

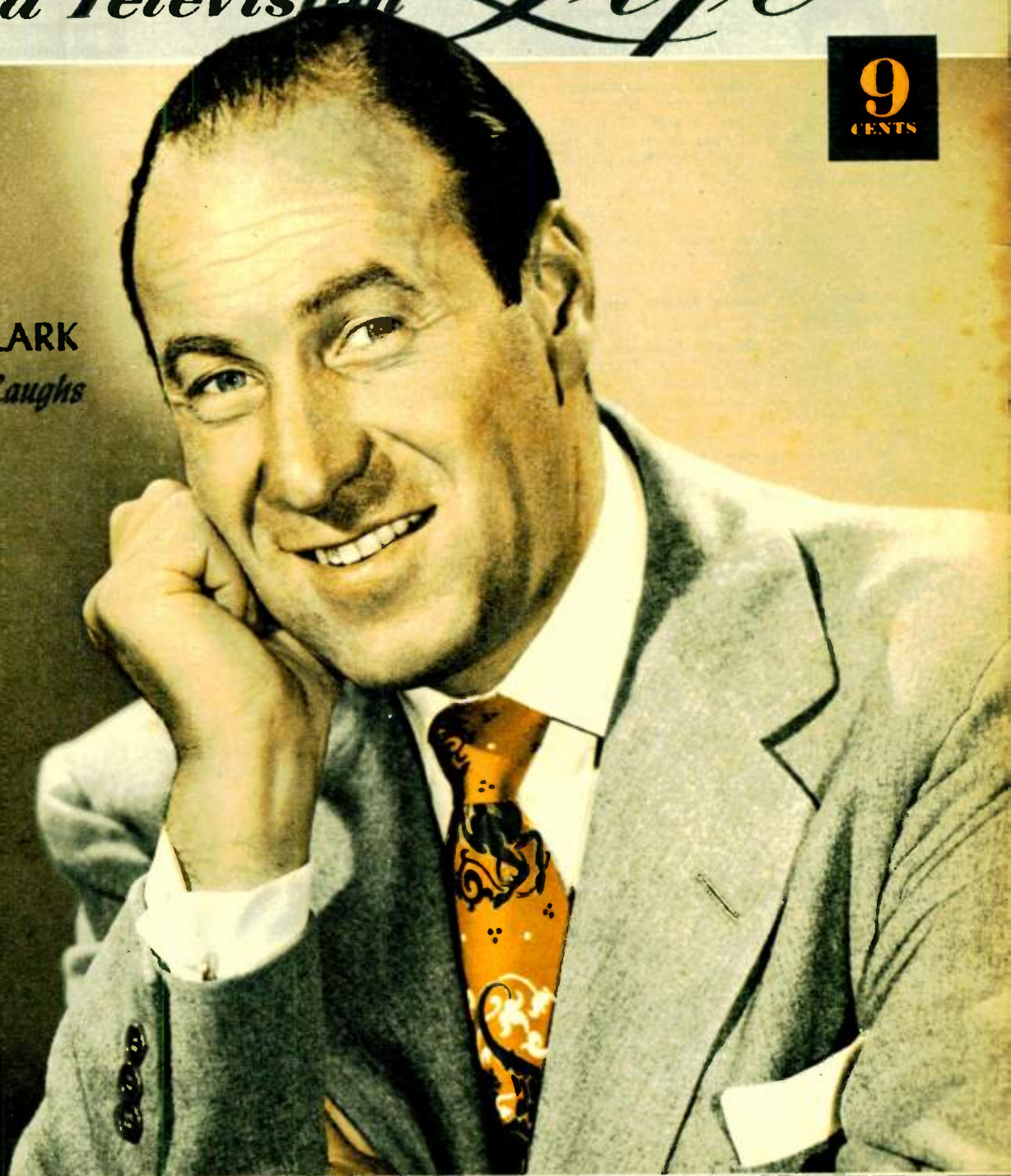

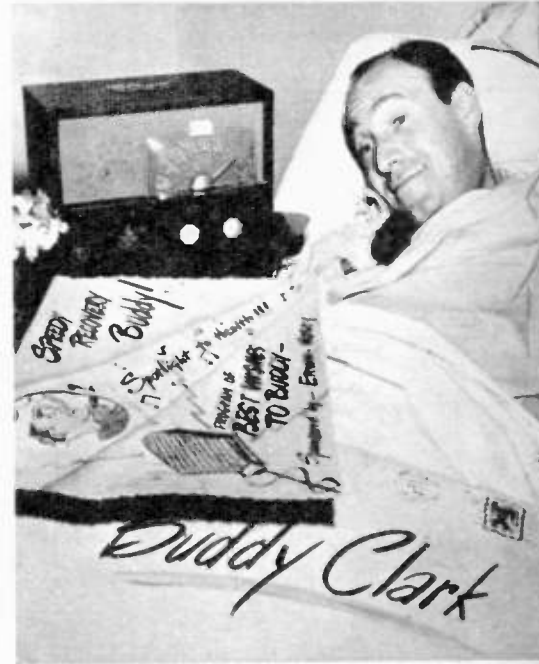

Song in His Heart

Buddy Clark Has Reason to Be Especially Happy These Days—He's Recovered From An Illness and Realizing an Ambition

SOME years ago, around Boston, a group of boys from a club were playing football. The quarterback, a slight youngster then without much of a voice, played the last quarter of the game with a badly sprained ankle. When the group's leader cut the shoe off the injured leg, he berated the small player for having gone on with the injury. Little Buddy Clark protested: "I couldn't quit the game . . . I was the only fellow in the club who knew all the signals!"

That same spirit prompted a tottering, wan Buddy Clark to leave his hospital bed, drag himself to NBC and go happily through the full "Carnation Contented Hour" last spring. True, Buddy performed his first return show from a wheel chair, but he was on stage, therefore happy.

The operation which kept Buddy hospitalized for nine days arose from a stomach disorder which in turn had arisen from worry. It started during the war years, when even the song Buddy keeps in his heart hadn't kept gnawing thoughts of an uncertain financial future dormant.

Army chow on top of a nerve-wracked stomach lining hadn't helped the singer. So these several years later, it was off to the hospital—or off of the show!

