GABE HEATTER'S Homelike Bomb Shelter



Victory Auctions . . .

DAVE ELMAN of "Hobby Lobby" radio fame never had a hobby of his own until the trumpets of all-out war were sounded over America. Now it's victory auctions, held after the regular "Hobby Lobby" program. To audiences totally unprepared for such an event, Mr. Elman has sold close to \$100,000 worth of War Bonds and Stamps.

The idea started when Dave turned five ladies' handbags into as many machine-guns — figuratively speaking. Here's what really happened: A hobbyist from Florida, who makes bags from odd and rare woods, asked Dave to give away five as souvenirs among the studio audience. That gave him the idea of using bags to sell War Bonds and he auctioned them off to highest bidder. Result: The bags brought the price of five machine-guns—\$3,100!

grateful for the opportunity to turn their hobbies into war materials.

First time the victory auction idea really went on the air as a hobby on Elman's program, he himself was interviewed on his hobby by Linton Wells, news analyst. Before this, Dave had written to Lieutenant Bulkeley of torpedo-boat fame for some souvenirs of his history-making onslaught against the Japs and his trip to Australia with General MacArthur. The lieutenant sent his PT tie clasp, collar insignia for senior grade lieutenant, together with a personal note of thanks to the highest bidder. Top bid for these was \$16,000. If a person wishes to bid on an article but lacks enough money, proof of War Bond purchase in amount bid, and brought to Elman's office during the week, will suffice.

To date, Elman has held nine of these auctions.

In order to keep them going, Hobby Lobby Elman wrote to hobbyists who had appeared on former programs, cited the example of the handbag auction, and asked them for articles to sell for bonds. Hundreds poured in from all over the nation, donated by Americans who were eager and

After first victory auction aired, Dave requested that anyone interested in how to conduct one write to him.

In next two days he answered over a hundred notes of inquiry. Simple to conduct, they have caught the interest of the nation. Like bingo and keno, victory auctions can become nation-wide. And think of the revenue for War Bonds and Stamps they will garner if they do! —The Editors.


Clark Gable's Command Performance

And a brief smile lighted his face when he was told that soldiers "over there" had expressed a desire to hear his voice on the air-show that's put on by the War Department especially for them. For since Carole Lombard's death, Gable has been a recluse. Now his one really vital interest lies in service to his country whenever and wherever he can give it. How, is up to Uncle Sam! For great sorrow has left plains of loneliness in his heart that only true service to fellow man and country can fill.

Heroes of the Sea Tell Their Stories on Coast Guard Show

A COLLIER in a convoy is torpedoed and the captain of a Coast Guard cutter disobeys orders and risks court-martial to rescue her crew.

A merchant ship is torpedoed and the crew of a Coast Guard surf-boat rows through a lake of flame to rescue sailors trapped by burning oil.

A freighter goes on the rocks in a full-gale blizzard and a motor life-boat fights through hell-below-zero to save her captain and crew—

These are but a few of the real-life, out-of-the-record-book stories dramatized Saturdays at 1:15 p.m. EWT over an MBS network on "On Guard with the Coast Guard."

And here's the punch to this story: Most of the parts are actually taken by Coast Guardsmen—former radio people now in service!

The scripts are produced and directed under the watchful eye of Blair Walliser, for many years director of "Helen Trent" and "Backstage Wife" as well as "Bob Becker's Dog Chats," "Harold Teen," "Americans at the Ramparts," and others. A former yachtsman, he's now a lieutenant in the United States Coast Guard.

