News from Advertising Avenue About Radio and Television . . . Accounts, Stations and People

A THOUSAND DOLLAR annual award for original contributions in the field of advertising research has been announced by the Canadian Advertising Research Foundation, which will administer the award for its donors, MacLaren Advertising Co.Ltd. The first MacLaren Advertising Research Award will be presented in 1964, and entries must be made by March 31 for consideration by a panel of judges.

DOWN THE LINE CHANGES have been made in the media department at McConnell, Eastman & Co. Ltd. A WILD AND UNCO-ORDINATED TREND

IT WAS ONCE SAID: "Inanity leads to anonymity". On November 7, the Canadian Broadcaster carried on article by "a former employee of the SABC" dealing with an alleged "seizure" of the South African Broadcasting Corporation by the South African Government. Accusing the government of transforming the SABC "into an out-and-out propaganda machine for itself", the writer "insisted on anonymity because of relatives in the Republic."

This cloak and dagger atmosphere eventually lifted when the writer admitted on occasions that there are still those who openly criticise the government without being in fear for their own safety of their relatives. The wild and uncoordinated trend of the first few accusations, however, remains throughout.

In one paragraph for instance, it is stated that "much time is de-

voted to emotion ally charged ideological programming, particularly on the Afrikaans transmission, where talks on subjects such as 'Land of our Fathers', 'Historical Moments' (recapping British outrages in the Anglo-Boer War) and 'Friends of South Africa' are popular."

It might also have been added that these historical programmes including, for example items on the "1820 British Settlers" - are popular on the English transmission as well. And then the question arises: Is it really so exceptional for the South African Broadcasting Corporation to have a distinct South African character? Or does "impartial" and "autonomous" in juxtaposition to "corporation" imply that it should have no character at all.



Editorial

Our Tribute at Christmas

This year, our tribute at Christmas to the industry we serve has an ironic tone in that broadcasting's contribution of the year -- of its whole existence in fact -- took place from Friday November 20, when United States President John Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas, Texas: through the fatal shooting of the alleged assassin, Lee Oswald; up to and including the funeral, November 25.

It took no act of parliament or congress, no ordinance of the BBC or FCC. Radio and television simply faced the emergency, even while it was occurring, as a matter of course, and turned themselves over to the common good as completely as they would have under some form of government expropriation.

It must have cost literally millions of dollars in pre-produced programs and even more in lost revenues from advertisers. There was no warning of the disaster which lay ahead, no time for instruction in the methods of meeting this unprecedented catastrophe. Broadcasters from the greatest of the networks to the smallest individual stations simply moved in on instinct, and dealt with the situations, as they arose, to the best of their individual abilities.

First came the story of the incredible deed, which was on the air and out to the remotest corners of the whole continent even before they had reached the hospital with the assassin's

People everywhere were waiting everywhere while the doctors performed their examinations and operations, and word of the president's death must have reached the world outside, at least as soon as it reached those who were waiting in breathless anxiety outside the hospital.

When the man charged with the assassination was being led from the Dallas police station and met death from a second assassin's bullet, viewers everywhere actually saw it happen on their screens.

They were right there when the Dallas district attorney told a meeting of reporters of the evidence his men had gathered against Oswald. It was not a news report they heard. They were actually attending the meeting along with the reporters.

They might have been lining the street beside the people of Washington, as they watched the solemn cortege wind slowly and sadly to the Capitol.

They were right there when great Americans delivered their eulogies over the remains of the man who, whatever their political views, had earned their respect.

They were silent witnesses as Mrs. Kennedy said her last adieus.

Finally they attended the funeral on Monday, just as though they had actually been present themselves.


It was perhaps fitting that broadcasting, which had been used so widely and so wisely by President Kennedy in his continuous efforts to bring understanding to the various divisions of his own country and the whole world, should have been the chief of the mourners on the occasion of his cruel and untimely end.

Broadcasters, along with the whole decent world, are mourning the passing of this great man, who gave so much and had so much more to give.

Consolation, if consolation is possible, lies in the fact that our industry suddenly found itself confronted with a responsibility, unprecedented, unheard of; it recognized this responsibility, and, literally without a second's delay, moved in to take the public right to the tragedy-spontaneously and effectively.

This is our tribute at Christmas to the industry we serve, and in which, in our own small way, we are supremely proud to play a humble part.

A BIG TURNOUT FOR RADIO'S FIRST COMMERCIALS FESTIVAL

THE UNIQUE POWER of the sound of the human voice, the emotional impact of the sound of music, the force of the sound of authentic sounds, adding up to the creative use of radio, were demonstrated again and again during the afternoon-long creative clinic at the Radio Commercials Festival in Toronto last month. Tape recorders spun throughout the sessions at this first annual Festival de commerciaux radiophoniques, co-sponsored by the Radio and Television Executives Club and the Radio Sales Bureau, as speakers used sound on tape to sell the concept of selling through sound.

