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
## Stage 50

CBC's famous drama series resumes with ancient Greek comedy

When Stage 50 begins on Sunday September 25, the broadcast will not only mark the opening of the seventh season of our Sunday night Stages, but will also mark the first time we have attempted anything so daring as an ancient Greek comedy. The comedy is *The Birds*, written in 414 B.C. by Aristophanes, and now newly adapted for us by Lister Sinclair. Although Mr. Sinclair has been successful in his adaptations of two Greek tragedies, *Oedipus The King* and *Antigone*, even his expertness has until now hesitated before the task of making an Athenian comedy palatable to a modern audience.

However, we feel that *The Birds* will not only provide us with a suitable opener, but will also prove a genuine eye-opener to everybody who

tunes in. Mr. Sinclair has, quite properly, transferred the action from Hellas in the fifth century B.C. to Canada of today. This has been inspired by no delusion that Aristophanes can be improved, but rather that the play may have the same kind of impact upon our listeners that it had upon the audience which first saw it.

The lyrics which Mr. Sinclair has freely adapted from Aristophanes have been turned into sprightly contemporary songs by Lucio Agostini. The young men of the play, who collaborated with the birds of the air to build a Cloud-Cuckoo-Land from which all the political ills besetting our everyday world are eliminated, are (Turn to page 2)

young Canadians of today, the kind of people who are in fact constantly thinking of doing something just like that.

The second of our plays in the new *Stage 50* will be *The Fifth Column* by Ernest Hemingway. This play may seem to be about happenings which are now thoroughly out of date—perhaps, more out of date than Aristophanes. The Spanish Civil War is now thought of by most of us as a small prelude to the Second Great War. Mr. Hemingway's play is set in the Spanish Civil War. But when we hear one of Mr. Hemingway's characters say that we are in for fifty years of undeclared wars and that he has signed up for the duration, we can perhaps realize that *The Fifth Column* is not nearly so dated as we thought.

The third play, by way of contrast, takes us back to a more settled world—the world of the late eighteenth century. This play is *The Rivals* by Richard Brinsley Sheridan. Both the play and its author are among the glories of the English theatre. A comic creation like Mrs. Malaprop would be sufficient to rank any play a masterpiece. And Mrs. Malaprop is only one of the attractions in *The Rivals*.

Our fourth play will give Lucio Agostini ample opportunity to display his undoubted genius in creating exotic mood—*Salome* by Oscar Wilde. This play was originally written in French, a language with which its author liked to believe himself thoroughly familiar. Although it was later translated by his friend Lord Alfred Douglas, the play was never performed upon the English stage until about thirty years after Oscar Wilde's death, because the Lord Chamberlain held that representation of biblical characters upon the stage would offend the sensitivities of the English audience.

*Salome* is often seen on the European stage, but very seldom in Britain or in North America, except in one of its operatic forms. We hope that our broadcast of this work will make a great many people wonder why the Lord Chamberlain took the view he did.

Promised and hoped for in our season are new original plays by Lister Sinclair, Joseph Schull, W. O. Mitchell and Len Peterson. Mr. Sinclair's original is the story of the man who converted southern England to Christianity and founded the cathedral at Canterbury. The shock with which this venerable missionary discovered, when he returned to Canterbury twenty years later, that the evils he had believed eradicated after his first visit were still flourishing under a new form, constitutes the nub of this play. From W. O. Mitchell we hope to have another story of the Canadian West, which will prove a worthy successor to *The Devil's Instrument* of last year. Both Mr. Schull and Mr. Peterson are still secretive about their new plays, but their success in the past will keep our hopes high.

## TIME CHANGE

THIS WEEK sees the return to Standard Time in most parts in Canada, and CBC network schedules are correspondingly disturbed. The situation is complicated this year by the continuance of Daylight Saving Time in certain important areas in Eastern Canada.

