Wide Audience for Canada's New Voice

Overseas Listeners Report on CBC's
International Service

The CBC International Service officially began its overseas transmissions on February 25, 1945. Although at the present time, broadcasts have been exclusively directed to Europe and a highly efficient directional antenna employed, reports have been received from many other parts of the world. Here are some of the cables and letters, or extracts from the letters:

Cable from Chief Engineer of BBC
—We are delighted that strongest signal in nineteen metre band from your side of the Atlantic now comes from Canada.

From R.C.A.F. Overseas, Middle East Forces—Speaking for all the Canadians in this unit, we are indeed pleased with reception, and sincerely appreciate being able to tune in to "home." You don't know how good it sounds to hear Canadian voices on the air! I'm sure the new station will fulfill many purposes and when your announcers say "This is Canada calling," they may be pleased to know that over here we say, "and this is Canada listening."

Cable from Raymond Arthur Davies, in Moscow—Shortwave coming in fine and regularly listened to here, indicating interest paid to Canadian broadcasts, ten minutes after my item from Moscow on Canadian elections heard over shortwave on Saturday, friends and acquaintances phoned me.

From Canadian Forces Overseas, on the Rhine, Germany—I've heard a good deal of Sackville on 15.2 megs. She really pounds in here and what a treat it is to get some first hand Canadian news and music. Some of the time there is a fade on the station but other times you'd think it was on the broadcast band. When are you going to start a 24-hour schedule? In our daily and weekly army newspapers your schedules and frequencies have been well advertised.

From Bahrein Island, Persian Gulf
—We heard Canada on the new shortwave station from Sackville, New Brunswick. They broadcast in French, German, as well as in English. It is a good program and worth while.

CBC's cheery sportscaster, BILL GOOD, will do a special broadcast on the Nelson Bonspiel—held July 2 to 7 in the Rocky Mountain town—from Regina on Sunday, July 8, at 1:15 p.m.

From Bexleyheath, England—Already the voice of Canada is taking its place in the international broadcasting family of the United Nations, and I admire very much the quiet dignity and poise which characterizes the presentation of the programs without any cheap sensationalism.

Other places heard from were Holland, Trinidad, Victoria (Australia), Algeria, Invercargill (New Zealand), Ceylon, Switzerland, Dutch West Indies, Malta, West Africa, Finland, Kenya Colony (East Africa), Greenland, and many points in Great Britain and Europe.

Laugh-Packed CBC Serial To Start on Friday 13th

"Johnny Home Show" Recounts
Humorous Side of Return to Civilian
Life

Toronto. — A special veteran is shortly to arrive home in Canada from overseas. He is disembarking over the CBC Trans-Canada network, in the premiere of the comedy feature, The Johnny Home Show, to be launched Friday, July 13, at 8:30 p.m.

The laugh-packed serial of Johnny Home and his pal, Sam Lightfoot, has been born in the minds of army writers Frank Shuster and Johnny Wayne, who have just recently arrived home themselves from an overseas tour of writing and acting in army entertainment shows.

In creating Johnny Home and his pal, Sgts. Shuster and Wayne have looked about them in the army and drawn a picture of what can happen when veterans come up for discharge. The two soldiers' uproarious battle with the post-war world is played out in terms of solicitous families, gratuities and general civilian reinstatement.

The Johnny Home Show will be produced and directed by J. Frank Willis, CBC supervisor of features. Participating in the half-hour program will be an orchestra conducted

by Samuel Hersenhoren, and a vocal ensemble, "The Swing Platoon," under the direction of Jack Allison.

Jack Fuller, one of radio's best-known personalities, will have the principal role of Johnny Home, and Sam Lightfoot will be played by Budd Knapp. Grace Webster plays Johnny's mother, and Frank Peddie his father; Peggi Loder appears as the kid sister; Alice Hill as Rosemary, the girl friend; Bernard Braden as Gabby, the postman; and Tommy Tweed as Uncle Henry who only rarely comes up from the cellar. Al Pearce and Alex McKee will be included among the actors appearing as additional characters.

The authors of the show have been collaborating on entertainment for 14 years. They began when writing and acting in high school dramatics, continued at the University of Toronto by producing and writing the lyrics, music and dialogue in the "Follies" for four years, and graduated into radio writing and production. From there Shuster and Wayne went into the entertainment unit of the Canadian Army. Theirs was the first show to land in Normandy, where they spent three and one-half months entertaining the Canadian and America forces.

