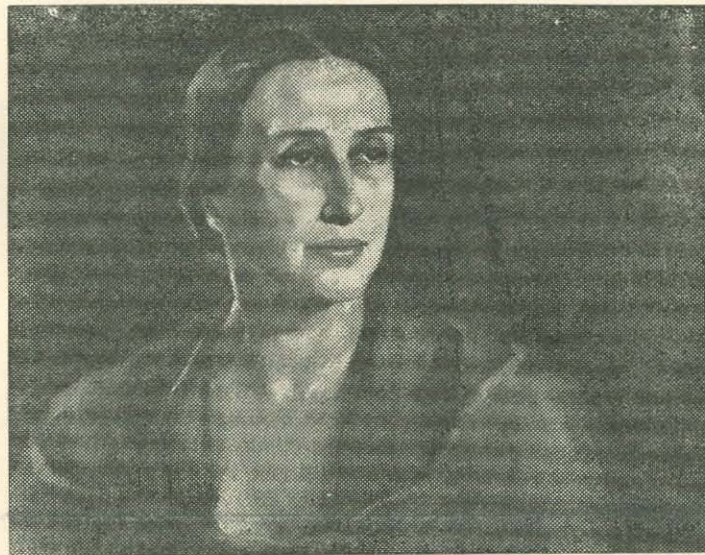

## Yule Concert Tips

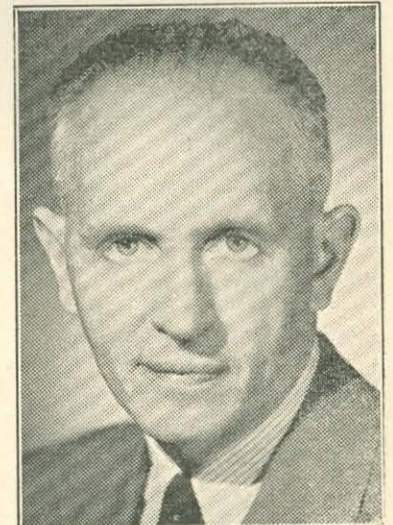

The performers are being chosen from among Montreal's outstanding musicians.

The work to be heard tonight is Mozart's "Clarinet Quintet in A Major," written for clarinet, two violins, viola and 'cello. The performers are Armand Gagnier, clarinetist; Alexander Brott and Jules Payment, violinists; Joseph Mastrocola, violist, and Roland Leduc, 'cellist.

Miss Gould won the top award of a thousand dollar scholarship last season on the "Singing Stars of To-

morrow" program. There is a good deal of Canadiana in the background of Dominion Special, the BBC program recorded in England and flown to Canada for weekly presentation on the CBC Dominion network. The broadcasts go on the air Sundays at 10:30 p.m.

Foremost among the Canadiana are Flt. Lt. Bernie Yuffey, R.C.A.F., whose musical ideas and string group were popular radio items with all the British and American forces, and P.O. Ted Hockridge, of Vancouver, whose baritone voice is known in most of the English provinces. Both these entertainers are now part of the weekly program; and another Canadian note is struck through the program's narrator, Alan Melville, who was with the Canadian army in Holland as BBC correspondent, and who has long been familiar to Cana-

**Farm Radio Forum**

**Resumes October 29**

National Farm Radio Forum will celebrate its sixth birthday with the inaugural broadcast of the 1945-46 series on Monday, October 29, at 9:30 p.m. over western stations of the C B C Trans-Canada network. Throughout the season the forum program will be broadcast to a nation-wide audience at varying times on Monday evenings over regional sections of the Trans-Canada network.

A joint project of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, the Canadian Federation of Agriculture, and the Canadian Association for Adult Education, the forum this year takes as its theme "The Farmer Feeds the World." In its survey of this subject the program will present five sub-series, each consisting of four broadcasts.

The inaugural forum poses the question "How Important is Agriculture to Canada?" and examines the contribution agriculture makes to Canada and the world. This forum is to be broadcast from the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph before a student audience. The participants in the debate will also be students.

Farm Radio Forum will move around and through the rural centres and areas of Canada in the course of the year's broadcasts. Farmers and agronomists from all parts of the Dominion will thus be enabled to take part in the discussions.

As in previous years the broadcasts will be of 25 minutes duration, to be followed by the five-minute Farm Forum News broadcast on local groups of stations.

