One, titled: "General Frequency and CALI SIGN List" has more than 8000 frequencies in the range of 3 to 30 Mhz . listed. The book covers all types of utility stations, except RTTY (radioteletype) stations in frequency order. Frequency, call sign, name of station, ITU country symbol, and modulation type. Also there is a cross-reference in the rear of the book listed in call sign order. This alphabetical listing has more than 4000 call signs listed. Abbreviationg commonly used are also listed. One very unique feature of this book is that there is published therein the new Aeronautical mobile service frequency plan. Price of this book: \$12.00. The second publication is a companion to the first entitledi "Radioteletype Press Broadcasts, Tine Order List/ Agency Schedules". It consists of two parts. The first is listed in "time" order (GMT) for every half hour of the day. This giving the agency "symbol" (such as "Ap" for Associated Press etc) and the frequencies/times that their transmissions are broadcast. The second half of the book lists the agencies in alphabetical order, giving addresses, schedules and sometimes a "thumbnail" sketch of the agency. A very helpful aid in finding out where all those "news" stations arel The only thing omitted from this book was the nominal speed in BAUD and frequency shift commonly used by each station, however this can be found out easily by experimentation whilst listening.

Now on to some commonly asked questions that time precludes from asnwering individually. To have a fighting chance to get a QSL out of a Latin American station broadcasting in Spanish (or a Brazilian in Portugese) it is almost imperative to sent a report in the proper language. The BEST guide to writing foreign language reports is SPEEDX own "Foreign Language Report Guide" which Don Johnson at Lake Elsinore loves to all but give away at a most reasonable price. Drop Don a line, along with the obligatory SASE and he'll send you the info, that is, if you've lost your New Members Facket which has this information. SPEEDX has also got some super TriLingual reporting forms, but you've got to earn these, via credit points. Don has the info on that also.
Awards? Heck yes, SPEEDX has a super program. And, we go by the honor system, for those who do not collect QSLs. The proper address for the info is: Jack Jones, 304 Robinhood Road, Jackson, MS 39206. Cost for the "Country List" and the entire awards program info sheet is $\$ 1.00$. How to get pennants? Ask for them, that's how. Some folks feel that asking for a pennant might jeopradize getting a QSL from the station. That is not so. Many stations, especially some of the Major Internationals, do have certain requirements for getting a pennant, such as so many reports, membership in a "house" DX club and the like.

As for enclosures to send to stations, used U.S. commemorative stamps are always welcome by staff members. If you don't get much mail, the $2 \not \subset$ each box at your local stamp collector store is a goldmine. Also, local postcards are a nice touch, if you live in a small town, try to get cards frem that town, rather from a nearby major city. Yes, the clerk at Turnpike Pharmacy does look at me rather strangely when I buy "Shrewsbury Town Hall" cards 50 at a time, especially when the building pictured on the card was torn down years ago and replaced by a modern one. Photos of you and your equipment are also most welcome by stations. Sounds a bit expensive, but it's really not. Even if you have to buy the used stamps, (and send only 10 or so), total outlay will be less than the cost of an IRC. Yes, you should also send return postage to most small stations, whether in the form of IRC or mint stamps of the country involved. Best source of mint stamps that I know of is: DX Stamp Service, 7661 Roder Parkway, Ontario, NY 14519. Send George an SASE for his latest price list and tell him you saw the address in Kap's column in SPEEDX.

There is also a good source for "report cards" in EF, PP, SS and FF. An SASE to William J. Plum, 124 Hillside Terrace, Irvington, NJ 0711 will get you the info. Enclose a buck and I'm sure that Bill will send you a sample of each.

Yes, it's true, I did get a new radio, the Kenwood $\mathrm{R}-2000$. Just got it a couple of days ago, and doing this column has tied up my time, but if first impressions are lasting ones, I am going to be very happy with it.

One more note, and goodnight. I must strictly abide by the 12 th of the Month deadline. Only exception is if the 12th is on a Sunday, ther we extend it one day. Otherwise, anytring received or the 13th or after will be held over to the following montr.

EQUIPNENT, ANTENNAS, RECEIVERS, ACCESSORIES, AND NEW IDEAS

The most capable general-coverage shortwave receiver on the market today for under $\$ 1100$ is ICOM's IC-R70. Value-wise the R70 is unbeatable at under $\$ 700$. Other reviewers who have extensive experience with more expensive and exotic receivers are saying it is only slightly outdone by the Drake $R-7 A$ and about equal to the NRD-515. If you are in the market for a higher class receiver, check suppliers' list prices on "Nerds" and Drakes first, then see your ICOM dealer and check out the R70 and its price. I got mine for $\$ 649$ here in Spokane but I did have to pay an added $\$ 40.20$ in sales tax.

