### AIR WORTHY IS HE

**THE JEWISH QUESTION:** Juicy morsel for many a rabble-rouser is oft vociferated, never clarified, subject which, by propagandists, is dubbed "The Jewish question." Last fortnight Berlin again plumped onto short-waves the voice of Douglas Chandler, (Haw Haw for U. S.) who, in his broadcast, air-snared by listening stations, raised again for many conjectures as to what the Jewish question is. Most uninformed persons regard it as Gentile-menacing ambitions of Jews, expressed in interests in motion pictures, communications, banking, and politics. On these terms, as many a competent radioist has vouchsafed, the Jewish question is no question at all. It is one concerning Gentiles who, fed much factless verbal and printed fodder, hearing unreasoned diatribes, conclude Jewish ambition is for world domination, subjugation of other races, destruction of "Gentility."

True facts are: Jews are numerically inferior to other races. By native shrewdness, spurred by persecution, they have tended to isolate themselves, gather power through competitive effort, gain economic strength as most potent weapon in moral and spiritual arsenals.

Rarely are Jews leaders in campaigns against any religion, race, or creed. Most are home-loving, devoted to their children, generous and peace-seeking. Like all peoples, Jews have their rascals. If a question exists at all it is, perhaps, because of these ethnic bad ones. These have no more country than has, for instance, Britain's Lord Haw Haw, and his currently announced "American" comrade, Douglas Chandler.

Latterday Jews solve hideous problem of distrust and hate by cultivating Gentiles, keeping faith with them, by examining orthodoxies which many a sociologist has concluded as partly responsible for periodic distressing plights into which Jews are caught.

That Jews hate Hitler is no secret. Hundreds of thousands of them, guilty of no more serious offense than that they lived, were herded and driven into concentration camps and from the land. Reason back of this, despite earnest protests of many well intentioned Jews, was the fact that individuals had captured potential command positions in German economics. But such positions have been captured by other Jews without the wholesale crimes against civilized procedure that has marked Hitlerism. Question rises: Should the fact that some Jews share with some Catholics, with some Gentiles, more power over others than is good for men, be deemed reason for junking civilized methods? Few persons, searching their minds honestly, would answer affirmatively.



One of radio's most respected personalities is Jose Rodriguez, co-star with Sid Sutherland of the highly KFI news-analyses, "Inside the News," heard at 10:30 p. m. In addition to being an expert on current events, a convincing talker, an accomplished linguist, an editorial writer for a national chain of newspapers, and a regular guy, Rodriguez is known far and wide as a musicologist. His daily recorded "Classic Hour" on KECB at 1 p. m. is one of the oldest as well as one of the most popular programs of its kind in the United States. This picture, an interesting character study, was snapped by a motion picture cameraman who was visiting Rodriguez in a Sunday afternoon.

Interested radioists pondering the Chandler diatribe (Radio Life, June 15, Page 3 "Lord Haw Law For U. S.") knew this: That his fulminations were part and parcel of an attempt to intensify American social restlessness by raising the misleading "Jewish Question" to turn possibilities of human friendliness and cooperation into certainty of democracy-weakening hates.



*Ed. Note: All those who wish to read a fair statement of problems posed the Jew may read "What Can the Jews Do?" by Lewis Browne, former conductor, "I Disagree" CBS program. It is obtainable in condensed form in Readers Digest for April, 1937, in a full text in the Virginia Quarterly Review, University of Virginia. In less than 2000 words Mr. Browne does more to picture the Jew in his faults and virtues as an essential human being than all diatribes and praises from propagandists for and against. In the interest of closer understanding Radio Life unreservedly recommends Mr. Browne's article.*

**PAYING THE "FIDLER":** Last week two items made news in radio circles, were of interest to listeners. Kate Smith's program after July 11 would be cut to a half hour. Second news was that Jimmie Fidler would return to air his pungent programs of chatter and gossip and Hollywood lowdown for Columbia Broadcasting company, Pacific Network, starting Friday, July 11 at 8:30 p. m.

Of the two pieces of news chat concerning Fidler was the most interesting for these reasons.

Hollywood "prophets" had predicted that Fidler would never come back to broadcasting. They claimed motion picture studios would keep him off, that radio networks were afraid of him, that he couldn't find a sponsor. Fidler had refused to

delete from his radio chatter many news-worthy items, frank criticisms, and well-merited rebukes which many a Hollywood bumster did not like.

Further, Fidler has a contract with his sponsor, the TAYLOR Company, cosmetic manufacturer, unlike any other ever signed in radio. It is for a straight three years without usual thirteen-week renewal clauses. Only reason contract can be cancelled would be his failure to boost sales to anticipated increases. The contract also calls for a percentage of gross sales receipts, in addition to his broadcast salary.

Fidler's program will follow the same formula as when last heard: news of Hollywood stars and pictures; notes from the Little Black Book; Open Letters, pre-

views of new pictures with the familiar "bells" for rating. There will be, also, Fidler's familiar closing, "Good night to you, and I DO mean YOU."

**THE POT WAS EMPTIED:** Hated by motion picture interests has been Horace Heidt's "Pot O' Gold" program which, last fortnight, replaced its radio lid, was taken off radio's simmering contest ranges, was unable to get in touch with person chosen to receive pot's contents, \$1,800, and, in absence of claimant, gave money to American Red Cross.

Started a year ago "Pot O' Gold" sliced deeply into Tuesday night revenues of film theatres, angered film tycoons who brought pressure to bear on Department of Justice to wreck program, salvage half dollars and quarters from the 35 millions who stayed at home to listen instead of gaping at flicker fare.

