PLEA FOR A MESSAGE

Movie-Radio Guide Directs This to All Red Cross Army Nurses Who Escaped From Bataan or Corregidor

AMONG the many letters that came to the editors of Movie-Radio Guide last week was a simple plea for news of a loved one. Because we had no direct way of granting that request, we are printing it in the hope that some Red Cross nurse who escaped from beleaguered Bataan or Corregidor may read it, and be able to give this sister a message about her brother, Staff Sergeant George W. Wagner. Yes, we know that the chance is a slim one; but even in this chaotic world, we still believe in small miracles. And certainly nothing can shake our stout faith in those courageous nurses. We know they will, if they can, answer this sister's plea. Here is the letter:

Richmond, Ky.

Dear Editor:

This will seem to you, no doubt, a strange letter, but strange things occur in war-time.

In the issue of your publication for the week of July 4-10, I noticed an item on the short-wave page concerning some nurses who escaped from Bataan. This greatly interested me, for I had a brother who was on duty in one of the hospitals there, he having been previously on duty at Sternberg General Hospital in Manila. He was Staff Sergeant Gerald W. Wagner. We are from Rapid City, South Dakota, but are here in Kentucky on a defense project.

We've had no word from Gerald since February 25, and a letter from the War Department to my mother shed no light either. So I am wondering if any of those

nurses who escaped could be contacted, and perhaps they could tell us the date they last saw him (if they did) and how he was. We ask no more—just to know how he was is more than we can dare to hope for. If you are able to do this, would you, for us, please? All we ask is when they last saw him, and how he was. Oh, if you could only do this, how grateful we would be.

If you are unable to help, we will understand, but we hope and pray for the best. I do hope it can be done.

Of course we have no way of knowing whether this letter will be read by any of those fortunate nurses who succeeded in escaping from the Philippines or not. So we ask that if any readers of Movie-Radio Guide happen to know one of these nurses that they contact her. Should there be any message, it can be sent direct to Mrs. Wild at the address given on this page, or if mailed to us at 731 Plymouth Court, Chicago, Ill., we will see that it is forwarded to her at once. For like millions of others

we know what it means to get a message about a loved one in our armed forces.

Singing Secrets

Tailor-Made Tunes Are Slanted to Individual Needs of Song Stars

HOLLYWOOD song-writers are the custom tailors of the music business. Their songs are made to order—and to fit the requirements of individual stars. You may not realize it, but each time your favorite screen singer starts tossing notes around he is handling a song written especially for him.

Screen singers are specialists. Each has some strong points—and most of them have serious weaknesses. Unless the composer keeps these special factors in mind, he finds himself with the right song for the wrong singer—and no cash in his pockets. Even the lyric-writers must, in many cases, slant their work to the screen personality, or "character," of the performer.

I've been writing songs for Hollywood stars for a long time, and I've come to know many of their odd traits and special needs. It may interest you to learn about these and then notice, when you see your next musical, how patly every number covers each star's special traits. Some of the traits are not common to any other vocalist.

Songs for Dorothy Lamour are serious problems. But they are problems well worth solving, for Dorothy has a knack of putting her numbers—if properly slanted to her—in the “hit” class. Incidentally, she also has fine judgment and a real intuition for the “hit” possibilities in a song. I profited handsomely from her intuition when she spotted “Moon of Manakoora.” Dorothy begged for a chance to record it, and you all know it because of her presentation.

Dorothy sings best with open sounds. She has a short range, and her songs must be written in one octave to allow for this. Otherwise there will be signs of strain on her face or neck as she struggles for high notes. Dottie’s known for her languid beauty, and the songwriter must help make her lovely while singing. Dreamy tunes with many “oohs” and “ahs” help keep her face in charming repose before the cameras. When Dottie goes on the radio, her looks aren’t important, so she can sing songs that are fast and furious.

Mary Martin needs songs that call for plenty of facial expression. They must be light and gay, for that is Mary’s character. Mary can put over a song pictorially, and with this in mind I gave her “Kiss the Boys Goodbye.”

Mary acts with her face while singing, but Betty Hutton acts with everything. She is at her best when she’s jumping around wildly, so I give her songs suited to such rampaging. I enjoy these assignments, for such songs are fun to write.

Bing Crosby is something else again. He has the best music mind in Hollywood. He can handle almost any song and do it well, so the writer has a free hand. Incidentally, Bing has the most amazing musical memory I’ve ever known. Give him a new song, and he’s ready to record it three minutes later.