I had been using a Kenwood $\mathrm{R}-1000$, and after buying the R70 I was able to make back-toback comparisons. It was no contest at all. The R70 won in every category, but the most impressive thing was the R70's ability to make audible and enjoyable, signals that on the Kenwood were almost destroyed. To illustrate, imagine that you want to tune a signal which is running $S-2$ to $S-3$ while 5 kHz away is another signal running 'way over S-9 and covering one sideband of your signal with "slopover". Further imagine that on the other side of your signal there's an annoying "het". The R70 will not only wipe out all the "slop", it will eliminate the heterodyne interference, and if that's not enough, the audio quality will be almost as good as though the signal had been completely in the clear!

In the sensitivity department, I've never seen anthing like it. I'm not talking about meter-busting gain made up mostly of noise, but usable sensitivity. The shielding and internal noise suppression on the $R 70$ are absolutely superior. It is quiet as a mouse. Signals that don't raise the meter needle at all are quite easily readable. I know what you are thinking-that no $S$-meter is to be trusted; but the dealer adjusted it at the shop to roughly parallel his ICOM 740 transceiver, which was dnown to have quite an accurate meter. On the other hand, many signals require attenuation. This usable sensitivity is very helpful on indoor antennas; this, from personal experience. I get very satisfactory reception on less than lom of wire inside my house. One has to attenuate most of the time on $M W$ stations, but even if you forget to switch in the 20 db attenuator, the fantastic dynamic range of the radio subdues any tendency to overload.
The abundance of usable sensitivity is further complemented by the stability of the R70. I don't intend to get into manufacturer's promo statements in this review. (See full page ad, p. 5., 1983 WRTVH) Suffice to say, one night I tuned in R. Netherlands - Bonaire on 6165 kHz , pushed the button for lower sideband, pushed another button to set the tuning rate at 1 kHz per complete revolution of the tuning dial, easily got the BFO on the exact center of RN's carrier, and went off to do other things for an hour. On returning to the set $I$ found almost no audible drift--perhaps as much as 10 Hz . With this receiver you can tune and enjoy a $S S B$ signal, plus, if things get really crowded, you can tune an AM station in ECSS mode and sit back and enjoy it without any "touchup" tuning after a few minutes. There is also an RIT (fine-tune) control separate from the main tuning setup which one can switch in or out, that allows a deviation of plus-orminus 800 Hz from the tuned frequency-without changing the digital frequency readout.
The R70 is fully synthesized and uses a triple phase-locked loop. The logic unit is microcomputer controlled. There is a pushbutton choice of three tuning rates: 10, 100, or 1000 Hz per increment. This gives a great deal of flexibility in tuning: one revolution of the main tuning dial can change frequency by $1 \mathrm{kHz}, 10 \mathrm{kHz}$, or 100 kHz depending on which button you push. The slowest rate is just right for fine tuning $S S B$ signals, the moderate rate works fine for slow band-scans, and the fast rate gets you from one end of a tuning range to another very quickly. There is also an electronic "lock" which holds exact frequency if that button is pushed. This prevents detuning if the main turing dial is bumped or rotated accidentally.

Another novel feature is dual band-selection capability. A pushbutton allows selection of "ham" bands only, or of general coverage capability, in ranges of 1000 kHz each. To change bands in either case, just push the "up" or the "down" button. There is no automatic advance available by holding the button down, so one has to use multiple pushes to change from, say 21 MHz to 15 MHz . This is one of very few annoyances on the R70.
Frequency readout is, of course, digital, in increments of 0.1 kHz . I checked once out of curiosity and at the slowest tuning rate it takes a movement of about $3 / 4$ inch on the circunference of the main tuning dial to change the readout 0.1 kHz . Now that is what I would call FINE tuning capability. At that tuning rate it's a breeze to" tune SSB signals. There's absolutely no backlash or dial looseness, and there's even a user-serviceable brake adjustment on the main dial shaft.
The set operates on either 117 V AC or 235 V AC. 100 V , 200 V , or 220 V AC requires internal mods. The manual says the set can be converted for DC operation.
Given the superb sensitivity of the R70, there is a separate provision for a MW antenna. One ought to be able to hook up a BCB loop easily. However, if a switch on the back panel is thrown, you can receive MW using your shortwave antenna. This will necessitate judicious use of the attenuator, though.
The unit is not large at all-about the size of the Kenwood R-1000, but deeper; that is, with the set resting on your desk surface, it will project further toward you. The front panel is loaded with controls, and they are, of necessity, very small. Some are paired and concentrically mounted to save space. They didn't compromise on the size of the main tuning dial-it's a full 6-3/4 in. in circumference. The controls are well-marked and neatly and logically laid out.
The are two separate VFOs and with pushbutton controls one can store a frequency while tuning another, and even swap control back and forth between the VFOs at will. This is quite useful in hunting parallel frequencies, since one can instantly summon up the stored frequency from the other VFO when one wishes to make a comparison.
ICOM claims that this is a quadruple conversion rig, but that takes some explaining, and they didn't. All I can figure is that when the passband tuning control is in use, the second IF figure is up-converted 455 kHz and then down-converted the same amount to feed the third IF stage. Apparently with the OBT out of the circuit, it's just double conversion.

