LESLIE MOONVES
(President and Chief Executive Officer, CBS)

As President and Chief Executive Officer, CBS, Leslie Moonves is responsible for the programming, sales and marketing operations of all the Company's broadcast television efforts, including CBS Entertainment, CBS News, CBS Sports and the Viacom Television Stations Group -- as well as the Network's affiliate relations, research, advertising and promotion functions. Additionally, Moonves oversees CBS Enterprises, which features the renowned syndication division King World, and CBS Broadcast International, the international sales unit.

Moonves joined CBS as President, CBS Entertainment, in July 1995 and was promoted to his current post in April 1998. He also serves on the Board of Directors of Viacom Inc.

Since his arrival, Moonves' impact at CBS has been felt across all divisions. Under his leadership, CBS has become America's #1 network, CBS Productions has become a leading supplier of programming, CBS Sports is the most prolific supplier of television sports impressions in the industry and CBS News has expanded its presence with the premieres of 60 MINUTES II and THE EARLY SHOW. Additionally, King World recently brokered one of the most lucrative deals ever for an off-network drama series.

Moonves has taken CBS to the top of the network standings by introducing innovative programming strategies, developing hit new series and orchestrating key scheduling moves. Under his aegis, CBS has developed the hit series EVERYBODY LOVES RAYMOND, THE KING OF QUEENS, BECKER, JUDGING AMY and CSI: CRIME SCENE INVESTIGATION. He also acquired JAG, which continues to rank among television's top dramas.

In June 2000, Moonves introduced a bold, original programming strategy with the launch of SURVIVOR. Scheduled during the summer months, a time when original programming has rarely succeeded, SURVIVOR's groundbreaking "dramality" format became both a ratings and cultural phenomenon.

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In February 2001, Moonves utilized this new programming powerhouse to transform the Thursday night competitive landscape by strategically scheduling SURVIVOR: THE AUSTRALIAN OUTBACK and CSI against NBC's powerful Thursday night lineup. The moves paid immediate ratings dividends as SURVIVOR became the #1 series on television and helped catapult CBS into first place in the February and May Sweeps, the Network's first May Sweep victory since 1983. Additionally, SURVIVOR and CSI propelled CBS to its first Thursday night wins against NBC's "Must See" lineup since 1985.

With the success of SURVIVOR, CSI, EVERYBODY LOVES RAYMOND, JUDGING AMY and the Network's other broad-based programming, CBS placed first in total viewers and households in the 2000-01 season, marking the second time CBS has been first in these key categories in the past three years. CBS also made significant demographic rating gains and reduced its median age by more than any other network.

In News, Moonves played an integral role in the formation of the successful 60 MINUTES II, which premiered in January 1999 and is now the second-highest-rated news magazine on television. He was also instrumental in the launch of CBS News' weekday morning broadcast, THE EARLY SHOW, anchored by Bryant Gumbel and Jane Clayson, which debuted in November 1999 from a new state-of-the-art street level broadcast studio. THE EARLY SHOW has recently registered significant ratings gains, increasing CBS's competitive position in the morning.

In Sports, Moonves and his CBS Sports team orchestrated the landmark 11-year, \$6 billion agreement between CBS Sports and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), which, in addition to granting CBS exclusive rights to the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Tournament, was the first sports deal in history to include internet and other new media marketing rights. And, in the past three years, CBS has become the dominant supplier of television sports impressions, jumping from fifth to first among all broadcast and cable networks.

In late night, Moonves developed THE LATE LATE SHOW with CRAIG KILBORN as a companion to LATE SHOW with DAVID LETTERMAN, helping CBS realize revenue increases and dramatic ratings growth in younger demographics in the late night daypart.

Additionally, Moonves has built CBS Productions, the Network's in-house production arm, into one of the top suppliers of network programming. CBSP has 14 series on the Network's 2001-02 schedule.

In addition to the Network, Moonves also oversees the King World Productions syndication empire, which includes such top-rated first-run and

off-network series as WHEEL OF FORTUNE, JEOPARDY! THE OPRAH WINFREY SHOW and EVERYBODY LOVES RAYMOND. In March 2001, King World engineered one of the most lucrative syndication deals ever with the record-setting off-network sale of CSI to The National Network.

Moonves' responsibilities also include oversight of the Viacom Television Stations Group, comprised of the 16 CBS and 19 UPN stations with locations in the top 13 markets and 18 of the top 20.

Additionally, he has moved CBS to the forefront of interactive television, striking an agreement with Microsoft's WebTV Networks to deliver viewers a broad slate of interactive programming.

Moonves joined CBS from Warner Bros. Television, where as President, he oversaw a television division that supplied the greatest number of programs to network television for nine consecutive years, culminating with a record-setting 22 series (including "ER," "Friends" and "The Drew Carey Show") on the 1995-96 network schedules. He had been President of Warner Bros. Television since July 1993, when Warner Bros. and Lorimar Television combined operations. From 1989 to 1993, he had been President of Lorimar Television.

He joined Lorimar Television in 1985 as executive in charge of the company's movies and mini-series and became head of creative affairs in 1988. Past series under Moonves' aegis include "Dallas," "Knots Landing" and "Falcon Crest," all on CBS, "Perfect Strangers," "Full House," "Max Headroom," "Homefront," "Reasonable Doubts" and "I'll Fly Away."

