CBC-FM, NOW 24 HOURS, GOES ON SATELLITE

The CBC's English and French FM Stereo networks are now broadcasting 24 hours a day and, effective April 1, will be available to all cable operators via satellite. If all cable systems pick up the services, English FM will be available to 86% of all Canadians (up 17%), and French FM to 83% (up 58%). The CBC stresses that satellite delivery does not replace its plan to extend coverage using conventional transmitters.

Starting with the 1984 fall season, CBC-TV will increase prime time Canadian content by one hour a week on the English network and two hours a week on the

French network, (increasing percentages to 75 and 77, respectively). To meet this target, the CBC is committing up to \$23 million to finance film production in association with independent producers; with support from the Canadian Broadcast Program Development Fund, this could represent a potential investment of \$69 million in independent production.

CKND-TV ADDS NEWSCAST; WINS MORE DRAMA AWARDS

 A 30-minute news package at 6:00 pm has been added to the schedule of CKND-TV Winnipeg, with anchorman Linden Soles and sports director Brian Swain. The program is known as CKND News-6:00 Report. The existing late newscast, Manitoba Tonight, has been renamed CKND News-10:30 Report, with Jim Farrell and Marjorie Salki continuing as coanchors, Joe Pascucci taking over sports, and Stan Kubicek handling the weather. Two CKND productions, Hunting Season and Reunion, have won gold and silver medals respectively at the New York 26th International Film and TV Festival. A third, In the Fall has three nominations for ACTRA's National awards in April, and is also nominated for NATPE's Iris award. Production on the series is continuing with The Prodigal, and a sixth drama-to be completed this summer.

NEW CALGARY AM ON-AIR

CFFR, Calgary's first new AM station in 20 years, has begun operations in stereo on 660 kHz with 50,000 watts. Known as 66-CFR (Calgary Family Radio), its format is contemporary hit music, with emphasis on the 50s and 60s, and strong local news and information. Owned and operated by Ralco Communications (CJME/CIZL-FM Regina, CKOM Saskatoon), CFFR has Gord Rawlinson as gm, Don Armstrong as assistant manager, Vince Cownden as pd and Steve Brown as news director.

TVO EXPANSION

Some 56 northern Ontario communities are now equipped with low power rebroadcasters to receive a full off-air signal from TVOntario. The educational network's signal, beamed from Toronto via Anik C3, is received by a TVRO connected to the LPTV at each site. Northern communities of over 100 population may apply for a local transmitter through the provincial Ministry of Northern Affairs. Under the \$3.3 million program, as many as 170 communities could be equipped with LPTVs by 1985.

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

Associated with Quinte for 35 years, Frank Murray is a past president of the Central Canada Broadcasters Association and the Radio Bureau of Canada, and a former director of CAB. Active in many local organizations, he was recently honored in Lahr, West Germany, for his work promoting the 'twinning' of Lahr with Belleville. He continues as a consultant with Quinte Broadcasting and a director of Cablevue (Quinte) Ltd.

Other stations in the news:

- Steve Bolton and Paul Bradbury of CJYQ/CKIX-FM St. John's hosted the Miss Teen Newfoundland pageant—it selected Kirsten Grabke to compete in the Miss Teen Canada pageant on CTV.
- Nick Frost, manager of CHIM-FM Kelowna for the past 8 years, has resigned to apply for a second FM station there—format would be 'beautiful music.'
- Non-commercial CJRT-FM Toronto met its objective of \$140,000—pledged by some 3,300 listeners—during a recent 9-day fund-raising drive. CJRT receives 60% of its financing from the Ontario government.
- WQXR, The New York Times' classical music station, is reducing commercials an average of 15%—as much as 40% in some time periods; a policy of going to music, no spots, after news, is also in effect.
- Quebec communications minister Jean-Francois Bertrand has proposed that Radio Quebec increase private sponsorship to four times its present \$800,000 level. Total budget for the province's educational TV network is \$54 million.
- CISL Richmond has won CRTC approval to move from 940 to 650 kHz, with a power increase to 10 kw day/7.5 kw night. The transmitter site will move from Lulu Island to Delta.
- CKCY Sault Ste. Marie has been given until April 30 to complete its change of frequency from 920 to 540 kHz, with 15 kw day/2.5 kw night.