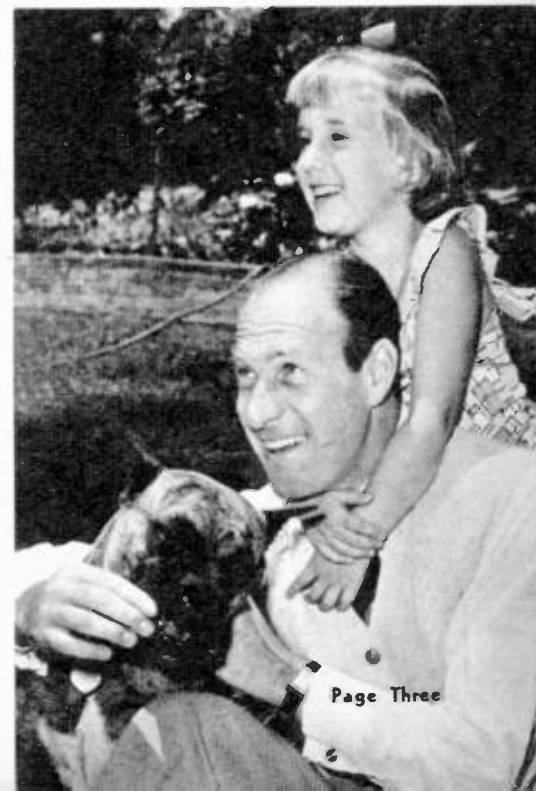
Loves Laughter

It's a safe bet that a void exists at the hospital now that the singer has left. Known principally for his romantic baritone voice (a baritone with the power of a bass and the lyric qualities of a tenor), Buddy is primarily a comic personality. An interview with Clark invariably turns into a session of lyrics and laughs. It follows that the nurses and doctors in attendance on the star would come in for the same sort of mad levity that marks a meeting with Buddy. And no doubt the three thousand or more cards, letters and gifts that Buddy received from well-wishers inside the trade and out provided some entertaining over-the-shoulder readings. Buddy deplors not being able to answer personally every good wish, but his early attempts at this Herculean task were stopped by his physician, a man already nearly turned gray by his intractable patient having removed the pipe leading to his stomach. The hospital had planned on feeding

AS SPRING turned into summer, the thoughts of some of radio's stalwarts turned from love to dreams of conquest over denizens of both the deep and the shallow.

Knowing of old that this would happen, we alerted photographers from the networks to keep their eyes on the stars and be ready with the Speed-Graphics. Some of their stories and pictures bear bringing to you readers.

One of the radio-ites who determinedly announced, "I'm going fishin' this summer for sure!" was NBC's Alan Young. Alan, a former native of Canada where the giant trout abound, naturally leans toward fresh-water fun. But for the busy comic, a weekly trip out Ventura Boulevard to the trout-stocked pool at Sportsman's Lodge had to replace a trek to Canada's sparkling waters. He reported that for the fisherman whose idea of a thing of beauty was a well-tied fly, the local sport wasn't too lively, but . . . "if it's rest you're after, this is the spot. And they'll always sell you the fish the other guy with no kitchen caught!"

The Hardy Way

Glenn Hardy, of KHJ-Don Lee's "Alka-Seltzer Newspaper of the Air," has made many a fishing trip, but his recent junket with Bob Dwyer of the Wade Advertising Agency

lingers uppermost in Glenn's mind. Hardy wanted to put on a good show for the "boss," so, not content to fish in a stream near the cabin high in the Sierras, he arranged for a pack-in journey. It was up at the crack of dawn for the pair as they carefully packed all equipment on a mule. Then followed a tortuous twenty-mile hike to a far-removed stream. Glenn and Bob hurried to unpack to get at the fishing. Everything was there . . . cooking utensils, sleeping bags, mosquito netting . . . everything, that is, except the fishing tackle. Glenn had left it back at camp. The pair returned in silence. Next day they fished near the cabin, and the accompanying picture of Hardy shows that the fellows did all right.

Jack McElroy of ABC's "Breakfast in Hollywood" never lets a week end go by, summer or winter, that he isn't out on the big drink after yellowtail, barracuda, or anything that will give Jack a tussle. His ambition is to land a fish his own weight, and a 260-pound fish would be a prize for anyone. This summer found Jack undergoing his most unforgettable and unpleasant fishing experience. Jack was out with Norman Marsh, creator of the syndicated "Danny Hale" cartoon strip. McElroy, with fishing equipment in hand, slipped on the boat deck, rammed his right arm through the plate-glass window of the craft, and wound up overboard. Marsh pulled the surprised and chagrined emcee aboard, administered first aid, and headed for port, where a San Diego doctor took ten stitches in a deep gash in the wounded arm midway between Jack's hand and elbow.

The father half of NBC's Harris-Faye show spent part of this summer's vacation fishing done up in a fashion that would have satisfied

Garbo. But it wasn't, with Phil, an attempt to avoid recognition. Harris was making a movie this year, and orders from the studio went out: "No more tan!" It seems that Technicolor and an outdoor look don't go hand in hand. The outdoor guy who used to rush from his Sunday night show straight to a lake for several days took it so hard that immediately upon the picture's completion, he took off for Klamath Falls, near Klamath, Oregon, for some of their famous fresh-water

sport. It's a safe bet that once in the wilds with his pianist-arranger, Al Neuman (an equally ardent fisherman), Phil's lack of garb would scarcely pass censorship.

Excess Baggage

Richard Aurandt, CBS musical composer-conductor, is—like most fishermen—a story teller, but since his latest fishing trip, Dick boasts a fish story that's really true.

In the dark of one early morning, Dick carried rods, reels, boxes and

cans down to his front walk, placed them outside the yard fence, and then helped his friends to load the car. They drove to the airport, where a plane stood waiting to carry them to Lake Crowley.

Then they began transferring the fishing gear to the plane. One large can seemed to belong to no one. Investigation proved the container to be—not an insulated fishing can—but the Aurandt garbage can, picked up by mistake in the darkness!

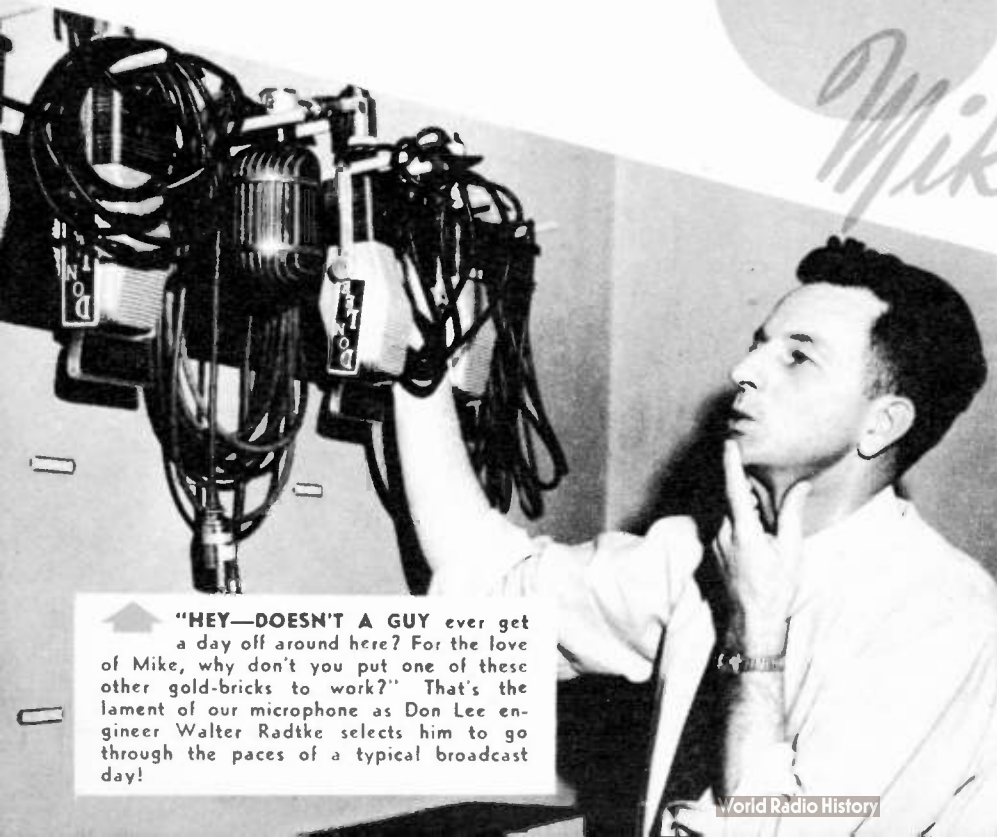

patient Clark through this pipe, but he wasn't having any, and immediately upon recovering consciousness removed the offending equipment.