Reception modes available stock are AM, SSB, CW RTTY, and as an option, FM.
There's a front-mounted speaker which, though small in size, produces excellent audio. Also, on the front panel is a tone control which is so effective it, in itself, can eliminate many annoyances that are present on so many signals nowadays. A rearpanel jack (miniature) allows use of an outboard speaker, but there's no need for one, in my opinion.
The noise blanker which they install in the set is like most in that it doesn't do all you'd want it to. One can select two widths: wide and narrow. I've found it to be ineffective on powerline noise, but it does cut out interference from auto ignitions, electric drills and that sort of thing. If your wife is vacuuming in the next room, however........ These things have limits to their capabilities. Concerning the Russian "woodpecker", it isn't bad in the wide mode, but it doesn't completely silence it. Strong ones swamp it, and "woody" cones through loud and clear.
The AGC circuit is quite effective. "Slow" mode handles most tuning, but there's also a "fast" mode, and one can also switch it completely out of the circuit.
Jacks for earphones and for external recording are on the front panel.
Another switch (3-way) selects either reception as-is, 20 db of attenuation, or 15 db or so of pre-amplification. The pre-amp is very well shielded, as there's no audible evidence that it's in the circuit other than a boost in signal strength. It is fair to say, though, that the set doesn't attain the extreme sensitivity attributed to it until the pre-amp is switched in. There's also an RF gain control. (Kenwood didn't think this was important.) And believe it or not, it has a squelch control! How often do you see this feature on a general coverage receiver?

Selectivity controls include ICOMs own version of passband tuning, a notch, and the users own judicious use of detuning off-frequency.
The PBT arrangement needs explaining. The built in AM filter is quite broad at 6 kHz , but relatively flat on top. It's probably a better grade ceramic. Shape factor is lousy: 3:1. When the PBT control is "on" the bandwidth can be narrowed continually up to a maximum of plus-or-minus 3.3 kHz , from either side of the passband. In sharpest position you have a 2.7 kHz wide passband lying to the left of the carrier frequency, or to the right of it, depending on which way you rotated the PB' control. The results are similar in SSB and CW modes, except for narrower filters and that in SSB mode the BFO isn't
centered in the middle of the passband at the start, so you can lose the signal completely if you turn the PBT control too far in the wrong direction. Something similar to this happens in the AM mode. In the extreme clockwise or counterclockwise position the control is knocking off some of the carrier so signal strength will be down noticeably on the S-meter. Nevertheless, even in the sharpest configuration, audio quality remains good since nearly all of one sideband is retained. Really, this device is almost $100 \%$ efficient in eliminating "slop" from nearby signals. Of course if you're trying to clear up a signal that's barel rraising the needle on its own and it's 5 kHz away from a signal that just about "pins the meter" all one can expect is considerable improvement and not total eradication of the problem. It wipes "hets" too, provided they lie within the sideband you're attenuating, and in this case they're gone-no vestiges remain.
What you can't get rid of with PBT, you can usually get rid of with the notch. It's 30db deep, very sharp, and spans a usable range of plus-or-minus 1.3 kiz . However, in Aif mode, the notch is centered about 2 kHz below the displayed frequency. It is well-centered for SSB and CW operation. Detuning somewhat on AM helps to bring the notch into the ballpark, so to speak.
One has to remember that this radio's ancestors were engineered as SSB transceivers and probably the AM capability was offered in the R7O as an attempt to siden the market to include SWLs as well as to entice the occasional "ham" who is also interested in general band-tuning throughout the spectrum. To keep the price competitive, which it most certainly is at $\$ 550$, certain compromises with excellence had to be made.

