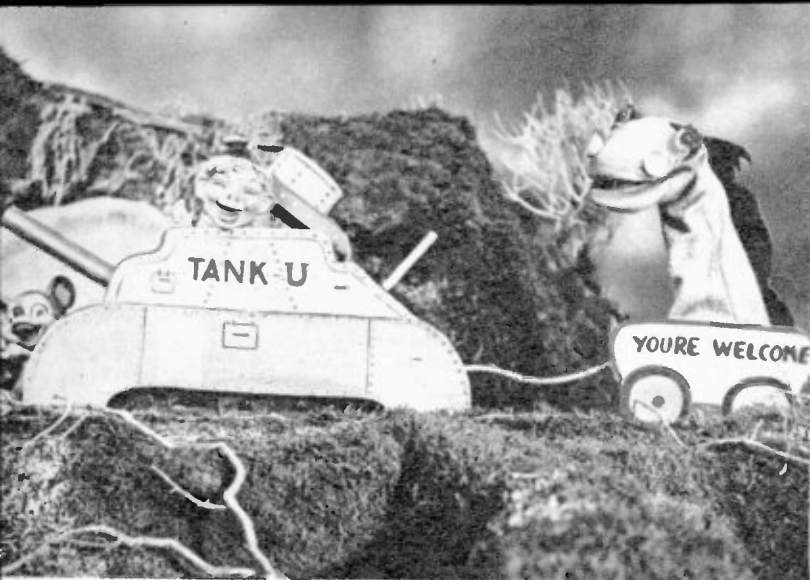

Means the Hour Has Rolled Around When as Winsome a Parade of Video Characters as Ever Hit the Channels Appears to Continue The Slyly Humorous, Lifelike Adventures

KTLA, Channel 5

EACH evening at 6:30 a strange malady strikes the Southland. Children desert playground swings, grandmothers lay aside knitting, businessmen close shop and dinners grow cold. Why? Everyone's watching KTLA's "Time for Beany."

In the four months six-year-old "Beany" has been on the air, he and his blustery uncle, "Captain Huffenpuff," "Cecil the Seasick Sea Serpent" and the fabulous crew of the world-traversing "Leakin' Lena" have captured the imaginations of thousands of television fans. As preceding generations took "Winnie the Pooh" and "The Wizard of Oz" to their hearts, audiences have welcomed the charming fantasy and lovable characters of "Time for Beany."

Modern Oz

Like these classics, "Beany" is fantastic adventure in worlds free

from the humdrum. Who in "Oz" is more appealing than the slightly stupid "Cecil the Seasick Sea Serpent"? On the second program Cecil appeared to lay his head on the "Leakin' Lena's" deck and announce (ad nauseam), "I'm (hiccough) seasick." He's been helping Beany in and out of messes ever since. Of course Captain Huffenpuff will argue that Cecil exists only in Beany's impressionable young mind, but audiences love the amiable serpent—so who cares what Huffenpuff says?

The "Leakin' Lena" voyages Monday through Friday from 6:30 to 6:45 with a crew comprising Hopalong Wong, the happy Chinese cook; Klowny, the clown, a mailman of "sorts"; Hunny Bear, the cuddly mascot; Mr. Crow, the lookout in the crow's-nest; and Dishonest John, a truly villainous blackguard. No matter what difficulty embroils them—they stick together in trouble. Sportsmanship comes first with Beany and his friends and the program totally lacks the "comic" brutality found in many children's programs. Not only do the characters set an example for the kiddies, but they succeed in conveying the spirit of fair play throughout their adventures. The lessons on "Beany"

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Song Specialist

"The Fastest Song Writer of His Weight in the Country," Is Jack Barnett's Self-Description. Besides His Other Merits, He's a Great Mimic

A TAILOR shop located on a New York City side street is about the last place you would expect opportunity to knock. That is, unless opportunity is taken by the horns and led in the desired direction. Peppery Jack Barnett, song writer for the NBC Jimmy Durante show, is just the kind of a guy to do anything that comes into his mind and, luckily enough, get away with it. It was in the aforementioned haberdashery that he bumped, or more descriptively pushed, into a fellow named Eddie Davis—a writer, and a top-bracket one at that. "I went up to him," smiles Jack, "and pulled all my gags, jumping around him, yanking at the suit he was trying on, trying to be as funny as I knew how."

So what else could the fellow do but laugh at this curly-headed youth's antics? The time was ripe and Jack brainstormed, "Say, what you need is another writer like me! We would make a great team!"

Pal Duo

Unless you'd met Jack and discovered his dynamic personality, your first assumption would be that Davis looked at him and told him where he could get the next slow boat to China. He didn't, and together they actually did make that great team. Their surprised and soon steadfast friendship went ahead great guns, and six weeks after their meeting they were called by Jimmy Durante.

"The Schnozz" informed the two writers that he needed a script overnight. It was, moreover, important because Durante had been off the air for three years and needed a bang-up job done on the script. The boys went ahead, staying up all night and turning out a fabulous script which met with great success. It was a comeback hit for Durante.

Mimics Jimmy

Long before Jack had ever thought of actually working with Durante he had done imitations of him in his dad's New Jersey night club. "I was master of ceremonies at my pop's place and did a lot of mimicry," he explained. Jack described his dad

as the Dutch vaudevillian comic who would come out on the stage, twirl his mustache, glance quizzically at the audience and ask, "Vell, vere are the gurls? Hmmm?" It always brought down the house.

Even the Army, at first, didn't interrupt Barnett's show-business career. He wrote a variety show at Fort Knox for awhile and then with the rest of the machine-gunners went to Europe. "After the armistice," he remembered, "General Eisenhower issued a request for me to write for the Air Forces. That request followed me practically all over Europe . . . through Germany and Austria . . . every time it was almost up to me, I was leaving with the outfit!" When he finally returned to New York, he got the much-delayed assignment.

Fastest Song Writer

With more than 400 musical scores

to his credit, Jack jokingly typifies himself as "the fastest song writer of his weight in the country." His name is tagged on such tunes as "The Secretary Song," "Any State in the Forty-Eight," "Guy With the Proboscis," and specialty songs for stars like Judy Canova, Bing Crosby, Dorothy Lamour, Don Ameche, Alan Young (Jack wrote Young's first personal-appearance script), Candy Candido and Van Johnson.

