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OUR cover photograph this week was taken on the Isle of Barra off the west coast of Scotland. It shows an English film crew at work on an outdoor set for the movie *Tight Little Island*, which has been showing recently in Canadian theatres. The occasion is a special broadcast series which the BBC has prepared for Canadian listeners describing and explaining, from start to finish, how a film is made. Arrangements for the program were made by the CBC's Gerald Pratley and it will be heard, starting this Tuesday, in the period normally occupied by *The Movie Scene*.



How a Film Is Made

The following article has been contributed by the BBC producer DEREK HOLROYDE, who supervised the production of the series *A Film Is Made*:

"How is a film really made?"—this was the question I put to Dr. Roger Manvell, director of the British Film Academy, in April of this year. Listeners to *The Movie Scene* will be able to hear the answer in the series of seven feature programs entitled *A Film Is Made*, to be broadcast through October and November—on the CBC Dominion network at 8:15 p.m. each Tuesday, starting October 10.

To ensure absolute authenticity throughout, Thorold Dickinson, one of Britain's outstanding film directors (responsible for such films as *Men of Two Worlds* and *The Queen of Spades*), was brought in to collaborate with Manvell on the script. He plays the part of the director in the series, and further, to get the producer's point of view accurately expressed, John Sutro, who has produced *49th Parallel*, *Men of Two Worlds* and many other successful British movies, was also called in.

The series tells the whole story of a film production from its original planning, financing, selection of cast, scenic designing, shooting on location and on the studio floor, to its editing, addition of music, and its premiere and reception by the critics. One of the most fascinating aspects of the series is that the "film" being made, an adaptation of *The Torrents of Spring*, a story by Ivan Turgenev,

is, in fact, a picture that Thorold Dickinson and John Sutro have always wanted to make, and so the problems that have to be faced, and the solutions found for them, are genuine, just as their enthusiasm for it is quite real. Everyone concerned in the production of these programs, from cast to recording engineers, was clearly inspired by this same enthusiasm, and I hope that the result is to (Turn to page 4)

"Stage 51" Begins

Producer Andrew Allan discusses his plans for the new season

The first broadcast in the eighth season of Sunday night *Stages* will occupy the Trans-Canada network on Sunday, October 8 (W-8:00, K, X-9:00 p.m.), according to Andrew Allan, CBC Supervisor of Drama and producer of this famous series.

From Laurence Housman's two fat volumes of plays on the life of the great Queen, Mr. Allan said, John Bethune has made a selection for October 8 under the title, *The Young Victoria*, taking the story from the schooling of the young Princess before 1837 to the death of Prince Albert in 1861. For the second week (October 15), Mr. Bethune, under the title, *The Widow of Windsor*, has completed the story through the two Jubilees and the long gladiatorship of Disraeli and Gladstone. Although many who enjoyed Helen Hayes in the stage version of *Victoria Regina* some years ago, will recognize some of the episodes, so vast is the mine of Mr. Housman's material that much will be new, wrought throughout with the

charm and humanity which makes this writer so irresistible.

Choosing a play to represent each of our twentieth-century decades was bound to result in choices which to some people would seem arbitrary, Mr. Allan said, but, for good or ill, the choices had finally to be made.

The Diary of a Nobody, he continued, which will represent the pre-1914 period, is a comic work from the pages of *Punch*, written by the brothers Grossmith, both of whom made their living on the stage rather than by literature: but, as one critic has said, "the fact remains . . . that a large area of English social life is painted in this book more faithfully and fully than anywhere else." Although the work is actually five years older than our century, the story of bumbling, respectable, little Mr. Pooter of Brickfield Terrace, of his wife Carrie and his dreadful son Lupin, is really the story of all the bowler-hatted clerks whose world the First World War transmogrified forever.

chosen for the prewar period, it seemed fitting to submit a German story for the war period—the choice falling on Erich Maria Remarque's *All Quiet on the Western Front*.

For the Twenties, Mr. Allan said, we have selected an adaptation of an American work, Sinclair Lewis's fictional definition of the middle-west in the boom years, *Main Street*. For the depression decade we return to England, more especially to Lancashire. The play is Walter Greenwood's honest picture of the horrors of the hand-out and the courage of ordinary people in the net of an irresponsible society. *Love on the Dole* is a lot more than thirty years from the world of Charles Pooter.