The first of these is the wide and mediocre quality AM filters. 6 kHz is too side nowadays; 4 kHz with a better shape factor would have been a better choice. Still the installed filters aren't nearly so wide as the 6 kHz filters in the modified Kenwood I had.
The second compromise, and a really weird one, is that the second IF center frequencies are offset from one another as much as 1.5 kHz in the various modes of reception. This makes for some very confusing anomalies at the ends of each 1000 kifz range. This I won't get into. Read the reviews of others; but don't let it scare you off. One does have to learn a lot to get the most out of this set, but it's worth it. Assuming you're looking for a really outstanding receiver with the capabilities this one has, you're not going to mind. Especially for only $\$ 650$ !
One last littlenicety: the digital display, on its left end, even shows which mode you're tuning and which BFO (A or B) you're using.
As far as I could determine, there's no misleading "hype" in the specs that they don't back up with performance. ICOn is selling an outstanding piece of equipment for a price that is almost ridiculously low. As little as two years ago, comparable equipment was selling for more than twice the price of the R70 today.
On a final note, I encourage others to write up their own views on the ICOM IC-R7O and send them to "Tips and Topics". Several opinions tend to give an objective balance to the discussion of any topic. I'm sure Art will welcome your contribution to "Tips and Topics", so let's hear it from out there "ior" (or "against") the R70!

A REBUTTAL TO RESPONSE TO A RESPONSE

From reading the latest episle regarding the issue of ham radio vs. SwLing debate by Tom Phillips, I find there are statements made without qualification which deserve rebuttal.

For a start, let's take up the point of contention where the SWL only has to hear the station vs. the ham operator having to be heard in return with an exchange of reports
to qualify for QSLs. The first complaint is that the average QSO is of the duration measured in seconds vs, an hour's listening to a $S W$ station. When one considers that over 10,000 QSOs are produced by a DX operation of a limited time of a few days, the SWL QSO rule is simply umrealistic. An exercise in arithmetic would prove it would take at least 10,000 hours or over a year to accomplish the job. This based on the assumption of continuous operation and ideal round-the-clock propagation existing. Who or what organization or individual has the capacity in time and finances to conduct such an undertaking under SWL QSL rules? The difference of QSL rules has got to be obvious.
How many ham operators do you know that have a QSL for a QSO with China? Albania? Have you forgotten that for over 30 years China has forbidden ham radio until recently? Albania is another of the same category. Yet as an SWL, one only has to spin the dial of his receiver to a given frequency and BINGO: you have Radio Peiping with no sweat. The same with Albania, etc. Yet, you complain that there is an hours effort of listening, making out reports, etc. It should be obvious that QSLs for those places should be a dime-a-dozen in the ranks of Swhs in spite of their efforts to obtain them.

There is the complaint of time and monotony in the effort to obtain a QSL card. Mr. Phillips overlooks the fact that ham radio operators do not have lists of fixed times and frequencies on hand to look up and work their desired countries as if by a time table. What about the monotony involved when scanning the bands for hours if not days in quest for that elusive DX? Not to be overlooked is the probability of others involved in the same game ready to beat you to the draw. This activity is pursued with the knowledge that the $D X$ in question has random activity and random requencies of operation. Also, the probability of no DX becomes an accepted risk in the game. Thus, SWLs are not the only ones with their problems of monotony.
The so called carefree operator does not always get to work dozens of countries with time out for typing on the feed bag for the given time it takes to satisfy the requirement for one SWL QSL. What is overlooked is the old reciprocity theorem: if you can't hear them; you can't work them. Propagation is a big factor with the time differences of locations to be considered as well. Dozens of countries? Hell no! Dozens from the same country would be nearer the truth when one considers the populations of ham operators in West European countries being very numerous. The exception to the rule possibly being an ARRL or CQ DX Contest with ideal propagation conditions. Otherwise that dozens of countries claim is invalid.
When it comes to the complaint of costs of QSLs, IRCs, etc. I always like to relate to the story of how J.P. Morgan was asked what it costs to operate his yacht. His answer to the effect being that if you got to worry about the cost, you cannot afford to own a yacht. Perhaps the same could apply to SWLing and ham radio when one complains of QSL card costs.

Another misleading statement is that one goes to the store and purchases the equipment for that big signal. Mr. Phillips, have your forgotten those police powers exercised by municipalities known as zoning laws that limit one's desire to put up the antenna to go with that big signal? There are relatively few with the large real estate for those big antenna systems. With this country in a severe recession, it is very doubtful there are many hams able to buy such equipment when one considers the sale of cars and houses being at an all-time-low in these times.