The old adage about the darkest hour being just before the dawn worked double time in Clark's case, for no sooner did the patient make his getaway from the odor of ether and the clean crispness of hospital sheets than he was offered a solid role in "Girl Crazy," a musical comedy to be presented in the series at the Greek Theater this summer. Buddy's role is that of "Danny Churchill," but the part has been rewritten to include another comedy role. With Clark as the hero, "Danny" will find himself also singing "But Not for Me" and "Bidin' My Time," ballads originally handled by other cast members. Not only can the delighted Buddy at last give with the full comedy treatment, he has a chance to satisfy his terpsichorean proclivities.

But the Clark who talks and acts like another Clark, the famed comedian Bobby, and who sings like an angel, has a new worry. Buddy finds difficulty in memorizing lines, whether they be songs or dialogue. At the time Radio and Television Life talked to Buddy he had a fast six weeks in which to learn the entire score and script for "Girl Crazy."

About this beloved task, the long-time star of record, stage, screen and radio says, "If you don't think I'm nervous about that, you're crazy!"

thing to it. He would tackle the sport himself. Stewart wanted to concentrate on the art of fishing itself and not be troubled by such possible distractions as sea-sickness, so he decided on the Santa Monica pier for a first angling experience. Rumors Are Flying

Peter Donald's "Talk Your Way Out of This" may return to the air, re-sponsored. . . . Robert Montgomery may do a non-controversial commentary in the Drew Pearson spot when Pearson's sponsor drops out August 28. . . . They say there will be more giveaways on the air this fall than ever before. . . . ABC may do a documentary on "loyalty" this fall, rivaling their last season's "Communism" in scope and preparation. . . . "The Shy Guy" auditioning at CBS. We don't know anything about it, but that title sounds awfully cute. . . . Hoagy Carmichael's music drama, "Melody Morgan," also auditioning at CBS. . . . Songwriter Harold Arlen ("Blues in the Night," "Stormy Weather," etc.) may have his own song show again. . . . The long-awaited audition of Helen Traubel and Lauritz Melchior in their domestic comedy series about a married opera pair has been postponed, is now promised for some time in August. . . . "Club 15" may be the subject of a musical movie, on the order of the Al Jarvis "Make-Believe Ballroom" picture. . . . "Gallant Heart," daytime serial, may return to the air. . . . Sealtest is another former nighttime sponsor headed for daytime radio. . . . "The Clock," psychological melodrama series, may return to radio. . . . Next star to author his life for the book stores may be Lionel Barrymore.

Looks Like

Bill Spler ("Sam Spade" and "Philip Morris Playhouse") will be the director on the NBC James Mason show, now that Arch Oboler has bowed out. . . . Four movie studios will participate in the big ABC show, "Academy Quiz." If the whole series is as much fun as the audition record we heard, it'll be a great show. . . . ABC has signed "Ozzie and Harriet" to a ten-year pact. Doesn't this make the Nelsons the only triple-play show this season—from NBC to CBS to ABC? . . . Pat Patrick will again be "Ericl Twing," the man who says "Fa-rey-ends," on the Edgar Bergen show when it returns to the air via CBS this fall. . . . MBS is the only network not accepting whisky ads as of now. The other three nets have reversed their long-standing ban against Demon Rum. . . . Al Jarvis has relaxed his ban against medicinal ads. Lydia Pinkham broke

through. Maybe radio can recoup advertising losses by tapping earlier "bans" on various products. . . . "Original Amateur Hour" to be cut to forty-five minutes from its previous hour. Will it now be titled "Original Amateur Forty-Five Minutes"? You can bet it won't—radio is the only place in the world where five minutes can be an "hour." . . . George Burns and Gracie Allen snagged a sponsor this week for their fall show on CBS. . . . Radio isn't the gold mine it often seems to outsiders. Take a look at the findings released by the U. S. Department of Labor on radio singers and actors. Statistics reveal that the majority of them must hold outside jobs in order to make a living. Two out of every five make more money in outside employment than they do on the air. Announcers eat better. . . . Latest news from the "Suspense" series is that Bill Spier, long identified with the show, will return as director next season. . . . What's doin' with Jerry Colonna? He's to be seen in the Greek Theater production of "Girl Crazy" in a comedy lead. . . . Virginia Bruce returns to the air to hostess the new Hollywood series "Make Believe Town," on CBS. . . . Gordon MacRae's wife, Sheila, now in the movies at Warner Brothers, where hubby works. . . . Margaret Whiting will be heard with Jack Smith on Mondays and Fridays when his CBS show resumes. . . . Station KWIK has been bought by the union that has FM station KFMV, and they may be combined.

Your Cue (Shows You May Like)

"Breakfast With Burrows"

Abe Burrows's show has gotten bigger and bigger, with less and less of Burrows in it. On "Breakfast With Burrows" ("He Gets Up Late"), KNX, 6:30 p.m. Monday, the illiterate intellectual is surrounded by a full orchestra, a comedy maid, a stooge, a vocal group and a guest star. Against all this competition, Abe and his guest star usually emerge winded but triumphant.

Frankly, we've enjoyed his clowning on his original unpretentious fifteen minutes and as a member of the "This Is Broadway" panel more than on the present series. Where his songs were once a mockery of a whole school of popular tunes, as in "I May Be Sick in the Hospital, But I'm Not Sick of You-oo," they now seem to be equipped with the traditional punchline of a music-hall routine.

Best moments of the program are in

the operettas and musical comedies with which he and his guest stars climax the program. Recently, Hildegard, a singer we never expected to sound like anyone but Hildegard, co-starred with Burrows in an original titled "Hopalong Hildegard," and managed almost as many good, strong notes as Ethel Merman does in her second-balcony mood.

All the endearing qualities of Burrows are still present, and we do recommend him to anyone looking for the unobvious in comedy. His eagerness for the audience to be happy, his excitement at sharing a joke with the listeners gives him the air of a man who wishes nothing but good for everyone. Indeed, in his eagerness, he seems almost ready to charge right through those little holes in the microphone.