**GOD AND THE NETWORK:** Important part of most network schedules is that which does with religion what other programs do with culture, entertainment and routine public information, the broadcasting of spiritual programs in the language and format of the nation's diversified approaches to God. The nation's major networks, Columbia, Mutual and National, stress religious programs with earnest emphasis. By last week National Broadcasting Company had won for itself

top honors for two of its religious programs.

At a convention of the Woman's Press Club in New York there were cited as outstanding programs NBC's "National Vespers" and the "Message of Israel," the first under auspices of Dr. H. E. Fosdick; the second, of the United Jewish Laymen's Committee.

**STEEL RAIL WEIGHTS:** Rarely does Paul Rhymer make mistakes. Last week, however, the author of Vic and Sade (five-a-week, 11:45 a. m. KFI) did make one, was sure of it this week after seeing this letter from John Reese, station agent for the Great Northern Railroad in Nash, North Dakota.

"I imagine Uncle Fletcher will argue this point, but you can tell him that railroad track is figured on a basis of weight per yard, and not per foot. In other words, a four ft. length of 110 lb. rail would weigh 146½ lbs. instead of the 440 lbs. Uncle Fletcher told Sadie."

**QUIZ WHIZ:** Quiz whizzer is Richard Williams, eleven year old East Chicago, Indiana, mathematics wizard and all around mental gymnast. This week (June 25) over KECA-KFSD he heads into his 25th Quiz Kid session with no strikeouts yet recorded against him.

With little advance warning Richard became a mental bombshell on the board January 8. Sent to Chicago for auditions from Harrison Elementary School at East Chicago, young Williams proved to have an I. Q. of a high school senior. Split-second solving of complicated problems in arithmetic are his forte. To this ability is added a singular knowledge of geography, a healthy stock of information on general subjects. He made the highest score attained by any kid on a single broadcast. Close competitor is Jack Lucal, 14, current member of the board, who will be heading into his 18th straight program this week.

Ranging in age from 8 to 14, the Quiz Kids unhorsed professors of history, mathematics, economics, foreign languages and psychology by a score of 275 to 14 in a mental battle staged on campus of University of California at Los Angeles, as a feature of Alumni Day.

When smoke of battle cleared, the Kids had played hob with Professor James L. Cate, medieval history teacher, recent recipient of a \$1,000 award for excellence in teaching; Professor Harry Everett, secretary of the math department and lecturer at Adler Planetarium; Mary B. Gilson, assistant professor of economics; Arthur Bovee, assistant professor in foreign languages, and Professor Harvey B. Lemon, of the psychology department.

The triumphant Quiz Kids team also includes Van Dyke Tiers, 14; Joan Bishop, 14, and Gerard Darrow, 8.

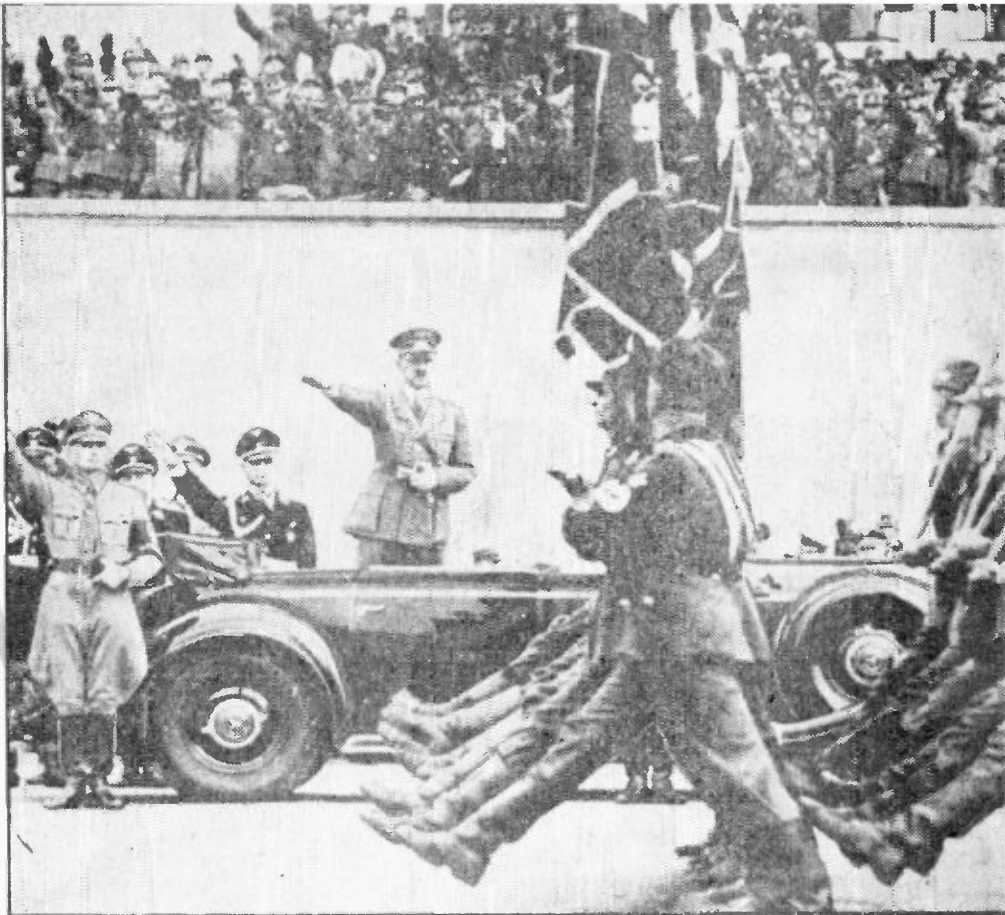


**B**Y NIGHT the Stukas scream over England, the Spitfires snarl over Berlin, laying their death-squirming steel and explosive-packed "eggs," bursting to vomit death on humans within range, destroying buildings and homes, sparing neither the halt nor the lame, the strong or the brave, the young or the old, when these are in their paths.

