





That same thing is happening every




day in these United States. One per-



When the editors of MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE asked me why I hoped my horse would win I couldn't give them an immediate answer.

They asked me to jot down my thoughts on the matter and maybe they'd be interesting reading. So here are the thoughts and I don't know whether they're interesting or not, any more than I know whether Lum's Pride is gonna win that race 'or not. Honestly, I'm so nervous about the

Kentucky Derby that I'd forget the whole thing if it weren't for Abner—he's my partner, Norris Goff. But Abner knows horseflesh forward and backward and he knows Lum's Pride. He was there when Lum's Pride was born and has kinda foster-fathered him ever since.

Abner says he looks at the whole thing in a sensible way, without bias or prejudice, and he says I not only should send Lum's Pride to the post on Derby Day but that I've got a darned good chance to win.

Grannies, I hope he's right! There's an old song I've always liked about "Bury Me Out on the Lone Prairie."

If I'm standing at the finish wire on May 2 and my horse comes across that finish line in front of all those other classy thoroughbreds, there won't be any Lum to argue with Abner on the next Monday, I'm afraid. No, sir, I know I'll just absolutely collapse right on the spot and they'll probably bury me in the winner's circle.

As Seen by Neighbor Mrs. Carlton E. Morse

War Strikes Home in This Fifth Instalment of The Barbour Family, Fictionized Version of the Fascinating Radio Serial, "One Man's Family," When Paul's Plane Is Reported Missing Somewhere Over the Pacific

The Barbour Family is Mrs. Carlton Morse's fictionized version of the popular radio serial, "One Man's Family," heard every Sunday night at 8:30 EWT over NBC, under the sponsorship of Tender Leaf Tea. Preceding instalments have described many changes in the famous radio family. Father Barbour has sold his stock and bond business, is now retired. Family life at present centers around the ranch homes of Claudia and Hazel. Claudia is happily married a second time to Captain Nicholas Lacey. Hazel, now a widow, has found a new interest in Daniel Murray, manager of her ranch. Cliff, the playboy, seriously injured shortly after the death of his wife Anne, who died when her son was born, has gone to live on Hazel's ranch, finds peace and useful work there. Jack, the kid brother, now a law student, is married to his boyhood sweetheart, Betty Carter. Only Paul, oldest son, aviator veteran of World War I, remains the same. He is still a philosopher, and counsellor to the whole Barbour clan. His adopted daughter Teddy is at present much in the spotlight. She has grown into a beautiful, poised young lady through Paul's wise guidance. With two young aviators—Tracy Baker and Wayne Grubb—both vying for her favors, life is glorious for Teddy until her beloved adopted father, who has been ferrying planes for the government since the Pearl Harbor disaster last December 7, is reported missing somewhere over the vast expanse of the Pacific. Now go on with the story. —The Editors.

THE days and nights of waiting, waiting, hoping for a ring at the door or telephone yet fearing to hear it, smiling carefully so that the smiles didn't turn to uncontrollable sobs, all these things the Barbour family did for seven eon-long days. Seven days . . . does anyone know how long that can be who hasn't waited as the Barbours did? Where was Paul? What had happened? Was he dead . . . or alive . . . suffering . . . alone? Mustn't show fear for the sake of the others . . . each member of the family walking down his lonely road of imagination to Paul, wherever he was. A plane is such a little thing in the air above the thousands of miles of the great Pacific. But this was not fair to Paul. He is an astute, a magnificent pilot. They, the Barbours, we, the neighbors, must believe in him and his ability to get home. If sheer faith and love ever brought a man safely back to waiting hearts, that man was Paul Barbour. He came back with a broken elbow, which still is stiff, but he returned. He will leave again when the elbow is normal, but right now he is home and only the past few days has Teddy been willing to let him out of her sight.

Teddy is Paul's greatest delight. It has been a never-ending source of joy to watch the gawky, funny little daughter he adopted grow into a beautiful girl. It has been interesting for the neighbors also, for this particular Barbour is most certainly the product of her environment. Paul's efforts have borne a fine fruit in Teddy. Usually she has been easy to

lead, to teach, to mold, but there have been times when Paul has had to be wise indeed to steer her safely through certain problems of growing up and adjusting herself to woman's estate.

Her sudden interest in young men with money was a worrying thing. Hitherto Wayne Grubb and Tracy Baker and others of their ilk had been quite exciting enough, but she made the announcement one day that it was just as easy to fall in love with a rich man as a poor one and that she had every intention of exposing herself to money and marrying same!

Paul looked at her as she made that statement. "You worry me a lot sometimes. Here you are just finishing your last year in high school and you talk about falling in love. Exposing yourself to money . . . however that is done."

"Well, what do you want me to do, Paul? Sit down and marry the first boy who comes along even if he hasn't a job?"

"Teddy, I'm not interested in having you marry anyone at the moment . . . I don't know whether your flip, cynical conversation about men and money is just something the younger generation is affecting or whether it is something pertaining to you alone . . . Whatever it is, it isn't funny, it isn't smart. In fact, it strikes me as slightly cheap and vulgar. I hope it is just a phase you're passing through."