Jack's first job came as a result of appearing on Major Bowes's amateur program. He toured with one of the units as a mimic. His expert mimicry has fooled many a listener, particularly friends of the person he is imitating. Once in awhile he gets into hot water. Like the time he imitated Al Jolson saying he wasn't going to guest on Jimmy's show and got Jimmy so worried that he threw down the phone and started to run over to Al's house almost before Jack could catch him and let him in on the joke.

Professional Entertainer

In keeping with the rest of his unusual life, Jack met and married his wife in an equally fascinating way. "Marion came to me for a specialty act," he recalled. "In 1947 we got married between the matinee and evening performances at the theater."

They have no children. "My wife says I'm enough to take care of as it is," he chuckled. Marion Colby is a professional entertainer and, besides appearing at New York's La Martinique, has sung and danced in such Broadway shows as "Are You

Whys and Hows of Taping Shows

Part II

Continued from Last Week Is More of The Lore Behind Radio Tape Recording

NO ONE expects every take of a movie scene to be so perfect that it's printed—why expect it of a radio program? That's a sensible argument for recording radio shows on tape, then editing them for final release. Last week we described the process of putting a taped program together, pointing out some of the great advantages of the new—and still growing—medium.

The radio personalities themselves present the best arguments for it. Crosby started it when he moved to ABC on the stipulation that his program be recorded at his convenience. He was released from his tight movie-radio-records schedule to a happy extent. Other stars have found it just as convenient.

Big Job

When "Screen Guild" planned to do "Command Decision," it was discovered that most of the all-star cast was on location during the one week that it was possible to secure the services of star Gable. The tape recording job that brought the whole

show together is now legendary. Clark Gable and Elliott Lewis worked together on the first session. Gable read his original lines in the script. Lewis read all the other parts, timing them against the Gable role. He had to be particularly careful not to step on any of Gable's lines. The musical director had to leave the star's speeches unscored. Later, the rest of the cast, including Charles Bickford, Brian Donlevy, Walter Pidgeon, recorded their roles, with the indefatigable Elliott Lewis reading the Gable lines. Engineers took the two tape recordings, cut Lewis out of the Gable reel and the cast reel, and spliced the two together. What emerged on the air was "Command Decision," starring Clark Gable and company. The voice on the cutting-room floor was that of Elliott Lewis, but the finished product was a triumph for the missing actor as well as the tape recording engineers who made it possible. About 250 separate splices were made in the recording.

Joan Triumphs

Joan Crawford, whose fear of a

radio microphone is such that she has made only two broadcasts in ten years, is another star who credits tape recording for a successful show. She appeared in "The Ten Years" on "Suspense" with the stipulation that it be a tape-recorded program. Miss Crawford strives for such perfection in performance and is so self-critical of her work that a live radio broadcast is a nerve-wracking experience for her. Tony Leader, producer of "Suspense," revealed that her work on the taped program required the editing of but *one* word, and that was not a fluff, but merely a matter of director's interpretation. The star was completely at ease although the role called for continuous narration and several scenes of hysteria, rising

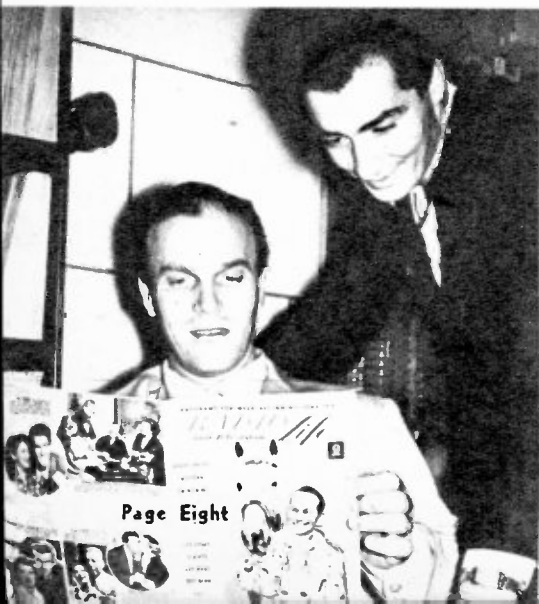

to a hair-raising pitch and sudden changes of pace. The mere fact that the program was being recorded on tape gave Joan the confidence that she desired. It went out on the air unchanged and the audience heard exactly the same program as it would had the show been done live.

Ordinary recording, with the program taken down on acetate records and played back on the air, had been found to distort quality in the transition. One famous singing star (not on the air at present) recording his

programs by this method while he was traveling, came out on the air sounding very little like himself. In this case, a conscientious engineer compensated by restoring low tones on the mixing panel. When the singer switched to tape recording, the engineer, still trying to compensate for a recorded medium, tried his trick again. The result was nothing like the original. The engineer found that the tape preserved the original quality so exactly that nothing need be added. Subsequently, tests have shown that even experts cannot tell the difference between a live broadcast and one played from tape.

Recording companies are beginning to discard their wax-master method in favor of the more accurate taping.

Tape Facts

The American Broadcasting Company, pioneers in the new medium, have a very complete studio of Ampex tape machines and staff of engineers. It has been discovered that tape, though accurate and satisfactory in nearly every way, is not the great time-saver that was imagined. The machines are "transportable, but not portable." Unlike an audition record that may be played at any point desired if one is searching for a particular part of the program, the tape recording must start at the beginning and wind to the end. A fast speed can send the tape recording past at a rate that produces only high-pitched gibberish, but the engineer must still listen to find the spot he wants. A demonstration will show that the engineer has ears so sharp that this is possible. His precision is that of a highly tuned machine. The letter "P" spoken too directly into a mike will make a "popped" sound. A tape engineer can find the letter, cut off the "popped" sound at the beginning, splice the tape back together and

have earned the show widespread parental approval.

The current voyage of the "Leakin' Lena" is an expedition in search of the two-headed "Freep" — the last living prehistoric quadruped. Guided by Captain Huffenpuff's "Freep Map," Beany and his gang have already sailed down the Los Angeles River to meet the hazards of Boo-Hoo Bay and Lake Ha-Ho (bordered by the giggly Laughing Grass) into the Straits of Jacket, and are now in the La Brea Tar Pits (the Lands of the Freep and the Home of the Brave).

Show's Creators

When it comes to the mechanics of "Time for Beany"—effects and characters—nobody is talking. Since many regard the characters as real people, KTLA and Producer Bob Clampett want to leave it that way. We can say that Clampett was formerly a director of the "Bugs Bunny" cartoons and was personally discovered for television by Klaus Landsberg, Paramount Television's West Coast director. Landsberg realized the opportunity to develop "Beany" into television's first original comic serial—as indigenous to video as the comic strip is to the newspaper and the cartoon to the theater.