Earlier in his career, Moonves was Vice President of movies and mini-series for Twentieth-Century-Fox Television, where he was also in charge of first-run syndication and pay/cable programming. He had previously been Vice President, Development, for Saul Ilson Productions (in association with Columbia Pictures Television) and a development executive for Catalina Productions.

Upon graduation from Bucknell University, Moonves pursued an acting career at New York's Neighborhood Playhouse, studying under the renowned Sanford Meisner. He performed in numerous stage and television productions before opting to produce plays on Broadway and in Los Angeles.

Citing Moonves as "one of America's most prominent and creative broadcasters," President Clinton named him to co-chair the Gore Commission, a group charged with drawing up a blueprint for the relationship between

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broadcasters and the federal government. The Commission submitted its recommendations to the White House in December 1998.

Moonves is on the board of directors of the NCAA Foundation, the board of directors of the Los Angeles Free Clinic, the board of trustees of the Entertainment Industries Council and the board of governors of the UCLA Center for Communications Policy. He is also a trustee of the National Council for Families and Television and the American Film Institute and is past president of the Hollywood Radio and Television Society.

In 2000, Moonves was recognized with an award for significant achievement by the International Radio and Television Society. He was also named *Variety's* "Showman of the Year" and *Entertainment Weekly's* "Most Powerful Man in Hollywood" and received the Casting Society of America's Career Achievement Award.

He is also a past recipient of the American Jewish Committee's Sherrill Corwin Award, given to outstanding leaders in the entertainment and communications industry.

Moonves, a native of New York, now lives in Los Angeles with his wife, Nancy, and their three children.

NANCY TELLEM
(President, CBS Entertainment)

Nancy Tellem was named President, CBS Entertainment in August 1998. She reports directly to Leslie Moonves, President and Chief Executive Officer, CBS.

In her position, Tellem is responsible for overseeing all of CBS Entertainment's operations for prime time, daytime, late night and Saturday morning.

Tellem's responsibilities also include the oversight of CBS Productions, the Network's in-house production arm which has become one of the industry's top suppliers of network programming.

Under Tellem's auspices, CBS was America's top rated and most watched network in the 2000-2001 season, placing first in viewers and households for the second time in the past three years. CBS also won the February sweep and its first May sweep since 1983.

Last season, Tellem oversaw the development of an impressive slate of new programs which included "CSI: Crime Scene Investigation," the highest rated new series of the season, "The District" and "Yes, Dear." Those series, along with "Survivor: The Australian Outback," helped the Network make significant demographic gains while lowering its median age by more than any other network.

This fall, CBS will debut a 2001-2002 schedule that features an exciting and diverse lineup of programming which includes, among others, the television series debut of Academy Award-winning actor Richard Dreyfuss in "The Education of Max Bickford," the return of Ellen Degeneres in "The Ellen Show" and Emmy Award-winning producer John Wells' maiden project for CBS, "Citizen Baines."

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Tellem was a key part of the development of the phenomenally successful dramality series "Survivor." "Survivor" was the top-rated program of the 2000-2001 season in households, viewers and all key demographics and has made CBS a competitive force on Thursdays for the first time since 1985.

Tellem also played an important role in the formation of CBS's late night franchise "The Late Late Show with Craig Kilborn," which has produced dramatic growth in the late late night time period.

Tellem joined CBS in July of 1997, as Executive Vice President, Business Affairs, for CBS Entertainment and Executive Vice President of CBS Productions, a position that made her the highest ranking officer at the Network's in-house production company. As head of Business Affairs, she was responsible for all of CBS Entertainment's business and financial matters.

Prior to CBS, Tellem was Executive Vice President, Business and Financial Affairs, Warner Bros. Television, where as the second highest-ranking executive, she played an instrumental role in maintaining Warner Bros.' dominance as the industry's leading supplier of series to the networks. Under her business guidance, Warner Bros. produced many of television's top-rated programs, including "ER," "Friends," "Suddenly Susan," "The Drew Carey Show," "Murphy Brown," and others.

Tellem served in the Warner Bros. business affairs department since 1987 (then Lorimar Television) beginning as Director, Business Affairs. During her tenure and eventual rise to head of the department, she was directly involved in negotiations on nearly all series, television movies and mini-series produced by Lorimar/Warner Bros.

Tellem resides in Pacific Palisades with her husband and their three children.

THE EDUCATION OF MAX BICKFORD

Academy Award winner Richard Dreyfuss ("The Goodbye Girl") makes his television drama series debut as a college history professor whose life is at a crossroads when, among other things, he is passed over for a long-overdue promotion at the all-women's college where he teaches. The job is given instead to Andrea Haskell, one of his former students, who has now surpassed her mentor in academic achievement. To make matters worse, his old friend Judith Hackett Bryant, president of the college, has endorsed this decision. And making things even more challenging is the fact that Max's best friend, Steve, has returned as Erica after a sex-change operation. These days, Max's joy comes from spending time with his 11-year-old son, Lester, an aspiring basketball star. More challenging is his relationship with his teenage daughter, Nell, a freshman at the college. Now, everything and everyone is up for reexamination in Max's life.