To be so criticized by Paul, whose good opinion she values above all else, was a surprise to the young lady. Paul usually didn't speak quite so



shortly. She tried to explain her reasons for wanting to marry money. "It's just that next door Jack and Betty are having such a hard time and going without things and pretending they don't care because they haven't any money, and down the street everything is easy and smooth and nice for Claudia and Nicky because they HAVE money. Claudia and Nicky are just as much in love as Jack and Betty, so what's so vulgar about my wanting to live like Claudia instead of grubbing along like Betty?"

"Both Claudia and Betty married for love, Teddy. Money didn't enter into consideration, just the man. That's the very reason for the differences in the financial circumstances in the two households."

"Of course. I understand that, Paul . . . I . . . I . . . guess I was just talking. I know really that it is love and not what a man owns that is the important thing."

"If you do know that and you guide yourself accordingly, I can't criticize." Paul smiled and said, "Run along now. I want to work. And be grateful, my problem child, that you will never be a father!"

That little talk settled THAT, but just as Paul felt that there couldn't be any more disturbing problems for a while, Teddy became intensely interested in Daniel Murray, who manages the Dairy Ranch and who has asked Hazel to marry him. This man so much older, with much of the suave charm that is Paul's, became the most exciting thing Teddy had ever known. It was all very evident, but most of the family was inclined to dismiss it as a little girl's affection. Paul knew only too well that the little girl was fast growing to adult stature emotionally and must be made to see that this infatuation would never do.

Hollywood Rallying 100 Percent for Victory in New War-Time Measures; Ty Power Joins Navy, Tim Holt, Army Air Corps; Joan Crawford Turns Producer

HOLLYWOOD

By EVANS PLUMMER

WAR-TIME measures to point the movie-makers' usefulness to the all-out war effort and for the protection, too, of the studios and their personnel were adopted last week by the board of directors of the Association of Motion Picture Producers. The fighting rules include:

(1) A plan for the interstudio use of equipment and services in the event of war damage.

(2) A survey and pooling of the available transportation and delivery services.

(3) The employment of capable engineers for a survey to determine what equipment now in use in Hollywood may be put in part-time production for the armed forces.

Hollywood, always war conscious and once charged as "spreading war propaganda," is rallying one hundred percent for victory . . .

A real test of one studio's air-raid precautions was made when a blackout was ordered in Los Angeles last week just as Warner Bros. was previewing a new Bette Davis picture to newspapermen at their studio projection-rooms. The writers, their hosts and hundreds of other night-time workers caught on the lot hastened to the studio's several bomb shelters to await the all-clear signal, which did not come for two hours. The preview showing was resumed then, and it was approximately 2 a.m. before the Hollywood correspondents reached their homes! . . .

Movie-goers will sing "Deep in the Heart of Texas" and two other songs with Gene Autry and Smiley Burnette in "Stardust on the Sage" . . . Dorothy Parker's "boys don't make passes at girls who wear glasses" hasn't prevented 20th-Fox

Type of Picture: This is a modern, up-to-the-minute film comedy in which Brian Donlevy plays the part of General Andrew Jackson, who has been dead virtually a century. When his talents as Jackson fail to release innocent Bill Holden from jail, Jackson calls upon his friends, Chief Justice Marshall, Benjamin Franklin, George Washington, and others to rescue Holden so that he can marry Ellen Drew. Hilariously they do.

This is the Story: Bill Holden is an honest, scrupulous, young bookkeeper in Shale City Hall. When he discovers that his books do not balance and that the fault lies with his supervisors' shady dealings, he is thrown in jail on a trumped-up charge. Discouraged because his love will not bloom while he is in prison, Bill is visited by the spirits of famous historical personages, who are really flesh-and-blood ghosts of Andrew Jackson, Benjamin Franklin, George Washington and the rest. Under their tutelage, with his sweetie, Ellen Drew, thinking he is berserk, he uncovers the evidence of his own innocence and sends to their rightful punishment the villains. The ghosts go back to whence they came.

Verdict: If you liked "Here Comes Mr. Jordan," this show will win your approval. It is real American and is fine entertainment for the whole family. And Donlevy again is Donlevy the great.

The Radio Front

"Abie's Irish Rose" Had to Wait for Its Radio Success; Bing Crosby Croons to Flyers Over India; the Ol' Professor Gives Morale Lessons

WASHINGTON

One of the most remarkable stories of radio success was revealed recently when I lunched with Robert Jennings, radio chief of the Kastor Agency in Chicago. It is the story of radio's "Abie's Irish Rose."

The original "Abie" played in New York for many years. Its opening night was a nightmare for Anne Nichols, who wrote it. Every critic in Manhattan tore his hair and lamented the state of affairs which permitted the presentation of so shoddy a play.

Nevertheless, that footlight romance between an Irish girl and a Jewish boy attracted people, and the play, which all the experts had said could never succeed, became the greatest success of any season.

Perhaps you have heard it recently on Saturday night. It is now a radio hit and how it came about is a small lesson for all of us. The author is a resourceful, intelligent woman named Anne Nichols. After "Abie's" Broadway run was over, she turned to radio and attempted to interest some sponsor. She wrote thirteen scripts and presented them to expert after expert. None wanted "Abie." Presently she brought those scripts to Robert Jennings, a thirty-year-old hit-picker who has produced many network triumphs. He saw something in them, something good enough to talk to Miss

Nichols about.