Many changes in dates and times of programs will take place in this and some subsequent weeks. Several weeks may elapse before the networks settle down to normal. Everything possible will be done to keep CBC Times program listings up to date, but listeners are asked during this period of adjustment to pay particular attention to the lists of corrections and late program notes carried on Page 8, relating to the previous week's program lists. Errors which may creep into listings and program notes in this period will be due in the main to information received too late for inclusion. We ask our readers' patience with these. The time change is a semi-annual ordeal for CBC program planners, who must adjust network schedules affecting programs originating in all parts of the Dominion, in the United States, and elsewhere. They are working hard to overcome the difficulties.

### Barn Dance Visits Dryden, Ontario

Orchestra and soloists of the CBC's Saturday night Red River Barn Dance left Winnipeg for Dryden, Ontario, on Saturday, September 24th, for a big bang at the western Ontario town.

The barn dance program on that occasion will originate in Dryden's new Arena building, a fine structure built through the efforts of the citizens. A special entertainment organized by Eric Wild, well known CBC conductor, will be provided for Dryden people, who will also be able to hear the broadcast of the Barn Dance program.

Also at Dryden that week will be Liston Burns, of CBC International Service, who will do a special program on Dryden's paper industry.

### Junior Club Program To Begin October 1

#### New Program To Include News, Interviews And Activities Of Junior Clubs In Manitoba

For the past two years the CBC in co-operation with the Extension Service of the Manitoba Department of Agriculture has been able to broadcast news and activities of the Boys' and Girls' Clubs throughout the province. This weekly feature was broadcast each Thursday as part of the Prairie Region Farm Broadcast.

Plans have now been completed to extend this Junior Club feature to a separate fifteen-minute program to be heard on CBW each Saturday at 12:15 p.m. CST. Bob Knowles, assistant Farm Broadcast Commentator, is in charge of the program and will be heard as commentator. The first program will be broadcast on October 1.

The broadcast to be known as the Junior Club Program, will be devoted mainly to Junior Club activities in Manitoba and will include interviews and special broadcasts with as many club members as possible. It will also include reports on Club rallies, fairs and camps, and many other topics of interest to Junior Club members. The broadcast will also provide a service

to all the Junior Clubs in the province by announcing their activities, such as meetings and field trips, providing the various club secretaries forward the announcements in time for the broadcast.

It is hoped that club members, the leaders, parents and others interested in the Junior Club Program will send in regular reports of their Club activities along with ideas and suggestions for developing the program so that it may be of real service to the Junior Clubs in Manitoba.

## Chorus Important In Britten Opera Rehearsals Continuing For CBC Wednesday Night Performance Of Peter Grimes, October 12

The opera *Peter Grimes*, by Benjamin Britten, which the CBC Opera Company will perform on Wednesday Night, October 12, makes unusual demands of vocal independence on the chorus. The melodic lines and harmonies are such as are more usually found in orchestral music; not much help is given the individual singer in finding his pitch; and some of the strange harmonies make it necessary for each singer to be a rugged individualist.

Chorus rehearsals for the opera, under Richard Johnston, began in April, continued through June, and following a summer vacation, resumed again this month.

Britten's music, according to Johnston, is sometimes beautiful and sometimes ugly, but always dramatically to the point. Ugly effects are obtained by ugly sounds. To sing certain passages the chorus has had to forget its vocal lessons, for not to forget them would be dramatic suicide.

Diction is very important in this opera, where the chorus is used largely as a principal, and very infrequently as merely an accompaniment. Every word sung by the chorus must be verbally understandable and thoroughly thought out for dramatic effect.

"The music is difficult at first," Johnston says, "but when grasped, makes eminently good sense. As in the case of the piano music of Debussy and Ravel, when first written, no accepted techniques made it possible to meet their demands, but once these demands had been met, the technique — indeed, the horizon — of the piano-forte had been extended."

The rehearsal accompanists for *Peter Grimes* — valuable contributors

whose work often goes unsung — are Gordon Kushner and George Brough. The opera will be conducted by Geoffrey Waddington. Soon after the performance, Britten himself will be in Toronto, and will be heard in recital on CBC's Trans-Canada network.



