

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

Doolittle Tells How He Bombed Tokyo

This unusual document is the speech of America's number one hero, General Jimmy Doolittle, over the Columbia-Pacific Network June 1. The address was made before workers of the giant North American Aviation plant. The broadcast could not be heralded in advance, because Japan probably would be glad to sacrifice the lives of fifty of its spies or fifth columnists to "get" the general! His life is now guarded as closely as is the President's. Jimmy here tells the real lowdown on the bombing of Tokyo.—The Editors.

DON'T tell a soul, but Shangri-La is right here in this North American plant. This is where our B-25 bombers came from.

For military reasons I can't tell you certain things about the flight. I can't tell you where my seventy-nine companions are now, except to say that they are not in Japan and that almost all of them are well and happy and itching for another pass at the Japs.

I can tell you something of the planning—the training—the bombing—the results of the bombing and the airplanes and crews.

The idea of this particular mission was conceived in January. The airplanes were specially prepared in February; the crews given special training in March. Everything went smoothly from the start. Oh, I don't

mean that we didn't have all the minor annoyances that any new and different problem is faced with.

The crews were trained in day and night operation. Training included bombing, gunnery, navigation, and general flying, with particular attention to offensive and defensive action at extremely low altitudes.

We approached our targets in Japan at tree-top altitude and pulled up to 1,500 feet to bomb. Fifteen hundred feet was chosen as the bombing altitude because it was the lowest altitude from which we could bomb and still enjoy comparative safety from our own bomb fragments. Immediately after dropping our bombs we again lowered away to the tree tops. Our high speed, low altitude, and evasive maneuvering made us very elusive targets. This was indicated by the fact that not a single plane was shot down in Japan although they certainly tried—both with fighters in the air and with anti-aircraft and machine-gun fire from the ground.

The targets

bombed were steel works, refineries, oil-tank farms, airplane factories, munitions plants, ammunition dumps, etc.

Care was exercised to avoid hospitals, schools, churches, and even the Imperial Palace.

Due to the intensive training the crews had had, their careful study of its charts and individual target areas, the fact that it was a beautiful clear day and because the bombs were dropped from a low altitude, each crew was readily able to destroy its selected target.

The highly inflammable nature of the conventional Japanese type of construction added materially to the destruction wrought.

The Tokyo radio gave an indication of what was going on. They were broadcasting in English when we struck, telling about the cherry-blossom festival and Japan's freedom from fear of invasion. The program was suddenly interrupted as our bombs landed, and an excited voice, speaking in Japanese, said that

Tokyo was suffering a devastating air attack. The next day a program was broadcast requesting all the Japanese people to pray for rain in order to help put the fires out. Two days later they advised that the fires were finally under control. It was only then that the censored programs came on, advising that little damage had been done except to hospitals and schools, and that nine planes had been shot down. Planes were shot down—possibly nine—but they were not ours.

In conclusion, our bombers—your bombers—functioned magnificently. The crews operated them with consummate skill and conspicuous bravery. The B-25 was selected for this mission because it was the best airplane in America for that particular job. Our planes are the best in the world.

Past wars have been won on the battlefields. This war is being fought not only on the battlefields but in the shop and at the desk. That country or those countries that can produce and man the greatest number of the best warplanes the quickest will win.

And remember it doesn't make a bit of difference whether you are in the cockpit of an airplane or at the bench. If you do your job the best you can, your contribution toward the winning of the war is the same.

Thanks for giving us good airplanes.

Orson Welles Shows You in Movie Made From Tarkington Novel, "The Magnificent Ambersons"

WHEN Booth Tarkington wrote his Pulitzer prize-winning novel, "The Magnificent Ambersons," a quarter-century ago about an era that began in 1873, he probably would have smiled at the mere idea of America's returning to the modes of dress and transportation, which characterized that period, in 1942. Yet the Orson Welles-RKO film scheduled for fall release may portray what can well be in store for a more modern America in the next few years, with the produce of industry being turned into gigantic war-production channels, rather than to civilian use.

Tarkington's Ambersons lived magnificently in an age which saw prancing carriage horses give way to snorting steam and gas buggies. While in America today we are witnessing a forced return to the horse-drawn carriage and bicycle, after years of using private cars and taxicabs. Gas and tire rationing, with no replacement of rubber in sight and no new cars available, are the long shadows that reflect their return in bold strokes.

There's a hint of destiny, too, in the comments of this same Amberson clan as they watch the advent of the automobile, and remark that they don't think they will see many cars next summer because the law will probably prohibit their sale. For war priorities in 1942 have already brought that to pass, and by the summer of 1943, if the war goes on, certainly America will use fewer and fewer private cars on her highways.