Clear Channels Yield 155 AM Assignments for Canada

Canada-USA Bilateral Agreement Signed

With signing of the bilateral agreement on January 17th, 24 Canadian operating stations on U.S. and Canadian NARBA clear channels are confirmed, along with 131 assignments for proposed stations on these channels. The total of Canadian entries on the list attached to the new agreement is 163, but this includes six duplicate entries for the same channel at given locations, being options for operating parameters for a single station or mutually-exclusive options for competing stations. Also included is a dummy entry for Ottawa on 750 kHz, required for interference calculation only, and 1540 kHz in Toronto, which will permit CHIN to commence night operations (1540 is a Bahamas 1-A channel under NARBA, not one of the 32 on which Canada or USA had priority).

The agreement provides procedures for additions or changes to, or deletions from the list, but few future changes can be expected, since the negotiators have virtually saturated the possibilities on these channels.

The U.S. entries on these channels far outnumber the Canadian. The U.S. practice of retaining much lower power limits permits more frequent repetition of assignments; also, many U.S. entries are mutually exclusive, or for daytime-only operations.

The list provides not only basic parameters, but full detail of directional array designs, plus information on top-loading and on augmented patterns.

Aftermath of Rio Agreement

Negotiations of the bilateral agreement was a necessary rationalization of the agreement resulting from the regional conference which concluded at Rio de Janiero in December, 1981. The Plan from that conference listed many stations which were incompatible, and post-conference procedures were developed to sort out what would or would not be possible in assignments. The original Plan contained two lists, 'A' and 'B'—the former containing stations for which interference values to and from were acceptable; the latter, stations which faced or caused unaccepted interference conditions. (A report on the conference and the original Canadian station list appeared in Technitopics in BT, March/April 1982.)

Canada has now completed negotiations with all countries involved in our list 'B' assignments, and with signing of the U.S./Canada bilateral treaty, all surviving Canadian entries can be moved into List 'A' and the balance deleted. The original Rio listings provided 172 Canadian entries on the U.S. and Canadian NARBA clear channels. Of these, 27 were not retained, others were provided alternative frequencies, and in addition, ten further assignments were found possible. Canadian broadcasters should be thankful for the results achieved by our negotiators, in particular René Guindon and Doug Forde of DOC's Broadcasting Regulation Branch.

Agreement Covers New Ground

The new agreement supersedes all previous agreements between the two countries including those provisions of NARBA relating to mutual undertakings, and any provisions of the Rio agreement with which it is inconsistent as regards mutual relations between Canada and the U.S.

Much of the agreement is a repetition of the details thrashed out at Rio, but a few new wrinkles have been added. The articles of the agreement cover the following subjects: I—Definitions

II-Adoption of the Plan in Annex I or modifications resulting from Article III

III—Procedures for modification

IV-Format of notifications per Annex 1

V-Technical Criteria per Annex 2

VI-Groundwave measurement procedures and resolution of complaints.

VII—Extended Hours of Operation—being night-time hours which occur between 6 am and two hours after sunset local time, may be used with protection to other stations calculated using diurnal curves contained in Appendix 7 of Annex 2.

VIII—Critical Hours of Operation—Class B or C stations must protect Class A station in the other country, which originally had NARBA Class 1-A status, from local sunrise at the Class B or C site until 1 1/2 hours after sunrise at the path mid-point and also from 1 1/2 hours before sunset at mid-point until sunset at the Class B or C site. Protection values, obtained from a curve in Appendix 8 of Annex 2, are not particularly difficult to meet unless the protected station is not very distant from the Class B or C site.

IX—Termination of Previous Agreements—this agreement now represents the only Canada/U.S. agreement governing AM broadcasting.

