:00 and 10:45 a.m. in the 25-, 31- and 41-meter bands; at 11:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. in the 25- and 31-meter bands; at 3:00 and 6:00 p.m. in the 25- and 41-meter bands; at 7:00 and 9:10 p.m. in the 19- and 25-meter bands; at 11:30 p.m., 1:30 and 2:30 a.m. EWT in the 25- and 31-meter bands. The usual frequencies employed are: 19-meter band, JLG4 (15.105); 25-meter band, JZJ (11.80); 31-meter band, JZ (9.565); 41-meter band, JVW (7.257).

The perverted sense of humor enjoyed by the Nipponese broadcasters may be judged from the fact that the daily period of "phony" messages broadcast by American prisoners of war over Tokyo Radio is ushered in with the music to "My Bonnie Lies Over the Ocean"; the period closes with the music for the line "Oh, bring back my Bonnie to me."

Venezuelans Buy "Victory Bonds"

The owner, manager and seven employees of a small trading company in El Callao, Venezuela, have shown their faith in the United States and hemisphere solidarity by sending ten dollars to Prof. Vicente Tovar of WGEO, General Electric international broadcast station in Schenectady, and asking of him "the service of investing these dollars in 'Bonds of the Victory.' With our contribution we wish to share, however humbly, in this battle against Nazism and Fascism, sure as we are of the final triumph, because we know God is not dead and that there are yet free countries in America."

Frequency Modulation

FM Station Proposed for Houston, Texas. For the Latest Developments About Radio's Youngest Offspring, Follow This Page Regularly

By DICK DORRANCE

PEOPLE who hear a symphony orchestra over FM for the first time are invariably astounded by the tonal purity with which the notes of every instrument reach their loudspeakers. The upper registers are sharp and clear, even to the shrillest squeak of a violin string and the thinnest, highest note of a flute. The reason for this is that the FM system of broadcasting is capable of faithfully reproducing every musical note that the human ear can detect.

Some of the pseudo-experts who think they know a good deal about

FM will tell you that FM's extended tone range exists only toward the treble end of the scale. That's not so. FM can reproduce equally well the bassiest bumble of a bassoon and the deepest notes of a tuba. The fidelity is so exact that listeners are unable to find any difference between a concert heard properly over FM and one heard right in the concert hall.

When we use the term "high fidelity"—which you'll frequently find being bandied about by set-makers, radio-store salesmen and an occasional radio engineer—we're on uncertain ground. Many people say "high fidelity" without bothering to define just

what its limits may be, and since there are no hard and fast standards, even receivers that give inferior performance are sometimes called "high-fidelity" sets. Engineers know, however, that a radio program sounds increasingly lifelike as we add more and more tones from both ends of the musical scale. The extreme highs and lows are vital if you want the music you hear to have color and brilliance. When it becomes so real that you can't tell it from the original—it's not just "high fidelity." It's full fidelity.

FM Proposed for Houston

The latest application received by

the Federal Communications Commission at Washington for permission to build an FM station comes from the Houston Printing Corp. of Houston, Texas, publishers of the Houston Post. The proposed FM outlet would serve an area of 10,500 square miles, which embraces a territory extending about seventy miles in all directions from Houston and populated by approximately 722,600 persons. This is the second application for an FM station to come from Texas, a similar request now being on file at Washington by the Amarillo Broadcasting Corp. of Amarillo. The state of Texas does not yet have any FM broadcast service.

WHAT'S COOKING!

Colonel Corn

THAT'S a good title for our native corn, since corn is highly respected in the land of "colonels" to the south and also because it looks as if corn is going to serve an important function in the present war. It is likely corn will become the source of some of our sugar supply if there should be a shortage of beet and cane sugar.

The talk in the Bible about corn, odd as it may seem, doesn't mean corn as we know it. Wheat or oats is what is really meant. Corn is the big name given to the leading cereal crop of a section. Thus, in England corn means wheat; in Scotland and Ireland, oats. When we say corn in America we refer to one thing, Indian corn, now developed into a delicious cereal fed to man and beast alike.