Movie-goers, when they see the suits worn by the Amberson men, may smile; but if they really observe them closely they will find a definite resemblance to the Victory suits being made for men at the present time—suits without cuffs, snug fitting, with small lapels, and the coat extending little lower than the center of the hip line. However, American women of today can still laugh at the feminine styles of the Amberson period; for in those days a gal's lingerie filled a good-sized hamper and couldn't be shipped from New York to Hollywood in a No. 10 envelope. Priorities preclude a return to those fashions. Isabel Amberson would probably have swooned at the idea of wearing slacks and shorts that debs of 1942 affect; but, on the other hand, how far would a modern American girl get carrying a parasol, wearing long skirts and a bustle to work in a defense plant or hopping into a plane. Perish the thought!

But don't miss "The Magnificent Ambersons" when it is released, if for nothing else than to see "Henrietta," the veteran tiny horseless steam carriage, born in Dayton, Ohio, just a half-century before her imposingly beautiful descendants were being returned to oblivion for the duration.

Orson Welles has done a magnificent job of recreating Booth Tarkington's America of yesterday, which may return in part tomorrow!



LONELY WOMEN

Last week we met Mary Collins, manager of The Towers, a career woman with a warm heart. We learned what her work meant to her—a chance to enrich the lives of the residents of the women's hotel by giving the establishment—for all its commercial purposes—a touch of the spirit of home.

Now we meet two guests of The Towers. May we introduce Judith Clark and Marillyn Larimore?

MARY COLLINS has come to know during the past few years a young woman whose two rooms, whose home is on the seventh floor of The Towers. During that time she's helped her to convert two cold rooms into a comfortable, charming, colorful, livable home. Miss Collins doesn't know Judith Clark too well, but I rather imagine there's a reason for that . . .

"A very good reason for it. Yes, a very good one. The first year that I lived at The Towers, I made a distinct effort not to make friends with anyone living here . . . or living anywhere else, as a matter of fact.

"There was a reason for that, too. Much as I wanted, needed friendship, companionship, I was afraid. I was afraid of Jean, who lives across the hall . . . of Marillyn, who lives at the end of the corridor. Time and again they've asked me to have dinner with them downstairs in the dining-room . . . to go out somewhere . . . tried to include me when they bought tickets for the theater . . . asked me to go to the movies with them. I was afraid because . . . because women can be hateful, malicious . . . not intentionally so, but that's the way so many of them are; and I was afraid of companionship, of friendship which opens the door to confidences. I was afraid that in an off moment I might say things which could hurt someone that I loved very deeply . . . that I love.

"Miss Collins, she's a pretty grand person. I've often wondered what happened to her in the past. I know she's been hurt—she must have been or she wouldn't understand as she does.

"Well . . . a year and a half ago she told me I was making a great mistake by shutting myself away from people; and it was while she was in here talking with me that my telephone rang. I have a private phone . . . I'm afraid of switchboards. I couldn't tell her, not then . . . I haven't really told her . . . but she knows . . . so does Jean, and Helen . . . that a telephone ring meant my whole life . . . means my whole life. Oh, I wouldn't go out, not even today, anywhere, until I've heard that telephone bell.

"They know it's a man at the other end of the wire, but who it is they don't know. I can't tell them. When I'm away from the city over a week-end . . . those week-ends are becoming fewer . . . I feel . . . I feel that I have so much more than Jean and Marillyn. And when I come back I feel I have so much less.

"Lately I . . . I've felt that I've come to the end of my rope. Oh, don't misunderstand me . . . I've a good job, a very good one. I'm a secretary, and I'm not too unattractive. Three years ago I was very attractive. It would be easy to find someone else. I said 'someone else' . . . but there can't be . . . there can't be a someone else when you know there has been, that there is just one.

Oh, yes, I've got a good job. Hundreds, thousands of women would trade places with me, so they think. The only thing that keeps me going at times . . . oh, you've heard the word, you've used it, you believe in it . . . and only now and then I give up . . . hope. Tomorrow it'll be different. Next week, next year . . . I've got to give him a chance. He promised . . . he's promised so often. Empty promises. I left home because of him. He was the one who suggested that I live here, at The Towers. I wanted to take an apartment of my own, to make a sort of home of it . . . but he said no, it would be

better this way. I'm twenty-seven now . . . and I'm afraid . . . afraid of tomorrow and tomorrow and tomorrow . . . The telephone . . . yes I . . . I've been sitting here . . . waiting for that call."

About six or seven months ago a strikingly dressed young woman in her early twenties registered at The Towers—Miss Marillyn Larimore. A number of the older residents did a little eyebrow-raising, but I rather imagine Marillyn, a natural strawberry blonde, got quite a—shall we say—kick out of raised eyebrows . . .

"Yes, you bet I did. A year and a half ago I found in my line of work that a plain, mousy, uninteresting woman will always raise her eyebrows at a model. That's what I am. I've been modeling in a rather exclusive women's dress-salon.