X—Periodic Review is now provided for on a five-year cycle. XI—Amendment of the Annexes—except for station changes to the list in Annex 1, made in accordance with Article 3, amendments to the Annexes may be made by an exchange of letters. XII—Entry into Force: January 17, 1984.

Annex 1-Contains instructions and forms for notifications, lists of former NARBA Class 1-A stations to be protected during critical hours, and 1-B stations, and the Plan. However, two important qualifications are attached to the Plan annexed to this agreement. First, the list is incomplete, in that it contains stations on only the 32 channels which originally were NARBA Canadian or US clear channels, plus the night operation for CHIN Toronto on 1540. However, the full Plan includes all assignments coordinated under previous agreements. Secondly, the assignments in the Plan on the former NARBA local channels 1230, 1240, 1340, 1400, 1450 and 1490 kHz are on the basis of agreement that night power may be increased to one kw or in some individual cases, to other powers, the effective dates to be established by an exchange of letters. Furthermore, daytime powers of stations on these channels may be increased provided satisfactory protection is maintained.

Annex 2—Technical Criteria—largely based upon the criteria accepted at Rio, contained in Annex 2 of the regional agreement. There are a few additions plus deletion of some superfluous information, such as criteria related to the tropical noise zone. Added is a new 10% skywave curve, Fig. 4-A to replace the 8 db differential from the 50% curve used at Rio. The values for diurnal factor used in calculation of extended hours are given in Figures and Tables 5A and 5B. Criteria and guidelines for reduced design tolerance (reduced Q) are provided in Attachments B and C. Calculations for extended hours of operation are in Appendix 7 and for critical hours of operation in Appendix 8.

NEW FACILITIES FOR CJOR— THE TALK OF VANCOUVER!

For 60 years, one of Canada's pioneer radio stations, CJOR, has been part of the history of Vancouver and the west coast.

Today, CJOR 600 is entering a new era—marked by its move to a modern spacious facility at 1401 West 8th Avenue. There are also new management and direction, and a new programming policy, News Talk Radio—Vancouver. In an added note of optimism, 3,000 square feet of the 11,000 total in the new layout have been set aside for FM studios, in the expectation of acquiring an FM licence.

The move ended CJOR's long-term residency, 54 years, in the lower level of the Grosvenor Hotel.

As to the beginnings of CJOR, the official version is that it began in 1924 in the rear of New Westminster battery shop, as CFXC. In 1926, it became CJOR, and for many years was owned by the late George C. Chandler, recently inducted into the Canadian Association of Broadcasters' Hall of Fame.

Today, the station is owned by Jim Pattison Industries Ltd., and management personnel includes L. Harvey Gold, president, who joined CJOR last year from CKOY Ottawa; David Bremner, general sales manager; Rudy Herman, chief engineer; and Eleanor Jorge, accounting manager.

- Doug Collins—war hero and longstanding B.C. journalist, 12:30-3:00 pm.





CJOR started in 1922 as CKFX. It was owned by the Westminster Trust Company and became CJOR in 1926. George Chandler bought it for \$600-half in cash, and twenty-five a month. The studio was in an apartment. He slept in the bedroom. The kitchen was the engineer's office. And they broadcast from the living room. Then they moved to space over the Alexandra Ballroom. Mart Kenney says he owes his success to CJOR. He was playing the Alexandra and the CPR was trying out bands in Calgary to go to Banff for the summer. Kenney wanted to audition, but he couldn't afford to go to Calgary. So we arranged things. After we went off the air at twelve o'clock, we'd come back on the air at one, especially for Mart Kenney. He played a one-hour programme of music and because we were on a good frequency and all the stations were off, they could pick us up in Calgary. The manager of the Palliser Hotel heard Mart, liked what he heard, and hired him. That's how he got his career started.

