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IT takes plenty of people to put on a big network show—and that's what *Startime* is. Seen here during a broadcast are the *Startime* chorus, soloists, conductor Paul Scherman and most of the orchestra, in the CBC's concert studios in Toronto. Behind the scenes are the producer and the studio technicians—not to mention the many scores of line company and radio station workers who are on point duty to signal the program to its destinations all across the country.



### *Canadian Music Abroad*

(Condensed from the August, 1950, bulletin of the Department of External Affairs)

The increased knowledge of Canadian music abroad during the last five years may be attributed to at least three causes: the common experience of the Second World War shared by the peoples of the western world; the desire of many Canadian musicians to gain recognition abroad; and the fact that the overseas broadcasting policies of the CBC International Service have made Canadian music better known in foreign lands. . . .

Canadian composers and performers were anxious to make the most of the opportunity offered them after the war to establish reputations for themselves in Europe. Probably the most salutary development since the war has been the greatly increased direct contact of Canadian musicians with foreign audiences. It is possible that this relationship may be helped in the future by such fellowships as those provided by the Canadian Council for Reconstruction through UNESCO. Great credit is due to musicians such as Sir Ernest MacMillan, Raoul Jobin, Alexander Brott and Eugene Kash, who have spent much of their time during the last few years visiting foreign lands to perform and conduct programs of Canadian music. . . .



*For A Big Show—A Big Team*

It is an anomaly of the Canadian cultural scene that, although music is an art in which Canadians have made significant contributions, the works of Canadian composers and the talents of Canadian performers remained, until the end of the war, little known to the Canadian public. Prior to that time many Canadian orchestras and performers were unwilling to risk the use of much

Canadian material, while the early entry of United States agencies into what might be called the "recital business" created conditions that made the success of Canadian performers themselves difficult to achieve. As a result, many Canadian concert-goers remained largely unaware of the wealth of musical ability that was being trained in this country. (Please turn to page 6)

# National Farm Radio Forum

Eleventh Winter Season Begins October 30

With most of the crops harvested, many farmers across Canada will be turning their thoughts to the long winter evenings, including some beside the radio. And this week many of these farm people will gather in groups to hear and discuss their own program — *National Farm Radio Forum*—which begins its eleventh season on October 30.

As in the past, *Farm Forum* will present broadcasts about topics of

interest to Canada's rural residents. The winter's schedule will again be divided into five main series, each consisting of four programs. Two programs in each series will be devoted to discussion by agricultural experts and farmers on rural, social, economic and educational problems.

The speakers on these programs will be chosen for their special knowledge or their particular point of view and the chairman in each case is a member of the CBC's farm broadcast department. One program in each series will be a dramatization and every fourth broadcast will present a review of the three previous topics and a roundup of *Farm Forum* opinion across the country.

The *Farm Forum* season will open with a discussion of the question, "Can we farm on shorter hours?"—the first in a series on farm management. Next week the question, "Who should pay for soil conservation?" will be dramatized from the CBC's Toronto studios. The importance of forest conservation will be the topic for discussion on November 13.

On November 20, in place of the usual review, there will be a special broadcast from Washington. It will be in the form of a round-table on the results of the special session of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations. Speakers representing several countries will be heard.

Other general topics which will come up for consideration on *Farm Forum* this winter are health and social security, marketing, international problems and education.

*Farm Forum* is a joint project of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture, the Canadian Association for Adult Education and the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. The programs are arranged and directed by A. R. Kemp and Keith Morrow of the CBC's farm broadcast department.

Perhaps the largest listening-group type of program in the world, the *Forum* last year had sixteen hundred groups with about twenty-seven thousand members. Four hundred and thirteen new groups were organized during the 1949-50 season.