"The idea is there," he told her, "but you don't know enough about radio writing to give it to an audience which works by ear. The time isn't ripe either for the public to hear so strong a plea for racial tolerance."

The next step was the important one. Bob Jennings made a deal with Anne Nichols for the writing of another Kastor show, the Irene Rich program out of Hollywood. He would teach her to write for a radio audience and they would put "Abie" in the desk drawer.

That was two years ago. During that year Anne Nichols became an expert radio writer. During that time Hitler and Hirohito made racial understanding and sympathy in this nation a condition of survival. So Jennings and Nichols dusted off "Abie," rewrote it completely, and got Procter and Gamble to substitute it for "Knickerbocker Playhouse."

The result is a phenomenon of broadcasting. While most other shows are feeling the decline of summer listening-habits, "Abie" is growing at a record-breaking pace. "Abie" is now threatening to do on the air what it did on the New York stage, which is to be the greatest hit in history. Listen in some Saturday night . . .

Washington brings together many strange characters who come here with the same unselfish purpose. Each wants most sincerely to do whatever

he can to serve his country. This ungainly community is so confusing that most visitors are baffled and bewildered, and they grasp hungrily at the signposts of familiar names. I find many in my office, eager for a chance to serve.

One of the first, months ago, was Don the Beachcomber. He started selling zombies in a Hollywood restaurant, remember, and kept his customers from going home by spilling water down his awning in what resembled a torrential downpour. Now Don has a fine restaurant in Chicago, too, but he wanted to put his expert knowledge of the southwest Pacific to use for his Government.

Jack Warner, of the famous Warner Bros. who make all those movies, is here as newly appointed lieutenant colonel in the air corps. Lt. Col. Darryl Zanuck has been promoted to colonel.

Stark's announcements are done from the regular studios . . .

So you wondered about the closing lines on a recent Eddie Cantor show? As you may have suspected, the show ran overtime, and the snapper was cut off the last gag by the theme music and audience applause. Here's how it went: Phil Baker, subbing for Cantor, who was in the hospital after a throat operation: "Long distance call from Moscow? Russian, Joe Stalin wants to talk to you." The Mad Russian: "Hello, Joe! Whadya know? Don't cry. It's too late. I have joined the Yankees." Here theme and applause swallowed the lines. And here's what should have followed: Baker: "Russian, why is Stalin so upset because you're with the Yankees?" Russian: "He wanted me to join the Brooklyn Dodgers!" . . .

Paul Schubert can tell you a unique experience about getting into radio. His wife is a singer and she had an audition with WOR. Schubert went along with her to accompany her on his accordion. There was no opening for the vocalist at the time, but it set the accompanist to thinking about radio. A couple of months later Schubert himself appeared before the same man who had auditioned his wife, outlined his background and took a test. Now he's on the air not as an accordion player but as Mutual's naval analyst! . . .

NEW YORK

"Your voice sounds very familiar," announcer Charles Stark and commentator Gabriel Heatter might have said to one another when they were introduced the other day. Stark had announced Heatter's programs for two years, but the men had not met until the commentator did his broadcast from the WOR studio for the first time. Usually he broadcasts from a private studio in his home, while

MBS Maestro Alfred Wallenstein Will Head First American Opera Festival in Cooperation With U. S. Treasury Department to Spur Sale of War Savings Bonds

ARATHER ambitious project has been undertaken by conductor Alfred Wallenstein and the Mutual Broadcasting System, in conjunction with the U. S. Treasury Department. A First American Opera Festival is the idea, and one of the chief purposes of the venture is to spur the sales of War Savings Bonds. The festival begins on Thursday, May 7, and will run, all told, for seven consecutive Thursdays.

The works to be performed by the forces under Mr. Wallenstein's direction comprise six operas never before broadcast. One will be given its world premiere and six of them have American locales.

To initiate the festival, George Gershwin's "Porgy and Bess" has been chosen, presenting the full cast of the current Broadway production, headed by Ann Brown and Todd Duncan. Following that will be heard Douglas Moore's "The Devil and Daniel Webster," Gian-Carlo Menotti's "The Old Maid and the Thief," Quinto Maganini's "Tennessee's Partner," Virgil Thomson's "Four Saints in Three Acts," Aaron Copland's "Second Hurricane" and Deems Taylor's "The King's Henchman."

The orchestra to be employed is that of the WOR-Mutual Broadcasting System, and all productions will originate in the WOR-Mutual Playhouse in West 42nd Street, New York City, though no audiences will be invited.


The Case of Mendelssohn

Whatever else may be said of the music of Felix Mendelssohn, the fact remains that everything he wrote he managed with supreme elegance of style, finesse and clarity of thought and a grace and polish belonging to him exclusively. There can be no denying, furthermore, his claim to a great inventive talent, even if that did not reach the heights attained by a Bach or a Handel or a Beethoven or a Mozart.

He was a complete master of musical form and he understood the ramifications of the subject as few other composers did. Never an innovator or a style-setter, he nevertheless devoted himself to his music, producing his works after the examples presented by the greatest, and the very lucidity of his writing makes it all the easier for the interpreter to assimilate the creator's aims.