The "art" of electronic sound and music was demonstrated for the near-capacity audience of some 250 by Charles Barclay, vice-president and sales manager of the Jingle Workshop, Long Island, which is headed by composer-conductor-musician Raymond Scott.

Via tape, Barclay presented the two faces of electronic sound and music, electronic sounds that are unlike any others produced by man or nature, and electronic music that simulates the sound of conventional musical instruments. Via colored slides, he introduced the electronic music machine, a complex right out out of the space age, and explained its operation.

"The potential is almost limitless, there are infinite possibilities, Barclay said, as he played the first with electronic music (for Vicks Medicated Cough Drops) and then went on to the sound of dirt in your carburetor, the sound of "taste" and "fee!"

Electronic music's first contribution to commercials is as punctuation, accents, mood sounds, or background, Barclay said, and it will

give new freshness to established jingles by introducing a new sound to the basic music. But from there anywhere.

UNCOMMERCIAL COMMERCIALS

An exercise in verbal imagination opened a talk on "Reaching the Unlistening Listener" by Ken Nordine, president of K-Arts, Chicago, and creator of such award-winning radio commercials as the Fuller Paint "stare with your ears" series and the "think with your tongue" commercials for Salada Food's Lushus jelly desserts

Looking at the alphabet in his inimitably, fresh, far-out and off-beat fashion, Nordine saw "A, a twostorey tent; E, a broken rake, F, a broken E; M, a V holding on with both hands; P, a leaking D; T, an extremely-mixed up, schizoid L" and, going on to numbers, delighted the audience with such gems as "5, a lighthouse looking out to sea from a big round rock; 15, more honest than

Described by Hank Karpus, vicepresident and director of client services of Ronalds-Reynolds & Company, as "the Carl Sandburg of advertising" and by himself as a "frustrated poet", Nordine played a series of his own commercials, from nine years ago, seven years ago and most recently, and included three which he said had "bombed out".

Along with the well-known Fuller Paint and Lushus commercials, Nordine included his "uncommercial commercial from Salada" currently running on CHUM-FM Toronto, which demonstrates his successful free association or stream of consciousness technique. The commercial is based on the premise that people buy, in this case, tea, not just because of 5¢ off or more product, but for the

emotional atmosphere, the enjoyment of using the product, the associations it has

SOUND CREATES PICTURES

"Sound plays on the stage of the theatre of the human mind," said Gene Seehafer, account executive with the Columbia Broadcasting System in New York, in his talk on "Enhancing Commercials with Sound, Voices, Music".

To graphically illustrate the emotional impact of sound, Seehafer had the lights dimmed in the Empress Room of the Park Plaza and left each member of the audience to conjure up his own scenes for

sounds that cut through our con-sciousness like a knife", an auto crash, a baby's cry, a car horn, and the more pleasant sounds of a train whistle, the croaking of frogs.

To demonstrate the power of the human voice to rouse men to action, he presented excerpts from speeches by Roosevelt, Hitler and Churchill, and the announcement of the end of World War II by a newscaster. laughed, and we thought of Johnson's Wax," he said, at the sound of the clatter from Fibber McGee's closet. "Other sounds almost made us cry," he went on, with a brief segment of Arthur Godfrey's commentary on the funeral of FDR.



To illustrate the irritation voices can arouse, Seehafer played a commercial.

"Music can build four-color, personalized visions in our minds," he said, stirring reverence with a hymn, patriotism with an anthem, enthusiasm and spirit with a college song, sadness and melancholy with the Last Post, and capturing the electronic age with music by a computer.

Describing jingles as "the most potent advertising method known to man", Seehafer recalled on tape the musical commercial from the days of Harry Horlick's A & P gypsies, through the memorable Barbasol jingle and the first Pepsi-Cola hits the spot, commenting that many radio success stories were directly attributed to a jingle.

Other media are finite because they give the audience a picture, but radio is infinite because the listener is personally involved to create his own picture, Seehafer said.

He wound up with five fundamentals for radio commercials:

- (1) Use words of salesmanship, well-chosen, simple, effective, to spark the imigination;
- (2) build the commercial around a keynote idea;
- (3) enhance it, when appropriate, with music, sound, personal salesmanship voices, and learn to write directly into sound;
 - (4) be distinctive:
 - (5) be believable.