"My Good Wife"

If a talented radio gal got the same sort of gold-plated deal that talented radio guys get, Arlene Francis would have a better vehicle than her present one, "My Good Wife," KFI, 7:00 p.m. Saturday. Arlene is one of the few women we've ever heard on the air who possessed the trigger-quick abil-

ity to think and ad-lib with the speed and humor of our top male emcees.

In "My Good Wife" she is able to inject some of the humor and much of the timing of her best ad-lib performances, but she's too good to have to stick to the script. As "Mr. and Mrs. Emerson," Arlene and John Conte are one of those radio couples who always live in towns with names like "Larchmont." Suburbanites, they call 'em in the East—in the West, we call 'em ranchers.

As the "Mitchells," Charles Irving and Linda Watkins pace the stars in their domestic-comedy goings-on.

There have been so many titles on the order of "My Favorite Wife," "My Favorite Husband," not to mention "My Favorite Blonde," "She Married Her Husband," that we are able to remember "My Good Wife" only by recalling what a good performer Arlene Francis is.

"Spin to Win"

Seems to us that "Spin to Win," KNX, 9:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, has the most difficult quiz gimmick we've ever heard. The winner of the jack-pot sum must be able to identify a record played backwards. To these ears, all the backward records used on the program have sounded like "Chickery-Chick" played forward. The problem is a difficult one and few contestants have cracked it. However, most of the other queries on the show, identification of titles, bands, vocalists, etc., have been quite simple.

This is one of those quiz programs that gives listeners a chance to compete as well as members of the studio audience. The emcee phones an at-home contestant, and if he is unable to answer the question, he designates a member of the studio audience to try.

Though the giveaway-quiz show has evidently proven to be what the great mass of listeners want, the only real entertainment on "Spin to Win," as on most quizzes, depends upon the personality of the emcee. The show is fortunate in having Warren Hull, who keeps the show moving and who displays a pleasant personality. Most of the records played on the program are pretty good ones, but anyone looking for entertaining records can no doubt find a local disc jockey who plays them without letting quizzes get in the way.

We View With Alarm

. . . Another interview bore—those non-professional subjects who interject the word "listen" at the beginning of every sentence.

. . . Those recorded commercials that are not only loud, dull and too familiar, but also have a crack in the record, believe it or not. Now that's really adding insult to injury.

. . . That soap-opera dialogue that strings itself out endlessly: "I know you're in love . . . in love with someone else . . . you're not in love with me . . . you're in love with Bart . . . Bart Williams . . . you're in love with Bart Williams, Lillian's husband . . . that's who you're in love with!" After all this, to have the heroine say, "What . . . what do you mean?" is inanity at its greatest.

. . . Those panel members on radio discussion programs who talk over one another thinking that the audience will hear the one who is speaking loudest. They should know that what emerges is sheer cacophony.

. . . That daytime program that advertises face cream on its opening commercial and floor wax on its closing one. The association is frightening!

Sevareid Tribute

The day of the airplane crash near Bombay, India, in which thirteen American correspondents died, among them former CBS newsmen George Moorad, CBS correspondent Eric Sevareid broadcast this touching tribute:

"I would like to include here a special obituary notice about George Moorad, though I never dreamed I would be writing his obituary in any form. He was with CBS for years in China, Russia, the Middle East. He followed the war in most of the tough places, like Guadalcanal and Italy.

"During the war he sometimes made a joke: 'I'm not trying to be the best correspondent,' he said, 'I'm trying to be the oldest.' That was what he said, but it was not the way he worked. He

was a brave and rather gay person. He survived the war, though it often seemed he would not. This news is a little hard to get used to, and I suppose that's the feeling in all the news offices the other men come from."

Radio Lifelines

WASHINGTON, D. C., JULY 16. Last Saturday about this time, I was backstage at CBS's Playhouse No. 3 in New York watching rehearsal for Nila Mack's "Let's Pretend" series, the children's program which has been kiddoed with just about every radio award there is. Miss Mack was not feeling well enough to brave the oppressive heat, but it was encouraging to see how smoothly others stepped in to direct and present the program, which will soon go into its twentieth air year.

SOME OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE working the show have been with it ever since they were old enough to decipher a script. Gwen Davies, who always has a leading role, was one of the two babies who prattled before the mike when "Let's Pretend" was known as "Mary and Helen." She's married and mother of a not-quite-one-year-old daughter, a fact usually soft-pedaled because it might not be good for the show. We think this attitude is a bunch of rubbish.

CHILDREN WILL LIKE THE PROGRAM, regardless. Summer audiences fall off due to heat and vacations, but during the school months, boys and girls pack Playhouse 3 to the rafters. The warm-up is direct and quiet. "Anybody who doesn't believe in Santa Claus can put on his hat and go home," the warmer-upper stated coldly.

YOUNG PEOPLE IN RADIO have such a delightful touch. I was surprised to learn, when visiting the Bob Smith-Howdy Doody show, that practically the entire program personnel is youthful. Eddie Kean, who writes all the songs, is twenty-three; Bob Keeshan (who writes and helps direct other TV shows and who does Clara-bell the Clown on Bob's show just for kicks) is about the same age as Eddie. Rhoda Mann, the blonde puppeteer who pulls the strings for Howdy Doody, is only twenty-one. That makes Bob himself, at thirty-one, practically an antique!

ALTHOUGH HERE IN WASHINGTON some excellent radio programs originate, it seems to me there should

In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

Rumors Are Flying

General Electric is working on a series of TV boxes (like music juke boxes) for public counter and table use. The insertion of a nickel in the slot brings forth three minutes of video entertainment. . . . Desi Arnaz is slated for a video show this coming autumn, as is Tony Martin. . . . NBC-TV is going to give rebirth to "Lights Out," the scary old radio series that kept folks up late! . . . Rumor hath it that William Pereira, the famous architect, is designing a "videatorium" believed to be the largest of its kind. The circular auditorium seats spectators above the stages, away from cameras, wires, etc. Great secrecy surrounds the venture, and it is further rumored that a big radio network is behind the whole deal. . . . KFI-TV is rumored shifting its Saturday shows out of the way of KECA-TV's big grid tilts, while KTTV will build a show especially designed to buck the S.C.-U.C.L.A. games. KNBH, KTSN, KTLA and KLAC-TV will probably continue to skip Saturday afternoon. The KTTV show is rumored to follow the pattern of the giant NBC giveaway on Sunday afternoons. . . . Televising of the opening of the Century Theatre's first commercial play, the George S. Kaufman-Moss Hart vehicle, "The Fabulous Invalid," is under discussion.

