








Contributing to Duluth's spiritual side are the 104 churches of various denominations.

3. Second only to New York, Duluth's busy harbor with its 21 thirteen million ton capacity coal docks and seven 819 thousand ton capacity iron ore docks, accomodates 7,000 vessels annually.

4. Downtown view of Superior with its 572 retail firms. A total of 15,827 Superior employees earn an annual payroll totalling more than 44 million dollars.

These iron giants weighing over 1,100,000 lbs. regularly handle 180 loaded ore cars, from mines to dockyards. The D.M. & I.R. management and employees working together have established an enviable safety record of outstanding achievement.

8. Aerial view of Duluth's bustling downtown section. The city has a total of 1540 retail outlets. Over \$125,000,000. annually is paid Duluth's 40,150 employed persons.

9. Architectural drawing of the University of Minnesota Duluth Branch proposed science building. This is one of the 3 colleges 120 ypublic schools and 14 parochial schools contributing to Duluth's educational system.