## Calgarian Conducts Maritime Singers

A native Calgarian is the conductor of the Breton Singers of Sydney, Nova Scotia, a group from a mining town who are making a great impression in broadcasts over the CBC's Maritime network. (The program is not heard in the west). He is Ewan Clark, who grew up in Halifax, and has lived in Ontario, the United States and France. Mr. Clark is a graduate of Dalhousie University, and a Master of Arts of Toronto. He did graduate research at the University of North Carolina and in Paris, France, but found time in the intervals to study piano at the Halifax Conservatory, voice at the Toronto Conservatory, and organ at the American Church in Paris.

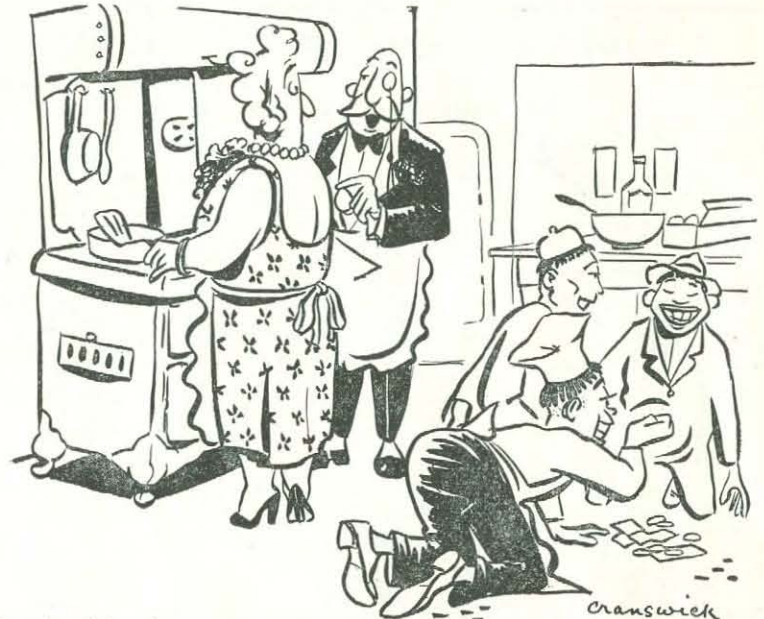

## Talent Series Returns To French Network

June Kowalchuk, Regina soprano, and William Blaine Williams, Hamilton baritone, are the regular guest artists of the third CBC French network *Our Future Stars* series scheduled to begin on October 29. Miss Kowalchuk and Mr. Williams are the winners of last season's popular Montreal talent show open to all young Canadian singers across the country. Their appearances on the program is a part of their awards—\$500 and a CBC 26-week engagement.

The coming *Our Future Stars* series has been planned on an even more elaborate scale than the two previous ones. The broadcast time has been extended to a full hour and three contestants instead of two as formerly are being presented on each program. This brings the total number to be heard on the air up to 60.

Also being featured in this year's series are outstanding solo instrumentalists and a twelve-voice choir. An instrumentalist is appearing alternately with the choir.

The program's thirty-piece orchestra is again conducted by Giuseppe Agostini and Madame Berthe Lavoie-Fortin is handling production of the air show as well as the contest organization.

The contest procedure remains the same. Auditions are now in full swing and candidates living outside the Montreal region can record their selections at their nearest CBC station and have the recording forwarded. However, all applications, which are being received up until November 5, should be addressed to Madame Berthe Lavoie-Fortin, Box 6000, Montreal.

Candidates must be Canadian, under 30 years of age and have a classical or semi-classical repertoire.

Night. A radio anthology in words and music of the phenomenon, night, prepared by a Toronto writer, Allan Anderson. Music conducted by Geoffrey Waddington; production by John Kannawin, with Robert Weaver as consultant. Mr. Anderson has drawn

upon writings and music from many countries and ages. The evening will be divided into four main sections—devoted to prose, drama, music and poetry—with the same commentator acting as guide throughout.