Daws Butler and Stan Freberg, the stars of "Beany," are veterans of vaudeville, radio and cartoon dubbing. They are fast becoming the top men in their field. The clever and mobile sets are created by Bill Oberlin, also formerly with "Bugs Bunny" cartoons. Charles Shows, former writer of Paramount's "Speaking of Animals" series, heads the story department, and Gordon Minter camera-directs for KTLA.

It's difficult to select a single quality that makes any show popular, but the main appeal of "Time for Beany" may be the humanity of its characters. There's a little of the impish Beany, the blustery Captain, and the addled Cecil in all of us. It's just funnier when it's edged with satire and applied to someone else.

Further explanations are unfair because "Time for Beany" is a visual show in every sense and words can't capture its appeal. Besides that, it's nearing 6:30 and that means just one thing. It's "Time for Beany."

leave the consonant unimpaired!

Rumors on radio row have it that a well-known comedian has borrowed some big laughs from other taped programs and had them spliced into his own comedy show. This may or may not be an improvement, but the leeway it demonstrates is an added blessing to the show that radio listeners finally hear.

James Mason Show

In spite of the fact that a well-publicized disagreement parted the James Masons and scripter-director Arch Oboler, the reasons were not apparent on the first of the NBC shows, heard on KFI, 6:30 p.m. Thursday. The programs started out with the title "Illusion," now switched to "Run, Man, Run." The first broadcast, one of Oboler's, was "The African Story," an exciting, well-produced and well-acted show. Much of it must have been based on material that Oboler brought back from his recent African trip.

Mason, a proven radio personality with his comedy stints on the Fred Allen show and appearances on "Theater Guild on the Air," was excellent as the titled Englishman who trails the man responsible for the death of his wife during a safari on the Dark Continent. Pamela Kellino, Mrs. Ma-

son, proved herself equally at home on the air.

In a telegram to the press, Oboler stated that three of the "Run, Man, Run" programs, transcribed before the series aired, are his work. The remaining five will be done with Bill Spier as director. It's an interesting development.

"Johnny \$"

When the "Johnny Dollar" program debuted on CBS last season, it took a shellacking from both the trade critics and the unofficial ones who gather in the artists' corridors at the networks. Second time around, "Johnny Dollar" has improved considerably. Heard on KNX, 3:30 p.m. Sunday, insurance investigator "Johnny" sounds as if he might be going places this time.

Charles Russell, young movie actor, is still playing the title role. He has an interesting come-hither voice just right for the part. He has also developed an ease at the mike that was missing during his first session as "Johnny." As the dauntless insurance investigator, "Johnny" leads a life more glamorous than we realized was the lot of the profession. On the first show, he was set to guarding a lovely divorcee on whom his company held a large policy. He's a private eye with a business background.

Now being written by Paul Dudley and Gil Doud, the latter formerly co-author of the "Sam Spade" capers, the scripts, at least on an initial hearing, seemed to be as much improved as the performance of the leading man.

Radio Lifelines

BACK HOME! At that certain point in a trip when home begins to look mighty good, your vacation has achieved its fundamental objective. With me, the realization dawned about the time I left sweltering New York for sweltering Washington. Heat and humidity alike at 95 are almost too much for a native Californian to cope with!

WASHINGTON WAS AS FASCINATING as ever. It is always a thrill to emerge from the Union Station and see the Capitol dome immediately, without having to drive to some obscure part of town. Personally, Washington meant not only beauty of buildings and trees, but an undercurrent of Things Happening. I looked at everyone with a speculative eye, wondering what he or she was up to in the nation's capital, for to me, people I observe and meet on a trip (or anywhere for that matter) are just as much fun as the places.

YOUR IMAGINATION CAN soar so fantastically in trying to niche people. The first morning at breakfast in the Statler, a purposeful-looking man entered the coffee shop and I immediately began deciphering him. He looked like a cross between Kaltenborn and Jimmie McHugh and I finally concluded that he was some bigwig from out of town, come to Washington to tell the fellows in the Pentagon Building just what to do.

IMAGINE MY DISILLUSIONMENT that afternoon when I was in a party touring the Capitol. Turning around suddenly I saw the Purposeful Man bringing up the rear of the tour! Which led me to wonder whether he had figured me out for some gal with a mission in Washington and was equally disappointed to see me rubbernecking along with all the other tourists.

NOT ONLY THE WHITE HOUSE, but the Capitol itself is undergoing extensive repairs. For years the ceilings of both Senate and House chambers have been laced with steel girders, to keep the roofs from falling on our legislators' heads. (Won't play with this one!) Now these unsightly supports are being removed. Other weak spots in the buildings are being repaired by noisy workmen who buzz their saws and bang their hammers night and day. The evening I attended the U. S. Army Band concert in front of the Capitol, the workmen stopped just long enough for the program, then resumed their hammering and sawing. One of the biggest thrills of my trip was standing on the Capitol steps singing "The Star Spangled Banner" while the Army band, 100 strong, played and the Stars and Stripes furlled smartly from the poles on the Capitol behind us, the Senate and House buildings at the sides, and the Library of

Congress ahead. I thought all flags were supposed to come in at sundown, but those on the Capitol and Congressional Library were still waving gently at 9:30 p.m.

LIKE ALL PERSONS WHO HAVEN'T traveled for a long time, I took too many clothes. Most of the trip it was entirely too hot to wear "best things" and I had to fall back on a couple of tried and true cottons that could be laundered in a wink. Was surprised at the general informality of dress, especially in New York, where men and women both go hatless and gals wear simple cottons at all hours. Lugging a small coat cross country was love's labor lost, even for San Francisco. But my trusty raincoat got a good workout, especially in Washington. No matter how many cats and dogs it rained, however, it was still sticky and humid.

"CALIFORNIA, HERE I COME," I sang to myself as I boarded the Zephyr in Chicago. What a fabulous train! Someone had the good taste to leave the stainless steel unadorned by gaudy paints. Cars, inside and out, were the last word in comfort and decor, even providing oversized beds for tall travelers. But more than the elegance of the train was the spirit of camaraderie which prevailed. The novelty of the vista domes (top-deck observation floors with all-glass tops) gave the westward trip the feeling of a holiday and helped everyone become quickly acquainted.