Regarding the "Bad Apple" syndrome by Mr. Phillips empirical observation on the PYO undertaking, he mentions how they were listening 14200 up while transmitting on 14195; but, he omits the fact they stated that they were listening all the way up to 14300; hence, 100 kHz of the band taken up for listening to replies. Such an excessive use of frequencies only result in Russian roulette and/or frustration as the consequence of poor control. No wonder there were so many who showed their frustrations by the name calling, profanity, and QRM on their frequency. Yes, Mr. Phillips, I was there to hear it all for myself. Considering their poor control of the situation, I could not blame them. With 30 years experience in chasing EX as qualification, I would rate them among the poorest operators in all my time.
As further proof of my claim, I did conduct an experiment by calling them about 100 kHz up from the bottom edge as directed for 45 minutes with no response. I did check for a clear frequency periodically. Now, can you really claim that they were listening up that far in spite of their giving directions to that effect? For one who is knowledgable of mathematical statistics and probability, I claim a grade school kid can easily form his hypothesis on that issue. Need I say more?
Regarding your respect for the QRP operator who has to work his way through the "Big Guns" by using his operating skills to the maximum, I will inform you that calling from the high end is an old trick that is utilized by them. Time after time I have used it with one or two calls to get a QSO by the result of a smart operator at the other end. By this classic manuever, the QRP operator works his way around, not through the "Big Guns"! However, the PYO operators were not that intelligent according to the results of my experiment; hence, it was a rare exception that this classic manuever failed.

In closing, I have no objection when anybody tries to take me on in the subject of ham radio, provided he is qualified, knowledgable and knows what he is talking about; otherwise, he is fair game for me to go after him with no holds barred in reply to his claims and in defense of ham radio.

AND THAT'S THE WAY IT WAS

In January I went back to my first love, shortwave listeninn, when I purchased a new ICF-2001. As I pushed the buttons and listened to the synthesizer swish in this interesting receiver, my memory took me back to my introduction to
the hobby during World War II.
Everything was simpler then; the equipment, the band congestion and the interference it produced. But the listening was exciting to anyone of any age, much less an early teenager.

As I turned the dial for the first time on the second-hand Philco console radio my parents had purchased for me for $\$ 45$, one of the first (if not the first) stations I heard was the BBC, London. Immediately my imagination took over as I visualized a distinguished Oxford-accented British announcer speaking so distinctly and calmly in what I imagined was a studio three stories underground while London was being blown apart by the German air force. To a kid wondering what was going to happen to the world, it seemed reassuring.
Over the next couple of years, there were many thrills, but none to equal two letters i received. Both were from parents of American Pows, one held by the Japanese, the other by the Germans. I had copied Pow messages to home from Radio Tokyo and Radio Berlin and forwarded them to the anxious parents. One letter indicated it was the first word of substance received from the imprisoned son. Those two letters were lost long ago in moves around the country, but the memory of them will never fade.

The enemy didn't always do its homework in its propaganda barrages. There was the broadcast from Radio Berlin during a time of severe flooding in southeast Kansas. The German broadcast reported that "all of the coffee in Coffeyville, Kansas had been destroyed by the flood!!!"

SwLing and DXing bring fascinating experiences, and in some ways I enjoy it more than amateur radio (I've been a ham since shortly after the war). But the young dial-twisters and button pushers of today have not known the excitement of monitoring shortwave broadcasts during a world war. Let's all pray they will never have the opportunity to do so.

REVIEW OF THE SHORTWAVE LISTENER'S HANDBOOK Author: Robert J. Traister
Tab Books Inc., Blue Ridge Summit, PA 17214

Mr. Traister is the author of a better known book, How to Build Hidden, Limited-Space Antennas That work which is directed primarily to the radio amateur fraternity. In The Shortwave

Listener Handbook, Mr. Traister directs his efforts to the beginning shortwave listener who has no technical knowledge.

In this ten chapter, 191 page book, the beginning shortwave listener is given specific instructions to build 25 shortwave antemas. All the antennas in the book are designed for the $4-7-13 \& 26 \mathrm{MHz}$ bands. There is no mention in the book of the $13-16-19-25-$ 31 - 41 or 49 meter bands and no mentions of the frequencies which they occupy. The new shortwave listener is given one short paragraph on how to convert the antenna projects to usable frequencies.
The shortwave enthusiast who buys this book could very well build an antenna far removed from their frequencies of interest. Little knowledge of how to calculate antenna lengths for various frequencies will be gained.

This book has an attractive bright red cover with a shortwave receiver tilted provocatively at an angle. Unfortunately, the cover is the only attractive thing about this book. Mr. Traister leaves the beginning shortwave listener as ignorant of antennas as he was before he bought the book. The unfortunate shortwave listener is out $\$ 9.95$.