Looks Like

NBC will telecast all the Friday night boxing bouts originating in Madison Square Garden. Gillette (which for years has been snatching tabs on big sports events for radio) will sponsor the events, beginning in September. . . . Boris Karloff, most celebrated menace of stage and screen, signed an exclusive full-year contract with ABC, under which he will devote all his time to ABC television. Karloff will enact lead roles in the ABC-TV series titled "Conflict" and will portray a variety of roles which have made him famous. . . . "Li'l Abner," dauntless defender of American womanhood and comic-strip hero with forty million palpitant fans, will become the first character out of "the funnies" to be seen on video in a series. Show will be done entirely with "live" actors, and the hunt is on for similar-looking character actors and actresses. . . . Dodge Motor Cars will co-sponsor with Hoffman Radio Corporation the S.C.-U.C.L.A. games on KECA-TV this fall. It is a full Dodge-Hoffman tieup, with reciprocal show plugs, etc. . . . Frank De Vol and Jack Smith, following their arrival in Eng-

land, went directly to London to appear as featured guests on the BBC "Television Picture Parade" program. Smith and De Vol were the first United States artists to appear on this particular British video show. . . . As a result of some of the major television set makers slashing prices, a portion of the smaller makers are dropping out of the game. . . . Milton Berle recently visited KTLA. The girl at the desk didn't recognize the comic, asked his identity, didn't recognize the name and announced the steaming Milton as "Milton Burns." It seems "our Millie" lodged a complaint agin' her, too. . . . Marjorie and Jack Reynolds, film players, are packaged for a husband-and-wife show, and Louise Albritton and Charles Collingwood are setting up a chatter show along lines of contemporary news-interest stuff. . . . Arthur Shields, brother of Barry Fitzgerald and himself a former Abbey Theater performer, is lined up for an ABC-TV video package called "Pibby Houllhan." Show is a situation comedy revolving around the superintendent of a New York apartment house. . . . Ben Gage's "Rumpus Room" looks like a good bet for fall presentation in the East via CBS film process, with Dr. Ross Dog Food picking up the tab on the whole works. The sponsor will have his product in Eastern markets by that time.

Big-Time Films on KTLA

Some months ago it was rumored that Paramount's KTLA, Channel 5, had a tieup with WPIX, in New York. Everyone "huh-uhed" the idea and stoutly continued to deny it through the months.

But the latest coup, as a result of some sort of friendship with the Eastern station, lay in KTLA's securing (by lease) thirteen feature films from WPIX. They will be telecast on Friday nights in the spot now being held by "Hopalong Cassidy" films. Among the fare scheduled are "Pygmalion," "Jamaica Inn," "The Beachcomber," "Sidewalks of London," "A Star Is Born," "Dark Journey," "Young in Heart," "Major Barbara," and others, all loaded with name stars.

Our "Precasts and Previews" column will carry the beginning date of the series and the schedule thereafter.

Off Lens (Personalities)

Video in Theaters

Large-screen theater video can well

become a reality in Southern California (from Santa Barbara to San Diego) this coming winter. New York bigwigs have given 20th Century-Fox the go-ahead on a video system linking twenty-five of that outfit's theaters.

Programs, covering musicals, dramatic hits and any other amusement that will draw box-office coin, will emanate from the stage of Grauman's Chinese Theatre in Hollywood. By means of closed circuit, the fare will be piped to each of the houses in the network. The whole shebang comes off at the appalling sum of \$4,000,000. This rumored layout of cash has to cover the circuit houses in the neighboring towns, the relay station atop Laurel Canyon, remote towers in the mountains between here and San Diego, theater installations of TV equipment, and above all, operators with know-how.

In the event the government fails to okay a private closed channel for this operation, Fox is surveying the possibility of using micro-wave relay on phone wires for the telecasting.

Stop, Listen, Look (Shows You May Like)

Olsen and Johnson

Ole Olsen and Chic Johnson, legendary even among other vaudevillians for their no-holds-barred vaudeville, got up a video show. Their entertainment offering is one hour in length, sponsored by a staid company long among leaders in the automotive industry, and comes to Coast viewers each Tuesday night over KNBH's Channel 4 at 8:00. These facts remain unchanged from week to week.

The show itself falls into the very best O&J "Hellzapoppin'" tradition, with hundreds of props, midgits, clowns, lovely girls, tricks, and, not the least of all, the audience, getting in on the act.

Whenever some bit of madness isn't going on, Olsen and Johnson take a turn at vaude delivery. They are superlatively funny. An evening with the show is a peek into the old days of vaudeville, and it's not inconceivable that a very lucrative business selling show ducats could grow up on the curb outside NBC's Gotham studio.

Al Goodman, his orchestra and chorus usually play (in the manner of a circus band beating out the grand entrance music) a tune or melody tipping off the nature of the acts to follow. "By the Sea" is, of course, followed with a ridiculous mythical trip to Coney Island. The ensuing slapstick finds tramps, vendors, tramp vendors, Zulus, queens, bums, dancers, acrobats, Olsen and Johnson, and the audience mixed into a really awesome spectacle.

The show is an expensive one by video standards, and makes any other comedy you may have seen (unless you have seen Olsen and Johnson in the flesh) pale fare.

For a real Tuesday treat, though,

dig up someone who isn't too familiar with the comic old vaudeville team—there won't be many of these uninitiated left in a few weeks—and who hasn't seen their Buick show. Invite this one over to watch the video hour with you . . . then watch friend viewer's face as he watches Olsen and Johnson.

Caliente TV Show

More than 25,000 feet of sixteen-millimeter film and upwards of 5,000 miles in air travel have been consumed during the first eighteen weeks of production on the only complete television program featuring thoroughbred racing, the Joe Hernandez delayed presentation from the Agua Caliente race course at Caliente, Baja California, just across the Mexican border from San Diego.

The Caliente telecast film had its eighteenth presentation on Sunday, July 17, via Los Angeles Times-CBS station KTTV, Channel 11. It has been on each Sunday evening at 10:00 p.m., a time that has proved outstanding in sustaining viewers' interest.

Joe Hernandez (the "voice of Santa Anita" who calls the race recap on KMPC for AM radio listeners, as well as the public-address announcer at Del Mar race course) and his crew fly via Paul Mantz Air Service special plane each Sunday morning to the Baja California course, film the "cut-ins" that have proved to be distinct features of the thirty-minute show, and then film eight races. The film is flown back, in the laboratory by 7:00 p.m., and on the moviola machines being edited by 8:30. The completed film, picture and sound, reaches KTTV approximately fifteen minutes before screen time.

Credit for good pictures that show all the horses and each horse, factors that make a race an interesting thing, goes to film editor Harry Lehman and cameraman Danny Rouzer, who comprise Hernandez' associates in the Caliente TV program.

The only thing lacking is the actual color you see at the track, but you don't need the jockey's silks in evidence with old-timer Hernandez calling the race.

"It's a Neat Trick"

One of the most dexterous magicians of television is holding down the 7:45 p.m. spot on KTSL's Channel 2 each Tuesday night. Eddie Silverman is host and one-man show of magic so magical it makes you believe in the stuff. A guest appears with him each time, to make sure, and we quote Eddie's own words . . . "there is no cheating." A little bit of the sort of cheating that would accompany Eddie's tricks would entail ability beyond most viewers' wildest dreams of dexterity and skill, and would undoubtedly prove as entertaining as the "magic" employed, but if he wants a high degree of integrity preserved, that's that. Anyway, someone has to be on hand to draw cards, hold capsules or boxes, and wear the expression of bewilderment habitual to magicians' assistants.