ONE OF THE PERSONS receiving most attention was a young missionary coming back home to Oakland from India with her ten-year-old daughter and six-year-old son. The little girl gained an immediate and wide reputation for her curiosity. So far she has been educated in English schools and spoke with quite a British accent. Her natural inquisitiveness was probably whetted by curiosity about the United States, which she had not seen for four years. Mother and children were due to get off the train in Oakland, but mother made a mistake when she wired her brother to meet them at the pier, then worried there would be a slip-up, as she intended detraining at the Third and Washington station. My heart bled for fear she should find no one to greet her after all that weary trip via Suez, England, Atlantic, and cross country, so I mounted the stairs to the vista dome to look

down on the crowd when we pulled in. (It's always so intriguing to see your fellow travelers in their full regalia of hats, best coats, and smiles and to note what kind of people meet them.) Well, there stood the missionary and her youngsters surrounded, yes virtually engulfed, by the clan, and I almost cried when I saw one of the ladies pinning an orchid on the missionary's plain cotton dress.

IT SEEMED ALMOST A tragedy to break up the gay group of two dozen who had had such enjoyment that morning from the gorgeous Feather River Canyon scenery. I had gotten up at 5:30 and was ready to start my neck-craning at 6:45. All but four seats in the dome were filled even then, as some travelers had been there for more than an hour and had skipped breakfast entirely to view the wonderful mountains, masses of pines and shimmering river. By 7:15 every seat was taken and for four hours we rode through a dreamland of scenic wonder with practically unobstructed view. For someone entering the state for the first time, I can think of no more breath-taking route.

THE FINAL THRILL was coming home and seeing all the dear family members, friends and co-workers. They all ask two questions: "How was the weather?" first. Then instantly, "Did you see 'South Pacific'?" I am preparing a sign to distribute: "The weather was awful." And "Yes, I saw 'South Pacific!'" Guess you are a nobody if you come back and say "No" to that one.

NOW CRAVE A VACATION. After five weeks of shepherding tickets, corraling luggage, commandeering cabs, punching in on reservations, climbing in and out of sight-seeing busses, sweltering, making train connections, attending shows, coping with redcaps and bellhops, sweltering, sloshing around in the rain, tipping porters, and generally carrying through a rugged itinerary, home looks sweeter than ever and this Southern California weather is definitely a special brand. My daughter summed it up neatly when we were passing through Sacramento. I had warned her that rainless California would look dried up and brown after the lush meadows and verdancy of the East. Pointing out the seared hills I said, "See how parched and withered they look?"

"Yes," she replied, "but look how blue the sky is."

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VIDEO *In Review*

In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

Rumors Are Flying

Word leaks out of the East that some of the biggest attractions on video are giveaways. ABC's "Break the Bank" and "Stop the Music" were high among the top ten in July, according to the New York City Teleratings. . . . Sherman Lauder milk, better known to video viewers as "Cowboy Slim," made a sudden move from KTLA to KTTV. Reason for the surprise move (a surprise even to Klaus Landsberg, we hear) was Mr. Lauder milk's inability to secure a contract. He had been serving as art director as well as doing his "Cowboy Slim" role. . . . Maxie Rosenbloom whipped into Hollywood last week to talk over a proposed television show that would star the ex-fighter with Patti Moore and Ben Lessy, based on the Slapsy Maxie nitery. . . . Vincent Riggio, a bigwig of the American Tobacco Company, was rumored as doing an awful lot of wining and dining of a certain local air comedian, NOT Jack Benny, when Riggio was here. That could mean nothing. . . . but the secrecy and raised eyebrow with which this news was passed on to us spelled all manner of fascinating huckster-type goings-on among the principals of the American-Benny video play.

Looks Like

The Federal Communications Commission, august body of presidential appointees, just didn't get around to even an oral hearing on the proposed sale to Warner Bros. of KLAC, KLAC-TV and KYA (San Francisco). The commission had until August 1, at which time Warners' petition to buy ran out. The opening date of the whole mess was last year some time.

It has always been our naive understanding that the Federal Communications Commission was created for the purpose of seeing that fair practices, equitable distributions and all manner of other high-minded, humanity-helping practices existed in radio commerce. Well, the Commission's failure to act cost KLAC's owner a reported \$50,000 per month, and she also was required to return to potential purchaser Warners some \$950,000 which the latter had advanced to carry out construction at KLAC and KLAC-TV. No one has apparently benefitted, and no purpose has been served, that we can see, by this seemingly autocratic wait-till-we-get-jolly-well-reducing on the part of the Commission. . . . The new Image Orthicon video camera, in use by NBC's entire

television network, is so sensitive that it can transmit a television picture by the light of a match. This should lend immeasurably to crime dramas, so popular on radio, when they move into their own on video. . . . The "Veteran's Page" on KTLA's "Magazine of the Week" still has a better than 100 per cent job-getting average for unemployed vets appearing on the show. "Veteran's Page" interest has also prompted calls to cooperating Veterans' Service Centers for dozens of other unemployed ex-servicemen. . . . KTLA's "Time for Beany" celebrated its 100th telecast last Friday night at 6:30. . . . The Television Broadcasters Association is up in arms about the FCC's recent ban on broadcasts of straight audio programs on video stations. These audio programs are quite necessary in helping dealers demonstrate sets, for installation of receivers, or as fill-ins for station experiments in program technique. Apparently the FCC feared that stations would use straight audio as a means of padding out their programming to the number of hours required by FCC ruling. A simple check would have revealed to them that in almost every case the allocated channels are telecasting more hours than the ruling requires. . . . Pianist-band-leader Frankie Carle has packaged his own film series of piano instruction by television, and he will huddle on the production of the video-designed programs when he arrives in Hollywood soon. . . . Looks like part of CBS will move over to the old ABC headquarters on Sunset. All of ABC is going to Television Center, and CBS needs the space they vacated to expand activities in both AM and TV.

Stop, Listen, Look (Shows You May Like)

"Missing Persons"

In an effort to trace adults and children who have left their homes without due notice, KTLA, in conjunction with the Los Angeles Police Department, is presenting a "Missing Persons Bureau." The show is narrated by Sergeant Jesse M. Rosenquist and goes on five nights a week just before the Channel Five sign-off.

Families and friends who have not seen or heard from a person for long enough to believe there is some inauspicious cause for his absence are welcome to send in pictures of the missing with a brief description and information as to where and when the party was last seen.

With a nationwide hunt, the local Missing Persons Department reports that a fair number of the strayers are

found with the help of viewers who believe they can be of assistance.