RADIO CREATIVITY PANEL

"Is as much creative attention given to radio as should be?" chairman Ross MacRae, director of broadcast services of Cockfield, Brown & Co. Ltd. asked a panel made up of John Straiton, vice-president and creative director of Ogilvy, Benson & Mather (Canada) Ltd.; William Straiton, creative director of Foster Advertising Ltd.; John Töbin, product advertising manager of Kraft Foods Ltd., Montreal; and Scott Feggans, vice-president, advertising and public relations, Dominion Stores Ltd.

"No," chorused the panel.
"Radio has always been given lousy treatment," said John Straiton, adding "measurement men did it."

"I remember in radio," said Bill Straiton, "the account man would come to the station with the commercial all written out and say 'this is how it's to be done because the client, the client, the client...".

Nobody ever said because the public, the listener, the audience ... *

"Before TV, radio had a captive audience," Tobin said, but now it/ hasn't. "Creativity in commercials hasn't adjusted to this."

"The most creative attention given to 'mainly because of the meat' was the decision to use the medium," said Feggans. "Not enough creative attention is given to radio, it's a matter of mathematics. The average level is bound to be low but at the top level there is better commercial work emerging."

What Is The Answer To Improving The Situation?

"Pay more attention to it," suggested John Straiton. Agencies direct their attention to where the revenue is coming from, and the fee system would give all media equal attention, he said. "Remember radio is an intimate medium," said Bill Straiton, where the copy should read "sweetheart", not "ladies".

"The answer is in the commercials presented by Ken Nordine," said Tobin, citing them as different, something to attract the listener.

"De-emphasize creativity," said Feggans, noting that sales is the aim of the commercial, not creativity, and that commercials should concentrate on USP, the unique selling proposition.

Is there too much use of jingles in radio today?

"If they're well done, they capture the audience," said Tobin.
"Yes," said the brothers Straiton.
"Jingles are being used to replace ideas, and used incorrectly," said Bill. "Good salesmen don't sing.
Ninety out of every 100 jingles shouldn't be on the air," said John.
"The good ones are enhanced by the bad ones," Feggans commented.

The final question, "Are advertisers and agencies using frequency to make up for a lack of creativity?" brought a mixed bag of opinions from the panel.

John Tobin agreed that frequency is more important.

Bill Straiton pointed out that the people who decide on the frequency are not the same people who control the creativity.

John Straiton said if a commercial has something to say and says it well it can be used with less frequency.

Scott Feggans said sometimes the reverse is true and the commercial with something to say and well said should be used more frequently.

ADVERTISING EFFECTS THE STOCKHOLDER

by BEN HOLDSWORTH

"ADVERTISING IS THE element which triggers all the factors combining to create our economy of abundance...which helps produce the only kind of rising economy that can possibly sustain the all-out effort we have to make in today's world conditions," said Charles G. Mortimer, chairman of General Foods Corporation, to the security analysts.

Last year, General Foods in its world-wide operation, spent some \$120-plus million in consumer promotion of its 250 product items (under many more than 30 brand names—including country-by-country variations).

Last year, General Foods, Limited, in Canada spent nearly \$3.5 million on media advertising, of which (says the TvB) three-quarters of a million dollars was in television and (according to industry sources) another \$100,000-plus on radio: over \$1 million in broadcast media including production.

Estimates from industry sources for 1963 show increased use of total advertising, with at least as much emphasis on broadcast media.

other countries; it is among the magic billion-dollar corporations in net sales in the world.

Why do we remind you of these facts?

General Foods is one of the corporations which worries about its shareholders—and feels that GF advertising has a definite effect on the shareholder, as well as on the consumer, the trade and the other groups with which a prime manufacturer deals. In this, incidentally, General Foods does not forget the suppliers, nor the rest of the various industries in which the company has a solid interest.

How does this work, at practical level, for the advertising people?

IN TUNE WITH THE AIMS

"One thing we can be sure of," said an agency man on the GF account, "is that we must be aware of the consumer--that's still number one--but everything we suggest and do must also be in tune with the GF aims at large. These include the broadening of the market for any particular type of product, especially the the new lines--and God knows they come along fast enough!

"We must also always think of the trade effects, the national good and welfare--and certainly the financial community, including not only the direct shareholders, but the analysts, the economists, the bankers, and the governments everywhere ..." he said.

A GF product man offered the view that his company is leading the way for Big Industry in its relations with the financial community:

"Everything we do is pioneering in some way or other...." he stated. "We don't move into a new area unless every kind of research has been applied, and in most cases we lead, we don't follow. But we keep in mind, as a marketing organization, which is what we are, really, that we must not only keep the consumer and the channels of distribution in mind... we've got to think of the present and future shareholders. We're constantly expanding, you know...."