Frederick Hollander and I wrote “See What the Boys in the Back


MENACE With a Future

PARAMOUNT Studio officials struck gold when they were looking for a young man to play the role of a cold-blooded killer in "This Gun For Hire," and cast Alan Ladd to do the part. Now the Ladd's set with a long-term contract, and the studio is making big plans for his future. That reads like an easy success story, doesn't it? But back of it is a ten-year stretch of hard work, disappointment and failure, plus near starvation, before Ladd got the break that's making him a box-office sensation in theaters today. Like another young man, named Tyrone Power, Alan was dropped at Universal after four months of training for movies. A year on a small newspaper came next, then two more as an unskilled laborer in a studio. Next came a year at a reputable school of acting, but no job. Alan's pockets and stomach were both empty when he finally landed in radio, where he did 15 to 20 shows a week, playing roles that called for men of 80 and boys of 18. This developed a fine speaking voice that caught the ear of listener Sue Carol, actor's agent, who signed him as a client. But two more years elapsed before Ladd finally landed in the role that is skyrocketing him to stardom!



Here! Here! Mr. Wyler! William Wyler, who directed M-G-M's "Mrs. Miniver," hailed as the picture of the year, wrote a stirring prelude to the production before he left Hollywood to join the U. S. 

PETRILLO HEADS FOR TROUBLE . . . GENE AUTRY JOINS THE ARMY AIR FORCE

Cal Tinney Blunders Badly; Rudy Vallee's Press Agency Clicks in a Big Way; Pert Kelton Takes M. C. Job on "Dough Re Mi" Quiz Show

The American Federation of Musicians is a hearty mouthful and as remote from most of our lives as the moon, or so most of us believe. Actually it controls a great deal of our listening pleasure and it controls it with a horny-handed absolutism which has given more than one broadcaster the jitters.

Quite a few years ago James Petrillo, a cornet-player with muscles and nerve, decided that musicians weren't getting a decent break. Probably he was right. So he formed a union, or perhaps he took an old union and put teeth in its mouth. In his own way, he presently made it undesirable for any musician to attempt to play in Chicago without holding a union card, at the same time persuading employers that hiring musicians who were not union members was an unhealthy proceeding. In time, he found himself at the head of probably the strongest union in America, one affecting our lives wherever we come in contact with motion pictures, hotels, radio, or any commercial use of music.

But today Jimmy Petrillo is in trouble, and the bullet-proof car in which he formerly drove about Chicago will not protect him. For he and the American Federation of Musicians have bitten off a mouthful.

They decided, some weeks ago, that to make a phonograph record which can be played on a radio station or in a juke-box is to cheat some musician out of a job. In short, if the phonograph record did not exist, they rea-

soned, the radio station or the tavern owner would be forced to employ a real musician.

It is probably commendable to create more work for one's friends and fellow lodge members, but virtue becomes a vice when the effort puts reputable business in jeopardy and violates long-accepted practises. It is my guess that half the radio stations in America would be forged to the wall if they could not play phonograph records. Worse than that, a recent

AFM edict forced the banning, it is alleged, of the National High School Orchestra, which has played for ten years from Interlochen, Michigan.

Well, the Department of Justice here in Washington is said to have quite a dossier on Jimmy Petrillo, the little czar of the music union, and it is an accepted fact that the Department of Justice—or the D. of J., as we call it—is a tough outfit, a lot tougher than even Mr. Petrillo was during his Chicago days . . .

Records for Our Fighting Men is the name of a national drive to salvage old phonograph records. Not for the music, which is ancient and wheezy, but for that precious war-scarce substance known as shellac. Perhaps you have heard some of the pleas for your old records over the air. The response thus far is grand. Cleveland, for instance, picked up 375,000 records in no time at all. The goal is enough records to produce \$1,000,000 in cash, or 38,000,000 separate platters. These records will be sold to various big record companies which have agreed to purchase them so that they can extract the shellac, and all proceeds will go into the million-dollar fund for new music for our fighting men . . .

Abbott and Costello have announced that they will make a personal-appearance tour and contribute all their salaries to Army Emergency Relief. AER officials, who know how badly our soldier families need the money, hope it is true . . .

Recently two Mutual newscasters told two conflicting stories. Cal Tin-

ney exploded one night with a tirade about the Army Post Exchange system, which he declared was piling up profits which were used to throw parties for officers. A night or so later, Fulton Lewis praised the Army Post Exchange system without reservation.

Actually an Army PX is a general store run by the soldiers at a post, where merchandise can be bought at the lowest possible price. I know Fulton Lewis to be a great reporter and a man who is not satisfied with putting news on the air until he has investigated its authenticity. I know Cal Tinney to be a former small-town editor and columnist and a once-upon-a-time radio comedian and master of ceremonies. Without listening twice, I accepted the Lewis version. The PX is an almost sacred trust and every officer so considers it. Soldiers themselves proclaim this. We don't know Mr. Tinney's motive in blasting the officer corps of the Army.