This, of course, does not take into account the numerous calls by "crack-pots" whose information merely leads to headaches for the Police Department and heartaches for the people who are anxiously awaiting the return of the party. Discovered buffoonery in cases as critical as these should be dealt with in some subtle way—like boiling the joker in oil.

Off Lens (Personalities)

Wynn Likes It!

Ed Wynn, "King of the Jesters," "The Perfect Fool," returned to New York from Hollywood full of enthusiasm for everything that's happening here on the Coast—video-wise, that is.

Wynn's weekly half-hour show will be carried live here and broadcast over CBS-TV's Eastern and Midwest stations by means of television recordings. And he is perfectly happy with the film process. Upon his arrival here, Wynn viewed several recordings of CBS-TV shows—including "Lucky Pup," "This Is Broadway" and "Toast of the Town"—then expressed pleasure at the high quality of reception and the giant strides engineers have made in the transcription of television programs.

Wynn's decision to begin his video series on the West Coast stems from the fact that he makes his home here, and from the desire to pioneer in the new medium in an area he believes will be one of the great centers of television.

Since Wynn's comedy turn is largely built on visual effect, the comedian foresees no problem in television. "I can put on as good a television show," he said, "as Ed Wynn ever put on a stage."

The comedian is moving all his fabulous props to California. They include 400 coats, 800 hats, and his famous forty-two-year-old pair of size thirteen shoes.

shown some shows to be excellent bits for continuance. Some have turned out as less excellent bits, gladly discarded come fall and the return of the regulars.

A certain group of cheese and mayonnaise makers have no worries. The boys behind this "Kraft" budget can sit happily back assured of a vast, loyal audience, and of a show outstanding for its high caliber of musical entertainment. The show, of course, is NBC's "Kraft Music Hall," starring Nelson Eddy and Dorothy Kirsten, the shapely blonde Metropolitan Opera star.

More Casual Than Temperamental

It started three years ago when Mr. Eddy held down the musical fort by himself. The addition of Miss Kirsten's voice and person occurred two summers ago, and proof of her joyous personality and complete versatility lies in the audience response to this duo's two years of performance.

After the "Kraft Music Hall" had been on a week or so this season, Radio and Television Life wandered over to NBC one rehearsal afternoon, to watch the popular stars put their show together.

The lyric soprano with the "oomph" of a night-club torch singer, Miss Kirsten, looked for all the world like a svelte Junior Leaguer en route to tea. The blonde hair, smartly cut into a short bob, and a softly fitted raw-silk dress in bright green drew whistles of appreciation from the boys in Robert Armbruster's band when Dorothy put in her appearance. The star, in turn, flashed the band a smile and a friendly quip, a response bound to insure even greater fondness from the group. During the long rehearsal, in which Dorothy and Eddy get every note of their seven or eight songs of the evening down pat, the musicians uncomplainingly go over and over the score for the duo, knowing it is a matter of getting it absolutely right rather than a matter of temperament that prompts such stringent measures.

Musical Backgrounds

Nelson Eddy draws no wolf whistles from the orchestra members, but practically any Eddy antic gets a tremendous guffaw. In addition to his fine voice and his ability to switch from a lullaby to a lusty ballad from "The Vagabond King" or an operatic aria, Nelson has a sense of timing and a comedy bent that keep his co-workers happy far beyond the call of duty.

Eddy's long list of records is as popular as any jivester's, and he has appeared with most of the foremost orchestras under noted conductors. Every movie-goer is familiar with the pictures he made during his nine years at MGM.

Another important ingredient of

this summer musical treat is the noted pianist and orchestra leader Robert Armbruster, who is as small and dark as Nelson Eddy is tall and platinum blond. "Bobby" doubles in comedy bits on the Kraft show, handling his share of the dialogue as though he'd trained in a vaudeville trunk. And the dialogue is an important part of the "Music Hall" fare. Written by Ed Helwick, the small talk on stage skillfully guides listeners from one mood to another. The jump from a pop tune to a serious classic needs a good bit of guidance.

Happy People, Happy Show

Watching the rehearsal for this glistening show brought out strongly the one factor that can tie several artists, each a dominant personality, into one smooth package. It is the spirit of true endeavor. Each member is more concerned with music than with himself. That same spirit is exemplified in a story about Nelson Eddy.

It seems that a few years ago Mr. Eddy stopped by his agent's office. In another room of that same building a group of young concert aspirants were being instructed. Nelson, who was currently one of the box-office kings at MGM, heard their voices and dropped into the class.

He unself-consciously and delightfully joined in the class singing, and his complete good fellowship and humility in turn delighted everyone else. Nelson was later heard telling a friend what a good time he had spent with a group of "other singers."

I think this is why the audience usually looks and sounds so dead. Folks are too busy following action to keep laughing or applauding!"

He got in there early and worked hard (it sometimes seems to us that remembering the right antics and patter of all those other fellows must really be harder work than making up your own material!) with the result that he emerged a top favorite.

Of course waiting around as long as he chooses may work out in Benny's case. It is easily possible that the public won't take to their hearts and video screens any of the other in-on-the-ground-floor performers. They may just wait around for some radio comics

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to drift graciously in the line of fire. And they may not. But by then Jack might find television recordings to his liking.

Miss Lee Takes TV

Career-Girl Success Story Led Lee Hogan From Little Theater and Radio To Her Own Television Show on KNBH

Wednesday, 8:00 p.m.
KNBH, Channel 4

LEE HOGAN, KNBH's attractive "Designed for Women" emcee, is subject of one of the best of the career-girl success stories in television. Lee is one of those talented gals whose capabilities seem endless and whose poise seems inborn. A big-city product, you'd swear.

Lee would laugh at that. She's from Little Rock, Arkansas, and a good deal of her radio training was obtained in her own home town. A scholarship from Little Rock Junior College sent her to the Priscilla Beach Theater in Plymouth, Massachusetts, where she studied every job connected with the theater. As for that unshakeable poise, she'll also relate the tale of how she burst into tears when a New York director scolded her for dropping script pages at a radio audition.

There's ten years of radio background, including writing, publicity, fashions, broadcasting, acting and production, behind Lee's television program. After soaking up knowledge at the Eastern school of the theater and trying to get on the Broadway stage, the teen-aged Lee returned to Little Rock, not to give up her dreams but to start from home base, a wise idea that doesn't occur to the ambitious youngsters who flock to Hollywood and Broadway with hopes and no experience. Besides, this youngster was homesick. She walked into station KARK in Little Rock and announced, "I am an actress!"

