## CBC CHAIRMAN ANNOUNCES NEW PROGRAM SERVICE

### CBC Wednesday Night Stimulating, Different

*New And Seldom-Heard Works  
To Be Presented*

Ottawa, Nov. 21—The following announcement was issued from CBC Head Office today by A. Davidson Dunton, chairman of the CBC Board of Governors:

The CBC has decided on a special new program service for Canadian listeners. Starting on December 3rd, the whole of each Wednesday evening on the Trans-Canada network, beginning at 7:30 p.m. EST, will be devoted to programs that are stimulating, substantial, different and at times more demanding on the attention of the listener.

Wednesday Night will include radio fare that is unusual and significant. On different weeks it will offer works that are new or seldom heard on the air. Types of performances will vary, with the criterion being the interest and quality of the work and of the production. Items will be chosen for imagination, humour and lightness of touch as well as for serious value.

The Wednesday Night programs will regularly include good music by various groups of different sizes and kinds, and recitals by distinguished artists, Canadians as well as those from other countries, who have acquired an international reputation. Another regular feature will be forthright discussions of interesting questions and talks of special broadcast merit.

The CBC has the responsibility of endeavouring to meet varied tastes among Canadian listeners. Its schedules include many types of programs, from light entertainment and music, to programs of more serious content. It believes, however, that there are a considerable number of listeners who would welcome a whole evening on one network of a more advanced and challenging type of broadcasting. And it believes that it is to the general advantage of broadcasting and the listening public to endeavour in this way to show wider possibilities of radio as a force in the cultural life of Canada.

#### Alternative Service

Wednesday Night service on the Trans-Canada network will aim at appealing to a large audience. So that there will be a choice for those who prefer other fare, the Dominion network on Wednesdays will carry an alternative schedule of good light entertainment.

*The new CBC program service, "CBC Wednesday Night," beginning December 3, is detailed in an announcement from Ottawa today by the chairman of the CBC's Board of Governors, Mr. A. DAVIDSON DUNTON.*

December 3rd and continue from then on each Wednesday evening. On December 3rd, there will be a performance of an original Canadian musical comedy "The Gallant Greenhorn." The following week the special performance will be "Murder In The Cathedral," by T. S. Eliot. A program of fine but seldom heard Christmas music will follow on December 17th. On Christmas Eve, a Wednesday night, the Nativity Play will be produced. New Year's Eve will feature an original topical revue of 1947, with music.

If the new plan proves successful this season it is hoped to arrange next year for greater flexibility in network schedules, so that there can be greater freedom in presenting more works at the length best suited for them.

### Jobin Is Guest With Montreal Symphony

**French Operatic Tenor Back From  
Paris Opera Comique**

The guest soloist with the Montreal Symphony Orchestra for the broadcast of Tuesday, December 2, will be Raoul Jobin, French operatic tenor. He will be heard with the orchestra directed by Desire Defauw at 7:30 and 11:30 p.m. over the CBC Dominion network.

Since his last appearance on a coast-to-coast CBC network in Canada, Jobin has made what Paris music critics have termed "a triumphal return" to l'Opera Comique de Paris. He sang there last April in the role of Des Grieux in Manon—a role for which he first became famous in France—and his appearance was hailed as the return of a favorite leading tenor. Just before the war, Mr. Jobin set a record of 111 performances in 15 months at the Grand Opera de Paris.

Raoul Jobin's operatic record in America has been one of continuous success since he made his debut at the Metropolitan Opera in 1941. In addition to the Metropolitan, he has sung with the opera companies of San Francisco, Chicago, Montreal, St. Louis, Cincinnati and Havana. He made his South American debut in 1939 in Rio de Janeiro and appeared there again in 1941, and in Buenos Aires.

**Vancouver Symphony To Perform  
Recent Work By Marc Blitzstein**

A choral symphony, with soloists and a speaking narrator, described as "tracing the development of flight from early mythology through Leonardo da Vinci and the Wright brothers to the present day," will be performed by the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra during its next broadcast over the CBC Trans-Canada network, on Sunday, November 30, at 5:35 p.m.

