Capitol's Out With A Screamer

HOLLYWOOD—When "The First Family" album of a year or more ago sold 4.2 million copies in less than five months, cartoonist-writer Alen Robin and comedy-writer Earle Doud had an idea. Result is a new comedy album—"Welcome to the LBJ Ranch"—funny, timely and provocative, just issued by Capitol Records.

This time, instead of imitating voices, Robin and Doud reproduce actual voices of such celebrities as the President, Eisen-(Continued on page 6) You can promote a record to high heaven, but all the synthetic enthusiasm you build under it won't insure its selling unless it's in the groove. If it's in the groove and the manufacturer shows his confidence in it by legitimately advertising it—not with hypes—it will make the charts—not just any chart, but one of top integrity

from which the stations are programming and the trade is buying.

Probably the biggest mistake in today's recording industry is the consistency with which many manufacturers continue to squander production cash on a record that they 'hope' will be one of the best sellers of all time, but deep in their hearts they don't think so. They enter upon a gamble where the odds are all against them.

It's high time that the trade realize that in today's market—with the spiraling cost of production, distribution and mounting overhead—it must look the facts in the eye and stop trying to run a profitable business

with an inferior product.

They must grasp anew the inescapable fact that: (1) A single, in order to earn its investors a return, absolutely must be "in

Japan Reaches For Nashville Product; Rose Touring East

NASHVILLE-Music City has become so big on the world record scene that far-off Japan, widely regarded as the world's third largest music and record market, has reached out to Music City to welcome Wesley H. Rose, president of Acuff-Rose Publications Inc., and of Hickory Records, for the establishment of stronger ties, for records, copyrights and American talent.

Rose, now in the Orient on an extended tour, is known to look upon Japan as a nation filled with opportunity for American product. High on Rose's agenda is a general scrutiny of how the business works there, and discussions with leading Japanese industry people.

"We want to get our catalog exposed and exploited there," Rose says. "We know there's a great world-wide demand for our Hank Williams songs. We've done a lot of business with "Tennessee Waltz," with Don

Gibson's "Oh Lonesome Me" and "I Can't Stop Loving You" and with Roy Orbison's "Oh Pretty Woman."

Long a champion of the importance of the international phase of the music business, Rose at one time worked through key publishers such as Chappel, Campbell-Conally and Bourne in Britain in the exploitation of Acuff-Rose copyrights, but the business grew so rapidly that the firm opened a branch operation.

'Overall, our overseas business has increased by at least 200 pct. in the last five years," Rose said. "It will keep right on growing when we finally have our own offices in other key countries.

Acuff-Rose firms are already established in England, Germany, France, the Benelux countries, Italy, Scandinavia, Switzerland, Australia and Brazil.

the groove." (2) Must make a chart that the programmers and trade follow. (3) Must show their confidence in the product by legitimate advertising. It's happened before and will happen again—that a promotion man will direct the president's attention to somebody's chart where the record was listed at No. 87, or to an inflated hype, or to the fact that his artist guested on so-and-so's TV show the week before.

So what?

When the board of directors looks at the sales figures, the truth comes out. Dollar figures are hard to hype and the board knows that the record was a bust. When the producer and the talent leave a record date they too know whether or not they

If they have, start the money-making machinery going - promotion, advertising, distribution. Chart escalation is sure to follow. And watch the sales pour in.

NEW YORK-Latin American Licensing, representing several U.S. labels and pubberies in Latin America is having great success with the product of two of its clients -Tico Records and Roulette Records, according to Howard Cook. Morris Pellsman, general professional manager, and Norman Kurtz, vice-prexy and attorney for the firm, report that Shawn Elliott's "Shame and Scandal in the Family" has become a runaway seller in the region, having sold over 50,000 in Panama alone, and also going well in Brazil and Argentina.

Eden Pace Steps Up

NEW YORK-Clyde Otis, topper at Eden Music, reports that the firm is re-recording some of its best older songs including a few million sellers. He said sessions are also being set for some of the newer songs in Eden's catalog. Eden Music was largely a one-man operation until Fred Parker was added as general professional manager a few months ago. Parker's chief concern other than placing tunes has been to build up Eden's writing staff.

Chellman said "I have watched Frank Sweeney's radio career for many years. His interest and knowledge in pop, R&B, and country music makes him an ideal choice to lead our promotion department, plus the fact that he held a similar position for a Cleveland label a few years ago."


Sweeney has spent 13 years in radio both as an air personality and as an executive. He first rose to national prominence as music director for WHOT in Youngstown, Ohio, where he was tagged with the name "Swingin'." Thereafter Sweeney became an air personality for the Westinghouse outlet, 50,000 watt KYW in Cleveland. He then was named PD for Youngstown's WKBN. Most recently he played an important role in the huge success of Detroit's WKNR.

Sweeney has been given credit for breaking as pop hits such country records as "Mama Sang a Song" by Bill Anderson, "Three Hearts In a Tangle" by Roy Drusky, "On the Wings of a Dove" by Ferlin Husky, and others.

Reporting to Sweeney will be Ed Crawley who handles the promotion chores of Sound Stage 7, and B. J. McElwee, midwest regional man.

Sweeney and his wife, Marie, plan to move to Nashville after Jan. I. In the meantime he will operate from Detroit. "Actually I plan to spend most of my time on the road for the first few months," says Sweeney, "getting acquainted with the radio people all over the country and working with our distributors.