A raid is accomplished over England, over Germany; military projects are launched by opposing armies; men pit their iron and steel, bullet- and bomb-supplemented strength against men. . . .

The war is on! Terrors strike at the bravest, loose agonies to stream from desolate hearts and homes. . . . Press services chatter in a fever of reportorial intensity. Information and misinformation, military claim and counter-claim, lies and truths from propagandists, strategists and politicians clatter cables and wires, send teletypes into passions of staccato overwork to keep up with the steady and mounting flood of news and near-news. . . .

This is a thin and watery suggestion of war. It neither brings home the horror of modern war, nor does it define in quick and understandable terms what war is about. Few are the persons of average humble origins whose voices are to be heard, raised in protest or in defense of the death-dealing holocausts that currently sweep across Europe, sending century-old civilizations and traditions into ague-like shivering death. Mostly heard are the voices of politicians, statesmen, spokesmen for "interests," be-frocked "divines" bespeaking slaughter and allocating God conveniently to whatever political and

economic interests they are forced to serve. . . .

Bemused, as has been many another thoughtful man, was Earl Gilmore a few weeks ago. How, thought Oil Man Gilmore, might one "core" the heart of tragedy, reveal the common man, woman and child, their intimate reactions to what was going on about them, of which they and theirs were a part?

From such musings came "War Letters," KHJ program (Mondays through Fridays at 9:15 p. m.)

In "War Letters" humble citizens (to date restricted to Britishers) make simple and sincere outpourings of the human aspect behind war news. The letters submitted to the program are from those who have received them from friends and relatives living in threatened or invaded lands of troubled earth.

From the letters, read by Roderick Mays, unidentified soldiers have told of the British defeat at Dunkirk, of blitzkrieg along the peaceful plains and valleys of the lowlands, the Mounts of Greece and the verdant grape-lands of France. They tell of hungry and weary men, marching by night and fighting by day and night, of stunning and brutal sorties with suddenly dashed coveys of hostile troops, of panicked refugees banking the roads along which sped silent-muzzled artillery, truck laden with grim men satiated with slaughter, yet compelled by the urgencies of war to slaughter more.

The letters tell of sorrows and joys, of dreams war has smashed, of plans that are bloodied and done, letters from Frenchmen and Englishmen, refugees from the Axis, from soldiers and sailors and tired eyed men of Home Defenses,

# Radio Beams on MARY ASTOR

*The Show-Case Lady Gets the  
Once-Over by Evelyn Bigsby*

**M**OST of you probably think of Mary Astor the way we did. So many times we've seen her brilliant screen delineations of the supercilious, sophisticated woman. From currently screening "The Great Lie" we carried away vivid impressions of her as the b.azen, blasé, brittle concert pianist who renounced her baby. We became confused, it seems, and actually attributed to real-life Mary Astor the hard, worldly-wise qualities which she depicts so convincingly on the screen.

But it isn't that way at all.

At first, when we stumbled upon her

the way we did, we had to pinch ourselves to make sure we were in possession of our normal senses.

For some reason to ourselves most astonishing but very gratifying, we were 10 minutes early for our interview appointment and were directed to the gardens beside Miss Astor's Colonial home in Pacific Palisades.

As we skirted a clump of flowering shrubbery, we noticed that a large piece of the lawn had been torn up to make way for a common ordinary vegetable patch. Very snugly arrayed were two

rows of corn, two rows of beans, parallel clusters of radishes, twin lines of carrots, peppers, tomatoes, and strawberry plants. In the middle of it all was a feminine figure covered in nondescript denim and headgearing in a garden straw which made her look like a descending parachute. We were in process of hurrying past when an unmistakably familiar voice summoned from under the billowy brim.

"Pete" it directed to the gardener who was grubbing in the radish row, "come here and see if you don't think these carrots need more Vitamin B."

Then the hat brim flopped up and we were confronted with Miss Astor's warm smile and friendly recognition from her beautifully set eyes. She gesticulated a greeting with mud-spattered, gloved hands and plunged right into an explanation.

"I've just bought 77 acres near Indio and I'm planning on making them a paying investment by raising corn, onions, and other vegetables. There are some sugar beets on the place already. My enthusiasm about the project ran so high I couldn't wait for the ranch to become organized, so I started growing things here on this 40 by 16 plot. Call it an experimental garden, if you wish, but it's really practical and seeds of fun. I've hired a soil tester to be sure that plenty of calcium, iron, and other essentials are reaching my miniature truck farm. We've already had beans and radishes for our table."

By this time our previous notions of Miss Astor had undergone some radical changes. A few moments later when talk shifted to the "Hollywood Showcase" program of which she is mistress of ceremonies, we were convinced that she is a down to earth person in more ways than agriculturally.

"That show's my baby," she said beamingly. "I really have a good time doing it. I suppose it's just the 'ham' in me that responds so overwhelmingly to the footlights and real audience which are parts of the 'Showcase' broadcast. The very set-up, the mere fact that once a line is read it's irrevocable and not subject to retake like the movies, gives the show a nervy quality and definitely adds zest to my performance."

