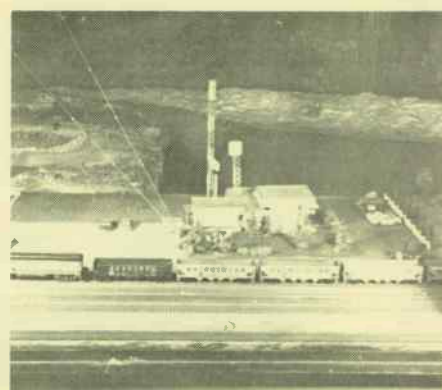
The Saga of a Big Mouth

The KICD Building at the Clay County Fair was originally designed for chickens and roosters. Then it was decided to use it for radio and television stations, but only one showed up other than KICD. One week before the Fair of 1948, the Fair management was in a quandary about the southeast quarter of the building. The big mouth of the KICD prexy suggested that a model railroad would be a nice addition.

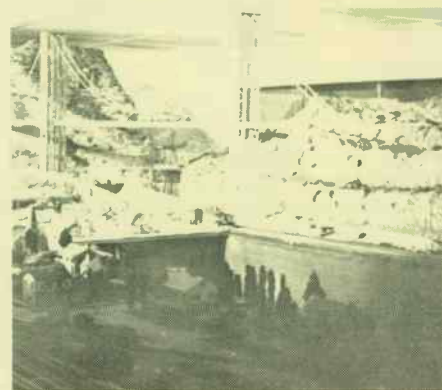


Two carpenters, hundreds of board feet of lumber, and six days later the Smoky Mountain started operation - a 45' loop of two tracks. It was an instant hit, and surpassed the exhibit of the wingless chickens! The following year it doubled in size, taking the entire east side of the building. Six tons of plaster, mixed tenderly in buckets and applied by talented volunteers, created the mountains. The trestle came into being a bit later. And then came the next challenge. The Board of Directors tried to "inspect" the railroad during the fair, and couldn't get in because of the crowd. Leon Witter was not to be outdone. He laid down the dare - if he knocked out the east wall and ran it out another 14', would the big mouth agree to putting "another side" to the railroad? He did, and the volunteers went back to work. From year to year, the Smoky Mountain grew. Then, about 1963 or so, the railroad was taken over by a railroad club. When that arrangement fell thru, the prexy was beckoned out of retirement, and the Smoky Mountain runs on, all two thousand feet of it.

When it first started, there was a romance about railroading, even though it was starting a decline. Steam was still around, and it brought back memories when our older "kids" watched the little trains running around the exhibit. Then came the diesel, and steam a thing of the past. Much of the exhibit now takes on the chore of the history teacher, showing some of the things that made our country great. Some of the youngsters of today don't know a steam engine when they see one. What they missed! Steam, valve oil and smoke - the hissing, the music of the steam whistle off in the distance at night, the arrival of old Number Eleven with the morning mail, it's passengers and the cheerful "Good morning" of the porter to the KICD audience - they are all things of the past, as are Numbers thirty-three and thirty-six that used to go between Spirit Lake and Des Moines.

Maybe the Smoky Mountain can keep some of those memories alive.

At least that's the hope of the hundreds who have contributed their efforts and time for your enjoyment. The romance may have dimmed with the years, but the bloom of the past is a great sight. And the Smoky Mountain rolls on and on, out of that past and into the hearts of those of the future. There's room for everybody, so - ALL ABOARD!

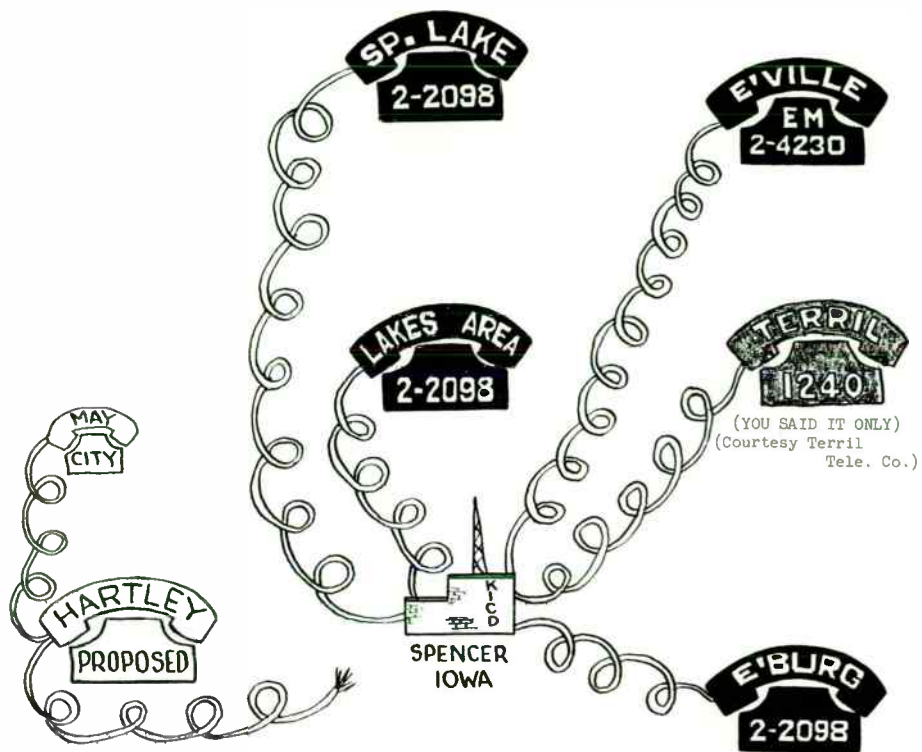

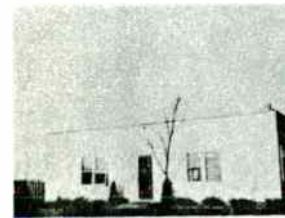
