## CBC Talks For Women Popular On Prairies

Miss McIver Returns To Winnipeg From Western Tour

CBC talks for women have a large and regular audience in the prairie provinces, and especially in Saskatchewan, according to Miss Catherine MacIver, CBC talks producer in charge of women's interests, who returned to her Winnipeg headquarters recently from a tour of the prairies which took her through Regina, Moose Jaw, Calgary, Edmonton, Saskatoon and Watrous.

Miss MacIver went west with the dual purpose of looking after the production end of two broadcasts of the CBC series, *The Readers Take Over*, at Regina and Calgary; and to seek out broadcasting talent and meet people in the broadcasting business.

In Regina, Miss MacIver addressed the Local Council of Women at the invitation of the president, Mrs. J. E. Cooper, discussing production methods and the part played by the listener in broadcasting.

In Moose Jaw, the CBC representative was the guest of the Princess Pats association at tea, and was greatly impressed with the large number of women there who were regular listeners to Station CBK, Watrous, and who arranged to do "quiet" work, such as ironing, while CBC talks for women were on the air.

In Calgary, while greatly in the dark due to the almost total lack of accurate newspaper publicity, Miss MacIver found listeners keenly interested in the new CBC 50,000-watt transmitter now in process of construction at Lacombe, Alberta. The CBC visitor had the opportunity of speaking to a meeting of members of the Women's Institute, and was impressed by the attitude of friendliness and interest toward CBC programs and activities generally displayed among these listeners.

At Saskatoon, Miss MacIver met presidents and other officers of many of the city's leading women's organizations.

## Soldiers Start Radio Station At Aklavik

A sergeant-major, a sergeant, two corporals and a private are responsible for Canada's newest radio station, which began operations at Aklavik, Northwest Territories, on May 1, according to an announcement by army headquarters at Ottawa.

The station is CHAK, most northerly station in the Americas, which has a power of 30-watts and covers a good part of the surrounding Mackenzie Delta. There are 150 people in Aklavik, and they, as well as many others at surrounding trading posts and traplines will now have a regular radio service.

Sergeant-Major R. A. MacLeod started building the station six months ago with parts of a "ham" set, and with the assistance of Sergeant J. W. Willis, Corporals K. N. Murley and M. J. Benoit, and

Private G. E. Stonier.

To get a rough idea of how far north Aklavik is, measured on a map of the Dominion it is very nearly twice as far from Winnipeg to Aklavik as it is from Winnipeg to Toronto.

## Queen Mary Selects Evening's Programs

As a gift on her eightieth birthday, which falls on May 26, Queen Mary has been invited by the BBC to select an entire evening's entertainment for the Home Service. The Queen Mother's selections have already been made, and include a special story for the occasion to be written by Agatha Christie, the Queen's favourite mystery writer. Many of Great Britain's most popular comedians will be heard; there will be a choir from Wales, pipes from Scotland, and traditional Irish songs. A massed band program will be heard in North America.

## CBC Will Continue Political Broadcasts

New Series Announced, May to December

The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation has announced plans for a further series of free-time federal political broadcasts called *The Nation's Business*, to be heard on Wednesdays at 10:00 p.m. over western stations of the CBC Trans-Canada network.

Between May 21 and December 10, there will be 30 quarter-hour broadcasts—12 Liberal, nine Progressive Conservative, six C.C.F., and three Social Credit. The schedule is based on the formula set forth in the CBC's White Paper on Political Broadcasting and is subscribed to by all political parties concerned.

There is no allocation of time for the Labor-Progressive party since it has no representation in the House of Commons as a result of the Cartier by-election.

The broadcast schedule for June calls for a Progressive Conservative speaker on Wednesday, June 4; a Liberal on June 11; C.C.F. on June 18; and a Progressive Conservative representative again on June 25.

The *Nation's Business* series began in July last year, and will continue indefinitely as agreed among the qualifying federal political parties.

## New Plastic Lenses Advance Television

Supremacy in the television field is likely to rest in England for some years to come, as a result of the production of practical plastic lenses and plastic cathode ray tubes for television sets, by English scientists working under the direction of Dr. David Starkie. The scientists have been at work for six years on this problem, in laboratories at Welwyn.

According to the announcement, lenses and optical systems which could be made in glass can now be produced by a comparatively cheap process in plastic. The result in television will be improved reception on larger screens without the use of large and expensive tubes. Lab tests are now complete, and it is said that the Board of Trade has given priority to the building of a plant for the production of tubes, lenses and mirrors. The removal of the slow and costly grinding process necessary with glass is regarded as a great advance. Before the completion of Dr. Starkie's experiments, plastic lenses were found to be soft and to scratch easily, also to expand and contract in varying temperatures, causing distortion. Greater accuracy is also expected from the new plastic lenses.

## In Recital



ISAAC MAMOTT, Toronto 'cellist formerly of Winnipeg, will be heard in recital over CBC's Dominion network on Monday, June 2, at 9:30 p.m. He is a member of the Parlow String Quartet.