RICHARD DREYFUSS
(Max Bickford in THE EDUCATION OF MAX BICKFORD)

Richard Dreyfuss is among the leading actors of the American cinema. His role as the teacher in "Mr. Holland's Opus" earned him Academy Award and Golden Globe nominations for Best Actor. He still holds the distinction of being the youngest actor to win an Academy Award in the category of Best Actor, for "The Goodbye Girl" (1977) at age 29. Three of his movies rank in the American Film Institute's list of the 100 Greatest Films.

Dreyfuss made his motion picture debut in 1967 with a bit part in "Valley of the Dolls," followed by one line in "The Graduate." Then, several films later, in 1973, he starred in "American Graffiti," which earned him both praise and attention. This was followed by performances in "The Apprenticeship of Duddy Kravitz," "Jaws," "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" and "The Goodbye Girl."

He appeared in a string of acclaimed movies during the 1980s, including "Down and Out in Beverly Hills," "Tin Men" and "Stakeout." In addition to "Mr. Holland's Opus," his films in the 1990s range from Sidney Lumet's "Night Falls on Manhattan" to the comedy "What About Bob?" He also had a cameo role in "The American President," for his childhood friend Rob Reiner.

Dreyfuss has performed on stage in the Broadway production of "Death and the Maiden," with Glenn Close and Gene Hackman, and in "Three Hotels" at the Mark Taper Forum in Los Angeles. He also directed "Hamlet" for the Birmingham Theatre Company at the Old Rep in England, marking his debut as a director. He is a charter member of the Los Angeles Theatre Works, a radio ensemble company. He recently starred as Mark Anthony in the BBC Radio/KCRW production of "Julius Caesar" and as Benedict Arnold in "An American General," as well as in George Bernard Shaw's "The Devil's Disciple" in Washington, D.C. He received a Grammy Award nomination for a recording of "The Prisoner of Second Avenue," made with Marsha Mason in London's Haymarket Theatre.

Dreyfuss will soon be seen in the Showtime film "The Day Reagan Was Shot." He recently appeared in the live CBS production of "Fail Safe," the HBO film "Lansky" and the feature film "The Crew." He has just completed shooting the film "The Old Man Who Read Love Stories," directed by Rolf de Heer, in

French Guyana. Dreyfuss received the 2000 Lifetime Achievement Award at the Hollywood Film Festival.

DAWN PRESTWICH and NICOLE YORKIN
(Creators and Executive Producers, THE EDUCATION OF MAX BICKFORD)

Dawn Prestwich and Nicole Yorkin began their successful writing and producing partnership after a chance meeting at the American Film Institute 15 years ago. They've had an overall deal with 20th Century Fox Television since 1999.

Most recently, Prestwich and Yorkin were co-executive producers of the hit CBS drama series "Judging Amy" for two seasons, after having spent three years on David E. Kelley's "Chicago Hope" and one season on Kelley's "Picket Fences," both also broadcast on the CBS Television Network, and writing an episode of "Ally McBeal."

Prestwich and Yorkin began their television career as staff writers on CBS's "The Trials of Rosie O'Neill" and "Angel Street" and went on to write multiple episodes of "Birdland" and CBS's "Christy."

Prior to their collaboration, Yorkin was a reporter for six years for the *Los Angeles Herald Examiner*, where she was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize for a series of articles about a 12-year-old prostitute, and Prestwich was a published short story writer. They each have two children.

THE AMAZING RACE is a new reality-adventure series hosted by Phil Keoghan - pitting 11 teams against each other in a worldwide, 30 to 40-day journey through diverse cities and countries spanning the globe. The first team to reach the final destination will be rewarded with \$1 million. Each team, comprised of two people who have a preexisting relationship, will compete at every destination in mental and physical challenges. Only when each task is completed will they learn their next destination. The couples farthest behind will gradually be eliminated. The teams will be filmed nonstop, chronicling their journey as well as the conflicts and deepening relationships that may develop through the competition. Each team will have to rely on wit and ingenuity to conserve limited funds. Plane travel will be restricted, and the contestants will have to use alternate means of transportation such as buses, trains, boats, taxis, bicycles and even camels.

PHIL KEOGHAN
(Host, THE AMAZING RACE)

Phil Keoghan has traveled the world as a cameraman, producer and on-air host. Since the age of 19, he has hosted more than 1000 program episodes, including his own internationally distributed series "Keoghan's Heroes," which profiles famous thrill-seekers around the world.

Keoghan got his big break in front of the camera hosting the series "Spot On," for which he auditioned while on an apprentice program in cinematography. He then co-created and co-produced the primetime cable series "Phil Keoghan's Adventure Crazy." His additional television credits include "Go for It," an extreme sports show, "Fox After Breakfast" and "The 1998 Film Festival Awards." In 1999, he co-hosted "Surprise, Surprise," a primetime special on the CBS Television Network.

He is currently developing a new series, "Notes from the Field," with the Wildlife Conservation Society and writing a book--about the list of things he wants to accomplish before he dies--to be published in the fall of 2002.

Keoghan, who is originally from New Zealand, lives with his wife and daughter in Los Angeles. His birth date is May 31.

JERRY BRUCKHEIMER
(Executive Producer, THE AMAZING RACE)

What Jerry Bruckheimer instinctively understands about audiences is that they want a great story told by interesting characters from a unique point of view. This understanding is the foundation of his feature films, which over the past two decades have won major awards and grossed billions of dollars worldwide, and of his television projects, which include CSI: CRIME SCENE INVESTIGATION, the popular and critically acclaimed new drama beginning its second season on the CBS Television Network, and THE AMAZING RACE, already one of the most original and eagerly awaited offerings on the 2001-02 schedule.