How does this work? Do the advertising people—both agency and GF, as well, perhaps as suppliers-keep a check list of all requirement in copy, in display, in commercial implication, in visuals, to work against, so that the shareholders, the financial analysts, the banks and other investors are also "sold on the GF concept"?

The answer is really very simple, since all GF management personnel, and all key supply personnel, including agency persons, are imbued with the Corporation aims and objectives. It is, evidently, not simply a matter of having checks and double-checks on copy, trade implications of media choice, financial aspects of newproduct launching, or whatever the work-a-day problems which may be at hand.

"...magnitude of the job of identification"

Charles G. Mortimer, present chairman, came up to his present management position through marketing and advertising. Indeed, top management at General Foods has been one of the great examples in the past decades of the advances of marketing and advertising-oriented executives to the top positions. Included among the corporation vicepresidents, for example, is Ellen-Ann Dunham, director of the General Dunham, director Foods Kitchens. (And, incidentally, there is a woman-member of the head office board of directors, Margaret Clapp, President of Wellesley College and Pulitzer Prize Winner).

Many other examples of marketing-to-top-management route have been noted over the years, both at home office and in Canada.

As a matter of interest, GF has paid dividends every quarter since its incorporation in 1922. Today there are about 75,000 shareholders of record, representing over 25,000, 000 shares

Advertisers and broadcasters have always had a strong interest in the activities of General Foods. It is, currently, the only member of the "Top Ten" advertisers in Canada from the food industry. The next in line, Standard Brands and Salada Foods, have not recently been in the "Big Time", according to media re-cords—which can be misleading, since other expenditures on total promotion, such as direct mail, display, production and other items are not easily measured-but the point remains that GF is one of the big ones.

More than this, General Foods have always had a strong interest in the expansion of the many markets in which they have exploded: New products, new countries, new techniques of production and mass-market-This has required a massive attack on the investment community for a fairly constant flow of investment capital.

From 1954 to 1963, for example, working capital increased from \$182 million to \$249 million; assets, in the same period increased from \$261 million to \$411 million.

Sales, in the same period, advanced from \$843 million to \$1,316 million. Fixed assets, land and buildings included, as well as capital equipment, at a gross value during the same period, went from \$141 mil-lion to \$375 million.

Today, with 28,000 employees in all countries, thousands of suppliers, and thousands of stockholders, General Foods must keep a sharp eye on the investor--as well as on its million of retailers, and multi-millions of consumers: This, says a GF spokesman, is the "terrible fact of life ...

IMPORTANCE OF ADVERTISING

Is advertising important? Is the corporate identification underlined?

"Each GF product is promoted individually, but all are also being brought under the corporate umbrella of a new trademark... To provide a strong visual identification with General Foods, the trademark is being (introduced) on packages, in all forms of advertising ...

"We aim to build, and continue to build, General Foods Franchises ... with the consumer -- still Number One -and with the other communities we must deal with and convince, including the financial, the investment and supplier communities. It's all part of keeping our position -- and our dollars spent in advertising must be weighed carefully for all of these, said a Corporation spokesman.

ACCENT ON GF LABEL

How does all this actually work for General Foods? The introduction of the new trademark is under way, has not affected all product packages in Canada as yet--but, we are told, it will. All TV messages, whether spot or integrated, will eventually have the GF ident.

When you consider the tremendous range of the Corporation's product interest, you have to be impressed with the magnitude of the job of identification alone: Cereals, coffees, baking ingredients, frozen foods, pet foods, household products (such as S.O.S. and LaFrance), Certo, a full dessert line of Jell-O and D-Zerta, Kool-Aid, sweetening products, and also all of the institutional products. How do you mix Baker's chocolate with Minute Rice? Or Yuban Coffee with Gaines-Burg-

So, evidently the answer in the corporation wisdom is the GF label on all messages, on all products.

It is, in the words of one observer, the most complex problem in marketing-with the simplest answer. One label, but not one brand name! After all, GF was and is an amalgamation of firms and brand nameswhy hide IT?

Why don't other long-line, multibrand people do the same? Why don't P & G, Colgate, Standard Brands, Imperial Tobacco, and many other multi-brand producer and mar-keters do as GF?

On the other hand, why didn't GF start sooner?

It seems, the real impetus came from the Investment Community! Analysts with whom we have talked (in New York) have said that they could more readily sell the General Foods proposal to investors, provided the Corporation identity--its image, marketers might say--were more readily defined."

