Celebrate FM's Fiftieth Anniversary With Us

On June 13 we celebrate 50 years of American music on New York City's own classical radio station with a concert of new compositions at Alice Tully Hall, Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts, and you're invited! Even if you can't make it to the concert, you can hear it broadcast live, from 8-10pm.

John Schaefer hosts world premieres of 12 works inspired by "No Longer Very Clear," a poem written by Pulitzer Prize winner John Ashbery to mark the occasion. The composers appear on stage as the following pieces are performed:

Laurie Anderson, who has defined "performance art," does a piece for voice and sounds on tape.

Milton Babbitt, dean of American avant-garde composers, contributes a work for soprano, violin, cello, flute, and clarinet.

Sergio Cervetti, composer of works for dance, electronic pieces, and lyrical art songs, offers something for soprano, string quartet, and harpsichord.

John Corigliano, composer of the opera "The Ghosts of Versailles," gives us a composition for solo piano.

Anthony Davis, known for jazz compositions and recordings as a soloist and with his group, Episteme, offers a piece for soprano and chamber ensemble.

Philip Glass, composer of "Einstein on the Beach" and a number of acclaimed operas and music/theater works, has written a piece for solo piano.

Morton Gould, whose works have been played by every major American orchestra, performs music for solo piano.

Robin Holcomb, who combines elements of rock, jazz, traditional American, and more experimental styles, plays a song for voice, piano, synthesizer, electric guitar, bass, and drums.

Tania Leon, whose compositions draw on her Afro-Cuban roots, offers a piece for voice, cello, and marimba.

Raphael Mostel, leader of the Tibetan Singing Bowl Ensemble, conducts a work for multiple voices and

singing Tibetan bowls. *Peter Schickele*, composer and host of one of radio's most eclectic programs, premieres a piece for piano six-hands.

Joan Tower, composer of chamber works, piano pieces, and orchestral scores, contributes a piece for solo piano.

Among the musicians are: Ursula Oppens, piano; Christopher O'Riley, piano; Cheryl Marshall, soprano; Bill Frisell, electric guitar; and the Essex String Quartet.

Tickets for seats are available at \$50 and \$80 at the Alice Tully Hall box office. Buyers of \$125 tickets are invited to a reception with the composers and performers immediately



Behind the Chaos

For the past decade Anna Deavere Smith has created one-woman theater pieces based on verbatim interviews with people from all walks of life. In this special she explores Los Angeles, and the result is a powerful work that poses difficult questions. She interviews individuals ranging from riot victim Reginald Denny to Twilight Bey, an organizer of the gang truce. Through this one-woman show Anna Deavere Smith reminds us that what erupted in Los Angeles two years ago is part of a much larger puzzle.

Legacy of Summer

In 1964 nearly 1,000 white volunteers came to Mississippi to fight racial discrimination. They were viewed as agitators by many Mississippians. Several were murdered, and hundreds were beaten or jailed. White supremacists burned dozens of black churches and homes in retaliation. Those involved disagree about the legacy of Freedom Summer. Insights are gained through interviews with the participants, who have reunited in Mississippi to recall this unique moment in civil rights history. The program also includes archival news reports and music of the day. Civil rights activist and Freedom Summer participant Julian Bond narrates.





Stonewall: Myth, Magic, and Mobilization, AM820, Saturday, June 18, 11pm

Many people regard the Stonewall Rebellion as the beginning of the modern Gay Rights Movement. What began on June 27, 1969 as a routine raid on a "homosexual hangout" called the Stonewall Inn in Greenwich Village, turned into three nights of rioting. Although the melee energized a generation of lesbians and gay people into a fighting force for their civil rights, many myths have arisen about the events of those three nights and the personalities involved. *Stonewall: Myth, Magic, and Mobilization* traces the real history of the modern gay rights movement and hopes to clarify some of the myths about the riots.

The Radio Stage: Double Down, AM820, Sunday, June 19, 9:30pm

A game of cards becomes a scene of moral confrontation and haunting memory, as one person forces another to acknowledge their passive participation in the lynching of a gay youth, in this powerful drama. Tom Donaghy wrote this radio play, a co-production of WNYC and the Radio Stage Consortium.

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