A little more than 20 years ago, Bruckheimer, who started as a commercial producer telling 30- and 60-second stories, moved from Madison Avenue to Hollywood and into one of the most successful producing partnerships in the film business. For 14 years, he and the late Don Simpson wowed audiences and created new film vocabulary with features including "Flashdance," "Beverly Hills Cop," "Top Gun," "Bad Boys," "Dangerous Minds," "Crimson Tide" and "The Rock." They discovered, cultivated and redefined stars such as Jennifer Beals, Eddie Murphy, Tom Cruise, Will Smith, Martin Lawrence, Michelle Pfeiffer, Denzel Washington, Nicolas Cage and Sean Connery.

On his own since Simpson's death in 1996, Bruckheimer has produced the blockbusters "Con Air," "Armageddon," "Gone in 60 Seconds," "Remember the Titans" and this year's "Pearl Harbor," films with the indelible Bruckheimer beat that audiences feel in the editing, hear in the music and hold onto as they leave the theaters. His work has been honored with Academy Awards, Golden Globes, Grammys, People's Choice Awards and MTV Awards.

The Bruckheimer lightning bolt now strikes television. This past season, he reached viewers with the riveting and provocative "CSI," starring William Petersen and Marg Helgenberger as Las Vegas crime scene investigators. He won awards and a huge following doing the impossible: he made science sexy.

BERTRAM van MUNSTER
(Executive Producer and Co-creator, THE AMAZING RACE)

Bertram van Munster served as creator and executive producer of "Wild Things," a hit syndication animal-adventure series for Paramount Domestic Television, which premiered in 1997. In order to create 78 hours of "Wild Things," van Munster and his crews roamed some of the most inaccessible and inhospitable regions of the world, from Africa to Alaska, in search of compelling reality-style stories.

Prior to his association with Paramount, van Munster served as producer on more than 300 half-hour episodes and three one-hour specials in the long-running primetime series "Cops." During his tenure, the series received four Emmy Award nominations and a Television Critics Award.

He was born and raised in Holland. He began his career as an apprentice cameraman for Fox Movietone News, before becoming a much sought-after director-cinematographer on high-end commercials. His Amsterdam-based company, Film Group One, became the premier European producer of commercials for the world's top ad agencies.

On the international stage, van Munster's keen, inventive approach began to show itself in such projects as the 1970 World Exhibition in Osaka, Japan, where he enlivened the Dutch Pavilion with a presentation on 27 multiple screens, as well as the Mexican Olympics in 1968. He is currently developing new entertainment projects for both television and the Internet through his production company, Earthview, Inc.

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THE GUARDIAN

THE GUARDIAN revolves around a hotshot, thirtysomething lawyer who must perform community service or risk being disbarred when he's arrested for using drugs. While closing lucrative deals at his father's ultrasuccessful law firm, Nick is forced to work for a child-advocacy office run by Alvin Masterson, a boss who plays by the rules and is determined to keep Nick honest. Although his father wavers between pride and concern over his son's work performance, Nick attempts to appease him and the firm's high-paying clients while devoting his time to a place where he can help those truly in need. Straddling two vastly different legal worlds, Nick is determined to maintain his fast-paced lifestyle as he tackles cases involving children caught up in difficult circumstances.

Veteran actor Dabney Coleman's breakthrough role was as the male chauvinist boss in the feature film "9 to 5." His subsequent feature film credits include "Stuart Little," "You've Got Mail," "Inspector Gadget," "Tootsie," "War Games," "Where the Heart Is," "Dragnet," "On Golden Pond," "North Dallas Forty," "Melvin and Howard," "The Man with One Red Shoe," "Cloak & Dagger," "The Climb," "The Beverly Hillbillies," "There Goes the Neighborhood," "Clifford," "Meet the Applegates," "Short Time" and "Hot To Trot." He also provided the voice of Principal Prickley in the animated feature "Recess: The Movie" and will be seen in the upcoming film "Baby's in Black."

Coleman made his television comedy debut in the series "That Girl." After several guest-starring roles, he was cast in the series "Mary Hartman, Mary Hartman" and its spinoffs, "Forever Fernwood" and "Fernwood 2-Night." He later starred in "The 'Slap' Maxwell Story," which earned him Golden Globe and Emmy Award nominations, "Drexell's Class," "Buffalo Bill," for which he received two Emmy nominations and a Golden Globe nomination, and "Madman of the People." He also received an Emmy nomination for Outstanding Guest Actor in a Drama Series for a role in "Columbo."

His television credits also include the movies "Sworn to Silence," for which he won an Emmy Award and was nominated for a Golden Globe Award, "Murrow," for which he was nominated for a CableACE Award, "Baby M," for which he received an Emmy nomination, "Kiss My Act," "Must Be Santa," "Exiled," "My Date with the President's Daughter," "Devil's Food," "Idols of the Game," "Judicial Consent," "In the Line of Duty," "The Texan," "Never Forget" and "Guilty of Innocence: The Lenell Geter Story" and the mini-series "Fresno."

MARK JOHNSON
(Executive Producer, THE GUARDIAN)

Academy Award-winning producer Mark Johnson recently wrapped the suspense drama "Dragonfly," and went straight into production on three more films: the comedy "The Banger Sisters," "The Rookie" and the comedy "Baby's in Black." Production is scheduled to begin soon on Johnson's fifth film of 2001, "The Notebook."