The Chairman of the National Farm Radio Forum this year will be Orlo Miller of London, Ontario. Mr. Miller has been farmer, journalist, historian, author, and radio raconteur. Recently he has played a prominent part in the search for better methods in scientific land conservation. He will preside over the forum debates throughout the 1945-46 season.

dian listeners during the war years for his BBC show Front Line Family.

"Dominion Special" is produced by Miranda Duley as a potpourri of radio episodes designed to furnish Canadian ex-service listeners with memories of old friends made while serving in Britain, and to give listeners generally a gay parade of music and variety—with entertainment the motif.

BBC reporter John Irwin roams around in a recording van to take word pictures of the English places that Canadians know best. 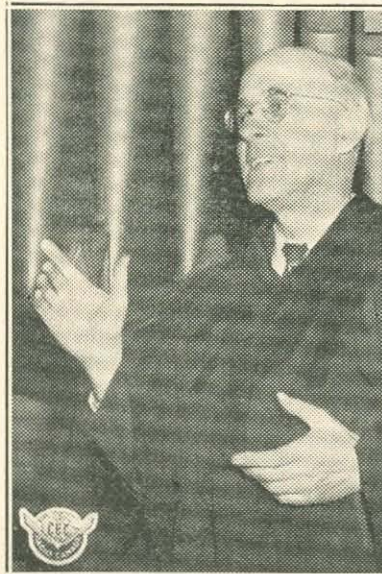

Today Jean Hinds, of CBC, Winnipeg, will interview Miss Haig on the air, and discuss the interesting personality who is the subject of her book.

## Toronto Symphony Broadcasts Resumed

The regular winter season of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra will open in Massey Hall this week under the direction of Sir Ernest MacMillan, and will be brought to listeners across Canada via the CBC Dominion network. A one-hour portion of each of the 17 concerts in the series is to be presented on Tuesday evenings, dating from the opening broadcast of Tuesday, October 30, at 8 p.m. The orchestra's guest artist on this occasion will be the young Czech pianist Rudolf Firkusny, whose Toronto debut last year attracted a large audience of artists, critics and music patrons. The broadcasts of the Toronto Symphony are presented as a feature of the CBC's regular Dominion Symphony Hour. In addition to the Toronto concerts there will be symphony performances from time to time by the orchestra of Les Concerts Symphoniques de Montreal.

## Banking Not In Her Line, Says Miss Hinds

When Jean Hinds broadcast an appeal in behalf of the clothing drive for Europe over CBK on October 2, she had no idea that she was committing herself to do a job as banker and distributing agent. But that's how it turned out. From a town in Saskatchewan last week came a longish letter from a lady listener, enclosing twelve dollars—three from each member of the family—and announcing the dispatch of a heavy fur coat. Miss Hinds was to buy clothes for Europe with the twelve dollars, and to see that the fur coat got to someone in Norway who needed it.

The trouble, the listener explained, is that out on the farm there are no partly worn sweaters. When they get through with them, they are all worn. Consequently, they can't send clothes. Hence the money.

Miss Hinds regretfully replied that money was no good for this purpose, and could not be accepted. Nothing but clothes. She said she would turn the fur coat over to the clothing drive authorities.

*Mail Bag*

**Would Have Music Speak For Itself.**

I am appalled with the tendency shown on almost all CBC programs of really good music to go in for ver-bose and tedious introductions in- stead of allowing the music to speak for itself. On this particular pro- gram (Music by Mozart, Oct. 14) we were obliged to listen to a resume of Mozart's life and accomplishments. Why was this necessary? Radio has been giving us the music of Mozart and Beethoven and Bach for many years, thank goodness, and one would suppose that everybody has been surfeited with these well-meaning efforts to cram biographies of com- posers into our heads. There is a wholly false attitude toward this class of music, perpetuating the high- brow conception which existed years ago when the unfortunate proletariat could not share in symphonic or chamber music. It is a condemned lot of nonsense to set great music apart in a rarified mystic atmos- phere. The CBC, doubtless with the best of intentions, is perpetuating a deplorable piece of musical snobbery. If your introductions can add some- thing to the listener's enjoyment or put him in the way to perceive something otherwise obscure in the fare about to be provided, by all means construct them to that end. I suggest, however, that we should be spared these endless repetitions, year after weary year, itemizing the gloomy details of the lives of bygone impoverished composers. Incidental- ly, except that I'm out of breath, a lance could be broken on the question of using terms such as "adagio" and so on for a general (as distinct from a musically educated) audience. It would be interesting to have those responsible for CBC in- troductory matter review the whole subject to form a revised policy. It is high time the listeners were given a chance to hear the music itself, without obstruction. The pious and reverential attitude toward the "great masters" defeats its own purpose. The unenlightened simply switch off, and the music is not heard.—D. L., Winnipeg, Man.

