SPEECH and dramatics have been BETH LOCKERBIE's consuming interests since her girlhood days in Regina, and she wasn't far into her teens when she began applying her skill to radio work in Calgary and Winnipeg. She went to Toronto in 1946 and is currently heard as "Mom" in *Alan and Me*, and Helen Manning in *Brave Voyage*.

Beth Lockerbie, on our cover this week, has one of the warmest voices in Canadian radio, a thorough University training in speech and dramatics, and a way with children. So it is not surprising that her current activities should include the widely contrasting roles of "Mom" in the weekly family drama series *Alan and Me*, and the young heroine of the Monday-to-Friday daytime drama *Brave Voyage*.

She also appears frequently in the *Stage* series, *Buckingham Theatre* and *Ford Theatre*, and Toronto theatre-goers have seen her in the stage productions of various drama groups.

She has been interested in all phases of dramatics since her childhood in Regina, enrolling in the drama and speech course at Regina College, and continuing at Emerson College in Boston, a well-known institute for dramatic training.

Equipped with a Bachelor of Literary Interpretation diploma, she returned to the Canadian West to become director of the speech and drama department at Mount Royal College in Calgary.

There she divided her time between speech classes, stage work with amateur groups, and organizing and directing one of the first radio schools in the West.

Her next move was to Winnipeg, where she devised and directed talks and interviews, and worked as an announcer and producer. There she founded her second radio training centre—the Win-

nipeg School of Radio Dramatics—through which she produced students' radio features for three years.

For five years she conducted a program called *Women's Radio Digest*, in which she interviewed visiting celebrities, interpreted current events and magazine articles for women, and reported on club activities. She moved to Toronto in 1946.

British Firm To Equip TV Studios

CBC Places \$300,000 Order For Camera Chains and Accessories

A British firm will provide television studio equipment for CBC production centres at Montreal and Toronto, it was stated today by Donald Manson, CBC acting general manager.

As the result of tenders called for in February, the Corporation will buy over \$300,000 worth of equipment to be made by Marconi's Wireless Telegraph Company, Limited, of Chelmsford, England.

The equipment will be delivered early in 1951. It includes camera chains, control and test equipment, and accessories to equip two "live" program studios, one film projection unit, and a master control at each point. The order is being placed through the Canadian Marconi Company, which will install the equipment.

Six firms submitted tenders including two British companies, and the submission of Marconi's Wireless Telegraph Company, Limited, was the best. This television equipment, the first to be ordered by the CBC, apart from the two transmitters being provided by Canadian firms, will be made according to specifications drawn up for operation under Canadian standards and conditions.

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of April 30, 1950.

The Growing of Gladioli

Prior to 1925 relatively few gladioli were being grown in the prairie region but since then the popularity of this flower has grown by leaps and bounds. Today there are gladioli fans almost everywhere and many prairie cities have organized Gladiolus Societies affiliated with the Canadian Gladiolus Society. This year's Canadian Gladiolus Show is being held in Calgary, Alberta, August 18 and 19 under the sponsorship of the Calgary Gladiolus Society.

For the benefit of beginners, information on growing gladioli is summarized as follows:

1. *Beginners should choose early or early mid-season varieties.* Number of days from planting to blooming is an important factor in success. Late varieties must be started indoors. Visit flower shows to learn names of other good varieties.

2. *To avoid disease and thrips* buy corms from recognized and reputable sources.

3. *Good corms* are high crowned and plump. Volume rather than diameter should be considered.

4. *Soil* should be loamy, friable and rich in decayed organic matter. It must be well drained but plentifully supplied with moisture. Rotted cow manure is a good general fertilizer but must be thoroughly incorporated into the soil. Corms should not be in contact with manure. Use a moderate amount of complete fertilizer at planting time. Top dress with fine, rotted manure when plants are half grown.

5. *Plant early*, from last week of April to May 10. The soil should be up to 45° before planting.

6. *Corms should be treated* before planting to lessen chance of disease. Consult experienced growers as to the best method or write to the nearest Dominion Plant Pathological Laboratory at Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Edmonton or Lethbridge.

7. *Depth of planting* is usually three to four inches on the prairies although somewhat deeper planting may be used in warmer districts.

8. *Spacing* is important in securing good spikes of bloom. Rows 12 inches apart and corms spaced eight inches in the row are satisfactory.

9. *Cultivation for 100 per cent weed control* is essential.

10. *Gladioli require plenty of moisture* especially in August when the flower spikes commence to emerge. Get the water down under the roots. Don't sprinkle the surface. Gladioli are not drought-tolerant plants.

11. *Staking is necessary in windy country* especially since rather shallow planting is used. The best time to stake is when spikes begin to emerge.