"I started as a clerk in the sweater section about two years ago. I learned a few things . . . how to wear sweaters . . . and it wasn't too long before I really learned how to dress. I learned a great many things from the expensive women who came to buy expensive clothes. Models aren't always as stupid as they look . . . at least, I'm not . . . and I made up my mind when I left home . . . that was two years ago . . . that I was never going to be as stupid as my mother and my two sisters.

"There were six of us kids. Oh, I'm not from a small town . . . I'm not from the country. I was born on the other side of the tracks . . . the wrong side, for me. I won a few beauty contests when I was a kid . . . that's all I needed to tell me that I had looks. When I finished high school . . . I was the only one of the kids that demanded a high-school education . . . for some reason or other I never could see eye to eye with my family. We just didn't think alike. I didn't understand them and they didn't understand me.

LOVE, that's something I want to keep away from . . . it just doesn't enter into the picture as far as I'm concerned. I want something more than my family has . . . than they were ever able to give me. I want clothes . . . I want a car . . . I want a lovely apartment. Oh, I know I could have all those things now, but I want them my way. I want them with a 'Missus' attached to them. I could never be 'back street.'

"I suppose you're wondering why I'm living at a women's club. That shouldn't be very hard to figure out. Remember I said it would have to be 'Missus.' The Towers is a wonderful front . . . and men, they're so easily fooled. Men want to be fooled. How they hide behind the words respectability, conventionality! Perhaps 'hide' isn't exactly the word. That's what they want . . . respectability. And remember I said it would have to be 'Missus.'

"I wonder what Jack would say, what he'd do if I told him my background . . . where I come from. No, it isn't safe to tell him yet. I met him on a blind date. Jack Crandall, about thirty-eight . . . successful, rather distinguished-looking . . . and he's got money. He's got a wife, too. I've often tried to picture what she looks like. He never talks about her. I've tried to get him to give me some idea of what she's like. I've learned not to be too inquisitive, because I've also learned that I'm treading on dangerous ground when I try to question him. But that's all right. I don't think I'll have to question very much longer. He wants me as much as I want what he has to offer. Oh, yes, The Towers, a women's club, is a very nice front."

MOVIE REVIEW

"The Gay Sisters"

Cast: Barbara Stanwyck, George Brent, Geraldine Fitzgerald, Donald Crisp, Nancy Coleman, Gene Lockhart, Larry Simms, Donald Woods, and introducing Gig Young. Produced for Warner Brothers by Henry Blanche and directed by Irving Rapper, from screen play by Lenore Coffee based upon the novel by Stephen Longstreet.

Type of Picture: A serious, romantic drama, with an entirely new plot-twist involving the truth behind the long-drawn-out litigation over a fabulous New York estate. Barbara Stanwyck, as heiress Fiona Gaylord, is the hold-out; George Brent, as Charles Barclay, is the man she hates—or loves.

This Is the Story: Most closely does the film follow the book, and starting, as it does, with a World War I motivation and jumping to current times, it should enjoy great popularity. Lusitania widower and Major Penn Gaylord goes to France to avenge his wife and leaves little daughter, Fiona, in charge of his half-billion dollar estate and two younger daughters, Evelyn (Miss Fitzgerald) and Susanna (Miss Coleman). He is killed, and the scene jumps to 1941, 23 years later, with the litigation over the estate still continuing. Fiona flames up at the court's stuffiness, charges "that man Barclay" is the cause of all her and her sisters' troubles, and, further chancing a contempt-of-court citation, she dashes with her two sisters from the courtroom. Barclay desires the ground on which the ancestral Gaylord home sits. Inside, it is a shambles of its once proud self. One servant is left; she serves the three "Gay" sisters hamburgers. A mysterious youngster, Austin, chases about the place, but is frightened of his "Aunt Fiona"—whom he respects, nevertheless. It is upon the parentage of Austin that the probation of the estate really hangs, and Fiona knows it, but does not reveal her secret to her sisters until cornered. To tip off the surprise ending would not be fair; go see it and some fine acting, too.

Verdict: "The Gay Sisters" and Barbara Stanwyck are both great. Never saw Stanwyck better, in fact! And young Gig Young, who started his screen career as Byron Barr and Bryant Fleming, is so good that they've decided to hang his future film career on the Gig name from the Longstreet book. Adult.

"Victory Theater" to Present Top Talent for Uncle Sam; Mercer Takes on Mercy Missions; Corwin and Meredith Plan a London Paper for Fliers

WASHINGTON

News on the Washington radio front is hot this week. Much of it stems from the appointment of Elmer Davis as top man in the new Government agency charged with informing the public about the war. The Office of War Information is an admission on the part of the Government that total war is much more than military war; it has been recognized by every thinker and leader that military victories can be made possible by previous victories on the economic and psychological fronts.