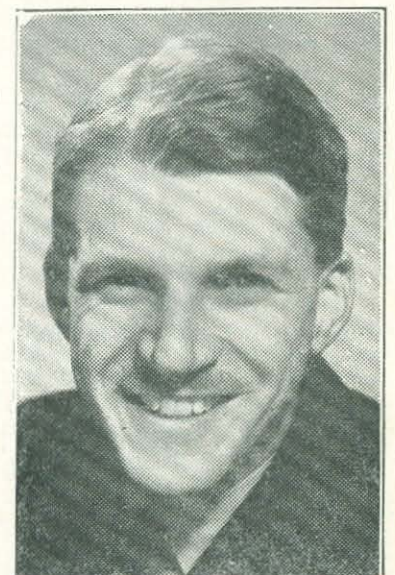
#### Canadian Premiere

The work is "Airborne Symphony," by a New York composer, Marc Blitzstein. This will be its second performance. The premier was given in New York last year, with Leonard Bernstein conducting the orchestra and Orson Welles as narrator.

Jacques Singer, permanent conductor of the Vancouver orchestra, will direct the present performance, and Juan Root, often heard in CBC dramatic productions, will be the narrator. The vocal soloists will be Karl Norman, tenor, and Derek McDermot, bass-baritone. There will be a chorus of 100 voices made up from

### Tribute To Airmen

Marc Blitzstein served in the United States Air Force during the war, wrote his symphony as a tribute to Allied airmen. The narration contains much flyer's jargon which ex-airmen will recognize. At the climax of the work, the chorus sings blithely of the joys of the air age, while the serious voice of the narrator urges positive action to ensure peace. Describing the miracle of flight, the composer, who also wrote the narration, says: "This notion eats oceans, puts the desert in its vest pocket, has geography for tea. . . . The barriers to the other side of the world—they can pack up now and call it a day. They're through!"

The principals in this performance are all ex-servicemen. Singer, the conductor, served with the United States forces in the south Pacific; Juan Root, native of Philadelphia, was in the Canadian army; as were the vocalists, Karl Norman and Derek McDermot. Veterans also predominate in the University chorus.

Jacques Singer was formerly conductor of symphony orchestras at Philadelphia, Dallas, and New Orleans. Juan Root appeared with Walter Hampden on Broadway before coming to Canada. He went to Vancouver with Anna Neagle's touring company.

