

I was sorry to hear Vic and Sade go off the air. They were so human. We need more comedy. Things to make us laugh in spite of ourselves. God knows we are depressed enough with real troubles, without listening to things out of a story.

I have one son in the European theater of war, who was home on furlough only once since he went into service in April, 1942; one son in the Navy, now in the Pacific area, who went in during December of 1941 and who was home just once; and one son who went in the Army in August, 1942, and who never has had a furlough, as he was shipped out after six weeks basic. He is now in the Philippines. I haven't heard from any of my boys since the last of October.

I'm not the only one in the same predicament. We women who are kept at home because of younger children certainly deserve more in the way of entertainment than that which radio puts out in the way of "soap box operas." Goodness knows we need something to keep up our spirits. We really need the radio to keep us from thinking too much about ourselves and our own problems.

Pleasant Misunderstanding

IT ALL HAPPENED because I didn't understand a phrase and I'd have died rather than admit that with all my years in the show business, I'd never come across a radio phrase," said Paula Stone, daughter of Fred Stone and star of the new Kreml program "Paula Stone and Phil Brito."

It seems that a local New York station had an airwave letter to servicemen entitled "Broadway Beam." Once a week local gossip of Broadway was transmitted to boys in army camps via the kilocycles. When the commentator was drafted, Paula was asked to take over. She did and made so great a success of it that the program director asked her if she'd write and comment on a show of her own "across the board."

To Paula Stone "across the board" meant informal chatter, a round-table—anything but "six shows a week"—which is the radio definition for this cryptic phrase. When she discovered what it meant, it was too late to retract—so on she went—six times a week, to talk of Hollywood, the theater and life behind the scenes.

Puzzle Pieces Fit

Then—all her interests—all her

ambitions—and all her experience fell into place like the pieces of a jig-saw puzzle. Paula's knowledge of "the marriage of voices" helped her vary her interviews and pitch her voice to that of her guest. Among the 500 or more celebrities who appeared on her program were Shirley Temple, Brian Aherne, Lana Turner, Betty Grable—all of whom she had come to know personally through the years in Hollywood. Her knowledge of breath control, learned by years of singing lessons, made it possible to stand the strain of so many hours at the microphone. And the writing she'd always wanted to do—well, six programs a week requires someone who honestly loves to write.

When the executives at Erwin Wasey, who handle the Kreml account, heard Paula Stone on her own program, they knew they'd found just what they wanted for their new Mutual network program. She was signed with the proviso that she collaborate with Albert Miller on the scripts and set the guests.

"It's just the kind of a program I've always wanted," says Paula Stone. And we've a hunch that with guests like Ed Wynn, Judy Garland, Victor Jory and Hildegard, it will be just the kind of a program Mutual listeners will want, too.

It's a routine flight, 14,000 above the Pacific, and two officers in the control cockpit of a B-25 bomber are listening to NBC's "Fibber McGee and Molly." (KFI, Tuesday nights at 6:30). Suddenly the pilot confides to his co-pilot, "that's my uncle, Beulah."

The co-pilot thinks his chief is having hallucinations. But, that's not the case.

That co-pilot isn't the only one who has been fooled by Marlin—or Beulah's—air appearances. Ever since the character has been on the McGee show the fan mail has poured in. Listeners all over the country have wanted their bets settled.

ites, I absolutely refused to burlesque them to make them funny. Instead, I listened to old Edison cylinder records by the dozens—recordings made by Anna Held, Maggie Kline, Eva Tanguay and others. I conferred with all the old-timers I could find—singers, theatrical managers, stagehands—and unearthed every bit of information I could about the performers of the turn-of-the-century. If my songs are funny, it's because our musical values have changed, and they're funny for the same reason that an old dress with fourteen petticoats and a bustle would be funny if worn today."

Laryngitis Helps

Beatrice has been a professional actress since she was six, and her theatrical career has included stock, vaudeville, the legitimate stage and musical comedy. Then, when she was seriously preparing for a career in operetta, she suddenly developed a severe case of laryngitis and the doctor ruled "no singing" for at least a year.