We also had a group at CJOR putting on live drama. We did historic dramatizations of all the big companies in this area—the CPR, the Powell River Company, MacMillan-Bloedel, for example. It made CJOR's name well known. We did the first Canadian Golf Championship carrying heavy remote equipment around on a stretcher. Nobody had any money but we'd work our guts out to do something because it was fun. We started 'Town Meeting in Canada,' a sort of public forum. We did 'Treasure Trail,' a giveaway show. We gave away fifty silver dollars each week, and people had to send in their gum wrappers. We got 35,000 thousand letters in one week. —Don Laws.

...I did a great many productions at CJOR in Vancouver. That's where I first worked with Alan Young. It was in a comedy show directed by Andrew Allan; Fletcher Markle was in it, and Bernie Braden. We all worked on each other's shows and we were all ready to descend on Toronto which, eventually, we all did. —John Drainie

As they are wont to say on many a newscast: Here's what has been happening... The retirement of **Don Hartford** from Standard Radio removes from active broadcasting a fine gentleman for whom we have always had the greatest respect and admiration. We wish him and his wife, Jean, many happy days—and Don, may the hunting and fishing be the best ever. Don was recently inducted into the Canadian Music Industry Hall of Fame, a well-deserved salute to his strong involvement in the Canadian Talent Library... 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
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New CIHI, CKHJ-FM Facilities in

CIHI first went on the air August 19, 1977. From that date on, a formidable audience has grown, backing our efforts to the point that major additions and changes were contemplated as early as 12 months after our on-air date. The idea of Country FM was formulated and set on the drawing board—CKHJ-FM went on the air July 15, 1983—and a complete revamp of CIHI-AM was included.

The first thing, obviously, on the agenda of building a radio station is a location. Plans for new buildings or the acquisition of existing buildings were being contemplated when our owner Jim Ross, who is also a real estate developer, acquired a property at 364 Argyle Street in Fredericton. This three-storey building in the older section of the city had been a turn-of-the-century boot and shoe factory, and was saved from the demolition crews by Mr. Ross. It now has been completely renovated, preserving remarkably well the architecture of that era. (Ross Ventures Ltd. earned an award from the Heritage Trust Association for this project.)

CIHI and CKHJ-FM are located on the third floor, east wing of the building. The floor plan utilizes almost every square inch of space, yet provides a pleasant working environment. Important considerations were:

- new studios and talk booths were to be large enough (not 'sardine cans') but with no wasted space;
- (2) minimal changes in existing sprinkler systems, wiring and plumbing;
- (3) visual proximity of talk booths assignable to other studios;
- (4) proximity of studios and talk booths to central rack control area;
- (5) all broadcast functions to revolve around a central area.

These and a hundred other requirements were taken into consideration before deciding on the design.

All studios, talk booths, newsroom edit positions, and the rack room are interconnected with 4-inch and 6-inch PVC pipe firmly secured to the ceiling underneath. This exercise, which took a day to complete, has saved hours of work—not to mention the advantages of neat wiring routing. (Somehow, no matter how well-planned the facility, or how many extra pairs of wires left behind the console, you always have to run one more to the studio that can't be accessed without a jack hammer or jig saw.)

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

Fredericton Heritage Building

Our next consideration was soundproofing and isolation of studio islands.

The original floor in the building consisted of 2x8s, laminated on their edge, supported by 12x12 wooden beams. The reason for such a sturdy floor, I suppose, was the heavy machinery once housed here. This floor caused some concern, as air conditioning units and heat pumps are fastened to the ceiling underneath. When turned on, vibration was conducted up through the flooring into the studios. To overcome this problem, a sub-floor was built, consisting of 2x6s with a layer of rubber both above and below to provide isolation.

Incidentally, the walls of the studios are actually two walls, with a sound blanket woven between them, covered on both outside braces with two layers of 5/8" gyproc. All floors are covered with an antistatic carpet and rooms are humidity-controlled as there have been past problems with phono pre-amps being blown by static charges. The windows in the studios are triple glazed, also rubber mounted, with the center pane at 90° to the sill and the two outside panes angled out at the top. Our doors and frames are of a special type manufactured by Ambico Ottawa.