Toronto scriptwriter Ron Hambleton, who is well known as a short story writer, has taken his inspiration for Anthology from the letters of the alphabet. Taking different letters in turn, he chooses a key word which provides him with the theme of his program. In his broadcast E is for Epics for example, he may quote some of the great epic poetry in the world's literature, hark back to the epic achievements of the ancients, and recount in dramatic narrative the epics of today. Music inspired by these writings and events will be chosen by Mr. Avison. A is for Anthologies, is Hambleton's opening script tonight over CBC's Trans-Canada network stations. The cast stars Peggy Hassard, with Arthur Hill, Eric Vale, Sam Payne, Juan Root and Frank Vyvan. Subsequent programs will take as their theme words ballads, dances, epics, fables, humour, imagination, kings, letters, parodies, riddles, ships and water.

## The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of May 25, 1947.

### Annual Flower Beds:

1. *Time of setting out plants:* If well hardened frost hardy items like pansies, alyssum, snapdragons, petunias and asters may be set out quite early, but tender plants such as African and French marigolds, zinnias, lobelia and cosmos must be delayed until danger of late frost is over. It doesn't pay to be in too much of a hurry in this.

2. *Right use of colour:* Requires considerable skill. (a) Strong colours, particularly red, should be used with caution. They are best when used for accent here and there. (b) The flower bed must fit into a scheme that already includes the green of grass and shrubbery and the blue of the sky. (c) Light colours—white, cream, soft yellow—show up better against green foliage than reds and purples. (d) Some colour combinations naturally combine to strengthen one another, i.e.—yellow and blue, orange and lavender, white and purple. (e) To get the colours you want to use you may find it necessary to grow your own plants. Named varieties to colour are best. (f) Beginners should not try to combine more than two or three colours in a bed. (g) Learn to experiment. Don't be afraid to make mistakes which are the basis of learning to do better. Express your own ideas.

3. *Shapes and sizes of beds* should be simple and of types to fit into the background rather than standing out in the foreground. Geometrical designs and mazes are not desirable on small grounds, if anywhere. "Border" plantings are preferable to beds in the middle of the lawn. Stone or sapling markers do not contribute anything to the beauty of flowers and should be avoided.

4. *Time of blooming and length of blooming season* of particular plants must be learned if they are to be used effectively. Snapdragons and petunias have a long blooming season and stand fall frost.

5. *For brightness at dusk and for perfume* white nicotine, and light coloured petunias and stocks are very effective.

6. *Good annuals for rockeries* include alyssum, lobelia, African daisies, phlox, nemesia, nasturtiums, dwarf marigolds and dwarf zinnias.

7. *For hot rather dry spots* try African daisies, fig-marigolds and portulaca.

'Dick Barton' Author Is Edmonton Native

BBC Serial Hero Is England's Most-Talked-About Man

You might think that the most-talked about man in England today would be the Prime Minister, or the Foreign Minister, or Mr. Churchill, but from the best advices coming in, it seems that it is not so.

The most-talked-about man in England today, according to these advices, is Dick Barton, who in fact, though not in his fictional character, has Canadian ancestry.

Dick is the hero of England's most famous radio serial "Dick Barton, Special Agent", heard daily at 6.45 p.m., throughout the Kingdom, on the BBC's networks. Even the time of his broadcast gets talked about, because troubled parents think it has an effect upon the school careers of their offspring. "I find," wrote one parent to the BBC, "that Dick Barton is death to prep (meaning home work), and destruction to household orderliness. May I suggest that he enter upon his adventures at 7.15 in the morning? This would help to get my children up in good time."

Regarding Dick's Canadian ancestry—the man responsible for the serial is William MacLurg, native of Edmonton, Alberta, and former resident of Vancouver and Victoria. It is estimated that 15,000,000 people in Great Britain now listen regularly to MacLurg's adventure story, and that approximately 10,000,000 of them indulge now and then in what has come to be known as the "Barton controversy". This controversy far outranks the U.N. Conference, the meetings of foreign ministers, and the Food Ministry as an item of news and a matter for public discussion, and as for the Palestine issue, it is pushed away into the background when Dick Barton appears.

MacLurg is described as a short, stocky man with greying hair. He left Canada when he was in his 'teens to finish his education at the University of London, where he studied chemical engineering. He served in the R.A.F. during the war. He is a graduate of the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art, and played in musical comedy, Shakespearean and stock roles in London before joining the BBC. He left the BBC staff, where he was a program producer, to go to war, and returned after demobilization.

### Visiting West



A visitor to CBC's Prairie Region Headquarters at Winnipeg last week was W. H. BRODIE, of Toronto, CBC supervisor of broadcast language. Mr. Brodie was returning to his eastern headquarters from Vancouver, where he had spent several days at Station CBR. All phases of broadcast language are Mr. Brodie's concern. His successive Handbooks for Announcers have become classics in the broadcasting world. The last one, published in 1946, has a revised issue of his unique pronouncing dictionary of Canadian place names, the result of wide and patient research. Mr. Brodie is a former schoolmaster (at Ashby College, Ottawa) and a former attache of the British Foreign Office. His supervision includes both French and English broadcasting, two languages in which he is equally proficient.