Most Americans relish corn on the cob. That's a standard American delicacy, like hotdogs and ice-cream, but other delightful uses for corn as a food are often overlooked. Our pioneer ancestors, you know, had corn as a staple food. They ground it up into corn-meal for mush and for breads. They also used a great deal of hominy, which is simply corn with the kernels hulled off. The hasty pudding that the "Yankee Doodle" song refers to was made of this hominy.

The modern housewife has corn-starch on her shelf for puddings and sauces; unrefined starch for her clothes; Karo for its many uses as a syrup and for desserts; Mazola, made from corn oils, for salad dressings; Corn Flakes for breakfast, but hominy grits or corn-meal aren't to be found often with the other corn products.

Corn on the cob, in cans, and as ground meal contains valuable foods for health and energy—starch, minerals, and some vitamin B1 and C. There's nothing quite like hot corn on the cob with melted butter dripping from it, but it's only in season during a special part of the year. If you want to enjoy the rich, individual flavor and the health values of corn the year round, you'll try using canned corn (you can get it either with the kernels intact or broken up) and corn-meal.

Old-fashioned Johnny Cake, which Bess Johnson proudly prepares in the pictures above, offers a welcome



change from bread and rolls. The recipe she uses is simple, economical, and almost sure-fire. That's the wonderful thing about corn-bread—seems like you just can't miss on it. Here is one recipe which calls for sour milk or buttermilk; maybe you have a recipe which uses sweet milk. There are all sorts of ways of preparing this treat:

JOHNNY CAKE

- 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 3/4 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 cup corn-meal
- 1 1/2 cups sour milk or buttermilk
- 3 tablespoons melted shortening

If you like the corn-bread heavier, you can cut down the amount of white flour you use, adding more corn-meal in proportion; however, this proportion of white flour to corn-meal will make a light, tasty bread. After mixing and sifting your baking powder, sugar, salt and soda, add the corn-meal and mix well. Then add your melted shortening to your beaten eggs and milk and add to the dry ingredients.

Hats off to corn, the food of many uses, of a great tradition, and because it's 100% American.

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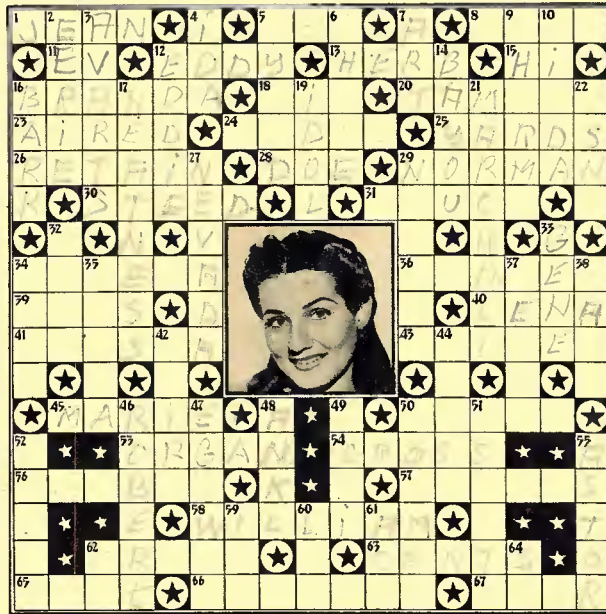

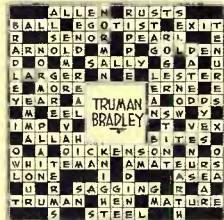

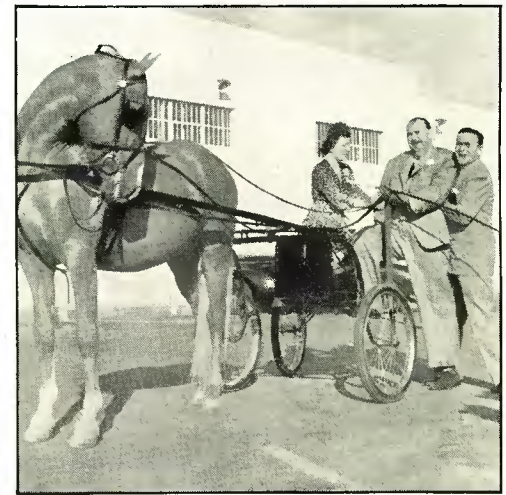