SHOSTAKOVICH USES "BOLERO" DEVICE IN CELEBRATED "SEVENTH SYMPHONY"

Victor Releases Glenn Miller Version of "Serenade in Blue"; Columbia Records Danny Kaye Specialties; Decca Presents Hoagy Carmichael Album

romantic history of the work's inspiration—a work born out of the heart of battle, out of the courage and the suffering of a fighting Russian people during the siege of its great city, Leningrad. These things have struck us with immense force. They might be expected to exert an influence on a listener's reception of the music—as music.

While we must admire the fortitude of the Russians; while we must shrink with horror from the Nazi blitz treatment of non-military citizens, the aged and the infirm, and the women and the children who participated in one of the world's titanic struggles, one question stands clear above all else—What is the worth of this music that owes its existence to those very circumstances?

A work like the Seventh Symphony by such a composer as Shostakovich is not to be dismissed with a convenient "I like it" or a just as convenient "I don't like it." Shostakovich has shown before that he can compose music which has an immediate effect on its hearers. So it is here. The Seventh Symphony is huge in proportions and parts of it make that sort of effect.

Magnificence rides an appreciable length of the first movement, which possesses whole pages of an eerie, barbaric beauty. Its themes are of a most interesting invention and all of them carry the hallmark—Russian folk. In presenting his material Shostakovich has found it necessary to call upon a device that was shrewdly exploited by Ravel in his "Bolero." The French composer took a theme and he caused it to pass through innumerable repetitions, each successive one more ornate than the preceding in point of instrumental colors. He achieved his design, which was to hypnotize the listener with the semblance of a repetition that corresponds to the cumulative intensification of a central idea. Suddenly the chord changes to the minor, and the total effect is stunning. We recognize

that as the Ravel technique.

Generally speaking, Shostakovich seems to have had a like aim. However, he has been exceedingly more ornate about it. He has thrown himself into the writing with the full force of his craftsmanship. He has maneuvered into the scheme a wealth of rhythms which play against each other with an astonishing adroitness. He has further added to the idea of thematic repetition with many complicated changes of harmony, which, with the contrasting dynamics, bring the picture to the size of a panoramic canvas.

But while some of the music in the first movement makes its sweeping effects, there is a good deal of it that seems commonplace. He seems to have been too charged with his feelings to bother with being selective—properly selective. I could not escape the feeling that Shostakovich worked in a particular hurry; that he had so much to say that it must be said at all costs. Hence, the wide difference in musical values between sections of the movement.

The drums beat their insistent figure, as the music grows louder and louder. There is something like a twelve-minute crescendo, which in itself is hair-raising. Shostakovich was driving relentlessly to tell his tale, and he resorted to every argument he could think of, heading tangentially into alien fields as he argued, much in the fashion of an emotional speaker who pours into a discussion every part of his thinking self, even rationalizing, even grasping at distantly related ideas, in order to make his point.

A neat block of the first movement could be chopped right off to its con-

siderable improvement. In his fervor Shostakovich has at times confronted so many things with so many others that it all makes much too much to grasp. It results in unclear, brooding-nagian sound—and this I noticed particularly, with all that Arturo Toscanini was conducting.

The composer shows a master hand at the construction of certain sequences of his symphony. Regrettably this is not the case with respect to the whole. All in all, keeping firmly in mind the fact that repeated hearings might bring about a change in one's opinions, I believe that fifty or sixty percent of the symphony represents Shostakovich as we more or less know him—a composer of fine moments and just as many trivial ones. The other fifty or forty percent is just plain bunk, over-exaggerated, meaningless, blabbering bunk.

These may be hard words, but they come from one who was ready to worship even before listening, from one who tried awfully hard to divorce the romantic and dramatic situations surrounding the work's composing from the consideration of the music per se. In so far as I am concerned, there is the Shostakovich of the Fifth Symphony and of the slow movement of the First and of the numberless pages scattered throughout his other opera that are touched with genius. This Shostakovich of the Seventh is an altogether different voice, a voice that is louder and longer and less persuasive musically, despite its many attractive manifestations.

D'Artega: He went far beyond that first step

TO MAKE the grade in radio does not mean to be engaged for one series of programs. That is only the beginning. But having accomplished that much, it is up to performers to be re-engaged again and again. That only happens when performers have something that the

public wants. So it is with bands. For instance, the past three years have seen many of these organizations get as far as the first step only to drop suddenly out of things.