Our own Board of Economic Warfare got under way before Pearl Harbor. In those days we called it Eco-

ber him as the man whose five-minute news spots came winging out of CBS' New York studios after the Munich crisis, when this world first throbbed to the beat of war drums. His voice, which was at first improperly focused for microphone work, soon became deft and authoritative. Many an American got the Elmer Davis habit then. When he signed off the other evening he was typically brief and informative. "This is my last broadcast," he said, "for I have been called into Government service."

Listeners will not hear his voice any more, but everything we read about the war, from now on, will bear his impress, because it will be released under a policy of his making.

Under him, we can bring our psychological offensive to the same effective pitch as our military and economic campaigns. What we have lost in our listening, we shall gain in our thinking . . .

Another significant move in Washington is the reported leasing of two short-wave stations by the Coordinator of Information. The CIO is the office charged with throwing American broadcasts to the four winds so that Japanese and Germans and all other peoples can hear the truth about both American and world affairs.

In the past, this was done by private broadcasters who cooperated with the Government. But now the Government itself plans to lease and operate its own stations to supplement privately owned plants. In times of peace, this would have caused a con-

vulsion in the broadcasting industry. Since the beginning, broadcasters have been afraid that the Government would take over broadcasting. Commercial broadcasters, for reasons quite sound in many respects, have fought any degree of Government entry into the broadcasting field.

They may get it willy-nilly. For if the Government finds it necessary to lease and operate stations to reach foreign populations, it is equally possible that it may decide it needs stations to reach the American public. If it does, this writer wants to recall an old editorial published in MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE years ago in which it was suggested that a ring of super-stations might be built. Each would be designed for a different type of program. One would be a continuous newspaper, broadcasting nothing but news and features. Another would be a university of the air, delivering lectures. A third would play only classical or semi-classical music. A fourth would fill the air with dance tunes and popular pieces. In short, every listener could find his taste fulfilled at any moment. The idea is still good.

nomie Defense Board. But our psychological front has been wide open for enemy thrusts. Individual Government departments moved to the attack and some of them did a creditable job.

But all of these, each good enough in its way, did not fit into a master plan, the objective of which was to reach a goal calculated wisely in advance by a master board of strategy. Instead, ours was the rugged American desire to do a good job without waiting to be ordered to do that job.

Newspapers have already approved the appointment of Elmer Davis in almost lyrical terms. They know him as a capable journalist, writer and commentator. Radio listeners remem-

JOHNNY GREEN DIRECTS WORLD PREMIERE OF LATEST COMPOSITION, SUN.

Helen Traubel Guest of "Telephone Hour," NBC, Monday; Werner Josten Conducts New York Philharmonic - Symphony Orchestra, Friday, CBS

THE road to stardom in serious music for a composer doesn't usually start in the milieus or purlieus of jazz. But that road exists. It has been traveled by at least one eminent American, George Gershwin. Others are by way of stepping out on it. There is one young music-maker, however, who has already done considerable traveling along that road. We mean Johnny Green, who began his creative career with the writing of popular music.

Johnny Green—he hates to be called John W. Green, because it sounds "so stuffy"—appears on the Columbia Broadcasting Symphony program through his latest composition, "Music for Elizabeth," a fantasia for piano and orchestra, which is dedicated to his wife.

"Lots of people call it a concerto," Mr. Green told us in one of the New York studios of CBS recently, "but I think they're wrong. For one thing, it hasn't that concerto feel, if you know what I mean, and for another, it isn't strictly in concerto form." All of which makes his case, no doubt.

There had been a period of inactivity in the life of Johnny Green, composer, necessitated, he avers, by good old economic determinism. There is a wife to support, and a child, and no modern creative writer can afford to play the game of genius sans livelihood. Mrs. Green, incidentally, is

Betty Furness, the gifted young actress, who is at present in Hollywood.

It was the wife who complained of her husband's creative vacuum and, hence, the fantasia dedicated to her.

Mr. Green had a recorded two-piano reduction of his score. He played it for us. From what we could gather, since two pianos don't altogether sound like piano and orchestra, it is a well-knit composition. It has lift and pace and boasts a good share of telling inner relationships. Of course, the orchestral version may sound totally different, but we have our doubts. Mr. Green, we think, has hit on an idea, and, what's more, he seems to have something to say.

Young Mr. Green has already won the country to his songs. There have been "Body and Soul," "I Cover the Waterfront," "Out of Nowhere," and others, each considered by experts in such matters as sterling examples of the popular song genre. But then there have also been his more serious essays, such as "Poem," also for piano and orchestra, and "Night Club Suite."

Anyway, we can report that he is now serving as conductor of the new Broadway musical, "By Jupiter," and that a musical comedy with a score by him is soon to make its bow. Recording dates and radio programs take up the slack, if such there be. And while we're at it, we may as well mention that he will conduct his new composition at its world premiere, making a guest appearance on that occasion.