Mr. Henry Ford II, incidentally, has been elected to the GF board in the past couple of years, too. He has a reputation in marketing, we

MAJOR IN ADVERTISING

"THE GOLDEN AGE of Radio Commercials" was the topic of the address by Edmund C. Bunker, president of the Radio Advertising Bureau lnc., to the awards dinner at the Radio Commercials Festival last month, and "unlike the golden age of Greece, or the golden age of motion picture comedy ... the golden age of

radio commercials is with us today," he said.

Radio commercials are a minor art form and a major advertising form, Bunker said, and radio today is producing better commercials than TV. One of the reasons TV commercials aren't as effective as those on radio,

he said, is because TV commercials have abandoned broadcasting techniques and are animated or moving magazine ads.

"TV commercials are tested pre-tested, pre-screened, researched, until, in almost every case every ounce of creativity and novelty is squeezed out of them. Because of the tremendous expense ... TV spots can't afford to be bad. This sort of caution breeds imitation ... until a dozen companies are represented by the same approach. The consumer is confused, the identities of the products become merged and submerged.



"On the other hand," Bunker said, "TV commercials, to a much rarer degree, suffer from too much originality. You sit there and think, 'what a great commercial', If I ever find out what they're selling, by golly, I'll buy some."

The low creativity factor is TV's soft underbelly, and radio should centre its attack there to increase its share of the broadcast dollar, he said.

One of radio's big advantages is its relative low cost and, with it, the ease and speed with which the occasional clinker of a radio commercial can be replaced, Bunker pointed out.

Apologizing for the obviousness of the statement, he said that radio is the only medium that deals solely with sound, with no interference from the printed word and the pretty picture, and "nothing can move people so marvellously as the urgent, inspired sound of the human voice. For many advertisers, nothing can sell so well as a radio personality gently kidding the sponsor's product, or broadcasting direct from his selling floor."

Commercial creativity by itself is useless, Bunker reminded his large audience, unless the commercial reaches people who have the means and inclination to buy the advertised product. The Radio Advertising Bureau has proved that the radio commercial does reach these people, he said, and one of the advertisers it proved this to is Eastman Kodak.

Revealing the Kodak case history for the first time, Bunker said Kodak already controlled about 75% of the available market for cameras and film. RAB's presentation to the client made two points: advertising should attempt to increase the use of film among present users rather than try to gain a larger share of the present market; radio is ideally suited because transistors and car radios take the commercials outdoors, where people take most pictures, and summer is the biggest season both for radio's audience and Kodak's tilm sales.

Eastman Kodak went on the air for eight weeks in three markets in the summer of 1962. Film sales went up dramatically in these markets and awareness of the Kodak name among consumers also climbed considerably. In the summer of '63, the company went on the air with heavy schedules in 22 markets.

"Kodak, which never used radio before, is now solidly in the radio fold," Bunker reported -- and this is an advertiser with a completely visual product, selling with sound.

BBM Will Expand Service

THE ADDITION OF thirty new members in the Bureau of Broadcast Measurement, a new all-time high of 390, has led to a decision by the directors to expand the services provided by the bureau, without extra cost to the station members.

At a recent press meeting, Jack F. Glasier and Dr. Bill Byram, respectively president and executive vice-president of BBM, said the steps are being taken on the basis of "considerable evaluation and research, under the able direction of Professor Dale, appointed by the Tri-partite Planning Committee of ACA, CAAA and CAB."

The following are the six changes which are being instituted immediately

(1) The contract of KCS Limited, the data processing company, expired this fall, and BBM has signed a con-tract with IBM for the complete tabulation of BBM data. This will give BBM the benefit of one of the most advanced and largest computers in Canada. Present efficient operation and economies resulting from the IBM contract will make possible the extended BBM service.

(2) Instead of two reports a year, BBM will now provide four for over 30 markets, including nearly 100 radio and 50 TV stations. The remaining markets will get the basic two reports a year.

(3) All station reports will have audience composition figures showing tuning by men, women, teenagers and children.

(4) The two basic reports will be conducted for four weeks, instead of the present one week, "thus reducing some of the alleged distortions created by promotional 'hypos' during survey week."

(5) In order to make BBM as comprehensive as possible, members

will receive, in addition to the above four reports a year, coincidental telephone services, in addition to the BBM diary technique, in some 15 major markets where there are several stations and probably two TV networks in competition.

Toronto, Montreal (English and French), Vancouver and Winnipeg will get as many as six additional reports a year (making a total of ten reports diary and coincidental).

Smaller markets will get approxi-

mately three telephone reports as well as the four diary reports.

Elliott-Haynes Ltd, with a record of 23 years providing continuous coincidental telephone ratings has signed a contract with BBM for the field survey work connected with the coincidental telephone service. They will discontinue publishing their regular ratings at the end of this year.