What You Should Know About the Coast Guard

1. It was organized in 1790 and is the smallest and one of the oldest of the armed forces.
2. In peace time it operates under the Treasury Department, and in war, or when the President so directs, it serves under the Navy Department.
3. Its speedy 83-foot "sub-busters" are driving the subs back from our shores.
4. Its big destroyer-type 327-foot cutters are on convoy duty far across the open seas.
5. Its crews man transports that carry American troops to all parts of the globe.
6. Its men, skilled in handling small boats, operate landing-boats with our task forces.
7. Its air arm wings aloft in the big "flying lifeboats," most of which are now on submarine patrol.
8. The Coast Guard maintains 32,000 aids to navigation along 40,000 miles of American inland, coastal and territorial waters. These activities range from Alaska to Puerto Rico and from Hawaii to Greenland.
9. The Coast Guard has transported as many as 80,000 people to safety in a single major flood disaster in the Midwest.
10. The Coast Guard has maintained an ice-patrol in the North Atlantic since the Titanic disaster. During all the years since, no other ship has sunk from striking a berg.
11. Coast Guard cutters on "weather patrol" duty provide meteorological data that helps to keep the transatlantic planes flying.
12. The Coast Guard maintains shore stations which patrol our coasts, ever watchful against spies landing from submarines.
13. The Coast Guard protects all harbors, docks, ports and waterfront facilities against fire and sabotage.
14. Coast Guard ice-breakers keep our harbors open late in the fall and early in spring.
15. The Coast Guard protects fisheries and seal herds, guards against smuggling, acts as the maritime police force, and performs scores of other services in peace and war alike. Indeed, "The Navy of Mercy" is now "The Fourth Arm of Uncle Sam's Fighting Forces"!



"What'd it cost?" she asked. "Lodge fellas send the book to ya free or do ya hafta pay for it?"


"I hafta pay for it," said Vic, his enthusiasm undampened.



Washington Plans Its Own Stage Door Canteen; Elmer Davis May Broadcast Again; Lamour Leaves Her Mark on a Soldier's Face

WASHINGTON

Several months ago, we talked over an idea with Ted Collins. If you remember the last war, you recall how often people in theaters sang the stirring war songs of 1918. Ted's idea was that people were ready to sing again and that all they needed was a leader. He said he had the leader in Kate Smith. Not in person but in a movie short.

So you will be singing in your theater some of the days soon, led by Kate Smith herself. The title of the series will be "America Sings with Kate Smith." All profits, by the way, will be turned over to the USO . . .

There is something exciting just in the words "Stage Door Canteen." Irving Berlin gave the phrase a lilt when he wrote "I Left My Heart at the Stage Door Canteen." Hollywood is making a picture called "Stage Door Canteen." But what is it? In New York where it began, it is a cozy, comfortable place wherein soldiers find fun and food. There, they meet the stars and starlets of Broadway who have volunteered to dance and dine with the fighting men.

The big news in Washington is that we too are to have a Stage Door Canteen. Of all places in the U. S. A., this city needs it most. The majority of big Army camps are in the South. The majority of people in the U. S. live north and west of Washington. Here, thousands of soldiers change trains. On week-ends the streets are crowded with men in every kind of uniform. For them, the Canteen will be a godsend.

Plans were launched here recently by a supper on the stage of the Belasco Theater. More celebrities trod those famous boards that night than in all history. Among them, saying good words for the cause, were Eleanor Roosevelt, Helen Hayes (a Washington girl who is coming home to take charge of the canteen), Tallulah Bankhead, Edna Ferber, Paul McNutt, Senator Claude Pepper, and many others . . .

Army officials are in a quandary over what to do about Irving Berlin's soldier show, "This Is the Army." It opened on Broadway on July 4, expecting to play for four weeks. Its success was so great that an additional four weeks was authorized. Now it is showing a profit for Army Emergency Relief of \$42,000 a week, and experts are saying it could run a full year. But the Army has other plans for those singing soldiers. When to send them on to finish their military training is the problem. Are they more useful making such huge sums for the needy families of soldiers or as fighting men? It is a tough decision to make. Regardless, Berlin has a check for half a mil-

lion dollars already written out for Army Relief, which probably will be presented on an early Army Hour radio program . . .

Pressure is increasing to bring Elmer Davis back to radio. The voice with the middle-western accent is missed these nights when the news is scarce. Don't be surprised if Davis comes to you in his own variety of "fireside chat" this fall. His matter-of-fact delivery, plus the authority of his position as head of the Government's Office of War Information would be a welcome tonic.


did a thorough job of hanging himself . . .