"I often wonder, now, what would have happened if I'd obeyed the doctor's orders," Beatrice laughed. "As it was, I went right on singing, and my voice got raspy and raspy, and pretty soon no operetta director would even have listened to me, much less given me a part."

Despite the fact that ignoring the doctor is not a doctrine she advocates for others, Beatrice admits that it is probably the luckiest thing that ever happened to her. Because when she discovered that she had an entirely new type of voice, she decided to capitalize on it. During her future engagements she began changing the style of her numbers and developing them for comedy expression. And when she sang her first old-time song at Billy Rose's Diamond Horseshoe in New York she was an instant sensation.

Today, when she's not on tour or in Hollywood, Beatrice and her husband, Sylvan Green, live in a 200-year-old house one and a half miles from the village of Closter, N. J. "It's probably the only house in the district that George Washington never slept in," the singing comedienne says. "When we moved in five years we had a lot of remodeling to do, and since we only had two and a half rooms of furniture for a 10-room house, we really rattled around like peas in a pod."

Regular Museum

Today, the house is furnished in a combination of early American and Victorian, and much of its furniture and bric-a-brac was sent to Beatrice by her fans. So many of these old-fashioned gifts have come in that the NBC star had to build a special room in her barn to serve as a museum.

Away from the microphone, Beatrice's slim figure is usually clad in slacks or sports clothes. Her curly brown hair is short and fluffy, giving her a pixie-like appearance that is accentuated by her stature—she is just five feet tall. An excellent cook, she has a collection of recipes from all over the world, and likes nothing better than to try out new dishes on her husband. She was the first volunteer firewoman in the country, and is an honorary sergeant in the Women's Marine Corps.

It's a completely different Beatrice, however, who dons the satins and furbelows of the mauve decade and steps in front of the NBC microphone for her "Gaslight Gayeties" broadcasts. Gone is the self-sufficient, modern young woman, and in her place is a befeathered, fluttering soubrette who might well have been the toast of grandfather's day. "Sure it makes me seem older," she laughs, "but what's a couple of decades, anyway? When people stop thinking I'm old enough to be their grandmother, that's when I'll start worrying."

"McCloskey says, 'I'll go you,' then the seconds got in place.

And the fighters started in to decore each other's face!"

Then, before we take leave of the "Gaslight Gayeties" Variety Hall, little "Beasy" Kay, "Mikie" O'Shea, and Bill Days of the Rockaway Four take us back to the little red schoolhouse, where we find comical John Brown as the teacher with his hands full.

Brown: Michael, stop that! You have a knack for getting in trouble—and, believe me, I'd like to break your *knack!*

O'Shea: C'mon, Beasy, gimme a little kiss, huh?

Kay: Now, Mikey, none of your lip.

Parents, "Aunt Vinnie"

Then there's "Mom" and "Dad." Everyone who has listened to "Book-ends" has heard Ted's beautiful tribute each year to his mother on her birthday, and also to his Dad, retired minister who now owns a candy factory in Independence, Missouri. In Glendale, California, live loveable "Aunt Vinnie" who, Ted says, always feeds him too much when he's trying hard to wear his belt a couple of notches shorter, and "Aunt Flo," past 80, who decided after the bombing of Pearl Harbor that she'd raise a cactus garden "for the Japs to fall into" if they came over!

to Hollywood from the Broadway stage to be Barbara Stanwyck's leading man in "Lady of Burlesque." He has been here two years, starred in eight pictures, and is now making his mark in radio as the singing, clowning emcee of NBC's "Gaslight Gayeties."

He is all-over Irish, even to the point of having been born on March 17. That was thirty-nine years ago in a town near Hartford, Connecticut. When he was in the fifth grade, he had to quit school and go to work because his family was so poor. He's been in show business since he was fourteen, but between bookings, he's been everything from a bellhop to a private detective. He is a veteran of New York radio, having appeared on almost every leading East coast airshow, including "Gangbusters," "Mr. District Attorney," "We, the People," the Kate Smith Hour, and daytime serials.

