NEW BRUNSWICK'S IRVING FAMILY TO SELL CHSJ-TV TO CBC, MITV TO CANWEST GLOBAL

If the CRTC approves, CBC affiliate CHSJ-TV Saint John and its rebroadcasters will become CBC O&O stations. New Brunswick is the only province where the CBC does not own a TV station - a situation which has brought considerable criticism over the years. It has been reported that New Brunswick Broadcasting, owned by the Irving family, also offered to sell Maritime Independent TV to the CBC, but that the price was "not one (CBC) could entertain." In any event, CBC stations already cover the areas served by MITV.

CanWest Global Communications has stepped in to buy MITV, a move expected since CanWest executives toured the MITV facilities some months ago. The network covers much of the three Maritime provinces and was recently given approval for four more transmitters in Nova Scotia.

CRTC APPROVES KITCHENER, LINDSAY TRANSFERS

· CHUM Ltd. has won CRTC approval for its purchase of CKKW/CFCA-FM Kitchener from CAP Communications. The purchase price is \$5 million, and CHUM will is spending \$526,000 on new facilities; other benefits include \$304,500 over the next seven years for various projects in the broadcast courses at Conestoga College and promotion of Canadian recordings through CHUM's 'Free Ad Plan'.

 A group of 11 shareholders (993682 Ontario Ltd.) bought CKLY Lindsay — in receivership since July 15/92 — for \$700,000.

The new owners, eight of whom live in Lindsay, have undertaken to continue the community's only local station and also plan a slight increase in programming. News staff will be expanded to four full-time, plus a network of 'stringers'.

MORE AMS PLAN MOVE TO FM


MARKETING PLAN FOR RADIO GROUP IN EAST

Mulvihill's radio division, as of July 1, is offering a package of 12 stations in N.B. and P.E.I. Eastern Atlantic Radio System (EARS) will give advertisers and agencies the convenience of one buy, and claims maximum saturation reach levels and cost efficiency. The group includes CIHI/CKHJ, CJCJ, CKNB, CFCY/CHLQ, CKCW/CFQM, CFAN, CJCW, CIOK and CHSJ.

Other stations in the news: A new community FM has been licensed to Coopérative Radio Restigouche Ltée at Balmoral. NB, 7,295 watts on 103.9 MHz. The station will provide the first full-time local French service for some 17,000 Francophones in the area. Capital costs are estimated at \$430,000, and the municipality has donated land for the studio facilities. The CRTC denied a proposed for on-air bingo in French, English and Micmac... Redmond Broadcasting's CJEZ-FM Toronto has applied for a power increase from 4,000 to 28,900 watts ERP... CFQX-FM Selkirk, MB, has applied for transfer of control from Robert Chipman and Megill-Stephenson Co. (each 50%) to Craig Broadcast Systems of Brandon... CFBC Saint John, NB, citing financial problems, has laid off manager Shirley Crawford and asked longtime talk-show host Tom Young to consider other options. VP Don Brown says no largescale layoffs are planned for the staff of 35... According to The Weather Network, flooding at the end of July affected the studios of CKVU-TV Vancouver, forcing it to go to taped programming... From DX Ontario: CKFX Vancouver has been off the air and engineer Jack Weibe is quoted as saving it may be back on later this year. (It's the short wave station of CKWX.) A new radio station in southwest Ontario, CJWD Tilbury, is said to be in the works; it would operate with 600w on 1490 KHz. And CKOL Campbellford is the call of the community station recently established in that eastern Ontario town... Cariboo Central Interior Radio has applied for two low power FMs at Fort St. James to rebroadcast CIRX-FM Prince George and CIVH Vanderhoof, BC. An AM rebroadcaster of CIVH would cease operation... A judge has ordered CHER Sydney, NS, to pay Pat Connolly more than \$25,000. His verbal 2-year contract to do play-by-play hockey ended after one season (1988-89) when CHER did not pursue further rights to the games. The judge says CHER has to pay him for year 2. plus 6% interest... CKRX 1090 Rocks is the new call for 24-yearold CHEC Lethbridge. GM Clyde Ross says the Monarch Broadcasting station is responding to extensive market research that showed listeners wanted a 'true Rock' station in Southern Alberta. A summer promotion has given over \$30,000 in prizes... CIGO Port Hawkesbury, NS, is being bought by its manager, Bob MacEachern. He's been with CIGO for 18 years, the last six as manager. Owner John Van Zutphen, president of the Eastern Group of Companies, said he wanted to keep the station in local hands... Here's a station that isn't in the news: P.E.I. Francophones have been lobbying for a Radio-Canada studio since 1977. SRC regional director Claude Bourque says that with CBC's budget cuts, the Charlottetown studio isn't a priority. Bonjour Atlantique, the morning show for P.E.I., is produced in SRC's Moncton studios... CHSJ Saint John has been given approval for a power increase from 10 kw day/5 kw night to 25 kw day/10 kw night. A previous bid for 50 kw day was denied; this time CHSI reduced signal