Howard Barlow conducts two works by Mendelssohn on his Columbia Broadcasting Symphony program, namely, the "Ruy Blas" overture and the "Reformation" symphony. Neither of these is too frequently performed these days and it follows that their scheduling is more than welcome. In both of these items one may admire the sterling workmanship, the clear-purposed detail, the fine molding of phrases and fragments into a closely related whole.

An interesting point is brought up by Stephen S. Stratton, Mendelssohn's biographer, who advances the opinion that his versatility may have "prevented his reaching the highest pin-

high, aiming at good entertainment and at education.

In addition to conducting his well-known "Sinfonietta," Mr. Wallenstein directs the concerts of "America Preferred," also in collaboration with the Treasury Department, and other important programs. Radio listeners, thanks to the young batonist's original ideas, have had the opportunity to hear many outstanding musical series under his leadership, notably that offering the Cantatas of Bach, which previously had not been given in cycle form. He has brought to radio over one thousand first performances, both of contemporary and classical compositions.

In recognition of the many services he has done for radio and the cause of good music, Mr. Wallenstein received recently the George Foster Peabody Award, which is considered the Pulitzer Prize of radio.

The fourth movement of Dr. Hanson's Third Symphony, marked "Largamente e peesante," which is to be played under his own direction on the "Milestones in American Music" program, is of compactly contrapuntal character. Dr. Hanson was born in Wahoo, Nebraska, on October 28, 1896. He began his musical studies with his mother, later continuing them at Luther College and at the School of Music of Nebraska University. Further study was undertaken at the Institute of Musical Art in New York City with Percy Goetschius and subsequently at Northwestern University's School of Music, where he worked with C. Lutkin and Aren Oldberg. Dr. Hanson taught at the College of the Pacific, in San Jose, California, after taking his final degree. In 1921 he was awarded a three-year fellowship in composition at the American Academy in Rome. In 1924, on his return to this country, he was

Classics in Brief

The tendency in modern composition is to create works of shorter length—in general—than those honored ones of the classic past. That is one reason why the programs of the "Telephone Hour" series will feature the briefer items, the pieces that audiences want to hear, "the encore pieces," as conductor Donald Voorhees puts it. The list of works arranged for the second concert in the series reflects that policy. Appearing as soloist, Grace Moore, noted American soprano, will sing several such numbers, though, truthfully speaking, the literature for the voice is scarcely to be compared, in point of individual length of works, with that for the instrument family outside of opera. Yet the policy established by the originators of these programs is pursued in that only standard favorites will be performed.

Charpentier's opera "Louise" offers one such item, the aria "Depuis le Jour," which is probably better known than its source. The subject of the opera is Parisian Bohemian life, much like that of Puccini's "La Boheme." Louise, employed at a dressmaker's, loves Julien, a painter. Her father frowns on painting in general and painters in particular, so that immediately we have the main dramatic motive. There isn't much to the story, since it follows the initial theme rather closely. And Louise is united to her Julien, on the heels of which her father utters "Oh, Paris!" in the full splenic fervor of a curse.

It is interesting to note that Mary Garden made her first appearance on any stage in the title role of the opera on April 12, 1900, less than two months after the work's premiere at the Opera Comique, Paris.

BARRY WOOD, commenting on the changes that have taken place in the program "Your Hit Parade," recalls that in the early days there was a different band every two weeks and that vocalists were shifted around just as often. He himself appeared first with the show two and one-half years ago, introducing the informal note of a singing master of ceremonies. It added a personal touch to the presentation. At the present time, the personnel comprises a fairly stable group, the girl singers occasionally being subject to change.

The only constant thing about "Your Hit Parade" has been the type of songs performed. Simple ballads with a straightforward melody and lyric still have the best chance of reaching the envied No. 1 spot, and though the number of the current war songs has increased by leaps and bounds, they have made remarkably small impression, according to the show's statistical geniuses. Of these innumerable essays only two, "White Cliffs of Dover" and "Remember Pearl Harbor," have been listed among the ten top tunes since December 7 last.

A major ambition of Walter Gross' career was recently realized when he was given his first sponsored program. The gifted pianist—who can do beautifully either in the classical or the popular style—was awarded the prominent spot on "Duffy's Tavern," succeeding Teddy Wilson's fine little group which held forth for the first four weeks of the series. Mr. Gross' larger band plays for chanteuse Vera Barton as well as on other CBS programs. He is now organizing a sextet for the "Duffy's Tavern" shows.

Recommended this trip are the following: "To a Broadway Rose" and "Deuces Wild," by Artie Shaw and his orchestra (Victor 27838); "Day Dreaming" and "Ages Ago," sung by Tito Guizar (Victor 27839); "When There's a Breeze on Lake Louise" and "Heavenly, Isn't It?" sung by Joan Miller (Bluebird B-11498); the album of famous theme songs by such bands as Gene Krupa's, Charlie Spivak's, Cab Calloway's, Frankie Masters' and others (Columbia Set K-4).

Bombs in Bataan Made Real Sound-Effects for the "March of Time"

New BBC Program Schedule

TO MAKE its programs even more interesting and informative than they already are, the BBC introduced several new program features; revamped some of your old favorites, effective on April 19. The new trend is toward more and more programs actually originating in spots where British war activity is most intense; for example the air-warden posts, factory benches, military camps and flying-fields.