Last year, Johnson formed Gran Via Productions with a first-look deal with Intermedia Film Equities. He produced the critically acclaimed family film "My Dog Skip," served as the executive producer of the summer thriller "What Lies Beneath" and produced the sci-fi comedy "Galaxy Quest." His other film credits include "Home Fries," "Donnie Brasco," "A Little Princess" and "A Perfect World."

Johnson entered the producing world in 1982 as executive producer of director Barry Levinson's debut film "Diner." This was the start of a long and successful collaboration between Johnson and Levinson. They went on to make "The Natural" (1984), "Young Sherlock Holmes" (1985), "Tin Men" (1987), "Good Morning Vietnam" (1987) and "Rain Man" (1988), which won four Academy Awards including Best Picture. The 1990 film "Avalon," the first film under the pair's Baltimore Pictures banner, was followed by "Bugsy" (1991), which was nominated for 10 Academy Awards including Best Picture, "Toys" (1992) and "Jimmy Hollywood" (1994). Johnson was also honored with Golden Globe Awards for his work on both "Rain Man" and "Bugsy."

Johnson served as executive producer of director Steven Soderbergh's "Kafka" and of "Sniper," "Wilder Napalm" and "Quiz Show." He and Levinson decided to form their own separate production companies in the spring of 1994, although they continue to work on joint projects, most recently the offbeat 2000 comedy "An Everlasting Piece."

Johnson began his feature film career after being accepted into the Directors Guild training program and working on Paul Mazursky's "Next Stop, Greenwich Village." Over the course of the next few years, he advanced from production assistant to assistant director on "Movie, Movie," "The Brinks Job," "Escape from Alcatraz" and "High Anxiety," where he first met Levinson, one of the film's writers. Shortly thereafter, Johnson and Levinson began work on "Diner."

MICHAEL PRESSMAN
(Executive Producer, THE GUARDIAN)

Michael Pressman has had an extensive career as a director and producer for the stage, feature films and television series as well as long-form drama and special presentations. He has directed such diverse feature films as "Boulevard Nights" and "Some Kind of Hero" and co-produced "Lake Placid" with David E. Kelley and Peter Bogart. Pressman also directed the play "To Gillian on Her 37th Birthday" in Los Angeles and then took the story to the big screen.

Teaming with David E. Kelley, Pressman was co-executive producer of the Emmy Award-winning drama series "Picket Fences," during all four years of its run on the CBS Television Network. He continued his collaboration with Kelley by producing and directing the pilot for the award-winning CBS drama series "Chicago Hope," for which he received a Director's Guild nomination, and serving as executive consultant during its first season. Pressman returned to "Chicago Hope" in its sixth season as executive producer/show runner.

Pressman directed the television movies "A Season for Miracles" and the adaptation of the Ann Tyler novel "Saint Maybe," both "Hallmark Hall of Fame" presentations broadcast on the Network. He also directed and produced numerous episodes of the CBS series "Michael Hayes." His other television credits include directing more than a dozen television movies, including "Shoot Down," "Quicksand" and "To Heal a Nation."

Pressman was graduated from Manhattan's High School of Music and Arts, went on to study drama at Carnegie-Mellon University, then moved to Los Angeles where he received a B.F.A. degree in film from the California Institute of the Arts in 1972. He is now a member of its Board of Trustees. Pressman studied under Alexander Mackendrick, the director of the theatrical films "The Sweet Smell of Success" and "The Ladykillers."

After completing film school, Pressman joined fellow students Sean Daniel and David Kirkpatrick and raised \$200,000 to make "The Great Texas Dynamite Chase," which Pressman directed. The low-budget action film demonstrated promise and Pressman was subsequently hired by Paramount to direct "The Bad News Bears in Breaking Training," the first sequel to the hit film. Pressman next developed and directed "Those Lips, Those Eyes," "Doctor Detroit" and "Boulevard Nights."

In the Company's largest investment ever in a news broadcast, THE EARLY SHOW, a new CBS News weekday morning broadcast anchored by Bryant Gumbel and Jane Clayson, debuted in a new digital, state-of-the-art, street-level broadcast studio. A new two-hour program, THE SATURDAY EARLY SHOW, joined the CBS Television Network's lineup. FACE THE NATION and CBS NEWS SUNDAY MORNING experienced audience growth, and CBS Radio News was improved dramatically, to industry acknowledgment. Additionally, CBS News -- specifically the CBS EVENING NEWS -- has been heralded for its rededication to hard-news coverage.

Heyward also spearheaded the Division's move into new media. He was a key force in the establishment of two premier Web sites -- CBS MarketWatch and CBS HealthWatch, leading consumer sites that now provide valuable, in-depth, updated content for viewers. CBS News also became the exclusive network news provider to America Online, the leading online service.

Before his promotion to President, Heyward was executive producer, CBS EVENING NEWS, and Vice President, CBS News (October 1994-January 1996).

Prior to that, he was executive producer of the CBS News magazine "Eye to Eye" (February 1993-October 1994). He was also responsible for developing and launching 48 HOURS, the primetime CBS news hour that premiered in January 1988. Under his leadership as executive producer, 48 HOURS achieved critical acclaim and wide recognition for its innovative style of reporting. The broadcast

has won such prestigious honors as a George Foster Peabody Award, two Ohio State Awards, the Overseas Press Club Award and an Edward R. Murrow Brotherhood Award. Heyward has also won 12 national Emmy Awards.