("Music for Elizabeth," by Johnny Green, will be performed by Vera Brodsky, pianist, and the Columbia Broadcasting Symphony, Mr. Green conducting, Sunday. Bernard Herrmann conducts the rest of the program.)

A Dramatic Challenge

The ladies of song, as well as the men, aren't at all loath to try their mettle on a good, meaty aria from an opera once in a while, even if said ladies are recital-bound. One of the pieces which is often thus employed is "Voi Lo Sapete" from Mascagni's "Cavalleria Rusticana." It won't do for a light soprano to sing this item, because it calls for a voice of heroic scope.

Mascagni is best known for this one-act tragic work, which is often coupled in presentation with Leoncavallo's "Pagliacci." Like the latter, "Cavalleria" offers a gory tale of love and hate. Its locale is a Sicilian village and, one supposes, rustic chivalry (which is the translation of title) is as much given to stringent rules and regulations as, perhaps, the sophisticated kind, which goes in for fancier frills.

The code of the "Cavalleria" villagers calls for a set-to with carving-knives or something such. The hero, philanderer that he is, comes off second best and it serves him right. For not only has he seduced Lola, the wife of his conqueror, but he had previously performed the same little office for the heroine, Santuzza.

She sings her woes to the hero's mother in "Voi Lo Sapete," and if ever words and notes have been wedded together in pitiful heartbreak, these are they.

Shakespeare & Co.

Coriolanus, tragic Roman patrician, was immortalized by Shakespeare. Beethoven wrote a "Coriolanus" overture, which is said not to be connected with Shakespeare's play but with a drama by Heinrich Josef von Collin, a contemporary of the composer's. Beethoven, however, knew of Shakespeare's character and of Plutarch's. We are told, though, a rather wordy treatise by Richard Wagner finds Beethoven's motivation all from the Shakespearean side. Strangely enough, the composer dedicated his overture to Collin, which proves anything or nothing, apparently. We have Donald Tovey's opinion that "Both plot and denouement (of Collin's drama) are eminently un-Shakespearean, but even Collin, as well as Beethoven, had read Shakespeare, who breaks through like nature in Beethoven's music." Whether all the foregoing proves a thing, we have no idea. What seems to matter is the fact that we do have whatever gods of chance or inconsistency to thank for the "Coriolanus" Overture.

MARCIA NEIL is a newcomer to radio. Not long ago she arrived in New York, burning with ambition—as who doesn't?—to crash the sacred precincts of the big-time, radio, theater, what have you? She has finally crashed through and now you can hear her with the "Swing Fourteen" on the Philip Morris NBC show. Ray Block, conductor and her discoverer, predicts great things for her.

While still in high school she entered and won prize No. 1 in a state-wide piano-playing contest, topping, if you please, Robert Yost, who is now a faculty member at Eastman School of Music. She entered Duchesne College, Omaha, upon completion of high school.

In the meantime, she studied voice. After two years spent at Duchesne, she matriculated at the Hastings Conservatory of Music, whence she was graduated with honors. After doing some teaching, some singing—all for a living—she made the momentous decision that brought her to New York.

Miss Neil obtained work in the RCA television exhibit at the World's Fair. Then she became a salesgirl at a Fifth Avenue hosiery shop. With her savings she moved to Miami, Fla., where she secured a position on radio station WQAM. A brief period there and she returned to New York, where, at last, she met her guide, philosopher and friend, Ray Block. She was placed with the "Swing Fourteen," doing solo work almost from the start.

Miss Neil looks more like a "coloratura" than like a swing singer. She has done both, so you can never tell.

PICTURES AND SOUND CAN BE SENT AT THE SAME TIME BY FM STATIONS

Newspapers, Illustrations, Charts and Maps Will Use Same Channels as Sound; "High-Fidelity" Versus "Full-Fidelity"

FM of Tomorrow

ALTHOUGH one aspect of FM transmission has been known for years—and frequently discussed as well as tested—little in the way of practical application has yet been made of it. This is the capability of FM to transmit, simultaneously, a program that you can hear over your loudspeaker and a page of printed or pictorial matter that is reproduced on a "facsimile printer."

The two transmissions, even though made from the same FM station and on the same radio channel, do not interfere with each other. FM engineers call it "multiplex" and, for the radio listener of the future, it holds some fascinating possibilities.

First, we should explain more fully just what radio "facsimile" is. Undoubtedly you have seen in your newspapers late war photos that were sent by radio from Moscow or London or Australia. This was made possible by a process of facsimile. The original picture—thousands of miles away—is scanned by a tiny beam of light that swings back and forth over its surface, making at least one hundred trips per inch as it creeps down the photograph. This minute speck of light, which eventually falls on every single spot in the picture, is sensitive to white and black as it moves along, translating these degrees of shade (which make up any photograph) into electrical impulses that are sent by short-wave radio to the United States. Another device here—called a facsimile printer—is operated by the radio signal being received and reverses the process so that an almost identical picture is reproduced.