"But," she continued eagerly, "my own acting brings only a fraction of the satisfaction. You see, each week we bring to the microphone a small group of promising young professionals who need perhaps just the boost of a "Showcase" appearance to receive that prayed-for nod from fame. Preliminary eliminations precede air time. From those chosen for the program, a winner is decided by vote of a studio jury, selected by throwing a dozen ping pong balls into the audience."

Miss Astor went on to explain that the Orpheum Theater books one of the performers each week and that the jury-adjudged "best performer" is rewarded with the opportunity of a return engagement on the "Showcase" program. As aftermath of an appearance, Bob Bradley landed a berth as sustaining vocalist at CBS, Songstress Ardis Davis was signed by the Light Opera association, Violinist Dorothy Wade was invited to participate in the Pasadena Bach festival, and several others found niches for which they had been yearning.

RADIO LIFE BIOGRAPHY  
**MERCY ON US!**  
**McCAMBRIDGE**  
**ON THE LOOSE**

AFTER a breathless half-hour with Mercedes McCambridge the other day in the Artist's Corridor at NBC's swanky Radio City on Sunset and Vine, I was convinced that the radio summer is going to be one hectic scramble to keep up with this small town dramatic-comedy-Firebrand who has assumed the role of "Judy Jones" in "This Is Judy Jones," the new 9:30 p. m. Tuesday NBC-Red (KFI) show that started off last week.

This engaging daughter of a professional singer and a ticket vending railroad passenger agent is affectionately dubbed "Merxy"—but it's obvious she has shown herself none in driving up the airplanes from Mundelein College in 1936 to a top-ranking radio star in 1941. At Mundelein one day she was asked to read four solo lines in a verse speaking competition. Half an hour later she was signed for a regular role in the serial, "Dan Harding's Wife." She was a junior then. Her senior year was spent dashing between studios and the Mundelein campus. In June, 1937, she won the Golden Rose, annual drama award, and a B. A. degree.

"I made my dramatic debut attending country school in Kinsman, Ill.," Merxy said modestly.

"As a freshman at Rosary College, River Forest, Ill., I won a scholarship to Mundelein."

In August, 1939, Merxy swept a

score of suitors out of the front hall and played the star role in a surprise wedding. Her leading man is Bill Fifiield, author of numerous radio thrillers.

Vivacious brunette, Irish and lovely, she is as energetic as a colt, her activities ranging from riding and swimming to collecting penguin models. She cherishes an Irish lace handkerchief given her by the Irish author, Shane Leslie, and she hates political speeches and green neckties. When and if she raises a family she wants it to be made up of boys who'll grow up to be football players, firemen and policemen.

In the studios she's nervous for the first few minutes of the broadcast and she never pictures the audience. It makes things too complicated.

Last week as Judy, she launched into a series of adventures which promise to keep her family and friends on guard. Simple plans for a vacation became momentous when Judy took hold. Her search for a camp named "Cat Rack," though it started quietly, will generate plenty of excitement for her and her best friends, Junior Sheldon and Betz Bowman.

Mercedes, as Judy, works as a model, is a good right hand for the eccentric Mr. Creighton Leighton, fashion designer. Junior Sheldon, with whom Judy has been in love since grammar school days, is roled by Ben Alexander, and Betz Bowman, who is not as dumb as she sounds, is played by Marvel Melinis.

Adults who try to keep up with Judy and her gang are Mrs. Jones (Betty Wilbur), Mr. Peterson, (Elliott Lewis) the man next door whose heart beats faster whenever he sees Judy's widowed mother, and Mr. Creighton Leighton (Wally Maher), Judy's eccentric, long-suffering boss.

But during the remainder of the series of Tuesday evening broadcasts, Judy will be in evidence directing activities of her active gang. The story is written especially for radio by Myron Dutton.

## Background of A Woman In White

"WOMAN IN WHITE," the long-popular serial from the pen of Irna Phillips, recognized as radio's most successful serial dramatist, was introduced to network listeners more than three years ago and has been heard ever since, every day, Mondays through Fridays.

In the introductory chapters listeners met Karen Adams, the title character, just as she was graduating from nurse's training. They heard the stirring pledge: "With loyalty will I endeavor to aid the physician in his work and devote myself to the welfare of those committed to my care." They felt Karen's deep resolve to do her utmost in keeping this pledge.

In writing "Woman in White" and its forerunner, "Road of Life," which touch many phases of the lives of those in the medical profession, Irna Phillips was the first to feature nurses and doctors as heroines and heroes of the airplanes. Actual case histories are followed in the action of the serials. Miss Phillips' programs have become popular because she has felt great responsibility in presenting an ever true picture of the service given to humanity by nurses and doctors.

During the years Karen Adams' story has been dramatized, her career has progressed normally from starting out as a nurse and then marrying an able young doctor, Dr. Kirk Harding. Shortly after her marriage, which was a happy one, she became troubled by a series of events which involved her husband in a past romance with her brother's bride. Unverified reports, undeclared revelations of the situation, led Karen into many unhappy suppositions and finally into leaving her husband.

Subsequently, Karen went to the west coast from her home in Chicago. She took a private nursing assignment, and later returned to Chicago. Friends sought to effect a reconciliation between Karen and her husband. However, both were hurt and stubborn and misunderstandings greatly grew. Karen's life is at this point now. It is hoped that she can find happiness in her marriage to Dr. Harding because they love each other. Pride and hurt misunderstandings could continue, however, and make their lives tragic.