The re-emergence of the Individual in a world-society bent on self-destruction is the theme for the 1940's, and the play for the purpose is a

portray the British approach to the making of a film at its best. The difficulties of finance, of working on location in a foreign country (this in a quite startling way!), and of editing the film are all given their place, and Roger Manvell, who is the "Visitor" in each program, is there to ask questions and explain the more visual aspects of the production as it goes along.

The Torrents of Spring is the story of a young Russian landowner, Dmitri Sanin, who, while returning from a holiday in Italy via Frankfurt, meets there, and falls in love with, a beautiful young Italian girl, Gemma, in her mother's confectionery shop. In his search for a purchaser of his estate in Russia, which he must sell so as to have sufficient money to marry Gemma, he meets an old school friend whose wife, Maria, a siren with compelling eyes, ensnares him and carries him off to Paris so that he never sees Gemma again.

The handling of this apparently

unsatisfactory story forms part of the series, and shows Thorold Dickinson's ingenuity as a director. So as to present fairly the views of typical British film producers and directors, the views expressed in these programs by John Sutro and Thorold Dickinson do not necessarily always represent their personal opinions.

All those concerned in the film industry in Britain are very appreciative of the warm reception accorded to British films in Canada, particularly since the war, and we should like to think that this series of programs is a tribute to those who have shown such interest in Britain's contribution to the movie scene.

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of October 1, 1950.

This talk was a "success story" dealing with the gardening experiences of the Andersons of Lone Rock, Saskatchewan, whose gladioli entries at the Canadian Gladioli Show in Calgary in August were among the chief winners, being awarded five firsts, one second, one third, and both the Groff Trophy and the Scales Challenge Cup.

The Andersons, living in a dry area subject to frost, have become outstanding gardeners. They have developed fine shelterbelts, built up a dugout water supply, built small propagating houses at little expense in cash, and by hard work and intelligent planning to overcome difficulties, have shown what can be done in a small village.

What the Andersons have done, others can do. You too, can have a "green thumb," if you will face up to your gardening problems. Success is based on hard work and intelligent solving of problems. The "will to do" is a bigger factor leading to good results than a "green thumb."

School Broadcast Executive Meeting

Vancouver. — Educators from four provinces meet in the Empress Hotel, Victoria, October 3, to discuss educational radio broadcasts at a meeting of the executive committee of the National Advisory Council on School Broadcasting. Dr. W. P. Percival, Director of Protestant Education, Quebec Department of Education is chairman. Members are Philip J. Kitley, Director of School Broadcasts, British Columbia Department of Education; J. W. Grimmon, Director of Audio-Visual Education, Ontario Department of Education; R. J. Hickey, Director of Audio-Visual Education, New Brunswick Department of Education; and R. S. Lambert, Supervisor of Educational Broadcasts, Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, Toronto.

The National Advisory Council assists the CBC in planning national school broadcasts, heard once a week on the Corporation's networks. Provincial school broadcasts, carried four days a week on the CBC, are planned directly between the Corporation and the provincial departments of education.

Bruno Schmidt

Prominent Winnipeg 'Cellist Dies; Distinguished Career

Winnipeg musical circles generally, and CBC musicians in particular, were saddened last week by the death of a popular and highly-esteemed member, Bruno Schmidt, first 'cellist of the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra and frequent performer on CBC networks.

A musician and artist to the fingertips, and a charming and warmly-human personality, Mr. Schmidt had endeared himself to many in the city where he had lived for nearly twenty years. He was a man of wide interests, apart from music, and a constant student in many subjects. His delight in the literature, and particularly the poetry of his native Caucasus, was a marked characteristic.

Mr. Schmidt studied 'cello in Moscow with Gliere at the Imperial Music Society, simultaneously with a course in architecture at Moscow University. He was appointed 'cellist with the Kharkov Symphony Orchestra under Nicolai Malke and Alexander Stalin. Later he continued his studies at Frankfort-on-Main, and toured Europe with the Krause String Quartet. He came to Canada in 1923, and lived in Vancouver and Saskatoon before moving to Winnipeg in 1931.

