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**T**AKING its place among the major symphonic groups of Canada today is the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, which is heard over the CBC Trans-Canada network on Sundays, alternating with the Vancouver Symphony and other programs of serious music. **WALTER KAUFMANN**, subject of this week's cover picture, is the orchestra's permanent conductor. Mr. Kaufmann came to Canada in 1947, after a distinguished musical career in his native Czechoslovakia and as director of music for the All-India Radio in Bombay. He spent a year as head of the department of piano and theory at the Halifax Conservatory before coming to Winnipeg, and his suite "Strange Town at Night," written soon after his arrival, deals with that famous maritime city. His "Sinfonietta," which the Winnipeg Symphony performed last year, and which the Toronto Symphony will perform this week, has also won distinction, and his ballet suite written for Winnipeg's famous troupe was performed with great success.



### *The UN Colossus*

Someone asked me a few days ago which was more exciting—Winnipeg during the Great Flood of '50, or the United Nations during the Fifth General Assembly. The answer isn't simple.

The flood was a period of crisis. It was tragic—and yes, exciting. But the basic dramatic element of the Manitoba Flood was physical conflict—human strength struggling against a "force of nature." The struggle reached a climax, the water subsided, and the drama was over.

Here at the United Nations,

on the other hand, is a continuing drama of conflict between individuals and nations and, to coin an analogous phrase, the whole "force of humanity." When you have represented in the same room, several fundamental philosophies, many religions, social systems, and cultural ideals, you have something very complex indeed. In short, you have conflict between civilizations. . . .

Broadcasting from the United Nations presents very special problems of selection. In one day there might be a meeting of the Economic and Social Council discussing civilian aid for Korea in the morning, the Security Council dealing with a Middle Eastern problem in the afternoon, and simultaneously, morning and afternoon, meetings of three or four

Margaret Ann Ireland was born in Winnipeg in 1928, of Irish-French parentage. She studied in Toronto (Royal Conservatory), and New York (with Mieczuslaw Horszowski). She made her concert debut at 16 with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, and has been heard frequently on CBC.

Walter Kaufmann, conductor of the Winnipeg Symphony, is a native of Czechoslovakia and a graduate of the University of Prague. He studied with Franz Schreker in Berlin, and was later director of music for the All-India Radio in Bombay. He came to Canada in 1947, as head of the department of piano and theory at the Halifax Conservatory. In November, 1948, he moved to Winnipeg as permanent conductor of the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra.