Newsroom Re-Designed

Our newsroom came under the 'axe' as well, and everything was removed from the area and a new design set in place. With the addition of more news people for the FM station, the space had to be utilized more efficiently, while retaining some privacy for those working in an area that is pretty hectic at the slowest of times. Our final design became three semi-isolated work stations, each equipped with typewriter, ITC RP cart deck, Technics RS M263 cassette deck, Crown SX800 reel to


reels (from our previous studios), and consoles (two Microtrac and one LPB, inherited from another small studio). Also centralized across from the work stations are the teletypes, BN voice recorder (Revox A77), scanner, AM-FM monitor receiver, monitor cassette deck and VHF radio, all wall and desk-mounted together. All the functions in this area were also

routed to each work station and could be remote controlled from each individual station.

The decisions on consoles, how many and how to load them took several weeks to finalize. I had looked at various makes and types, but ultimately we couldn't ignore the excellent relationship shared with McCurdy Radio over the past six


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Master Control Room

years—including several occasions when McCurdy people raced to the airport to get critical components to us. Jon Young came to Fredericton and after a couple of all-night work sessions, we came up with a complete custom package. It was decided to replace the AM consoles as well, and went entirely with the 8800 series consoles throughout, with the purchase of three 8816s and two 8808s.


Master Control Rooms

Our AM master control (MCR) consists of the McCurdy woodwork and pedestal package with 8816 console, Technics SB6 speakers, ITC 3C cart, 2 Revox PR99s, SP10 MKII turntables with S220 tone arms, RS-M263 Technics cassette deck, Heathkit weather computer, VHF radio and AKG C414EB microphone. The FM MCR is identical both in layout and equipment. Cart storage is handled by Russ Lang rotating pedestals.

Production Control Rooms

The AM and FM production control rooms are equipped with 8808 consoles, McCurdy pedestals and woodwork, SP10 MKII turntables and S220 tone arms, RS M263

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Technics cassettes, SB6 Technics speakers, PR99 Revox reel to reels, and ITC Pr and P cart units (mono in AM, stereo in FM). Both of these studios are used for foreground and special production work, leaving the last studio to be described exlusively for commercial production.

The master AM-FM PCR is equipped with a McCurdy 8816 console, with pedestal and all oak woodwork. All stereo recording and playback machines are located on one side of the console, including one stereo RP ITC cart deck, one stereo play-only ITC cart deck, RS-M263 cassette deck and two B-67 MKII Studer reel-to-reels. On the other side are the SP10 MKII turntables with the SS3159C McCurdy turntable packages, one mono RP ITC cart deck, one mono play-only cart

deck, and an ITC splice-finder/eraser.

The board is equipped with 12 input modules and two output modules (PGM1/Sum o/p & PGM2/Aux o/p) with PPM metering for PGM1, PGM2 and sum. Two 3-band EQ modules, 2 compressors with its own metering, varispeed controls for Studers with 5 button remote control are wired directly into board. We also installed a 12-station alternate action simulstart preselect, wired via master start/stop switch to selected machines, and a count-up timer to control on/off functions simultaneously.



Compact turret provides simplified controls in each of four talk booths.

Rack Room

The central control area, or the rack room, as we call it, is located to the rear of the studio area. As mentioned, PVC ducts bring all studio and talk booth wiring to three 19" rack panels in this room.

RACK #1

- McCurdy DA504 audio distribution for off-air feeds, PGM 1 and 2 o/ps from AM consoles, BN Voice, news console outputs, etc.
- Mosely TRC 15A remote control system sending via PCL 101 and return via telephone line.
- TFT753/755/AM preselectable modula-

tion monitor, which also provides our offair feed, plus an alarm interface for modulation or carrier loss.

- Revox B77 logger machine using Ampex 706 logger tape (7200 ft. per reel); logs AM left side, FM right side.
- Audimax 4440 directly limits AM MCR pgm, 1 or 2 output to STL and Telco backup program line.