If we could recount Eddie's tricks,

we would. What we saw was an empty tube into which was placed a six-inch salute firecracker being held by the guest of the evening, a full three feet from his body in plain sight of all. After some flourishing of a handkerchief (by Eddie Silverman) the handkerchief disappeared entirely, the tube was opened, and out came the white linen square. The firecracker was discovered in the baffled guest's pocket.

This was followed by the handling of playing cards (handling that could make a millionaire of Silverman should he take up games of chance and cultivate a great disregard for ethics), and some mysterious hocus-pocus that smacked of the occult.

But the trick of the evening lay in Eddie's changing the commercial from a commercial into entertainment. MJB coffee, however tasty and flavorful, is still just another brand of coffee, and after radio's hammering away on the subject of coffee for more than fifteen years, audiences are pretty hardened to blandishments.

Mr. Silverman wisely doesn't depend upon his delivery, which isn't all it could be. But then, concentrate on magic and something has to suffer, even if it turns out to be voice and line-reading.

He craftily displayed for a recent commercial, a large MJB ad picturing a pretty girl who swears by the brand. After the briefest sponsor pitch about movie starlets who prefer MJB, Eddie tore up the ad, ripping the lush brunette physiognomy into shreds. As he shredded, he deplored having forgotten to save the picture for a friend who undoubtedly would have liked it as a pin-up. Next step was to wave his hand and make the poster whole again. Viewers won't forget the trick, consequently not the Java brand. That in itself is a "neat trick." So, he can't tear up a picture every Tuesday, but from what we saw, host Silverman has a good store of tricks left up his sleeve, some of which are undoubtedly adaptable to the commercial, and all of which are good.

Second Glances (Critical Comment)

"Ford Variety Theater"

The most recent half hour we spent with KTTV's "Ford Variety Theater" seemed to combine visual goodies with some pretty boring stuff.

Cass Daley, Herb Shriner and Peter Donald starred . . . Cass, of course, singing "A Good Man Is Hard to Find" and "Together." A gooder singer than Cass is hard to find! . . . particularly on that song.

Peter Donald teed off the show with a series of impersonations, bits of old American stage lore and general emcee rattle-rattle. After his references to an old Irish radio character, "Mr. District O'Tourney," and a baseball team "known as the Gettysburg Giants because they scored four and seven years ago," we gave up and

ALBUM OF THE WEEK (Capitol-Telefunken): In one of the top recordings of Tchaikovsky's "Ouverture Solennelle" ("1812") the interpretation by Mengelberg and the Amsterdam Concertgebouw Orchestra shows rare understanding of the composer's dramatic intent, from the reverent introduction of the hymn, "God Preserve Thy People," through the gypsy song with its tambourine, mounting in the intensity of the battle music to the climax of "Anthem of the Czars" and the triumphant pealing of church bells. . . .

RECORD OF THE WEEK (Harmony): Pearl Bailey and "Hot Lips" Page start the Harmony ball rollin' with a pair of top-drawer novelties—"Baby, It's Cold Outside" and "The Hucklebuck." . . . Both are strictly for laughs in that free 'n' easy style with aside ad libs that characterize both Bailey and Page . . . and best versions of both tunes so far. . . .

LP-MICROGROOVE (Mercury): To derive the full benefit of this category, listen to the Khachaturian "Concerto for Violin and Orchestra" as played by David Oistrakh and the Russian State Symphony. . . . Each of the three movements is recorded without a break to provide increased listening pleasure by this great artist's version of a great composition. . . .

SONGS WITHOUT WORDS (Capitol): Ever had a yen to write lyrics to a song? Here are six original untitled popular tunes by composers Johnny Mercer, Jimmy McHugh, Isham Jones, Ray Noble, Livingston & Evans, and Paul Weston made to order for embryo lyricists—and \$1000 advance royalty to the best lyrics for each, according to the entry blank accompanying the album. . . .

SINGIN' THE BLUES (Brunswick): Jack Teagarden, his trombone, voice and orchestra, make their reappearance in six sides recorded over a decade ago—and still tops in the blues field. . . . Especially outstanding is Big T's "St. James Infirmary" and "Black and Blue," easily worth the price of the set alone. . . .

SY OLIVER ORCH. (Decca): The old Aristokrat of the music world has a choice pair of rhythm tunes in "Nine o'Clock Gal" and "When My Sugar Walks Down the Street"—with Sy handling the "Sugar" vocal and Joe Bailey doing a fine bit of piping on the flip-over. . . .

JIMMY DORSEY ORCH. (Columbia): First appearance on this label left much to be desired from JD, who has made some great waxings in his time. "And It Still Goes" and "Fiddle Dee Dee" are fair material, but arrangements lacked the punch to give Jimmy a chance to sell the band. . . . A.M.

Showcase for Songbirds

Future Video Canaries Are Being Tested on Regular Network Shows

HOLLYWOOD's legion of girl singers will provide the American Broadcasting Company with new faces for television.

The ABC network, which plans to have its own video programs on the air over KECA-TV in September, has built a backlog of singing talent by the simple method of utilizing all available professional songbirds now in the Los Angeles area, showcasing them on two of its weekly radio shows.

One of these, known as "Take a Chorus," features Basil "Buzz" Adlam's orchestra and a different canary weekly. The musicale is produced by William T. Johnson, who collaborates with Adlam in the search for talented girl singers with "pro" backgrounds.

By "pro," Messrs. Adlam and Johnson mean gals who have gone through the initiation of singing with bands or on other radio shows. Being blessed with this professional experience means ability to handle such chores as may be thrown their way in either radio or television. Hollywood, the gentlemen believe,

has many such individuals who should be heard more frequently.

In recent months, Adlam has presented such scintillating personalities as Patti Clayton, Suzanne Ellers, Vicky Palmer, Nancy Sinclair, and Marion Morgan as vocalists on "Take a Chorus." Each was studied for her video possibilities.

"Buzz" believes this system is equally advantageous to the singer and the network. "While it would be much easier simply to use the same vocalist each week," he explained, "our plan of changing every week gives work and confidence to more individuals who need to sing and be heard at every opportunity if they are to succeed as singers."

Adlam, who is musical director for ABC in addition to conducting the orchestra for four different ABC shows, thinks that band vocalists

Kenzie were experimenting with tape recording on the Crosby program. It was immediately successful. None of the sound quality was lost, it was easy to handle, and a number of amazing "tricks" could be worked through cutting and amplification.

The medium passed the most rigorous test of all when a group of engineers were tested with it. The group listened to a live show and then a taped one, and were challenged to name which was which. They admitted that they couldn't.

Supervisor Demonstrates

Lloyd Hawkins, recording supervisor for the American Broadcasting Company, demonstrated one of the miracle machines for Radio and Television Life and revealed many interesting facts about his work. The turntables hold 5400 feet of tape, thirty-five minutes of playing time. The tape winds past the head at thirty inches a second. The sound is recorded on the dull side of the tape, magnetized with iron oxide. The tape itself is strong and flexible, won't

WHEN Bing Crosby decided that he needed a more flexible schedule than his live radio program permitted him, a long step was taken in developing a new industry. The American Broadcasting Company offered to record Crosby's programs at his convenience, and Bing forsook "live" for "transcribed."