Radio Break

The station program director countered with the offer that she do a woman's program for the station. Lee's first reaction was one of dis-

interest. Her second was, "All right—but not a goopy one!" The teenager found herself writing a very adult woman's program with the emphasis on news stories, feature services and visiting celebrities. For two years she wrote all the commercial copy for the station. The pay was small; she started at ten dollars a week and progressed to fifteen, but she saved enough to buy a new wardrobe and another chance at New York. This time she was armed with letters of introduction to producers and "ins" into radio auditions. And then she went back to Little Rock and married announcer Joseph Hogan.

The war came along and the Hogans moved to Dallas, where Lee's husband was in the Army Air Transport Service. She busied herself with little-theater activities and then decided to get a war-effort job. She went to North American Aircraft, where she was hired as assistant transportation and housing coordinator, an endless job that required her to aid in channeling the forty thousand employees into housing and gas mileage.

She came to Hollywood in 1944 and, in between working part time in a doctor's office, auditioned for radio producers. "I didn't know what to think," she says now. "The criticisms ranged from very high praise to very low." Her first foothold in NBC came when she was hired as a member of the advertising and promotion department. By this time, there must have been very little that the willowy Hogan gal didn't know about radio. She moved

over into the press department, where her first job was rewriting and bringing up to date the stacks of biographies of all the NBC personalities. For two and a half years she was fashion editor of the department, with a brief time out when her little daughter, Christopher, was born. She made the staff of Radio and Television Life her friends at that time, and we recall her as a chic young woman with a beautiful low voice whose usual greeting was, "Hi, gals, how about a hot fudge sundae?"

Then Came TV

When KNBH, the Hollywood television outlet for NBC, came into being, the staff began auditioning

SCHOOL'S out and Saturday's a big day in the lives of kiddies. Usually it's a matinee complete with popcorn, sticky caramels and a whooping Western. As a prelude to a red-letter week end we found a fun starter on a recent Friday night visit to Jay Stewart's participation show "Fun Fair."

Walking into Studio Y at Tom Breneman's restaurant, we were soon engulfed in a crowd of some 400 children hanging tightly on to the hands of smiling parents. When Jay Stewart appeared on the stage the show was on. Known for the flair for coaxing talk out of youngsters which has made him one of the best children's emcees in the business, Jay greeted the audience whose resounding hellos were twice as hearty.

The stint opened with Jay walking through the aisles asking the thrilled youngsters if they knew any riddles. One young gent piped, "What has eight wheels and flies?" This rather stumped Stewart, who replied with a puzzled frown, "Well, I know the one about a garbage truck which has four wheels and flies, but your riddle stumps me... I give up, what is it?" The youngster chortled, "Two garbage trucks!"

When the guessing games are over, the program revolves around a quoit-pitching game on the stage, a "Pop the Question" contest in which a father and daughter compete against a mother and son, and a reading of the "Pet of the Week" letter.

Most of the time there is a surprise guest who delights the onlookers with tricks and talent. When "Bozo the Clown" (Pinto Colvig) visited the show, he brought along a special treat, for he dressed up several participants in complete big-top regalia. The youngsters will probably never forget the day they literally joined the circus.

"I Want a Puppy"

Climaxing each week's fun fest is the entrancing "I want a puppy" contest, in which several boys and girls with extra-special requests are selected to tell why they want to have a pet. The children come up

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with wishful reasons like, "Oh, I want a puppy because we now have a big yard and I would like a cute little dog to be my playmate" or "My dog died and I miss him so and I would like to have another so I won't feel so lost." There's always one little tot who wistfully sighs, "I've never had a puppy before and I would love to have one to see what it's like."

With wishes like these it's difficult for the audience to decide, and usually the applause is taken in two or three rounds. When the winner is chosen, Jay tells him to whistle, and from the side wing trots a pedigreed six-weeks-old puppy. It's the thrill of a lifetime for the lucky child, and Jay, knowing that the other participants are so disappointed they could cry, tells them also to give a little whistle, which is answered by more prancing cuddly puppies.

Knowing children often don't readily comprehend why everyone except them gets something, Jay tops off the program by treating the whole audience with peanuts and bubble gum.

A more appropriate title couldn't have been derived, for not only is Jay Stewart's show fun with all the excitement, but it's a fair fair in that everyone leaves the studio with a big smile and a handful of goodies.



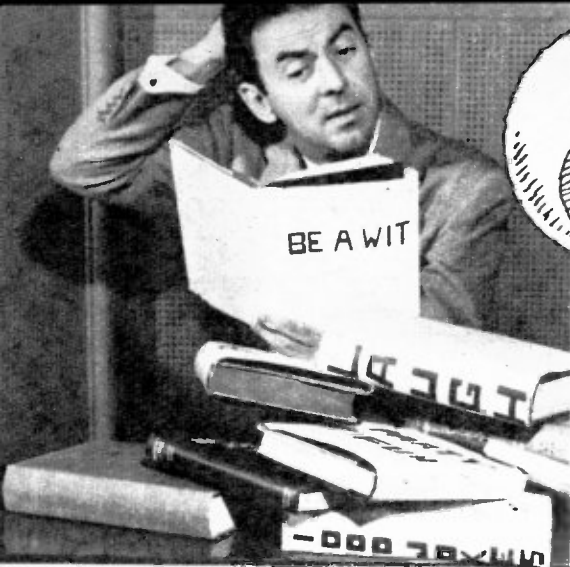

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8 He Stayed Behind the 8 Ball

But George O'Hanlon, After a Long Struggle To Make Good, Says He Now Likes It There

TALENTED GEORGE O'HANLON won't find anything in those books that he doesn't already know. He's a third-generation comedian and first new short-subject star in a decade. (Otto Rothschild photos.)

MOST of the movie audiences which see George O'Hanlon in his amusing "Behind the Eight Ball" comedies know him as "Joe McDoakes," the typical fall guy who lives his life behind that eight ball in the series of "So You Want to Be" short subjects. George has gained a reality through these "average man" portrayals that the usual movie funny man seldom achieves.

Radio audiences, however, are destined to know him under his own name as his "Me and Janie" show goes into another air season. (Last year on Mutual, it was the George O'Hanlon show. This time, it's on NBC.)