CHICAGO

We forget about this war—forget it because we live so freely, easily, comfortably. But the other night 12,000,000 of us in the Midwest remembered it. Army orders dropped a blackout across the shores of Lake Michigan and the country far inland—Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Indiana. I rode an American Airlines flagship up from Chicago's Municipal Airport on a starry, moonless night. We rose near where the black cornfields rolled against the outer reaches of the gleaming gridiron of city streets. Neons flickered and fluorescents slashed the

dark. Black bugs with headlights crawled the boulevards, and Lake Michigan wore a necklace of lights.

Then—though we couldn't hear them at 3,500 feet—the sirens shrieked "W-a-r-rrr," and blackness splattered across the town, wiping out blocks here, whole neighborhoods there.

An engineer wig-wagged a cue, and Jack Brickhouse, seated across the aisle from me, started talking into a WGN mike. Thirty seconds of prepared script, minutes of direct, neck-cranning description, more minutes of interviews with the OCD experts aboard. It was a good broadcast, smooth, efficient special-events coverage, as pat and easy as a baseball broadcast.

I couldn't keep my eyes on Jack and his experts. Outside, below, my town and my Midwest were smudging their warm and friendly glitter, donning the black that is battle uniform for groundsters in a war which has made the sky an enemy highway . . . That's not a pat thought,

not an easy one, when the uniform covers the fields you've walked in the spring, the park in which you've made love, the parlor where your wife's listening to the radio, the room where your son sleeps in his crib. Then you see the black not as death or emptiness but as a stronger-than-steel, double-buttressed shelter—and you're fiercely angry at every flicker of light that still shines upward.

You fume and curse at the fool who left those headlights burning—one pair of headlights making a block-long glare on the pavement. You're riled by the shop window a merchant forgot to darken—and you cheer when it blacks out suddenly. You worry and ask your neighbor, "Is it good? Is it a success?"

Five minutes of blackness, then the landscape flared with splashes of light—the defense plants rolling back into action. The shop-lamps seemed to grin against the darkness, and we could almost hear the plants bragging, "We are strong and tough, and we're doing the job. You gentlemen in Berlin, when we're humming, does it spoil your sleep? Do you rest easy, scum?"

Except for defense plants, the Midwest took a half-hour of blackness. Then, as we cruised out over the lake, we saw the light return. Streamers of street-lamps flared like skyrockets; windows gleamed; traffic-lights picked up their emerald-amber-ruby rhythm. The light, as a mass, built up slowly, bubbled through the streets, flowed up the skyscrapers until, after many minutes, the familiar big-town glow filled the sky.

As the last ridiculous advertising signs returned to their pointless flashing we shrugged and bummed cigarettes from each other and chattered lightly, making a great palaver about not being impressed. Maybe, in that chatter, I was the only liar. Maybe, though I don't believe it, I was the only one who couldn't forget easily the way home looks from a bomber's viewpoint—who couldn't get out of his mind the fact that some other night the Midwest may have to put on another blackout; that this other one must be better—for light, in 1942, is another name for death!

LANNY ROSS FINDS ARMY MEN APPRECIATE BOTH CLASSICAL AND POPULAR MUSIC

Shortages Cut Volume of Record Production, But Not Quality; Mark Warnow, Ace CBS Conductor, Rose From the Concert-Master's Chair

LANNY ROSS, star of the CBS' "Camel Caravan," is all excited over the work he has done and plans to continue doing for the USO. Some time ago he took a two-month leave from matters wireless and went off on a USO tour of the Army camps. He was one of the first artists to sing for the men in uniform and he recalls the thrills he had when appearing before the soldier audiences.

He related that the town of Alexandria, La., is the Saturday night goal of the men situated in four near-by camps. The sum total of the trainees in that area comes to some 100,000 men. "On Saturday nights," he said, "practically all of them—well, almost all of them—hit the town looking for something to do.