"Just Mary" Back From Trip Abroad

CBC Story Teller Returns With Cornish Fairy And Lucky Coin

Back from the British Isles with a lucky farthing, some old circus books, a silver Cornish fairy, and a new fund of stories, Mary Crannan of the CBC—"Just Mary"—to thousands of very young listeners—resumes her famous Sunday series on September 25.

In London, Mary did two broadcasts for the BBC, spent a day in the children's television department, and sat in on a broadcast of the *Children's Hour*.

The CBC story-teller sailed from Canada on July 8 and made landfall first in the port of Dublin, Ireland. In Marrowbone Lane she watched for the ghost of Peg Woffington, but Peg was coy that day. In her acting heyday in the 1700's, poor Peg met her death when an enraged patron threw a rock at her during a performance.

(This was said to have given rise to the idea of the movies, for the protection of actors). Mary visited Rosemary McMaster of the Dublin Gate Players on Howth Head, heather-covered hill which juts from the Dublin coast into the Irish Sea. She also bought several books of Irish legends while in Dublin, and some old folk music, which in due course may pop up in her program.

In England, Mary visited Westminster Abbey, Hyde Park, and many other historic spots, and made a journey to Fowey in Cornwall, where the author Daphne du Maurier has her home. Here it was she encountered the *pisky*. It's a Cornish fairy, with a peaked cap and wings.

In London again, Mary met several Canadian radio players, including Bernard Braden, soon to begin stage work in a London performance of *A Street Car Named Desire*; Mrs. Braden (Barbara Kelly) and Arthur Hill (formerly of Vancouver), both now appearing in *The Male Animal* on the London stage. Another Canadian, William O'Connor, is singing a leading role in *Brigadoon*; and Gordon Tanner, former CBC sound effects man, had just returned to London after making films in Italy.

### A BOOK I LIKE

Phyllis Bentley, a well-known British novelist, will conclude this series with a talk on *How I Write a Novel*. Miss Bentley is one of the most popular speakers in Britain and an entertaining conversationalist who can talk with authority on a wide variety of subjects. She was born in Halifax, a cloth-manufacturing town in the West Riding of Yorkshire. During the First World War, she taught in the local Boy's Grammar School, and then became a secretary at the Ministry of Munitions headquarters in London. In the 1920's she classified and catalogued, single-handed, three West Riding libraries amounting in all to about 90,000 volumes. Among Miss Bentley's novels dealing with York-

shire are *Inheritance*, the story of the coming of the industrial revolution to Yorkshire; *A Modern Tragedy*, a record of the effect on a linked group of people of the hardships of the postwar slump; *Sleep in Peace*, and *Take Courage*. CARR PECKNOLD, CBC announcer stationed at Winnipeg, is a native of Edmonton, Alberta, of Irish origin. He is heard frequently in the morning newscasts from Winnipeg.

Carr left high school with a yen to follow a musical career, and for six years played sax and clarinet in dance bands about Vancouver. The war came along, and his next four years were spent with the armed forces. It was then, after leaving the forces, that radio began to beckon.

Carr's radio career began at a private station in Vancouver. Subsequently he went to the Academy of Radio Arts in Toronto for further training, and then again joined a private station in Hamilton, Ontario. He came to the CBC in July, 1948.

This CBC announcer has added steadiness, reliability and industry to his native endowment of Irish cleverness and charm. Outdoors, he likes tennis, golf, and swimming, and at home, books—chiefly current events and biographies—attract him. He has an ambition to handle actuality broadcasts for the CBC.

## Claude Champagne Named BMI Editor

Toronto—The appointment of Dr. Claude Champagne, composer and teacher of music, as editor-in-chief of Broadcast Music Incorporated, has been announced.

Broadcast Music is directed jointly by the CBC and the association of private broadcasters, and is affiliated with an organization of the same name in the United States.

Dr. Champagne, speaking of his new appointment, said he hoped to advance Canadian composers through performances of their works on radio and stage, and through publicizing them in other countries.