One of the bandleaders who has gone much beyond that first step is D'Artega, who points proudly to having appeared on seven networks in three years. Some time back D'Artega landed the summer-replacement series for Jack Benny's "Jello" program. Until that point he had been conductor for Eddie Cantor and Olsen and Johnson productions, as well as arranger for the Kostelanetz, Whiteman and Al Goodman orchestras.

In quick succession D'Artega followed his success on the "Jello" show with such radio presentations as "Admiration," "Enna Jettick Melodies," the "Rinso Vaudeville Theater," the "Hit Parade," the "Believe It or Not," and "Pan American Holiday." He is currently connected with the latter.

D'Artega is thirty-two years of age, plays piano, accordion and saxophone expertly, flute and guitar less so. He is at present devoting a considerable part of his time to conducting symphonic programs, and he has already directed the orchestras of Buffalo, St. Louis, New Jersey and the NYA.

He is far from forsaking popular music, but he feels that all musicians should be versed in all types to understand their own specialties well.

Thousands of letters have been received by KGEI from American servicemen across the Pacific, thanking them for the short-wave broadcasts. From a soldier in New Caledonia: "I am a U. S. soldier in service on the island of New Caledonia, and am taking this opportunity to write you a letter of appreciation. I am writing also for the rest of the men in my company . . . Your programs are certainly worth while, and I'm sure morale-lifting. You can depend upon us over here to support you in any way we can. "Keep 'Em Coming." From an officer "somewhere in the southwest

Pacific": "Through a hook-up of amplifiers, some five to six hundred men hear your programs at this location and several other of our batteries also tune in on their own receiving sets."

Less Meat for Swiss

Bern, Switzerland, radio announced that the meat ration for August will be two pounds, including bones. However, as compensation, each person will receive three-quarters ounce more of cheese and two ounces more of tea.

One Woman to Another

"One Woman To Another," a new program describing the important role and the activities of the American woman in a world at war, is now beamed to the British Isles every Friday at 10:15 a.m. CWT, over NBC stations WRCA (15.15) and WBOS (15.21). The new show is written and narrated by Marjorie Brook, Canadian-born. She describes the aims of the broadcast in the words of the opening script. "We, over here in America, want to tell you how we are getting along during these worrisome times. We want you to know not only our serious side but also our lighter side. We're going to tell you about our newly formed Woman's Army Auxiliary Corps, about our factory girls and Red Cross units, and government workers—but we're

also going to tell you a bit of our gossip—how the fashion world is adapting itself to the new restrictions, what's going on in Hollywood and along Broadway, and what the latest shades of nail-polish are."

Berlin Asks for It

Like the little boy whistling to prove his bravery as he walks by the village cemetery at night, Berlin radio is doing a lot of loud shouting about the proposed Allied second front. Lord Haw Haw said this: "In Germany there is a calm and quiet confidence that should the Allies invade Europe they will be defeated. Germany has made all her preparations down to the most minute detail. We cannot lose." Said Fred Kaltenbach: "Germany is prepared for any kind of a second front. The United Nations are not ready for a full-scale invasion. Nothing less would do them the slightest good. They undoubtedly will make a pretense of an invasion by landing a few hundred soldiers somewhere along the coast."

Short Waves Guide Ships, Aircraft

According to William C. White, head of General Electric's electronic laboratory, in a broadcast over the Schenectady short-wave stations, the development and use of high-frequency radio waves that resemble light waves in some respect and which can be formed into beams and made to do things that cannot be done with light, will be a part of the contributions to be made by science of electronics toward better living when the war is over. Mr. White explained how they can penetrate clouds, smoke, fog and storm and thus become a great navigation aid to ocean liners and aircraft.

Room Will Have" for Marlene Dietrich. Marlene is effective only when singing salty, suggestive songs. She has great confidence in Mr. Hollander and insists on his presence whenever she rehearses a song.

The late Victor Schertzinger and I wrote "I'll Never Let a Day Pass By" for Don Ameche, and thereby hangs a tale. We called the song "I'll Never Let a Day Go By," and that was its title until the moment Ameche stepped up to the recording microphone. Suddenly he refused to go on with the song. He was afraid his Italian relatives would misunderstand the words "Day Go." We had to change the title before he would sing.

Bob Hope needs songs which match his personality—not too much maudlin romance but lots of gaiety and life and a touch of "tongue in the cheek." Bob's a very self-conscious performer, and he knows his own limitations. Timing is something else that is very impor-

tant to the comedian—and therefore to his song-writers. My "Two Sleepy People" is an example of a Hopesque song.