Among the features wholly new is **MEET THE PEOPLE OF BRITAIN**, heard on Sundays at 7:00 p.m. CWT, with Jack Peach interviewing a different person each week. Old soldiers, fighter pilots and businessmen will take their turn at the microphone to tell what each is doing for victory. **ESCAPE TO FREEDOM** is being heard on Wednesdays at 7:45 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. CWT. The series dramatizes stories of escape from the occupied countries, which for the safety of the individuals concerned have been kept secret up to this time. Another new feature is **WORKING DAY**. This program is put on Thursdays at 7:45 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. CWT. Primarily dealing with factory workers, **MY WORKING DAY** brings many types of individuals to the mike who are serving in "Britain's Production Army." **FREEDOM FORUM** being heard on Thursdays at 6:30 p.m. CWT takes up controversial questions affecting day-to-day conduct of the war and questions concerning the future of the peoples of the United Nations.

DEMOCRACY MARCHES on Monday nights (7:00 p.m. CWT) has been changed from an exclusively American show to include Canadians as well. On Tuesday the experiment tried in recent weeks of alternating Vernon Bartlett with Frederick Kuh of the *Chicago Sun* on "Current Affairs" (7:00 p.m. CWT) will be continued. William Holt's sharply observant talks have been shifted to Wednesdays and in his place on Thursday **WOMEN'S WAR** will be heard. It will feature (7:00 p.m. CWT) each week three different women, who will describe their war work. On Saturdays at 7:00 p.m. CWT Stanley Maxted's **OFF THE RECORD**, a radio reporter's view of Britain, will be heard.

Changes have also been made in the regular nightly **BRITAIN SPEAKS** (7:30 p.m. CWT) feature. J. B. Priestley remains to do the Thursday night show and Wickham Steed to speak on Fridays. James Hodson is taking over the Sunday

night period formerly occupied by Frank Owen. Hodson is a brilliant and interesting journalist. On Monday nights this program will review social progress in Britain, while on Wednesdays, **BRITAIN SPEAKS** offers a new series, "Africa, the Middle of the World." This series will tell listeners of Africa today.

Bataan Bombing Background

An interesting coincidence in which actual bombing furnished a background for a radio show describing Japanese bombing of the same locale was described in a letter—postmarked February 13—which has just been received by station KGEI in San Francisco. The letter said in part:

"I have a short-wave battery radio receiver which has been a Godsend here in the woods. For the past few evenings KGEI has been booming through fine and we have enjoyed such programs as Bing Crosby, 'The March of Time,' Charlie McCarthy and Jack Benny. A funny thing happened the other evening while I was listening to the 'March of Time.' One of the episodes purported to depict an incident in the front lines here in Bataan. There was a sound-effect of firing and one of the characters said,

'Here they come.' Just at that minute a flight of Jap dive-bombers opened up on us and our anti-aircraft responded. The noise of that little brush completely drowned the sound-effects of the radio. There was a gang around the set at the time and we were all much amused at the unusual coincidence."

Nazis Admit Starving Prisoners

According to the Soviets, the eighteenth issue of *Bote der Heimat*, Nazi storm-trooper organ published in the town of Glaschuette, notes that Soviet war prisoners are building roads in the neighborhood. The same issue prints a cartoon showing two rabbit-breeders with the caption: "Why are the rabbits so skinny?" "Because the Russian prisoners have eaten all the leaves and grass." This brutal and idiotic sample of Nazi humor confirms the Soviet government's charge that Soviet prisoners of war are being starved to death by the Germans and is a sufficient refutation of German contentions that captured Red Army men are well treated.

Blue Names Iceland Correspondent

Bjorn Bjornson, American newspaperman who predicted the occupation of Iceland and who has been stationed there for several months, will air the latest news to Blue Network listeners on alternate Monday evenings, from 5:00 to 5:10 p.m. CWT. The Iceland pick-up is made over Reykjavik short-wave station TFJ (12.235), which is usually easily audible on these network shows. Bjornson has more qualifications for his new post than almost any newspaperman in the country. He has perfect knowledge of the difficult Icelandic language, in addition to Swedish, Norwegian, Danish and German. Bjorn's father, Gunnar Bjornson, who resides in Minnesota, was that state's official representative at Iceland's one-thousandth anniversary celebration of the establishment of her parliament, oldest in the world.

Frequency Modulation

Height, Not Watt-Power, Will Be Determining Factor in FM Plans for New World of Radio, Dedicated to Serving the Best Interests of America's Listening Public

Forget the Wattage

ONE of the more difficult aspects of FM broadcasting for most radio listeners to grasp is the fact that these new-type stations are not rated on the basis of their power in watts. Instead it's according to the size of areas served, measured in square miles. Despite frequent attempts at explaining this fundamental of FM, readers of *MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE* still write in occasionally to ask "how much power" certain FM stations now have or will have when completed.

To show you how meaningless the matter of FM watts can be, there's a station on Mount Washington, New Hampshire, with only a 5,000-watt transmitter, yet it serves 31,000 square miles—a radius of one hundred miles and better. But in several important cities there are FM transmitters of 10,000 to even 50,000 watts that serve ranges of only forty or fifty miles.