The printer reconstructs the picture with the same number of lines per inch, but these are so close together that your eye can't detect individual lines in the finished product.

Your Future Radio

The radio listener of tomorrow is very likely to have FM facsimile in his home as a commonplace service. He may own a special receiver designed to take advantage of the fact that FM can broadcast both regular programs and facsimile at the same time. Let's suppose, for example, that an international commentator is talking over FM in those post-war days to come, and that he's discussing the newly formed United States of China. While he speaks, and his voice comes from the loudspeaker with typical FM clarity, another part of the receiver is busy reproducing a map of the United States of China. "Now," says the commentator, "if you will glance at the map we have just sent you by radio facsimile, you will see the results of the new boundary agreements between Suiyan and Shansi."

In the Mail Bag

Recent letters from readers of MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE indicate a lively interest in many aspects of frequency-modulation broadcasting. Some of the typical inquiries cover points that may well have also puzzled other readers.

A man in Illinois writes to ask: "Just what is meant by the term high-fidelity? Is it different in any way from full-fidelity, which you often use to describe FM?"

So-called "high-fidelity" is a very nebulous and inexact expression. Acoustical engineers have employed it for many years without ever bothering to define its limits in terms of tone-pitch or—to use the engineers' accepted yardstick—cycles per second.

"High-fidelity" once meant anything that had a greater tonal range than average. The first radio receivers sold back in the early 20's were quite limited in reproduction, so that high and low notes sounded badly chopped off—as they really were. Then, as new sets came along which could reproduce on their loudspeakers a fuller tone range, the term "high-fidelity" began to enter the picture. Of course, what we might have called a high-fidelity receiver in 1930 would be considered rather mediocre today.

FM has long felt that "full-fidelity" is a more apt description than "high-fidelity," because it plainly implies that the entire range of tone is being reproduced. The normal human ear can detect all tones from a very bass rumble of thirty cycles up to the extremely thin and airy squeak of 15,000 cycles. FM's full-fidelity capabilities make it possible to reproduce this entire scale and—contrary to popular belief—many important instruments in any orchestra have harmonics and rich overtones occurring in the extreme treble register.

Corregidor Heroines Escape Fall of the Fortress; "Hams" to Be Organized to Aid Civilian Defense With Two-Way Communications

Free Italy Speaks

THAT the spirit of freedom in Italy is not dead; that all men in that country are not tools of Nazism is clearly demonstrated in a letter from a listener in Italy that the Columbia Broadcasting System received recently.

It was date-lined "Milan, April, 1942," but the envelope which contained the letter was postmarked Brissone, city in the Swiss canton of Ticino, just across the Italian frontier. The letter evidently was smuggled over the border and mailed by anti-Nazi friends in Switzerland. It was anonymous "for obvious reasons" and was written by a cultured person.

Text of the English translation of the letter follows:

"The writer of this letter is an Italian who listens whenever disturbances do not prevent him from doing so to your words which come through the air. I send you greetings also in the name of many, many other listeners.

"The Italians who are still worthy of the name—that is, those who know the values of life, who appreciate noble feelings and despise baseness—find in you a support and a sure guide.

"Do not fail to understand the soul of so many of your brothers who are living in slavery, who are the objects of violence on the part of the traitors to our fatherland and of the contempt of those who tread upon our dear country.

"In Italy there is no Fascism (which disappeared long ago, provided it did exist at any time). But there IS Nazism—harmful, destructive of all our ideals of religion, family and country.

"We cannot do anything in the face of such a disaster. We are not cowards; we are unarmed. We have more and more confidence in your assistance, and we are sure that you will do your best to help us out of all the dangers which threaten us.

"Please go on broadcasting your words of truth. Here truth has become a myth.

"Long live the free people! I hope I will be able to have this letter reach you. God help us!

"Best wishes and thanks to you and the whole American people. Long live liberty! For obvious reasons I cannot sign; my letter might be intercepted. My grateful regards."

* * *

CBS international broadcasts seem to have hit the target in Germany as well as in Italy; have drawn the hatred and perhaps fear of Nazi spokesmen, including Berlin short-wave stations' "Paul Revere," alias the American traitor, Douglas Chandler. He has been screaming that CBS is transmitting "monstrous lies" to the whole globe via WCBX. He charged that CBS (1) told the world that thousands of planes raided German munitions cen-

ters, and (2) added that the Allies' naval forces are getting under control the Axis submarine menace in the Atlantic. These two items win the blue-ribbon prize for lies he says and offend the scruples of honest men like Adolf. He even threatens to come to New York and slug Edmund A. Chester, CBS director of short-wave broadcasting, in person.