"At Camp Polk, near Alexandria, I was standing around watching the men pass by the camp theater—but in droves. The natural question I asked was, 'What, no audience?' Somebody, a good Samaritan eager to smooth my ruffled feelings, I thought, said, 'Just wait till later, you'll get an audience.'

"Anyway, I gave the first concert in the camp theater. The listeners were some three hundred officers' wives. They were all very nice, very intent and very gracious with their applause.

"When that was over, the same person came over to me and said, 'Well, okay, now, the men are waiting.'

"The men?" I asked. "Where?"

"Yes, the men, just down the line a piece," he replied.

"So we trudged over to the amphitheater—one of those natural ones, you know. About 15,000 of the trainees were sitting around. They had just had a demonstration in flame-throwing. The sight of the crowd, the huge hillside teeming with faces, the clearness of the night were things to remember.

"I climbed onto the stage and was introduced. The officer in charge was very kind to me. He said, 'We have a big surprise tonight, Lanny Ross is here to sing for us.' Well, to make it brief, I gave a one-hour show and the biggest kick I got was making the men sing with me.

"At the conclusion of the program, a bugler blew the 'attention' call. Incidentally, that was when I learned the meaning of what I thought merely an auto-horn signal. Everyone stood up, rigidly at attention. The commandant arose from his place and marched through the crowd of soldiers. They made lanes for him to pass through.

"I walked directly behind him, during the terrific quiet, and he turned to

me and said, 'Take it easy, it's a long climb to the top. You'll feel it in your legs if you don't.' When we reached the summit, the men began to disperse.

"One of them, a little fellow, made his way to where I was standing with the commandant and his staff. As democratic as all-get-out, the officer introduced the buck private to me, explaining that he was a talented singer. The youngster informed me that he had been at the concert back there in the camp theater. 'I guess I was the only man there,' he said. 'When I get out of the Army I'm going to sing professionally. In the meantime, I'm building muscles. Of course, if I knock off a few hundred Japs or Nazis, it'll make me sing with all the more enthusiasm.'

"Another chap, also a buck private, came over. He asked me to autograph his girl friend's picture. I thought it an odd request, but I complied, asking the whys and wherefores the while. He answered that the girl friend was one of my 'fans,' a fact I was, naturally, glad to learn. Then he asked me to sign his cartridge belt—for himself, which flattered me all the more."

Mr. Ross' pleasure at these reminiscences was undisguised. "Believe me," he said, "I'm going to do more and more of that work. While I'm seriously considering which branch of the service is going to get the dubious benefits of my physical prowess, I might as well do as much of it as I can. These men love music, make no mistake about that. In the programs I have sung for them I tried to mix the pieces, giving the boys serious music as well as the popular kind. Never did I find an objection to the so-called

classics I offered them. In fact, I might say they were received with even more cordiality than the other kind."

The personable tenor remarked that he likes popular music a great deal. "I can even make with the jive, you know, although I regret that it doesn't suit my type of singing. I'm essentially a singer of songs."

Mr. Ross has already appeared in operatic performances. The role of Rodolfo in Puccini's "La Boheme" he has sung numerous times. He is currently at work on the parts of Alfredo in Verdi's "La Traviata" and Des Grieux in Massenet's "Manon." He is tremendously ambitious, he admits. "You never stop working or aiming higher," he said. "You can't stop, unless you're easily satisfied."

An athlete of considerable renown during his undergraduate days at Yale University, Mr. Ross was national AAU champion in the three-hundred-yard dash two years in succession. However, music, singing have always been his predilections. In 1928, he turned down a chance to compete in the Olympics, in order to travel abroad with the Yale University Glee Club.

He went abroad again in 1936. He saw no sign of dissension in the countries he visited—Germany, France, Hungary, Italy—but, as he looks back on it now, he did feel a certain tension in the air. "Pre-war tension, that was it," he said.