He was senior broadcast producer of the CBS EVENING NEWS WITH DAN RATHER (May 1986-October 1987). Prior to that, he was a senior producer of the CBS EVENING NEWS (1984-86), having joined the broadcast as a field producer in March 1981.

Heyward was executive producer of "The Six O'Clock Report," the evening news broadcast on WCBS-TV, the CBS owned television station in New York (1978-81). Earlier, as producer of the broadcast, he won a local Emmy Award in the Outstanding News Program category. He joined the station in 1976 as a news writer.

DON HEWITT
(Executive Producer, 60 MINUTES)

More than 50 years after joining CBS News, Don Hewitt continues to influence television journalism, much as he did when he helped develop many of its methods for reporting news, beginning in 1948. His pioneering work in producing and directing many of the broadcasts of the world's major news events during television's infancy provided a blueprint that news producers still rely on today. But Hewitt is best known and most respected for another innovation, 60 MINUTES, the groundbreaking news broadcast he created in 1968. In his new book, *Tell Me a Story, Fifty Years and 60 MINUTES in Television* (PublicAffairs, April 2001), Hewitt chronicles his life as a newsman, from World War II correspondent to the beginning of television to the triumphs and controversies of 60 MINUTES, the most-watched news broadcast in television history.

60 MINUTES, which enters its 34th season in the fall, finished the 2000-01 season as the number-one news magazine. Hewitt is credited with creating the news magazine format, a successful and much-copied style of news broadcast for which 60 MINUTES was the prototype. For this innovation and for his years of leadership on 60 MINUTES, he was awarded the Founders Emmy by the International Council of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences in 1995. When presenting this award to Hewitt, then-ABC News President Rooney Arledge said: "His real monument is 60 MINUTES. He is truly an innovator in this business. I still believe Don deserves the credit for it [the idea of the news magazine format]; it is an innovative format no one had done before. It's been copied all over the world, including several times by us. He's been a leader in our industry. He has inspired all sorts of people."

Hewitt has been the recipient of numerous other honors, the most recent of which was the 2001 Carr Van Anda Award for his contribution to journalism, bestowed by the E.W. Scripps School of Journalism at Ohio University and the 2000 Fred Friendly First Amendment Award from Quinnipiac College. In 1999, he was honored with the Spirit of Liberty Award from the People for the American Way Foundation. A few weeks earlier, the Committee to Protect Journalists awarded him its 1999 Burton Benjamin Memorial Award for "a lifetime of distinguished achievement in the cause of press freedom." His other prizes include eight Emmy Awards, two George Foster Peabody Awards and the 1980 Broadcaster of the Year Award from the International Radio and Television Society. Hewitt was inducted into the Television Academy Hall of Fame in 1990. In 1992, he won the Lowell Thomas Centennial Award, presented by Marist College, and the Goldsmith Prize for Investigative Journalism, presented by the Joan Shorenstein Barone Center on the Press, Politics and Public Policy at the John F. Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University, a prize he shared with Bob Woodward of *The Washington Post*.

Hewitt began his career with CBS News in 1948 as an associate director of "Douglas Edwards with the News," then served as producer-director of the broadcast for 14 years. He later became executive producer of the "CBS Evening News with Walter Cronkite."

As a producer-director of "Eyewitness to History" and other CBS News specials, Hewitt covered the travels of Presidents Dwight D. Eisenhower, John F. Kennedy and Richard M. Nixon. He was executive producer of the award-winning "CBS Reports: Hunger in America," produced and directed the first face-to-face television debate between presidential nominees Kennedy and Nixon during the 1960 campaign and directed two history-making three-network "Conversations with the President." He was also producer-director of the coverage of the coronation of Queen Elizabeth (1953) and the installation of Pope John XXIII (1958). In addition, Hewitt had a leading role in CBS News' coverage of every Democratic and Republican National Convention from 1948 to 1980.

Hewitt's additional honors include the George Polk Memorial Award, the Alfred I. duPont-Columbia University Award and the University of Missouri Distinguished Service Journalism Award. In 1988, Hewitt, 60 MINUTES Correspondent Andy Rooney and the broadcast's former Correspondent Dan Rather were honored with the Gold Medal Award from the International Radio and Television Society for their work on 60 MINUTES. It was the first time that a television news broadcast received the prestigious award. Hewitt was also honored by the Radio/Television News Directors Association (RTNDA) with the Paul White Award (1987) and by the National Press Foundation with the 1985 Sol Taishoff Award for Excellence in Broadcast Journalism. In May 1990, he was honored by Brandeis University with an honorary doctorate in humane letters. In January 1992, he was a guest lecturer at the University of California, Berkeley Graduate School of Journalism. In 1993, Hewitt delivered the first William S. Paley lecture at the Museum of Television & Radio. He was also honored by the American Film Institute with an honorary doctorate in fine arts, and in 1998, the Banff Television Festival gave him its highest honor, the Astral Award for Excellence in Broadcasting.