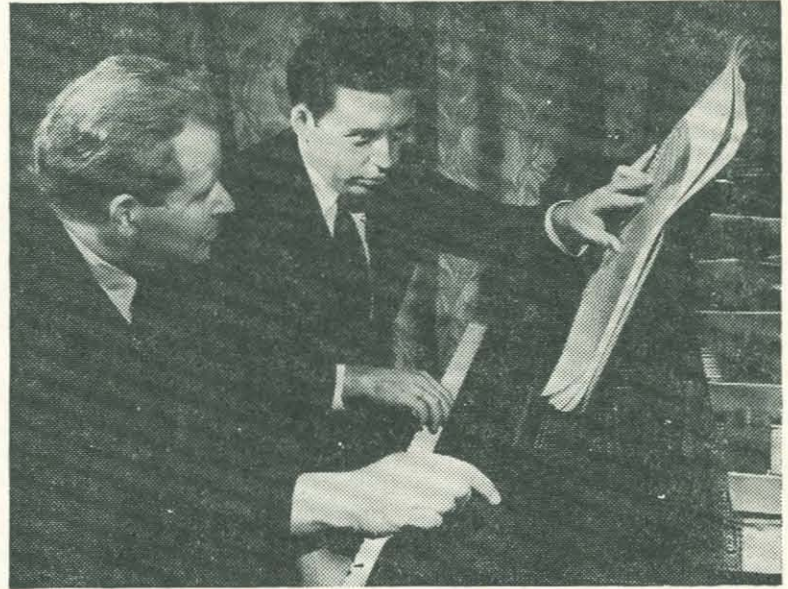

New CBC Series On Canadian Athletes

Louis Cyr was the strongest man in history, Joseph Montferrand was the boxing champion of the world, George F. Jowett was the holder of the world weight-lifting record, and the Bluenose and her famous skipper were internationally famous. To these can be added a long list of celebrated Canadian athletes. Martin Franklin, McGill University student and active athlete, is telling their stories in a new series of sport talks on the CBC Trans-Canada network, Canadian Athletes, heard at 11:15 a.m. on Sundays.

Franklin is a fourth year honor student who, besides taking an active part in campus athletics, has been writing feature articles for several years for both English and French language sports magazines, and is the author of a book on Louis Cyr.

She says that if she asks them to solve another listener's problem, scores sit right down and say what they would do. Once a woman wrote her and asked how to get rid of ants in her kitchen. She mentioned it on the air and 75 people wrote to tell her how to do it.

This is one of many points which Mrs. Hobbes will bring out when she turns the mirror on her radio audience on December 5, as the next CBC women's commentator to appear in the series, "Meet My Listeners," heard on Fridays, at 3:48 p.m.

On the air for eight years on a coast-to-coast network, Ethelwyn Hobbes has received mail from Flin Flon, Labrador, the northern American states, remote parts of Vancouver Island, fishing villages in Nova Scotia, as well as from practically every city and town in between. Many women listeners have been writing to her off and on for five or six years although she has never met them. According to her mail, her listeners also include a surprising number of men, salesmen on the road who listen to a car radio, retired men, several blind men, and men home with the flu.

## No Cinch, Running The Commonwealth

Three times in the last twenty years I have been on lecture tours in America. At almost every meeting somebody has got up to ask an unpleasant question about the British in India. Few Americans would ever believe that our reasons for being there were not entirely selfish and oppressive, or that we should ever leave the country. Well, now we have done so and some of those same Americans who criticized us for being there now criticize us because we are not there any more. . . . We promised to go, we have gone, and I believe that by going we have enormously increased our prestige not only in the United States but throughout Asia and in parts of the British Commonwealth that are approaching independence.

Again, in the case of Palestine, our present poverty has doubtless hastened our decision to leave. But the protagonists on either side refused to admit that no solution could give general satisfaction. The United Nations enquiry has proved that to be true. The anti-British propaganda carried on by Jews in the United States during the past year has been unbelievably bitter. But even among many of the Jews themselves there is anxiety because the British are no longer prepared to carry the unpleasant burden of maintaining some sort of order in a country where passions run so high.

I do not suppose there has ever been a time when so many foreigners realized that running the British Commonwealth wasn't all beer and skittles.—Vernon Bartlett, on BBC.

## The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of November 23, 1947.

### Propagation of House Plants:

To keep a collection of house plants in first class condition it is necessary to have young vigorous plants coming along to replace old plants that should be discarded. This means there is real need for a well planned program of plant propagation to provide replacements.

The following are some of the main methods in use:

(1) *Cuttings* root more readily if the air around them is full of moisture. Make a "cutting box" by means of four panes of glass stood on edge around the sides of a flat box and provide a fifth sheet as a cover. To root cuttings place them in moist sand, peat and sand (50-50) or vermiculite. Use sharp, gritty sand. Provide full drainage. Make cutting medium firm. A pot of sand with a bell-jar cover makes a good set-up for propagating small groups of cuttings. As soon as the cuttings develop roots half an inch to one inch long they should be removed from the cutting box and potted. Plants easily propagated from cuttings are: Geranium, Wandering Jew, Coeus, Patience (Impatiens) Plant, Philodendron, and English Ivy.