Uphill Work

Success hasn't always hung around George with such constancy, though, and for a good part of his career he was a real-life "Joe McDoakes" under the shadow of an eight ball. Not that he didn't have a great background. He comes from three generations of an acting family, making him right up there in lineage with the Barrymore and Lupino clans. His comedian father was known as "Sam Rice" in vaudeville, his mother was Lulu Beeson, a Shubert star. His grandparents ran the famous Bird Cage Theater in Tombstone, Arizona, prototype of the western theater immortalized in screen horse operas. Born in New York and educated in Providence, Rhode Island, George essayed the stage at an early age. At fourteen he joined a stock company. At fifteen he had his own band. At sixteen he came to Hollywood and made a very small dent in the film capital by playing elevator operators and messenger boys in Warner Brothers movies. He also worked as a dancer,

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an art he picked up by virtue of belonging to a theatrical family. (He's pleased that he's to make a "So You Want to Be in Vaudeville?" comedy soon.) Between jobs, he starved. He recalls once stealing two bottles of milk in desperation. "Wouldn't you know it?" he sighs now, "they were both sour. I've never forgiven the guy I stole them from."

Young George, getting nowhere fast, was tipped off by an interested casting director at Warner Brothers. "You're just too young," he was told. "It'll be ten years before you're ready to make good." The director arranged to have George go to the Bliss-Hayden school on a scholarship. His professionalism stood him in good stead, and he played most of the comedy roles that were beyond the training or abilities of the paying students.

First Chance

He even got "discovered" once. A German director came back to his dressing room after a Bliss-Hayden comedy. "You are like the old European comedians," he told George, "a pantomimist." O'Hanlon was signed as the comedy lead in "New Wine," a musical. "I began thinking about swimming pools," he recalls ruefully. The shadow of the eight ball rolled back, however, when the war came along at the completion of the picture. The director was considered an enemy alien and he directed no more films.

George continued at the school and got a daytime job selling men's



suits. "I didn't know anything about selling suits," he smiles, "but I did have a gift of gab. I sold twenty suits in the time I worked there—and every one of them came back!"

The second time O'Hanlon was discovered, it seemed even less promising than the first. A man came backstage after one of George's comedy performances with the query, "Would you care to do pictures?" Yes, O'Hanlon would! He began to get those swimming-pool visions again. The proposition rapidly assumed smaller proportions when the visitor explained the offer. There was to be no money in it just then. They were to beg, borrow and rent enough sixteen-millimeter equipment to film some one-reel comedies on the streets of Hollywood and impress a major studio with their excellent work. This is the sort of shoestring operation that used to work in the energetic slap-dash days of the silent screen. It seemed an almost impossible coup to bring off in the days of the bank-financed super-movies. However, the actor behind the eight ball of a suit department was willing to take a chance.

The writer-producer-director of the enterprise was Richard Bare, a photography teacher, and he secured the necessary camera equipment to film two one-reelers starring O'Hanlon. It was just like the days of little old Hollywood. "I'd go up to a door and ask the lady who answered if it would be all right to run up and pound on the door while we filmed a sequence," O'Hanlon relates. Shades of Fatty Arbuckle and the Keystone Kops! It cost four thousand dollars to film the two gems that Bare finally took to Warner Brothers. The studio liked them and bought them. Bare called O'Hanlon, who was in the midst of helping a prospective customer into a suit. O'Hanlon dropped the customer's coat, picked up his own and walked out of the store forever!

Another Halt

The studio enlarged the films to thirty-five-millimeter and released them as the first of the "Behind the Eight Ball" series. The comedy

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SUPERMAN of the Trumpet." That's what they call Walter "Pete" Candoli. And today, the folks who take their downbeats in jazz time on the favored music list are hearing the Candoli horn from his perch in Basil "Buzz" Adlam's ABC orchestra on such shows as "It's Time for Music," the Curt Massey show and "Take a Chorus."

Like good ole Bix, and Bunny, too, Candoli's horn-blowing has earned him a historical niche in the realm of trumpeting that would make even Gabriel himself just a wee bit envious.

Along with the great Bix and Bunny, "Pistol Pete"—so called because of his agility with the horn—has been voted one of the top seven trumpet players of all time in American music history. That puts Mr. Candoli right in a class with such other jazz champs as Harry James, Bobby Hackett, Louis "Satchmo" Armstrong and Dizzy Gillespie. In 1946, Esquire Magazine, in its annual "All-American Musicians" poll, selected Pete Candoli as the world's "outstanding jazz trumpet player."

Band Connections

Pete was only thirteen when he obtained his initial musician's union card. He was eighteen when he joined his first professional dance band—the Sonny Dunham orchestra. After that, the twenty-six-year-old trumpeter was to be heard successively as a feature of the bands batoned by Will Bradley, Benny Goodman, Tommy Dorsey, Alvino Rey, Freddie Slack, Charlie Barnet, Teddy Powell, Woody Herman, Boyd

tured in an act where he displayed his prowess at giving the high notes the jazz treatment.

Born in Mishawaka, Indiana, Pete came naturally by his trumpeting talents. His father Tony was a concert trumpet player and made it his business to start giving lessons early to his son. Years more of study—including membership in the high-school band at Mishawaka—began to show advantages for young Pete. Just after he had entered Purdue University, he met Sonny Dunham, who invited him to join his newly formed orchestra. This event cut short Pete's college career, but cer-

"Superman of the Trumpet"

Pete Candoli, Heard on Several ABC Shows, Is Rated One of Our Seven All-Time Top Trumpeters

It was Pete's horn-blowing, by the way, that made many Herman recordings—such as "Apple Honey," "Goosey Gander," "Wildroot" and "Caledonia"—top numbers where the guys and gals dropped their pocket money into the nation's juke boxes. It was during his tenure with Herman's outfit, too, that Pete gained his "Superman" title because, dressed like Superman, he was fea-

tainly sent him up the road of progress in the business of making music. For several years now, Pete has been a five-figure-per-year trumpet player.

Over at ABC, Adlam says of Pete's trumpeting, "Great, just great." And Richard Woolen, producer who directs the network's "It's Time for Music" program, waxes just as enthusiastic when he says, "Pete has tremendous power and clarity of tone

on the high passages which certainly stamp him as terrific."

Oddly enough, however, Pete's deeper interests these days don't involve his celebrated trumpet. As he puts it, "I always have been a 'ham.'" With that, he will tell you that he is ambitious to carve a career for himself in the field of acting. Right now he is studying dramatics and playing parts in little-theater productions around the Los Angeles area—with a hopeful eye on the flickers.

If it takes good looks to get into the movies, then Pete should encounter little difficulty. He's a handsome black-haired, brown-eyed young man with a well-groomed mustache. He stands five ten and a half in his argyles. His favorite pastime of weight-lifting has kept his 190 pounds firmly packed into muscle.