Also in 1998, Hewitt accepted the President's Award for Lifetime Achievement from the Overseas Press Club for 60 MINUTES' regular inclusion of foreign reports in its story mix. The citation reads: "Under Don Hewitt's leadership, 60 MINUTES' coverage of vital overseas stories sets the highest standards." In addition, 60 MINUTES was honored with the 1987-88 Gold Baton, the highest of the Alfred I. duPont-Columbia University Awards in broadcast journalism, "for two decades of reporting that changed the nature of television news." In April of 1993 (the year it celebrated its 25th anniversary), 60 MINUTES was inducted into the National Association of Broadcasters Hall of Fame.

Hewitt began his journalism career in 1942 as head copyboy for the *New York Herald Tribune* after attending New York University for one year. During World

War II, he served as a correspondent in the European and Pacific theaters (1943-45). He later became night editor of the Associated Press' Memphis bureau (1945-46), went on to become editor of the *Pelham* (N.Y.) *Sun* (1946-47) and was the night telephoto editor for Acme News Pictures. He is the author of the book *Minute by Minute* (Random House, 1985).

Hewitt was born Dec. 14, 1922 in New York. He and his wife, Marilyn Berger, a former NBC News White House correspondent and former *Washington Post* diplomatic correspondent, live in New York.

SUSAN ZIRINSKY
(Executive Producer, 48 HOURS)

Susan Zirinsky has served as executive producer of 48 HOURS since July 1996. Before that, she was executive producer of "Campaign '96" (1995-96), managing the daily operations of CBS News' election-year political coverage. Prior to that, she was executive producer of the primetime CBS News magazine "Eye to Eye" (1994-95), after having served as the broadcast's senior broadcast producer and senior producer (1993-94).

Zirinsky was the director of CBS News 1992 political coverage, responsible for coordinating coverage of candidates, issues and events for all CBS News broadcasts, including the presidential election. During that period, she also held the position of senior CBS News producer at the 1992 Olympic Winter Games in Albertville, France, where she was responsible for overseeing the CBS Sports News Desk.

Prior to that, Zirinsky served in several capacities for the CBS EVENING NEWS WITH DAN RATHER in New York and Washington, D.C. In New York, she was its senior broadcast producer (1991-92) and senior producer (1989-91). In Washington, she managed all feature stories and oversaw editorial content of daily hard-news events (1986-89). She first joined the CBS EVENING NEWS as a producer, primarily covering the White House during the Carter and Reagan administrations (1979-86).

Zirinsky was technical advisor for writer/director James L. Brooks on the film "Broadcast News," starring Holly Hunter as a Washington network news producer.

She also worked on other CBS News broadcasts, including the CBS MORNING NEWS and CBS EVENING NEWS Weekend Editions, and held a number of other assignments, including floor producer at the Democratic and Republican National Conventions from 1976 through 1988. She was senior producer for both conventions in 1992 and has been an election-night producer since 1976.

Zirinsky's foreign experience is extensive. She traveled on every major foreign trip with Presidents Carter and Reagan and was the lead producer at every U.S.-Soviet summit during their administrations. In 1989, Zirinsky ran the

Beijing newsroom during CBS News' critically acclaimed coverage of the student uprising and subsequent military crackdown. Earlier that year, she was lead producer for CBS News' coverage from Japan of Emperor Hirohito's funeral. She was the senior producer responsible for setting up and overseeing the Network's news operation in Kuwait while covering the Persian Gulf War, and it was under her stewardship that CBS News was the first network to enter Kuwait, just behind the Allied forces.

Zirinsky first joined CBS News as a part-time production clerk in 1972. She was graduated cum laude from American University in Washington, D.C. Her husband, Joe Peyronnin, is Vice President of News at Telemundo. They live in New York with their daughter, Zoe. Zirinsky's birth date is March 3.

JEFFREY FAGER
(Executive Producer, 60 MINUTES II)

Jeffrey Fager was named executive producer, 60 MINUTES II, in July 1998. The broadcast debuted in January 1999 on the CBS Television Network to overwhelming critical acclaim and has already been recognized with three Emmy Awards, two Peabody Awards, a Delta Sigma Chi Award, an IRE Award, an Alfred I. duPont-Columbia University Award and a Gracie Allen Award presented by AWRT.

Fager had been executive producer of the CBS EVENING NEWS WITH DAN RATHER (1996-98), during which time the broadcast was praised for its rededication to hard news, enterprising reporting and increased foreign coverage. By the time Fager left to join 60 MINUTES II, the CBS EVENING NEWS had gained more than one million viewers over the previous year, a gain none of its competitors could match. The broadcast regularly finished number two in the ratings and claimed the number one spot four times during the 1997-98 season. Prior to that, Fager was the senior broadcast producer for the CBS EVENING NEWS (1994-96) and covered many major international stories, such as the war in Bosnia and the assassination of Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin.

Fager had been a producer for 60 MINUTES (1989-94) and was part of the original team that developed and launched 48 HOURS, the primetime CBS News hour, under the leadership of Andrew Heyward. Fager was a producer for that broadcast (1988-89).

He served as a producer on the CBS EVENING NEWS, based in London (1985-88) and New York (1984-85), and his international assignments were numerous: he covered Palestinian/Israeli conflicts in Lebanon, Syria and Jordan; the bombing of Libya in 1985; the Reagan-Gorbachev summits in Geneva and Iceland; Gorbachev's first foreign visit, to Paris, in 1986, and the changing Soviet Union and the fall of Eastern Europe.