Mr. Ross plays, "for my own amusement," the piano and the guitar. He is completely sold on radio, thinks that radio is here to stay for a while. "Make it forever," he added immediately. "You see, I believe that radio is still in its infancy. But just you wait until the infant grows up."

The General Platoff Don Cossack Chorus, a group boasting as resounding a body of tone as you'll hear anywhere, sings the "Song of the Volga Boatmen" and "The Twelve Roberts" under the direction of Nicholas Kostrukoff. Erica Morini, distinguished violinist, plays in her fluently descriptive manner the Waltz from Gounod's opera "Faust" and a Ravel piece.

POPULAR MUSIC

MARK WARNOW once held the chair of concert-master in a New York motion-picture palace. One day, believing that he had served enough apprenticeship, he went to the manager of the house and acquainted him with a special ambition. He wanted to conduct.

The great man listened to the fervent plea, making little or no comment. On the following day Warnow was told to take his ambitions elsewhere.

Turning to radio, he obtained work as concert-master for several network orchestras. He seemed to be doing particularly well. There came an opportunity to do some substitute conducting, but when that was over he returned to the orchestral ranks.

In the meantime, he devoted nights, sometimes whole nights, to the study of orchestration. He composed. He toyed with sharps and flats. He experimented. This was the real apprenticeship. One day he was summoned by a radio executive. He was given the post of CBS staff conductor.

His particular duties, at the time, were to prove musical as well as moral support to budding CBS stars. Among these may be mentioned Morton Downey, Connee Boswell, Phil Regan, Virginia Verrill and Gertrude Niesen. He conducted orchestra for some of radio's most important shows, notably programs starring Helen Hayes, "We, the People," and others, and, finally, the "Hit Parade."

Born in Russia of musically gifted parents, Warnow came to this country with his family when he was six. Picking up his father's violin one sunny day in Brooklyn, he experienced the thrill of his life, as he bowed and fingered away for all he was worth. Coming upon that scene, Warnow pere decided then and there to give his son a musical education.

Because of stringent finances, young Mark was forced to turn temporarily away from Bach and Beethoven and to turn to the gods of Tin Pan Alley. He played with many dance bands. From that point he spread out into other, though related, fields.

He conducted pit orchestras and he even ventured into the operatic arena for a spell. Not long after that he became the concert-master for the Paramount Theater (New York) orchestra. It was from there that he was fired summarily for being ambitious. Ironically enough, Warnow was to be a headline attraction at the theater ten years later.

SMUGGLED LETTERS TELL OF EUROPEANS' FAITH IN THE VICTORY OF FREEDOM

Nazis' Latest Howl: "British Don't Fight Fair"; South Americans Are Becoming Swing Addicts; "Bomb Site" Gardens Aid British War Effort

WGEA Mail Clearing House

AS PART of the United Nations' effort to make the people of occupied countries know that they have not been forgotten, WGEA beams this message to Europe several times a day:

"WGEA is anxious to be of service to any listeners in occupied countries. If any members of your family or any friends have come to the United States since the war, and their whereabouts is unknown to you, send a letter to them in care of WGEA, General Electric, Schenectady, N. Y., U. S. A. We shall make every effort to deliver these letters for you."

In response to the above offer, letters are trickling into WGEA. Smuggled out of the Continent, these communications from "another world" reveal that despite a possible death-penalty for listening to foreign broadcasts, German-hating residents of Europe's occupied countries are risking their lives to hear short-wave programs from Schenectady. The assurance of eventual liberation from the Nazis, broadcast continually by radio, is enabling the conquered peoples to endure privations and continue underground warfare against the enemy.

A French widow, who, with thousands of others, was forced by the Nazis to evacuate her home in Lorraine, wrote to WGEA for help in locating a relative in Mississippi, and added:

"Abandoned almost by everyone here, the certainty of deliverance which you give us enables us to endure this long exile as well as the privations of every kind. England and the great American nation will be victorious and once more will save us.

"May you be blessed, American people, and may the ever victorious Star-Spangled Banner soon float under our French sky.