CANADIAN YARNS (11:15 a.m. and 12:15 a.m.)

Marius Barbeau, Canada's most distinguished folklorist, has prepared three of French Canada's folktales for broadcast in the Canadian Yarns series. Today the famous story of "The Flying Canoe," known in French Canada as "La Chasse Galerie," will be told by the narrator of the series, Roger Baulu, the French Network's well-known bilingual commentator. "The Bewitched Cow of Rockliffe" will be the third story, to be broadcast, July 15. Marius Barbeau is the author of a great number of books dealing with Canadian subjects. Among his most recent publications are the novel, "Mountain Cloud," and "The Indian Speaks," a collection of the Indian legends of British Columbia.

GREAT VARIATIONS (12:30 p.m.)

The well-known pianist and composer, Arthur Benjamin, who now makes his home in Vancouver, will be heard in another of this piano-forte series. For his broadcast this week he has chosen Brahms' Variations on a Theme by Handel.

NELSON BONSPIEL (1:15 p.m.)

Bill Good, CBC Sportscaster, will broadcast from Regina on this occa-

sion, on his way home to Winnipeg from attending one of Western Canada's oddest sporting events—the Nelson Bonspiel, held in the beautiful Rocky Mountain town from July 2 to 7. This is a genuine bonspiel, with ice and rocks and brooms and tam-o-shanters. There is no secret how it happens to be held in July, either—artificial ice does the trick. Bill will describe his experiences at this remarkable midsummer assembly in the high altitudes.

ONCE UPON A TIME (5:00 p.m.)

"The Biography of a Mosquito" is today's play—a tragic tale, but then, life is tragic, isn't it? Deep in the mud of a Manitoba ditch he came into this life—Lester, the greatest mosquito of them all. Of humble origin—his father and mother had little, an inch of swampy water, mortgaged—yet greatness was born in his soul. Step by step through his stormy life, with its struggles, its defeats, its triumphs, the narrative follows him, until at last the fatal squirt gun of Joe, the implacable human enemy, brings him down to the dust. Wrapped in a rose leaf, he is buried in his native ditch. All day long the mourners file past, singing the mosquitoes' national anthem: "O Lester we raise our hats to you! Long may you buzz, o'er field and wood and slough."

The sixth of Ray Darby's amusing drama-fantasies parodies the manners and affectations of modern biographers in a hilarious comedy. Esse Ljungh will direct the players, and Roy Locksley will arrange the music and conduct the orchestra.

LET'S PLAY DUETS (6:30 p.m.)

Duettists Marie-Thérèse Paquin and John Newmark present another program this afternoon of music by the masters originally written for four hands to be played on the one instrument. The works featured this week are Valse, op. 8, No. 4, by Moszkowski; Sonata No. 4, by Mozart; and Slavonic Dance, op. 9, by Dvorak.

CONTRASTS IN RHYTHM

Rhythm will be played both fast and loose when Lou Snider steps up for his "Contrasts in Rhythm" program. Opening up on the fast side, Lou directs the orchestra in "The Peanut Vendor," moving next into the rhythm of "Sunrise Serenade." Three other orchestral numbers are to be "This Time It's Real," "I Got Rhythm," and Raymond Scott's "Siberian Sleighride." Pat Berry, vocal highlight on the program, will sing "The More I See You," and "A Friend of Yours." Lou Snider, himself, executes some piano wizardry in the memorable "I Surrender Dear."

The orchestra's feature number will be one of Alan McIver's rhythmic fantasies, "London Bridge Is Falling Down." Also for performance at this time, maestro McIver will add his special arranging touch to "Fine and Dandy," by Arthur Schwartz; "Because I Love You," by Irving Berlin; and "Mexican Hayride," by Cole Porter.

"Radio Folio" Will Use New Techniques

Something new in the way of radio entertainment is to come from the pen of playwright Fletcher Markle in the program, Radio Folio, which begins a run of 13 weeks on the CBC Trans-Canada network, Sunday, July 8, at 8 p.m. As summer successor to Stage 45, the program is presented for Sunday evening entertainment and will be directed by the author, acting as guest producer for the CBC. First item to emerge from the Radio Folio is "To Be Announced," defined by its author as "a comment on tomorrow's children." One of the underlying themes of "To Be Announced" is the obligation of prospective parents to give a world to the child rather than a child to the world.

Cast in the leading roles of the opening broadcast are John Drainie and Ruth Springford.

Radio Folio is intended as a broadcast experiment, using novel techniques of writing and production—making the listener a participant—will be followed throughout.