The funeral took place at the Schoenwie Mennonite Church, Rev. J. J. Schultz officiating, assisted by Rev. Gerald Burch of St. Luke's Anglican Church.

Cross Section

CBC Series Resumes Oct. 12

Cross Section, which has won prizes in the Canadian Radio Awards competition for two successive years, is a CBC public affairs feature of special interest to the business world and the labour movement of Canada. Both groups take a hand in planning it, and representatives of both are frequently heard on its programs (Thursdays, Dominion, 9:30 p.m. MST, beginning October 12).

Plans for the 1950-51 season are nearly complete. They got under way last June at a conference of CBC officials and representatives of the Trades and Labour Congress, the Canadian Congress of Labour, the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

High on the list of all parties was a program on industrial pensions and old-age security. Other topics proposed for 1950-51 were seasonal employment, industrial relations, labour-management co-operation, and two programs dealing once again with the aims and objectives of business and labour.

The first three programs form a series covering three important aspects of eastern Canadian economy. On October 12, an economic survey of Newfoundland, by Roy Wolfe of Toronto; October 19, a survey of Canada's potential iron-ore empire in the Labrador area; and October 26, "The St. Lawrence Seaway—an Unfinished Story"—the two last by Henry Seyward of Montreal. Topics for later programs include international trade and Alberta's oil developments.

Cross Section in its present form was first broadcast in 1948. The original series began with an economic survey of Canada by such speakers as Arthur MacNamara, Deputy Minister of Labour; Geldard Bridgen, Canadian Manufacturers' Association; Eamon Park, United Steelworkers of America; and Graham Towers, Bank of Canada. Programs on social security, education, rent control, the world food crisis, Canada's trade problems, were presented during the year. One script *Labour and the Communist Question*, carried off a prize in the Canadian Radio Awards competition.

During the 1949-50 season, *Cross Section* broadened its field to include the social sciences. Progress on alcoholism, practical education, and juvenile delinquency, were presented and the response from listeners showed that they favoured the variety.

Last year, *Cross Section* won a double prize in the Canadian Radio Awards for two scripts—on the economic status of women and the story of an industrial dispute.

For the first two seasons, *Cross Section* was produced by Charles Harris, recently-appointed special

assistant to Fergus Muir, Director of Television for the CBC in Toronto. This year the producer will be E. S. Hallman of the CBC talks department, who wrote many successful radio scripts on social issues before joining the CBC staff a few months ago.

Talent Prospects

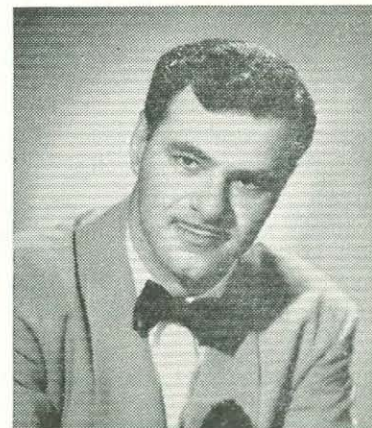
Toronto—Back to Toronto from a flying tour of western Canadian centres, H. G. Walker, manager of the CBC Dominion network, said representatives of service clubs and business organizations in Winnipeg, Regina, Edmonton and Vancouver had been told about what the CBC would like to be able to do, in the way of encouraging home-grown talent through the series *Opportunity Knocks*.

The purpose of the trip, on which Mr. Walker was accompanied by Geoffrey Waddington, CBC music adviser, was to enquire about the possibility of setting up audition panels in the four western cities and finding local backing which would enable artists chosen by them to travel to Toronto and compete on *Opportunity Knocks*. Contest sessions of the program are broadcast each Monday at 8:00 p.m. MST on the CBC Dominion network.

Opportunity Knocks entered its twelfth cycle of thirteen broadcasts on September 18. The winner of each series has received a contract for a broadcast series. The program also incorporates a competition for announcers and a showcase for new works by Canadian composers.

At present the program is broadcast from the stage of Shea's Theatre in Toronto. The talent expert and conductor and arranger is John Adaskin.

Hour and Half-Hour.—As in literature there is a place for the short story alongside the novel, so too in radio can the half-hour play exist with the one-hour or two-hour feature.—Peter McDonald, CBC producer.