Why should that be? Well, the factor that makes the difference is height. The antenna of the Mount Washington station is 6,300 feet above sea level. If the same 5,000-watt transmitter were placed at the base of the mountain, it probably wouldn't have a range of over twenty miles, with plenty of weak reception in the hollows and behind hills.

The high-power stations in cities are usually located on top floors of tall buildings, but few tall buildings in the average city are much over five hundred feet high. Therefore, the additional wattage must be radiated to compensate for lack of height.

Cities Aren't Alike

Another point that baffles some FM listeners—even the ones who do understand how FM stations are licensed to cover definite areas in square miles—is why there should be such variation in these areas for different cities. Take, as an example, the standard service area for all FM stations in New York City, which is 8,500 square miles, or a radius of fifty-two miles. Chicago FM stations, on the other hand, are required to serve 10,800 square miles. And the ones in Philadelphia must cover 9,300.

Listeners reason that, since New York is a bigger city than Philadelphia, why should the Philadelphia FM outlets be permitted to serve almost 1,000 more square miles than the New York City ones?

These figures aren't stipulated by the Federal Communications Commission, which licenses all radio stations, purely on a hit-or-miss system. They're arrived at by dint of considerable research and study, involving the economic and social activities of each individual city. "This basis," declares the FCC, "has been selected because the limitation of the trade areas as established corresponds in general with the social and cultural

interests of the community. Also, the area which a high-frequency (frequency modulation) broadcast station can serve with good technical service both day and night corresponds in a large measure with the majority of such areas."

The Nation's Neighborhoods

"The aggregate of all the basic trade areas," continues the FCC, "includes the entire area of the United States, and thus the entire population will receive service under the plan except where technically and economically it is not possible to render service throughout some areas."

The nation is broken up into approximately 625 basic trading-areas surrounding the major cities. These are the areas (actually, spheres of influence) from which people travel into a certain metropolitan center to shop and work—a center around which all the economic and cultural life of that territory revolves.

Surveys have shown that the biggest cities don't always have the biggest trading-areas in terms of square miles. The existence of other large cities near by may tend to divert trade from them and to concentrate population closer to the main centers. New York City is a good example of this. In the Midwest, however, where people are accustomed to traveling greater distances and don't live so close together, some of the cities have

comparatively enormous trade areas.

Then, of course, within the 625 basic areas you will find innumerable smaller cities and towns with less than 25,000 population. These are rightfully entitled to have their own FM outlets, too—stations that are permitted to serve only a "limited trade area," meaning the individual "sphere of influence" of that particular community. There can be quite a number of these limited trade areas within the confines of any basic trade area. Their stations seldom serve much more than three thousand square miles.

What It All Means

Let's see how this theory works out. Suppose a man in Lexington, Kentucky—which is a city of about 50,000 people, not counting its trading area—decides that he wants to build and operate an FM station. First he must make an application to the Federal Communications Commission in Washington for what is known as a "construction permit." His application must include all manner of salient data on his own financial standing, his character and that of his associates, his plans for operation of the station, the types and performance of equipment to be installed, statistics on Lexington and its trading area, its people and their actual need for an FM station, plus dozens of additional facts you'd never dream of.

The official application blank that must be filled out contains forty-four searching pages of involved questions. Countless maps, exhibits, photostats and documents must be attached to it. In short, the FCC requires every scrap of detail that may be necessary in deciding whether to grant or reject the application.

The proposed station must agree to serve a region conforming as nearly as possible to the actual trading-area of Lexington—which happens to be about 6,300 square miles. Some 415,000 potential listeners live in that region. If the aspiring FM station owner wants to serve only three thousand square miles—or maybe as much as ten thousand square miles, depending on his inclination and bank account—Washington simply won't let him. In other words, if he intends to give Lexington FM reception, then he must do it so that the new station caters to not less—and not more—than all of the people living within the accepted Lexington trading area. And, if a construction permit is granted, it's done so with that understanding.

Furthermore, any subsequent FM stations that other people might want to build there must cover exactly the same-size area. In this way, all Lexington FM transmitters will compete upon an identical footing. Good service to the community, rather than just loudness of the signal, will determine the popularity of a station over its local competitors.

In other words, all stations in a given city will be heard at approximately the same volume level. The 50,000-watt outlet can't flaunt its greater power to the detriment of the little fellow with only one thousand watts.

It's an ideal arrangement for localized broadcasting. It cures many of the ills that have grown up out of years of haphazard growth by ordinary broadcasting. These ills aren't anyone's fault; they just happened because ordinary broadcasting was new and so unpredictable that radio people couldn't foresee and chart perfectly its unbelievable course of progress.

But FM, coming as it does after broadcasting has been an industry for twenty years, brings with it an opportunity to profit by experience and so preplan a new world of radio that will be dedicated to serving the best interests of the American listening public.



Dr. Damrosch Honored



Even though we are at war, picture-taking isn't banned in America. There is a code governing photography in war-time, but aside from suggesting that the photographer ask himself the question, "Does this picture contain information that I would like to have if I were the enemy?" there is little else that the average layman need know about it.