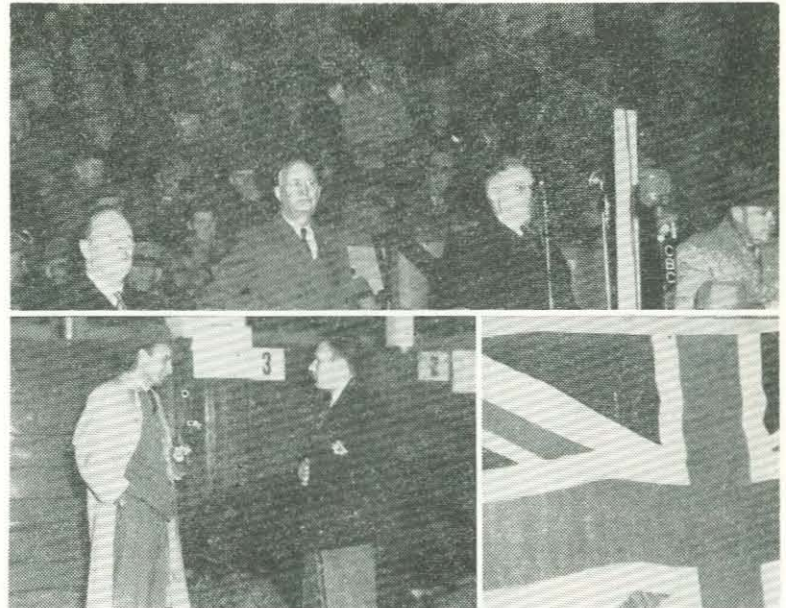

## A Unique Event British Livestock Sold For Manitoba Flood Relief

A unique event in the annals of Canada was broadcast recently, when Saturday Magazine reported the auction sale of 63 head of British livestock in aid of the Manitoba Flood Relief Fund. CBC Announcer George Kent, CBC International Service Representative Liston Burns, and CBC Farm Commentator Bob Knowles broadcast a half hour of the sale direct from the Winter Fair Arena in Brandon, Manitoba.

Bob Knowles reports that this is the first time in Canadian history that a group of purebred British livestock has been auctioned in a Canadian sale ring, and while the purpose of the sale was to aid Red River Valley farmers who had lost livestock during last spring's flood, it was speculated that others might follow should this first shipment of purebred livestock meet with good favour.

The sixty-three head comprised of Shorthorn and Angus and Hereford beef cattle; Jersey and Ayrshire dairy cattle; Red Poll dual purpose and Yorkshire hogs arrived at the Brandon Stock pavilion several days before the auction sale. While resting up from the two-month, 5,000-mile journey, they were truly "the showcase of Britain." The livestock represented some of the world's best blood lines in cattle, sheep and swine. Western farmers came from near and far.

The stock was sold under the hammer of W. J. "Bill" Durno and associates, who gave their services free in aid of the Flood Fund. The sale established an all-time Canadian record price for swine when a boar sold for \$1,550. The sale netted over \$66,000.

## The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of October 29, 1950.

### More House Plant Problems

In order to grow choice house plants the formula of amount of light, temperature, water and soil mixture must be varied to suit the particular kind of plant and its stage of development. Here are two illustrations:

1. **African Violets:** (a) **Soil**—Two cups loam, two cups leaf mold or well decayed peat, one cup sheep or cow manure, well rotted, one cup sharp sand, one tablespoonful bonemeal. (This mix is also suitable for ferns, begonias, and plants requiring a porous soil, rich in organic matter.)

(b) **Light**—Does not like direct, strong light but winter sunshine of low intensity satisfactory. In summer keep where light is filtered through curtain of texture of cheesecloth. Use lighted windows in winter, northern ones in midsummer.

(c) **Temperature**—Seventy degrees in daytime, sixty degrees at night. Does not like severe chilling when in bloom.

(d) **Water**—Loves plenty of moisture and air in the soil. Water from underneath with some water in saucer daily. Keep air in room humid.

2. **Boston Ferns:** (a) **Soil**—As above.

(b) **Light**—Filtered sunlight, not direct light.

(c) **Temperature**—Seventy degrees. Do not like cold draughts or sudden changes. Essential to keep air moist.

(d) **Water**—Soil must be kept moist but not soggy. Provide ample drainage with coarse rubble in bottom of pot.

Love in a Coffee Cup. In 1727 a German poet named Picander published a journal in "villainous verse" satirizing the excessive use of coffee in Leipzig. A few years later he turned his "poem" into a comic cantata—the Coffee Cantata—for which Bach wrote the music in 1732. In recent years the work has been revived as a chamber opera called Love in a Coffee Cup and a half-hour version of the opera will be presented tonight by the Montreal Minute Opera Company. ## Northern Messenger Regulations Issued Service Resumes on CBC Stations West and East

Last week saw the resumption once more of the CBC Northern Messenger Service, which has been carrying messages—about 200 each week—to trappers and traders, mounties and missionaries, in the one and a half million square miles of the Canadian northland since 1933.

Bernard Deaville, CBC producer who looks after the Northern Messenger broadcasts at Winnipeg, has once again issued the list of regulations governing these programs. The service, he notes, is available only for residents of the Northwest Territories and Canadian Arctic not in touch by regular means of communication such as airmail, telephone or telegraph. It operates as a weekly program during the winter season only—from the beginning of November to the end of March. There is no charge for the service.