(6) It is anticipated that the cost of these additional services for 1964 can be met from the BBM budget without membership fee increase. The coincidental telephone surveys will be offered on an optional basis to non-member advertisers and agencies, many of whom are already buying them direct from Elliott-Haynes.

CONSUMPTION

From an address by FRANK BUCKLEY, president, W. K. Buckley Ltd.

THE DETRACTORS OF ADVERTIS-ING, a very vocal minority, see no benefits and regard it as an evil force with no place in society. However studies show that, for the most part, the public is indifferent.

A study conducted by the American Association of Advertising Agencies on the consumer judgment of advertising reached the following

"By any measure, advertising is not prominent among the institutions which preoccupy people -- either favorably or unfavorably."

80 per cent of the answers found advertising not noteworthy. (Quite an indictment!) The remaining 20 per cent found it either good or bad.

Why is there more discussion or criticism of the merits of advertising directed towards advertising in the broadcast media than in other media?

- (1) The intimate nature of radio and television.
- (2) The large amount of time spent with these media.
- (3) Unfavorable comment in other

If the attitude of the Canadian public is the same as or similar to that of the American viewer and listener, what benefits can be claimed for advertising?

There are benefits, some measurable, many intangible.

The economic benefits are wellknown. Creation of demand increases sales, which results in increased production. This lowers costs and consumers benefit. It increases their purchasing power.

This principle is generally accepted, but is it necessarily true?

Let us take the automotive industry for example.

In 1962, the cost of advertising on a leading make in the States was \$17.00 approximately per car in measured media. To this add estimates of other advertising costs including spot radio which is not measured — and the total is approximately \$25 per car.

On 2,000,000 sales, the total advertising expenditure is in the neighborhood of \$50,000,000.

What would happen if this expenditure was eliminated?

If it lowered the cost of the car \$25, nobody by \$25, nobody would notice. People don't haggle over \$25 on the price of a car. Maybe \$100 but not \$25. But without advertising, demand would decrease, production would sag and the cost to the consumer would go up considerably.

CONSUMPTION ORIENTATION

Advertising helps to create a consumption-oriented economy.

To a large extent, the development of this nation has paralleled the development of our national resources. The main concern has been production of minerals, forests and agriculture.

With production of material at its present high point, we must become a consumption-oriented economy, to use up the material we produce. Yet management still seems to be production-oriented.

The increase in our consumption capacity must be accompanied by an increase in consumption. Advertising is the main factor in stimulating the consumption process.

Because, in essence, advertising is the process of "making known" it provides information to those entering the market place, such as immi-

It reminds old users who might be lured away by competitors.

It provides information on new products which may meet old needs and wants. It may also create new ones.


By this dissemination of information, advertising helps make people conscious of the benefits of goods and services. The hopeful result is a stimulation of consumption.

A supplementary benefit is that advertising enables the consumer to have the knowledge necessary to exercise freedom of choice. (The relationship of advertising to this is not measurable.)

MEDIA BENEFITS

We have considered benefits to the consumer and also to the adver-What about benefits to the media, benefits that may accrue from advertising revenues?

Most of the complaints we hear against the media are because of

advertising. Let me present the following hypothesis:

We could not sustain our communication media in a free society without advertising.

There may be broadcasters and other media people who feel the only benefit of advertising is that it provides the source of revenue for their operation.

Even if this is so, is it such a bad thing?

In our society, could you maintain your operation without advertising?

Without advertising, could our newspapers and magazines survive?

Possibly, but the cost per copy might become prohibitive. This cost would tend to reduce circulation and so restrict communication.

Without advertising, the only way for broadcasting to survive, would be for it to be subsidized by the state or by individuals. This would take the form of government systems or Pay-TV, or something similar to an electric or water meter.

How long could the industry survive under such conditions?

If we believe the means of mass communication should be a system encompassing the free communication of ideas, we must consider how this can be accomplished.

One of the ways of supporting this is by revenues derived from advertising.

However, proponents of state control of media say dangers lie, in advertiser control.

This is a serious challenge.
Broadcasters and publishers
must take positive stands to prevent
advertiser influence. They must not
abdicate their responsibility.

FREEDOM IN A FREE SOCIETY

If a free society does not like or agree with what it is offered to see, hear or read, then it can exercise freedom of choice to accept or reject the means of communication.

In the case of broadcasting, it can switch stations. With publications, it can cancel its subscriptions. The choice must rest with the individual.

If this has established that "we could not sustain our communication media in a free society without advertising", I think we have an obligation to supplie the further.

tion to explore further.

We have examined, briefly, some of the benefits of advertising. Should we just leave it at that or should we do something to further these thoughts?