Outstanding members of the cast are Betty Lou Gerson as Karen Adams Harding; Arthur Jacobson as her husband, Dr. Kirk Harding; Harry Elders as John Adams; Lesley Woods as Janet Munson Adams; Bob Griffin as Crandall Boone; Judith Lowry and Edward Firestone, Jr., as Granny and Timothy Barnes. The program is produced and directed for broadcast by Carl Wester & Company in Chicago from the studios of WBBM-CBS.

Betty Lou Gerson, one of the most talented actresses in Chicago radioland, is also one of the most beautiful. She is from Birmingham, Ala., and first came to Chicago to study dramatics at the Goodman Theatre School.

**B**EAKY-NOSED, full-lipped, balding is Xavier Cugat who for rhythm conscious North Americans has brought torrid staccato music in full melodic flood from West to East, from fir-clad north, to magnolia-odored South.

With his wife, Mexican-born Carmen Castillo, Lina Romay and Miguelito Valdez as featured singers, he airs from NBC's Los Angeles KFI in time parallel to Rudolph Vallee, feminine heart-throb baritone and sax-famed singer, who air-casts at 6 p. m. Thursdays from KECA, NBC Blue Net station.

Cugat's musical appeal is to all ages, the preponderance of course

to collegiate youngsters who, minus the varicosities of age, lime-laden joints and lumbagoic signs of approaching age, find in his music an outlet for coltish spirit, a natural love of balance and cadence with the right girl in arms.

To elders he brings memorable re-kindling of more fertile yesterdays, brings a bright musically warmed interlude in daily air-diets.

Last week Cugat earned a crown, was regally acclaimed by Billboard magazine as broadcaster of the best Latin American music.

To 171 editors of College periodicals Billboard addressed this query:

**"Does your campus have any particular favorite orchestras specializing in this type of music, and if so, who?"**

The answers were no surprise to those who know Cugat music, his recordings and personal appearances at New York's Waldorf-Astoria. Cugat romped home winner by a considerable margin, the total number of votes cast for his competitors not equaling his plurality! In winning, Cugat repeated his performance of a year ago when he also showed on top.

Latin-American music is continuing to spread its influence far and wide on America's dance horizon. Happy is Cugat's sponsor, who has renewed his contract, the program to run through the summer under title of "Cugat Rumba Revue."

A year ago campus caperers were apathetic to the rumba, the conga. Since, they have sharply reversed, a majority of collegiate prom-trotters now favoring the South American musical way.

Of editors questioned 63 of 171 went all-out for Cugat music, 34 revealed a growing interest in his rhythms. With the 34—whose favor is on the increase—added to the 63 already sold on the music, the change from last year's attitude was more respect-commanding. Year ago majority thumbed down Latin-American music in favor of jitterbug routines.

Cugat advances two reasons for sudden heightening of affections. One is widespread popularity of south-of-the-border tunes like "Frenesi," "Perfidia," and "Amapola," the other: the newly bestowed attention on our neighboring republics in an effort to foster good will.

ON Tuesday evening not long ago, a famous Metropolitan Opera tenor sang a duet over the air with a blind girl who had won a scholarship in singing at the Baltimore Conservatory of Music.

The opera star said that he had reason to be deeply grateful to those who cannot see, for, but for a little blind girl, he might not have been a singer.

This moving incident happened on the CBS presentation, "We, the People," which, with its mingling of drama and comedy, invariably springs surprises, even on the program's able conductor, Gabriel Heatter, and others in radio's inner circle.

All stories on this broadcast are drawn from life—true experiences of the people who tell them—incidents that occur to persons in widely separated parts of the earth who are brought together within the same four walls.

The majority of these nutshell dramas and comedies of life are brought to the attention of a group known as the Listeners' Committee, by letters received either from the persons involved or from those who have learned about the stories. Other interludes are contributed through the initiative of the committee, which, incidentally, is composed of two men and three women—a business man, a publisher, a housewife, a business woman, and one holding a civil service post.

Part of one broadcast was switched to London, where, under guidance of Columbia's chief European correspondent, Edward R. Murrow, people in London told people over here about experiences in war's front line.

Not only was Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox heard on "We, the People," but in the course of the same broadcast the commander of Uncle Sam's battleship, Wyoming, Captain Patterson, contributed to information about our fighting sea forces.

Henrietta Crossman, the distinguished actress and grandniece of Stephen Foster, told a charming story about the great song composer. Said Miss Crossman: "Although Uncle Stephen tried his best, he could not keep away from writing songs. A music publisher in the early days heard about him and asked if he could see one of Uncle Stephen's songs. 'Sure,' said the composer, 'and what's more, you can have it.'

"Two days later he received a letter from the publisher and was highly excited when he showed his mother two \$50 bills. From that moment, bookkeeping was tossed aside. That first song was 'Oh! Susanna.' It was written in 1848—the year gold was discovered in California. By 1849, the trails across the plains were filled with covered wagons, and at night those pioneers sat around camp fires singing, 'Oh! Susanna.'

"Uncle Stephen loved the South best of all. In New York later he harked back to that happy scene and he began to hum the tune that was to be 'My Old Kentucky Home.' But his greatest song was written about the lovely river that flowed past his home—the Monongahela. That name was too long. So, after looking over the rivers in America, he de-

ecided to call it after one in Florida, 'The Swanee River.'