Once again, listeners are reminded that messages should be as brief as possible—not more than 25 words. They should be addressed to:

The Northern Messenger Service, Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, Winnipeg, Manitoba.

The name and address of the sender must be included with every message. Also, the name and location of the person to whom the message is addressed must be included with every message.

The Messenger Service is broadcast over CBW, Manitoba, 990 Kc.; CBK, Saskatchewan, 540 Kc.; CBX, Alberta, 1010 Kc., and the Army Signal Transmitter VED 82.65 Mcs., on Friday nights (actually Saturday mornings in the Central Zone) at 12.15 a.m. CST, and 11.15 p.m. MST. It is repeated eight days later on Sundays at 11.20 p.m. Eastern Standard Time on CBA, Sackville, N.B., 1070 Kcs., CKLO, 9.63 Mcs., 31.15 metres, and CKOB, 6.09 Mcs., 49.26.

## Daily Broadcasts To Russia Shortly

Ottawa—The International Service of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation will shortly start regular daily transmissions to Soviet Russia, it was announced here today by A. Davidson Dunton, Chairman of the CBC Board of Governors.

This will add Russian to the twelve languages in which the International Service is now broadcasting daily.

"These transmissions will add a Canadian contribution to the broadcasting into the USSR being carried on by the BBC and the Voice of America," Mr. Dunton said "some adjustments in the program schedules of the International Service will be necessary but it is felt that this new additional means of bringing information from the outside world to the people of Russia fully justifies the changes. The Russian service will begin as soon as the necessary language staff has been assembled and trained. At present two half-hour periods daily are contemplated."

committees of the General Assembly. When so much is going on, what do we do?

We have a daily five-minute commentary in which regular correspondents analyze important trends and developments in UN affairs, from various points of view. While the Assembly continues, there will be almost nightly reports from Lake Success or Flushing Meadow on *CBC News Roundup*. So, in about seven minutes of air time every day, we try to tell you about the United Nations something more than you get in the news.

Quite often, naturally, our correspondents will follow the "big story," the story that is making headlines. But we will continue to try, whenever we can, to tell you some of the "smaller" stories about debate on the International Endowment Fund for Children, or the Technical Assistance Program, for instance. These stories are often as "big," or bigger in the long run of their importance than the more sensational, "headline" stories. It is important for all of us to see the United Nations as a whole. This is not easy, but I think it must be the aim of our CBC programs from Lake Success.

We feel that one of the most effective ways of letting you in on the kaleidoscopic scene at UN is to let you hear people from all parts of the world express their opinions on important issues themselves. So occasionally on *International Commentary* (instead of Walter O'Hearn, John Rogers, A. M. Rosenthal, Leon Edel or Peter Stursberg), you will hear guests such as Sir Mohammad Zafrullia Khan of Pakistan, and Fawzi Bey of Egypt. And on *Press Conference*, a new Dominion network program scheduled to begin later this month, you will hear UN news from time to time. Correspondents from many lands will be heard quizzing UN delegates about their countries' policies. Our UN contributions to this series will, we hope, recreate for Canadian listeners some of the atmosphere of UN itself.

Another important aspect of our UN coverage is Canada's part in debate and action here. Mr. Pearson, chief of the Canadian delegation, has already given us one special talk about Canada's position on the general problems which face this Assembly. From time to time, other members of the Canadian delegation and political advisers from opposition parties will be heard on *International Commentary*.

Only part of our work here is covering UN for Canadian listeners. The CBC International Service also uses regular commentaries from UN in its shortwave transmissions to Norway, Sweden, Denmark, the Netherlands, Germany, Italy, Czechoslovakia and the United Kingdom. . . .

They are Fedora Barbieri (as Princess Eboli), Delia Rigal (Elizabeth of Valois) and Boris Christoff (Philip II of Spain).