The prose section will be heard first (after an introductory talk by Mr. Anderson). It will include descriptions of nights spent under the stars in the country, night in the city, nights at sea and in the Antarctic. There will be five excerpts on the subject of sleep by modern authors. Some of the writers to be represented are H. D. Thoreau, J. J. Rousseau, Robert Louis Stevenson, V. S. Pritchett, Admiral Richard E. Byrd, Thomas Wolfe, R. H. Dana, Charles Dickens, Charles Lamb, J. B. Priestley and Thomas Hardy.

Next, a play based on another aspects of night—its terrors. It is The Ideal Craftsman—a radio adaptation by Mr. Anderson of Walter de la Mare's short story about a young boy who awakes at night to find himself alone in an old house with an old woman and a murdered man.

After the play there will be a program of night music, played by a CBC orchestra in Toronto.

In the poetry section, a variety of interpretations of the hours of darkness will be presented, ranging from poems by a ninth-century Chinese poet to a word picture of night on the Canadian prairie by Wilfrid Eggleston. The program will end with four poems by Archibald MacLeish, W. B. Yeats, T. S. Eliot and Hart Crane, arranged by Mr. Anderson as a chronological cycle of night's program from twilight to dawn. Distinguished Artists. Kathleen Parlow, violinist; Leo Barkin, accompanist. From Toronto. Her program will include works by Handel, Vieuxtemps, Ries and Brahms. A feature will be the first movement of Eduard Lalo's Concerto in F Minor—the work which established the Spanish composer as a concert favourite instead of merely a "musician's composer." Miss Parlow is among the most widely-known of all Canadian solo musicians. In the course of her concert career she has played throughout the Americas, in nearly every European country, as well as in Asia and Australia. She joined the staff of the Royal Conservatory of Music of Toronto in 1941 and two years later founded the Parlow String Quartet, which broadcast a series of recitals recently. ## John Kuchmy, Pianist

### An Important Recital From CBC, Winnipeg

Musicians of the orchestra often double on various instruments, but it is rare indeed for a concert performer or soloist to excel in two instrumental fields. Yet John Kuchmy, Winnipeg-born pianist and violinist who has recently returned to Canada after a long stay in England, has done that. So successful were his joint studies from the beginning that as a youngster he won in one year both the senior violin and senior piano classes at the Manitoba Musical Festival.

The CBC is presenting Mr. Kuchmy in recital on Monday, October 30 (W-10:30 p.m.; K-X-6:30 p.m.), as a pianist. Yet when he won the gold medal and a scholarship for study in England at the Royal School of Music Associated Board examinations in Winnipeg, he came to a difficult decision and placed the violin first, although so celebrated a virtuoso as Harold Samuel had urged him to focus his attention on the piano. He says now that, even though the violin has proved to be a great success, he regrets the decision he made, and after sixteen years he has returned to the instrument he loves best.

As a professional violinist, Mr. Kuchmy worked with nearly every famous orchestra in the United Kingdom, and especially enjoyed his association with such outstanding organizations as the Boyd Neel String Orchestra, the London Philharmonic and Symphony Orchestras, and the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra under the direction of Sir Thomas Beecham.

The decision to leave all this and return to the piano was brought about by the encouragement and sponsorship of a group of friends, among whom was the great teacher Mabel Lander, herself a pupil of the renowned Leschetizky, among whose pupils were such scintillating names as Paderewski, Artur Schnabel and Benno Moisevitch. John Kuchmy has inherited much from this brilliant school of pianists and brings with him to Canada an extremely colourful and invigorating style. The London Times refers to him as being particularly successful in exploiting the wide range of tone both in colour and quantity which the piano can be made to yield.

At present John Kuchmy is enjoying a much-needed rest at the home of his parents in Winnipeg. This was necessitated by an illness in England. His idea of rest, however, is rather strange, since he still practices for at least six hours each day.

## CANADIAN MUSIC ABROAD

Since 1945, this situation has steadily improved. The number of orchestras and performers willing to introduce new Canadian works into their repertoires has notably increased, and an audience for Canadian composers and musicians is being created.

Marked improvement has also occurred in the opportunities for Canadian composers to have their scores published.