As an experiment, the series follows in the tradition of Fletcher Markle's radio career. His first large assignment was a 65-week series called "Imagine Please," in which Markle experimented in writing, editing, producing, and acting. His first claim to fame, the Baker's Dozen experiment which Andrew Allan produced in Vancouver in 1942, attracted attention to Markle wherever radio circles were big. Since his recent return from England and his R.C.A.F. job of telling the airman's story via both films and radio, Markle has been active in writing drama for CBC's Stage 45.

AEOLIAN STRAINS (8:00 p.m.)

The programs will feature the soprano with guest conductors and a 29-piece orchestra. Each week a musical director from one of the leading motion picture companies will present the most popular music from his studio.

"Hometown" Opens On Monday, July 9

Summer drama for CBC Dominion network listeners is to be provided in a new play series entitled "Hometown," which will have its premiere from Toronto on Monday, July 9, at 9:30 p.m. The plays will present sketches of people and their ways in a small Canadian city, and describe their effect upon one another.

"Hometown" is being written by Bernard Braden, who will also be CBC's guest producer for the 13 broadcasts in the series. Mr. Braden is refraining from classifying his plays under individual titles since each broadcast is designed to contribute to the total impression of "Hometown."

In each sketch the listener's attention is focused on one or two principal characters, who will in turn play a more or less incidental role in succeeding broadcasts.

The CBC's popular Vancouver origination, Classics for Today, featuring a 21-piece orchestra under the direction of Jean de Rimanoczy, has moved to a new time on Tuesday evenings, and will now be heard on the full nationwide facilities of the Trans-Canada network. The next program will go on the air at 9:30 p.m. on Tuesday, July 10.

It is said that Classics for Today holds the record as the longest program series continuously broadcast on the CBC. Summary for Broadcast of July 1, 1945.

West Meets East at Kenora.

1. Wooded country, more precipitation and more humidity provide Kenora with greater horticultural scope than the open prairie country. The hardy prairie variety of trees, shrubs, flowers and fruit predominate.

2. The rock outcroppings provide excellent opportunity for the landscape gardener. Gardens at the Paper Mill, the Forestry Station, the C.P.R. Station and McLeod Park indicate different types of treatment from the formal to the natural.

3. In private grounds the majority of gardeners have not paid sufficient attention to natural settings and the use of native material but local horticulturists have made the town a very attractive one nevertheless.

4. The Kenora Agricultural Society active for over 30 years has done much to arouse local interest in horticultural activities.

Suggestions for Landscaping.

Whether on home grounds or in public parks it is suggested that the following points should receive consideration:

(a) Make the plantings fit the lay of the land. Take advantage of natural features. The finished product should appear natural rather than man made.

(b) Plant in groups so that masses of shrubs or even annuals break the straight lines. Lines should follow the contours of the land.

(c) Frame vistas leading to key points of interest from the most commonly used viewing points.

(d) Blend native and imported plant varieties.

(e) Use grass as a foreground and to lend distance to vistas.

(f) Use specimen plants for points needing accent.

SPEAKING AS A CANADIAN (3:18 p.m.)

Lucien Parizeau, Montreal editor and art promoter and the final speaker in the 1945 presentation of the series of talks, "Speaking as a Canadian," deals this afternoon with the subject of a "National Art Exchange." He advocates greater co-operation between the national and private art galleries in order to facilitate the exchange of art exhibits.

CBC Resumes Series On Foreign Affairs

Canada's relations with foreign countries and other nations of the British Empire are to be closely reviewed for CBC listeners when the series *The World and Ourselves* is resumed. The broadcasts, featuring Gerald Noxon as speaker and interviewer, will commence on Friday, July 13, at 9:15 p.m.

As an introduction to the series, the opening program will deal with the broad functions of the Department of External Affairs and its importance to Canadians, collectively and individually. Also to be underlined are the department's wide activities in connection with overseas trade alone.

This will be the second presentation of a series by Gerald Noxon on the subject of "The World and Ourselves." In his first, broadcast in the summer months of 1944, Mr. Noxon,

through narration and interviews with foreign diplomats, showed how Canada had become an "embassy" country in the eyes of the world and a country that must in turn maintain embassies elsewhere. His present series will take listeners behind the scenes of Canada's External Affairs to show what goes on in the day's work.

Mr. Noxon is widely known in Great Britain and Canada as author, historian, playwright and broadcaster. His recently produced radio fantasy in blank verse, "Crossing at Jumieges," has been described as "one of the few authentic documents to come out of Canada in this war."