RACK #2


Houses all power supplies for every studio and talk booth, relay switches for talkback system, distribution amps for some consoles and phantom power supplies for microphones.

RACK #3

- Harris MXP-95 FM Audio CPU handles all the limiting and processing required for FM MCR.
- Two PCL505s with TDT-2 switches for auto transfer, in case of failure in 950 MHz STL link to FM site. The reason for the backup 505 was a \$2000/month line charge by NBTel for program lines. (It's interesting to note that when I requested NBTel to quote a monthly charge on the system we now have, they still wanted around \$2000 per month.)

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COMPUTERIZED SEQUENCER CS—800


The CS—800 was developed to bring operational ease to various applications of VCR sequencing. In broadcast, it will air all commercials while running a movie or any taped full length program. In cable, it will automate a complete channel. In hotels, it will run local movies without attendance. Its programmable versatility will allow it to adapt to virtually any application.

- Built in micro-processor for foolproof programming.
- —L.E.D. readouts and full tally confidence.
- —Built in 12 x 1 audio follow routing switcher.

- DA507 handles all stereo feed distribution through out the various studios and talk booths.
- Amcron FM-1 handles our FM off-air receiver needs.
- Moseley TRC15AW looks after FM remote control functions, sending on the PCL505 and return via the SCMO channel.

All the rack equipment is cooled by sealed Rotron rack fans.

AM Transmitter Site

Our AM transmitter is located approximately 5 miles north of the city and is a direct line of site for the STL link. (As long as the saw mill next to the towers keep its saw dust pile down.) The site is located on a piece of interval land bordered by the Nashwaaksis stream, and during rainy periods and the spring break-up, the only access is by canoe. The site has held other surprises over the years-including a helpful farmer who decided one spring to plow the field he had sold to us. We had understood he was going to pasture the ground; he had other intentions, which led to an expensive and timeconsuming repair of the radial system.

The AM station operates DA-N, 10,000 watts day and night. Our transmitters are CCA, with a 10 kw main unit and a 1 kw backup. Other associated gear includes a Nems-Clarke phase monitor, Moseley TRC15AW remote control, Moseley PCL 101 receiver, and audio processing by Mike Durrough's DAP. We also built a unit which automatically switches audio feeds into the 10 kw tx if either the PCL 101 or Telco lines fail. Also incorporated into this unit is an auto switcher from 10 kw to 1 kw tx in case of RF failure.

One of the biggest headaches at this site is AC power—to quote one N.B. Power official, "it's one of the worst power grids in the province."—line voltage here varies from 80 to 130 volts, with even greater sags and surges—that's if the power is on at all! Surge protection and a Kelk stedivolt, and a generator capable of handling the 1 kw tx were installed, eliminating most outages. Power problems are 95% of the outages at our site.

FM Transmitter Site

The FM site is also located north of Fredericton, 16 miles from the studios and 11 miles beyond the AM site. And yes, it's on the same AC power sources as the AM tx, which presents the age-old problem of trying to be in two places at once. One would think that the remote control system would handle this, but generally what happens is the voltage will drop considerably for a few minutes before going off all together, causing excessive current draw—which in turn fires off circuit

breakers everywhere! (Incidentally, does anyone have information on a type of panel breaker that can be reset remotely?)


Equipment at the FM site consists of two Harris transmitters—a 20 kw main unit, with a 1 k back-up. These units, through a series of rigid inside transmission lines, connect through a Dielectric A-5000 coaxial switch to a 6-bay Dielectric antenna (DCVS series) and an Electro impulse dummy load. The two PCL505s linked by an auto switcher and fed by an Anixter-Mark dish, supply audio and remote control functions to the transmitters.

Other associated equipment includes an LEA surge protector, Kelk voltage regulator, and generator capable of handling the 1 kw transmitter.

The aperture of the antenna is approximately 1000 ft. above sea level, providing excellent coverage to over half the province of New Brunswick.

I could ramble on for hours about our operations, but better still, when you're in the area, drop in—I'd be pleased to show you around New Brunswick's newest radio stations.