A "Mug" Expert

Who's a Sissy?

Poetry-Reader Malone, Accused Of Being a "Panty-Waist," Dons Blue's War Correspondent Garb

FROM A READER of poetry for nearly fifteen years to a war correspondent roaming bomb-shattered areas in the European theater of operations—that's what the war and 1944 have done to one young American known and loved by millions across these United States.

Fifteen years ago, in a studio at Kansas City's CBS station, KMBC, an agitated announcer, confronted with ten minutes of air time and nothing to fill it, was talking fast and insistently to a slim blond young man.

"Get in there, Alden!" he urged. "Here—read some poetry!" and he seized a book from the office shelf and thrust it into unwilling hands. "Okay," the victim finally agreed, "but don't you dare use my name! I don't want to be labeled a sissy the rest of my life!"

Alden Russell, fresh out of William Jewell College, stepped up to the mike, said "Hello there" in a friendly, unruffled voice and proceeded to read a few poems and chat informally with his unseen listeners while the announcer added a subdued background of piano music.

At the close of the unrehearsed

ten minutes the announcer, under a warning frown from the reader of poetry, ad libbed glibly: "Ladies and gentlemen, you have been visiting between the bookends with — Ted Malone!"

That announcer was Hugh Studebaker, known nationally in radio today, and of course the name Ted Malone needs no introduction. "It was the first name that popped into my head," Hugh said afterwards.

Heard Nationally

That ten-minute initial broadcast of "Between the Bookends" brought an avalanche of mail and telephone calls, and Arthur Church, vice-president and general manager of KMBC, at once made it a regular daily quarter-hour feature. Three years later it was sent one day a week coast-to-coast. Fan mail poured in from every corner of the nation and before another year had passed, Ted Malone's appealing voice was being heard on the coast-to-coast network five days a week.

In October, 1935, Ted moved to New York, established himself in the offices formerly occupied by radio's original "Voice of Experience," Sayle Taylor, acquired three full-time sec-



WHAT GOES ON behind the scenes in the production of a top-flight dramatic thrill show such as CBS' "Suspense"? Because Bill Spier, bearded guiding genius of the popular program, believes in realism above all, studio audiences are not allowed at the broadcast, and the listener's knowledge of the behind-the-mike scene at a "Suspense" airing is limited to the word-pictures we may draw from those who have a contributing part to play in the program's presentation — producer Spier, engineer Robert Anderson, soundman Berne Surrey, composer Lucian Moraweck, conductor Lud Gluskin, and Maxine Anderson, agency girl in charge of casting for the show.

Spier, winner of Radio Life's 1944 Distinguished Achievement Award for dramatic radio production, is enthusiastically praised by his "Suspense" co-workers for his knowledge and full appreciation of their individual spheres of endeavor.

"He knows *everything* about music," composer Moraweck exclaimed. "Sometimes, even more than the musician!"

Spier and Moraweck confer over the show's script each week to plot an original musical score appropriate to the mood of the play. "Moraweck's music," conductor Lud Gluskin pointed out to us, "is unusual and atmospheric. It is written to enhance the theme of the drama; often, a haunting part of it identifies one character or one incident in the play. Every portion of the score has a function to perform."

Orchestra Often Segregated

Unless the script calls for an augmented orchestra, Gluskin works with sixteen pieces. Sometimes, when a better show will result from it, the orchestra is placed in another studio than that in which the dramatic cast is working. At all times, with but one exception, the orchestra is isolated from the cast by a screen. The one exception was Lena Horne's appearance on the program, when the script called for her to work directly with the orchestra for two song numbers.

"Stars ask to be on the 'Suspense' show," Maxine Anderson informed us. They love to work with Bill

Spier. He gives them the chance to dig their teeth into a role.