One of the most difficult assignments I have ever handled concerned the folk-songs in "Tortilla Flat." The singers had no special singing quirks—they simply couldn't sing. The whole group—Spencer Tracy, John Garfield, Akim Tamiroff and Allen Jenkins—was incapable of singing a note on key. Finally, in despair, I suggested to the director that the song should be sung while the characters acted slightly drunk. The sour notes, which were bound to come, would then appear as part of the effects of liquor. The stunt worked out very well, and a real load was lifted from my worry-box.

These examples will give you an idea of the Hollywood song-writers' problems. But don't think we wall over our lot. We know that when we slant our work to the special talents of individual stars we're assuring you better entertainment.

Tricks of the Beauty Trade

SOME are born beautiful, others with a Phi Beta Kappa key dangling from their diaper. And if Dame Nature played hookey the day you arrived for the glamour handout—be a phony! We're all for fooling the public—making them think Cleo's been brought back to life. What if your glamour glides down the drain to a soap-suds refrain—mirror, mirror on the wall will keep your secret. And so will we!

Camouflage is more than a battleship's business. The brothers Westmore—Perc, Mont, Bud and Wally, make-up directors at four of Hollywood's largest film studios—are gilders of the lily from away back. For while 'tis true that "beauty is only skin deep," all too few men have X-ray lenses. You'd do better to put up a fascinating "front."

First of all, it's important to understand that the sole purpose of make-up is to enhance your attractiveness—to create an illusion of loveliness. At certain angles, reflected light casts sharp shadows across your face—unbecoming lines that would be corrected with a proper application of make-up. You can't possibly expect to change your face, but its appearance—the illusion it presents—can be corrected.

Bud Westmore tags it "masked make-up." He described the theory to me the other day and showed me its practical application on the 20th Century-Fox movie lot.

"The average woman with a big face labors under the misconception that by making her mouth into a cupid's bow, wearing her rouge in small, definite circles on her cheeks and styling her hair into small, tight curls, she's minimizing the size of her face. Nothing could be more deadly," he laments. "This 'small' treatment serves only to accentuate size."

Make-up is not something that comes out of a jar or a box to be rubbed or dabbed on your face in haphazard fashion. It's a science that will teach you how to make the most of your God-given features. Don't think of it in terms of powder, rouge and lipstick—concentrate on the "tricks of the beauty trade" and see to it that your make-up expresses a willingness to be taken at face value.

NOW, to get down to base facts! Play up your good features and play down your bad ones with an application of foundation cream. It's equivalent to the portrait artist's ground tone and will create an illusion of roundness or elongation via the highlight-and-shadow method of make-up artistry. Correct the appearance of size by using a lighter foundation on the cheeks in the area just at the sides of the nose. Blend your cream in with your natural skin tones, over the nose and on the outer cheeks, creating an illusion of fullness for your cheek-line. You

thus minimize nose proportions easily. However, if yours is a pekinese pug, a lighter foundation cream brought right down the center will serve you in good stead.

WHAT'S COOKING!

To Begin With—Breakfast

By GEORGIA SCOTT

IF YOU'RE eager to start the day right, a hearty, healthful breakfast is in order. The warm season offers a challenge to your ingenuity—don't let summer breakfast menus baffle you. Begin by realizing that a lot of food does not necessarily mean a lot of energy. Similarly, a small breakfast need not be lacking in nourishment. Whether your family likes theirs small, medium or man-sized—hot or cold—make their morning meal adequate!

Plan your breakfast menu the night before. It's a great advantage if you're the roll-over-on-the-other-side kind. Call "time out" to prepare fruit, set the table or mix a batter before doing your daily dozens—this time-saving device will allow thirty extra winks of sleep come morning. When setting your table, make the most of colorful floral settings or pretty-pretty cloths and shining service. They create a cheerful breakfast atmosphere and set a happy pace for the working day.

Some of the world's largest manufacturers of ready-to-eat cereals are "enriching" their breakfast products with vitamins and minerals. Yes, it's an "all out" to get on the health bandwagon!

Restored cereals taste no different nor do they look different from those we're accustomed to eating. Actually, all that's taken place is the addition of thiamin, niacin and iron—three nutritive elements found in the whole grain. The whole grain, unfortunately, is too hard and too unpalatable for the making of ready-to-eat cereals. It also contains an oil that goes rancid in a short time. But since science has shown how necessary the whole-grain elements are, restoring them by enrichment is a wise nutritional step that benefits millions of people without changing established eating-habits.

Happily for housewives, home cooking is kind to these added elements.