At that time, a large hue and cry was raised. There existed in the industry a belief that radio listeners wouldn't accept recorded shows with the same enthusiasm they accorded the live ones. The other networks acted as if there was something not quite cricket about a recorded program.

Proven Success

That was three years ago. In the ensuing time, the American Broadcasting Company (and Bing) have proved that there's no business like show business, especially when it's on tape. The beginning was a struggle to find the best method of recording. In its early stages, the Crosby show was recorded on regular discs with some sacrifice of quality and convenience. Then came wire recording and the same problems.

Whys and Hows of Tape Recording

It's a Modern-Day Miracle, the Facile Handling of Time and Talent by Experts Of a New Industry, Radio Tape Recording

In San Francisco, he discovered Jack Mullin, an ex-Army engineer, who had experimented with German tape recording during the war and had developed a tape recorder of his own. The following season, Mullin and Mc-

stretch or shrink. It can be used over and over again with no loss in quality. By turning on the automatic eraser, the sound on a used tape can be wiped off and new sound recorded in the same operation. Speed is kept constant on the two turntables and the difference in diameters of the winding and unwinding

sides is automatically adjusted.

Editing of a tape-recorded show is done merely with a pair of sharp scissors and some specially developed Scotch tape. The operator plays the tape until he hears the word or phrase that he wishes to eliminate, slows down the machine until he isolates the exact spot and then cuts it out. It sounds easy and looks extremely difficult. The operator must have the ear of a musician to hear with the exactness his job requires. He can take an "s" off the end of a word, he can shave down the sound of an over-emphasized letter at the beginning of a word. He is also the only man in the world who handles tangible silence. When a pause is needed in a taped show, he cuts a piece of blank tape and puts in the "silence."

In addition to the Crosby program, ABC has used tape recording on the Louella Parsons program and the Groucho Marx show in order to attain qualities impossible on a live program. Miss Parsons is able to get interviews with hard-to-get celebrities by recording them separately. She is able to leave the end of her show open for last-minute news.

Groucho Marx has proved that tape is the comedian's ideal solution for the problems raised by the irresistible ad lib and the immovable script. His "You Bet Your Life" show runs in actuality about twice as long as the version you hear on the air. His wit can soar to the crazy heights it achieved on both stage and screen—and all the dull contestants can be left on the cutting-room floor.

I HAVE so many hobbies," declared "Fibber McGee and Molly" writer Don Quinn, "that I've no time for work!" Don was exaggerating slightly, for in the next breath he admitted, "Regardless of how well the show is grooved, writing it is one hell of an operation. In one month, the show's scripts are equal to one bad Broadway play."

Obviously, both the show and its scripts are so good that Don can kid about them. The important thing is what has happened to Don in the past few years. Even though his assistant, Phil Leslie, used to devote rugged hours to each week's scripting, Don tied himself in bow knots staying up all night Fridays and/or Saturdays whipping the situation comedy into final form. The rest of the week he recuperated from this titanic effort. It is all different now.

"They used to say a gag writer past forty was living on borrowed time," Don observed. "But I am really living now. I'm the happiest man in the country."

Don and Phil meet a week or two ahead of the show they are working on and, together with others important to the program, decide the story line. The Jordans ("Fibber and Molly") always give their approval before the writers start—in fact, Don

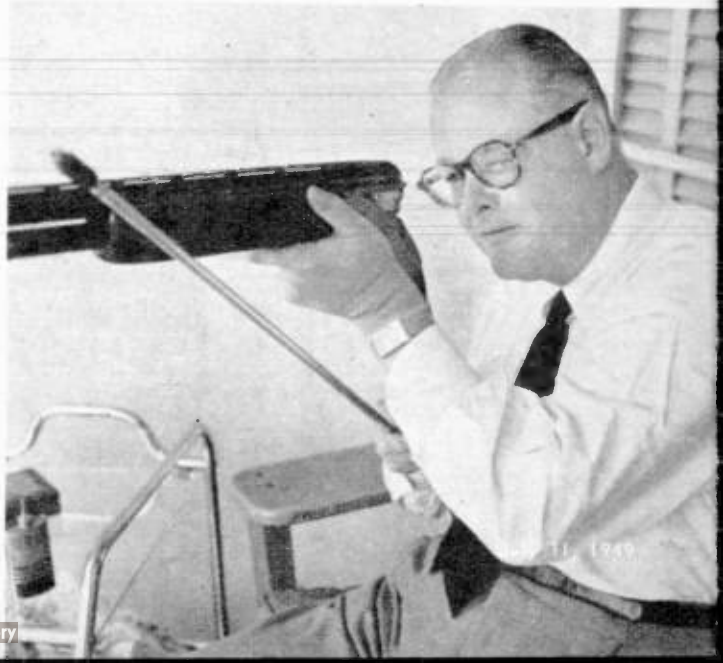
"No Time for Work"

wouldn't think of proceeding without their say-so. Since the script is broken into three "spots," Don and Phil amicably divide their work, Don taking the first and third sections one week and switching with Phil the next, all according to what each writer has a feeling for.

What each does is still work, but Don no longer bats his brains out in all-night vigils. He writes like a businessman keeping office hours. The remainder of his time he devotes to a string of new hobbies that would exhaust a teen-ager. Except that Don attacks each with his delightfully relaxed air and his one-in-a-thousand sense of humor.

Artistic

Always an admirer of oil paintings, he has taken up the brush and has finished one view of San Fernando Valley (from Beverly Glen). He drew it from memory in two hours, then went to the spot to check his accuracy. Of course Don has an advantage in taking up this hobby, for before he joined Jim and Marian Jordan, he was a commercial artist and already clever artistically.

But musically he isn't so talented. "I'm tone-deaf," he admitted, "but I bought an accordion in Canada and decided I wanted to learn to play it. I didn't know middle C when I signed with Vic Smith for a series of lessons."

Skeet shooting claims another share of Don's time. Just before the war, he started shooting at the Los Angeles - Santa Monica Gun Club with "Tuffy" Goff ("Abner" of "Lum and . . .") and although he had to discontinue the sport during the war, he has taken it up again.

Flying is another hobby, although Don believes he has the wrong tem-

perament to be an expert airman. Instead of giving up the enjoyment altogether, he goes up with Bob Kimick, one of the men in the show's orchestra and a competent pilot. Bob takes off and lands and Don takes over between times. On the ground, Quinn is an avid motorist and loves impromptu trips, the kind where he throws a bag in the back of the convertible and, with the top down, lights out for nowhere. He is eager to travel extensively . . . to China some day, to Europe "when it straightens up," to Hawaii, which he is fond of, to South America, to the Polynesian countries. So far he has visited Mexico, Canada, and Hawaii.

Chess with assistant Phil Leslie is another Quinn pastime. Don also likes gin rummy, poker, and "a child's game called Pollyanna," which he plays with his wife. They keep merciless score and actually pay each other off to the cent. No movie fan, the writer is beginning to like television with reservations. He thinks Milton Berle is "Mr. TV," and he also falls heavily for wrestling.