"In the hope of soon seeing our army beside you, associated with those who have heroically saved the honor of France, please accept our profound gratitude."

WGEA recently complied with an unusual request sent by a Spanish refugee, who formerly was an infantry major in the Spanish Republican army and a lieutenant in the French Foreign Legion. He wrote asking WGEA to broadcast a message to several friends in Oran, Algeria, who assisted him in escaping from a concentration camp in North Africa and what he described as "Nazi-Fascist slavery," that he had arrived safely in Mexico.

"We agreed to send them this message," the ex-officer stated, "by your radio station, which we listened to every day with perfect reception, as well as to the Free French radio in London.

"The Boches will learn, in their turn, what is anguish!"

Here and There

Margaret Bourke-White, giving a description of the Caucasus the other night over the London radio, stated that there were sixty-seven different languages—not dialects—in use in this part of the U. S. S. R. alone . . . Naval officers in training for public-relations work are frequent visitors to the CBS publicity-division offices and the CBS short-wave listening posts in New York . . . According to William Holt of the British Broadcasting Corporation, every tillable foot of ground in Great Britain is now under intensive cultivation. Most unique of all, he said, are the "bomb site" gardens, where before you can plant seeds you must first remove broken drain-pipes, bricks and rubble. One shell-hole gardener ran onto several tons of coal while digging. He had evidently struck what had at one time been someone's cellar coal-bin . . . According to the Soviet radio, while on scouting duty on advanced positions a Red army man, Markelov, found near a populated place the body of a Soviet commander which showed marks of torture. Markelov attempted to lift the body in order to carry it back to his unit for burial, when suddenly he observed a wire which had been attached to it and which led to a mine.

Not far away he discovered seven more corpses which had all been similarly mined . . . In a recent issue of MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE, I mentioned Berlin commentator Paul Revere's visit to Hoperoy House in Munich where he partook of several foaming tankards of beer. Miss Hazel H. Chapin of Springfield, Massachusetts, says it was actually Hofbrau Haus, one of the show places of Munich, which the broadcast referred to. The name means Court Brewery House, and fifty years or so ago the beer for the Imperial Court was made there. Miss Chapin visited Hofbrau House in 1931 . . . Week-end flights to London from this country are becoming more and more common. Due to war-time secrecy regulations, most of these diplomatic or military hops do not get into the papers. A recent week-end visitor to the British Isles was noted commentator H. V. Kaltenborn, whose trip could be kept no secret, since he broadcast from "somewhere in England" a few hours after his arrival.

British Tactics Unfair Say Nazis

Forgetting its all-out effort to talk down the proposed Allied second front for the moment, the Nazi radio recently went back to one of its well-worn tricks of accusing the British troops of unfair tactics and foul play. The Nazi

speaker, claiming to be talking from the North African front, stated that the British were supposed to be fighting for "Christian ideals" but that in the desert their bombers were dropping explosives on helpless Arab tribesmen and their sheep and camels; that the same naughty British were dumping gasoline and petroleum into the Arab's wells, making it necessary for them to journey hundreds of miles out of their way to other wells. "Our German troops," he continued, "gladly gave up their water rations to the poor Arab tribesmen." (This yarn depicting the sprouting of wings from kindly and chivalrous Nazi soldiers was too good to keep.)

Rug-Cutting on the Pampas

Shepherders on the pampas and department-store clerks in the cities down in Central and South America are the world's newest American swing addicts, according to Joseph Littau, director of NBC's International Division musical library.

"Our neighbors below the Rio Grande are real swing-music enthusiasts," said Littau, whose task includes the selection of all musical fare beamed to Latin America via NBC's short-wave transmitters, WRCA, WNBI and WBOS. "They prefer our faster numbers and never turn down an opportunity to listen to the music of Tommy Tucker, Sammy Kaye, Tommy Dorsey, Vincent Lopez, Freddy Martin, Charlie Spivak and Bob Chester. They also like Jose Bethancourt's orchestra with Jose at the marimba playing Latin-American rhythms."

