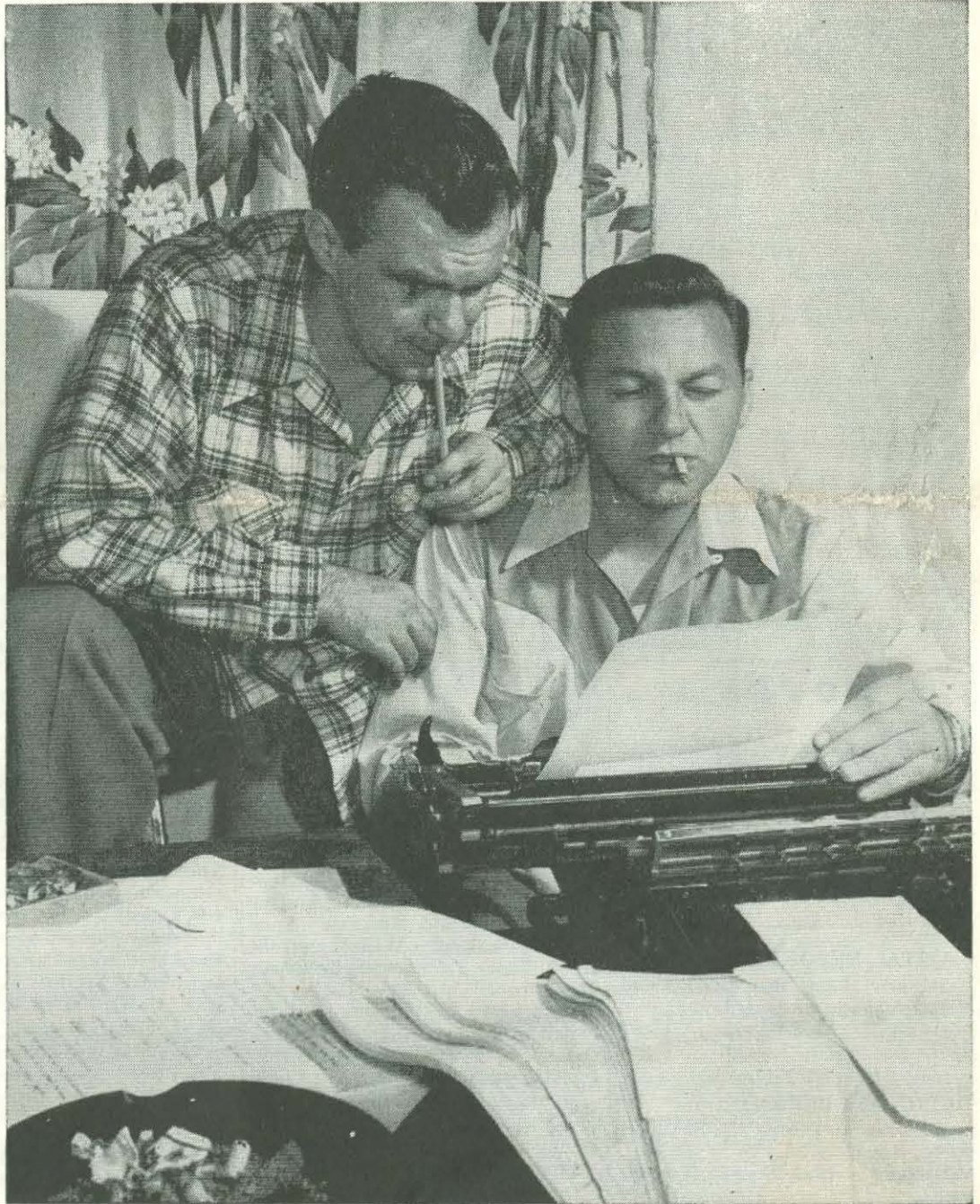
LAUGHS don't often just happen—you have to work for them, and JOHNNY WAYNE and FRANK SHUSTER know that as well as anybody. This photograph shows them hard at it in the special den Frank has fixed up at his home in Toronto, where most of the work is done. They write their own scripts, always keeping at least two weeks ahead of the game. Each Friday they complete a draft script which, with a multitude of revisions and additions, will be used on their Thursday show thirteen days later. On Thursday afternoon the scheduled script starts coming to life in rehearsal. The pressure mounts from then until broadcast time, and when the show finally goes on the air the script contains a mass of pencilled changes. The general excitement is carried over right into the broadcast, and the boys pick up many a laugh over their difficulty in following its hieroglyphics. The May 18th broadcast will be the 150th *Wayne and Shuster Show* and, to mark the occasion, CBC producer Jackie Rae has written a little tribute which follows:

#### **Four Years With Wayne and Shuster**

Four years ago Johnny Wayne, Frank Shuster and I, were invited to attend a party at the home of a mutual friend. We had known one another before, but not well. I had seen and admired their work in the entertainment field, they knew of my

vaudeville background, and we had met the odd time.