Use your own discretion about what you photograph. Photographs of waterfronts, important bridges, Army camps and other obviously vital wartime features are banned. When in real doubt about photographic restrictions, ask a near-by policeman or other official . . .

This year, drama critic George Jean Nathan's contribution to the nation is a book about the theater, the circus, the radio, the theater, and sideshows, and the theater. It's called "The Entertainment of a Nation" (Knopf, \$2.50), and anyone reading it is well aware that Mr. Nathan's emphasis on entertainment is in favor of the theater. Care Is Your Cue

HAVE you ever had some acquaintance of yours, in a moment of confidence, admit almost proudly that she doesn't have to use either a deodorant or an anti-perspirant? None of us like to be catty, but haven't you thought that there was a lass who was really dumb? Well, you're right? The fair lady who says she doesn't need perspiration protection is not only not "fair" and not a "lady" but she's not even smart.

If there really is one of you that absolutely knows she doesn't perspire, then we suggest she see a doctor about it, because she's neither normal nor healthy. Perspiration is a regular body function whose purpose is to cool off the body when it needs it, and that's all the time, all over the body. Fortunately, most of it evaporates into thin air.

Unfortunately, the under-arms are in what we might call a "closed position," and perspiration here cannot evaporate. Instead, even despite your daily bath, the body wastes and oils of perspiration accumulate. The result is often, shall we say, "unpleasant." It might affect the whole course of your life, your contacts with friends, and in business, and your chances for happiness if you don't guard against it. You cannot afford to offend through personal carelessness. Neither can you afford to ruin good clothes in these times when "conservation" is our watchword. Under-arm stains not only discolor the materials—and you've undoubtedly noticed how awful these look—but also weaken them.

There are two excellent methods for

protecting yourself and your clothes against the social evils of uncontrolled perspiration. One is to stop the flow of perspiration altogether by using an anti-perspirant; the second is to use a deodorant and sew in shields to protect your clothes. Which method to use is entirely a matter of personal preference. Both are good and both are safe.

It's an outmoded, disproved idea that stopping perspiration under the arms is unhealthful. In fact, we'll quote the *Journal of the American Medical Association*, which states, "No harm comes from stopping perspiration under the arms . . ." There's your assurance that there are enough pores all over your skin to take care of your body temperature without the help of those under your arms. As a matter of fact, it has been shown that the continuous accumulation of perspiration under the arms softens the skin and makes it more susceptible to abrasions and infection.

THESE facts hold true season in and season out. But they assume even greater importance during the warmer months when the temperature is high and your life is a more active one. Then you may find it wise to apply an under-arm protection even several times a day. If you want to be really smart, you'll tuck a small size of the preparation you use into your purse, or keep it secretly in your desk drawer.

Our ladies in civilian-defense activities, who are justly proud of their smart new uniforms, have reason to

WHAT'S COOKING!

By GEORGIA SCOTT

Back Seat For Sugar

THE last great war is still green in the minds of many American women, which is one reason why there was such a frantic rush to the grocery stores a few months back to buy sugar. Women remembered the hardships they endured then trying to cook without sugar, but they failed to take account of the tremendous advances that have been made since then in the food laboratories of the nation. Sugar is no longer the queen of kitchen staples; some recent upstarts, like corn-syrup, molasses and honey have challenged her supremacy.

In many cases these alternatives to sugar have proved themselves more healthful, and recipes which employ them, tastier. Take, for instance, rhubarb, which is in season now but which has been somewhat neglected in the markets because its tartness requires, according to standard recipes, two or three cups of sugar to the pound. You can use honey or corn-syrup successfully for stewed rhubarb, for pie, or whatever way you use it. For stewed rhubarb, in using these liquid sweets, the rhubarb must be allowed to simmer longer so that part of the liquid will evaporate. If you like your rhubarb fairly tart, use 1½ cups of corn-syrup to a pound of rhubarb, 2 cups if you like it fairly sweet. Since honey is sweeter than corn-syrup, you need use only 1 cup of it to the pound of rhubarb. Here's a recipe for rhubarb pie made with corn-syrup:

5 tablespoons flour
¼ teaspoon salt
3 cups diced rhubarb

1 tablespoon butter
Pastry dough
Corn-syrup

Line the pie-pan with pastry dough. Sift flour and salt. Fill your shell with alternate layers of rhubarb and flour mixture. Dot with butter and pour in

corn-syrup (according to how sweet or tart you like your rhubarb as suggested herein). Cover with pastry and bake in a modern oven.

A wholesome trick that women practised during the last war is still a good one, sugar shortage or no. Since dried fruits have a great amount of stored-up, natural sweetness, combine them with tarter fresh fruits, like rhubarb and apricots. Figs and dates, particularly, because of their abundant sweetness, combine well with tart, fresh fruits. Then there are desserts, like turnovers, like brown betties, which can be made with dried fruits which prove just as tasty as when made with fresh or canned fruits. Raisins, too, with all their good, natural sweetness can be used in many desserts. Raisin pie is one of our favorites.

MOST of the major food companies are hard at work now concocting new and brilliant sugarless desserts. General Foods Kitchens have prepared several elegant cake recipes which use corn-syrup instead of sugar. In most cases, your favorite cake recipes can be easily adapted to the liquid substitute; the only thing involved is decreasing the liquid requirement in proportion to the amount of liquid sweet added.