Latin Americans also possess the finest taste in the serious music field, said Littau, pointing out that "we can't send them enough of the standard operatic repertoire."

News About the Stations



So it's up to you to do your share—to give yourself a private and personal leg show where it's most revealing—in front of your mirror!

Unfortunately, not all of us were blessed with the leg beauty of a Billy Rose aquabelle, but there's a lot that exercise can do to mold thighs, calves and ankles nearer unto the coveted lines. Joan Leslie is just one of the many "Babes in Hollywood" who deems it worth ten minutes a day to bend, lift and stretch her way to health and beauty. Movie stars have always had to spend far more time standing and walking than the average woman, but today the war has put every feminine American patriot on her toes. Gas-rationing has of necessity increased your walking average, and bond-selling, relief work, benefits, etc., add to pedestrian mileage. Therefore your "stems" are important not only for their "leg-art" but as military aids to boot.

If your glance has descended toward the sidewalk recently, you may have noticed how many more women are wearing sensible walking-shoes. There was a time not so very long ago when the word "sensible," applied to footwear, was synonymous with "ugly," "undainty" or "out of style." Yet manufacturers have come to realize that most women would rather be comfortable for beauty than suffer for

Now take a card from right pile and tuck it between your left toes—and reach!—then one from the left pile between your right toes. Now stretch over, pluck the card out and put it back behind you. See how many cards you can get transferred from deck to toes and back again. A melon-shaped rubber exer-

cise-ball is a handy thing for relaxing feet, too. Or, if you're absolutely too exhausted to lift a finger, then don't. Just lie down for ten or fifteen minutes with your feet higher than your head—you can almost feel new life flow through your veins.

One of the nicest things you can do for your feet is to plunge them into bubbling foot-baths. Several that we know of are pleasantly aromatic and consist of ingredients that relax and refresh your feet, and at the same time keep them well groomed and well stimulated.





Scripts are written by Ensigns Hal R. Strass ("The America's Speak") and Lyle D. Gumm, successful freelance writer.

Hughie Rowlands, former star of "Flying Patrol" (Blue Network), took the part of a Coast Guard flier in that script for so long that he joined the service, did many parts in "On Guard," and is now stationed at an eastern Coast Guard air base. Claude Kirchner, former network announcer, is now a second-class seaman, announcing the show on Saturdays and spending the rest of the week trying to win a commission. Bob Larimer, former radio commentator, is narrator. He works with the recruiting office other times.

Barre Schlaes was a Goodman Theater graduate. At first he worked on the show as a good-will gesture. He got so pepped up about the Coast Guard he finally packed up and joined the service. His regular station is now the Battle Creek training station. Then there's Dolph Nelson, former network star in shows like "Ma Perkins" and "Road of Life." A private chat with a fighting-mad boatswain's mate on the program one day stirred Dolph up to enlist. He was trained at Curtis Bay, Maryland, served at Fort McHenry, and is now back in Chicago.

There aren't any girls in the Coast Guard yet; but **Juliet Forbes**, former Broadway stage actress, ingenue lead in several big productions, and **Melanie York** of the CBS staff help out with a wide range of feminine characterizations.

Not only that, but the show has actually scooped both Coasts in getting on the air men fresh from combat duty. There was **Ralph Sproston**, for instance. He was radioman on the ill-fated cutter **Alexander Hamilton**. For five days she towed a merchant ship on a mission of mercy. On the fifth day, this proud destroyer-type cutter was torpedoed. Then there was Ensign **Bruce Karnes** freshly returned from a U-boat patrol. He couldn't "tell all," but what he implied gave convincing proof that the Coast Guard's mighty navy of little ships on in-shore patrol was more than paying back the Axis for the cowardly sinking of the **Hamilton**.

For men who love the sea and have a little salt in their blood and a Viking spirit in their hearts, this program tells again and again the story of breathless action afloat that awaits men who enlist in the Coast Guard.


