### *Special Events*

"Showing one end of Canada to the other and both ends to the middle."

That's how A. E. Powley of Toronto sums up the idea behind his work in planning and arranging special events broadcasts for the CBC. The actuality broadcast, he points out, is one of radio's unique talents. The CBC exploits it extensively—during the summer more than in any other season—"to seek out and bring to the Canadian audience by means of on-the-spot description happenings and customs and places that go to make up the Canadian scene.

Actuality programs (most important of which is *Saturday Magazine* on the Trans-Canada network) Powley says are based on the idea that the Canadian scene is so wide and varied as to be full of materials of interest to listeners across the country. The exchange of actuality program material is carried out every week on a nation-wide basis—each Saturday afternoon (in the program starting at 2:03-1:03 p.m.) there are at least two and sometimes as many as five "pickups" from widely-separated points.

Taking July 15 as an example: on this occasion *Saturday Magazine* will last for three hours and

will visit five places for eye-witness reports on important summer outdoor events. From Saskatoon there will be a commentary on the Willingdon Cup and Canadian Junior Golf Championships; from St. Catharines, Ontario, an account of a soap-box derby; from Hamilton, a broadcast from the scene of the Canadian Track and Field Championships; from Montreal, a commentary on the run-

ning of the Quebec King's Plate; and from Calgary, sounds and voices at the famous Stampede.

At certain times, as on July 15, the emphasis falls heavily on sport. But over the summer period, *Saturday Magazine* and other programs take in the widest possible range of scene and event. Already this season the Saturday (Turn to page 5)



CBC Truest Approach To Freedom, Calgary Forum Delegate Asserts

National Farm Forum Representatives Assemble at Brandon for Annual Conference

BRANDON, MANITOBA — "We have come to look upon our CBC as the truest approach to freedom of expression that we have in Canada," James McFall, delegate from Calgary, Alberta, told a meeting of the National Farm Radio Forum in the Brandon city hall, June 23. More than 100 delegates from all parts of Canada

except Newfoundland attended the conference.

Mr. McFall spoke in the course of a discussion on Farm Forum broadcast topics, as outlined by A. R. Kemp, CBC supervisor of Farm Broadcasts. Topics dealing with farm economy, rural health, rural education, and soil conservation were discussed among others. CBC farm commentators from the Maritimes, Quebec, Ontario, the Prairie Provinces, and British Columbia attended the conference. A meeting of the Manitoba Federation of Agriculture was also held in Brandon during the week, and among the addresses at the Forum conference was one on relations between the Forum and the Federation by R. L. Stutt, Saskatchewan delegate.





Fall's remarks were made on the second day, following a debate of extraordinary vivacity on the opening day, during which Supervisor Kemp became the centre of a discussion which constituted a remarkable demonstration of the vigorous spirit of the Farm Radio Forums. Debate centred about the comparative merits of discussion and dramatized broadcasts, and demonstrated a resolve on the part of delegates that issues vital to Canadian agriculture should have the fullest expression through national radio. Kemp replied that the CBC was ready to carry broadcasts on any subject brought up by the Forums, no matter how controversial, but had found through past experience that it was difficult to find speakers ready to address the national audience on some of these subjects.

In the matter of drama versus discussion, a compilation of weekly reports from Forums showed one drama program rated the best of the season with 86% of the forums giving it top classification. Seventy-three per cent of Forums had rated all the drama programs as "good," in reports cataloguing programs as "good," "fair," and "poor." The most recent questionnaire on the subject taken by the CBC had favoured dramatized programs.

A demand for more "punch" in Farm Forum broadcasts came from James Davidson of Quebec, who thought the CBC's Citizen's Forum broadcasts were dealing more vigorously with controversial subjects. Several delegates, following Mr. Davidson, urged that Forums should not stop at discussion, but when conclusions had been reached, should follow them up with energetic action. If the Forums could not exert pressure and could not take sides, then they could do nothing.

This view was opposed by Mr. McFall, by R. L. Stutt, and by Floyd Griesbach, national secretary of the Forum. Mr. McFall said the national radio system should be untainted by bias. It offered the widest freedom of speech and gave fair representation to all shades of opinion. That was something to be cherished and preserved. Forums might mill over topics and produce all available information on them, but action on their conclusions was the business of other farm organizations.

Mr. Griesbach said that the Forums might discover pressures and bring them out into the open, but could not become pressure groups themselves. Their business was to bring out the facts.

Mr. Stutt declared that the Farm Radio Forum and the national radio

constituted one of the great institutions in Canada for the development of human personality. Nothing else was so valuable in developing people's views, and giving them the ability to express them.

Other discussions during the conference dealt with rural education and the question of federal grants in this connection. Education in citizenship was urged, and the suggestion was made that Canadian children were not being made sufficiently proud of their homeland.