I mention this particular night because it was then and there that Johnny and Frank asked me to join them as producer of their soon-to-begin series of radio shows. We've been working together since then, and indeed it has been a wonderful education for me, and so much fun.

It has been a great experience keeping up with the pace set by their energy and drive, their tremendous capacity for work, and their knowledge of show-business "know-how." And it really has been a lot of fun. Both Johnny and Frank, especially at rehearsals, are unpredictably funny—even to me, and I've been one of their most constant fans for four years now. Summary of Broadcast of May 7, 1950.

Problems in the Vegetable Garden—(Continued from April 23).

1. Crops should be rotated to help in controlling insects and diseases and to vary the demands crops make on soil fertilizer. Alternate shallow and deep-rooted crops. Suggested rotations: Potatoes, carrots and beets followed by spinach, peas, beans and corn.

2. In farm gardens, and in all gardens if feasible, have at least two garden areas for alternate cropping. Manure should be added in the summer-fallow years and a green crop ploughed under in the fall.

3. In small gardens succession cropping is worth while. Tomatoes may follow radishes, spinach, and leaf lettuce.

4. Comparison cropping in small gardens saves space. Example: Head lettuce set between late cabbage.

5. Make a planting timetable. Cool weather crops can be sown safely between April and May 15, but frost-tender crops must not be seeded until danger of frost is over. Examples: Sow carrots May 1 to May 15 and cucumber May 24 to June 15, depending on local weather probabilities.

6. Setting out plants:  
(a) Hardier plants in a cold frame for a week or ten days.

(b) Set out in moisture.

(c) Plant on cloudy days or towards evening of sunny days.

(d) Use dwarf sturdy plants rather than tall, overgrown ones.

Our rehearsals are very relaxed—yet each member of the Wayne and Shuster Show—Terry Dale, Herb May, Eric Christmas, Dick Nelson, Johnny Dobson, Don Bacon, Dave Tasker and Samuel Hensenhoren and the orchestra—is extremely intense and conscientious in his or her contribution to the success of the show. In my capacity as producer of the Wayne and Shuster Show, I have come to know Johnny and Frank pretty well, and it has been a pleasure to work with them. They have no temperament—just talent.

## Many Honours For CBC At Columbus

### Corporation Scores Again At American Radio Institute

On May 1 it was announced that Canadian Broadcasting Corporation programs had again won honours in competition with the four American networks at the annual exhibition of the Institute for Education by Radio, conducted by Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio.

CBC programs won a total of thirteen awards, placing second to NBC. CBC received five first awards and three honourable mentions for drama, public affairs and children's programs and for national school broadcasts; a special award for the Wednesday Night program; and special commendation for a series of Bible stories for children.

In addition, CBC and the Ontario Department of Education won a first award for a regional school broadcast. Two honourable mentions went to the Toronto Junior League for a broadcast series produced in co-operation with the CBC on CBL, Toronto, and to the British Columbia Department of Education and the CBC for another regional school broadcast.

One of the perennial winners at the exhibition is the Sunday night *Stage* series, produced by Andrew Allan with music by Lucio Agostini, which again won a first award.

In the classification of public affairs drama, the first award went to the series *In Search of Citizens*, produced by the CBC in co-operation with the Dominion government and the Ontario Department of Education, which dramatized the problems faced by new Canadians in adapting themselves to their new surroundings. Scripts were by George Salverson, with production by Esse Ljungh.

Another program produced by Mr. Ljungh which also won a first award was the public affairs feature *In Search of Ourselves*, produced in co-operation with the Canadian Mental Health Association. Both these pro-

The first award in the children's program classification went to the CBC network feature *Cuckoo Clock House*, written by Babs Brown and produced by Norbert Bauman, in co-operation with the Canadian Federation of Home and School. Honourable mention was given to Mary Grannan's series *Maggie Muggins*.

Another honourable mention was awarded to the series "Cross Section," produced by Charles Harris.

A special classification was given to CBC's national school broadcasts because there is no similar service in the United States. The judges singled out for a first award the series "This is Newfoundland," written by Orlo Miller and produced by Kay Stevenson. *Children of the Commonwealth*, a national school broadcast series of exchange programs among Canada, Great Britain, Australia and New Zealand, was given honourable mention.

The CBC shared with the Ontario Department of Education a first award for the school broadcast *Children of Other Lands* written by Fern Rahmel; and with the British Columbia Department of Education an honourable mention for the program *My Neighbour and Me*.