Cheers for Corregidor Nurses

A contingent of American nurses, escaped from Corregidor just a few hours before its capture, are now in northern Australia on their way to Melbourne and Sydney. These nurses spoke over the Australian short-wave radio the other morning. Fresh from the horrors of the merciless bombing of Manila by the Japs, these nurses went to Bataan and opened two hospitals under gravest of handicaps. There were no buildings or even tents to start with. One hundred fifty to two hundred soldiers with open wounds were treated daily. Their principal diet of food was caribou stew and fish. One hospital was bombed twice. Together with soldiers fortunate

enough to escape, the nurses got away from Bataan just three hours before it was overrun by the Nipponese. One bunch traveled to the docks in a garbage-truck. While they waited for some sort of boat to take them to Corregidor, Jap bombers flew over and tried to bomb them.

After a thrilling dash by rowboats, mosquito boats, planes and ships the little group of brave nurses left the hell of Corregidor far behind. They now lie in the hot tropical sun of northern Australia, playing cards, smoking and chatting, all ready for duty in whatever danger zone or under whatever conditions necessity may next dictate. Three cheers for the nurses of Bataan and Corregidor!

Personalities in Short-Wave

Mighty considerate of busy movie and radio star Bob Burns to volun-

tarily take it upon himself to record all "personal messages" from American soldiers in prison camps in Japan, broadcast in Tokyo's short-wave transmissions to North America, and then mail these little recordings to the loved ones to whom these messages are directed . . . NBC's former correspondent in Roumania, Frank E. Stevens, recently arrived home, states that in passing through European countries on his way out he saw fear and dismay. In France, people begged for an A. E. F. invasion. "Each dough-boy must bring an extra gun. Ask each one to bring a gun for us," they told Stevens . . . Richard Tennyly, NBC Tokyo correspondent interned in Japan since the outbreak of war, is expected to arrive at New York on August 17 in an exchange of American and Japanese nationals. No word has been forthcoming from Edward Hart MacKay, former Shanghai correspondent, and Bert Silen, stationed at Manila.

War Emergency Radio Service

It was inevitable that skilled amateur radio operators, who have been off the air since our entry into the war, should sooner or later be called upon to play a part in the war effort. Two-way radio communication in air-raid emergencies, employing the skill of civilian technicians, including radio amateurs, has been envisaged by the Office of Civilian Defense and the Federal Communications Commission in its new War Emergency Radio Service, which provides for the use of "Civilian Defense" stations.

Thousands of compact radio stations to be constructed and operated under prescribed restrictions largely by persons who have had amateur radio experience are expected to augment the services of OCD.

News About the Stations

Australia's transmission to eastern North America has now become a full hour feature, being broadcast daily from 1:25 to 2:25 p.m. EWT over VLG2 (9.54). In addition to the popular feature, "American Soldiers Calling Home," broadcast at 1:37 p.m., leading network correspondents, including Fred Cuhel, Martin Agronsky and Sydney Albright, give commentaries regularly near 2:00 or 2:05 p.m. EWT . . . Australia's program for Great Britain, broadcast nightly from 8:55 to 9:25 a.m. EWT over VLG6 (15.23) and VLQ6 (9.58), is being heard with good signal strength by many West Coast listeners . . . Hsinking, Manchukuo's new short-wave feature, the broadcasting of personal messages from British and American subjects interned in that country, may now be heard daily at 8:00 and 8:45 a.m. over MTCY (11.775) and at 3:30 and 4:45 p.m. EWT over MTCY (9.545).

The Trend Toward "Bounce"

The three B's of modern music—barrel-house, boogie-woogie and blues—bid fair to become five B's, according to Jane Froman.

The beautiful songstress, who returns to radio for a series starting July 5, over CBS, predicts that two more B's, bounce and ballads, will be the big thing this summer.

Most of the time in recent months, she points out, the No. 1 song had rhythm and No. 2 was a ballad, and that is likely to remain the musical situation any week in the coming hot season.

Musical experts agree that the war calls for songs of certain types, and unquestionably it has had its effect in keeping bouncy rhythm tunes and ballads high in public favor. "Don't Sit Under the Apple Tree" is a good example of the former type, tying in with the current situation of a soldier and his girl, while in the ballad field, "Johnny Doughboy Found a Rose in Ireland" takes cognizance of the war, too.

For every rhythm tune there must be a ballad, she says, for a welcome change of pace, so the songstress will turn willingly from the gay "One Dozen Roses" to herald, in true real-estate-allotment fashion, the values of "Sleepy Lagoon." Her prediction is borne out by the fact that many of the orchestras that heretofore featured only trumpets, saxophones and trombones are now adding violins. That would certainly indicate that ballads will be right up there in the foreground with the bounce numbers.

Miss Froman points out that there is now a dearth of real "torch" songs, the broken-hearted lament having currently given way to ballads of remembrance of the happy days and way from the lyric agony of the "torch" ballad in its sharpest definition. The true "torch" tells of an unhappy heart vowing undying (and generally, unrequited) love and, she believes, is the type of popular song that touches the hearts of the greatest number of listeners.