strength towards Fredericton and committed not to sell advertising in Nova Scotia... NewCap Broadcasting received \$925,000 when it sold CHRK-FM Kamloops to NL Broadcasting. NL agreed to increase news and local production... Border station CHXL-FM Brockville, ON, is taking advantage of CRTC guidelines for programming flexibility for small market stations. It has lost money in each of the past four years ... Okanagan Radio has applied for two FM rebroadcasters at Oliver, BC: the CJOR Osoyoos rebroadcaster would move from AM to 180w on 102.9, and a rebroadcaster of CJMG-FM Penticton would also be on FM, 180w on 99.9...

Janet Maskell, on behalf of a company to be incorporated, has applied for FM at Whitehorse, YT. The Group I rock & dance format and operate on 92.5 MHz with 1.388 kW ERP... Rogers' CKKS-FM Vancouver has applied for SCMO to carry programming in Chinese. It's reported that the applicants for CHQM Vancouver, 431881 B.C. Ltd., plan to program mostly in Chinese dialects. CHQM, one of three stations in the city owned by CHUM Ltd., is being divested as required by the CRTC... Diffusion Laurentides Inc. is now networking from 6pm to midnight daily, CJLM-FM Joliette picking up the programming of CIME-FM Ste-Adèle... Plans for rebroadcasters have been filed by CFRN-TV Edmonton (for Athabasca, AB, ch.13, 4 kW); and CKQR Castlegar (for Nelson, BC, 103.5, 84w)... CFMT-TV Toronto has acquired the Canadian broadcast rights to 1994 World Cup Soccer in languages other than English and French... Five CanWest Global co-productions were among the winners at the Houston WorldFest, the world's largest film and video festival, held earlier this year... BT

ATV has restructured its newsroom. Gone are regional assignment editor John Soosar and Charlottetown reporter Alex Vass. Seven were hired for a new noon newscast on ASN and extended weekend news on ATV... There's lots of computerization going on in the Maritimes. Call Jim MacLeod, president, if you want to find out how NewCap handled it.

In Montreal, Mount Royal Broadcasting's CIQC/CFQR-FM cut deeply in restructuring... West to Ontario, where CJOJ-FM Belleville is almost ready to go on-air. **Greg Southhorn** is sales manager and **Mike Christo** ops manager and PD. More, I can't tell you. Everything about CJOJ has been a well-kept secret... **Wolf Von Raesfeld** left CKOC/CKLH-FM Hamilton to become GM at CHYM-FM Kitchener... **Joe Snider**, former ND at CIDC-FM Orangeville, left to join CFTR Toronto; **Brian Hatchell** replaced him at CIDC...

Further west to Moose Jaw, where Vern Traill retired August 27 as GM of CHAB. The king of practical jokers began his career as a salesman at CHAB back on May 23/61. There should be a re-launch CKST Vancouver this fall with new partners. Other possible buyers/partners have been looking at CJCA/CIRK Edmonton and CKRC/CKLU-FM Winnipeg... Receivers restructered CFQC Saskatoon in preparation for the pending sale to Clint Forster. Among those gone: Dave Harrison, former PD and acting GM, and ND Ray Norris, who is seeking a nomination to run in the federal election...

Still is Saskatoon: **Barry Wiese** left the Western Academy Broadcast College to take over as ops manager at CHSN-FM, while **Don Scott** headed back fulltime to the Academy. Then Barry headed back to Vancouver "to go after another dream — the wonderful world of animation." **Matt Bradley** took over as ops manager and morning host...