Special commendation was awarded a Bible story program which replaced *Way of the Spirit* last summer, written by W. J. Dunlop and produced by Rupert Caplan.

The special award given by the judges to the CBC Wednesday Night program was for its "courageous experiments with radio themes, techniques and writing, and for the excellence of its music and production."

## Atmosphere Of Night In Whitteker Show

"They say when there's a mist around the moon your ears will hear anything you choose." With these words CBC announcer John Rae invites Dominion network listeners each Thursday at 7:30 p.m. MDT, to share the musical interpretation of a night mood in the program *Moon Mist*. Written and produced by Byng Whitteker, *Moon Mist* follows the tradition of his earlier productions—*Starlight*, *Moods*, *Flavoured with Flute*, and *My Lady's Name*—by presenting unusual combinations of music and sound to evoke a particular mood.

The atmosphere of "mist around the moon" is created by a group which includes a harp and native bongos, under the direction of Cliff McKay. ### Comparisons

## Family Comedies—Canadian and U.S.

The CBC Dominion network carries two programs Sunday afternoons—one from Toronto and the other from New York—about as similar as any two programs could be in theme, but as different as any in presentation. In this corner's opinion the Canadian effort is the best (sic) program hands down.

The Toronto presentation is a family comedy known as Alan and Me. The American relay is The Aldrich Family, also a so-called family comedy.

It so happens Ray Darby's Canadian scripts are so plausible they are funny without the listener straining his imagination. Elliott Collins and Alene Kamins, as Alan and Me, are an understandable brother and sister team, with Beth Lockerbie and John Drainie as their parents. The scripts and the characters are so natural they can't help but be amusing.

The Aldrich Family, on the other hand, becomes so involved with impossible situations the program obviously is a radio fake. Even the characters, Ezra Stone, now nearing middle age but who still plays Henry Aldrich, and Jack Kelk who squeaks through the role of Homer, are only as funny as their crackling voices make them sound.

The Aldrich Family is an oldtimer on the networks but its humor doesn't match that of the Clay family of Alan and Me, largely because the Canadian author finds fun in everyday happenings without reaching into the realm of imaginative make-believe.

On the other hand, Canada's leading drip drama, John and Judy, is no better than any of its American counterparts. The only point in the Canadians' favour is that what is done once a week the Americans manage to spread out through five days.—Denny Brown, in Calgary Herald.

times, a long, long way. It started some 197-198 years ago, in the years 1751-53. Two hundred families came to Nova Scotia from Hanover, Germany, and several from Switzerland. Most of them hailed from Lunenburg in Hanover, and thus we have the name Lunenburg today. They settled down the coast from Halifax, about 60 miles down. In Nova Scotian terms, this is called the South Shore. It is a compact area, with little harbours tucked along the shore and farmlands running inland. You can always identify one of these Lunenbergs by his family name—Knickle, Zwicker, Ernst, Crouse, Walters, Rhuland, Hirtle, Lohnes, Eisnor, Corkum, Zinck, Backman, and so on.

Maritimers frequently and erroneously refer to them as Dutchmen. It is a mistake because these people are as Canadian as the Maple Leaf. They have been living and building here for nearly 200 years. They have done more to promote and honour the name Bluenose than any other community. They came here as farmers but in a few generations they turned the tables and gave the world a great lesson in how to sail, build ships and wrest a living from the sea. Their schooners are claimed to be among the most practical and finest in the world. This was the home port to the most famous fishing schooner in North America—the Bluenose. The town of Lunenburg claims still to be home to the biggest fishing fleet in all North America. Out of here sail the trawlers and schooners, far out to the Grand Banks, down to the West Indies and far up the coast. They are deep sea fishermen, who daily, year in and year out must face the dreadful perils of the sea. And sometimes the toll is heavy. These people who know the discipline of the sea, who know the strength of unity among the crew, have carried over these traits and made them a part of their own lives. I have never seen a Canadian community more orderly and with such automatic discipline as I saw in Lunenburg. They have mastered the art of working together.—John Fisher, on BBC.

### Kurt Weill

A composer of genius was lost to the American scene with the death in New York on April 3 of Kurt Weill, whose radio opera, *Down in the Valley*, was performed on CBC Wednesday Night February 1 by a chorus and orchestra conducted by Eric Wild from Winnipeg.

Weill, at 50, had produced an extraordinary succession of musical hits, including *The Knickerbocker Holiday*, *Lady In the Dark*, *One Touch of Venus*, and *Street Scene*. At the time of his death he was working on a musical version of Mark Twain's *Huckleberry Finn*. His music, while generally light, was faultless in technique and melodically interesting. He made clever use of American folk tunes in *Down in the Valley*. Weill was a native of Germany, and came to America in 1935.