Lauritz Melchior, the world's greatest Wagnerian tenor, was the man who sang the duet with the blind Ruth Welles. Mr. Melchior told this story:

"I would never have been a singer if it had not been for a little blind girl. When I was a small boy back in Denmark, I had no thought of being a singer. I had a little sister who was blind and often my parents asked me to take her to the opera. At the opera in Copenhagen they had a very nice custom of admitting blind people to the opera free of charge. But since the blind cannot see, there was no reason for them to sit out in front. Instead they were seated in a little room under the stage where they could hear the music just as well.

"Sitting with my sister, I had to pic-

ture for myself what was happening on the stage, just as if I, too, were blind. I had to imagine from the singers' voices what gestures they were making, what expressions they had on their faces. Actually, I learned to understand music better than if I had seen the singers.

"By the time I had graduated from school, I had made up my mind to be an opera singer. When I was 21, I was given an audition at the Royal Opera House. The judges accepted me. But my career really started in that little room under the stage with my sister and other blind people. Some weeks ago I heard a young blind singer named Ruth Welles. She sang for me—sang so beautifully that I asked her to come here tonight to tell you her story."

Miss Welles told of having been born blind, like Melchior's sister. As a young-

ster, she would pretend to be on the stage, singing in the back room of her father's grocery store in Baltimore. She resolved to be a singer, but her family could not afford to pay for singing lessons. Ruth, therefore, learned to be a typist. At 20, she won a scholarship in singing at the Baltimore Conservatory of Music. She studied there for four years and a year ago she came to New York to discover greater opportunity for singing engagements.

Armed with tools, Professor Prince of William Jewell College decided to repair a hole in a garret. He crawled through a trap-door in the bedroom to the attic. His wife heard him busy sawing and hammering for some time, and as she had several guests coming for dinner, she did not notice how long her husband was taking on the job. His anguish was affecting and people on the stage and in the audience wept. Fifteen minutes before the repeat show, Mr. Heatter was informed of a telephone call from an Alabama newspaper saying that a woman who believed she was Mr. X's sister was sure she had recognized the voice of her brother. It was eventually discovered that the woman was right. The patient was W. H. Lawrence of Birmingham, Ala.

RADIO'S INCOME FOR 1940: CBS time sales, \$31,137,823—net profit, \$5,006,634. . . . NBC time sales, \$37,137,823—net profit, \$3,918,722. . . . Mutual time sales \$3,600,161—net loss, \$39,712.

Thus for 1940 did the three major United States networks reveal their earning positions. The figures were released

last week as the Senate's Interstate Commerce Commission heard arguments paving way for Congressional investigation of Communist-suspected Federal Communications Commission.

The three leaders sold approximately half of all time sold by radio during the year, took 5% of the net profits earned throughout the land.

Making the industry happier was the fact that operators in the red dropped to 187 as against 1939's depressing 227 who failed to make money.

While Mutual came out in the crimson there was no clucking of sympathy by CBS and NBC, both ired by fact Mutual sides against them too often and willingly on matters—like FCC rulings—that tend to destroy or impair network efficiency. No sympathy was needed. Mutual is a co-operative organization, interested in profit-making for member stations, not for itself as a management organization.

Inwardly we admired, "That's very swell of you, Miss Astor. You haven't forgotten that you were only 14 when you started banging on fame's portal and how your fists were bruised before the doors finally swung open. Although you've been an actress for 21 years, you're still young enough to share these youngsters' sympathies yet experienced and influential enough to help the talent you're unearthing. This program is giving you honest-to-goodness heart satisfaction that makes you glow when you simply talk about it."

"How old is daughter Marilyn, now, and what does she think of your show?" we queried in deference to an urge to "talk family."

"Marilyn's nine," she replied, "but she's usually in bed when 'Showcase' is aired. If a special dispensation allows her to listen, she exercises childhood's prerogative of utter candor and is just as apt as not to observe the following morning, 'Mummy, it didn't sound like you last night. Of course you were good, but So-and-So was swell.'"

These dramatic evaluations may be emanating from a future light of screen and radio, although as yet Marilyn has indicated no urgent desire to emulate her mother. her system (she says it "hurts like indigestion" until she does and her diagnosis must be correct for she's had a story in both Saturday Evening Post and Collier's); in August she will start "The Gay Sisters" with Bette Davis; and every Tuesday at 8:30 p. m. she will devote extra special attention to her "baby," "Hollywood Showcase."

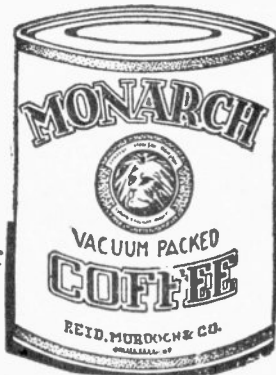

## Chef Milani's Sunday Dinner

### For Eight Persons

Puree of White Bean Soup Allemande  
 Celery - Olives - Radishes  
 Wilson Tender Made Ham Glace, Champagne Sauce  
 Spinach in Cream  
 Potatoes au Gratin  
 Wine Jelly with Whipped Cream  
 Assorted Cakes  
 Coffee

### Recipe for Wilson Ham Glace, Champagne Sauce

1 Wilson Tendermade Ham, 10 lbs.  
 1 lb. powdered sugar  
 1 pint cooking sherry wine, Royal Feast  
 2 bunches watercress  
 4 ounces sugar  
 2 glasses white wine vinegar (Lady's Choice)  
 1½ pints Madere sauce

Put Wilson Ham in a baking pan, and put to bake in oven at 100 degrees F for 5 minutes to the pound. Then sprinkle the top with 1 lb. of powdered sugar and pour in the bottom of the baking pan, 1 pint of cooking Royal Feast Sherry Wine, set in the oven and let roast until brown. Serve on a platter garnished with watercress. Serve champagne sauce separate.