In Edmonton, John Short has the evening sports airwaves to himself again on CFCW, after CFRN dropped its sportstalk show... CFRN also let morning man Wes Montgomery go; he's a well-known personality, having worked for a number of local stations... Pam Barrett, a former NDP member of the Alberta legislature, is doing double duty as host of daily talk shows on both CJCA Radio and CFRN-TV's On Line... New GM at WIC's CHED/Power 92 is Doug Rutherford. He was programming VP at CKNW New Westminster, one of Canada's most successful stations, and says the move was one of the toughest decisions of his career. He says the Edmonton staff made it easier when he had a chance to talk to them and understand just how talented and dedicated they are. That's a tribute to Stan Ravndahl, whom Dave succeeds. Winnipeg news: Westcom's CJOB/Classic Rock 97.5 FM got a new GSM with the promotion of **Garth Buchko** to that spot.

He's been in radio sales in Winnipeg for 11 years and was retail SM at CHUM's Q-94 FM/1290FOX before he moved to Westcom... CKJS has a new ND in Gordon Henley, replacing Ken Dalton: at CKY-TV, Jim Wicks is now ND, replacing Vivian Merkeley... In Grande Prairie, Gordon Sharp moved across the road to become ND at CJXX, succeeding Erin Brooks. Gord's replacement at CFGP is Marie Taylor-Read... New PD at CHEC Lethbridge is Marv Gunderson, formerly at CKRD Red Deer, who replaced Mike LeBlanc... Speaking of Red Deer, congratulations to CKGY, celebrating its 20th anniversary...

In the B.C. interior, CICF Vernon dropped its country format for AC, making more room for Walter Gray, president of CKIQ Kelowna, if he gets the country FM licence he's applying for...


The Alberta Country Music Awards were handed out August 29 in Calgary with a salute to emerging native artists. The show's executive producer is Edmund Oliverio, a former

promotions director at CKND Winnipeg. CHRB High River is Alberta country music station of the year, and the Heritage Award went to Paul Hanner, who retired in May as MD at CHRB. Before moving to CHRB 14 years ago, Paul worked for CHQR, CFCN and CHFM in Calgary. Vocalists of the year were Cindy Church and Greg Paul. Entertainer of the year is Dick Damron, and performer of the year, lan Tyson.

CanWest Global continues to expand: It hired Joanne McKenna from JLL Broadcast Group to manage new business development, i.e., specialty TV applications... And Jim Rusnak replaced Peter Viner Sept. 1st as president and GM of CanWest Pacific (UTV Vancouver). Jim was president of Baton's STN Saskatchewan, based at CFQC-TV Saskatoon. Peter, of course, has gone to Australia to look after CanWest's interests there... David Asper, son of Izzy, became GM of STV Regina when Fred Filthaut moved back to Alberta, Fred, who started his career 27 years ago in Lethbridge, moves from VP of STV to be GM of CFRN-TV Edmonton. Steve Hogle, son of Bruce, was made sports director to succeed Al McCann (who, Bruce says, was first hired from Lethbridge by Steve's grandfather, Bill Hogle - then CFRN's ND)... With people returning home later and going to bed earlier, a 6:00pm newscast no longer fits; Steve Harris, president and CEO, explains CHCH-TV Hamilton decided on 7:00pm because it doesn't cut into prime-time viewing habits. So this month, Tony Parsons of BCTV Vancouver and Donna Skelly of CHCH start co-anchoring Canada Tonight with input from Westcom's stations in Calgary, Edmonton, Lethbridge, Red Deer, Kelowna and Victoria. The big question: what will it do to the networks? CHCH is continuing its current newscasts, including the 5:30pm report. - please turn to page 39

MITV EXPANDS: Surprising no one, the CRTC gave approval for MITV to add rebroadcasters at Yarmouth, Shelburne, New Glasgow and Sydney, N.S., by fall. GM Ted Billo said the price tag on the four transmitter projects will be about \$1.5 million. The payback: up to 250,000 new viewers... Plans to improve coverage in N.B. and P.E.I., however, were turned down. MITV wanted to use the CHSJ-TV channel in Moncton, moving CBC service to new UHF channels. The Commission insists that there be no reduction in CBC-TV network coverage in N.B. (UPDATE: Applications are being filed for the CBC to buy CHSJ-TV and for CanWest Global to buy MITV. More on page 8.)

Correction: We recently erred in identifying MITV's Halifax studios as the former home of the defunct Star Channel. Fred Mattocks of CBC says "Star Channel was on Terminal Road. It became Studio East Productions, later East Coast Post. MITV is in facilities it built in Burnside. I spent a few hours with their architects and engineers, showing them how we sound-proofed studios." So alright, Fred, how do you sound-proof studios? (You could 'float' them — a cinch for Maritimers? — Ed.)