RECITAL (3:45 p.m.)

Today's recitalist from Winnipeg is Helen Dahlstrom. Miss Dahlstrom is a teacher and accompanist at the Regina Conservatory of Music, and accompanist for the North America Artists Bureau. She accompanied John Goss on his western tour in 1941. Her program includes: *Intermezzo*, Op. 117, No. 2 (Brahms)—one of the composer's later works; Jacques Ibert's *Little White Donkey*, a miniature from an impressionistic suite, *Les Rencontres*; *Etude in D Flat Major* (Liszt)—one of the great etudes, an epitome of Liszt's findings in a complete explanation of the whole range of piano technique; and *La Tarantelle Fretillante*, by the famous English-Negro composer, Samuel Coleridge-Taylor.

PRAIRIE COMMENT (5:15 p.m.)

These weekly "Rambles Round the Prairies" are introduced by the puffing of the train, which speeds from one western town to another in search of matters of interest. This afternoon's subject is "Hostellers Holiday," and the speaker is Eleanor Carlyle of Calgary, who will interview Jean Casselman.

MERCHANT NAVY SHOW (7:00 p.m.)

The popular accordionist, known along the airwaves as Amelia, will make a second appearance this season on the *Merchant Navy Show*. Amelia and her accordion have been firmly ensconced in the show business of Eastern Canada practically since she was big enough to hold the "folding box." At six she appeared on the stage of the Capitol Theatre in Montreal and at eight she made her first radio appearance in Quebec City. During the war years, besides a full schedule of weekly programs, she has travelled the length and breadth of the province entertaining the service men and women. She is currently entertaining them overseas via the CBC's International Shortwave Service. Ray Harvey handles the introductions on the *Merchant Navy Show* and con-

tributes some of the vocals. Howard Higgins directs the orchestra and Announcer Monty Tilden not only ushers the show on off the air but helps keep the sparkling dialogue moving along at a sprightly pace.

JOHNNY HOME SHOW (8:30 p.m.)

Frank Shuster and Johnny Wayne, Toronto writers who have recently returned to Canada from a tour of writing and acting with an army entertainment unit, are the authors of this new CBC series, which treats the problems of the returning soldier from the humorous side. The principal characters are Johnny Home (played by Jack Fuller) and his pal, Sam Lightfoot (played by Bud Knapp). Others are Johnny's father (Frank Peddie) and his mother (Grace Webster); his kid sister (Peggi Loder); the girl friend (Alice Hill); Gabby the postman (Bernard Braden) and Uncle Henry, who rarely comes up from the cellar (Tommy Tweed). Frank Willis, CBC supervisor of features, is producing the series. There will be an orchestra conducted by Samuel Hersenhoren, and a vocal ensemble, *The Swing Platoon*, conducted by Jack Allison. Shuster and Wayne have been collaborating for 14 years. Their show was the first to land in Normandy, and spent three months there entertaining Canadian and American troops. See also story on front page.

VANCOUVER PLAYHOUSE (10:30 p.m.)

It's a double feature this week on Vancouver Playhouse, when two hilarious comedies by the Vancouver writer, Frank Vyvyan, will be aired for the Trans-Canada network audience. Titles of the plays are: "The Ghost of 'Arry 'Awkins," and "A Bird in Hand." Our first story is about a man who returns home after being presumed dead, and the complications that ensue; the second concerns a hen-pecked husband and a duck. This broadcast is another in the series of popular plays which have been heard on Vancouver Playhouse previously, and are being repeated.

The choral programs on Sunday evenings are really beautiful and well-chosen, and the CBC renders a great service in broadcasting them to those of us who otherwise would have no opportunity of hearing them.—J. Canadian Radio Drama.

I have been a follower of Corwin, Oboler, and Welles for years, and frankly I had come to believe that radio drama in the United States was away ahead of anything available in Canada. But lately I have been listening to Stage 45, and to the fine series of dramas from Winnipeg, and I am not so sure. There are sharp differences in the Canadian and American approach to radio drama, one has to get used to the two methods. The Canadian is more documentary, less spectacular and thrilling, but when you have become familiar with its technique, it is no less effective. I commend all my radio friends who have been "sold" on U.S. radio drama to try the Canadian variety for a change. It repays study, and is good entertainment. The CBC has worked in an unspectacular way, and without fanfare, but the job it is doing is a thorough one, and worth while.—H.M.G., Calgary, Alta.