Special attention was directed by Manitoba delegates to floods as a factor in the problem of soil conservation. No conservation program, it was agreed, could ignore floods.

assistant, Ontario; Marc Peron, assistant farm commentator, Quebec; Lamont Tilden, market commentator, Montreal; Peter Whittall, farm commentator, and R. G. Knowles and Al Richardson, assistants, Prairie Region; and Tom Leach, farm commentator, British Columbia.

Discussions dealt with all phases of farm broadcast work, which includes contributions to the National Farm Radio Forum. Daily farm broadcasts in all regions, which include market reports, agricultural news, information on farming methods and practices, daily sketches in which useful information is conveyed, and commentaries and interviews on all phases of farming technique, were reviewed at length.

Visiting commentators were the guests of the Prairie Region farm staff at a banquet at Lower Fort Garry, last surviving relic of the fur-trading days, on the bank of the Red River 20 miles below Winnipeg. Food-stuffs from all parts of the Dominion brought specially by the commentators, were served—scallops from Newfoundland, lobsters from the Maritimes, maple products from the Oka Monastery in Quebec, strawberries and cheese from Ontario, Winnipeg goldeyes and choice beefsteaks from the Prairies, and oysters and apple juice from British Columbia.

As a delightful conclusion to their conferences, the commentators visited the farm of Mr. Thomas R. Wilson, at Oakville, Manitoba, fifty miles west of Winnipeg, where they had lunch with Mr. and Mrs. Wilson and family, and inspected Mr. Wilson's 900-acre farm and beautiful gardens, at this season alive with blossoming shrubs and flowers. This large farm, operated with the aid of the latest in modern agricultural machinery by Mr. Wilson, his two sons, and one assistant, proved of keen interest to the visiting commentators.

## The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of July 1, 1950. July work in the Garden

1. *Summer clean-up* of weeds to prevent seeding is one of the most important July jobs—not only those interfering with garden crops but also those in adjacent areas. Every weed destroyed before shedding seeds means hundreds of next year's weeds taken care of.

2. *Mulching* flower beds and garden crops to keep soil cool and conserve moisture pays good dividends. Use peat moss mixed wet with rotted manure or chopped straw or hay.

3. *Dig tulips* as soon as tops ripen. Place bulbs in trays in warm, dry shade for ripening. Re-plant in September.

4. *Sow seed of head lettuce* for a September crop.

5. *Kill dandelions and weeds* in the lawn with 2,4-D.

6. *Check gladioli*. Dig up and burn yellow, stunted plants. Spray with tartar emetic or floral DDT to keep thrips under control. Keep ground in gladioli plot moist. Mulch with peat moss and manure.

7. *Order iris, peonies, lilies and other perennials* now for delivery when ready to transplant.

8. *Prune spring flowering shrubs* to tidy form. In pruning lilacs avoid pruning out next year's flowering stems which develop from point immediately behind location of this year's flowers.

9. *Tidy up the perennial border*. Clip dead flowers from spring flowering plants such as golden alyssum and trim plants to tidy form. Stake delphiniums.

10. *Go visiting*—experimental farms, public parks and neighbour's gardens, to gather new ideas and to share garden knowledge with others.

## Mail Bag

Likes Miss Mosdell.

In the matter of dramatic and musical criticism Miss Mosdell (June 11, *Critically Speaking*), is the answer to the listener's prayer. . . . Miss Mosdell dismissed as irrelevant the nationality of an author or composer, merit alone being the test for acceptance or rejection. Very properly she said Canadian work should receive recognition only when it could stack up with the best and most enduring work of all nationalities in all ages. On this basis the Canadian quota for music and drama would be very small indeed. Yet we are told (*Times*, June 2), that 269 of 294 CBC plays in the past year were by Canadians. That is a damning admission and gives point to Miss Mosdell's criticism. Her reference to a great deal of it as "tripe" shows integrity and courage. She should have a chance as a critic of music and drama on Sundays.

"Tripe" is bad, but far worse are intellectual prostitution and charlatanism, and that is what peddling "tripe" as caviare amounts to. . . . In drama, contrast the record of the NBC Theatre, which since its inception has produced over 100 outstanding plays.—B. Barrow, Million, Man.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Our correspondent's unusual point of view, which appears to question the propriety of a Canadian radio system's specializing in Canadian drama, will doubtless provoke some response from other readers of the TIMES. There should, however, be no misunderstanding with regard to the CBC's broadcasting Canadian plays to the exclusion of others. In the TIMES article of June 2, mentioned by our correspondent, reference is also made to plays from South Africa, Australia, New Zealand, the British West Indies, the United Kingdom and the United States—not to mention a regular contributor in Cairo, Egypt. An important reservation is also made in the case of CBC Wednesday Night, which has shown great catholicity of taste in drama. The moth-eaten suggestion which our correspondent advances as to the immense and inevitable superiority of United States plays has become monotonous through repetition, and produces in us a sensation similar to the dull thud of the terminal preposition with which the penultimate sentence of his communication ends.)