AAB awarded **Paul Schurman** its Broadcast Recognition Award. (For more about AAB, check pages 12, 14)... After 13 years, **John Soosar** was released by ATV's Halifax newsroom — part of a restructuring' plan, which will add seven new faces. Soosar was shocked and says there had been no indication of dissatisfaction with his work... **Janet Irwin** has left TV News to return to radio as a producer of *Maritime Noon* in Halifax. Her husband is CBHT cameraman **Darryl Gray**... Workshops featuring **Paula Danckert** were held at CBA Moncton recently. Among those involved: **David McClelland, Michael Leblanc** and **Linda McNutt**. McClelland is active in amateur theatre in nearby Sackville, N.B., not far from his Ft. Lawrence, NS home.

ISLAND PUNCH: CBCT Charlottetown sure gets its listeners' attention. After a recent newscast, a local lawyer strode into the studios and swung a punch at TV producer Geoff Hussey. THE PHIL STONE REPORT

An Interview with Bob Hesketh

The way I see Bob Hesketh, he is a man of the 'high C's: colorful, clever, comical, complete as a major award-winning broadcaster and journalist.

When Bob dropped by our condo to chat about his past, present and future, we talked about the fact that he is probably the only person to have received the highest honors from both print and broadcast: a National Newspaper Award, and appointment to the Canadian Association of Broadcasters' prestigious Hall of Fame.

The circumstances that lead us, when we are young, to seek out a career in a particular area vary from person to person. With Bob Hesketh there were diverse, interesting pathways — both accidental and happy instances. "It began", said Bob, "after the war. I was coming out of the Air Force. I had seen a movie with Clark Gable called *The Hucksters*. It was about the advertising business and the people in the film had rugs on their office floors and long lunch hours, and I thought it would be a great thing for me to get into the ad business. After I was discharged I found out by visiting practically every ad agency I could find that they didn't want me".

The Toronto Telegram Days: Bob then decided he'd like to work for a newspaper. "And I found out that there were very few newspapers that wanted me either. I wound up in the office of a small religious paper that couldn't afford to hire anybody. But the publisher had a contact at the Toronto Telegram and gave me a letter of introduction. That got me in to see the managing editor and I was taken on at the Tely for 15 bucks a week. I was told by the city editor that I should be grateful, because they were teaching me a profession."

In his school days, Bob had demonstrated a liking and talent for writing. "After all these years, I still like it," Bob said, adding, with a smile, "It's about the only thing I can do well". So it was a happy circumstance.

"I remember the first interview I had at the Telegram. I was asked 'Why do you want this job?' I figured I should be honest and said 'Because I need the money'. Then I was asked, 'Have you read Shakespeare?' And I answered, 'Only in school, sir'. And lastly I was asked, 'Can you type?' And I said, 'Yes.' And the interviewer said, 'You're hired!' I had taken typing at high school and that's what really got me into the newspaper business".

From covering City Hall, the Telegram moved Bob to the law courts at Osgoode Hall, "a deadly place to work". He asked Sports Editor Bobby Hewitson for a post in his department and was accepted. "Ted Reeve was a major figure there. He was from the Toronto Beaches area. Ted told Bobby that he hadn't heard of me, 'but if he comes from the Beaches he must have gone to Malvern Collegiate, so hire him.' And that was another happy thing. Ted Reeve was quite an influence on my life and career, and he became a great buddy of mine."

Writers enjoy the craft to reveal things, to be colorful, to coin phrases. What did Bob enjoy? "I enjoyed the reaction. I'm convinced that to be in this media business, journalism or broadcasting, you have to have an ego. If you have an ego you like to have it massaged, and I found that I could write

well enough that most of the reaction I got was fairly complimentary. That was big with me. I really liked the recognition that came with having my own column. It was a great way to make a living".

Bob hadn't yet developed aspirations to get into radio. He was later 'a great television buff'. But he does remember in the early '50s listening to newscasters Jim Hunter on CFRB and Walter Bowles on CBC.

Eventually he said he heard "that radio sportscasters were making a lot of money and seemed to have a pretty good life. So I went to CBC, thinking I might get into the news department. The news director gave me some Canadian Press wire copy and told me to go home and 'Write it the way you think it would be written for radio.' So I really sweated over it all weekend on my old Remington before taking it back on Monday morning. The news director glanced at my copy and told me I should give up my idea of getting into radio." Bob stayed at the Telegram for several more years.