Are the benefits of advertising moral, immoral or amoral?

If you are not convinced that the benefits of advertising contribute to the common good of society, get out!

For too long we have been burying our heads in the sand...afraid to stand up and be counted.

Let's not neglect the moral issues involved. Let's make sure the benefits of advertising are benefits for all.

Mr. Jamieson said the country suffers from a "crisis in communica-tions- probably not totally of our own making."

Although the flow of news through the country is "immense," he felt patterns of broadcast programming and types of news should be re-examined so that systems of communicating news and information might apply new ideas.

Mr. Ouimet felt that in a situation "charged with passion, prejudice and emotion" sensationalism became a "criminal act." Canada had at its disposal the most efficient system of communication ever devised but they must disseminate "the truth, the

Mr. Laurendeau, editor-in-chief of Montreal's Le Devoir, said that while he is a career newspaper man, he wondered whether extreme points of view hear by the Royal Commission in different parts of the country

whole truth and no more than the truth.

"There are not two kinds of truth, one for French-Canadians and another for English-Canadians," he

The discussion at the 10th annual meeting of l'Association canadienne de la radio et de la télévision de language française was conducted in both languages with a system of simultaneous translation for members knowing only one language.

The translation device was provided, as a courtesy, by Broadcast

Henri Audet of Trois Rivières, ACRTF president, expressed pleasure that the discussion occurred at the French-language broadcasters meet-

SPEED AND DEPTH

Mr. Laurendeau, speaking in French, said the problem facing the commission was that it has to work quickly but in depth as well. He felt its job would take two years.

He said the terms of reference of the commission indicate that there is no equal partnership in Canada between the English and French-language groups but that it is possible to achieve this.

The question was how to bring it about since "zones of unilingua-lism" exist in the country and probably will remain. Since the two language groups are of different sizes, another question was how equality between them could be brought about under a system of parliamentary democracy.

He felt it was essential that all Canadians start thinking about the idea and that the commission, by holding sessions across the country, will give all Canadians a chance to study the "immense and diverse question."

REWRITE THE CONSTITUTION

Philippe Vaillancourt of Montreal, educational director of the Canadian Labor Congress, thought the commission would have to reach the conclusion that the Canadian consti-



tution must be modified or rewritten entirely.

He said that until recent years French-language delegates to Canadian labor meetings had to speak English. No objection was expressed when they started to use French.

Mr. Vail/uncourt added that in the field of labor negotiations, French-language groups once had to conduct negotiations with employers in English and sign English contracts.

When contracts were drawn up in both languages, they carried the notation that the English version was the official one. Nowadays, said Mr. Vaillancourt, when negotiations are conducted in French, contracts are drawn up in French.

Léon Lalande, representing the Montreal bar, said that while problems such as stenographic records present difficulties, either French or English may be used in any federal court in the country since both languages are official. Federal laws are drawn up in both languages and either version may be used for interpretation.

In Quebec courts, he said, it was common for exchanges between lawyers and judges to be conducted in both languages.

ASSURANCE FOR ETHNICS

Michael Oliver, McGill university professor, said that while the Royal Commission's terms of reference were concerned with equality of partnership between English and French, the commission would discover new Canadians formed a third group. The commission would have to reassure this third group that its position of Canadian citizenship would not be diminished.

Prof. Oliver said Quebec was the first area in the British Empire to grant full rights to Jews and he thought the province's experience in accommodating people of different cultures and languages will prove valuable.

Léon Dion of Laval University said "bilingualism" is a concrete term and a subject for accurate study but "biculturalism" is a term invented by a journalist.

He said the various groups among Canadians have opinions and prejudices and any study would have to produce a balance sheet—to find out what can be done, what the population will accept, what has to be changed or improved or revised, and to what extent outlooks can be changed.

UNITY IS THE ESSENCE

Isidore Pollack, Quebec businessman, said Canada faces a problem of survival as a nation.

He felt that people seeking to dismember Canada want to be "big frogs in little ponds".

"Unless the aim of Canadian unity in a progressive country is achieved we will wind up a Balkanized country," said Mr. Pollack who spoke in French.

CAB president Jamieson suggested Caundians are a "little ushamed to display patriotism."

"We haven't done enough to put a bit of emotion in our patriotism. What we need is a heart in our constitution."

Mr. Jamieson said broadcasters may have concentrated on Canadian content in their programs rather than what he called "Canadian character."

Dr. Andrew Stewart, chairman of

the Board of Broadcast governors, said there is no reference in the Canadian broadcasting act to language or culture.


He said the BBG in its decision had to sense what is in the public mind. Not much had been done in the past to promote bilingualism or biculturalism.