With everybody endeavoring to keep a "stiff upper lip" in face of the war, the effect is visible in song lyrics and in many of the melodies, too, Jane observes, and there isn't a new number right now that fits the description of "torch song" for a girl to sing. There are only semi-torchy ballads, which will have to do till a real torch song comes along.

But if Jane had her way, she'd ask the songsmiths for one thing: "Make me a present of a good torch song!"



A well-planned dinner meal alone is not enough. A nourishing diet, three times a day, and 'tween times, is! Lunch-boxes for the little ones on their way to school or that man of yours on his way to work must include leafy green or yellow vegetables, fruits and salad greens. Eggs, lean meats, poultry or fish, enriched or whole-grain products, fats and sweets are other food essentials. And a regular water-drinking habit . . . six or more glasses a day . . . should definitely be encouraged.

If your imagination is stymied and you're in the market for some tempting suggestions, hot Cornish pasties, recommended by the *Herald Tribune* Home Institute, should prove an unqualified success.

The coal-miners' streamlined one-course meal, these meat and vegetable turnovers pack a terrific energy and nourishment wallop—food "naturals" for men fighting the war from the factory front.

An English housewife's invention, pasties are wrapped in wax paper while hot, placed in a tea towel and packed into a tight-lidded dinner-pail where they'll keep warm for several hours.

Two that Dad and the children will be proud to pass around and claim as your very own recipes have the added advantage of being extremely economical as well as tasty and nourishing. They are equally happy selections for the war-worker's dinner-pail and for a family picnic. Here are the simple, easy-to-follow recipes:

Baked Stuffed Loaf

- 1 loaf bread, unsliced
- ¼ cup butter
- 1 cup canned condensed mushroom soup
- 3 cups cooked lamb, ground
- 1½ cups soft bread crumbs
- 1 tablespoon grated onion
- 1 cup leftover vegetables (peas, carrots, etc.)
- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- Salt
- Pepper

Remove all crusts from bread. Cut a lengthwise slice from top, one-half inch thick. Scoop out inside of loaf, leaving an edge of one inch at sides and bottom. Reserve crumbs for filling. Spread outside of loaf on all sides with softened butter. Prepare following mixture: Combine soup, lamb, bread crumbs, onion and vegetables. Cook together about ten minutes. Add eggs, reserving two tablespoons for later use. Cook five minutes longer, stirring constantly. Fill loaf with mixture, moisten top edge with egg, replace cover. Place on a greased baking-dish and bake in a hot oven (400 degrees F.) about thirty minutes, or until nicely browned. Approximate yield: six to eight portions.

Picnic Buns

- 12 round rolls
- 1½ pounds hamburger
- 1 cup hot water
- 1 scallion or 1 small onion, finely chopped
- ½ teaspoon salt
- Dash of pepper
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire
- ½ teaspoon dry mustard
- Melted butter

Cut a small slit in side of roll. Scrape out crumbs with fork. Add crumbs to meat. Place in skillet. Add boiling water and stir well with fork. Add seasonings and cook over moderate heat fifteen minutes, stirring to prevent lumping of meat. Brush inside of rolls with butter. Fill with meat mixture. Wrap in wax paper to keep it fresh. Approximate yield: six portions.

HOW TO PACK A LUNCH-PAIL

THE right food builds and repairs your body . . . keeps it in good running order . . . gives you energy for work and play . . . helps prolong your prime of life and is a basis for good health. I've said it before . . . I'll say it again! It's one subject that deserves "broken record" repetition.

I wrote of "food to keep you fit" and the ill effects of "hidden hunger" in MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE's issue of June 20 to June 26, emphasizing the importance of a properly balanced food diet. And now, to be more specific, suggestions for regenerating that "human dynamo"—the industrial worker—are certainly in order.

Because the increased tempo of war production is resulting in severe strain on the physical and nervous systems of American workers, nourishing, energy-building foods are vital to our personal health and ultimate national defense. Recommendations from Paul V. McNutt, Federal Security Administrator, have already been received by industrial organizations throughout the country demanding that nutritious

meals be made available to workers at reasonable prices. The practise of serving food between meals is highly recommended as well. And 'tween-meal pick-ups of milk, fruit, vegetable juices and crackers admittedly pay the highest dividends in national war production.

The British Ministry of Labor recently ordered the establishment of canteens for nutritious low-cost meals in all plants employing 250 or more workers. And by their own experience, an improvement in workman diets brought increased output of war materials without any conscious increase in effort, PLUS a notable decrease in industrial accidents.

Longer working hours, speed-ups, insufficient rest, extremities of work-enforced temperatures, and a lack of recreation result in increased energy consumption—the actual reason your body's nutrition requirements have gone up. And since few production plants are currently outfitted with worker cafeterias, the "what's within" the lunch-pail is of national importance.