Honey combines especially well with muffins. The All-Bran people offer the following delicious muffin recipe with honey (radio actress Ann Eden, heard on the "Lincoln Highway" program, shows the result above):

- 3 tablespoons shortening
- ¼ cup honey
- 1 egg
- 1-3 cup buttermilk
- 1 cup bran cereal
- 1 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- ¾ teaspoon salt
- ¾ teaspoon soda

Blend shortening and honey. Add egg and beat until creamy. Add milk and bran cereal; let soak until most of moisture is taken up. Sift dry ingredients together; add to first mixture, stirring only until flour disappears. Fill greased muffin-pans two-thirds full and bake in moderately hot oven about twenty-five minutes. This yields eight large muffins and sixteen small muffins.



Why I Hope Lum's Pride Will Win the Derby

they're men, women or children, look to the Kentucky Derby as just about the greatest race in the world.

It isn't just horse-racing. It isn't just another horse-race with a big prize.

It's the Kentucky Derby. And if Lum's Pride can win it I'll gladly change places with him. I'll eat hay in the barn for a year and he can have my place at the table.

Abner and I are from Arkansas, as you may know. And all our lives we've owned and ridden and loved horses, whether they're saddle-ponies, cayuses or thoroughbreds. We've grown up with horses.

And all our lives we've dreamed of some day having a horse in that Kentucky Derby.

And that's why we're leaving the West Coast after our program of Friday, May 1, and flying to Louisville for the race. Maybe Lum's Pride won't have good luck and maybe he won't start. If that happens, I'll swallow the lump in my throat and wait till some other year.

Just the other day I asked Bing Crosby if he thought I should ought to run Lum's Pride. He says I should. Abner says I should.

So, that's how it is. I'm gonna do it, if he is in good condition.

Now about my hopes and later something about my own choices for the race and some of the other entries.

Why do I hope Lum's Pride wins?

I guess it's vanity, or maybe it's because a human likes to see a horse

succeed after overcoming heavy odds.

When Lum's Pride was a little baby he had a hard time learning how to leave a starting-gate. He got himself bumped by other horses a lot and I thought sometimes he'd give it up. But he kept plugging and so did we, and finally he overcame this complex. Today when he gets bumped in a race he runs all the faster to make up the ground he lost. Horses understand those things and I guess that's the real reason we humans love 'em so much.

When he was a two-year-old, Lum's Pride found he didn't have speed to match other horses in short races, but he didn't become discouraged. He was always trying and even at short distances he was always makin' up ground and finishing close.

Ben Jones, who trains Whirlaway and who should know, told me Lum's Pride, with his long stride, would develop as a three-year-old when he got longer races—that he had extreme courage.

Well, Ben is sorta being borne out in his opinion and I really hope I can beat Ben's horses, which he trains for Mr. Warren Wright, in the Derby. If I can't win, I hope Ben can, because he has helped me and my trainer, Sam Secrest, a lot in preparing Lum's Pride for this race.

But I guess the real reason I'm hoping Lum's Pride wins is so he can hold his head high, throw out his chest and swell with pride when people point to him in years to come as the winner of the 1942 Kentucky Derby.

I've seen lots of horses before and after the Kentucky Derby, and winning that race actually makes a horse look and act better. The winners look proud and cocky as though they're

pretty pleased with themselves.

Then I guess, too, I wouldn't be so ashamed if people pointed to me and said: "He owns the Kentucky Derby winner."

That's what I meant when I said vanity enters into it.

Abner says Lum's Pride will run no

worse than third. He thinks Requested is the horse that'll finish on top, with Bless Me second, Lum's Pride third and Sun Again fourth.

But he also insists that with a good break in the luck that day Lum's Pride will win because he's worked out the Derby distance in better time than any of the other candidates.

Personally, I pick Sun Again to win, Alsab to run second, Bless Me to run third and Lum's Pride to run fourth.

Don't say I'm too confident. Maybe I am. Maybe I'm just hoping for fourth.

I'll say this, and I'm not offering it as a preface alibi, that there are more good three-year-olds this year than in any other year I can recollect.

Some Chance won the Belmont Futurity and Sun Again won the Arlington Futurity. Those ain't just little things to crow about. And Colonel Teddy beat Sun Again, Sun Again beat Whirlaway and Lum's Pride has beaten some horses which have beaten the top ones.

If I go on this way I'll have everyone all confused, but I only wanted to point out that anything's possible.

I feel that Lum's Pride will have to improve between now and race-time to win the Derby, but Abner says Lum's Pride is like Challedon, a horse which rises to greatest heights when the competition is toughest over a distance.

He says if Lum's Pride can stay out of trouble he'll be mowing 'em down in the stretch.

There you have it.

I've been too enthusiastic, maybe. Don't let me talk you out of your own opinion, because I'll probably wind up talking myself out of my own beliefs.

But I guarantee one thing: If Lum's Pride WINS that Kentucky Derby on Saturday, May 2, Lum and Abner will go on the air Monday, May 4, with only Abner at the microphone. Lum will be recovering in a hospital from nervous prostration.

And I hope I am.