He said the BBG could pass a regulation requiring, for example, that every broadcasting station devote a half-hour weekly to the problem but it would be better for broadcasters to work at the problem on their own initiative.

News from the film front — Television — Industrial — Features — Syndications

PHASE TWO OF THE RENOVATION program at the Lesser Studio is now completed, adding a modern new front to the premises at 55 Charles Street West, Toronto, and handsomely modernizing the offices. Phase one covered the face-lifting of the studio, art department, editing rooms and conference room.

Next on the agenda is the creation of a sound stage next door, an 80' x 60' clear span studio approximately 30' in height to the grid. The new live action studio will be completely self-contained, with office space, workshop, lights, make-up, etc., and will be available for rental to other producers. Work begins early in the new year.

It's now three and a half years since the Lesser Studio moved from its old home on Grange Avenue where the emphasis was on slides and slide film. (While most companies might have a faded photo of the old premises, president Mort Lesser has an oil painting by Albert Franck).

Now the company produces "anything to be projected onto a screen" and is currently doing more animation than live action: animation for such companies as Kraft Foods Ltd., Imperial Oil Ltd., the Ford Motor Co., Ontario Hydro, National Trust live action for such firms as Canadian Industries Ltd., Canada Packers Ltd., the Aluminum Co. of Canada.

Animation cameraman Gil Halikias reports that he is still discovering new ways to use their Oxberry electronic animation stand, the only one of its kind in Canada to Lesser's knowledge. In addition to all the regular features — automatic follow focus, pre-set optical effects, bipacking, interchangeable 16 and 35 mm shuttles — film can be shot at continuous speed while eccentric camera movements are guided from the remote control unit.

METRO-GOLDWYN-MAYER Television held its annual three-day sales meeting at the new Hilton Hotel in New York late last month and Canadian sales manager Bill Robinson returned with a new package of 40 post-1950 features for release to TV in 1964.

.

The 40/64 package includes such films as Tea and Sympathy starring Deborah Kerr and John Kerr, All at Sea starring Alec Guinness,

Love Me or Leave Me with Doris Day and James Cagney, and The Little Hut with David Niven, Stewart Granger and Ava Gardner.

BETTER LATE THAN NEVER in reporting two appointments at Williams, Drege and Hill Ltd. Heinz A. K. Drege, who designed the company's exclusive Pictafilm process, has been made executive vice-president of the film production house. He joined the company when it was formed in 1954 and has been, progressively, production supervisor, executive producer, vice-president and director.

Newcomer to the firm is producer-director Paul Kimberley. He has twelve years' experience in films and television, writing, producing and directing for CBC-TV, ABC-TV in England, and at CFTO-TV Toronto.

WD & H staff are watching the Jerry Lewis Show on TV now, to see the commercial they produced for U.S. Plywood through Kenyon & Eckhardt Inc., New York. In nine years, U.S. Plywood commercials have won nine awards and, having won the production over bids from U.S. producers, WD & H hope this commercial will bring award number ten.

A recent Pictafilm production is meeting with great success with the Glidden Co. Ltd. The 17-minute film was originally made to present the paint company's advertising and promotion plans to sales managers at five meetings across the country. Now it is being used at dealer meetings, and has also proved an effective sales tool in presentations to prospective accounts.

The production is in five segments, the first dealing with the company's big move into TV advertising, the second part on point-of-sale and window display material, the third portion covering direct mail promotion to consumers, and so on. Between these segments, Glidden inserts a talk, a slide presentation or, in the case of the section on TV advertising, a screening of one of one of the sponsored TV shows.

This first venture into Pictafilm has proved so successful that Glidden's advertising manager, John Howe, is considering other uses for the technique in the future. NEW SALES REPRESENTATIVE with ITC of Canada Ltd., is Frank D. Murray, who moved over from ZIT Programs (Canada) Ltd., where he had been an account executive for the past two years. With headquarters in Toronto, Murray is working with both TV stations and ad agencies across Canada.

ONE CANADIAN WAS among thirteen members of the Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers who were elevated to the grade of Fellow of the Society in recognition of their outstanding contributions. The honors were done at the So-

ciety's 94th semi-annual technical conference in Boston.

The new Fellow from Canada is Norman R. Olding, operations engineer with the CBC in Montreal, where he is responsible for technical operating and maintenance standards, planning and supervision of major special events broadcasts, and training of technicians.

The 95th technical conference of the SMPTE will be held April 12 through 17, 1964, at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles. Rodger J. Ross, technical supervisor of film operations, TV engineering, CBC-TV Toronto, is again associate program chairman for papers from abroad.