"They like the no-audience rule," Miss Anderson went on to explain. "It allows them to lose themselves completely in their characterizations. When Cary Grant comes to the 'Suspense' microphone, he acts all over the place!"

Because of restrictions in his screen contract, Grant can make only a limited number of radio appearances each year. With this in mind, he chooses his air stints wisely and with utmost discrimination.

"That is why it's so gratifying," said producer Spier, "to know that Cary has expressed the wish to do all of his radio appearances on 'Suspense.'"

Orson Welles, a good friend of Spier, appears frequently at the "Suspense" microphone. Charles Laughton, Ida Lupino, Agnes Moorehead and other performers of equal caliber have appeared on the program three times and more. Miss Moorehead is continually requested to repeat her gripping portrayal of the panic-stricken woman in "Sorry, Wrong Number."

Names not often heard on the air-planes have starred on "Suspense," among them Paul Lukas, Frederic March, Ben Hecht, Paul Muni and Robert Montgomery. Among the stars scheduled, at this writing, to make their initial appearances on "Suspense" in the near future, are tiny Margaret O'Brien, who memorizes every line of her radio scripts because she is still too young to read; and suave Ronald Colman, who has long expressed his desire to do a "Suspense" drama.

Ed Gardner, the comic "Archie" of "Duffy's Tavern," made his dramatic debut on "Suspense." "This is the life!" he beamed during rehearsals for the show. "What am I doing in comedy?"

Dramatic Debut

Lena Horne was given her initial opportunity to appear on the air in a starring dramatic role on Spier's thrill show. "She did a fine job,"

For Sake of Realism on "Suspense," Bill Spier Bans Audiences, the Engineer Takes Chances, and the Soundman Gives His Blood

Miss Anderson remarked, "and after her appearance, we received over one hundred and fifty magnificent letters commending the broadcast as an historic step against racial discrimination and a contribution to real national unity."

Katina Paxinou, Academy Award winner of the screen, made her radio dramatic debut on "Suspense."

Stars are awed by Bill Spier's rehearsals policies. While other airshows, of less difficult format, sometimes spend days in preparation, Spier advocates no more than four to four and a half hours of actual rehearsal immediately before broadcast time. He likes to see his performers step to the microphone tense, their minds keyed to the emotion of the drama.

As the show takes to the air, behind the scenes, at the controls, sits the engineer, Robert Anderson. "I like doing the 'Suspense' show," engineer Anderson told us. "Spier allows me to take chances, and he is always aware of an engineer's problems.

"'Suspense' has a meaning of its own for me," Anderson continued. "I sometimes have the control board set up in a manner that's never been tried before!"

The engineer finds it to his particular advantage that "Suspense" is aired in one of CBS' large audience studios (regardless of the fact that on-lookers are barred) since the added space and better facilities enable him to perform engineering feats that would otherwise be impossible.

Because of the spacious vacant studio, he could better simulate, with the cooperation of soundman Berne Surrey, the sound of a public address system in an European village for a sequence in the dramatization of "The Black Path of Fear."

Engineer Anderson names "The Singing Walls," which starred Van Johnson, as the most outstanding broadcast from his technical viewpoint, since it required him to produce the exceedingly difficult effect of "fog" music. In the unfolding of the story, there was a sequence during which a transition must take place from the sound of music as heard normally to that perceived by the fogged mind of an opium-fiend.

Lightning Work

It took hours of experiment and thought before Anderson hit upon the manner of doing it, arranging his board in a way never done before and employing an entire dolly-load of extra equipment. The airing of the effect required the engineer to perform rapidly eight operations in specific sequence in the short time it takes to read two lines of script!

"We tried it out two minutes before air-time, and it didn't work," Anderson related. "On the air, we took the chance—and it worked!"

Soundman Berne Surrey remembers "Donovan's Brain" as the broadcast which called for the most difficult sound effect he ever produced—the sound of a brain, having been separated from the body and being kept alive, registering the gamut of human emotions.