Pete is married to the former Nona Slamp, who sang for the Tommy Dorsey and Tex Beneke bands. The couple own a new home in fashionable Topanga Canyon on the outskirts of San Fernando Valley.

To the Candoli man, home is an important reason for his quitting the road with dance bands. For eight years he annually averaged around 25,000 miles with his trumpet, which didn't allow much time to collect pipes, swim, or watch football and baseball games.

THE "Tom, Dick and Harry" signature on Curt Massey's "Plantation Jubilee" show, Mutual-KHJ, has a euphonic ring that sticks in the mind and for some listeners recalls that early era of radio when the trio was broadcasting over clear-channel station WGN in Chicago.

But this simple nomenclature does not apply off the air, where "Tom" becomes Jimmy Hatton, "Dick" becomes Dick Rock and "Harry" becomes Gordon Vandover.

Head man in the group is Gordon Vandover, who, besides handling all their musical arrangements and setting the format for the "Plantation Jubilee" program, has a number of compositions to his credit. These tunes are distinguished by some of the oddest titles that ever decorated a song. Just a few are: "I'm a Big Boy Now," "Pedro, the Poor Paon Peddler," "Give That Man Three Silver Dollars," "Radio Commercials Keep Me Broke," and a little gem called "Luigi, Get Out Your Ouija," of which he is justifiably proud. It was written in 1944, and in it he predicted what would happen presidentially in 1948. The verse went: "Will he wear a black mustache?" "Will he run a haberdash?" a bit of sharp prognosticating on Gordon's part.

"It was just luck," he says deprecatingly. "I was pretty sure Dewey was going to run again in '48 and nothing would rhyme with mustache

except haberdash. Turned out I was right."

Song Library

The long-standing popularity of this group is partly attributed to their unique programming selection which bypasses the dog-eared tunes that other artists rely on in favor of those that have been forgotten or left behind in the race for recognition. Vandover often re-works the lyrics, bringing them up to date. With the "Shut the Door" song that they did on a recent show, the last two verses were his own lyrics. The boys have no written arrangements for their numbers; they just run through them a couple of times.

One of the published numbers they've done on the broadcast is "She Lived Next Door to a Firehouse"—and, so far as Gordon knows, they're the only act that ever did it. They have literally thousands of numbers in their repertoire

for which they can deliver the lyrics by rote. This backlog of songs comes in very handy for the boys, who also have a television show in Los Angeles—improvised as they go along.

"We've been televised for eighteen weeks already, at eight songs a show, without repeating a number, and we're good for eight years at the same rate," Vandover says.

The group got its start in radio via a night club in St. Louis, paradoxically named "The Los Angeles Club," where Gordon worked at one of the game tables. They began singing around the place for their own amusement, and before long the management latched onto this refreshing vocal talent and made it a regular feature of the floor show. So later, when the night club bought time on a local station, KWK, Gordon and the boys were assigned to the spot. From there they went to

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two children have specially designed golf clubs and, although they have been at it only a short time, are rapidly catching on to the general idea of this popular pastime.

Feet on Ground

Carson's philosophy is refreshing in its simplicity. He says, "Through others your success and career are built and sustained. Always be honest with yourself and be sincere in your desire to help others." That is explanation enough why Carson the singer has been gaining a solid foundation in Hollywood and is rated in a field where the competition is terrific. As a matter of fact, Carson's finest compliment came from famed director John Ford, who said upon hearing Carson, "There is the newest and freshest voice I've heard in a long, long time."

Carson's story has a typical beginning, too. The first money he ever earned was selling newspapers on the Dempsey-Tunney fight in Wichita, Kansas. With the money he bought a pair of skates and a harmonica, the latter marking the start of his musical career.

His mother did much to further his musical career by buying him a guitar when he was twelve. After mastering the instrument, Carson entered an amateur contest at the Novelty Theater in Wichita and proceeded to grab first prize! He followed this by organizing a harmonica band in junior high school and won a city-wide contest. That decided Carson on a musical career.

Playing a guitar he first auditioned for radio in 1930 and has been on the air constantly since. Early one morning (6:30 to be exact) he walked over to KMTR with his guitar and told Stuart Hamblen he wanted to sing. Hamblen listened and hired him. With that as a beginning, Carson progressed steadily in radio playing the guitar and singing Western ballads. He developed his singing voice by studying harmony and composition with Eddie Ballantine in Chicago.

The early days of radio were tough. At one time Carson did two and three shows a day and played dances two nights a week—all for the munificent sum of \$15 per week! Most humorous incident in his radio career came in 1933 at KHJ when an overhanging microphone dropped into his lap while he was playing the guitar.

On Screen

Carson has appeared in many movies. He did a series of twenty pictures with Roy Rogers as a member of the Sons of the Pioneers, has had singing roles in "It Happened One Night," "Streets of Laredo," "Roseanna McCoy" and others.

He has also played character parts

in Walt Disney cartoons.

His favorite singer is Bing Crosby, his favorite musical composition "Rhapsody in Blue" and his favorite composers George Gershwin, Irving Berlin and Frank Loesser.

Carson's advice to others contemplating a similar career? Well, he puts it succinctly. "It's a tough field but if you are sincere, buckle down and rehearse, study twenty-four hours a day. Don't give up. Keep your mind open for suggestions because others, you'll find, will be happy to help you."

She credits her producer, John Gaunt, for so much wise help and constructive criticism in aiding her to build the sort of program she wants. She lends a kind ear to press agents because she was once in their job herself.

Though Gordon is not one to pull out press clippings at the drop of a compliment, he still has a soft feeling in his heart for Kansas City, where he won a popularity poll of all the networks in 1930.

Fan-Mail Pull

The trio used to get mail from every state in the Union when they were on WGN. The whole thing started when they got some fan letters from down South. Incredulous, they decided to ask for fan mail and see what happened—so they would say, "Today, everybody in Washington write in. Let's hear from all you people out in Washington" — and, sure enough, by the time they'd finished they had postmarks from all of "the forty-eight."

Like anything else that achieves considerable popularity, "Tom, Dick and Harry" have had a number of things named after them. There were some triplets born in Des Plaines, Illinois, of a cab-driver father named Krause. The trio did a benefit show for their namesakes and raised \$2000 and gifts. Then there was a family of monkeys in the St. Louis Zoo and also a prominent attorney of Lake County who named his sons, as they came along, Tom, Dick and Harry.

Thus the successful longevity of this group goes to disprove that old saying about "three's a crowd."