Ethelwyn Hobbes was born in Winnipeg, graduated in economics from the university there, and worked as a reporter on a Winnipeg daily. She also spent some years as an advertising copy writer, and during the 30's ran a restaurant in Montreal.

This CBC commentator is an ardent reader, which probably explains the diversity of topics which she deals with in her broadcasts. Fan mail comes to her from all over the continent, and her replies are enough to keep a small post-office busy. Most of her letters go to listeners who write for information, on a variety of subjects ranging from sword-dancing to cheese-making.

Another highlight will be an original arrangement of a sparkling Cuban melody, Rumba Rhapsody, to be played by pianist Lou Snider. Don Miguel and the orchestra will play an Argentine tango called Dusk, while Chicho Valle with a rhythm group known as Los Cubanitos, will play and sing Periquito Real, a folk song which Valle brought with him to Canada from his native Cuba. A regular performer in the series is vocalist Dorothy Alt, whose singing is internationally known. She will give North American interpretations of South American songs.

Mitchell Parks, pianist, with a girls' trio—Mary Koshowski, Wanda Swan, and Stephanie Konyk—will be heard tonight. **CBC Records Award of Hon. LL.D. to Heinze Ceremonies At B.C. University Beamed To Australia**

When the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws was conferred in *absentia* on Professor Bernard Heinze, Australian musician and conductor, at graduation ceremonies recently in the University of British Columbia, the proceedings were recorded by the CBC for transmission to Australia.

It was believed to have been the first time anywhere that such a ceremony had been broadcast. The recording will permit Professor Heinze to hear the proceedings as they happened.

A technical crew from the CBC's Vancouver station CBR, with W. J. Herbert as commentator, covered the ceremonies. The transcription was transferred to aluminum discs at CBR, to be flown to Australia on the next departure of A.N.A. Airlines from Vancouver.

At the same time, duplicate aluminum discs were flown by T.C.A. to Montreal, where CBC officials beamed them direct to Australia by shortwave over the 50,000-watt twin transmitters of the Corporation's International Service.

It is expected that the discs which go by air to the University of Melbourne will be used on the networks of the Australian Broadcasting Corporation.

Ira Dilworth, CBC Regional Representative for the Pacific Region; E. L. Bushnell, CBC director-general of programs; and Charles Jennings, CBC general supervisor of programs, who arranged Professor Heinze' recent tour of Canada as guest of the CBC, were also responsible for arranging the recordings.

The CBC transcription of the graduation ceremonies included the Chancellor's address, the citation for Professor Heinze by President Norman Mackenzie of the U.B.C., and the playing of O Canada.

## Dan McCowan Begins New Nature Series

### Banff Naturalist Will Speak On CBC From Vancouver

Dan McCowan of Banff, whose friendly Scottish burr is already well known to CBC listeners through his many previous broadcasts, begins a new series on the CBC's Trans-Canada network on Thursday, June 5, at 6:45 p.m., under the title Adventures In Nature.

Dan McCowan is the author of three illustrated books: A Naturalist in Canada, Animals of the Canadian Rockies, and Outdoors With A Camera in Canada.

Of Banff's famous naturalist, Bob

Davis of the New York Sun, once said, "About forty years ago Dan McCowan turned up in the Canadian Rockies and began to interview all manner of wild animals and birds.

"With these he established such friendly relations that when the last trumpet blows and noses are counted, Dan will be found coming down a canyon in the company of grizzly bears, mountain sheep, whistling marmots, moose, wildcats, owls and humming birds. And he will be leading the procession."

Dan was born in a tiny Perthshire village under the shadow of the Grampian hills, and came to Canada as a young man to settle at Banff. For 20 years holidayers in the Rockies have returned home with enthusiastic reports of his lectures, and though he has written newspaper and magazine articles and published illustrated books, it was not until he made his first radio broadcasts for CBC that the whole nation could appreciate his gift for interpreting the wonders of the Canadian outdoors which he knows so intimately.

From 1932 until the outbreak of war he was well-known as a singer on the Austrian Government Radio.

## Canada's Radio

Canada has had its national radio system—the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation—for more than ten years.

Seven of those years were war years—not the best time for getting acquainted. Everyone, including the CBC, was concerned with only one important job—winning the war.

Now that the CBC is back to peacetime service, Canadian listeners can take a fresh look at their publicly operated radio system. Many of us may have forgotten why this particular plan of broadcasting was chosen as the one best suited to Canadian needs.

Canada's radio system is based on regional and national network service that is publicly operated and local community service that is privately operated.

You can't mention radio without starting an argument, because there are as many ideas about radio as there are people. Some people like one program, some another. Some people want no advertising on the air, other people don't mind it.

When you have a lot of different tastes and opinions, you can do one of two things. You can say, "We're going to have it all this way, and if you don't like it you can lump it."

Or you can say "Reasonable people don't try to force all their views on other people. They try to find a workable solution that's got common sense in it."

That's how Canada came to have a system of broadcasting that is in part publicly operated.