### Recipe for Champagne Sauce

Put the 4 ounces of sugar in a casserole and cook to a brown caramel color, but be careful not to burn. Then add the white wine vinegar and boil until nearly dry. Then add the 1½ pints of Madere sauce, and boil for 10 minutes. Strain and serve with ham.

### Recipe for Madere Sauce

Put in a saucepan 1 pint of sherry wine, and reduce one-half over fire. Add 1½ cups of brown gravy, boil for 10 minutes, and add some Madeira wine to make 1½ pints, before serving.

### Recipe for Potatoes au Gratin

2 lbs. potatoes, boiled and hashed  
 ¼ lb. butter  
 ½ pint cream  
 1 cup parmesan cheese  
 Salt and pepper

Fill a shallow buttered dish with hashed potatoes, season with salt and pepper mixed with cream. Sprinkle the top with cheese and put the rest of the butter on top and bake in oven until brown.

### Recipe for Wine Jelly with Whipped Cream

2 ounces gelatine, plain  
 1 qt. water  
 ½ lb. sugar  
 The rind and juice of 3 lemons  
 The juice of 2 oranges  
 1 piece cinnamon stick  
 3 egg whites, Lynden brand  
 1 glassful white port wine, Royal Feast  
 1 flannel jelly bag  
 3 cloves

Dissolve the gelatine in the water, add the sugar, the rind and the juice of the lemons, the orange juice, the cinnamon, and the cloves. Stir well and put on the fire to boil. Then stir in quickly the egg whites, partly beaten, and boil again. Then take off the fire and strain through the jelly bag. Add the glassful of white port. Mix well. Pour in 8 individual jelly moulds and put on ice until firm. To remove the jelly, dip the moulds in hot water and turn out on a cold dish. Serve with whipped cream.

## Radio Life Consumers' Club

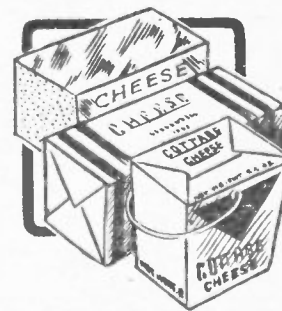
**KITCHEN KURIOSITIES**—Medicine and cookery were once closely related. Ice has the faculty of washing and purifying itself continuously. Mint has been thought to prevent hiccups. Roasted storks and swans were once a great delicacy. In England, certain taxes used to be paid with vinegar and pepper. In this country we use up about a thousand dollars worth of sugar a minute. The Romans once believed that lentil soup made one mild.

Other oddities in this line are the fact that women require more food than men, but generally use less; that a toastmaster was originally one who ate the toast in a loving cup; that "Have you eaten your rice today?" is a Chinese greeting; and that the Emperor Frederick II used sugar flavored with violets.

\* \* \* \* \*

**CHEESE FACTS**—Some of our recipes call for cheese this week so perhaps the following information will be of interest. In the first place, it takes about ten pounds of milk to make one

pound of cheese. Then, when the cheese is made, it contains different quantities of milk fat, according to its kind. Thus, American cheese runs about 33% milk fat; Gruyere, about 29%; Parmesan, 19%; Cream, 63%; and Roquefort, 33%. Others are Stilton with 35%, Cheddar with 34%, Camembert with 30%, Brie with 25%, Gorgonzola with 43%, and Edam, also with 30%.



Cheese was probably discovered before butter, thanks to the evaporation of sour milk. It often gives as much as one and a half times the nourishment in beef, and the secrets

of making some of the rarer varieties used to be handed down from father to son, or perhaps mother to daughter.

Many cheeses take the names of the towns where they originate and are very hard to duplicate, especially if particularly "high" in flavor or smell. Some require unusual care, such as Roquefort, which must be ripened in limestone caves at a temperature just ten degrees above freezing; or Gorgonzola, which must be constantly turned and pressed on a salt-covered surface.

\* \* \* \* \*

**TABLE SETTING POINTERS**—It's all right to put the cocktail glass on a small plate, if you set the small plate on a service plate. The bread-and-butter plate, of course, should always remain on the table until after the salad course. All forks, except tiny ones, should be set at the left of the service, the rest of the tools going to the right; and if you're in doubt about where to set the napkins, the usual place is neatly under the forks.

\* \* \* \* \*

**MAKING A CAKE WITHOUT AN OVEN**—All you need instead of an oven is a pressure-cooker. A cake can do very nicely in a pressure-cooker, and if you cover it with frosting as soon as it's done, few people will know the difference.

Why bother to make one this way instead of the other way? Well, one good reason is that it will not lose moisture by evaporation, and should therefore keep better.

**VITAMINOTES**—Everybody is talking about vitamins these days, and if a food hasn't got them, manufacturers rack their brains to find some way to get them in. For this reason, we feel you may be interested in some natural vitamin sources that aren't advertised as much as they might be.