12. *Thrips must be controlled* during the growing season. Spray regularly with DDT according to directions. Ask the nearest Dominion Entomological Laboratory at Brandon, Saskatoon or Lethbridge for guidance.

DENNY BROWN, radio editor of the Calgary Herald, is a former Winnipegger, born in London, England, who began his newspaper career on the staff of the Winnipeg Tribune. He is an all-round newspaperman, trained in every department of editorial work, but from his earliest days in Journalism he has manifested an interest in radio. Denny is probably one of the most consistent and keenest listeners in the Prairie Region, and follows network and local programs with close and sharply critical attention. He is the only Prairie Region radio editor who specializes in American radio, for which he frequently gives the Canadian product the go-by. A close follower of radio gossip from across the border, he gives his readers all the latest information about Bing Crosby's family, Bob Hope's travels, and Edgar Bergen's throat ailments. Events like CBC Wednesday Night leave him a bit cold, as evidenced by his announcement of T. S. Eliot's celebrated play on the life and death of Thomas a' Becket, *Murder in the Cathedral*, as a "murder drama." Radio-drama Notes

Catching The Mood

One of radio's assets is its power to move the emotions—particularly through drama productions. But unlike other media—the stage and the film—it must do this with sound alone. The radio-drama producer is like a conductor directing a symphony of sound involving the actors' voices, sound effects, music, and the actual space in which they all occur. Although his job is difficult, it has one great advantage over other forms of production: it gives the audience's imagination free play. In the radio producer's favour, too, is the fact that the ears are probably the most easily deceived of all the sense organs.

All a clever radio actor has to do is let a quaver come into his voice, and emit sounds of pain, and immediately to his audience, he's a suffering old man—though in reality he may be a spruce and spry twenty-five in the pink of health. All this is achieved without the aid of lights, make-up, wigs or other properties.

Each drama producer has his own

bag of tricks to help the actors feel the mood of the play. Sometimes a very rough set is constructed in the broadcasting studio—a room of certain dimensions or a succession of areas, like rooms, corridors, or open spaces through which the action extends.

Esse Ljungh of CBC Toronto once used this trick in a play concerning a hospital. He curtained off a corner of the studio for the patient's ward, and placed a microphone there. He put another microphone at the end of a long, narrow space marked off with chairs for a corridor, leaving it turned on while actors were walking down the corridor, and then switching on the ward mike when they reached it. The result, Mr. Ljungh says, was a very convincing effect of space.

When the script involves a scene at a bridge table, Mr. Ljungh finds that if often sounds more realistic if the actors actually sit around a table, with the microphone on a boom overhead. The same applies to breakfast scenes, in which a script may be propped against a teapot as if it were the morning paper; and when the actors rise, they can push their chairs away from the table with a realistic scraping.

In a kitchen scene in *Juno and the Paycock*, a CBC Wednesday Night production last year, Mr. Ljungh arranged to have sausages cooked beside the microphone when the script called for the sound of sizzling. The actors said afterwards that they were helped greatly (though in a most tantalizing way) by the smell and the sound.

Mr. Ljungh feels that a script can be a handicap to an actor—keeping his mind on turning pages and reading lines may detract from a natural interpretation. Several years ago, when he was producing in the CBC Winnipeg studios, he gave his cast a taste of what it will be like working in television. He required the actors to memorize their lines, keeping their scripts handy for self-prompting. The scene involved a chess game between a criminal and a detective, and doing away with scripts greatly improved the timing.

Not Sentimental About Battleships.

I see where some radio speaker has been getting sentimental about the old Aquitania liner, and a while before they were weeping over a bunch of old battleships that had been sent to the scrapheap. Well, it's O.K. about the liner, which may have been some use, but as for the battleships, I say the heck with them. The thing is ridiculous. Next thing, you'll have somebody mooning over the remains of an exploded H-bomb. For me, they can keep that stuff. I have no sentimental feelings about battleships or H-bombs. All I want is never to see or hear about either of them again. And that goes for aeroplanes and tanks and submarines and all the rest of their war-making rubbish. I'd rather get sentimental about an old disc-harrow.—S. M. McR., Saskatoon, Sask.

School Broadcasts

In the scripts commissioned for School Broadcasts I detect from time to time a tendency for the mere facts relating to a given subject to leap into undue prominence. In other words, a tendency for certain School Broadcasts to duplicate a job which can be done quite well by a mediocre textbook or a mediocre teacher. Now surely radio should be employed rather with an eye to the peculiar, the unique contribution it can make to the educational process. It is a contribution of the greatest importance; for radio, through good scripts ably performed and produced, can teach by emotional impact lessons that can never be taught in the schools. The moral? Don't let scripts bog down in an excess of routine facts; let radio have its head, let it stimulate the imagination; let it do what it can do uniquely and so well.—Robert Mac-Dougall, on CBC.