(2) *Leaf Cuttings* are easily rooted in the case of African violets and Ren Begonias. Insert the leaf stem of African violet in rooting medium. The new plant forms at the base of the stem. To propagate a Ren Begonia place a mature leaf upside down and make cuts in the veins just below the main vein junctions; then place the leaf right side up on the rooting medium and pin it down firmly with wire hair pins. Each leaf will produce several plantlets.

(3) "Division" is a suitable method of propagating Sansevierias—Fibrous-rooted Begonia, Aspidistras, African violets, and ferns. With a sharp knife separate a young rooted plantlet from the mother plant and pot up. Until well established the division should be kept in a moist atmosphere.

(4) *Seeds* of many house plants are obtainable. Examples of easily grown ones are: Asparagus springeri, Asparagus plumosus, Abutilon (Flowering Maple), Dracena (Cordylina indivisa), Geraniums, Begonia semperflorens.

(5) A good book on House Plants that gives full details about propagation methods is: *All About House Plants* by Montague Free, published by Doubleday & Co, 1946.

## Farm Broadcast Notes

### Poultry Grading.

Residents of Regina, Saskatoon, Moose Jaw, and Prince Albert will benefit by new regulations concerning the grading of poultry.

According to a recent order-in-council, hotels, restaurants and retail stores will be required to handle only graded poultry after January 1, 1948.

Previously, grading had applied mostly to the eastern export market and had helped build up a strong demand for Saskatchewan raised birds in Ontario and the United States.

Producers will also benefit from the maintenance of a high standard throughout the poultry industry. Broadcast of November 11.

### Comment and Criticism.

The recent lifting of ceilings on coarse grains has aroused considerable comment from western livestock producers, and their feeling of dissatisfaction and uncertainty was reflected in the poor prices at recent livestock sales. At the sales we attended, it seemed that about half the swine and a goodly percentage of the cattle passed through the sales rings without getting a bid. And in the case of the animals that were sold, most of the support came from U.S. buyers.

Coupled with this first hand experience, we have received letters and comments from Western farmers indicating that they are "going out of the livestock business" or "going out of pigs" or "going out of hens," whatever the case may be. There doesn't seem to be any doubt but that there is a sort of selling panic on among livestockmen just now—a selling panic that seems to be somewhat hasty in view of the unsettled conditions. Of course, many farmers have grown tired of the "wait and see" type of consolation they had to put up with during the war years, but agricultural authorities and the more far-sighted livestock producers urge caution at this time, rather than the wholesale dispersal of farm livestock because of the increase in coarse grain costs. . . .

In view of this threat to future livestock populations, and because of the widespread comments on the price ceiling removals, the CBC's Farm Forum period for Monday, November 24, will be given over to a discussion of the feed grain situation.

Further to the present state of livestock, the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool urged at its annual convention in Regina this week that a Royal Com-

It was with mild amazement that I heard the Minister of Finance (Hon. D. C. Abbott), say over the CBC on Monday night that Canada was far from being in the position where it is "in balance of payments difficulties because its costs and prices are at a level which does not enable it to compete in world markets." I was amazed, because I had been under the impression that our costs and prices were indeed high. You would certainly think so from the complaints of manufacturers and others during the recent strikes. It was repeated again and again at that time that strike action had pushed wage levels to fantastic heights and that prices had been forced to follow suit. But here is the Minister of Finance saying that we are far from such a position. This is good news.—H.M., Winnipeg, Man.

Preferences.

I am not very fond of male voices singing sentimental songs. They remind me very often of the bawling of a dying calf. And I do think we have too many tragic programs. As a rule, we all have enough tragedy in our lives, without getting it funnelled into our homes by the radio. . . . I can see that catering to the public without their help as to what is most wanted is rather a large order, and after all radio is rather in its infancy. . . . Even if it gave us nothing but the news it would be a great help. But I do feel that there will be a great advance in that field if we get together with the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation in the future.—Miss L. Seip, Miami, Man.

Victor Klassen and Wednesday Programs.

We—that is, my wife and I—particularly enjoyed hearing Victor Klassen. . . .