Fager was a producer for other CBS News broadcasts (1982-84), including the Weekend Editions of the CBS EVENING NEWS, and was a broadcast producer for "Nightwatch," the Division's original overnight program.

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Before joining CBS News in 1982, he was a broadcast producer from 1979 to 1982 at KPIX-TV San Francisco, now the CBS owned station there. Prior to that, he was the assignment editor at WGHB-TV Boston and a news writer at WEEI Radio, a CBS station in Boston (1978-79). In 1977, he began his career in broadcasting as a production assistant at WBZ-TV Boston, now the CBS owned station there. Over the next year, he served as an associate director and assignment editor for WBZ-TV, as well as a newswriter for WBZ Radio.

Fager was born in Wellesley, Mass., and was graduated from Colgate University in 1977 with a B.A. in English and political science. He and his wife, Melinda, live in New Canaan, Conn., with their three children. His birth date is Dec. 10.



Jackson Haisley is a widowed father of two and a master intelligence officer who longs for an overseas transfer. When his transfer is denied, he is forced to resort to dangerous measures to achieve what he feels he deserves. The mission of this formidable group is to combat terrorism, nuclear threats, biological warfare and any and all assaults on the United States.

Kilborn's unique sense of humor, which ranges from the subtly dry to the goofy to the extremely politically incorrect, is showcased nightly in the program's opening monologue and desk chat segments. Here, his stage presence enables him to connect directly to a small, live studio audience and to the viewers at home.

Every night, the program features Kilborn's take on the day's events with a comic "In the News" segment, featuring photos, video clips, newsreel excerpts and his commentary on the world's most interesting and most amusing occurrences.

THE LATE LATE SHOW also features Kilborn's chats with the brightest stars from the worlds of film, television, news and sports. The guest segments demonstrate his range as an interviewer, from his respectful talks with Hollywood legends to his verbal sparring matches with the industry's young turks, and always include his patented "Five Questions" quiz with the program's lead guest.

During his first two years on CBS, Kilborn has also developed several recurring new segments that have quickly become audience favorites, including the mock game-show tension of "Yambo," in which celebrity guests square off against each other, and his faux press conferences before and after the program.

THE LATE LATE SHOW has also carved out two niches of its own in the late-night arena-- spotlighting rising young comics every week in the tradition of Johnny Carson's "Tonight Show" and showcasing musical segments in which

singers and bands either perform their own hits in a stripped-down, acoustic format or cover hit songs by other stars. The show recently added two additional nights of music to their weekly programming.

CRAIG KILBORN
(Host, THE LATE LATE SHOW with CRAIG KILBORN)

Craig Kilborn has come a long way since his days as a radio sportscaster covering the Savannah Spirits of the Continental Basketball Association.

With only a few steps between then and now, the 38-year-old Kilborn currently hosts THE LATE LATE SHOW with CRAIG KILBORN, a nightly comedic forum that takes a lighthearted look at the day's news events and offers an upbeat venue for the most interesting actors, musicians, sports stars and celebrity guests from around the world.

Kilborn, a native of Hastings, Minn., began his career by telling jokes in his mother's kitchen, using a long wooden spoon as a microphone. Before long, he was cracking them up with both his jokes and his attempts at a crossover dribble as a "role player" for the Montana State University "Fighting Bobcats" basketball team.

After college, Kilborn took his first paid broadcasting job as play-by-play man for the soon-to-be-out-of-business Savannah Spirits. He moved on to become sports director for KCBA-TV Monterey, Calif., before being discovered by ESPN, which provided him with a national audience for his trademark sly wit. It was at ESPN that his incomparable highlights-tape calls made a cult hero of the NBA's Pooh Richardson with such descriptions as "Pooh Pooh Pa-Choo, Mrs. Robinson" and "Too Live Pooh."

That humor served Kilborn well when he became host of "The Daily Show" on Comedy Central, where he created the "Five Questions" and "A Moment for Us" segments, which he brought with him to CBS.

Kilborn is also in high demand outside of the late night arena. He recently hosted the 2001 "TV Guide Awards Show" and will serve as *Gear* magazine's first ever guest editor for their third anniversary special issue in September 2001.

Kilborn, who took over as host of THE LATE LATE SHOW on March 30, 1999, is also one of its writers. He lives in Los Angeles.

This re-creation of pivotal events that took place during production of the series as told by original cast members offers an unusual look inside a show that became a cultural phenomenon.

The story, told from the point of view of Dawn, Bob and Russell, begins with the battle the creator faced convincing network executives to green light the original pilot. After struggling to cast the show, he fought to have the series picked up. The network couldn't argue with the favorable reaction audiences had to the seven unusual castaways and their plight. However, even after the series was picked up, the obstacles faced on "Gilligan's Island" were not only in front of the cameras. From Russell Johnson's reluctance to take the role that eventually solidified his place in pop culture to the private pain Natalie Schaeffer (Mrs. Howell) endured, the events taking place behind the scenes were far different from the lighthearted on-screen escapades of the shipwrecked seven.

Emmy Award winner Paul A. Kaufman ("Run the Wild Fields") is the executive producer. He is also directing the film from a script by Duane Poole ("The David Cassidy Story") for Landscape Entertainment, in association with The Kaufman Company. Dawn Wells ("Gilligan's Island") and Larry Germain ("Brady Bunch Home Movies") are the co-executive producers.