Dr. Champagne is at present assistant director of the Quebec Conservatory of Music and Dramatic Art, Montreal, a post which he will retain.

## Transport Minister Urges Tolerance

### North American Radio Channels Crowded By Multiplying Stations

Montreal—A crowding of North American broadcasting channels by increasing numbers of stations, calling for tolerance and goodwill for solution, was described by Hon. Lionel Chevrier, Dominion minister of transport, in an address to the third North American Regional Broadcasting conference here last week. Delegates were present from Cuba, the Dominican Republic, Haiti, Mexico, the United States, and Canada. The Canadian delegation was headed by the deputy minister of transport, C. P. Edwards.

In 1947, when the first regional conference was held, Mr. Chevrier said, there had been 1,300 stations on the continent for 107 channels. The number had now increased to 2,500 stations.

Frequency allocations and technical matters were the chief items before the conference.

*The Colour of News.*—As most of us are aware the Canadian newspapers and radio stations get their foreign news almost entirely through the Canadian Press and the British United Press, which in turn get it from the great American newsgathering association, the Associated Press and the United Press. Both of these organizations can afford to maintain worldwide and well trained staffs and as a consequence they provide a service which Canadian papers and radio stations could not afford on their own resources. It is inevitable, however, that as the largest market for their news is in the United States, and as most of their reporters are Americans, writing for that market they tend to think of world affairs in terms of American interests.—G. C. Andrew, on CBC.



## Cuckoo Clock House Says "Come On In"

Cuckoo Clock House, the popular children's program on CBC Dominion, is back on the air for the fifth season, and it's "open house" every Saturday at 5:00 p.m. CDT, 5:30 p.m. MDT. Once again the host and hostess are Kenny Graham and Beth Robinson, who conduct their young listeners through the many imaginary rooms of Cuckoo Clock House, where there's always lots to see and hear of interest to youngsters from eight to twelve.

The most popular room in the house is the Story Room, where Bill Needles, well-known Toronto radio actor, presents dramatized extracts from children's stories old and new—giving his young guests just enough about the story each week to make them want to go to their local public library and finish the book themselves. The books are carefully chosen by the staff of Boys and Girls House, which is the children's branch of the Toronto Public Library.

Each broadcast begins and ends with a visit to the music room where Don Haskett entertains with cheery songs, accompanied by Lou Snider at the novachord.

Other rooms in this intriguing house include the art gallery, where listeners have some of the world's great paintings described for them, and hear stories about their origin and the people who painted them; the workshop, a favourite place on rainy days where boys and girls can learn how to make simple, inexpensive things out of paper, cardboard or wood; the games room, where indoor amusements are suggested for after-school hours and weekends; and the library, where there is shelf after shelf of interesting books on hobbies, history, geography, travel, biographies, and many other topics.

Sometimes there is a surprise guest in one of the rooms, an expert in some field of child activity—sports, hobbies, crafts, music, art or drama—who describes his or her work.

Something new has been added to Cuckoo Clock House this year. It is a small brown mouse, known for the time being as Cuckoo Clock House mouse. This little fellow attached himself to the house during the summer, "horned in" on the fun during the first "open house" last Saturday, and decided to settle down there. Listeners are asked to send their suggestions for naming him to Cuckoo Clock House, CBC, 354 Jarvis Street, Toronto.

The series is a feature presentation of the Children's Department of the CBC. It is produced by Norbert Bauman in co-operation with the Ontario Federation of Home and School Associations. It is planned and written by Babs Brown, of Toronto, who has two youngsters of her own, and knows the sort of entertainment boys and girls like best.

A highlight of each broadcast is the opening of the Question Box, to which listeners are encouraged to send questions on any subject. The most interesting questions are read and answered on the air, and the others are answered by mail. Babs Brown spends several hours a day tracking down information for curious youngsters who ask questions about anything from the habits of polar bears to the colour of Sir John A. Macdonald's eyes!

Reid had omitted to mention that he had set the watch ahead five minutes.