Surrey spent three weeks in research before he worked out the right effect. Remembering the instance when a human heart was kept alive in a jar, Berne decided to place the brain similarly in a jar of water, using a motor pump and an oscillator to produce the spine-tingling effect of weird gurgling sounds to convey the brain's conflicting emotions.

Clint Jones, radio instructor at U.S.C., listening to the show, was so affected by the mystic effect that he came down to the studio to see it, and immediately incorporated it into his text!

Sound's Importance

The important part sound-effects play in the presentation of "Suspense" stories points out the necessity of a soundman's having a thorough technical knowledge, imaginative ingenuity and a background in the theater to enable him to feel with the actor and to respond instantaneously to the on-the-spot directions of the producer.

Often, while "Suspense" is on the air, producer Spier has suddenly signalled Surrey for an unrehearsed sound effect! Other times, Surrey has supplied impromptu sounds without awaiting the word from Spier when the occasion for an additional effect appeared suddenly and unexpectedly. In one sequence, during the airing of "The Beast Must Die," when Herbert Marshall spoke a line of his script in an entirely different tone of voice than that with which he had rehearsed, Surrey supplied sound accordingly. When Paul Muni, unaccustomed to radio, was at the "Suspense" microphone, he often moved while speaking his lines, varying the sound of his voice on the air. Surrey remained alert, ready to supply footsteps whenever Muni moved. Another time, when a body was heard being hurtled to the ground and the actor portraying the role did not groan, Surrey did it for him.

But there was one time when the soundman went too far with what his co-workers smilingly call "Surrey-realism." In the climactic sequence of "The Diary of Sophronia Winters," Agnes Moorehead hit Ray Collins over the head with an axe. To produce the sound of the impact, Surrey thrust an ice pick into a cabbage. When he did so, the ice pick pierced his hand!

"That's going too far," Miss Moorehead kidded him later. "You don't have to give us the sound of blood with it!"

retaries and two "extras," and then, puzzled, but pleased, watched his fan mail count climb until it was averaging 15,000 letters a month. Once 2470 letters poured into his office in one day!

All through those years of success Ted was entertained and dined, showered with gifts of appreciation and affection by thousands of listeners, his work acclaimed by the schools and colleges of the entire United States and his programs recognized by the Library of Congress in Washington, D. C., as outstanding contributions to the literary advancement of the nation, yet there was one small annoyance that gnawed at his heart and—ridiculous as the accusation was—hurt. A very few of the letters he received were from men who wrote withering wisecracks about him: he was a "reader of poetry" . . . a "male panty-waist" . . . a "sissy."

The ignorant males who wrote the sneering letters did not, of course, know Ted. There's nothing "sissy" about him, never has been. He can tear your heart to pieces when he reads romantic poetry but he's full of vigorous fun. And no one can accuse him of being "sissy" or "romantic-looking." He's medium height, a little on the plump side, blond hair thinning in front, blue-gray eyes that are more often mischievous than dreamy, and always on the lookout for adventure. He's more interesting than a trip to Coney Island, and everyone who knows him loves him.

Nevertheless, the occasional unkind digs hurt. When war started thinning the ranks of radio entertainers Ted was still reading poetry—and resenting it. He wanted to get into the fight. Be in the thick of things. Do something active.

Blue Offers Chance

It was then, while he was restless, dissatisfied, that the Blue Network, selecting experienced radio men to send overseas, gave Ted his big chance as war correspondent.

He has been overseas now since last April—in England, France, Belgium, Italy, Iceland. He has "flown in a jeep" across the English Channel; accompanied a bomber crew on a mission over Normandy; spent two weeks in Iceland, the only correspondent to visit our American boys stationed in that "ice-olated" spot. One eventful day he saw a soldier who looked like—and it was!—his brother Jerry, and they had dinner together in London, neither one having any idea that the other was anywhere near.

Ted travels by truck or jeep, by plane or train, by bus or on foot to run down incidents and human interest stories that will bring—per-