More Activity

At producer Nat Wolff's home, the Quinns learned how to square-dance and are now ardent followers of the allemande and do-si-do. Another strenuous hobby, however, has been restricted by Quinn's medico, who, in deference to Don's ulcer, has forbidden too much jouncy horseback riding. Though it breaks his heart, Don will probably sell his mount.



When he doesn't feel like riding, square dancing, painting, flying, motoring, skeet shooting, card-playing, accordion-playing, traveling, TV-viewing, or writing, Don knuckles down to his weekly quota of reading which roughly amounts to five books, twenty magazines, and four daily newspapers (three local and one New York).

Never a dull moment! Some people are afraid of being lonely or of having nothing to do. Don Quinn, on the other hand, has a horror of getting in a rut. "I even shave in a different place in the house each day," he confessed.

QUINN DEVOURS BOOKS AND MAGAZINES. Here in his arms he holds a week's representative supply of reading (usually five books and twenty magazines—three newspapers aren't shown). Date on calendar is not an oversight, but is a procedure with Don, who always turns the calendar to the date of the next "Fibber and Molly" show. May 31 was the closing one of the season. About mid-August, Don will flip the date to the opening fall broadcast.

DON AND HIS WIFE, EDYTHE, WILL PLAY CARDS on the slightest provocation. Until recently they were great addicts of a parchesi-type game, Pollyanna, but then they were exposed to Canasta and have that bug. Edythe, who claims she always loses, writes Don a check for his winnings.

only program of its type on local video.

Canine Star

Back in April of 1948, Herb and Martha Wagner conceived the idea of better acquainting dog owners, prospective dog owners and the public at large with the potentialities of dogs. They had their idea and they had their star in the form of Gypsy. Gypsy is a Doberman pinscher and is regarded as one of the most intelligent dogs in the country.

In one trick, Gypsy must remember fifty-eight cues and commands. She never forgets them. The eight-year-old dog learns a trick a day and always remembers. More complicated tricks are taught by combining the individual basic ones already learned.

But when their show started on KTLA, Mr. and Mrs. Wagner's aim of bettering a dog's place in life (through more tolerance on the part of non-owners and better understanding and training of dogs by owners) couldn't be accomplished through merely having Gypsy appear before the cameras and be smart for the viewers.

Thus it is that each week the

features a visit from "the girl next door" (Louise Boggs), who comes to Herb's back yard to consult him about her untrained dogs and methods for their correction. The bases for all Wagner training are understanding and complete kindness. More simply, you don't hit a person for making a mistake, so why abuse a dog?

ONE OF the most watchable shows on the local television beams is a once-weekly, ten-minute spot that defies most concepts of what a television show takes to get across. First of all, it features people as little as possible. There are no dancing girls, no laughable comedians, no jugglers.

In the second place, the show is designed to instruct, and almost every viewer who takes instruction as "entertainment" wants his fare as sugar-coated as possible.

In "Man's Best Friend" the pooches are the stars. Their antics take care of the sugar-coating nicely. For a year the show has been drawing crowds to the studio. The difficulty of emulating it is proven by the fact that "Best Friend" is the

Wagners present well-known dog breeders, show judges, dog owners—and other dogs. Object lessons augment instruction and suggestions. A dog can be better taught through kindness and reward—a system excluding physical violence and fear—so “Man’s Best Friend” shows viewers how to teach.

Other show participants are emcee Dick Garten and guests such as “the girl next door,” whose dogs serve as Mr. Wagner’s untrained examples. Mrs. Wagner, one of the biggest factors of the show’s success, is seldom seen. She stays offstage setting up acts and readying the animals for their appearances.

Unruly Show Guests

While Mrs. Wagner is absolutely sure of Gypsy’s behavior, she can’t always tell about the “guests.” The small talking Boston bull who visited the show one night was determined to get at the throat of every dog in the place. Viewers who remember this little fellow will also remember that nary a word did he utter while on screen. Yet the minute his disappointed owners bore him out of the studio, he set up a clatter of talk. “I want out,” “I want my mama,” and “Let me have it now,” referring to the goodies with which he was to have been rewarded on the show. His speaking ability isn’t hearsay . . . we were there and heard him.

The pup that is given away each month on the show’s contest must wait patiently with his owner for an appearance to wind up the time slot. These little fellows don’t understand the lights, heat and other dogs happily scrambling through acts all about them, and many times their eager baby whines set the other dogs on edge.

But little Mrs. Wagner’s seemingly magic touch keeps the whole caboodle in line. In Gypsy’s case, the mere raising of a finger reduces her to adoring silence.

Every week or so, the Wagners vary the show’s routine with movies of their dogs at work. A recent film spot showed Gypsy effecting a rescue of her mistress from the lake near their home. The wiry little Doberman swam out, towed the apparently lifeless human figure back to shore, then tugged it to safety from the edge swells lapping on shore.

While all the footage isn’t this spectacular, each chapter illustrates a training point from which owners can well profit.

Although dogs are a study and a hobby for Herb Wagner, they are not his career. He works for a pre-

cision-instrument firm, doing technical engineering. But as a hobby, dogs have served for thirty years. He has studied and trained them for that period. Wagner has trained them in every field: tracking, obedience trials (which he still judges at many shows), and even vaudeville.

The show’s other regulars are Freckles and Pancho, canine pals of Gypsy’s. As the three of them go through their paces, whether the evening’s duty calls for hauling into camera range a cart full of visiting puppies, or being subjected to much bandaging as a lesson to viewing dog owners, it is obvious that the happy obedience of Gypsy, Freckles and Pancho is based on no measure of fear. They love their act.

Mr. Wagner, who credits Freckles and Pancho fully for their intelligence and cleverness, says they still are no match for Gypsy’s superior intellect.

At a recent dog show at the Los Angeles Jonathan Club, Gypsy was asked to sign the guest book—and thus became the only canine to make that staid ledger with a pawprint.

While the current format stresses psychological training of the dog, Mr. Wagner eventually wants his

offer more possibilities than other types of singers.

“Girls who have sung with bands,” he said, “usually are good-looking, smartly dressed individuals who have learned how to perform in front of an audience. They are good bets for both radio and television.”

Adlam also uses different girl singers on “The Curt Massey Show.” This coast-to-coast program (like “Take a Chorus”) is heard nationally at different times, but serves as a splendid showcase for the girls who want to keep in singing “trim.”

dogs to enact human foibles on a weekly situation-comedy basis. An offstage voice would speak for the animal actors. He thinks the unusual aspect of this type of show has a future in television. Undoubtedly.

But nothing on earth is better designed to kill one act than another act that carries a pooch . . . even a single pooch. Let the dog walk onstage, do a simple nip-up, and the singing-acting-dancing-juggling sensation of the century is dead. So where would Mr. Wagner find two other acts—one to precede, one to follow the bill that presented a bunch of gleeful pups cavorting through a scene while their voices came from off stage?

We dare you, Mr. Berle.