The chief vitamins are A, B, C, D, and G. Some excellent sources for A are carrots, escarole, kale, parsley, pimento, sweet potatoes, spinach, turnip greens, water cress, liver, butter, whole milk cheese, whole milk, eggs, and cream. For B, the best sources are yeast, avocados, whole wheat bread and flour, and embryo wheat. C is best found in raw cabbage, parsley, green peas, green peppers, pimentos, rutabagas, tomatoes, turnip greens, water cress, cantaloupes, grapefruit, lemons, oranges, raspberries, strawberries and watermelon. D, on the other hand, is one of the hardest of vitamins to get in food. However, if you need it you'll find it in oysters, sardines, butter, cream, whole milk and egg yolks. As for G, some of the best sources are asparagus, beet greens, kale, spinach, yeast, heart, kidney, liver, buttermilk, cream, ice cream, whole milk and eggs.

## CHEF MILANI'S RECIPES WITH CHEESE

### Recipe for Special Cheese for Sandwiches

3 Camembert cheeses                      ½ lb. butter  
¼ lb. Roquefort cheese                2 lbs. ps. flour, sifted  
1 pint good cream

Cook all the ingredients until melted, and all mixed. Strain through a cheese cloth. Put in a vessel and allow to cool. This cheese will keep for two weeks, and it's delicious for sandwiches or for celery on branch or for salads.

### Recipe for Souffle au Fromage

1 pint milk                                      6 eggs, Lynden Brand  
¼ lb. butter                                    ¼ lb. parmesan cheese  
¼ lb. flour, sifted                            Salt and pepper

Heat the milk in a double boiler. Mix butter and flour working them well together. Then add the boiling milk and cook until it thickens. Remove from the fire, add the yolks of the eggs, whipping slightly. Then add the parmesan cheese, season with salt and pepper, and stir in the white of the eggs, which you have beaten dry. Put into large or individual buttered moulds, sprinkle with cheese, and bake for twenty minutes at 375 degrees.

### Recipe for Cheese and Egg Dish Torinese

1½ cups Swiss cheese, chopped fine  
1 pint milk  
6½ lbs. butter  
4 egg yolks, Lynden Brand

Soak the cheese in the milk for 2 hours. Put the butter in a saucepan. When it begins to color, add the cheese with two lbs. of the milk, in which it has soaked. The mixture is stirred continuously, but should never boil. When the cheese is completely dissolved, the saucepan is removed from the fire and the egg yolks are mixed in. Then replace the saucepan on the fire, stir the mixture again well, and as soon as it is of the consistency of thick cream, serve.

New Potatoes

#### Recipe for Breast of Lamb en Casserole

3 lb. breast of lamb  
4 slices Wilson's Ol' Fashund Bacon

Now make a cream sauce by putting into a sauce pan 1½ lbs. of butter, 1½ lbs. of flour. When blended together, pour 1½ cups of hot milk and let cook for 5 minutes, stirring all the time. Then strain the sauce through a sieve and pour onto the fish. Let bake for 10 more minutes and then serve.

Kate Smith show for an audition. "Your acting," observed the producer, "is a bit too raw." "It shouldn't be," retorted the actor, "it's been roasted enough!" . . . An actress applied to Bert Lytell, emcee of NBC's "Star Spangled Theater" show for an audition. # Music In Wax

Duchin-Gershwin, Columbia Records Set C-52.

PERHAPS Oscar Levant is the accepted impresario of the work of George Gershwin but one is prone to place the indefatigable Oscar within the realm of Gershwin's heavier, more technical efforts, to leave the composer's lighter melodies open to those with or without ear or taste, to romp through the bars with complete abandon.

Eddy Duchin, as is suspected by the constant reiteration in these columns, is as pleasing a popular pianist as can be

found. "Gershwin wrote in a soft, subtle way." Eddy Duchin plays in a like manner.

There are clear ringing, singing, notes. Expected, of course, as most of us are familiar with the melodies. There are hesitations which arouse and delight. It is smart, sophisticated playing of music that also continues to be smart and sophisticated. It serves to remind us of such delightful theatrics as "Girl Crazy," "Funny Face," "Oh, Kay," "Lady Be Good," and "Porgy & Bess." All of which more or less reminds us of an era which seems

after only a few short years, to be in the dim past, but which is recalled with fresh enthusiasm in remembrance of the gayety then.

Columbia calls this DUCHIN-GERSHWIN combination a "natural." There is a lot to be said for that contention.

## Radiation-- An Editorial

A JESUIT priest and scholar, by name of Athanasius Kircher, invented broadcasting in the 17th century—so that intrigued listeners in court could hear from a small room what was being said in the central court. Kircher's system was a series of funnels, the bell-like ends of which gave out on central meeting places, from which voices were funneled up into family quarters.

But, long before Kircher struggled with giant trumpets—the point and purpose of broadcasting had taken form. In the living voice! Before history first was scratched on stone, the voice had grooved an effortless, instant path into the mind. That path is regrooved in every child today—long before he seeks any other communication with the world. And it grows with the adult. We did not need radio to discover this. Here is what Pliny, the younger, said, more than 1800 years ago: "We are more affected by words we hear, for though what we read in books may be more pointed, there is something about the voice that makes a deeper impression on the mind."

The truth of Pliny's shrewd observation has been amply confirmed in many laboratories of modern science.

Modern radio is a leaven and a bond between races and social groups. Treasured as a medium of social growth and humane development, and honestly conducted, it will do more to aid the plight of a humanity antagonistic to its various parts and sections than will any other medium of communication of ideas and information.

In America radio is still free. Americans should remember that—but should not take lightly a freedom that even now is threatened by dictatorial sycophants of the Federal Communications Commission.

If we are concerned with the menace of Hitlerism in America, might it not be a good task for patriots to clean out of their political nests the ugly writhings that have attacked—not radio merely—but a fundamental American principle of life—the right to be heard and to listen.