The establishment within the last few years of BMI Canada Limited, an affiliate of Broadcast Music Incorporated of the United States, directed jointly by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation and the Canadian Association of Broadcasters, has further increased the opportunities for publishing Canadian scores. Already this organization has issued more than thirty works by young Canadian composers such as Barbara Pentland, Harry Somers, Jean-Papineau Couture, Albertine Caron-Legris and Kenneth Peacock.

Few recordings of Canadian music are produced commercially. The recent production by the CBC International Service of limited quantities of recordings of Canadian music for the use of Canadian posts abroad has emphasized this fact. The first album so produced was sold to the Canadian branch of RCA Victor; but since that transaction the CBC has been unable to stimulate further commercial recordings of serious Canadian music. Thus, apart from this album, there is little available in recorded form to those interested in Canadian music, save a number of streamlined versions of French-Canadian folk songs and a plethora of popular dance tunes and so-called "rustic" songs.

Since its inception in February 1945, the CBC International Service has also made known to listeners in Latin America and Europe a large number of new Canadian musical works. Besides these broadcasts, the International Service has donated many albums of Canadian compositions and recorded programs containing works by Canadians to foreign radio stations. The curious result has been that there are a number of compositions written in this country that have been heard by foreign radio audiences but not by Canadians. In fact, certain Canadian composers are better known in Mexico and Denmark than they are at home.

By playing CBC International Service recordings on suitable occasions, several Canadian posts abroad, such as those at Rome and Copenhagen, have been able to arouse considerable interest in Canadian music on the spot, and to create a demand for further information about the composers and for scores of the works themselves. It is hoped that the state of musical publication in Canada will in time permit all requests of this kind to be met.

## The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of October 22, 1950.

### Winter Care of House Plants

1. Two of the best references for amateur growers of house plants are:

(a) *All About House Plants*, by Montagu Free, published by the American Garden Guild; and

(b) *House Plants*, by Wm. Godfrey, Morden, Man., and issued as Publication 798 by the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

2. Winter months provide a season of rest for most house plants and treatment should be made accordingly. Resting plants should not be forced into activity until they are ready for another season of activity. They require less water, less feeding and lower temperatures.

3. House temperatures of 68 to 72 degrees, comfortable to the family, are uncomfortable for most plants. Lowering the night temperature to 55 or 60 degrees is helpful but for many plants cool quarters should be provided until they are ready to make new growth. A well lighted basement or bedroom window is a suitable place for such plants.

4. Watering of resting plants should be limited to what is strictly necessary to keep plants healthy but not growing. Only exceptional plants in bloom should be given much water. But on the other hand all plants must be protected against winter drought in the house due to very dry air. For both people and plants attention should be given to maintaining reasonable humidity.

5. Some plants require dry conditions during the rest period. These include the common *calla lily* which does best if given a three months dry period. *Fuchsias* should be kept only moist enough to prevent the wood drying out until January when they may be pruned, watered, fed and forced into new growth.

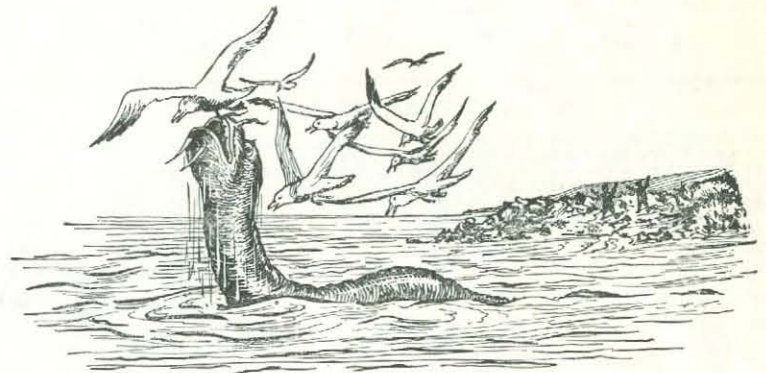