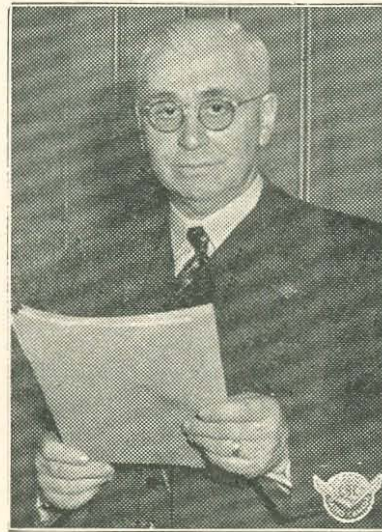

**NATIONAL SCHOOL BROADCAST (11:30 a.m. and 3:00 p.m.)**

About a century and a half ago a small band of United Empire Loyalists, seeking a new home in the wilderness, beyond reach of persecution for their loyalty to the British Crown, settled on rich soil beside a stream known as Twelve Mile Creek because it was twelve miles from the Niagara River and Fort Niagara, seat of Upper Canada's first parliament and home of its first newspaper and library. About 1793 the new settlement was called St. Catharines in honour of Catharine Hamilton, wife of one of the leading settlers. After the war of 1812 sulphur springs with valuable medicinal qualities were discovered and the place became a fashionable spa, visited by well-to-do planters from the States. In 1829 the first Welland Canal was built, linking Lakes Erie and Ontario, and passing through St. Catharines. A second canal (1850), a third (1875), and finally the great Welland Ship Canal, followed. St. Catharines gained a new importance, and became a flourishing shipbuilding town—and the recognized centre of the fruit and wine-growing industries of the Niagara Peninsula. The town claims the first electric street cars on the continent and the first Boy Scout Troop and Girl Guide Company. During the war just finished its industries made a notable contribution.

The program for tonight includes two songs by Miss Ware: This Heart of Mine, from the Ziegfeld Follies; and Sweetheart of All My Dreams, from 30 Seconds Over Tokyo. **The Prairie Gardener**

Summary of Broadcast of October 21, 1945

How to handle Soldier Gifts of Tulips from Holland:

1. *Planting outdoors:* Planted in late October tulips should be set deeper than usual, 6-7 inches in deeply dug (12 inches) but firmly compacted bed. Space bulbs 6-8 inches apart. Water thoroughly. Mulch the bed with 4-6 inches of leaves, straw or strawy manure. Keep the frost from penetrating to the bulbs until they have a chance to start rooting. The bed should be located where there is wind shelter and usually good snow coverage in winter.

2. *Planting indoors* is not satisfactory unless bulbs are in separate named varieties. Plant only one variety in a pot. Mixed tulips vary in height and time of blooming so do not give a good effect indoors. Plant in firm garden loam with tips of bulbs at or near the surface. Water thoroughly and place in cold basement room until the pots is full of roots and flower bud has emerged from crown of bulb. When rooted bring to warmth and light. They must never be permitted to dry out completely and the rooting period must be prolonged until bulbs are really ready to flower.

Care of House Plants (continued from October 14th):

1. *The simple rules listed last week* must be considered as a unit. Soil, light, heat, humidity, water, food, and protection against insects and disease are associated factors affecting the thrifty growth of plants. These must be adjusted to fit the needs of each individual plant. Plants vary widely in their needs.

2. *The water requirements of* plants illustrates variation in needs of different plants quite clearly. Calla lilies are shore or bog plants and their roots are adapted to the presence of free water, so water freely. The roots of cacti and other desert plants are adapted to dry conditions, so water sparingly.

3. *Combination of factors requires* study. In warm sunny locations plants use more water than in cool shady spots. These factors must be adjusted according to conditions.

4. *You can acquire a "green thumb"* for success in growing house plants by being thoughtful and planning your work, and giving regular attention to the jobs.