Pinch-Hitting for Gordon Sinclair: Eventually he did enter radio via CFRB. "Trent (Bill) Frayne, who was a close buddy of mine at the Tely, had gone to be public relations director at the Ontario Jockey Club. At that time, Gordon Sinclair was taking a lot of time off from his CFRB broadcasts and was threatening to quit every two weeks".

CFRB was looking for someone to replace Gordon while he took July off. "They wanted Frayne to do 11:50am and I was to do 5:50pm. But Frayne decided he wouldn't have the time, so I wound up doing both newscasts each day in July of that year, 1958. Then Wes McKnight, who was the manager, asked me if I would do a 5:00pm feature newscast. So for a while, after leaving the Telegram, I was working for an ad agency and doing the CFRB news at 5:00pm. The agency boss didn't think much of that arrangement. So I went to Wes and told him I'd like to come to the station. Wes said, 'Okay, how would \$7500 a year be?' I said, 'Fantastic!' And that's how I started a full-time career in radio in 1959."

Bob said that back then CFRB had a pretty loose news department. They were located at 37 Bloor Street West and had only four or five people in news, with Bill Hutton as news director. "That loose atmosphere remained for years. You gathered your own material from wherever you got it and you wrote it yourself and nobody edited it. You went on the air with it and they trusted you not to get sued for slander. Just to use common sense and not to go overboard with your copy. You were your own writer, your own editor. Most of the guys were sensible enough not to get us into trouble.

"On our staff was Jack Dennett who had a big following. As news became more of a major factor, the staff increased to 17 people. News became big business and for the station was a most marketable thing. Radio at that time was still the main communicator for the audience, which then was becoming more conscious of the total world."

Bob described television as a medium that "gave you news when it wanted you to have it." Radio gave you news every hour, if not on the half-hour. For people who wanted to be informed, radio was the way to do it".

In earlier years, many newspaper people didn't have that high a regard for the broadcast medium. "That's true", Bob said. "There was still a feeling that radio guys scalped the newspapers. I'll never forget one time when Sinclair was guest speaker at a National Newspaper Awards dinner. He told the audience, mainly newspaper types, 'If it wasn't for you people, us radio people wouldn't have anything to talk about!'. I got pretty upset about that because he implied that he was speaking on behalf of everybody in the radio business. Certainly we leaned heavily on the newspapers because in those days; radio just didn't have the resources to open news bureaus and get stringers working for us. But we got our news from other places, and even moreso today, of course, radio is self-sufficient."

Was radio a learning process for Bob Hesketh? "Well, I'll tell you. I was hired originally to the most outstanding, renowned, famous, notorious broadcaster in Canadian news, Gordon Sinclair. Did I want to emulate this man or did I want to be myself? I decided I couldn't be Sinclair and I didn't want to be. So I fashioned my own style of newscasting.

"It took about 15 years in radio to realize that I could be something other than that guy who replaces Gord Sinclair. It took a long time to learn".

In analyzing his on-air image, developed through his nationally syndicated *The Way I See It* series, Bob said that he never thought of himself as being too heavy-handed. I don't really look for the deep, dark motives of why things happen, of why

people do things. I kind of like to think you only pass this way once and trouble will come your way without you going out to look for it. So The Way I See It is, I think, a light approach to what happens around us. I feel that because I think I can identify with a lot of people these things happen to. For instance, earlier on in that series, I got into a discussion about vending machines and I got great reaction from people who were having similar problems with them, getting them to work for them. I feel that sometimes, too, laughing at something can be more constructive than getting on a soap-box. In other words, 'Let's not get too serious, folks'."

Bob recalled that The Way I See It started over 25 years ago. "I had been out of the Telegram and I got a 'phone call from the publisher, John Bassett, who wanted me to go back as Sports Editor and promised me three columns a week, unlimited travel and other perks. I really didn't want to take it so I went to see Thornton Cran who was the president of CFRB. I told him about the Tely's offer and that I preferred to stay in radio. He sent me to see Jack Dawson, who was general manager, with the idea of writing a feature for them, lack liked what I had written and asked for a five a week and then I was

taken over by Lyman Potts who was then in charge of Standard Broadcasting Productions and he arranged for the syndication of my feature. At one time we had over 40 stations. It was once described as the longest-running most-successful syndicated series in Canadian private broadcasting. That was up until that time".






